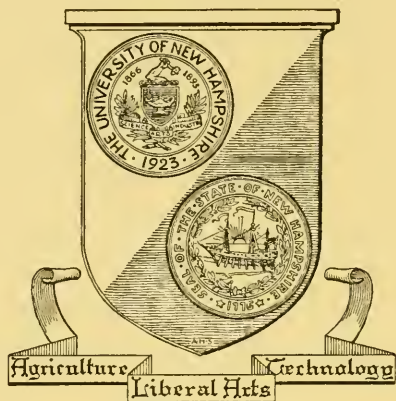

ORGANIZATION

of the City Government

Tuesday, March 23, 1937.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1937, and the members from the previous council, met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Carroll and prayer was offered by Rev. John L. Watson after which the council adjourned to the Gardens Theatre.

The Clerk read a statement of the votes cast for Mayor and Councilmen as returned by the Ward Clerks of the several wards and Mayor Carroll declared Hon. Edward J. Gallagher elected Mayor of Laconia for the ensuing year. And Robinson W. Smith, Oscar St. Jacques, Ralph C. Kimball, George C. Stafford, Richard F. Shelley and Frank D. Sleeper Councilmen for their respective Wards.

The oath of office was administered to Mayor Gallagher by Fortunat E. Normandin, Esq., and the Councilmen were sworn to the faithful performance of their duties by Frederick A. Tilton, Esq.

Ex-Mayor William F. Knight in behalf of the Directors of the Laconia National Bank presented Mayor Gallagher with a new gavel.

Invocation was then offered by the Rev. Thomas Redden, after which the Mayor delivered his inaugural address.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

of Hon. Edward J. Gallagher, March 23, 1937

Gentlemen of the Council:

In assuming this new office it would be my preference not to speak at any length. On my first day on the job I cannot be expected to possess complete knowledge of the inner workings of every department or to make recommendations except of a general nature. Yet I am aware my fellow citizens without knowing what specifically, my policy in the office would be, cast their ballots for me to such an extent that I was elected your mayor on March 9 by the largest majority ever given a mayoralty candidate in this city. Now that I actually hold the office they (or you) are entitled to hear in some detail my notion of what lies a head. You are entitled to know the financial condition of our city.

THE CITY DEBT

February 15, 1930, the serial debt was \$557,250. This amount was covered by frozen assets only and in the form of serial notes or bonds each of which has to be paid during a period of not over 20 years. An amount of approximately \$42,000 has been raised by taxation each year for this purpose. Our list of accounts receivable Feb. 15, 1930, totalled \$21,525.85 which was covered by liquid assets, supposedly, being unpaid taxes for 1927-28-29. Property sold to the city for taxes at that time stood at \$2,234.74.

February 15, 1937, our serial debt was \$475,750 or a net decrease over a period of seven years of \$81,500. Taking the fact into consideration that over \$294,000 was raised by taxation and paid on the serial debt during these years, it is evident that considerable money was spent during the period for which the city had to issue bonds or notes.

Our list of accounts receivable or unpaid taxes has increased during these years from \$21,525.85 to \$65,197.28.

Property sold to the city for taxes has increased in these years from \$2,234.74 to \$34,930.80.

Apart from the serial debt of the city is a note for \$100,000 which, though covered by assets in the form of the above-named unpaid taxes, necessarily stands as a debt of the city whether these taxes are ever paid or not.

Be that as it may, the fact remains that on February 15, 1930, the city had no outstanding notes against its unpaid taxes while on February 15, 1937, the city has notes against taxes of \$100,000.

Considering the decrease in our serial debt of \$81,500 and the addition of notes to the amount of \$100,000 it is my impression that the *Actual Debt* of the City of Laconia today is \$575,750 or an increase of \$18,500 during the past seven years.

Whether or not this amount of \$575,750 is protected or covered by liquid or frozen assets has no bearing upon the fact that it is the amount owed by the city as of February 15, 1937, and must be paid by the city whether the unpaid taxes are collected or not.

This is not a criticism of the merits of the debt of the city, but rather a statement of facts in regard to the debt itself and the tremendous increase in unpaid taxes.

Despite the growing difficulty in making tax collections and the substantial increase in the bonded debt during the past two years due to the new school building and work relief projects we are still below our five per cent. debt limit. There are bonds of \$52,000 coming due this year which will make the statement show a reduction of serial debt in 1937 provided no new bonds are issued.

TAX RATE

The most vital and perplexing problem that confronts us is taxation. With the ever-increasing demands upon our municipality the burden of taxation is appalling, if not

to the point of confiscation. When we realize that since 1930 the tax rate has increased ten dollars per thousand, or approximately 40 per cent. in seven years, and that we have the highest tax rate today that Laconia has known since it became a city 44 years ago, we grasp the full import of a grave situation.

I urge that every precaution be taken in making appropriations so we may not force a further increase in taxation on the people. Most of the revenue raised from the assessed valuation of the property in our city is from real estate.

