TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs, greetings:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will open at 1 p.m., and will remain open until 7 p.m. (The polls may be continued to be open following the above hour by vote of the meeting, but may not be closed before the hour of 7 p.m. RSA 39:2).

(All articles hereinafter are submitted by the Selectmen unless otherwise noted.)

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Auditors for the year of 1970.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year of 1971 and to make appropriations of and for the same, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Town Officers' salaries and \$2,500 for Town Officers' expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 for election and registration expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the upkeep of the Town Hall and other Town buildings, or take any other action relating thereto. Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 for Social Security payments for Town employees, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of \$3,600 for the Police Department and \$3,500 for the Fire Department, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 for Blister Rust Control, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for tree trimming, or to take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by Conservation Commission.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for Insurance, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 for Damages and Legal Expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for contributions to neighboring towns which permit the use of their dumps by Deering residents and for trash removal, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25 for Vital Statistics, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for Highway purposes: 1.) \$10,000 for summer roads; 2.) \$13,500 for winter roads; 3.) \$6,000 for the general expenses of the Highway Department, and 4.) \$2,000 for road sealing or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,364.23 to secure Town Road Aid, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550 for street lighting, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35 for the Library ,or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of \$1,200 for Town Poor; \$1,200 for Old Age Assistance; and \$500 for Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of \$1,500 for interest on short-term loans and \$1,650 for interest on long-term loans, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To recall to the attention of the Town that the sum of \$11,000. in payment of TRA notes must be raised, under the provisions of RSA 33:2; with the note that most of the latter sum is provided for in TRA commitments.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000 for its share of County Taxes.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the care of Cemeteries.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$290 for the support of the Monadnock Region Assn., or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for Civil Defense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$50,000 for the purpose of purchasing a tract of land and to erect thereon a municipal services building for the use of the Town's Fire, Highway and other departments, such sum to be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 33, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated (Municipal Finance Act) as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town, or to take any other action relating thereto. Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to secure title to a parcel of land adjacent to Reservoir Dam from the State of New Hampshire, or to take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by Conservation Commission.)

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to place Catherine Carew's photograph on the cover of the next Annual Report.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to have the reports of its Officers and Agents audited by the State Tax Commission.

Article 33. To transact any other business which may legally be brought before this meeting.

Report of the Selectmen

The town operated within the overall appropriated budget for the calendar year 1970. Current assets of \$77,392.82 compare with current liabilities of \$61,640.32. However, long-term liabilities of \$33,000. for TRA bonds result in a net debt of \$17,247.50. There has been a decrease of \$11,233.46 in net debt during 1970.

Expenses of police and the county assessment were above estimates.

Rising calls for police service necessitated an emergency appropriation by the Selectmen for additional funds for police calls. Continued off-season surveillance reduced vandalism reports. This service, while costly, is one of the few obvicus ways in which the citizens see the results of spending of tax monies.

The county's assessment was almost 25 percent over the budget estimate. This was due in large part to the fact that 1968 equalized valuation was used for the larger municipalities in the County. In 1970, their equalized valuation increased substantially and, in 1971, this should reduce at least the rate of increase in the County tax.

The costs of maintenance and improvement of the Town's roads was kept within the appropriated budget, but prudence requires a small (approx. 8 percent) increase in 1971 suggested appropriations.

The school budget continues to rise, with an unknown factor yet to be assessed dependent on action to be taken at the March 4, 1971 school district meeting.

The past compensation of the Tax Collector, at 1 percent of the tax commitment, appears inequitable in relation to the services offered to the townspeople by the Town Clerk/Treasurer, pursuant to authority granted the Selectmen earlier. We have consequently established, effective January 1, 1971, a new fixed rate of \$1,200 per year for each the Tax Collector and the Town Clerk/Treasurer.

Taxpayers' appeals to the State Tax Commission for previous years resulted in ordered abatements of less than \$100. during 1970.

We invite your attention to Article 27, which suggests

the possibility of erecting a new municipal services building for the use of the Fire and Highway Departments principally. We feel that early action should be taken to improve our fire fighting capacity ,and any step in this direction will require a new, heated building for winter location of a tank truck. The present Town shed is manifestly unsuitable.

TOWN OF DEERING

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Deering qualified to vote in Town Affairs, was called to order at 7:15 P.M. March 10. The meeting was opened with a Prayer and salute to The Flag.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Total Ballots cast 99; Selectman for Three Years, William Kulbacki 46; Kathleen Yeaple 50, Town Treasurer, Clara Rich 90; Tax Collector - Howard Whitney 91; Town Clerk, Clara Rich 93; Trustee of Trust Funds for Three years - Eleanor Fitzpatrick - 87; Library Trustee for Three Years - Joan C. Burke - 84; Auditors - Eunice Willgeroth - 87 and Marjorie Heath - 89. Police Officer - Harold Wells had 18 write in votes. Overseer of Poor-Board of Selectmen had 22 write in votes: Surveyor of Wood & Lumber - Board of Selectmen had 20 write in votes.

