TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$99.00 for the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to provide supervision, repairs and maintenance of the bathing beach, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an adequate sum of money for Workmen's Compensation and Public Liability Insurance, or take any action relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the following purposes:
 1. Replacement of or additions to the Town water system.
 2. Construction of a highway garage.
 3. Construction or reconstruction of Town highways or purchase of road equipment and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,276.13 received from the sale of the material of the Electric Department for the improvement of the new cemetery, or take any action relating thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for street lighting or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to insure the fire trucks and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for state aid construction, the State to contribute \$3,000.00 to finish the Forest road, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$642.81, the State to contribute \$2,571.25 for Town road aid, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to use Town road aid for black top road from Peterborough line to Sargent Camp entrance and continue gravel road to the Harrisville line, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for control of white pine blister in cooperation with the State Forestry Department, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to extend the water main and install a fire hydrant on the Stoddard road near Howard Dorry's and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to install a fire hydrant near Edward Mulhall's and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see what the Town will do about it's water system, or take any action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of the municipal budget law, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of one per cent on property taxes paid on or before August 15, 1949, or take any action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the Town, or take any action relating thereto.

22. To hear reports of Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and take any action relating thereto.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMITTEE

The total revenue during the year from the electric light system amounted to \$9,309.50 which included part of 1947 income not received until after the close of that fiscal year.

New customers added during the year were Sargent Camp Ski Tow, Sargent Camp Bunk House, Martin Johnson, George F. Weston, Jr., John Hill, Carl Larson, Leroy Trombly, Louis Teixeira, Francis Kelleher, William Russell, Charles Kelleher, Howard Chase and Stewart Bradley. Many old services were renewed or changed because of increased loads so that this item was much greater than anticipated.

A new line was built from a point near the Max Mason property on the Lake Nubanusit line to the summer cottage of George F. Weston, Jr., according to a vote of the town at the last annual meeting. In addition, requests for service were received from Martin Johnson and Howard Chase and also one from Sargent Camp to serve a new building built for use as a winter bunk house. Since these last lines did not involve over three poles each, they were built under authorization given the committee several years ago but it resulted in the appropriation for construction being overdrawn.

We stated in our last report that the town was faced with the problem of spending a considerable amount of money on its electric lighting system or selling it. We finished taking an inventory of the line and submitted our figures along with other information relative to conditions of the system to a consulting engineer in Concord. After studying the situation, it was his opinion that it would be for the best interest of the town to sell the system if a reasonable offer could be obtained. We asked for and received an offer from the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire for our lines which seemed reasonable to our engineer. We requested a special town meeting so that the entire proposition could be presented to the voters and it was held on Sept. 14th. After a lengthy discussion, it was voted to sell the town's interest in the line to the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire for \$27,000.00. The final sale was made on Nov. 12th and also at that time, the company took over our inventory of material and poles for which we received \$1,276.13.

We are not able to make a final report as we still have some accounts to settle with the New England Telephone and Telegraph Co., for joint poles replaced. We will also have to spend considerable time securing rights of way where the lines crossed private property as these papers have been lost and we were not able to transfer them to the Public Service Co., when the sale was made. A part of our balance on hand includes an appropriation for installing three street lights which was made at the 1947 meeting and we have asked that this work be done as soon as possible.

TO THE BOARDS OF SELECTMEN:

The successful control of brush and woods fires is highly dependent upon the cooperation of all townspeople in the prevention of these fires. To the end of enlisting this help, many wardens have asked us to assist them in preparing a brief statement which could be printed in the forthcoming Annual Town Reports. This statement appears below and your cooperation in seeing to its publication will be highly helpful.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

B. ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY

The past year has brought a noteworthy increase throughout the United States in the interest taken by parents and other laymen in the part our public schools play in the formation of the pattern of our society. One evidence of the interest in this area is the increased activity of Parent-Teacher Associations.

Each district in this supervisory union, except Sharon which has no school, now has an active working P. T. A. These organizations have evidenced high interest in pupil welfare by the exceedingly effective work they have done in supporting their major project this year—the school lunch program.

It is the recognition of the need of the combined efforts of all—teachers, school boards, parents and superintendents—working in close cooperation that has made it possible to accomplish so much. The welfare of boys and girls will be served continuously better as we gain new experiences in cooperative study and planning toward that high goal. There is much to be done but real accomplishment can be seen when there is a concentration of effort upon each specific problem. The development of our schools as the foundation of our society is the responsibility of each and every one of us as a member of that society.

C. ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION

Judging from the number of questions asked your superintendent of schools regarding the administrative organization of this supervisory union, it seems appropriate to devote a small amount of space in this report to this subject:

This union, known as the Peterborough-Jaffrey Supervisory Union No. 47, is one of the 48 of which the state is comprised and is composed of six school districts: Peterborough, Jaffrey, Dublin, Hancock, Rindge and Sharon. The following table of facts should be of interest:

The illness of Miss Nellie M. Welsh, which was mentioned in the last report, prevented her return to the schoolroom, and she retired on May 1, 1948 from the teaching profession after 50 years of faithful and efficient service.

Mrs. Thomas A. Wood completed the school year as a substitute for Miss Welsh, but would not accept reelection. To fill the vacancy Mrs. Ingeborg S. Carlson of Newington, Conn., a graduate of Teachers' College of Connecticut at New Britain in 1938 and with teaching experience in Pomfret Center, Conn., was elected.

A new position has been added this year—that of supervisor of art. Mr. Filbin is a graduate of the Massachusetts School of Art and is carrying on advanced work at Harvard and Boston University toward his master's degree. He resigned his position as supervisor of art in the Needham, Mass. Junior High School to accept the position of Art Supervisor in all the schools in this supervisory union.

At the end of the year Mrs. Margaret King, who had been substituting as Music Supervisor in Hancock, also declined to accept reelection, and Mr. Wilson was appointed. He is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and has had advanced training at other universities. He was formerly supervisor of music in Dover, N. H., and came to this supervisory union from Port Jervis, N. Y. He has charge of the music in Peterborough, Dublin and Hancock in this supervisory union, also in Marlboro and Troy.

The present enrollment in Grades 7-8 is 21, and in Grades 9-12, 41.

B. PROGRAMS AND METHODS

1. Elementary

Probably the most important change in the instructional program at the elementary school during the past year has been the introduction this year of an organized program of art. Mr. Filbin, who is now employed as supervisor of art, for the whole supervisory union, spends one forenoon per week in Hancock schools, high and elementary. Part of this time he devotes to direct instruction of pupils and part to assisting teachers the correlation of the art work with the other activities in school. All pupils in grades one through eight are participating in the program, and it is elective in the senior high school. The pupils are receiving the new opportunity with high enthusiasm. Much of the interest is due to Mr. Filbin's unusual skill in stirring each pupil to see in his everyday living experiences the vital part art plays. This improvement in the school program has given Hancock boys and girls significant help toward attainment of a stable emotional life.

The program of instruction correlating the basic subjects of reading, social studies, science, arithmetic and health adopted two years ago and further extended last year, has been continued this year up through grades one to eight. This effort has resulted in a marked improvement in this phase of the program during this period. The fine quality of this type of material can do much to stimulate the interest and increase the efficiency of the instructional program, but it cannot overcome the deficiency of larger modern instructional equipment such as phonographs, radios, moving pictures, film strip projectors, lantern slide projectors, modern maps, charts, pictures, globes, etc. Some progress is being made in the procurement of these modern aids to instruction, but sufficient funds are not available to make their progress very rapid. It is hoped that it will soon seem feasible to make much more progress with this problem.

2. HIGH SCHOOL

Because of the vital general interest of Hancock people in the local high school it seems appropriate to include in this report a brief review of recent developments in that phase of the educational offering, even though it is not a formal part of the school district organization.

Up to and including the school year 1946-47 all instructing at the high school was done by students regularly enrolled at the two state teachers' colleges, nearly all of them at Keene, who were assigned to the school for periods of eighteen weeks of practice teaching as cadet teachers under the supervision of the headmaster assisted by special supervisors from Keene Teachers' College. For some time the state had been contemplating making a change in its teacher-training plans. The first step in such a change came in the following year, when about half of the teaching was done by regularly employed teachers and the rest by cadets. At the close of that year the second and final step in the change came when the State withdrew all its part in the operation of the school. This action necessitated that the teaching staff for 1948-49 consist entirely of regularly employed teachers.

In order to coordinate all units of the local educational administration organization, the high school trustees passed the following vote on March 17, 1948:

"Voted that the Superintendent of the Peterborough-Jaffrey Supervisory Union No. 47 be requested to supervise the Hancock High School in the same manner as other schools in this Union."

After careful study by all and on recommendation of the headmaster and superintendent, the tentative five year plan for a program of studies, shown on the opposite page, was adopted.

To implement this program a staff of five members is being employed. It is believed that this program represents the best possible offering with the exceedingly limited and meager facilities available.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

During the past summer the school building was painted outside as recommended in the last annual report, and the floors received the necessary attention. In order to improve the seating conditions in the upper grade room the old seats were discontinued and thirty new posture chairs were installed. These are portable and much more comfortable than the old seats. Some painting of walls and ceilings in the upper grade room was done and new shades were installed in that room.

The major project to move the toilets from the basement to the first floor has still not yet been accomplished because of our inability to find anyone to submit a bid for the work. It is still

the hope of the school board and superintendent that this work can still be accomplished before the end of the current school year or at least before schools open in the fall. Sufficient funds are being held in reserve for this purpose.

