TOWN WARRANT

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 9 A.M. to 6:30 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 4th day of March, next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as off-sets against budgeted appropriations for the following purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to draw the sum of \$15,000 from the amount now held by the Selectmen consisting of the Town of Barnstead's share of Revenue Sharing Funds and to authorize said Selectmen to deposit said amount in the Capital Reserve Fund entitled Town Dump.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to draw the sum of \$6,000 from the amount now held by the selectmen, consisting of the Town of Barnstead's share of Revenue Sharing Funds, and authorize said Selectmen to issue checks in equal amounts of \$3,000 to both The Center Barnstead Fire Department and The Barnstead Parade Fire Department. This appropriation to be used by each of the aforementioned departments under the direction of their governing bodies for the purchase and/or replacement of fire equipment that the departments deem necessary to bring their standards up to those required for the safe and efficient protection of lives and property in the town of Barnstead.

- 6. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to adopt the current National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code 101. This code deals with life safety from fires and tike emergencies. It covers construction, petroleum, and occupancy features to minimize danger to life from fire, smoke, fumes, or panic before the buildings are vacated. It specifies the number, size, and arrangement of exit facilities sufficient to permit prompt escape of occupants from buildings or structures in case of fire or other conditions dangerous to life. However, private homes are excluded from The Life Safety Code. This code will give the local authority jurisdiction.

- 7. To see if the voters will vote to adopt the following ordinance to promote the Health, Safety and General Welfare of the Town of Barnstead:

Any appliance used for the burning of wood, coal or other solid fuels shall have installed underneath, sheet metal of at least 23 gauge or other noncombustable materials, such as, concrete, brick or slate to insulate floors and carpets, and to catch sparks, this protection should extend six inches beyond all sides, and 18 inches from the point where the ashes are removed, said appliance shall be equipped with legs, or simulated legs at least four inches high, also the distance from said appliance shall be at least 36 inches to the back wall and 24 inches to any side wall.

Single wall metal flue or smoke pipe used on any appliance listed in the preceding paragraph and connecting to an interior or exterior chimney shall be a minimum of 18 inches from any combustable material unless protected by approved noncombustable material.

Single wall metal flue, or smoke pipe used for the construction of an interior chimney, and passing through any wall, ceiling, floor, partition or window for the purpose of venting flue gases to the outside shall be prohibited in any structure used in whole or part for human habitation.

Factory made, double walled smoke pipe of the Metalbestos type so called may be used for the above purpose when installed according to the manufacturers' recommendations.

The authority having jurisdiction may, acting upon a request from the tenant or owner permit exceptions to

the above code if in his opinion other precautions are taken to adequately safeguard life and property. The above regulations shall pertain to all existing, and future structures in the Town of Barnstead, and shall take effect upon passage by a majority vote.

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Fire Safety Code shall be punished upon conviction, by a fine, not to exceed \$10.00 for each day of violation.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to change the Full Time Police Dept. back to a Part Time Dept. If the vote is in the affirmative, to take effect as of town meeting day.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500 for the operation of the Part Time Police Dept. (By Petition)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the New Hampshire Humane Society and instruct the Selectmen to enter into an agreement so-called "The Animal Control Agreement" with the New Hampshire Humane Society.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund entitled "Town of Barnstead Tax Map" and raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be deposited in said account.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a 20 (plus or minus) acre tract of land from Pittsfield Box & Lumber Co. for the sum of \$16,000 for the purpose of establishing a town sand and gravel procurement area. Said property is located on the Hannah Nutter Road and referred to as the Allen lot.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 to be used toward financing the sesquibicentennial celebration of the Town of Barnstead to be held in 1977. This sum to be placed in the custody of the Barnstead Historical Society.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Barnstead, Pittsfield, Chichester Refuse Planning Committee. Said money to be used to defray expenses and to research all refuse disposal alternatives available to said towns in order to comply with State requirements.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$430.00 for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Barnstead through the Laconia Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages, as well as preservation of the natural resources of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 for the perpetual care of lot #76 in the Riverview Cemetery in the name of Maitland C. and Ola E. Knowles.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to have the State Tax Commission or an approved firm by the State Tax Commission re-assess the taxable property in the Town of Barnstead for the ensuing year of 1975.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen employ legal action against the Pittsfield Box & Lumber Co. Inc., and prosecute said Pittsfield Box & Lumber Co. Inc. for the violation of the Planning and Land Use Ordinance for the Town of Barnstead. The violation of this ordinance is covered within Article VII of the Planning and Land Use Ordinance for the Town of Barnstead, and was violated by the Pittsfield Box & Lumber Co. Inc. on October 21, 1974. (By Petition)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to grant the Town of Barnstead the authority to cope with the safety hazards which open excavations create, to safeguard the public health and welfare; to preserve our Town assets; to prevent pollution of land and water; to promote soil stabilization and to preserve the aesthetic features of the Town of Barnstead.

