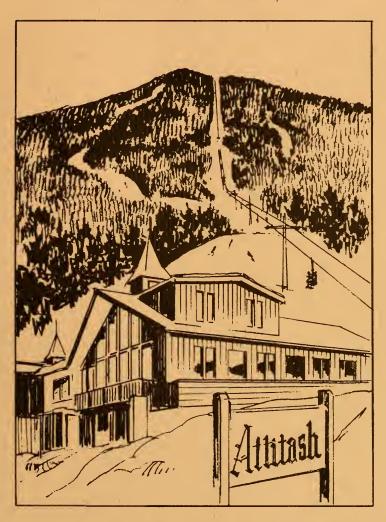

In recent years the Selectmen have used the cover of the Town Report to emphasize a significant or historical event in the Town. On the occasion of its 20th anniversary, we wish to pay tribute to the Attitash Ski Area.

Mt. Attitash Lift Corporation saw its inception November 20, 1963. Philip Robertson, previously General Manager at the Cranmore Ski Area for 25 years was the original promoter and its first manager, bringing new ideas and experience from the previous job.

In addition to private property acquisition, Attitash leases 250 acres from the US Forest Service on the upper reaches of the ski area and over the years has acquired additional land.

The current skier capacity is 2500 daily while during peak summer periods Attitash hosts over 3000 summer tourists per day.

Since installation, Attitash has proven itself on its snow grooming techniques and the reliability of ski conditions. Although not as large in capacity as some of the major areas in New England, its reputation for skiing is unsurpassed.

On behalf of the entire Town of Bartlett the Selectmen would like to thank Attitash for its continuing commitment in making its facilities available to the children of Bartlett to further their skiing and recreational interests. Without Attitash's involvement, a number of Bartlett's children would not have the opportunity to enjoy this outdoor sport.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the twelfth day of March 1985 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for ablloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to revoke so much of Article 1, Special Town Meeting, November 29, 1983 that authorizes the raising and borrowing of \$92,000.00 for purchasing jointly with the Town of Jackson certain real estate situated in the towns of Bartlett and Jackson. The land was purchased with appropriated surplus funds and this authorization is no longer required. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,500,00 to do necessary repairs and renovations of the Town Hall including relocation of the police department office to the

basement and zoning of the Town Hall heating system. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,863.00 for the purchase of a new Volvo police cruiser and authorize the removal of \$9,863.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund for the payment of said cruiser. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,900.00 for the purchase of a new 4 wheel drive truck and authorize the removal of \$24,000.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund towards payment of said truck. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to be used in addition to \$16,700.00 raised in 1984 to insulate and repair the Town Garage roof. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to expand and lay out lots at the Glen Cemetery. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be placed in the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund in preparation for Bartlett's Bicentennial observation in 1992. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,635.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sylvia Clemons and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400 to hire a summer recreation director, a part time arts & crafts person, and to subsidize the Red Cross Swimming Program. The recreation program is held in conjunction with the Bartlett Summer School Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by L. Joseph Rivers and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to support the Eastern Slope Regional Airport in Fryeburg, Maine. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard L. Barrows and others, Selectmen favor \$1,500.00.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the support of the Gibson Nutrition Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard L. Barrows and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to cover expenses incurred in developing a child identification and registry handbook that will include a voluntary finger printing session in April at the Bartlett School. Agreeable to a petition signed by Chief of Police Robert Snow and others.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,066.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C&Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy Hodgkins and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Farley and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lois Nelson and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Constance Spencer and others. Hodgkins favors \$300.00, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 in support of the Carroll County Program on Domestic Violence. Agreeable to a petition signed by Geraldine Tilton and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,483.25 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. said sum being equal to \$1.75 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Geroge Scott Gregory and others. Selectmen favor \$1,000.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the 1985 Capital Budget of The Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lois K. Gregory and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1984 was another good year for the Town of Bartlett. Services were maintained at an acceptable level and once again the property tax rate (12.80) was lower than the previous year (13.10).

Probably the best news concerns the joint purchase with Jackson of 165 acres on the Bartlett-Jackson town line. Bartlett's share (50%) of the purchase price was \$92,000 and the Selectmen elected to make the entire payment in one year, thereby saving interest costs. The Selectmen were pleased to be able to accomplish this with no increase in taxes. Meetings have been held to discuss possible future uses of this property but plans will not be finalized without public hearings in Bartlett.