Another increase may mean confiscation of homes that some of our people have worked most of their lives to build for themselves and their families. Our duty to protect these people, and help them as much as we can, is our greatest obligation.

Some of these smaller homes are assessed for much more than market valuation. This is unfair to the owners and adjustment should be made. Even if we desire to keep our valuation up in order to prevent increasing the tax rate, it is unfair to these home owners, who receive no revenue to value their property more than it is worth. They are paying more than their share of our city's expenses.

Speaking in terms of income tax rates, some of these home owners are paying as much as 50% income tax to our city. This is unjust and should not be.

I hope our legislature will devise some means of raising revenue from new sources in order that the burden on real estate may be lightened.

The heavy and constantly increasing county and state tax which we have to pay is alarming.

With the old age assistance law, with our duty to those in need, as well as the employment problem that we must cope with, we cannot promise any decrease in taxes, but we can at least try conscientiously to prevent a higher tax rate.

We have been fortunate that the federal government has come to our assistance in providing funds for relief and to furnish employment. Otherwise we could not have taken proper care of those in need, and those willing to work, but unable to find jobs in private industry.

None of this money granted to us by the federal government must be paid back. So far as this money from the U. S. government is concerned, it has not increased our indebtedness. On the contrary, it has been a factor in keeping our indebtedness from climbing still higher.

Let us therefore when we make appropriations realize that the citizens of Laconia pay the bills. Many of them with businesses and homes can hardly afford these payments. To conduct the affairs of the municipality we must have money raised by taxes. No appropriation should be made unless we feel it to be absolutely necessary in order properly to carry on the work of administering the business of our city to the best advantage of all the people and having in mind the protection of life, health, and property, and the happiness of our citizens.

WINNISQUAM POLLUTION

The morning after my election I attended the hearing at the state house on the bill introduced by City Solicitor Fred A. Tilton for the purification of Lake Winnisquam, under the terms of which the state would appropriate \$100,000. I have just learned this measure is likely to be reported as inexpedient and probably has no chance to pass.

I shall forthwith ask the National Water Resources Board to recommend inclusion of Laconia in its five-to-ten year program. Reporting to President Roosevelt two months ago, this board advised creation at federal expense of sewage disposal plants at Concord, Manchester and Nashua, for purifying the Merrimack river. In reply to a question I asked at the Concord hearing, Mr. Lockwood, engineer for PWA, said he believed the proposed Laconia sewage disposal plant would have been included in the re-

commendations of the National Water Resources board had the board's attention been called to it.

NEW INDUSTRIES

Efforts to attract new industries to Laconia must continue.

SCHOOLS

Laconia schools rank among the best in the state, and the cost per pupil is among the lowest. Such low per capita reflects economical management, yet I confess I would be ashamed of being mayor of a city whose schools had no other claim to fame than the lowest cost of operation, for I would think that boys and girls were not getting all they were entitled to, and that persons who were considering moving to Laconia would not be attracted here in preference to some other city with more to offer in the way of school advantages. Scholarship and athletic honors won by our pupils are good advertising.

The new building begun during Mayor Dunlap's administration and partially financed by a federal grant of 45% or \$49,950 relieves the congestion in our high school and fills a long felt want.

I would like to see "opportunity courses" added for over-age students, under a re-arrangement of work and classes, with this delicate task in the hands of competent men and women.

The teachers' salary schedule should be restored as soon as practicable.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police department is doing commendable work under Chief Hubbard. The officers are to be complimented on their precautions for the safety of children going to and from school.

I strongly favor abolishment of the police lock up so often condemned as unsanitary and inhuman, and confidently hope to see some new arrangement for a detention house this year.

I also approve the plan suggested by Atty. Gen. Thomas P. Cheney for police schools in this state.

The parking situation is serious and deserves our best thought.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Our fire department is giving the best of protection.

I recommend purchase of a new ladder truck for Lakeport and needed repairs at the Lake fire station.

The rest of the equipment should meet the needs for the coming year, I am informed by Chief Spring. The underwriters have inspected the hydrant system and apparatus, and have given Laconia the lowest insurance rate, Class A-1.

STREETS

The streets of Laconia are acknowledged to be among the best in New Hampshire. Mayor Carroll and the council deserve credit for bringing about many improvements so evident in our highway system. There appears to be a substantial balance of overlay in the highway department due to the mild winter and lack of snow, which ought to assist materially in financing this department the coming year.

SIDEWALKS

I believe the sidewalk should be completed on one side of Gilford avenue. I am told by a resident of the avenue there have been three fatal accidents on that street which perhaps would not have occurred if there had been a walk for the use of pedestrians.

AIRPORT

I recommend further improvement of the airport which we are fortunate in having located in Laconia and if possible I hope to obtain federal aid to this end. It will help to solve our county relief problem and incidentally Laconia's.

ATHLETIC FIELD

Since federal funds are available we should with little expense to the city complete the athletic field at the high school, and clear for a playground the lots near the Batchelder street school purchased by the school board a few years ago.