Section 1. The removal of clay, sod, loam, sand, gravel and stone may be permitted, but only subject to the issuance of a permit by the Board of Selectmen and subject to the following provisions:

- a. Existing pits that are legally operating may continue and will be granted a permit, upon request, to the Selectmen of the Town of Barnstead, within six months of enactment of this Ordinance.
- b. The removal of clay, sod, loam, sand, gravel, and stone for the purpose of town road maintenance shall not require the issuance of a permit but shall adhere to the other provisions of this Ordinance.

c. The Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Conservation Commission shall hold a Public Hearing

upon application for a permit.

d. Upon application the property owner shall file with the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Conservation Commission an adequate plan showing existing topography, proposed depths of cut, and final topography.

e. In the event that a permit is granted, the property owner shall be required to post a performance bond in a sum determined by the Board of Selectmen, to insure that loam and topsoil be re-spread and the area re-seeded in order to be protected against erosion

and sedimentation.

f. All loam and topsoil removed from the above excavations shall be stockpiled on the premises.

g. No permit shall be issued for a period of more than two years after which period the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Conservation Commission, after a public hearing, renew the permit for successive periods of not more than two years, providing that all conditions of the first permit have been met.

In evaluating applications, the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and Conservation Commission shall be governed by the following considerations:

- a. Proof that suitable material is available.
- Removal of clay, sod, loam, sand, gravel or stone will not be detrimental to neighboring properties.
- c. The effect of trucking into and from the area, and the resultant dust conditions and effects on the roads of the Town of Barnstead.
- d. The elevation of the bottom of the proposed excavation with respect to existing road grades, water table and surrounding terrain.
- e. Future drainage in the general area in which the removal is proposed.
- f. Set-back from existing roads and abutters' property lines.

Section 2. Validity: Should any section of this Ordinance be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not effect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any other part thereof.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to designate the Pineo Road as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Barnstead. (By Petition)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to designate Narrows Road from the junction of Beauty Hill Road to the junction of the Whiteoaks Road as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Barnstead and further, that the Selectmen shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7. (By Petition)
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to designate the below listed roads as scenic roads under the provisions of RSA 253:17, 18 for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Barnstead and further, that the Selectmen shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7. (By Petition)
 - -Vail Road to Hazel Clark Road.
 - -Hazel Clark Road.
 - -Old Pineo Road from Rte. 28 to Brindle Pond Road.
 - —Garland Road out of Barnstead Parade to Rte. 107.
 - -Road between Lloyd Hanson and Mr. Fallers' house.
 - —The extension of the Hannah Nutter Road which comes out on the junction of the Vail Road and the Hazel Clark Road.
 - —Snackerty Road from Lockes Corner to Barn Door Gap Road.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

As the inflationary economy and the fuel shortage had its effect on you, it has also had its effect on your library. The fuel shortage, which was more evident last winter, caused the library to curtail its evening hours at the request of the selectmen, but we were able to open once again in the evening as spring and the warmer weather approached. The increased cost of books, due to the rise in the cost of paper, has decreased the purchasing power of the funds that we have.

Nevertheless, in addition to the usual library expenses, we were still able to make many improvements to the building, which had been sorely needed.

- 1. We were able to have a hot water heater, which the building had been without, installed.
- 2. One of the light fixtures in the bathrooms had not been working, and we were able to have this replaced.
- 3. The bathrooms had been in need of a facelifting. We cleaned the finished wood walls and then coated them with polyurethane. The floors were covered with linoleum.
- 4. At present we have a storm window on order for the large window in front of the library, as there is quite a heat loss there.

