TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Grantham, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grantham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Trustee of the Public Library, for the ensuing three years; one Police Officer and two Auditors for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose one or more Highway Agents, and all other necessary town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to apply for Town Road Aid, and raise the sum of \$389.61 for the same with the State contributing \$2,597.43.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor and Old Age Assistance.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to shingle the Town Garage.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to continue as a member of the Newport Area Public Health Nursing Association.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Article 9. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of painting the outside of the Town Hall and Church.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a sand spreader.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and maintenance of the Town Dump.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to replace or repair the bridge across Sugar River on Dunbar Hill Road.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any property acquired by tax title in any manner they deem advisable.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000 to be placed in the New Truck Trust Fund.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500. to pay for the cost of street lighting.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Dunbar Library.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Article 20. To see what the town wishes to do about the so-called Al Smith road, and Old Route 10 from L. Horton south to Route 89.

Article 21. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways and bridges.

Article 22. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for snow bill.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money if necessary in anticipation of taxes.

Article 24. To hear the reports of the officers, agents and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

#### **Fire Permit**

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

#### Exceptions

Commercial or Industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

## **Penalties**

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.

4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Grantham on Wednesday, March 11, 1970 at 2:30 p.m. in the afternoon to act on Article one, (Polls will be open from 2:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.) and beginning at 7:30 p.m. to act on Articles two through six.

Article 1. To choose by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer, two Auditors, a member of the School Board for the ensuing one year and a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salary of School District officials and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to establish the position of Teacher Aide in the Grantham Village School and further to raise and appropriate \$2,265.00 to support said position.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to build a multiple purpose room in the unexcavated area beneath the Grantham Village School and for the purpose of defraying the cost of said construction to authorize the School Board to use the sum of four thousand, five hundred dollars (\$4,500.) presently in the North Grantham Schoolhouse Fund, and for the purpose of defraying the balance of the cost of said construction, to authorize the issuance of not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire

Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto), and to authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect negotiations, issuance, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Grantham School District and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE**

To the Citizens of Grantham:

#### FOREWORD

Change for change's sake is unjustifiable, but change to improve programs is a prime responsibility of every administrator. As you read the various reports this year. you will note the emphasis placed on change. The changes which are taking place are based on thorough study and are focused on providing a better learning environment for children. One does not have to search very deeply to find proof that the educational establishment must do better in terms of effective learning for all children than has been the case in the past. For example, the Army Surgeon General reports that in 1965, one of every four 18 year old males, failed the mental tests for induction into the service. Statistics show that today approximately one of every four American chilldren drop out of school somewhere between fifth grade and high school graduation. Although, the statistics locally are somewhat better than what is depicted in these nation-wide figures, there is much that can be done to improve our schools.

We have a philosophy which says that every child shall learn to the best of his ability. In order to make such a commitment, we must be ready to change a system which does not work, and find one which does. We must be willing to identify causes of failure in the system and change those things which lead to failure. We have made progress toward our goal, however, we must continue to seek ways which lead to the commitment we have made which states that every child shall learn.

## ELEMENTARY MINIMUM STANDARDS

The State Board of Education voted in June of 1969 to approve minimum standards for elementary schools. The State Board has set September 1, 1972 as a reasonable effective date for implementation of the standards. This action will, to some degree, effect every elementary school in the State. A comprehensive curriculum including, art, music, health and physical education must be provided for all students. Also guidance and library services will have to be available to all students. All elementary schools in the Supervisory Union have a problem in meeting minimum standards. It would seem that some of these services might best be provided as a shared service through the Supervisory Union Office, the same as we now share the cost of health services, thus reducing the cost to the individual districts.

## STATE AID TO EDUCATION

The two main sources of state aid to education that Grantham has received over the years has been Foundation Aid and Sweepstake Aid.

The purpose of Foundation Aid was and is to assist districts in equalizing the educational opportunities for the children in school districts of New Hampshire. The two factors used in determining the amount of Foundation Aid due to a school district are the Average Daily Membership (ADM) of its students and the Equalized Valuation of property in the school district.

Due to the fact that the legislature never appropriated sufficient funds to fully implement this program, Grantham has received only a small portion of the amount due for the period of 1965-71. The difference between the amount that the school district should have received and the amount that will be actually received over this six-year period from the Foundation Aid program is \$68,139.60.