PARKS

National recreation experts have referred to Opechee Park as a million dollar location, one which I think should be primarily developed for our own citizens.

I advocate continued expansion of facilities at Wyatt and Leavitt Parks, Pearl Street grounds, and The Weirs. A live woman's organization such as the Wyatt Park club could accomplish wonders for parks and general conditions in any part of the city.

AQUEDOCTAN

Laconia, in my opinion, should stage its second annual Aqueductan celebration this summer, with a three day program of worthwhile new features to bring thousands of visitors into the city.

OTHER ATTRACTIONS

We should co-operate with the Sled Dog Club and Ski Club in promoting major attractions. They have secured recognition of Laconia as the winter sports center, but other communities are beginning to go after the recreation business in a big way, making the field highly competitive. To retain a position of supremacy Laconia must not only co-operate with the organizations named, but find new ways of presenting its advantages constantly.

COMMUNITY SHELTER

The city might well participate in construction of a Community Shelter for use by skiers and other winter sports enthusiasts, including snow train arrivals.

REST ROOMS

Mayor Carroll and the last council made some progress toward obtaining public rest rooms and I recommend that this service be made a reality within a short time. The location at the Boston & Maine station seems to be the most feasible of any mentioned and should be put in operation unless its cost of maintenance and upkeep is prohibitive.

OFFICE TO BE OPEN

It is my intention to have the mayor's office open during regular office hours, the same as any other office at city hall. There is no fund available to cover clerk hire, but I have employed out of my own pocket a young woman who will act as my secretary, and be at the office constantly. She speaks French which should prove of great convenience to many visitors at city hall.

BATHING BEACH

I favor acquisition of the old Independent Ice House property for a public bathing beach and recreation spot, if some way may be provided to change the location of the intake of the Laconia water supply so as not to be affected by bathing. With this a park no other city of Laconia's size could boast of such an attractive beach, large, sandy and shallow, within the city limits, directly on a state trunk line highway. We who are surrounded by the most extensive lake shore line of any Eastern city have, it must be admitted, no satisfactory public bathing beach.

LACONIA IN THE FUTURE

Improvements I have suggested do not involve heavy outlay of money, and I feel in urging their adoption it may be said of us, at the end of our term of office, that we were possessed of a vision of a bigger and better city.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

for payment of bills against the city

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge, and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 P. M., at the City Clerk's Office.

THIRD: That the said City Solicitor be and he hereby is authorized and directed to enter into a further agreement with the Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company for and on behalf of the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia and the City of Laconia which shall contain; in addition to such other provisions as may be agreed to between Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company and said City Solicitor, clauses in substantially the following form:

The Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia, New Hampshire and the City of Laconia, New Hampshire are hereinafter collectively referred to as "the City" and Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company is hereinafter referred to as "the Surety." The City agrees that it will faithfully and diligently prosecute to judgment against Martha E. Johnson an action in the name of the City as plaintiff for the recovery of \$22,096.24, whether by the (*action now pending in the New Hampshire*) Superior Court or by other appropriate action, and that the City will use due diligence in collecting the amount of any judgment recovered in any such action. In order to facilitate recovery in said action, the Surety agrees to assign to the City for the purposes of this agreement and of the said action only all rights, demands, claims, actions and causes of action which the Surety may have against said Martha E. Johnson under seven certain agreements signed by said Surety and said Martha E. Johnson known as Official Bonds Nos. 994684, 1060352, 1142605, 1254-031, 1341316, 1432905 and 1528491. Out of

any monies recovered from said Johnson or from any other person other than the Surety as a result of such action or otherwise, which may be applicable to the said claim of the City against said Johnson, the City will, after retaining the sum of \$7,096.24, pay any balance coming into its hand to the Surety and will thereupon, upon request of the Surety, assign to or upon the order of the Surety the said judgment and all of its rights against said Johnson or against any other person or persons by virtue thereof. Section 2. All traffic approaching the above named stop signed intersections shall first come to a full stop, except when otherwise directed by a police or traffic officer or by any lawful traffic regulation sign, devise or signal, and shall yield the right of way to all other vehicles.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than twenty dollars for each offense.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the City Auditor.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

Amend Chapter 5 of the Revised Ordinances of 1916 by striking out the whole of said Chapter, and inserting in place thereof the following:

CHAPTER 5.

City Auditor

Section 1. The mayor, with the approval of the council, shall annually appoint an auditor who shall be an expert accountant and bookkeeper, and who, during the term of

his office, shall in no other capacity be connected with the city government, and may or may not be a resident of the city. He may be removed at any time by the city council. Whenever a vacancy from any cause occurs, a successor shall in like manner be appointed.