Article 2. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Auditors for the Year 1969.

Article 3. It was voted to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year 1970 and to make appropriations of and for the same.

Article 4. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400, for Town Officers' salaries and \$2,500 for Town Officers' expenses.

Article 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300, for election and registration expenses.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000, for the upkeep of the Town Hall and other buildings.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750, for Social Security payments for Town employees.

Article 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sums of \$3,500, for the Police Department and \$2,000, for the Fire Department.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125, for Blister Rust Control.

Article 10. Voted in the negative to raise money to

control Dutch Elm Trees.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000, for Insurance.

Article 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800, for Damages and Legal Expenses.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700, for contributions to neighboring towns which permit the use of their dumps by Deering Residents, and for trash removal.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25, for Vital Statistics.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums for Highway purposes: 1)\$9,000. for summer roads; 2) \$12,000. for winter roads; and 3) \$6,000. for the general expenses of the Highway Department.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,364.83 to secure Town Road Aid.

Article 17. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to temporarily discontinue TRA operations of the North Road, finishing the Old County Road only.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500, for Street lighting.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35. for the Library.

Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for repair of the Library to include Electrical work.

Article 21. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sums of \$1,500. for Town Poor; \$500. for Old Age Assistance; and \$400. for Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled.

Article 22. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sums of \$1,500. for interest on short-term loans and \$1,782. for interest on long-term loans.

Article 23. Recalled to the attention of the Town the sum of \$3,300. to meet the annual payment on the Grader and \$11,000. in payment of TRA notes must also be raised, most of the latter sum is provided for in TRA commitments.

Article 24. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500. for its share of County Taxes.

Article 25. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the care of Cemeteries.

Article 26. Negative vote to support the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 27. Negative vote to Appropriate money for Public Beach.

Article 28. Negative vote to raise money for Highway Garage.

Article 29. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Article 30. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for Civil Defense.

Article 31. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. for the compensation of the Dog Officer.

Article 32. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds.

Article 33. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 34 It was voted to abandon as elective office effective at the Annual meeting of 1971, the position of Police Officer, and to make this office appointive at the discretion of the Selectmen.

Article 35. It was voted to authorize and direct the Selectmen of the Town of Deering, in conjunction with the Selectmen of the Town of Hillsborough, to present to the 1971 Legislature a bill to authorize and empower the Town of Hillsborough and the Town of Deering to adjust their common boundry from a present straight line running from the Northeast corner of the Town of Antrim to a point on the East bank of the Contoocook River from the said Northeast corner of the Town of Antrim to the said point near the East bank of the Contoocook River which would coincide with the aforementioned straight line. And to take any other action thereto.

Article 36. It was voted to adopt the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 33-A with respect to the retention and disposition of records of the Town.

Article 37. It was voted to accept the quit-claim gift of a parcel of land from George Gregg of Hillsboro and to place the same under the control of the Conservation Commission.

Article 38. It was voted as an ordinance to be promulgated by the Selectmen, prohibiting overnight parking on any public road of the Town during the period from November 1 to April 1 of each succeeding year.

Article 39. It was voted to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.

Article 40. It was voted to place Whitney S. K. Yeaple's photograph on the cover of the next Annual Report.

Article 41. It was voted to approve the tentative action of the Selectmen in naming the roads of the Town as on the Official map.

Article 42. It was voted to publish annual assessment forms.

Meeting adjourned at 11:10 P.M.

DETAILED REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The following is to give the people a brief statement of the work done on Deering Roads in 1970 and to answer any questions raised to me during the past year. Gravel output was approximately 8500 yards. Although there are still several locations in Town that haven't received the attention they need, the following were taken care of: Wilson's Road to the Bennington line; part of Long Woods Road: the 2nd N. H. Turnpike: Donovan's Road: Dickey Hill Road and Tubbs Hill Road. East Deering Road and Old County Road received special treatment where needed due to holes and bumps. Clay, Hardpan and boulders were dug up on East Deering Road and rocks and boulders on Old County Road. These spots were filled with sand and gravel and then tarred. Two hundred tons of cold patch was used to patch up Class 4 roads. A majority of this cold patch was used on the above-named Old County Road and East Deering Road for the work described. The remaining was used for general cold patching in the entire Town. A question was raised as to my using the Town Sheds as a home office and garage. When I did use the garage to work on my equipment, I incurred little or no expense to the Town. But any minor expense which was incurred, was repaid far more. On many occasions I did not turn in time which I spent working on Town equipment and roads. I have also used gravel from my pit for Town roads at no charge. As far as parking Town equipment in the Town Sheds goes, I must state that none of the equipment fits in the sheds and with the present heating and lighting facilities it is no warmer inside than out. In conclusion, I am pleased to say that general maintenance expenses on Town equipment was minor and I feel that the people of Deering have gotten even more for their money this year than last. I hope I have served the majority of the people as Road Agent this past year.