The overall financial condition of the Town remains good. With the addition of \$25,000 voted at last year's Town Meeting, the combined capital reserve funds will total over \$175,000. After reaching agreement with the State to use \$92,000 of the surplus account for the purchase of the land owned jointly with Jackson the surplus account will still remain at an acceptable level.

Last year funds were approved for repair of the roof at the Town Garage but after an inspection by an engineer it was decided that more work would be necessary. Unfortunately the present roof needs strengthening before repair work can begin. The money raised will be carried over and additional funds will be requested this year. The renovations will include new insulation to make the garage more energy efficient. The competitive bid process will be used and we should have an exact figure by Town Meeting.

The Town now owns its own computer; an Apple III plus purchased at North Country Computer in North Conway. The property tax programs (software) were purchased from Rumstick House in Grantham, NH. As far as could be determined, this is the only small town tax program tested and on line in NH. Several changes were necessary in the program to adapt it to Bartlett's specific needs but after much trial and error the 3000 property tax accounts were successfully entered into the computer memory bank. Probably one of the most efficient and accurate property tax preparation and mailing operations in the history of Bartlett can be attributed to the diligence and hard work that went into this operation. There is still considerable work to be done bringing other aspects of the tax program on line and this will be completed in 1985. Additionally, plans are being made to put the town's general ledger (bookkeeping) and the voter checklist on the computer early in 1985.

After last year's non-binding ballot vote overwhelmingly favored some form of zoning, the Zoning Study Committee comprised of the Selectmen, Planning Board, and community members labored through many meetings studying and discussing master plans and zoning. After the committee made its decisions, the plan was written and entered into the computer (word processor). The computer nearly paid for itself in this one operation. The master plan went through many rewrites, additions, and deletions. The word processor facilitates this kind of narrative evolution and it can safely be said contributes to the quality of the final product. An excellent set of land use maps were completed featuring soil types and topographic information. As ancillary documents to the master plan these maps will be good planning tools for future use by the Town. Other towns have spent upwards of \$10,000 for their Master Plans and Bartlett's was completed for less than \$1000. The intention when the project was started was to have the plan prepared by residents of Bartlett, not outside "experts" who do not know and understand the town. A Public Hearing on the Master Plan was held on January 14th and the plan was adopted on the same date by the Planning Board.

Glen cemetery has finally "run out" of gravesites. It was necessary in 1984 for the Board to prepare gravesites on an emergency basis. Plans are being made for appropriate surveys and map work to facilitate an increase in capacity of the cemetery in the summer of 1985 and to initiate a system of site purchase and allocation.

The Town Hall needs renovating and refurbishing including rugs, doors, clapboards and windows. The police department needs new and expanded quarters. Plans are being made to upgrade the Town Hall and to move the police department downstairs into a portion of the former "Grange" dining room. The Board expects that Town Hall will look better and be a better place to visit and to work.

The recent experience with the Zoning Study Committee has graphically demonstrated the significant contribution volunteer effort can make to special town committees and projects. It requires involvement and a personal dedication to the future of our community. Please get involved. The Selectmen are always looking for volunteers to help on one committee or another, so if you would like to help your town, please contact one of the Selectmen or call Town Hall.

The Selectmen meet Friday mornings from 10 AM to 12 noon and are ready to assist you with any problem you might have. If you cannot make a Friday morning meeting, please call us and we will meet any time at your convenience.

BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

The Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Service has had a good year, in terms of safety as well as how the squad's members have progressed with training. The overall number of calls are down from last year. We still run between one hundred twenty-five to one hundred thirty-five calls per year. However, the type of calls for major trauma are running much lower than the past two years.

We have a full roster of members. After this spring's EMT course is completed, all fifteen of the fifteen members will be Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians. In addition, nine of them have been trained at advanced levels. We have four members taking Paramedic modules, not to become Paramedics, but to train in some advanced skills that the area's Emergency Medical Services has made possible for some to attend.