Section 2. Said auditor shall every three (3) months, and oftener if directed by the finance committee, examine and audit the accounts of the several departments, officers and agents of the city, and make report of his findings to the city council. For the purposes of such examinations, he shall have access to all securities, funds, books, papers and vouchers in possession of any and all of said officers and agents, and they shall furnish all the aid and information required by him in the prosecution of such examinations. He shall ascertain, as far as he is able, if there are any assets of doubtful value, if all moneys and accounts due the city have been collected, and if any overdue or disputed liabilities remain unpaid, and report the same. He shall examine as to methods of bookkeeping in use, and shall from time to time recommend such changes as he may deem necessary to bring about uniform, clear and accurate methods. He shall, under the direction of the finance committee, make up the financial statement at the end of the year, arranging it in such manner as will clearly and precisely show all moneys received and paid out and for what purposes, with a list of all assets and liabilities, and a complete summary of the financial condition of the city.

Section 3. Said auditor shall receive such compensation for his services as may be agreed upon between him and the finance committee and approved by the city council. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia:

The past year, in so far as our school system is concerned, has been marked by a gradual return toward normal conditions. There have been no additional buildings or radical changes in method. There have been no startling increases or decreases in enrollment. After a period of several years of depression and of more or less chaotic conditions our schools have been able to resume the ordinary routine.

The fact that there has been no new construction to report does not mean that nothing has been done to improve our buildings. Extensive painting and other repairs were made at the high school, Mechanic Street School, Gilford Avenue School, and minor repairs in the other buildings. The heating system at the high school was completely inspected and valves replaced. It is a source of satisfaction to know that we were able to resume necessary repairing, which our budget has not allowed for several years, in order that our buildings might be kept in first class condition. We have had many compliments during the year about our Practical Arts Building and equipment, of which we have every reason to be proud.

We are grateful to the Mayor and City Council for the excellent cooperation we have had from them in respect to finances. At the beginning of the year we requested in addition to our regular budget, which was the same as last year, an additional sum for restoring teachers' salaries to the scale on which we had been operating before the depres-

sion, and for hiring additional teachers for opportunity classes. Our request was granted to the extent of one half of the required amount for salaries, and twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.00) was added for the special teachers. Later, in the interest of economy to keep the tax rate as low as possible the school board voluntarily agreed to try to save one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) and as much more as possible from the budget. Our teachers in Laconia have not been receiving pay commensurate with their work and ability and appreciate the efforts made this year to restore their salary schedule. It is hoped that complete restoration may be made another year.

With the extra money allocated it has been possible to have opportunity classes at Academy Street School, Batchelder Street School and the high school. I personally have felt that too much time has been devoted to superior students in the past and not enough to slow learners and retarded pupils. Opportunity classes appear to be the best answer to this challenge at present. By hiring special teachers who devote all their time to students who require more assistance it is hoped that they will progress faster and learn more practical things which will be of use to them in case they do not complete their education. At present this project has not progressed far beyond the experimental stage, but we feel that its success is assured.

A word should be said in appreciation of the long and faithful service of Miss Edith L. Swain, who retired this year. She has been greatly missed by all who have had occasion in the past to know her and to work with her.

Notice has been received of the approval of a W. P. A. project to improve the high school athletic field. It is a tremendous asset to our schools to have such an excellent field

as conveniently located. This winter a skating rink was constructed which hundreds have enjoyed.

The School Board is interested in the development of the Parent-Teachers' Association and sincerely hopes that its members may feel free to consult with us at any time and to give us the benefit of any constructive criticism they may care to make.

We are also greatly grateful to the City Council for their help in keeping both the evening school and nursery schools open, as they fill a decided need in our community as is evidenced by the use which is being made of them.

Education is becoming more and more important to the welfare of our country and our community, and the members of the School Board only too well realize the responsibility which rests upon them. To all those who help us to shoulder this responsibility we are indeed grateful.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTEN- DENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Laconia:

Last year in my twentieth annual report I enumerated some of the developments that had taken place in the schools of Laconia and tried to point out some of the advantages that the boys and girls have in our schools today.

As I have thought of these changes and of the opportunities that are presented in our schools I have often wondered why more boys and girls do not appreciate what they could realize from their school life if they would really apply themselves. We have often wondered, too, why it is that so many parents are apathetic and apparently take too little interest in the schools and the progress of their sons and daughters in school.

Public schools are for all the children of all the people and should be of vital concern to all of the residents of the community. If people would stop listening to gossip, to "I hear that", and "They say that" stories or would investigate the source of these idle stories, many of which are extremely harmful to the schools and to the boys and the girls, they would help the schools a great deal.

Teachers, principals, and the superintendent are always glad to have visitors and to answer questions and discuss things pertaining to the schools with anyone interested in the welfare of the schools. Constructive criticism, honestly given, is always welcome and can be of great help to those in charge of the education of the boys and girls.

On the other hand much harm is frequently done to a teacher or to a pupil by some story, absolutely without any foundation and without a particle of truth in it, that may have started from some idle remark that was intended as a joke. "There's so much good in the worst of us and so much bad in the best of us, that it ill behooves any of us to talk about the rest of us."

The public schools of Laconia may well be listed under four classifications:

1. The elementary school, grades I to VI, that are housed in six buildings and have a registration of approximately 900.
2. The high school, grades VII to XII, that has had a registration of 1085 to date.
3. The nursery schools at Academy Street, Gilford Avenue, and Washington Street with an enrollment of 99.
4. The evening school that has 40 sessions from October 4 to March 14 has had a registration of 214.