The librarians and trustees welcome the townspeople's use of its various services, and this year we were very happy to see numerous groups and individuals take advantage of many of the services we offer, a few of which are noted here. We are happy to report that our copying machine has been well used, and that the projector we purchased not long ago has been used widely for programs that the library has sponsored and also by many groups within the town on numerous occasions. The summer reading program was once again a success.

Again, the Trustees would like to thank Mrs. Ellen Grau and Mrs. Carolyn Johnson, who as usual have done an exceptional job this year. Mrs. Johnson has completed her courses and has received her certificate in Public Library Technique from the University of New Hampshire.

A major concern still facing the library is the lack of space, which we hope will be taken into consideration by the Town Hall Study Committee.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Much effort was given by the Conservation Commission this year to planning and preparing the town's property on Suncook Pond for a beach. Bids for construction of a causeway to the beach were submitted and Roscoe Tasker and Son were selected for the job. This will be finished by late spring and the beach will be open to Barnstead residents this summer.

The Commission has entered a wetlands conservation article in the town warrant. This article is not meant to restrict people from using their land for purposes appropriate to wetlands. The Commission encourages such uses. If the article passes, watershed areas and future water supplies should always remain protected.

The Commission has also investigated certain areas in town, all wetland, with the thought of acquiring them in the future. It is felt to be very important that certain areas be forever preserved in their natural state.

The Commission has acquired a wetlands map which is on display in the library.

Through the Laconia Community Action Center a complete array of services and programs are offered. The Community Action Program serves in a referral and advocate capacity for low income people in emergency situations. It works with the people to assess the community needs, develops programs to meet these needs, and generate the funds, in-kind services and non-cash donations to support the programs developed.

During 1974 residents of Barnstead have participated in the following Community Action Programs and Services: General Information and Referral, Winterization and Plastic, Heat Emergency Fuel Loans, Food Stamp Information and Referral, Rural Transportation, Work Experience Program, Summer Program for Disadvantaged Youth.

We sincerely acknowledge the cooperation of all town people who have worked with us this past year.

It is hoped that through these groups and the news media, every person in Barnstead will participate and make the 250th Anniversary an event to remember.

We invite everyone in town to join our group. The modest annual fee is used to supply interesting speakers.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT Barnstead

As of this writing the 1975 Regular Session of the New Hampshire General Court is four weeks old. This year's session of the legislature finds itself dealing with some of today's most pressing problems, primarily in the area of energy, the economy and the environment.

Since my last annual report, I have been elected by the House membership to serve in the upcoming session as their Speaker. With this position I have assumed major administrative responsibilities within the House as well as obligations resulting from statutory membership on Joint House/Senate administration committees. As can be expected, I will be required to expend greater energy and time in my dual capacity as both State Representative and Speaker of the House if I am to dedicate to both the involvement they deserve.

The Route 107 Project for the Town of Gilmanton is now complete as a result of the original petition from the voters of Gilmanton and requests made from my office to the Department of Public Works and Highways. In line with this progress I will be requesting of the Department specific traffic study reports relating to the speed limits in local areas within the district and for more safeguards and guard rails along certain portions of the highway within the entire three town district. These requests have been made because of an expressed interest in these programs by constituents within the district and I appreciate them bringing these potential safety hazards to my attention.

Again this session, I will introduce a bill providing for the acquisition of Shell Camp Pond Dam in Gilmanton and making an appropriation to purchase, repair and construct the same. Unfortunately the bill did not pass during the last session, but it is my intention to re-introduce the legislation so the needed reconstruction of the Dam, which is neither owned by the town or the state, can proceed as soon as possible. On the original proposal the requested appropriation was \$42,000 so to allow the State Water Resources

Board to construct such a dam. I believe that the request this time will be slightly increased but I am hopeful of passage.

During this session there are many bills involving both local and state governmental activities. For the town of Barnstead I have introduced legislation to authorize village districts and to maintain and repair roads within the designated district.

Other legislation which I will introduce during this session include: an act to reimburse towns and cities for educational costs when a foster child is sent to a town or city by court order; an act relative to the powers and duties of conservation officers of the Fish & Game Department and an act establishing a Department of Transportation for a more efficient administration for all modes of transportation.

