SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1990, the end of a boom decade! Conway has many problems to solve. Unfortunately, the present economic down turn will not stop the problems caused by the seven years of steady upward growth.

The issue of garbage must be addressed positively this year, at a cost of \$4.1 million.

Recycling, under the direction of Scott Johnstone, David Brooks, Harvey Blake, Howard Hatch, III, of Albany, and Eugene Kleinmeier of Eaton, is off to a great start. More items will be added to the list of recyclables over the next few years. We must stop our throw-away attitudes and demand manufacturers use recyclable or biodegradable products and packaging.

The issue of roads must be addressed this year, and for the next five years, if Conway is going to get its share of the tourist dollars. Conway grew into a destination four season resort area with very little competition. We now have surrounding areas capitalizing on our inability to solve our traffic problems. Conway cannot afford to lose these much needed dollars.

The Town of Conway should not be lulled into a false saving by eliminating the position of Town Planner, Town Fire Inspector or Administrative Assistant. It is true the immediate savings will reduce taxes, but the long term effect will give the Town added tax burdens, with uncontrolled growth, with no direction to future problems -that is what we are paying for today, the lack of planning 20 years ago.

Be very cautious with all we spend and what we spend it on, but don't be led into short term savings that will lead Conway into long term costs and problems.

Conway can't turn back the clock, but we can and must control our future at a more calculated rate than we have in the past.

CONWAY TOWN WARRANT
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Karl Seidenstuecker Auditorium at Kennett High School, Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1990, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1 through 21, and Articles 23 through 25, will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-6 and 147-19. D. by redefining the definition of mall and interior signs of malls.

ARTICLE 3. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19 C.(1) by adding additional criteria to the regulation of preexisting nonconforming signs.

ARTICLE 4. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-19. D. by modifying language defining Directional Signs.

ARTICLE 5. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-19. E.(3) by adding the words "handicapped space" to this subsection.

ARTICLE 6. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed and recommended by the Planning

Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-9.1. by the addition of a Saving Clause.

ARTICLE 7. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-12. A. and adding new 147-12. A.(1), and amending 147-12. B. limiting Home Occupations in the Business District to commercial use allowed by special exception, and re-paragraphing and re-numbering Commercial Amusement Facilities.

ARTICLE 8. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 7 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance by amending the authority of the Planning Board to review and decide upon site plans for the purpose of authorizing the Planning Board to delegate its site review powers and duties regarding minor site plans to a special review committee.

ARTICLE 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 8 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance by adding a new provision to Conway Code 147-11.1, creating a Shoreline Protection District and regulations thereto for the purpose of careful development of land immediately adjacent to all great ponds.

ARTICLE 10. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 9 as proposed by Petition of James W. Hill and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-17. C. by redefining minimum water frontage on the Saco River, Swift River, or great pond. Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 11. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 10 as proposed by Petition of Barbara Hill and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-4 by adding additional criteria which regulate nonconforming businesses and nonconforming uses. Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 12. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 11 as proposed by Petition of Miles Brooks and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-21 by redefining the Village Commercial District in the Center Conway area, by adding lands easterly to the Flood Plain and to the outlet of Conway Lake crossing Route 302. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 13. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 12 as proposed by Petition of John Curzon, Jr. and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance, amending Conway Code by adding new section 147-4.1 modifying provisions regulating expansion of nonconforming structures which violate height or setback requirements. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 14. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 13 as proposed by Petition of Charles K. McHugh and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-6 by adding four new definitions for Major Commercial Use, Multi-Use Project, Public Way and Sign which will be inserted alphabetically. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 15. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 14 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending Conway Code 147-19. G.(5) by adding a new subsection to allow certain wall signs for commercial use. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 16. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 15 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance by amending Conway Code 147-19. G.(7) to change setback limitations for signs servicing larger subdivisions. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 17. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 16 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19. G. and 147-19. M. by adding a new provision regulating and allowing off site signs within a multi-use project. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 18. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 17 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance by amending Conway Code 147-19. D. to allow signs without permit which are not visible from any public way. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 19. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 18 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance by amending Conway Code 147-19. H. to allow without permit temporary signs when the visibility of the original sign is impaired or lost. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 20. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 19 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19. D. and 147-19. M. by adding a new provision allowing directional signs within a multi-use project without permit. Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 21. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 20 as proposed by Petition of Francine Lawler and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19. G.(1) and 147-19. M. by allowing additional off premise signs in a multi-use project for commercial properties having one common vehicular entrance, Not recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,300,000) for the purpose of constructing a SOLID WASTE LANDFILL on land to be purchased by the Town of Conway from the Kennett Company off the East Conway Road in Redstone; and to authorize the Selectmen, to borrow up to said sum under the Municipal Finance Act, with the Selectmen authorized to arrange all terms and conditions of such borrowing and its repayment, to be acted on by ballot of the Town. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-0).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to establish a CHARTER COMMISSION for the purpose of revising the municipal charter, or establishing a new municipal charter for the Town of Conway.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V & VI, for an OPTIONAL VETERAN'S EXEMPTION and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption. The optional veteran's exemption is \$100 rather than \$50. To be acted on by ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV, for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a SERVICE-CONNECTED TOTAL DISABILITY. The optional disability exemption is \$1,400 rather than \$700. To be acted on by ballot of the Town.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) for repairs to structural deficiencies at the CONWAY LAKE DAM. Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) to be placed in the TRAFFIC AND ROAD IMPROVEMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND for the purpose of design and layout of an EAST SIDE ROAD running along the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative power line from Route 302 northerly to Skimobile Road. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 28. To see if the voters will do away with and no longer fund the position of "TOWN PLANNER." Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the voters will do away with and no longer fund the position of "ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT." Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the voters will do away with and no longer fund the position of "TOWN FIRE INSPECTOR." Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the voters will raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.) to enable the Selectmen to search for and retain the services of a full time ATTORNEY AT LAW, specializing in municipal law, to serve as assistant to the Selectmen in legal matters. It is proposed by the voters that the Selectmen share the services of this attorney with the Planning Board, Board of Adjustment, Police, School Board, and other Town agencies as considered appropriate, on a cost sharing basis. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-1).