In addition to the above approximately 870 elementary pupils are enrolled in the parochial schools.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

At the beginning of the school year one teacher was transferred from the Harvard Street School to Washington Street in order to more nearly equalize the teaching load in the two buildings. At the opening of the second term Miss Rena Young was transferred from Academy Street to the fourth grade at Mechanic Street to take the place made vacant by Miss Twombly who resigned to be married. As the enrollment at Academy Street was smaller than usual one teacher could be spared at that building

without overcrowding any of the rooms. Last fall the fourth grade was moved from Academy Street to Batchelder Street.

Enrollments in the first grades this year are much lower than they have been for several years.

Miss Florence Fisher and Miss Bertha Varney were given leave of absence to study during the current year, the former at Boston University and the latter at Franklin School of Science and Arts.

Miss Marion Mellinger, who has been school nurse for four years, has a leave of absence for the year, and her position is filled temporarily by Mrs. Gertrude Hency Morris, a former school nurse here.

During the summer the interior of the Mechanic Street building and one room at Batchelder Street were painted and varnished. The policy of the School Board in former years of completely renovating one building each year will keep the schoolhouses in good repair. It is hoped that this plan, abandoned for several years because of lack of funds, can be carried on.

Two special rooms, similar to ungraded schools, were opened in the fall, one for grades one, two, and three at Academy Street, and one for grades four, five, and six at Batchelder Street. Results show that special work and help for the youngest children are of real benefit to some and already several transfers have been made to the regular grades.

The organization of an orchestra for children of the elementary schools and grades seven and eight by Miss Cazneau, supervisor of music, has met with a fine response.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

Registration to date, 1085, is larger by 15 than it was last year at this time. The number who have left school for one reason or another, is 15 larger than last year, consequently, the membership now is the same as it was one year ago. This year's graduating class will probably have about the same number as last year's.

Miss Edith L. Swain, a faithful and much respected teacher in the high school, retired last June after many years of conscientious service. Miss Swain will long be remembered by hundreds of graduates as an unusually efficient teacher of English and counsellor of boys and girls.

Mr. Robert Grant, also of the English department, resigned to accept a faculty position at the University of New Hampshire.

These positions were filled by Miss Muriel Kendrick and Mr. John Hayward, and, upon resignation of Mr. Stanley Harding, Mr. Walter Mitchell was elected. Miss Ruth Sladen was also added to the teaching staff as a teacher of a special junior high school group.

A real effort is being made this year to improve school spirit and morale by a wider participation by the students in arranging assembly programs and homeroom programs. Participation in activities is also encouraged. Parents are asked to urge their children to take part in at least one activity of the school and thus develop any talent they may possess. Among some of the activities offered are athletics for boys and girls, music (glee clubs, orchestra, band), debating and prize speaking, dramatics, school paper, junior and senior International Friendship Clubs, and other clubs of various kinds.

This year a skating rink on the athletic field has been provided and a hockey team has been organized. This rink is a very popular place and is much used, not only by boys and girls, but by men and women of the community.

In the high school there are 32 boys and girls working on N. Y. A. projects. The skating rink was constructed and has been maintained by a group of these boys. Other projects carried on by these youths are clerical work in different departments of the high school, construction of cupboards and other articles for the schools, care of the running track, and many other things which provision is not made in the school budget. The maximum amount any boy or girl may receive for a month is \$6.00.

During the summer vacation the auditorium and the corridors were painted and all of the desks were refinished. Half of the class rooms should be painted next summer.

Frequently this question is asked, "What kind of an education is it possible for a boy or a girl to get in Laconia High School?" Four statements will answer the question. 1. A graduate who has done satisfactory work (85%) in the required subjects may be admitted to any college granting admission by certificate. 2. A graduate who has done satisfactory work in commercial branches is prepared thoroughly for an office position. 3. A graduate doing satisfactory work in mechanic arts and the related subjects is ready for a factory position and a girl who has taken the Home Economics subjects has a good foundation for housework and homemaking. 4. A boy or a girl may by careful selection of courses get general education and a good background for life.

Occasionally criticism is directed against the school and its graduates by people who employ or interview for a position a boy or a girl who has not taken the

courses that prepare for that particular kind of job. Employers are urged to contact some one at the school familiar with the qualifications of graduates for different kinds of work.

NURSERY SCHOOLS

The enrollment at Academy Street is 28, at Gilford Avenue, 35, and at Washington Street 35. Of these children 15 are two years old, 22 are three, 36 are four, and 25 are five.

Two teachers and a cook are employed at each school. The salaries and one half the cost of the food are paid from Federal funds. The city furnishes rooms for the schools and one-half the cost of the food. Previous to January the entire cost of the food was met by Federal funds.

These schools make it possible for the children to spend six hours for five days a week in pleasant surroundings, under good supervision, with a good lunch at noon, and a rest period in the afternoon. It has been found that children who have had the advantages of a nursery school fit into the regular classes much more readily than did their older brothers and sisters.

