#### VETERANS' EXEMPTION

"No person shall be entitled to the exemption provided by Section 29 unless he shall have filed with the selectmen on or before April fifteenth of each year an application therefor signed under penalty of perjury on a form which may be obtained from the selectmen"

Printed above is a portion of the law governing property tax exemptions to servicemen or widows of servicemen which must be followed if exemption is to be allowed in 1961. The Exemption Law has also been revised so that only Residential Real Estate as defined below can be exempted from Taxation.

"Residential Real Estate; That Real Estate that a person occupies as his principal place of abode together with any land or buildings appurtenant thereto. Provided further that the resident qualified for exemption, excepting those with service connected disability shall not be delinquent in the payment of any taxes due the State of N. H. or any political subdivision thereof."

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Epping which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, which provides in part as follows: SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The (Tax) Commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit, xxxx"

This audit covered the period from September 21st, 1958, (date of the previous audit by this Division) to December 31, 1959. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report. Also included is a Statistical Table presenting a Ten Year Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk.

# FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1958 (Exhibits A-3 & A-4) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1959 (Exhibits E-4 & E-5)

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$14,478.04, less a revenue surplus of \$5,956.98, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$8,521.06 in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958.

In the year ended December 31, 1959, a net overdraft of appropriations of \$14,437.68, less a revenue surplus of \$5,080. 78, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$9,356.90.

Summary Statements of Receipts and Expenditures:
Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1958 (Exhibit B-1)
Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1959 (Exhibit F-1)

Summary statements of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, are included in Exhibits B-1 and F-1, respectively. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit F-2.

# AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

# Current Surplus:

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$26,389.53 to \$5,146. 56, during the two year period from December 31, 1957 to December 31, 1959, as shown herewith:

Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in each of the fiscal years ended December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, there were net overdrafts of appropriations amounting to \$14,478.04 and \$14,437.68, respectively. In other words - total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by these amounts as indicated herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, RSA Chapter 32, application should have been made to the Tax Commission by the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures.

Chapter 32, Section II, of the RSA, further provides that "Any person or persons violating the provisions of RSA 32:10 shall be subject to removal from office on proper petition brought before the superior court."

It is recommended that these lists be examined by the Board of Selectmen and Tax Collector and such taxes thereon as appear to be uncollectable should be abated.

If the operator is required to file a bond or make a cash deposit before the cutting can be started, the collection of yield taxes will be assured and the possibility of losing substantial amounts of tax revenue from this source eliminated.

Inasmuch as the two year period in which the law provides that redemptions may be made has expired in all of these cases, it is recommended that the Collector give tax deeds to the Town on the properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens.

# (Personal Property)

It was noted that the Collector sells personal property as such at his tax sales. If the delinquent taxpayer owns real estate, the unpaid personal property taxes should be included in the amount for which the real estate is sold. If, however, he is only liable for a tax on personal property, the collection of such delinquent tax should be made through distraint procedure and not through a tax sale which is limited to real estate.

(Interest on Redemptions from Tax Sales)

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 32, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, which is quoted in part herewith, interest at the rate of eight per cent should be charged on all redemptions from tax sales from the date of tax sale to the date on which redemption is made.

"80:32 Redemption. Any person interested in land so sold may redeem the same by paying or tendering to the collector, or in his absence, at his usual place of abode, at any time before a deed thereof is given by the collector, the amount for which the land was sold, together with costs for notifying mort-

gagees, if any, and with eight per cent interest upon the whole amount from the time of sale to the time of payment or tender, together with redemption costs incurred.\*\*'

(Yield Taxes)

It is noted that the Town has not made a payment to the State Treasurer on account of yield tax collections since 1957. Chapter 79 of the RSA, as amended, provides in part as follows:

"79:15 Disposition of Bond and Debt Retirement Tax. The bond and debt retirement taxes collected under section 4 of this chapter shall be paid by the collectors of taxes of cities and towns into their respective treasuries. Each town or city shall pay over to the state treasurer in the month of January all such taxes collected during the preceding year, less any abatements granted."

(Head Taxes)

It is noted that the Town has been losing some of its commission for the collection of State head taxes because of the failure to make remittances to the State within the time limits as provided by Law.

Chapter 8, Section 9, of the Laws of 1959, in relation thereto, provides in part as follows:

"8:9 Payment to State. On or before the fifteenth day of the months of September, December, March and June, each town and city shall cause its tax collector to certify such information as the state treasurer shall require and the treasurer to pay over to the state treasurer all special head taxes and penalties collected during the preceding three months after first deducting ten per cent of the head taxes collected. xxxx. If any town or city shall fail to make its payment when due the deduction of the ten per cent to be retained by it shall be reduced by one quarter of one per cent for each week or part thereof said payment is overdue."