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$16,400.) for the support of the CHILDREN AND YOUTH PROJECT OF MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY. Agreeable to a petition signed by Evelyn B. Dole and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-1-1).

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) for the NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sister Marjorie Moon, S.A., and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0).

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Nine Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$13,915.) for support of the GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Simone Allard and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Sixty Dollars (\$5,060.) for support of the NUTRITION AND TRANSPORTATION PROGRAMS FOR THE

GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Verna Robinson and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.) for the CENTER OF HOPE, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mark H. Tripp and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (3-9-0).

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for operating expenses of the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Martin Marvel and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-3-1).

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for support of the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Dionne and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-0).

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$11,600.) for the VISITING NURSE SERVICES OF NORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Rita Bourgeois and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (2-9-0).

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.) for the support of the COMMUNITY ACTION OUTREACH PROGRAM. Agreeable to a petition signed by Denise Leighton and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$6,615.) to assist the FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Caron Hart and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-0).

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Thirty Two Dollars (\$10,032.) to assist the CARROLL COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Benita Silver and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-2-1).

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.) to help defray the expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sharlene Severy and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-0-0).

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) for the purpose of running and maintaining the Conway Information Booth; to be carried out and accounted for by the CONWAY VILLAGE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Debbie Sweeney and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Nine Dollars (\$2,709.) in support of CARROLL COUNTY AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & RAPE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan K. Proctor and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Sixteen Dollars (\$5,016.) for the EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM OF CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC., said sum being equal to \$.55 per person in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to place fifty percent (50%) or Fifty Thousand Dollars, whichever is less, of annual receipts from Land Use Change Taxes in the FUND FOR THE ACQUISITION OF CONSERVATION LAND. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (2-6-0).

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000.) to upgrade and pave the section of road known as ALLARD HILL ROAD beginning at the Town line near the residence of Craig and Gail Kinney continuing south to the junction of Modock Hill Road. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles A. Frasier and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to accept the HENRY COTTON ROAD, located in the Davis Hill subdivision. Said Right-of-Way being 66 feet in width and approximately 1515 feet in length up to and including its intersection with said Hiram Philbrook Road.

This acceptance would be conditional on the following: a) all road bounds to be set; b) deed approval. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joy E. Tarbell and others.

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to accept the HIRAM PHILBROOK ROAD, located in the Davis Hill subdivision, said Right-of-Way being 66 feet in width and approximately 2260 feet in length, (its entirety). This acceptance would be conditional on the following: a) all road bounds to be set; b) deed approval; c) final completion of remaining shoulder work. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joy E. Tarbell and others.

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept APPLECROFT LANE ROAD, being approximately 1200 feet, running westerly from Route 113 in Conway with a cul-de-sac at the end, subject to a deed being received from C. Properties, Inc., the cul-de-sac radius be extended to 45 feet of paved surface and appropriate bounds being in place. Agreeable to a petition signed by James S. Soroka and others.