I would like to thank everyone for the support you have shown for the service. We are planning to put some of our donations to good use in order to purchase new equipment for the coming year. As I've done for the last few years, I would like to thank very much all the members of the Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Service for a job well done.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

MINUTES 1984 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Tuesday, March 13, 1984

Norman J. Head, Jr., Moderator Howard C. Nichols, Clerk Meeting opened at 7:00 p.m.

Moderator Head suggested that the meeting could be postponed to a later date due to the lack of turnout as a result of the extreme storm. Motion was made by Dina Howard, seconded by Myra Smith to postpone the meeting to Tuesday, March 20 at 7:00 p.m. William Paine then made the motion to recess the meeting until 7:20 p.m. to see how many more people showed up and then vote on postponement, seconded by Kathleen Head. All in favor, meeting recessed until 7:20 p.m.

Moderator Head reconvened the meeting at 7:20 p.m. The motion previously made to postpone the meeting until Tuesday, March 20 at 7:00 was then voted on and was defeated.

Moderator Head then read the warrant as follows: "To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March 1984 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The Selectmen hereby certify that we gave notice to the inhabitants within named to meet at the time and place and for the purpose within mentioned by posting an attested copy of within warrant at the place of meeting within named, and a like copy at the Glen Post Office, Bartlett Post Office, Intervale Post Office and other public places, being public places in the said Town on the 27th day of February 1984. Signed by James F. Chadbourne, Frederick T. Hodgkins and Gene G. Chandler."

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Moderator Head stated that since the election results had not been completely tabulated yet that the results would be read at the end of the meeting. Motion to move Article 1 until after Article 29 by Gene Chandler, seconded by Fred Hodgkins and accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion to accept budget of \$441,625.00 by Gene Chandler, seconded by Fred Hodgkins. Explanation of each budget item was given by Gene Chandler in Chairman James Chadbourne's absence due to a close friend's funeral. Chandler said the highway appropriation probably should be increased by \$4000,00 due to the increased need for salt since the budget was prepared. Richard Garland asked whether the septage area had been approved by the State and shouldn't the budget include the cost of installing monitoring wells. Chandler explained that the State had accepted the area and that monitoring wells may be necessary in the future but than we hoped we would not have to continue at this site after the three year contract was up. Chandler made a motion to add \$4000.00 to the bottom line of the budget amending the total to \$445,625,00, seconded by Richard Patch. Vote was taken and the increase was accepted. Vote was then taken on the article as a whole and passed.

Article 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$400,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by Paul Taylor. No discussion on the article. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion to accept by Richard Plusch, seconded by Gail Paine. No discussion. Vote taken and passed unanimously.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by Terrie Kroger. No discussion. Vote taken and passed.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,235.00 for the purchase of a new highway truck and authorize the removal of \$16,235.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said truck. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by Blanch Mahler. Gene Chandler spoke for the article. Wendell Whittum questioned why we don't keep the truck we plan to trade if it's in good working order. Chandler explained that it wasn't worth the price to keep it. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,240,00 for the purchase of a new one ton highway truck to replace the 1977 truck. Chandler and Chadbourne favor, Hodgkins opposed. Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by Arden Schoen. Bene Chandler spoke for the article. Chandler stated that we can afford to buy this truck this year and that it serves as a good back up for winter plowing as well as getting a lot of use in the summer for cold patching. Hodgkins stated why he was opposed, that it was just an extra truck and that other equipment such as the grader could be used in emergencies. A lot of discussion ensued regards the engine capability of the truck, use of the other equipment, hiring a full time mechanic, and renting as opposed to buying equipment. Vote was then taken and a hand vote was then necessary. Results of hand vote were 31 in favor and 38 opposed, article was defeated.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8500.00 for the purchase of computer hardware and software for the preparation of property tax bills, residence tax bills, checklists and other appropriate use and to authorize the removal of \$8500.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said computer. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Howard Nichols, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. Gene Chandler spoke for the article. Discussion ensued regards who would run it, what companies were considered, forming a committee of townspeople to advise, selling the service to other towns, and staying with American made. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7800.00 for the purchase of a new highway sander. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by Fred Hodgkins. Gene Chandler spoke for the article and stated that the sander had already been bought last year due to the expense of repairing the old one. Discussion ensued about using a front hydraulic pump, costs of repairs seem high, and repairing the old one. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to repair the Town garage and to paint and/or vinyl side the Glen Fire Station and to authorize the removal of \$3600.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as part payment for said repairs. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Howard Nichols, seconded by Paul Taylor. Gene Chandler speaks on article to explain repairs necessary to the Town garage. Chandler stated that an estimate given on the repair was \$17,000.00 and the article may have to be amended. Fred Hodgkins spoke regards the repairs to the Glen Fire Department building, that we have estimates on