As in the past I will continue to be available to town officials and town agencies to report to them about changes in state laws. I will try to continue to be responsive to your comments and suggestions regarding state legislation or the administration of state government as it affects this town and you individually.

I look forward to receiving your opinions and suggestions this year and will attempt to report more often to you through the local newspapers concerning actions of the legislature and effects of legislation on the three town district.

Because of my very busy schedule, at least during the six month legislative session, you may find it a little more difficult contacting me personally, but I can assure you that my staff will bring your inquiries and suggestions to my immediate attention and you will get a response. I. ADMINISTRATION B. REPORT OF THE ANNUAL BARNSTEAD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 1, 1974

The Annual School District Meeting was held in the Barnstead Elementary School Auditorium on March 1, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Moderator Richard Golden. Mr. Golden called attention to the "Barnstead Budget Summary" as published on page 81 of the Annual Town Report, stating that the heading for each column should be moved over so that the only item submitted without recommendation would be \$375.00.

The Moderator then read the Warrants and the Certifications of the Warrants being posted.

ARTICLE I: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Richard Collins made the following motion: "I move the salaries of School District Officers be approved as follows: Moderator \$10.00; Clerk \$10.00; School Board Chairman \$75.00; School Board Members \$75.00 each; Treasurer \$100.00; Auditor \$25.00; and Truant Officer \$10.00." Seconded by Ernest Tiede. Carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE II: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Lloyd Hanson made the following motion: "I move that the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees of the School District be accepted as printed in the Annual Report." Seconded by Gordon Johnson. Carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE III: To see if the district will authorize the school board to appoint a five member study committee to study the educational facility needs for the district and report these findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1975, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting.

Motion made by William Jenisch as follows: "I move that the school board be authorized to appoint a five member study committee to study the educational and facility needs for the district, and report their findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1975, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting." Seconded by Gordon Smith. Carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Motion made by Richard Collins as follows: "I move that the District raise and appropriate \$330,954 for the support of schools for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District." Seconded by David Gregoire. After much discussion, Mr. Collins amended his original motion and moved to take up the Budget item by item. This was seconded by Lloyd Hanson. This amendment was carried by voice vote.

Administration: Contract Services \$525.00 Motion by Dr. Conrad, seconded by Holly Bickford. Carried by voice vote.

Other Expenses \$ 75.00 Motion by Gordon Smith, seconded by Holly Bickford. Carried by voice vote.

Instruction: There was much discussion regarding the figures recommended in the budget under teachers' salaries. The figure submitted by the school board represented a base salary for beginning teachers, with regular step and track increases, of \$6,800.00 for a total of \$101,968. The amount recommended by the budget committee represented a base of \$6,600.00 with regular automatic increments, for a total of \$92,516.00.

Motion made by Robert Simpson as follows: "I move that the \$101,968 recommended by the school board be amended to a figure that would reflect a \$7,000 base for first year teachers with the step and track increases that would go with a \$7,000 base—this figure would be \$104,004." Seconded by Ursula Simpson. After much discussion and several speakers, proposed and withdrawn amendments, an informal poll of some of the teachers present as to whether they would return for \$6,800 or \$7,000 base, etc., the figure of \$104,004 was accepted by a voice vote.

Motion by William Gosse to accept the figures in the categories "Operation of Plant through School Lunch and Special Milk Program" as recommended in the Budget with the exception of Employee Retirement and FICA—this figure of \$8,437 to be adjusted to \$8,595 to provide for the increase due to the \$7,000 base salary for teachers. Therefore, the items would be as follows:

Mr. Collins stated all evening activities had been curtailed due to the energy crisis, but at the School Board Meeting in February the Board had decided to lift the restriction as of March 1, 1974, so that local groups previously using the facilities could continue as of that date.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my ninth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Last year it was reported the enrollment, during 1973-74, increased beyond expectations. During the fall of 1974, the enrollment stabilized with just a slight increase. Many factors may have contributed to this slower population growth. The economy is faced with many frustrations; increased cost of fuel, gasoline, food, and interest rates which have all added to the slowing down of the population growth. Large land areas ready for development have been stymied by these factors.