ARTICLE 58. To see if the voters will vote a non-binding referendum to direct the Selectmen to proceed with the process as contained in RSA 49-B:4, with the intent of forming a town council form of government for the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph E. Sullivan and others.

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town of Conway will send a message to the Legislature and Governor calling for a comprehensive toxics law requiring coordinated programs of planning, research and development, education, enforcement, and economic incentives to achieve toxics reduction by substitution with safer substances. Agreeable to a petition signed by H. Gardner Smith, Jr., and others.

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment." Agreeable to a petition signed by Maureen A. Cason and others.

ARTICLE 61. To see if the Town will vote to adopt locally an ordinance to control septic systems, permits, construction, operation and approval and use, and also fuels and gas storage installations in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lewis Zorzy and others.

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to rescind semi-annual real estate tax payments, and re-establish payment annually with a rate for the whole year and an interest rate for delinquent tax payments of no more than 10%. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lewis Zorzy and others.

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined school, town and county tax budgets, in anticipation of town, county and school purposes.

ARTICLE 64. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town of Conway, N.H. to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Conway, N.H. applied for, and to receive and expend them in accordance with the purposes thereof.

ARTICLE 65. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Capital Reserve Funds established by the Town from time to time and disburse the same in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were created respectively.

ARTICLE 66. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, any real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Collector's Deed; except when it is being sold back to the former owner, or to a party who has succeeded to the title of the former owner, in which case private sale may be utilized; any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before the next annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 67. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1988, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Conway's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1C, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway at December 31, 1988, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town of Conway at December 31, 1988, and the results of operations of such funds and

the changes in financial position of individual nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

to the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Conway

1989 was a very busy and eventful year. We were pressed, during the course of the last 12 months to implement many decisions made earlier. Among these was the completion of the Municipal Complex at Meeting House Hill, which includes the Police Station and State District Courthouse. This complex was well designed, well built within budget, and should be a source of pride for us all.

A considerable amount of time and energy was spent searching for a traffic solution. While a bypass is still an unsettled issue, a consultant's report, funded by the town and led by the Roads & Traffic Committee, resulted in an East Side Road recommendation. An article is before you seeking engineering and design funds.

Over the last decade it seems the Board of Selectmen has dealt with garbage disposal continuously. Finally, the issue is squarely before the voters in the form of a Landfill Bond Issue. Your support is needed.

The Town Assessor completed the first revaluation of properties since 1978. Assessor, Jim Fennessy, did a very difficult job, saved us a lot of money, and deserves our gratitude.

In a survey the voters expressed dissatisfaction with the present form of government and indicated a preference for a Town Council form of government. A Charter Commission vote is on the ballot in 1990.

As the regional economy slowed during the year, Conway was affected as well. When the economy soured we realized we cannot not do everything at once, and our budgets for 1990 reflect that, being under the rate of inflation. I do not believe; however, that our current economic problems should cause us to turn inward on ourselves, but work together to stabilize tax rates and provide for the elements of a diverse and stable economy.

Certainly, we have a lot to be thankful for here in our beautiful valley, not the least of which is our ingenuity and neighbor helping neighbor approach to problem solving. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT REPORT

As Administrative Assistant to the Town Manager my major responsibilities are serving the residents of Conway as Welfare Officer and Zoning Officer.

In the year 1989 the Town of Conway expended approximately \$37,000 of the \$45,000 general assistance budget, servicing approximately 122 single parents; 35 families; 33 senior citizens; 31 single males; and 18 transients, providing approximately \$2,700 in food vouchers, \$28,000 in rent vouchers, and \$6,000 in assisting with utility bills. Gasoline and bus ticket vouchers totalled approximately \$165 to provide transients with their continuing travel. A federal grant of \$5,000 was extremely helpful in keeping the taxpayers' dollars well spent, while continuing to assist the needy residents of Conway.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my thanks, especially to the Police Department who went beyond the call of duty, the churches, Community Action Program, and all the social agencies for the network that has been established in Conway to assist when help is needed.

I have found my responsibilities as Zoning Officer have been interesting and, to say the least, very challenging in the year 1989. As the economy started its decline in the latter quarter of the year I was challenged with the imaginative proposals for change of use and advertising techniques property owners were presenting to the Town. The zoning codes, generally, were understood and freely complied with as I took the time to explain to residents and developers the intent and spirit for which the codes were written.

There were approximately 80 sign violation notices issued in 1989, with compliance upon receipt of notice the general outcome. Occasionally, the violation notices resulted in a court summons with a District Court decision rectifying the understanding of the codes.