painting and vinyl siding. Motion was made by Gene Chandler to amend the article to read \$20,000.00 instead of \$10,000.00, seconded by Paul Taylor. Michael Farley made a motion to amend the article to require an energy audit be done on the buildings, seconded by Rick Zecher. Vote was first taken on the amendment to have an energy audit and passed. Discussion ensued regards the cost of vinyl siding versus painting, longevity of the two, and quality differences of vinyl siding. In order to vinyl side the article would need \$2000.00 more. Chandler agreed to withdraw previous motion and Paul Taylor agreed to withdraw his second. Chandler made a motion to amend the article to read \$22,000.00 instead of \$10,000, seconded by Paul Taylor. This would allow enough money to vinyl side, and Selectmen will put the jobs of both repairs out to bid. Vote was taken on the amendment and passed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following ordinance: all buildings, structures, or trailers intended for habitation constructed or moved into the Town of Bartlett for which a septic system is required will from this date require a "Permit To Occupy" (PTO) prior to occupancy. A copy of the State issued "Approval For Operation (AFO)" will be presented at the Town Hall at which time a PTO will be issued at a cost of \$1.00. The purpose of this ordinance is to insure that a septic system meeting State regulations is designed and constructed where required. Violations of this ordinance will result in fines of up to \$100,00 and/or \$10,00 per day for each day of violation. Selectmen favor, Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by Fred Hodgkins. Chandler spoke for the article and explained the current system involved in building in the Town. Richard Tilton asked if this only affected new construction. Chandler stated no but would only affect building from now on. Raymond Schoen asked if you had a trailer on a spot and changed the trailer, would this be effective. Chandler stated no if you were approved before and were not changing the bedroom size of the trailer. William Paine stated that the owner should not be the only person named as being responsible, that the ordinance should include the builder, installer, and/or the owner. The amendment would read after the word "violation" that the violation will effect and could include the builder, installer and/or the owner, motion on the amendment made by William Paine and seconded by Richard Patch. Vote was taken on the amendment and passed. Vote was taken on the article and passed.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be added to the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Richard Patch, sec-

onded by Fred Hodgkins. Gene Chandler spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 13. To see if the Town will approve the agreement signed by the Bartlett and Jackson Selectmen on January 13, 1984 and which is posted with the Town Warrant. This agreement provides for the establishment of and procedures for the Solid Waste Disposal District Committee for the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Howard Nichols, seconded by Fred Hodgkins. Gene Chandler spoke for the article. Dina Howard questioned whether page 2 number 9 allows for toxic waste to be dumped. Chandler stated that the Town already has an ordinance voted on at Town Meeting about 3 years ago protecting us against this. Fred Kuppens questioned the fact that the committee may be paid. Chandler stated that yes the committee would possibly be paid which would be determined by the committee but that the committee is its own entity similar to the ambulance and that two Selectmen must be members of the committee. Vote was taken on the article and passed.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 for purchase of fire related equipment for the Bartlett Village and Glen Fire Stations and authorize the removal of \$4000.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said equipment. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Fred Hodgkins seconded by Andy Grigel. Fred Hodgkins spoke for the article, stating that the funds would be used mostly for repairing leaking valves on the trucks that require special maintenance. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 15. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2283,60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. said sum being equal to \$1.65 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Lois Gregory, seconded by Gail Paine. No one spoke for the article. Forrest Simmons asked what last year's amount was and it was \$2532.80. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1800.00 to hire a summer recreation director and part time Arts and Crafts person from June to August. The Director will manage activities and field trips throughout the summer in conjunction with the presently ongoing summer program at the Bartlett School. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph Rivers and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Scott Gregory, seconded by Geraldine Tilton. No one spoke for the article. No discussion, Vote was taken and passed.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$973.00 for the support of the Children and Youth Project of Mount Washington Valley (C & Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy Hodgkins and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Fred Hodgkins, seconded by Gail Paine. No one spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700,00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by Carla McGonigle. No one spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1470.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Robert Gregory, seconded by Howard Nichols. No one spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2700.00 for the 1984 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, NH. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lois Gregory and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Robert Gregory, seconded by Carla McGonigle. No one spoke for the articlie. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1130.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Margaret Kerins and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Arlene Patch, seconded by Dina Howard. No one spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1200.00) for the Fireworks at the Bartlett Fair. Agreeable to a petition signed by the members of the Bartlett Fair Association, John E. Parker, Jr. and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion to accept by Carla McGonigle, seconded by Geraldine Tilton. No one spoke for the article. Andy Grigel questioned why the Town would be asked to support something that we pay for anyway for a group that makes money. Fred Hodgkins stated his opposition due to too many unknown factors about the organization, how much money they make, or if they make money. Vote was taken and it was unanimously defeated.