A SIX YEAR COMPARISON OF FOUNDATION AID DATA

Aid, then all districts receiving this aid will be cut proportionately to aid the district affected.

The following chart indicates the aid received from the New Hampshire Sweepstakes as the only other significant source of state aid to education. This aid, as can be seen below, has dwindled from its inception. The per pupil entitlement has gone from \$24.15 per pupil in 1964-65 to \$6.30 for 1969-70. Although the total of \$6,839.86 received to date has helped the district, this form of aid has been too unreliable and inadquate to provide the needed stability to the support of education in Plainfield.

Both Aid programs described above are inadequate. The degrees of implementation of Foundation Aid makes it ineffective. Sweepstakes Aid depends on the element of chance which makes it unreliable.

The School Districts in New Hampshire need financial assistance in providing and maintaining quality educational programs. Since the responsibility by-law belongs to the State, the General Court must be prevailed upon to accept it by providing realistic and not token support.

## FEDERAL AID TO EDUCATION

The only significant amount of aid Grantham has received from federal sources has been under the Elementary-Secondary Education Act (ESEA), Title I. This act provided funds that had to be used for the specific purpose of providing special instructional programs for educationally and/or culturally disadvantaged children. Like state aid, federal assistance to education has been dwindling over the years. Although the legislation is "on the books", Congress like the state legislature has not provided sufficient funds to fully implement the law. In the chart below, we have indicated the degree and amount of support Grantham has received under this law:

Indications at this time lead us to believe the President's veto of the Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) legislation will be sustained. This will mean that federal aid to education will be curtailed in many instances or continued at the present inadequate level in others.

The problems facing education today have nation-wide implications that affect local and state efforts in maintaining and/or improving the education of our children. Solutions to these problems can be reached only through the cooperate efforts of local, state and federal governments.

## BUDGET

The proposed budget for 1970-71 is \$53,246.21 compared to \$51,916.27 for the present school year. The proposed amount does not include funds which are included in the warrant as special articles.

The proposed budget increase is a very modest \$1,329.94 over this present year. In percentage terms, it amounts to a 2.56% increase. However, the amount to be raised by taxes has increased by \$6,773.11 or 23.8% over this present year. The reason for the large increase in the amount to be raised by taxes is mainly due to the loss of revenue in State Foundation Aid which amounts to \$3,472.77.

#### WARRANT

One special Article will be included in the Warrant for action by the voters at the Annual Meeting. This article calls for a sum of money not to exceed \$2,265. for the purpose of employing a Teacher Aide for the Grantham School. This year the Teacher Aide, who has been working with Mrs. Stephens, has been paid for with federal funds under the Education Professions Development Act, however, the program will not support the aide position for next year. We are hopeful, however, that federal funds will support an aide for one of the two rooms with the District picking up the cost of the other.

#### TUITION

At the present time there are twenty-three students from Grantham attending Lebanon High School and nineteen attending the West Lebanon and Lebanon Junior High Schools.

It is anticipated that next year there will be sixteen attending senior high and twenty-three attending junior high in Lebanon. The tuition rate in Lebanon next year will be \$705 for high school and \$620 for junior high.

## CONCLUSION

We take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the School Board, teachers, parents and friends of the Grantham School for their interest in and support of the educational program in Grantham. We sincerely hope that the interest continues and our combined actions will improve the educational program for the children of Grantham.

## **GRANTHAM SCHOOL NURSE REPORT—1969**

Due to the large number of children involved in the School Dental Health Program, and the limited amount of money, the school dentist, Dr. Chris Armen, and I plan to revise the program for next Fall to provide for more effective long range dental care for the children. We will complete all necessary work on the students who request dental care in the first through fourth grades, instead of doing partial dental work on a large number of children. If there are any funds left at this time, we will then do as much dental work as possible for the fifth and sixth graders. This plan should prove more gratifying to the students and the dentist.

The importance of immunization, especially measles vaccine, has been stressed in all news media due to the serious complications which may develop from many childhood diseases. May I urge parents to check with their family doctors routinely to make sure all immunizations are up to date. We avoid epidemics of childhood diseases in our schools in this manner. Both Newport and Lebanon hold regular Free Immunization Clinics which you are welcome to attend. The local radio stations and newspapers will keep you posted. It would be most helpful if you would notify your school nurse when your child receives any immunizations so that she may record the information on his health record.

I wish to thank the teachers, parents, and students for their fine cooperation in carrying out the health program for your school.