My goal for 1990 is to continue to keep the communications open between my office and the residents and developers of Conway so as to educate them in understanding the spirit and intent of the Zoning Codes, to be aware they are written to protect the residential neighborhoods while allowing complying growth in the commercial districts to create a working economy.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

In 1989 we completed our reassessment program which was in the works for approximately 3 years. Although we experienced some problems, they were no more numerous than if we had farmed the job out to a private company at a considerably higher cost.

We are still in the process of working out these problems and will continue to do so for some time, as assessing property, to be as fair and equal as possible, is a continuous process.

I, personally, would like to thank everyone for their patience and understanding; it was a difficult year due to the current depressed real estate market. Our values were arrived at prior to, and for the April 1st, 1989, tax date; since that time there has been at least a 15% reduction in selling prices, as well as a much longer period of time on the market than we had been used to the last few years.

I'm sure that most people realize that we cannot adjust values to reflect the current depressed market, any more than we could if it were an accelerated market up 15%. If we, in fact, reduced all property 15%, the tax rate would be affected the same percentage, and all the bills would remain the same. We will continue to work on inequities which may exist outside of these parameters.

Please remember that all exemption applications, by State statute, must be filed by April 15th of the tax year.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE FOR 1989

We are finally settled in at the new station and it seems great to have room to move around. It is much brighter and everyone seems happier. I know that there are a lot of you who have not had a tour, so stop by and we will be glad to show you around. We are proud of our new facility.

Ptl. Robert A. Grant attended the D.A.R.E. Officer School and is now teaching D.A.R.E. at Conway's three elementary schools. D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a seventeen week course that helps sixth grade students build self confidence and learn the decision making skills they need to resist the pressure to take drugs. Ptl. Grant is highly dedicated to this program and is doing an excellent job.

Det. Brian Collins, the Department Juvenile Officer, was trained by the Northeast Regional Center and is a member of the Conway Substance Abuse Prevention Team which works with high school students and the community concerning the use and outcome of substance abuse.

Even though traffic was down a little in 1989 and our economy has slowed up, request for police services increased by 5%. In 1984 when I became Chief, the police department responded to 5,527 Calls For Service and in 1989 we responded to over 8,000. The Department Prosecutor, Ptl. Christopher Perley, reports that the department had an increase of approximately 200 court cases for 1989, so you can see our volume is increasing at a rapid pace.

This March I start my seventh year as Chief. I appreciate the support that you have given the Conway Police Department and me for the past six years, and I hope we have earned your support for the future.

I would like to extend a special thank you to three highly dedicated Police Commissioners: Robert F. Porter, Ralph L. Mead and Paul D. Whetton. They have represented the Town admirably since they have been in office. Last, but not least, to the special men and women that make up the Conway Police Department, thank you.

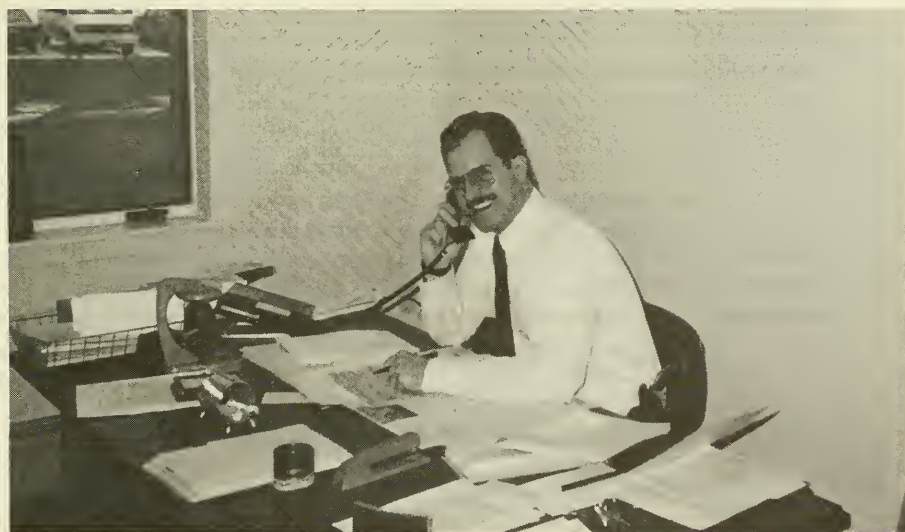

REPORT OF THE CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION FOR 1989

This year saw the completion of the new Police Station. The department moved into the new facilities in October. The Commission wishes to thank the taxpayers of Conway for their confidence in the Conway Police Department and furnishing the department with these new quarters. Considering the fact the training room is not used daily, it is very gratifying to see other town bodies, such as the Budget Committee, taking advantage of the space.