If the town does not expand and grow, then the tax burden is not expanded and broadened, thus placing this year's concerns on the same people. Coupled with this frustrating economy is the problem of unemployment. The cost of living is at a record high and the unemployment is at a record level for these modern times. This has placed added burdens on your school administrators, and especially your school board. The proposed budget for 1975-76 reflects the frustrations of the times. Many things which should have been included in the budget have been deleted or postponed.

My report would not be complete without paying respects to Priscilla "Pam" Morse. She started her teaching career in Barnstead with the assignment of teaching science and math to the upper elementary students. Her delightfulness, energy, dedication and sincerity was untimely ended in an automobile accident on January 18th, 1975. "Priscilla Ann Morse (Pam), May 16, 1950—January 18, 1975, we are thankful you shared a part of your life with us."

A special committee was appointed last year to study the educational and facility needs of Barnstead. Several meetings were held, visitations to other elementary schools, and consultation with the State Department of Education, all resulted in the report by the committee, which is included further in this Annual Report. Their findings are very important and need to be considered for implementation as soon as possible. The additional professional staffing to provide physical education, art, music and guidance would enhance the learning experiences of your students. Unfortunately,

the economy has brought about a delay in the financing of these recommendations. This in no way minimizes the importance of the recommendations. The economy will change. People will start building new homes, the population of Barnstead will grow and the need for an expanded curriculum and school facilities will need to be faced in the near future. The present school facility is fu'l. There is no room to create another classroom, yet we have large enrollments in the primary grades. It is not possible to predict the rate of growth for next year because of the fluctuating economy. Things could change between now and September of 1975 which would create a real overcrowding.

There is an increasing trend in education wherein the public, parents and taxpayers are becoming more and more involved with schools. This is good. I believe in having the public not only witness what is taking place in their schools, but to volunteer and become an integral part of the program. We are in a period of "individualization" because we now have evaluating instruments which make it possible to isolate and identify those skills each child has mastered and those he needs to master. The educational program is then designed to specifically assist the individual child. This requires a great deal on the part of the classroom teacher in diagnosing the skills and designing the appropriate materials for the child to further his skills' mastery. Volunteers can be of great assistance in this progress.

Barnstead should be proud of the fine staff serving her youth, including everyone from the kitchen crew, custodians, secretary, teachers, and Mr. Check, Principal. All of your employees have a tremendous interest and dedication for the success of the students. I wish to express my sincere appreciation to all of the parents, citizens, staff, and especially the members of the School Board for their continued efforts to serve the youth of Barnstead.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my third annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I have selected the following areas to report on: (1) Staff Development; (2) Special Education; (3) Title I, and (4) Recruiting.

T

In January, 1970, the State Board of Education appointed a Professional Standards Board "to develop teacher preparation, certification and inservice education recommendations for the State Board . . ."

In June, 1971, the State Board of Education upon the recommendation of the Professional Standards Board, approved Staff Development as a State-wide method of professional growth and, hence, a basis of teacher recertification, to become effective July 1, 1975. Each Supervisory Union was charged with the responsibility to develop a three-year Master Plan which would contain procedures and guidelines for the recertification process.

The Staff Development Committee of Supervisory Union #49 has been meeting regularly this year to develop a Master Plan which will meet the teacher inservice needs of the school districts of Alton, Barnstead, Pittsfield and Governor Wentworth Regional. As part of the process of developing a Master Plan, the Committee conducted a Needs Assessment. The results of the needs assessment indicated that we should strive for improvement in the following major goal areas: To have students (1) develop a desire for learning now and in the future; (2) develop pride in work and feeling of selfworth; (3) develop skills to enter a specific field of work; and (4) gain information needed to make job selections.

Effective July 1, 1975, each teacher of the district needs to consider these general goals when he submits an individual plan for recertification. In essence then, teachers will be striving to meet local education needs in addition to meeting their professional growth needs.

II.

We are operating under new standards for the education of handicapped children. Prior to this year the local school district was responsible for providing education to handicapped children aged 5-21. New standards resulted in the school district's responsibility for the education of the handicapped child from birth to 21 years of age. Parents of handicapped children must submit a request for placement to the Superintendent's Office. This request is then reviewed by a Screening Committee composed of local staff members. The Screening Committee reviews pertinent records and recommendations and meets with the parents. Appropriate placement is then recommended.

