



COMMISSIONER'S REPORT.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the requirements of the laws of New Hampshire, your Commissioners herewith submit the report of their financial transactions for the year ending December 31, 1916, and a statement of the financial condition of the county at the end of the year, together with the reports of the other county officers required by law. Attention is called to these reports for detailed information regarding the work done in different departments of the county's business.

The almshouse and house of correction have continued under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred P. Batchelder. They have spared no pains in making the lives of those in the almshouse comfortable while those committed to the house of correction have been kept at work.

While the amount of hay cut at the farm was unusually large, but with so many of the hoed crops affected on account of the long continued wet weather in the early summer; necessitating planting over the potatoes and some of the vegetables, and with a large percentage of the potato crop rotted in the field before digging time, the total yield of crops was greatly reduced.

The returns for dairy products sold have been the largest in the history of the county.

The number of house of correction prisoners have been the average for the past few years but the sentences have been shorter, which has made it necessary to keep them at work during the regular farm work the greater part of the time; the only extra work done, was the rebuilding of the road leading from the main highway to the farm buildings.

The county agent work has cost the county \$1050 during the past year. It is evident from the reports of those who come in contact with the work that it has come to stay and is a benefit directly or indirectly to a large percentage if not all residents of the county and can be made more so if all of those who might profit by it would do so.

The reindexing of the records in the Register of Deeds Office has cost \$808.60 to date; the work is not fully completed but is proving itself a great convenience and value to those who use them.

It is with much satisfaction that we submit our financial report, and are able to say that besides paying the usual running expenses of the county, making improvements costing more than \$31000, during the past four years, paying for county agent work, also court orders and court expenses during the past two years amounting to \$2475.48 more than for any two previous years and the extra cost of caring for the poor, caused by the unusual high cost of living; have all been paid for except \$1000 borrowed in anticipation of taxes.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Batchelder, who have been untiring in their efforts to make the lives of the inmates comfortable; and in performing all other duties incumbent on them as superintendent and matron respectively; and we also wish to express our thanks to the different county, city and town officials for their co-operation, and to all other citizens who have aided us in our work of the past year; and to those who so cheerfully gave their assistance in making

Christmas day of 1916, a merry Christmas for the inmates.

I have the honor to herewith submit to you my report as chaplain of the Belknap County Farm. While this is an annual report, yet this covers but nine months of service, as I was appointed to this office the first of April, 1916. Since then religious services have been conducted at the Farm regularly except during the vacation, and that was shortened by one month over previous years. Two funeral services only have called for the services of the chaplain. The Christmas celebration was a day of pleasure to the inmates of the Farm, and all those contributing to the happiness of the people there were doubly repaid in witnessing their joy. The chaplain begs to voice his appreciation and to give his thanks to all who assisted in making the day a day of joy to the inmates of the Farm, and also the donors of presents.

The fact that Belknap County keeps the saloon from within its borders gives us a minimum number of law-breakers and offenders, consequently the Jail and House of Correction furnishes a very small number for the chaplain's ministrations, the few, however, need the gospel.

To the Superintendent and his wife, and to all the employees of the institution, the Chaplain wishes to voice his appreciation of the cordial fellowship, and their unfailing co-operation in making his work a real ministry, which we trust has been helpful and satisfactory. A more extended report is scarcely needed.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

I beg leave to submit herewith the report of this office for the year ending December 31, 1916.

At the March Term, 1916, there were pending on the criminal docket twelve cases brought over from the October Term, 1915. Five of these cases were marked, "Contiqued," at the March Term, 1916; five were marked, "Not to be brought forward"; one case, a police court appeal, was marked, "Nolle prosequi"; and the remaining case, one of desertion and non-support was disposed of by calling for a mittimus and the extradition of the respondent from the State of Ohio, and commitment for sentence. At this term seventeen new indictments were found, and five police court appeals entered. The seventeen indictments were against eight respondents and may be classed as follows.—Larceny, two: obtaining goods under false pretenses, two; adultery, three; breaking and entering in the day time, nine; and burglary, one. Seven of the eight respondents against whom fifteen of the seventeen indictments were found, were convicted and the cases disposed of on various sentences and orders of the court: two remaining indictments against one respondent were continued. Of the five police court appeals entered at this term, three, the State's case being without merit, were Nol. prossed. and on the other two, convictions were procured, one for illegal liquor selling and one for cruelty to animals.

At the October Term, 1916, ten indictments were found which may be classed as follows:—Adultery, seven; breaking and entering, two; and embezzlement, one. Convic-

tions were obtained in all of these cases, and disposed of by various sentences and orders of the court. At this term four police court appeals were entered, two of which were continued, and the other two resulted in a conviction on one for lascivious conduct, and an acquital on the other for alleged illegal keeping for sale.

The criminal docket as now constituted contains eight cases awaiting disposition.

A suit has been brought by the Solicitor at the request of the Town of Tilton against the City of Concord to determine certain questions arising under the pauper law. This case is now pending in the Supreme Court on questions of law which will determine whether a settlement once acquired in a town can be lost, while aid is still being furnished, after ten years from the time when the pauper first commenced to acquire such a settlement. If such a settlement would be lost after ten years, all such cases would then become County charges.

No action has been brought against the County during this year, nor are there any actions pending against the County.

A large amount of time and attention has been given to many cases in the police courts throughout the County, and particularly in respect to the enforcement of the law requiring fathers and mothers to support their children.