Due to the initiative and cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association, the second floor of the building has been converted into a kitchen and dining room for the operation of a federally aided school lunch program. A gas range, an electric refrigerator, gas hot-water heater, and a two-compartment sink have been installed, the whole project being financed by donations.

In last year's printed report the school board's budget called for \$2,700 for elementary tuition and \$7,875 for high school tuition. The district meeting increased the latter amount by \$2,400 to \$10,275, making a total amount for tuitions of \$12,975. The request this year is for \$3,900 for elementary (\$3,850 for Hancock High School and \$50 for Peterborough) and \$11,125 for high school, a total of \$15,025 of which \$14,975 is for the local high school, an increase over last year's appropriation of \$2,000. The need for this increase is revealed by a survey of teachers' salaries in the state recently released by the State Board of Education which shows that few other, if any, high schools in the State are paying so low salaries as does Hancock. It is easily seen from this that if this school is to have teaching service of reasonably good quality there must be a marked increase in the budget.

PART. VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

A. SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

A few days following the Christmas vacation the newly organized school lunch program started operation at the elementary school with about 80 pupils from both schools participating. One worker is employed to take the responsibility for the preparation and serving of the food. She is assisted by volunteer workers, both adult and pupil. Each lunch served is a balanced meal providing one-third of the daily nutritional need of the child who pays 20 cents for his meal. For each meal served the district gets a federal reimbursement of 9 cents. Operational costs are met from this income of 29 cents per meal. The minimum food requirements as established by the federal government are increased considerably by donations of food from the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture from whom to date the following foods have been received:

The only cost for this ton and more of food has been the charge for transportation from Concord to Hancock.

Many have commented on the change of many of the pupils for the better due to the operation of this program. Many of them are much more alert in the afternoon and have a general appearance of better health. The inauguration of this program in Hancock will mean a great deal in the way of better health and better educational opportunities for the boys and girls of this community. It is hoped that the program may continue and be in operation from the opening day of school in the fall until the closing day of school in June.

B. REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

FREDRIKA MOORE, M. D., School Physician

OLA MYHAVER, R. N., School Nurse

The following report is the summary of the school nurse's work from Jan. 1948 to Jan. 1949. At the beginning of the year parents of new entrants were requested to fill out a disease census card. This report was transferred to the Student's Health card and placed on file in the school. Also transferred

from the Physical Growth Chart to the health card was the height, weight and average weight for height and age, and the records of vision and hearing. In the testing of vision, the Mass. Vision Test was used for the first time. This test is far superior to any other test we have used in the school. In the testing of hearing The Maico Pure-tone audiometer was used. This, too, is a great improvement over the old procedure of group testing. The school health examinations were conducted by Dr. Fredrika Moore, assisted by the school nurse. In the follow-up of defects found parents have been notified of the defects of their children by notices, interviews and home visits by the nurse. Cooperation of parents is necessary, if defects are to be corrected. The nurse visited the schools at regular intervals each month. In compliance with the laws of the State Board of Health, regulating control of Communicable diseases exclusions from school have been made for measles, whooping cough and other diseases. Class room inspection has been carried on by the teacher. Minor accidents have been cared for. The first-aid cabinets are equipped for minor injuries, only.

Dental Clinics sponsored by the local American Red Cross and Board of Education have been conducted by Dr. Lawrence at his office. No child has been sent to the clinic without the consent of the parents. Arrangements for the clinics were made by the school nurse.

Tuberculin skin tests (Patch) were administered at the Hancock High School by Mrs. Mildred Aiken R. N. assisted by the school nurse. These were followed up by Chest X-rays, when necessary, by Mr. Alden, Chest X-ray technician (sponsored by the State Tuberculosis Association, Board of Health and Board of Education.)

In May 1948 the physical examinations of September entrants and pre-school children were made by Dr. Fredrika Moore. The state board of Health and local Board of Education cooperating. This enabled the parents of children having defects to correct them before the child entered school in September. Mrs. Clare Hamilton, R. N., State Public Health Nurse was assisted by the local school nurse.

At this time the school nurse wishes to express her appreciation to the Supt. of Schools, Board of Education, principals, teachers, doctors, public health nurses, the technician and dentist and others who assisted in the school health program, and to especially thank all organizations cooperating with the department to further the health of the school children.

The school nurse attended a Public Health Nurses's meeting at Keene, N. H., a teachers' institute at Keene, N. H., the teachers' convention at Concord, N. H., and a Health and Physical Education work shop at Peterborough, N. H.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the purchase of new equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.
10. To see if the district will elect to approve the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers' Retirement System) in the Employee's Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.
11. If the district votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$21.00) twenty-one dollars for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.