# Motor Vehicle Permits:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 260, Section 5, of the RSA, as amended by Chapter 13 of the Laws of 1957, no permit for the registration of a motor vehicle should be issued without first requiring the applicant to show a tax collector's

receipt for the payment of any poll or head taxes for which the applicant is liable for the preceding year, or make an affidavit that such taxes have been paid.

# Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Epping for their assistance during the course of the audit.

# TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epping in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epping on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for roads and bridges.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise, providing such property is advertised fifteen days in advance of sale and such notice is posted in three public places.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$837.24 and the State to contribute \$5,581.57 towards Class V construction and/or improvement to our town.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the total of \$913.89 of the so-called Duncan Fund money, allotted to the town by the State for the year 1961, to be used as required by statute.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used in cooperation with the State and Federal Funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust, within the confines of the Town.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to construct a sidewalk with curb on the north-east corner of Pleasant and Main Streets. This sidewalk to start where the improved sidewalk in front of the Ma-

sonic Hall ends, and continue to the corner and thence north along Main Street, the length of the Bank Building. This being the same article that was approved and passed at the March 1960 Town Meeting, but the contractor was unable to complete before frost.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for a new Wing, fully installed on the Highway Agent's truck.
- 12. To see if the town of Epping, N. H. on petition of Richard Castle and twenty others, will vote to purchase a new fire truck, and for such purpose to appropriate a sum not to exceed thirteen thousand and five hundred dollars (\$13,500.00), and to raise such sum to authorize the issuance of serial notes or bonds, an amount not to exceed \$13,500.00, under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 72 of the revised laws, as amended and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on serial notes or bonds and to take whatever action as may be necessary to the issuance thereof.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to appraise all improved land and buildings to assist the Selectmen in equalizing assessed valuations within the town.
- 14. To see if the town will vote that the Highway Agent's Report be reduced in the future, to one page in the Town Reports, so that much space and money can be saved.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to close the following Class VI roads, or any of them, subject to Gates and Bars as provided by law in order to reduce liability for road expense and other liability now or in the future; (1) The old short cut from Mast Road to the rear of Hedding Camp Ground. (2) Grassy Lane to High Road.
- 16. To see if the town wishes to retain the recently enacted zoning laws (not to be confused with the previously enacted building code). The petitioners feel that the said ordinance is an unnecessary burden and expense to the citizens of Epping, a complicated addition to the town government, and unnecessary giving up of property owners' rights, as well as a very difficult thing to enforce.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to recind the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

18. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

Another year is past and again it is with pleasure that I present to you the following report. The Free Public Library has enjoyed another active and very busy year. One hundred and three new borrowers have been added, 342 new books were purchased, and the circulation was 8,349.

This has been an interesting year for me, and I only hope that I have made the library an interesting place for you. I have enjoyed watching the circulation of the library steadily increase and would certainly like to show an increase annually.

A high school girl, Miss Mary Crocker, has been hired as a helper on Wednesday afternoons. It was getting impossible to help the students to find books for their reports, take care of the fines, and date the books in a hurry, so that the bus children could make it back in time for the bus to take them home.

Monthly book deposits have been provided for the Mitchell Memorial Hospital throughout the year by members of the Friends of the Library group. The neighborhood exchange program is a bit slow and not too active, but is still in operation. There are small book deposits in the Nottingham and Brentwood libraries. Regular visits from the Bookmobile were made every two to three months where more and more books are left for reading pleasure and information.

I was given another scholarship to attend the library courses offered at the University of New Hampshire this past summer. I have already completed three years and hope to graduate from the course this summer and receive a librarian's certificate. I have also attended the Neighborhood meetings held this past year and have received valuable information on book selection and service for adults and young adults. The library has been given a number of books from the State library just for my attending these meetings.

The Friends of the Library, only a year old, has accomplished many things this year. Food sales have been held on the election days and held a very successful Tag Day. In turn, they were able to have the library painted and have purchased a library table to be used by the students. They helped to sponsor an Open House for the library one day during National Library week while the Garden Club made several flower arrangements. The Friends also helped to sponsor a film program and book display on the same day of the Open House. During the summer a Reading program was held for the fourth through the sixth grades and the Friends awarded cash prizes to the winners.

The Trustees of the Library sponsored atea for the school teachers of Epping. This was quite well attended and helped to promote friendly relations between the library and school and to introduce library facilities to the teachers.



### SCHOOL WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Epping qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Fourteenth day of March, 1961, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the School District of Epping will vote with the other Districts of Supervisory Union No. 14 to provide for the services of a Helping Teacher as provided in R. S. A. 186:11 XXII, XXIII, XXIV; as amended 1957, R. S. A. 252:2.
- 10. If the above vote is in the affirmative to see if the District will raise the sum of \$1,257.80 for salary, transportation, retirement and social security.
- 11. To see if the School District of Epping will vote to originally build and equip a ten classroom school building.