The School District is responsible for establishing programs for handicapped children as approved by the State Board of Education, or it shall pay tuition to such an approved program maintained by another school district or by a private organization or provide a minimum of five hours per week of home instruction. This new procedure represents an additional expenditure for the School District as the district is not prepared to offer specialized pre-school programs, thus, children are usually placed in programs outside of the local district. The district is liable for the State Average Tuition Cost and a like amount for transportation.

III.

We are in the second year of a Title I Cooperative Early Childhood Project with the School Districts of Alton and Pittsfield. The purpose of the project is to develop procedures for the identification of individual student learning needs and instructional programs to meet those needs. The project is under the direction of Mrs. Judith Bush and was recently commended for its design and operation by the State Title I Office.

IV.

A year ago I reported that Barnstead needed to retain its teachers for longer periods of time. This year we needed to recruit only two teachers and one of those was for an additional position. That is a considerable improvement over previous years. Barnstead is fortunate to have a very fine teaching staff.

It has been my pleasure to enjoy the support and cooperation of the Barnstead School Board, Superintendent Russell, Principal Check, and the School Faculty.

I. ADMINISTRATION E. REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL BARNSTEAD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Center Barnstead, N. H.

To the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools and the Citizens of Barnstead. It is with great pleasure that I submit my fifth annual report as Principal of the Barnstead Elementary School.

The 1973-74 year ended with the graduation of 31 eighth graders to Pittsfield High School, Alton High School and Brewster Academy.

The 1974-75 school year is well under way and we are indeed fortunate in having almost our complete staff returning. Filling the vacancies and new positions are Basil Harris, Grade 3; Kathy Latchaw, Grades 4-5; Priscilla Morse, 6th, 7th and 8th science and Ursula Simpson, teacher aide.

This year the 3rd grade classroom is involved in the Early Childhood Program at the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Fatula and Mr. Harris share the position and alternate teaching duties while the other attends classes at the university. Both teachers are involved in a Masters of Education program and apply their studies to the students in the 3rd grade. The program is progressing very well with the students, staff and school being the beneficiaries.

The 1973-74 school year also saw the beginning of the Criteria Reference testing program. This program is federally funded under title III, ESEA and includes testing, scoring and educational prescriptions for the students of grades 1-6 in reading and math. It is hoped that after the teachers have made the necessary preparations that the students will be programmed into remedial work that will meet the individual needs of the student. This project has been approved for Supervisory Union 49 as a model for other school districts.

Prior to the Christmas recess the total enrollment reached a high of 251. Grade enrollment breakdown is as follows: Gr. 1-39, Gr. 2-29, Gr. 3-33, Gr. 4-34, Gr. 5-36, Gr. 6-29, Gr. 7-27 and Gr. 8-24.

Our new reading program was implemented in September after a comprehensive study by a Committee of Supervisory Union Teachers. This year the Social Studies program is being studied as part of a continuing effort to provide the students with the most up-to-date curriculum possible.

I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the School Board, the Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent, the Citizens of Barnstead, my fellow teachers and staff members for their support and cooperation.

B. REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

This committee was appointed by the School Board in March of 1974 per direction of the voters of the Town of Barnstead at the Annual School District Meeting. The purpose of the committee was to study the educational facility and the educational needs of the district and report these findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1975, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting.

The members of the committee are Chairman Peter Yelle, Roger Genest, Wes Lavin, Secretary Pat Riel, and Maureen Rogers. Also meeting with the group has been School Board member Richard Collins, Principal Richard Check, Superintendent Damon Russell, and various guests who have shared with us their expertise.

Much of the time during the first meetings was spent in studying the Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Schools as set forth by the New Hampshire Department of Education and in comparing our own school with these State standards. Upon close examination we found that the areas on which we should concentrate our efforts were as follows: Art, Music, Physical Education, Health, Guidance, Library Services and teacher-student ratio.

We might take time to mention here one problem which really plagued us; the projected enrollment for the future. Helping us to get a better picture of the situation were members of the Planning Board in Town, and an enrollment projection by Mr. Russell. The consensus of opinion of these people seemed to lean toward a continued growth for the Town. After much discussion, we felt that if the growth rate were to continue as it has for the past 6-8 years, Barnstead would be faced with an overcrowded condition in its school system in the very near future, and would have to consider alternatives for solving this problem. However, upon comparing the enrollment this year in the Barnstead School with last year's, we found there was an extremely small increase in students. Upon further study this seems to be a trend in many schools in the nation which experts have predicted and have explained as a decrease in the birth rate. Another factor which could cause an influx of students into the school would be people moving into town and settling here, but with the shape of the economy and the decrease in new building construction, we were very reluctant to project any increase based on this factor.