We are also very fortunate to have a Chief such as Chief Scaletti. He is truly a person who looks out for the taxpayer of the Town of Conway. This has been another year Chief Scaletti has kept the budget in line, making it possible to turn money back at the end of the fiscal year.

With the economy as it is this year, your Commission and Chief Scaletti spent numerous hours preparing the budget for 1990, doing our best to keep it down, while not cutting anything that would endanger services rendered. We feel as though we have done this, as we were able to keep it at an increase of only 2.6%. One of the cuts is to replace only one cruiser rather than two, which we would usually ask for. Also we cut back on overtime, Cadets, and other items not affecting our service to you the townspeople.

We believe another accomplishment this past year is the reduced turnover of personnel within the department. A good reason for this is the contract negotiated last year with the Patrolmen and Dispatch.

911 is up and operating and has already had opportunity to prove its worth. With this and other services furnished by your Police Department we, the Police Commission, truly believe the Town of Conway has a Police Department second to none in the State of New Hampshire.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT REPORT

What is a Public Works Department and what does it do for you? In these times of economic slowdown it is critical for all residents to understand the services provided by the department so that you may make informed decisions regarding the funding of this department.

The Public Works Department consists of highway maintenance, solid waste disposal, parks maintenance, recreation programs and facilities, cemetery maintenance, building maintenance, long and short term planning services, building and fire inspection services, and engineering services. In total, the proposed PWD budget for 1990 represents a 3% decrease from the 1989 budget. I believe we can provide the same service which you have become accustomed to for less money by working harder, utilizing our resources more efficiently and being innovative in our approach to problem solving.

1989 saw significant progress on many Public Works issues. In solid waste management we implemented mandatory recycling. The citizens have responded well and the result is a tax savings and a cleaner environment. Additionally, the planning and engineering work needed to receive a permit for a new landfill was completed. The combination of these items will provide the Town with a secure, environmentally sound solid waste solution for the next 30 years.

In the area of highway and transportation many issues have begun to be addressed. The stability of the Conway Lake Dam was researched and a solution has been proposed to repair it. Three bridges, Artist Falls Road Bridge, Skimobile Road Bridge and Old Bartlett Road Bridge, were repaired and a six year plan to repair all of the Town's bridges was prepared. The reconstruction of the Brownfield Road was finally completed after five years of work. The leg work to build from was performed on the issue of the need to construct new Town Roads. A computer program capable of helping us make these decisions was installed and the staff trained in its use. Also, great success was achieved in getting the State to cooperate on making changes to their roads to promote better traffic circulation.

In Parks and Recreation much planning work was completed in the areas of ballfield needs, swimming area development, cemetery repair and tree planting. The major planning feat of the year was the completion of the capital improvements plan, which documents what issues must be addressed by the Town in the next six years and

shows how those issues can be addressed without significantly impacting the tax rate. The need for inspection services remained strong throughout the year. The Building Inspector performed over 1100 inspections, finding 175 code violations, and issued 404 permits compared to 473 permits issued in 1988. The Fire Inspector performed over 1050 inspections, finding hundreds of fire code violations in existing motels, hotels, apartment buildings and commercial buildings. With the inspection services being performed by the Town, the life safety of the buildings and, therefore, the life safety of all the residents and tourists, is substantially improved over that of a couple of years ago. There is still quite a way to go in this area as we have only been able to get to a small percentage of the existing buildings in Town.