Deering Planning Board Report

The Deering Planning Bcard met seven times, held three Public Hearings on subdivisions, as well as two joint meetings, one with the Board of Selectmen and one with the Conservation Commission. Dr. James M. Carew was reelected by the Board as Chairman for this year. Mr. John Snow was re-appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a four-year term created by his own expired term of office.

A total of ten subdivision plans were approved by the Board, with none not approved.

At the joint meeting with the Selectmen it was agreed that no land that is being sub-divided would be taxed as a subdivision until the plan had been approved by the Planning Board.

At the joint meeting with the Conservation Commission there was discussion regarding the Town requesting the State to grant the control of the Deering Lake Dam Beach area to the Town, limiting it for use by Townspeople only.

The two groups agreed to request the Town to approve the removal of diseased elms on the Common and trim the live trees. This Article appears in the Warrant and is endorsed by the Planning Board.

Comprehensive Planning for the Town was discussed and it was agreed that there is a definite need for such planning in the immediate future, in order that we may preserve our rural charm and avoid a haphazard growth and development of the Town.

The Planning Board wishes to call to the attention of all landowners that a Subdivision Law now exists within the State and that any Subdivision must be approved by the Planning Board and carries with it a penalty of \$500.00 per parcel when the law is not adhered to. Landowners wishing to subdivide are welcome to contact any member of the Planning Board for information and assistance relating to subdividing.

Regarding the Town Common, the Planning Board again suggests painting two sides of the Town Garage as seen from Route 149, storing all road equipment within the garage or behind the Town Hall during the open weather months, painting of the Town Hall and Library, and proper upkeep of the grounds during the summer months.

Again the Deering Planning Board feels it has accomplished considerable during the past year and in the best interests of the Town, and reminds you that its members are appointed by the Selectmen and serve without remuneration, in a true civic spirit. We are always open to receive suggestions and opinions from residents and non-residents on matters relating to the future planning of the Town. February 4, 1971

Report of the Conservation Commission

The commission meets monthly at the homes of various members. One meeting was held jointly with the Planning Board to discuss mutual problems.

We continued to work to obtain a beach for exclusive use of Deering and believe we have found a satisfactory solution to the problem. Approval of Article 30 of the Town Warrant will authorize the Selectmen to request transfer by the State to the Town of the State owned land adjacent to the dam and spillway. This would permit future development of a town recreation area. It will probably take from six months to two years to get approval from the State so it is urgent that we initiate action as soon as possible. No material additional expense to the Town will be incurred without approval of the voters. The Town is currently responsible for police coverage and sanitation. Money for toilet facilities has previously been voted. We urge your approval of Article 30.

On Old Home Day, August 15th, the Commission held a slide lecture at the Town Hall entitled "Deering for Better or Worse." Mrs. Olmsted arranged with Mr. Floyd Barker of the New Hampshire Cooperative Extension Service to present the lecture. She also prepared five excellent maps of the Town showing the swamps, streams and ponds, forested areas, hilltops, and roads. Although the lecture was delayed in starting there was an excellent turnout and we feel that we accomplished our aim of making the people of Deering conscious fo the conservation problems.

Members of the commission are working with Mr. Henry Baldwin who is surveying the Town property in the Center. When completed the Commission will work with the Planning Board to set up a "Plan for the Center."

On November 17, 1970 the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions was formed to aid the local Conservation Commission members in the better discharge of their duties and to facilitate communication and mutual cooperation. This is not a State supported organization. Member commissions pay dues based on Town population. Deering's dues are \$20.00 and have been paid from the commission's operating funds.

During the present calendar year the Commission hopes

to complete a questionnaire in order to learn what the people of the Town want in the field of conservation so that we may develop a long range plan to accomplish the desired ends.

All Deering taxpayers interested in Conservation should make themselves known to members of the Commission so that we can learn their views and make use of their talents if they are willing.

Health Officer's Report

I am pleased to report again this year that the water of Deering Lake remains in a fine quality and purity as last vear. A number of samples of the water were taken on September 7, 1970 and sent to the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in Concord. Reports from all samples indicated that Deering Lake has as fine water as one would like to find throughout the State. These findings were most encouraging, especially since there was very little rainfall during the summer, and the samples were taken at the end of the summer season. However, this should not be misconstrued to mean that the lake will always have such fine water, free of pollution, unless all using the water area, whether living at the lake or just using its waters continue in their efforts to help preserve the fine residential and resort area we all enjoy, assuring healthy living for all.

The areas of vital concern pertaining to pollution of the lake are contamination by privies, septic systems, oil and gas spillage on the surface water from motor boats, and dumping of waste such as cans and bottles.

In other areas of the town the Board of Health was required to condemn some former dwellings as unfit for human habitation. There are still dwellings being used in the community, all rental property, which the Board of Health will be compelled to close unless improvements are made by the owners to assure fit, sanitary and healthy living quarters for those renting them.

The health of a community should be of great concern to everyone living in that community. The Board of Health, comprising the Health Officer, Assistant Health Officer and Board of Selectmen, with the help of all in our community will strive to maintain healthy living for all. February 2, 1971