Article 23. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen oppose - favor \$500.00. Motion to accept by Howard Nichols, sec-

onded by Scott Gregory. No one spoke for the article. Gene Chandler expressed his opposition due to the fact that the people in the home in Bartlett were placed here as wards of the State and feels that they should pay for them to go to the Center and not Bartlett. Michael Farley asked for a per client cost. Arden Schoen asked what was appropriated last year. Fred Hodgkins asked that the director speak for the article. Moderator recognized Storme Ellis to speak although she is not a Bartlett voter or resident. Ellis stated that the per client cost was \$500,00 and that there was no appropriation last year due to the fact that the person it was given to to circulate and submit did not. A lot of discussion ensued regards number of Bartlett residents involved, programs included, and sources of funding including the making up of funds due to no article last year. Moderator Head asked to step down and William Paine served in the interim so that Mr. Head could ask questions regards the purchase of a house for a group home on Tasker Hill Rd, in Conway for \$120,000,00 which was at least \$20 - 30,000,00 more than the house was worth. Ellis answered that this was so but that the State fully funded that purchase. David Carta made a motion to amend the article to read \$1000.00 instead of \$4000.00, seconded by Rick Zecher. David Armington asked why the figure of \$1000.00 when the per client cost was \$500.00 and Bartlett only has one client attending that has been a lifelong Bartlett resident and not placed here by the State as the others have. Vote was taken on the amendment and defeated. Motion was made to amend the article to \$500,00 instead of \$4000,00 by Gene Chandler, seconded by Benson Howard. Vote was called for and a hand vote was necessary with the results of 31 in favor and 26 oppose, the amendment passed. David Carta made motion to move the question. Vote was taken on the article and a hand vote was necessary with the results of 35 in favor and 30 opposed. Article passed as amended.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325.00 for Medical Transportation expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by Scott Gregory. Richard Barrows spoke for the article. Fred Hodgkins expressed his opposition due to duplication of services between the agencies. Michael Farley explained that there was no duplication. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 to assist the Family Planning Program of Northern Carroll County. Agreeable to a petition signed by Constance Spencer and other. Hodgkins favor, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion to accept by John Duggan, seconded by Scott Gregory. No one spoke for the article, no discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250,00 in support of the Carroll County Program on Domestic

