NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

This year probably will be long remembered as the "Year of the Appraisal". To our knowledge, for the first time in Wilmot's history, *all* of its land and structures will be inspected and re-appraised at the same time. It was voted at the 1965 Town Meeting to hire the appraisers of the State Tax Commission to make this study and to provide the town with complete records of each property and the computations by which they arrived at the assessment.

The sum of twenty-five hundred dollars was raised for this purpose. This estimate of cost was provided by the Tax Commission and should be adequate. However, there are ways by which each and all of us can cooperate with the appraisers to keep our costs down.

1) *Prepare your inventories as accurately as possible and send them in promptly.* Research on the part of the appraisers will be time consuming and costly. Last year only 56% of the residents and 61% of the non-residents filed *any* kind of inventory. Care in filing your inventory will also be of value in assuring a correct evaluation of your holdings.

2) *Have your deeds and records available when the appraiser calls* so that the number of re-visits can be kept to a minimum.

The Tax Commission has advised us that the re-appraisal will take place soon after the first of April. We are pleased with this timing since it should mean that the tax rate will be set and tax bills mailed at their usual time. This will relieve us of the necessity of borrowing more money than we normally do to finance town costs until tax revenue is received.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

During 1965 the TRA and Duncan Fund monies were spent on the following projects:

- 1) Sealing the last section of the Elkins Road.
- 2) Black topping and sealing the new entrance to Rte. 4A at the north end of the Campground Road.
- 3) Sealing that portion of Cross Hill which was topped the year before and constructing and black topping the remainder of Cross Hill.

In 1966, we can anticipate Town Road Aid in the amount of \$6,208.74, with our share being \$809.84. The Duncan Fund will amount to \$4,260.01.

THE 1966 BUDGET

Your selectmen have prepared as tight a budget as possible. In only two areas are we asking for an increase in appropriations. In Election and Registration, it will be necessary to raise more because we have three elections this year as opposed to one last year. In Old Age Assistance, what seems to be a surplus in last year's appropriation is in reality a deficit because the State did not send our bills for the last three months of the year. The inclusion of these bills would raise the amount spent to \$3,200 (\$400.00 above our appropriation). We feel that we will need \$3,500 for 1966 to survive anticipated increases in the costs of nursing home care.

This "hold the line" budget certainly does not reflect any attitude on our part that there are not areas in which improvement could take place. It does reflect our great concern with increased school costs and its financial impact upon the property owners. By Town Meeting time, the decision will have been made regarding the Cooperative School. Whatever the result, it is apparent that a rise in school costs is inevitable due to the number of tuition students and the increasing standards we must maintain in our local schools.

We normally try to estimate what effect the budget under consideration, including that of the School District,

will have on our tax rate. This would be relatively meaningless this year due to the re-appraisal and subsequent computing of the tax rate on 100% values. We wish, however, to point out that, based on our present net valuation, we will be faced with raising by taxation about 6% more than we did in 1965.

IN MEMORIAM

We are all saddened by the loss last summer of another of our fine public servants. Miss Ruth Grace acted as Police Officer and Chief of Police for many years. At all times, she handled her responsibilities with dignity and devotion to the welfare of the town. Our loss is great.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$809.84 — the state to contribute \$6,028.74 for Town Road Aid.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day observance.
7. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Old Home Day observance.
8. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for the New London Hospital.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.60 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
10. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade.
11. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Incorporated.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town's needs. The sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent.
13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of \$300 from the Synod of New England United Presbyterian Church and to grant authority to the Selectmen to accept any possible future gifts from the same donor.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Townspeople of Wilmot:

The financial report of the Library Trustees will provide information about the items for which funds were used during the past year.

The trustees and librarians were assisted by personnel from the State Library in "thinning" the books in both libraries prior to the Book Sale.

A successful, Book, Food and Art Print Sale was held in July.

There were displays of new books at the Town Hall on Town Meeting Day and later at Sanborn's Village Store.

State and Regional meetings for the selection of books have been attended whenever possible.

Book Week was observed with a special afternoon program for the children.

The Dewey Decimal System has been put into operation. It is a time consuming task and not too much has been done. If any townspeople, not now directly connected with the Libraries, are familiar with the Dewey Decimal System and would like to help in this work, their assistance would be appreciated.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump.

If you must burn rubbish or brush:

- a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
- b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
- c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres in destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

**REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD**

The past year has been a busy one for your School Board. In our weekly meeting with the Regional School Study Committee, we have had a chance to seriously consider the present problems and deficiencies of our educational situation and its relationship to the difficulties confronting our neighbor communities. By the time this report is printed the issue of a Regional Cooperative School will have been resolved by vote on February 21st.

No one can tell just what the changes around us will mean to Wilmot. We can be sure that school costs in the future will be much greater whatever happens and the only question will be what our extra dollars will bring us in more adequate education.

Our own problems of maintenance and repair have continued throughout the year.

The Flat School was newly painted this past summer, both inside and outside. The balance of the money received last year from Sweepstakes revenue was used to buy desks and chairs for the Flat School. They are the same type that have been used so satisfactorily at the Center School for the past several years. Also, the Board felt that it was necessary for the gravel yard in front of the Flat School to be oiled.

The classroom floor was being worn badly from the gravel that was carried into the room on the children's shoes. The oiling was done during the fall with a satisfactory result.

There have been no necessary major projects at the Center School this year.

The fourth through eighth grade students took a trip to the Boston Museum of Science last spring and all of the children made their annual trip to the Tracy Library in New London to commemorate National Book Week.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the parents, teachers, superintendent, bus drivers, custodians and residents for their cooperation in the education and welfare of our students in Wilmot.



REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wilmot:

Since the school report of last year the Wilmot School District has made a major decision regarding the educational opportunities of Wilmot pupils.

In taking the necessary action to send grades seven and eight to New London, on a tuition basis, the district has done much to improve educational opportunities for all Wilmot pupils. Those attending school in New London will have the advantages of a more complete program, as well as the stimulation and competition which prevails in larger classes working under a departmentalized plan.

Teachers who teach only in one or two subject matter areas are able to devote more time to the preparation of materials, and to the needs of the pupils with whom they work. The benefits of such an opportunity for Wilmot pupils may be difficult to measure but such benefits will be very

evident to the pupils themselves as they advance to the work of the high school.

There are very obvious benefits, also, for the pupils who are presently enrolled in grades one through six. Even with two grades removed we find twenty-five or more pupils in each of the schools.

Although three grades to a classroom present certain handicaps to both teacher and pupil, it is somewhat more acceptable than the larger groups with four grades per room.

With fewer pupils and fewer lessons to prepare, each pupil gains by receiving more attention and assistance than was possible previously.

The Board and the community is to be commended for its action and for the interest and concern indicated by all who have worked for improved opportunities for Wilmot children.