EVENING SCHOOL

Of the 214 enrolled in the evening schools this year, 26 have taken English, 37 sewing and cooking, 71 wood-working, machine shop, and drafting and applied mathematics, 80 bookkeeping, stenography and typewriting. The ages have ranged from 16 to 59 years.

The work in English has been largely for those desiring to learn to speak, read, and write the English language. Among those in the commercial branches are many who have

graduated and wish to improve their speed, while others are learning the fundamental principles of stenography and type-writing.

Most of the men in the shop work are already employed in those lines. In this group are seventeen apprentices from Scott and Williams, Inc., who are taking drafting and trigonometry.

There is a splendid opportunity for employees, especially the young men, from other factories to benefit by attendance at evening school.

CONCLUSION

During the past year many honors have come to the schools and to individual boys and girls. While representatives from Laconia have often won first places in scholarship contests conducted by the State Department of Education at the Normal Schools, it was especially pleasing that the team in English Grammar, coached by Miss Swain, won first place last May just before Miss Swain's retirement.

A retirement system for teachers became effective in New Hampshire January 1, but does not apply to the older teachers. It is unfortunate that Laconia has not a system whereby it could remunerate its older teachers for their many years of faithful service, the greater part of which was during periods of very inadequate salaries.

The continued support and co-operation of the School Board and of many interested citizens are appreciated by all employees of the of the school system.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

On behalf of the members of the Board of Health the following report is respectfully submitted:

We have fortunately had no contagious epidemics during the year and only a normal number of contagious cases reported. Due perhaps to the interest of the public in the venereal disease campaign carried on by the National Public Health Service and to cases referred back to the local Board of Health by the State Venereal Clinics for treatment there has been some increase in the number of such treatments furnished by the local Board of Health over previous years, and I believe that this number will probably increase in the coming year.

The condition of the water supply at the Weirs remains unchanged and something will have to be done before the summer season to remedy this situation in which the State Board of Health is taking much interest.

As attested by the report of the milk inspector which follows, the milk situation in Laconia is on a par if not above the average in other cities of the state and our milk producers and distributors deserve commendation for their co-operation in meeting the standards set up for them.

There is still a considerable number of houses which are not connected with the city sewer system although this is required by the state laws and these will be rechecked for compliance with the law during the spring season.

Sewage disposal in certain sections of the city is still a serious problem as the underlying ground conditions are such as to make impossible the successful employment of septic tanks or cesspools and the building of public sewers in these localities cannot be carried on with the present method of sewage disposal into the lake. In these sections it is necessary to close these houses to occupancy during the spring and flood seasons because of the health menace present due to untreated sewage on the ground surface.

Solution of this problem must await the establishment of a new method of sewage disposal for the city.

REPORT OF THE MILK INSPECTOR

The year saw several steps forward in the production and sale of better milk and milk products in Laconia. The installation of pasterization equipment by one large dairy during the year, and the increased popularity of pasteurized milk obtainable from the two completely equipped local plants indicate a demand for this product.

Tests carried out on milk for sale here indicate a steady rise in quality and a still greater increase in the desire to produce and market a high grade dairy product.

The trend towards new dairy products and allied products such as chocolate milk, orange drinks, etc., has made it necessary to make additional tests on these products to insure their quality.

The tendency toward more volume by fewer dealers continues and it is felt that this is conducive to better quality milk products through better equipment and more efficient methods in the handling of milk.

The increasingly large number of summer tourists and residents creates a large seasonal demand for milk and allied products. This fact makes summer control of quality products doubly hard. Sources of temporary milk supply must be found and controlled farther from Laconia.

This year there was some decrease in the total number of dairies, producers, and dealers supplying the Laconia market.

TRUST FUNDS

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Once more may we call attention to the need of adequate funds (if any), being provided for lots in the city's care, in our cemeteries. Naturally where the small sums of \$50.00 and \$100.00 are willed to the city, they have to be accepted although with the present interest rates these same sums become a problem to the trustees, so we suggest to all those contemplating setting aside a fund to get in touch with the caretaker of the cemetery in which they are interested and learn of the various contingencies which have to be met, for placing a lot in "perpetual care" cannot guarantee a \$4.00 charge from \$3.00 interest.

By order of the trustees, where it was deemed necessary, 10 lots were "made over" or regraded; stones were cleaned on 9 lots; 11 sunken graves were filled; bunch grass and moss were removed from 13 lots, and extra fertilizer was used on 59 lots. Where funds permitted flowers were placed at 50 graves on Memorial Day and in two cases where the interest is abnormal, bouquets were used weekly throughout the season.

In some cases of small funds where the grass had entirely "run out" it was thought best to let the interest accumulate until sufficient funds were available for regrading. (* denotes extra care.)