Violence. Agreeable to a petition signed by Geraldine Tilton and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion to accept by Scott Gregory, seconded by Donna Tetley. Geraldine Tilton spoke for the article. Gene Chandler stated his opposition due to the fact that this program could possibly be handled by other agencies that we are already sponsoring. It isn't the dollar figure but number of agencies that ask for money from the towns and also receive money from the county. William Paine agreed with Chandler in trying to combine agencies but feels this program is beneficial and necessary. Benson Howard also questioned agencies getting money from towns and county. Michael Farley stated that most agencies represented on the Town warrant do not receive county money that's why they're on the Town Warrant. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Gregory and others. Hodgkins favor, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion to accept by Joseph Keleman, seconded by Lois Gregory. Joseph Keleman spoke for the article stating that the sources of revenue in the Business Profits Tax and Meals and Rooms Tax that the Town gets is a result of the help from the Chamber. Richard Patch stated that the Chamber helps but we would still get our taxes without them. David Armington asked about the total budget of the Chamber. Peter Fresco guessed it to be about \$350,000.00. David Carta stated his opposition and felt that the businesses should support the Chamber not the Town. Fred Hodgkins stated his support due to the increase in second homes, jobs, income, etc. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of the Community Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Farley and others. Hodgkins favor, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by Scott Gregory. Michael Farley spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken and passed.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before the said meeting. Richard Patch made the motion that the Town establish a committee to study the feasibility of hiring a full time mechanic, seconded by Wendell Whittum. Fred Hodgkins stated that the study should include needs of the fire department, school, as well as the highway. Andy Grigel stated that the fire department puts a lot of man hours in doing their own repairs. David Taylor stated that a group can get together on their own without being appointed and can put an article on the warrant next year to hire one if necessary. Gene Chandler stated that he would be all for it but would prefer appoint-

ments so that the Selectmen would have some input. Vote was taken and passed. Gene Chandler stated that the Selectmen are always open to outside advice and assistance and would hope that if residents know something about a particular area the Selectmen are investigating such as computers, mechanics, etc., that people would contact them. William Paine suggested getting a group together and then dissolving it once the problem is solved. Gene Chandler also asked the opinion of those present of the Selectmen stating whether they favor or oppose the articles in the warrant. Townspeople favored this format. Macia Hill asked the Moderator who the man was that was supporting all the money programs. The Moderator declared the question not pertinent.

The Moderator then returned to Article 1 and read the Election results as follows:

TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY-LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more. Violation = fine of \$10.00/day from beginning of construction plus up to \$100.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.

- SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.
- ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- STUMP DUMP REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.
- ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places, Violation = fine of \$25.00.
- TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.
- EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of \$10.00 + board reimbursement.
- PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation + fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.
- SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.

Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.

VITAL STATISTICS

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Dr. Francis M. Murphy

THINGS ARE LOOKING UP

This has been a banner year for education, both here in SAU #9 and in the nation. The concern for college board scores that have declined steadily for 20 years, was eased a bit when nationally the scores improved this year. Nationally, the improvement was by two points. Here in Kennett High, our scores went up by 54 points.

I do not believe college board scores are the best way to evaluate school quality, nor am I sure that this change in the scores in Kennett is a permanent, nonreversible event, but the news is heartening. The New Hampshire state average scores continued to be the highest in the nation; and for the first time in many years, we beat the New Hampshire average scores. I am very proud of the students, parents, and teachers that caused this improvement.

This year, we instituted for the first time in several years a comprehensive testing system for our elementary schools. This testing battery measures Aptitude (mental capacity) and Achievement (how much the student has learned).

Using this system, we had hoped not only to measure whether we were above or below national norms, but how well our students do compared to what they are capable of doing. We found some problems at some grades in some subjects. Generally, we will have to work harder in the areas of number facts, capitalization, punctuation, and spelling. However, even in these areas, the tests revealed that by the time the students arrived in the seventh grade, when considered as a group, they were not only above the national averages, but their performance in actual academic subjects had exceeded what could be predicted based on their ability.

The complete program of 'studies was redone this year at the high school. In addition, the high school English curriculum is being revised as is the 7-12 science curriculum and the K-12 computer curriculum. We are convinced that this effort will lead to a better program for all students at all four levels of study at the high school. We have reintroduced the seven period requirement in science for students in the college entrance and advanced level. We have made the offerings in the three junior highs the same in science, so that the students from Bartlett and Tamworth will be able to compete with the Kennett students at every level of challenge. We have increased the number of 400 level (advanced) courses in science from one per year to five. We have added an advanced topics in science course and several courses for the non-college bound.

In English, we have begun a three year phase out of most of our elective programs. The eventual course structure in English will have all ninth graders start with a course involving a major emphasis on writing, grammar, and vocabulary. The tenth graders will study British literature, the eleventh graders will study American literature while they are taking American History, and the twelfth grade will focus on world literature. At every grade, these courses will be offered at all four levels of difficulty, and there still will be a few electives.