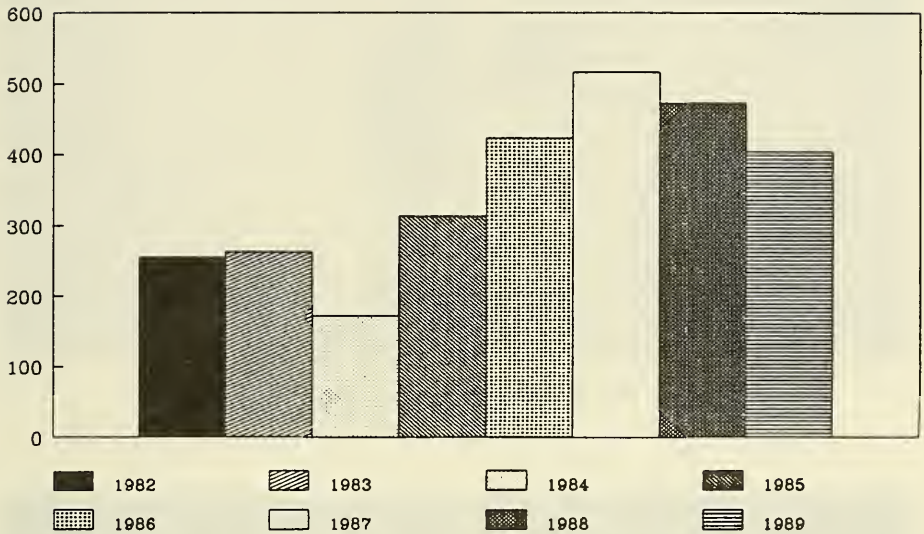
In 1990 we will continue to provide the services you have come to expect of us. Additionally, we will continue with the process of achieving a solution to our traffic woes, will design an East Side Road (if funds are approved), will look for additional ways to lower the cost of solid waste disposal, will begin work on updating the Town's Master Plan, will repair the Conway Lake Dam (if funds are approved), and will improve the process of obtaining information, services, and permits from the department for the general public so that Town Hall will become less complex to deal with.

Finally, the Selectmen have placed a \$3,300,000.00 bond issue for the construction of a new landfill on this year's ballot. Last year we asked for direction to the tune of \$800,000.00 and found that the voters were in favor of a landfill. This project will provide a thirty year solution to the Town's solid waste problem and will save millions of tax dollars during that time. You are offered a business decision in that this project requires an up-front investment in return for a long term tax saving. The cost of solid waste disposal has risen 747% in the past decade and will continue to do so unless this type of solution is implemented. Voting for a tax increase is always difficult, especially this year, but the alternative in solid waste management is economic Russian roulette.

In closing, I would like to praise the employees of the Public Works Department for a job well done this year. After all, the employees who provide the services to the Town are Town government's greatest asset. All the trucks, computers, and supplies in the world cannot provide service without competent, talented and caring employees. The Town is lucky to have the group of people it has.

Early in 1990 the final report should be approved by the Selectmen and Planning Board. This report will bring forward many suggestions on how to deal with traffic and how much each should cost.

The Capital Improvement Plan will help the Budget Committee and Town to keep taxes from rising so quickly. This report will show Capital Improvement for all departments for the next six years. This plan will be updated on a yearly basis. Here are some of the highlights of 1989.

1989 was the year that the Taxpayer has awakened in the Valley. The overheated economy of the mid to late 1980's has cooled down. Many new capital expansions were made and the cost of these now has to be paid. With the Capital Improvement Plan now in place, this should help keep the taxes under control in the years to come.

The major goals for the Planning Board for 1989 were as follows:

1. Shoreline Protection
2. Gravel Pit Ordinance
3. Clear-Cutting Ordinance
4. Septic Ordinance
5. Review Sprinkler Ordinance
6. Review Second Access Requirements
7. Re-Districting
8. Review Non-Conforming Ordinances
9. Update Master Plan

All of these goals cannot be reached in 1990. These goals help focus the Planning Board on which projects they will work on during work sessions. Each year, these goals will be updated and revised.

The Shoreline Zone was the number one priority for the Planning Board in 1989. At the 1989 Town Meeting, the Shoreline Zoning was defeated by about 100 votes. The Planning Board felt that more work should be put into the ordinance and also educating the public on the need to protect our lakes and great ponds. Our neighbor, Maine, has a state-wide Shore Protection Zone already in place. Maine has seen many of their lakes lost to overdevelopment and careless mistakes. The Planning Board has spent many hours researching and fine-tuning this ordinance, and hopefully the public will support it at our next Town Meeting.

In closing, it has been an honor to serve the Planning Board and Town of Conway for the last six years. Many changes have occurred and many more are to come as the Town of Conway turns into a small city.

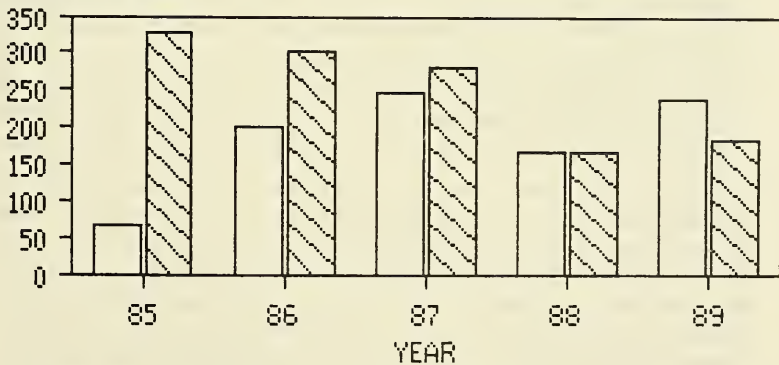

REPORT OF THE CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY - 1989

During 1989 much time and effort were spent on computerizing the circulation system and catalog. In February a person was hired to do data entry for the system. It is hoped it will be completed by the summer of 1990. All records will be added to the N.H. Automation Information System, which means that all of our records will be available to other N.H. libraries.