The Department furnished hose for six skating rinks—Lakeport Leavitt Park, Pearl Street grounds, Wyatt Park, Opechee Park, Casino Square and the High School rink. Fifteen hundred feet of hose is needed, if we are to continue each year with these skating rinks. Hydrants should be installed near the rinks, which will save the use of so much fire hose. The hose alone will cost five hundred dollars each year. It takes five hundred feet of hose to reach Wyatt park skating rink. One hydrant should be installed at the corner of Webster and Garfield Streets.

There is a demand for more hydrants throughout the city—Garfield Street, Tilton Avenue, Webster and Adams Street should have hydrants, as this is a thickly settled residential section. The Black Brook section near Bayside cemetery with all the summer cottages have no fire protection. Gilford and Laconia should unite and run a water main, eight inches in diameter, through the White Oaks road on the boulevard.

We are in need of a piece of fire apparatus—a combination ladder truck and pumper. The Weirs section should have a fire truck and pumper to give protection to that section of this city, such a piece of apparatus would cost in the vicinity of \$4,500.00 fully equipped.

I earnestly hope these recommendations will receive your kind consideration.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, New Hampshire

February 15, 1938

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We hereby submit the thirty seventh annual report of the Board of Public Works, together with the detailed report and suggestions made to us by the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

As will appear from these reports, which show in detail all appropriations and expenditures, the routine maintenance work of the year has been carried on, and such special work as has been authorized and provided for.

State Aid Construction on the Parade Road has been completed to the Meredith Town Line, the State furnishing one half the cost thereof; the improvement consisting of widening, draining and the construction of a gravel roadway, surface treated with tar.

With the building of the road through Meredith Center Village accomplished last fall, construction of a complete connection between U. S. Route No. 3 at Laconia and Route No. 104 in Meredith was made and the State has taken over for Winter Maintenance as well as Summer Maintenance all of this line from the end of the compact section at the corner of Oak Street to the Meredith Town Line on the Meredith Center road, and the City is consequently relieved of the cost of snow removal and sanding on this thoroughfare.

On account of existing conditions, we hesitate to urge at this time the undertaking of a program of construction or special work that would involve a large expenditure and add to the burden of our tax payers.

As we consider the situation, however, it seems to us that some additions to our Public Works System should be made annually if possible. Keeping in mind that we have the equipment and organization available and that this class of work is of great assistance in reducing unemployment and relief.

There are certain streets previously laid out by the Council which should be graded and drained; a number of drains reconstructed and there is a strong demand for the construction of new sidewalks in various locations.

We would suggest consideration of our recommendations of last year relating to resurfacing Union Avenue from Bridge Street to Davis Place; Elm Street from School Street northerly, and new curbing on Pleasant Street.

A favorable opportunity to improve some of our Class V or country roads under the provisions of the Town Road Aid Law is available this year; if the City applies and appropriates \$879.08, the State will contribute \$3516.32, making a total of \$4395.40.

Funds should be provided to replace one Concord truck now worn out and to replace a Ford truck.

As in former years we would urge an adequate appropriation for routine maintenance and would recommend the following general appropriations for the ensuing year:

BRIDGES

The numerous city bridges are generally in good condition except the two small bridges on the Hilliard Road which will require replacement.

Minor repairs were made to bridges where needed.

COLLECTION OF REFUSE AND GARBAGE

The existing contract with Mr. W. G. Hamilton was continued with satisfactory results. It was found necessary to make some additions to the collection routes so that the total cost of this service was more than the previous year.

Two public dumps are provided by the city, one near the Marsh Hill road and one at the Weirs for use of the Weirs village. A great deal of care is required on these dumps to keep them in good condition and to see that they are used in a proper manner by the general public.

DRAINS

New drains were built on Clinton Street, Dartmouth Street, Holman Street and Strafford Street.

All existing drains were cleaned and repaired where necessary so that they are generally in good condition except in many cases drains built many years ago are not large enough to take the flow in heavy rains.

The Clinton Street brook, enclosed in a stone culvert under the Odd Fellows building at Lakeport caved in and made considerable trouble. It was deemed necessary to rebuild this water way from Union Avenue to Mechanic Street. This was done by enclosing the brook in a 42" reinforced concrete pipe culvert with the necessary cross drains and catch basins. This was somewhat difficult as water, sewer and gas pipes had to be altered and the street pavement cut out and replaced.

PARADE ROAD

The Meredith-Parade Road was completed to the Meredith town line at a cost of \$8,869.20. One half of this sum was furnished by the State Highway Department.

SIDEWALKS

No new sidewalk construction was undertaken. Old sidewalks were repaired and recovered. 2,853 sq. yds. of sidewalk recovering was done at a cost of \$2,139.75. Much more reconstruction is needed and more money should be allotted for this purpose.

SANITARY SEWERS

The sanitary sewer system was carefully cleaned and maintained. A small amount of repairs and a small extension on Garfield Street was executed.

WATSON ROAD AND LAKESIDE AVENUE

The work on these roads was completed and they were given a surface treatment of tar and gravel.

The total length of these roads is 8,400 feet, which must be maintained by the city alone.