We will be increasing the graduation requirements in social studies from two to three years. Every student will take courses in citizenship/economics and American History. There will be electives in geography, psychology and sociology/anthropology. In the foreign languages, we have added an advanced course in conversational French.

The Vocational Education Department is combining its two wood programs. It is adding a second computer class, as well as making the first course a requirement for all students. In Home Economics, we are adding a course in commercial cooking. We will also be trying out a course in horticulture in our vocational agriculture program to see if we can encourage students to enroll in it. The business program will substantially increase its offerings next year.

We are adding a requirement in health education and a course requirement in art or music. We have revised the art and music programs substantially. Both departments are pleased with the changes. The physical education requirement has been increased from 1/4 credit to one full credit. Accordingly, we have focused our efforts on one full year course for all freshmen 5 days per week.

Students will be able, in the new program, to get pluses and minuses, and not just straight letter grades. Students in the advanced programs will be allowed to take supplementary courses in art, music and the vocational program, without hurting their standing in the class. The remainder of the program of studies will be relatively unaffected.

These changes will bring us into compliance with the new State standards and, with the possible exception of meeting the arts requirement, may be accomplished without adding a single new staff member. I am very proud of the department chairmen and the high school staff for their success in assembling this new program of studies.

The year has been a good one on a number of other fronts as well. Nearly all of our athletic teams are doing as well or better than they have in recent years. Debbie Ayers was named New Hampshire Art Educator of the Year. We will be hosting the first New Hampshire State Scholastic Art Competition for students in grades 6-12. We are hosting the

All State Band Competition. Our teachers are taking advanced courses in unprecedented numbers.

Madison has a plan for a new building I hope the voters will support. In Tamworth, the library was developed within the budget, the front energy efficient windows were added, and we were able to hire a part-time librarian. The curriculum at Freedom continues to take better form. Bartlett's school community newsletter emerged from the Mott Foundation grant. Jackson's exit test for sixth graders has been requested by the overseas schools because they were so impressed with this "homegrown" product. The Pine Tree School has been taking the lead in the "school effectiveness" research. Conway Elementary School has been working on a plan to assure the safety of all children in SAU #9 against childnappers. John Fuller School has continued to put its emphasis on reading and writing skills.

I invite you to come see your schools. The students are better disciplined than they have been in years. The schools are cleaner. The food is better. We do try harder, and it has been one fine year for your schools.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

by L. Joseph Rivers

Our entire faculty returned this year, and we greeted one hundred and eighty-five students. The new instructional design of mastery learning was implemented, and we completed one year of this new concept. Statistically, we found that more students made the honor roll, with twenty-three out of thirty making honors in the 8th grade. A new grading policy was also added to mastery learning in which students are required to make up all assignments before a grade is assigned. Summer make-up school could be used for students not passing major subjects.

A highlight of the school year was the awarding of a \$1,000 grant to the school to develop a community/school partnership. This committee became a spin-off of an already existing parent-advisory committee. The award was used to develop a Community/School Newsletter which has published six editions thus far. The goal of our community/school partnership is to develop a community/school action plan for community/school programs. Thanks to the sponsorship provided by our business community, our newsletter can survive.

We welcomed Carla McGonigle as our Community/School Coordinator and congratulate her on the work she has done on the newsletter.

Our overall instructional programs are firmly in place, and the financial support received for our programs provides us with outstanding equipment and materials.

We had many outstanding performances from our school band and chorus. Our sports teams all did well in Valley competition. The art and science fair was well received by the community, and career education week was highlighted by the excellent representation from the community who spoke on careers.

For the second year we had graduation in the gym, and thirty 8th graders were honored for their outstanding year. At graduation we were pleased to have Mr. Paul Taylor and Mrs. Dolly Rice give the parents' address. Graduation awards were presented to Kelly Walton, Highest Academic Achievement Award; Pauline Bagley, Glen David Hayes Memorial Award; Stephanie Lohmann, the George Mulvey Memorial Award; Patrick Phair, the Faculty Award; Daniel Mulkern and Susan James, the BARA Athletic Award; Kelly Walton, the Music Award; Brett Tetely, the Art Award; and Kelly Walton, the Drama Award.

We wish to sincerely thank parents, school volunteers, and the business people of the community for all of their assistance in making our school year a successful and productive one.