In order to get patrons' names into the computer the library began issuing "red cards" during National Library Week in April. This was also an effort to register new library users.

In an effort to protect the computer equipment a large window air conditioner was purchased. Window shades were also installed to make the library more comfortable.

Considerable time was spent by the Trustees and Mrs. Marschner addressing the need of more space in the Henney History Room and the Children's Room. Using funds from a grant received for that purpose a consultant made a feasibility study of the library. His report was reviewed by Trustees, the Librarian, the Town Manager, the Town Engineer and the Town Planner. A survey was also made by a consultant from the State Library. A third survey by the Northeast Document Conservation Center, which addressed the preservation and storage of all material in the library, was completed. A grant from the State Library covered the cost of this survey, which evaluated the entire building and the environment as they relate to the conservation needs of the collection. Studying these surveys resulted in the Trustees deciding to hire an architect. The Town Manager and the Town Engineer have kindly agreed to help in the selection process.

The Henney History Room is full of interesting documents and photographs. The Clerk's Record Books 1831 - 1875 from the Town of Freedom have been added; also newly bound Town Records of the Town of Eaton 1784-1801. Gifts of videos of local interest and local histories have also been received. Some of the monthly displays of local artwork in the meeting room were sponsored by the History Room. Although this is a history room, it has come to life under the direction of Anne Cullinan. Drop in and enjoy a look into the past.

Keith Henney presented to the library two narrative texts which he wrote.

The Conway Woman's Club continues to help the library with the annual book sale, which in 1989 was held to coincide with the Conway Village Festival. They continue to decorate the library at Christmas time, and helped the staff in 1989 to host a reception following the dedication of the Saco River Covered Bridge.

Volunteers continue to play an important role in the library. More volunteers would be welcome, even if for as little as an hour a week.

The library staff continues to be professional and friendly to patrons. They pride themselves on being helpful in research. Mrs. Judith Custer, staff member, initiated a program for the residents of the Clipper Home. The Trustees are proud of the work of the Librarian and staff. While they continue to be busy in the daily activities of checking books in and out, cataloging new purchases and answering research questions, they also sponsor various programs for adults and children.

The wide use of the library by townspeople is most gratifying. It has truly become a cultural center for the town.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1989 ANNUAL REPORT

1989 can be remembered as the year of recycling for the Conservation Commission. Probably no other single issue has been discussed with such frequency in the Commission's 20 years, so it has been wonderful to see the project finally come to fruition. In addition to recycling, the Commissioners worked on land acquisition, shorefront zoning, town lands management and wetland projects as well as laying the groundwork for some important upcoming projects.

In 1989 the Commission experienced some membership changes. Doug Burnell retired from the Commission after 10 years of faithful service. His position was filled by Candace Armstrong, with Ken Cargill and Alvin Hatch filling positions vacated by Karen MacDonald and Carl Dewitt. Scott Johnstone continued to be a very helpful liaison with Town Hall, as well as assisting us with our many engineering questions. We are also grateful to the town officials and staff, in addition to numerous townspeople, for their assistance in the following projects throughout the past year:

1. **LAND ACQUISITION:** The Commission continued to work with the local Task Force on the Trust for NH Lands/Land Conservation Investment Program in reviewing possible land for acquisition. In an effort to establish a more direct relationship to lands taken out of Current Use for development purposes and the need to establish a pool of funds to purchase replacement lands, the Commission is proposing that 50% of the Land Use Change Tax fees, with a \$50,000 cap, be allocated to the Fund for the Acquisition of Conservation Land. Your support of this proposal is appreciated. In other land news, the Commission is delighted that after 10 years of effort, the Nature Conservancy has purchased the 2800 acre Peaked Mt. property from Redstone Properties. This purchase will preserve this unique acreage for conservation and recreation.
2. **RECYCLING:** On January 22nd of this year, after several years of work and planning, mandatory recycling was officially inaugurated in Conway. Following the Town's vote of support for recycling at last year's town meeting, the Commission has been working with the local commercial haulers, businesses, Tin Mt. Conservation Center, the Lower Mt. Washington Valley Solid

Waste District and Scott Johnstone to promote recycling. Your patience and support is needed as we begin this important program.

