### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Town Meeting at 7 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Auditorium in said Andover on Tuesday the Tenth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to change its system of highway management by having the Selectmen appoint the Town Road Agent effective January 1, 1971. (By petition)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to join with other towns in the area of Andover. Bradford, Danbury, New London, Salisbury, Springfield, Sutton, Warner, Webster, and Wilmot for the purpose of enabling the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association to provide home visiting nursing and other related services to the inhabitants of the participating towns, and to raise and appropriate \$1.25 per inhabitant of the town.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to appoint an active committee to work with the Board of Selectmen to make provisions for a new Town dump, said committee being empowered to acquire the site necessary and to set up operation of said dump.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance related to dogs running at large:

No dog shall be allowed to run at large within the confines of this Town. A dog shall be deemed to be running at large if not restrained by being tied on a rope, chain, or cable permanently fixed in place, or on a leash held by its owner or keeper, or if not otherwise within the immediate care and control of its owner or keeper. In addition to any other damages recoverable or fines or penalties which may be prescribed by law, the owner or keeper of any dog running at large, whether with or without the knowledge of its owner or keeper, shall be fined ten dollars (\$10.00), to be paid to the Town.

8. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Board of Selectmen to regulate parking on the former B. and M. railroad lot at Highland Lake, to charge appropriate fees for parking on said lot, said fees

to be expended on care and maintenance of the lot and adjacent boat ramp.

- 9. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service (Social Security coverage) in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### Selectmen's Report to the Town

We look back at the operation of town government for the past year as a rather conservative year. Due to extra heavy expenses incurred during past late winter and much rainy weather during the spring and early summer we reached midyear with very limited funds. As a result, spending in general was kept at a minimum. But for an easier than expected November and December we would have had difficulty keeping the total appropriation in the black.

A minimum of tax assessing was done in the field. This is a job that always needs more time than you can give to it. In these days of a constantly changing real estate market values are continually changing, requiring a considerable amount of work every year to keep assessments on a fair and equitable level.

Five new window units with screens and storm glass were purchased but are yet to be installed. Also insulation for capping was bought. More window units should be bought and these jobs completed. Plans should be made to eventually replace the furnace in the town building with a more efficient unit, the savings effected would pay for this over a period of time.

We might note that the net expense under the police department item would have been at a lower figure if an expected reimbursement of \$318.50 on purchas of a police radio by the previous board had been received before the end of the year. This amount when received will show in the 1970 report.

The 1968 appropriation for a new bathhouse at the beach is still being carried over pending the grant of matching funds.

We are about to the end of the present dump site and feel that this is the year for the town to make definite plans to acquire a new site for future years. We could possibly use the present sandpit as a dump for a short period of time, but as state statutes will require that we abolish our open burning dump within several years, any delay will only mean unnecessary expense and hardship. We recommend an active committee be appointed to work in conjunction with the board to acquire and set up a new dump which will conform with the new regulations.

Many things can and have been said both for and against our particular system of road maintenance. Until such time as the town may wish to change this system, continued improvements can only be made with the cooperative efforts of the selectmen, road agent, and others concerned in planning and expending the funds available to get maximum use of the tax dollar.

All asphalt and patch monies were not spent as sealing of roads was not started until fall, cold weather curtailing this activity. The

need still remains for more sealing of roads than in the past.

1908 Town Read Aid funds were expended on Beech Hill from the Clyde Currier residence down to the Lawrence St. bridge. We were pleased that this project was completed after a late start and well within funds available. 1960 T. R. A. funds have yet to be spent in full, a partial start having been made on the hill leading from John Graves' down to Tilton Brock.

The Duncan fund or Class V road fund was spent in roughing out the Pinnacle road from the Taunton Hill Rd. to the Kiniry home. This remains unfinished and will need more gravel as does the previous years project on the Girney Putney Road.

As for town bridge construction, the bridge on Sucker Brook on the highway leading to Ole Ericksens was completed at a cost considerably in excess of the \$1,000 appropriation. This present board is in favor of increasing th's amount to the original appropriation of \$2,500 voted in past years. Funds left over from one bridge project can be used to buy materials for next, and sometimes at a saving. The money spent on permanent construction is a good long range investment and the town still has a number of bridge problems to be taken care of.

In looking ahead to 1970 it appears that cost of doing town business will continue to go upwards. Labor needs and deserves more wages per hour, material goods, parts, etc. continue to rise in price from month to month, and the budget will have to and will continue to reflect this inflation, or else we will have to do less for the same amount of money and perhaps pay out more in the long run.