Voted, that a ten classroom school building be originally constructed, equipped and furnished and that any real property necessary for it's location be acquired in said district.

- 12. To see if the School District of Epping will vote to raise and appropriate the sum aggregating to Two hundred forty thousand dollars (\$240,000.) to be used for the purpose of originally constructing, equipping, and furnishing of said new school and acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for it's location; and the said sum of Two hundred forty thousand dollars (\$240,000.) to be raised by issuance and sale of notes and/or bonds of the School District of Epping in the principal amount of Two hundred and forth thousand dollars (\$240,000.) to be issued pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act as set forth in Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, as amended, and any other authority enabling of the said Revised Statutes Annotated, the fixing of the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of the notes and/or bonds and all other matters in connection therewith to be left to the discretion of the School Board.
- 13. To see to what extent the School District of Epping will share services and facilities with Newmarket.
- 14. To see if the School District of Epping will vote to tuition High school pupils to schools in surrounding towns, starting in September 1961.
- 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

There have been many proposals and ideas on how to solve the educational problem on the secondary level for the past few years, but none of these have been given enough support from the community to give your School Board the authority to solve the problem. It is apparent from the interest in the past that you desire better education for your shildren and are willing to spend to obtain it. The question of tuition or forming a cooperative, or building a school of your own has been discussed and voted and discussed further. However, as of now the "what and how" still has to be decided.

I am very pleased therefore to offer you a new alternative. This alternative will provide a comprehensive program comparable to Exeter or other large schools around us, and at the same time help to offset the high cost per pupil and reduce to a minimum the cost of building a school. The proposal that I have in mind is for Epping to build it's own high school, but instead in the process of building involve yourselves in the high cost of providing shop, science labs and the like, to build and equip a school containing class rooms. How then can we gain our comprehensiveness? It is proposed that we share our services and facilities with Newmarket. As an example, instead of hiring a teacher in each community to teach three to five advanced

math students, we make this a joint venture and hire one teacher to teach all six or ten students in one place. Further, in relation to shop, instead of constructing and equipping an expensive shop for those pupils who will take shop transport them to the program of Newmarket. I am certain that this explanation doesn't begin to answer all the questions that you have relative to this proposal. However, discussions, open hearings and the like will be held in Epping before the annual School District Meeting. I therefore urge you to attend them so that you might understand and then vote intelligently. It is my opinion as your educational leader that this proposal solves the dilemma that has been facing Epping over the years.

In summarizing this proposal it offers the opportunity to maintain your local control, maintain your high school and at the same time provide an individualized, comprehensive program that will better prepare your high school boys and girls for their adult life.

Reference is made again this year to the questions brought to your attention last year in my report to you; mainly the type of education you expect and the type you are willing to support. We still need to reduce class size to 25 or 30. We still need a program of studies. We still need a basic series in our subject series. In addition one of the greatest needs in this Union is still help at the Union level. This is in relation to the position of Superintendent. It is unreasonable to expect anyone to fulfill all the obligations this person should fulfill as Superintendent of Schools and properly care for all the communities that are expected to be cared for in this Union. I feel it necessary to again this year request and emphasize the need for a Helping Teacher.

In looking over our needs listed last year it is noted that some of them have been fulfilled. For example, we are rapidly progressing toward a program of minimum essentials and a program of studies. We have improved our basic series in the subject areas. We have evaluated and made changes and are now using a new report card. We have developed and have only recently put into use a permanent record system that is universal throughout the Union. There is being offered an inservice training program for teachers, insignificant as it is at the present time, we are providing courses to improve teaching ability.

In conclusion I would like to offer to you as parents and citizens a challenge. Let us all search ourselves and others to determine what type of school is most desirable, ask ourselves if our school presently fits these requirements, and if not attempt to create change so that it will.

### SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To: Mr. Wade, School Board Members, and Citizens of Epping

I am happy to report that for the first time in the history of the schools of our Union we have available the services of a speech therapist. Because Speech Therapy is a young field, this type of therapist is not available to many school systems. Speech defective children are much more numerous than we might suspect, and investigation shows that only one-sixth of them are being given the remedial instruction that they must have if they are to be helped. The response from most parents and from the P. T. A., sponsors of the program, has been enthusiastic. It is my hope that Speech Therapy will become an integral part of the school program.

Because of family responsibilities, our school doctor has had to give up her school connections on a regular basis. In spite of this, she has kindly offered to help with individual needs.

The position of Public Health Nurse no longer exists in this area. This means that preschool clinics will be discontinued unless individuals or groups in the community plan and initiate such action.

Other health services aimed at maintaining and improving the health of school children are being carried on as usual.