3. **TOWN PROPERTIES:** In May the Commission received the completed Forest Management Plan for Whitaker Woods. This comprehensive report includes complete mapping and recommendations for managing the property for recreation, wildlife and timber stand improvements. In June the Commissioners voted to begin the management plan with a selective 9 acre cut to start this September. One of our upcoming projects for 1990 is the development of a natural resource inventory (NRI) to be included in the updated town master plan. This would give the town an important tool for reviewing proposed projects in addition to long range planning.
4. **DREDGE AND FILL PERMITS:** Applications for dredging or filling in the Town's wetlands were reviewed and several sites were visited to aid in making determinations of impact. One of these proposals, involving a substantial wetland, occupied a good deal of the Commission's time and resulted in a satisfactory arrangement for both parties.
5. **SHOREFRONT ZONING:** Commissioner Tom Earle has been working with the Planning Board on this year's proposed Shorefront Zoning District. Designed to protect Conway's great ponds, this proposal is being presented to the voters at this year's Town Meeting and needs your support.

The Conservation Commission will continue in the coming year to make Conway a better place to live and to promote the conservation and the enjoyment of our environment. As always, we welcome your input, ideas, and suggestions, and invite you to our regular meetings held at the Town Hall on the second Tuesday of each month.

REPORT OF TOWN PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

As Director of the Town of Conway's Parks & Recreation Department, I would like to thank all of the volunteers, individuals, organizations, and businesses that have contributed to this department. Without your help, it would not be possible to provide over 75 programs to the adults and children of our town.

A new updated playground has been installed and purchased by fund raising and volunteers. This new equipment at the Conway Recreation Center is ideal for the preschool youngsters and is a welcomed addition to our playground.

I have implemented a Shade Tree Program for the Town and was able to plant 25 trees this first year. Seven trees were planted at Conway Library, four at Conway Recreation Center, one at Conway Village Chamber, seven on Main Street, Conway Village, and three at the Gibson Center in North Conway. The Conway Village Chamber contributed \$800, White Mountain Board of Realtors gave \$240, and Gibson Center donated \$920 towards the purchase of trees. Peter Hoag's Tree Service removed a tree at Conway Library and pruning of all trees was done. All newly planted trees were watered throughout the summer months, and a fall fertilizing program was implemented.

The 1990's will be a challenge to our department and funds will come from the Town, user fees and fund raising.

Your Parks & Recreation Department is a vital part of this community and our residents must be able to continue to enjoy the amenities of our Town. Open space is limited as land becomes developed. The old swimming hole that was available for your use is now posted and cannot be used anymore by the general public.

One responsibility of your Parks & Recreation Department is to look at the future and be able to obtain suitable sites to meet the needs of our citizens - a place to swim, cross-country ski trails, walking trails, or a place to participate in an organized recreation activity. As your Director, and with the nine volunteers of the Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee, we will try to meet your needs.

REPORT OF CONWAY PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Conway Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee is a nine member committee appointed by the Board of Selectmen to provide both short and long range advice on items directly related to the park and recreational needs of the town of Conway.

During the last year C.P.R.A.C. has completed an inventory of all of the parks and recreation facilities in the town. In addition to that inventory, another ball field inventory has been presented to the Selectmen. A target map for future recreation land acquisition has been drawn up and presented to the Conway Planning Board for consideration.

A great number of hours has been devoted to a possible future swim facility. A study has been completed by the firm of Andrews and Clark outlining potential beach sites as well as cost estimates for a municipal swimming pool. It will be reviewed in the coming months and a recommendation will be made to the Selectmen. Also on the C.P.R.A.C. agenda for 1990 are a recreation needs assessment, planning for future development of facilities and programs, and coordination of existing programs and facilities.

The C.P.R.A.C. meets the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm at the Conway Recreation Center. The committee reports to the Board of Selectmen every other month or more often as needed. We welcome ideas, comments and concerns from residents of the town of Conway.

Recreation is a very important part of a healthy lifestyle. Members of this committee are working hard to provide quality parks and recreational services for the town of Conway.

**REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children, and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), no person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or caused to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, **without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.**

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000, and or a year in jail, and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield and Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

If you have any questions regarding New Hampshire forest fire laws, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden, State Forest Ranger, or the Division of Forests and Lands at 271-2217.