### Andover Rescue Squad, Inc.

Once again, during the third year of operation, the principal activity of the Andover Rescue Squad has been its ambulance service.

During the year forty-three patients, four less than last year, were transported to or from hospitals. There were twenty-eight trips to New London Hospital, nine to Franklin Regional, three to Mary Hitchcock, two to Lakes Region General and one to Concord Hospital.

Only four patients were involved in automobile accidents, compared with nine in 1968. Two trips were the result of skiing accidents, one of these involving the use of auxiliary outdoor rescue equipment and the other a trip to the Ragged Mountain Ski Area. The remainder concerned the sick or elderly, one maternity case and one juvenile. Thirty-six patients were local residents, seven were non-residents.

A second oxygen unit was purchased for the ambulance to supplement the resuscitator, and two outdoor rescue kits were assembled.

The ambulance was out of service for one week early in December while in Concord for rather expensive repairs to the electrical system. Fortunately no real emergency occurred during the out-of-service period.

The use of the third stall at the East Andover Fire Station, thru the courtesy of the fire company, has proved very satisfactory.

It is hoped that in the near future the members of the rescue squad will be linked together by a new Quick-Call telephone service, by arrangement with the Kearsarge Telephone Company. A single call number will alert all members.

The Andover Library is supported by appropriations made at town meeting — your tax money. The William Adams Bachelder Library at East Andover operates on its own endowment funds from the estate of the late Nahum J. Bachelder. Both are town libraries in every other sense and are available to all residents. The same trustees administer both.

The attractive basement room in the Bachelder Library is available without charge throughout the year to any individual or group needing a meeting place, and continues to be quite generally used. Date arrangements should be made with the librarian.

The appearance of the building has been greatly improved by the addition of a new dormer-type false roof over the entrance porch. A large water-color over the fireplace mantle, on loan from Miss Annaleida Van't Hoff, gives added attractiveness to the interior. The librarian conducted two story hours at the elementary school.

When Federal funds to the New Hampshire State Library were reduced during 1969 our two libraries ceased to enjoy the centralized book purchasing and cataloguing service it had been providing. They must now purchase direct from supply houses or publishers and perform their own cataloguing. Bookmobile books continue to be a much used and appreciated addition to the local shelf lists. Here again, the lower Federal funding may well mean fewer new Bookmobile books in the future.

We urge our new citizens, and all others as well, to take full advantage of both libraries. Those interested in local history may find the Old Picture File at the Bachelder Library an interesting collection showing covered bridges, buildings and scenes from the past. Ask the librarian.

#### School Board's Report

Continued increases in teacher salaries, tuition and transportation make up the largest part of the budget. Every effort has been exerted to keep the total increases to a minimum, However, rising education costs must be met by all of us, if we wish to maintain the level of education we all wish for our children.

The school nurses salary has been added to the school budget as this helps to reflect the true cost of operating our schools.

Several faculty changes were made this past year, and although we were unable to hire replacements for our music teacher, home economic and shop teachers, it is hoped this next year we will have these positions filled.

The 1969-70 school year was one of heavy expenses with replacement of the roof on the old high school building and major repair to our furnace. In the year 1970-71 we hope to continue in the replacement of furniture and the painting of woodwork also in the refinishing of the floors as it is imperative that we keep our building in good repair.

The members of your school board wish to express their gratitude to each of you for the whole-hearted support and cooperation given them this past year. We also wish to thank Mr. Perkins, Principal and his staff, also Mrs. Nelson and her lunch staff for their efforts and dedication in helping to make our school run smoothly and efficiently. Our appreciation goes to Mr. Seymour, custodian, who has worked hard to make our school a clean and pleasant place.

#### Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

The school year has seen several changes of a physical nature in the school plant itself. New roofing has been installed on the older portion of the building, together with new metal flashing to insure another extended period of service.

A considerable amount of painting was completed on the interior of the building, resulting in a much brighter appearance in the lobby and hallways of the old high school.

Floor tiles were installed as necessary and a partition was installed in what used to be the assembly area of the older building. This has resulted in two classrooms which are more nearly soundproof, so that neither group should be disturbed by the activities of the other.

An effort is being made to create a small library and reference area within the school. In addition, of course, the pupils make excellent use of the town library which is so conveniently located for class visits.

The Andover School Board is to be commended for its efforts to develop a systematic program for repairs and maintenance of the school building and grounds.

Again this year plans are complete for additional painting and the purchase of a limited number of pupil desks and chairs to replace those which have worn out.

It has been a pleasure to work with these interested citizens in the operation of the Andover school.