After taking into consideration the many variables and complexities involved in this study, we feel that we cannot in clear conscience recommend any additions to the physical plant at this time. However, present enrollment figures indicate we are at near capacity and therefore we feel the study should be continued for another year.

This past May the Committee was able to visit the school while it was in session. At this time we were able to obtain more insight into some of the strengths and weaknesses of the school, and to find the areas in which improvement might be needed. This visitation influenced us in drawing the conclusion of the previous paragraph, while at the same time in making our recommendations.

As a result of our visitation and studies, the following are our recommendations which we feel are areas that necessitate immediate consideration for the upcoming 1975-1976 school year:

- 1. Physical Education is presently taught by the individual classroom teacher which we feel is short-changing the children. We feel that a physical education teacher should be hired to insure that each class had physical education two periods a week. At present this would entail hiring a person for 3 days per week.
- 2. Art is also being taught by the individual classroom teacher. We recommend that the children have art at least one period per week. At present this would entail hiring an individual for 2 days per week.
- 3. We feel a music teacher should be employed for at least two days per week to insure each class having one period of music a week.
- 4. Guidance service is non-existent and we feel a guidance person should be hired for one day per week.
- 5. We would definitely like to see a separation of the Health Room and the Teachers' Room, and a nurse should be employed for two days per week.
- 6. We recommend funds be allocated to bring the library up to at least minimum standards, to include a librarian 2 days per week and to reduce aide services to three days per week from the present 5 days per week.

7. A reading specialist should be employed for 5 mornings a week to help diagnose reading problems and to assist classroom teachers to solve these problems.

NOTE: The additional staff members could possibly be hired on a shared time basis with other schools in the area. With the abundance of good teachers unemployed, we feel that filling such positions would not be that difficult. Actually, all these people, if hired on a shared-time basis would cost the town approximately three additional staff members and we would gain all the above mentioned services.

Recommendations for future consideration are:

- A. Improvements could be made to the existing plant to take care of the problems we noted on our visit, such as inadequate lighting and worn furniture.
- B. Even though to meet minimum standards we do not need a full time principal, a person in such a position could make for a smoother running operation.
- C. Instructional equipment is needed to include the following:
- AUDIO-VISUAL EQUIPMENT—Opaque projector, more head sets and cassettes, 1 small portable movie screen or permanent classroom screens.
- AUDIO-VISUAL MATERIALS—Career education materials, storage cabinet for materials, musical rhythm instruments.
- OTHER—More sets of encyclopedias, elementary encyclopedias, study carrels for the library, rooms equipped with dark curtains for showing films.

As mentioned before, we feel that the committee should be continued for at least another year as there are areas which could greatly affect our school population and demands upon the space and services available.

- 1. We are going to have to realize that even though kindergarten is not mandatory now, there is an almost certainty that it will be in the future. If and when this becomes effective, we will in all likelihood be faced with the problem of providing more classroom space.
- 2. Special Education students are now tuitioned out and we felt this could possibly be worked on to keep these students within our own schools. This would also necessitate more classroom space at a future date.

3. Possible future housing developments in the town will have to be considered as they affect the school.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Barnstead qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Elementary School in said district on the first day of March, 1975 at one-thirty in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to re-appoint a five member study committee to study the educational and facility needs for the district and report these findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1976, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting.
- 4. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to implement the following programs for the school year 1975-76:
 - A. Physical Education Teacher for Three (3) days per week.
 - B. Art Teacher for Two (2) days per week.
 - C. Music Teacher for Two (2) days per week.
 - D. Guidance Teacher for One (1) day per week.
 - E. Reading Specialist for Five (5) half days per week.

The above five programs are recommended by the school study committee and will bring the Barnstead School up to minimum standards. The above expenditures to be allocated and disbursed at the direction of the School Board or its designate. (Submitted by Petition—recommended by Budge: Committee).

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

- 6. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal or State Agency.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000.00 to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year.