GENERAL

Several new streets have been laid out by the City Council during 1936-37, viz. Orchard, Holman and Winnicoash extensions, Pine Street extension, Shepard St., Fair St., extension, Brigham St., and Sanborn Street extension.

No special appropriations were made to construct these streets but this department was able to do some grading on Pine, Sanborn and Shepard Streets by our regular men, assisted somewhat with welfare labor, so called.

Brigham Street, laid out in 1936 has not been properly graded and drained and I would recommend that funds be provided for this purpose as well as the other streets which have been laid out but not properly graded and drained.

It is recommended that funds be provided to replace our old Concord truck, completely worn out and abandoned and to exchange Ford truck.

Our snow equipment is generally in good condition. The exchange of the old G. M. C. truck, on which was mounted our oil sprinkler, for a new G. M. C. truck and a new snow plow gives us a very efficient road plow as well as an oil distributor. Conditions were such last winter that we did not find it necessary to use our tractor plows, although they are in condition to use at any time.

This department owns but two horses at the present time but as we run 15 sidewalk plows, it is necessary to have about 13 outside horses. We have been able to pick up the necessary horses for their keeping through the winter and have found this a satisfactory arrangement.

Attention is invited to recommendations made in last year's report for consideration.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

Any attempt to set forth in detail the work of the Solicitor's office during the past year would be futile. The activities of the office have been too numerous and varied to permit of any such detail. Suffice it to say that the work of the City has required almost daily attention. Many legal opinions have been rendered to the Mayor and Council, and to the heads of departments. A large number of legal documents have been drafted, among them leases, deeds, both to and from the City, and resolutions and ordinances for the consideration of the Mayor and Council. In connection with most of these matters a great deal of correspondence has been carried on; and in some instances considerable investigation.

There are at present on the docket of the Superior Court two actions to which the City of Laconia is a party:

1. Cheney vs. Laconia. An appeal from an award of damages in connection with the taking of property for the construction of the new road at the Weirs; and,

2. Draper vs. Laconia. An action to recover money for the construction of the new Weirs Fire Station.

A third action, Laconia vs. Martha E. Johnson will be entered at the March 1938 Term of Superior Court. In this matter, at my request, the Mayor and Council have employed additional Counsel in the person of F. E. Normandin, Esq. This seemed advisable in view of the nature of the case, and of the amount involved.

In short the Solicitor has attended to all matters pertaining to his office, has endeavored to assist all city officials and employees in every way; and, as in the past has been ready and willing, night and day, to devote himself to the accommodation of City business.

The recommendations made in the reports for both 1936-1937 are still live subjects, and I earnestly urge some action in accord.

The solicitor has attended nearly all of the meetings of the Mayor and Council during the year.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City
of Laconia:*

Gentlemen:

It is my privilege and duty to submit herewith my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending February 15, 1938.

There was very little change in the amount of relief furnished, compared with last year, until July, when the Federal Government denied project work to all aliens who had not taken out their first naturalization papers previous to that date, causing an increased relief load. Late in the summer, private industry began employing fewer persons, and adopted a part time schedule for those remaining, causing a relief load equalled only, during a few months of the business depression.

At the beginning of the year, there were 343 persons on regular relief, and at the close of the year, 527. Beginning September first the State assumed 20% of regular relief cost, all of which Laconia had previously paid.

There were 112 recipients of old age assistance at the beginning of the year, and 119 at the end. Previous to September 1, the Federal Government and the City shared costs of old age assistance equally; since then the State has assumed one half of Laconia's share. The city has, and still continues to pay all incidental expense of old age assistance, consisting mostly of medical care and funeral expenses. In return, the City has a preferred claim, subject to mortgages, on any property an old age recipient may have.

The Federal Government has continued to furnish surplus commodities to people entitled to them, and also pro-

ducts of the sewing project, without cost to the City, except for a small part of the materials used in making clothing.

The amount of money necessary for relief during the coming year cannot be closely estimated, because radical changes in the settlement laws are to take effect June 1, 1938. According to recent rulings of the Attorney-General, all cases now assisted by the City will become County charges on June 1. After that date settlements of new applicants will be determined in accordance with such rulings. Apparently the 1933 settlement law is not being interpreted as those sponsoring it expected it would be.

A change of settlement laws, placing more of the relief load on cities has been the hobby of theorists for a long time, carrying with it the possibility of eventually eliminating the County Commissioners as relief agents. The wisdom of such a change is still a much mooted question.

According to a recent notification from the State Director of Welfare, beginning May 1, the State will discontinue reimbursements for regular relief, causing a 20% increase in the City's relief budget after that date.

There is a feeling among those desiring and needing employment, particularly on construction work, that too little consideration has been given them by persons having such work to do, and depending in part for their business success on local patronage. It should be remembered by all that employment of local people reduces the tax burden on all property tax payers, puts more money in circulation locally, and creates a more friendly community spirit.

The financial statement of this department will be found by referring to the report of the Financial Department.

PARK COMMISSION

Laconia, N. H.
Feb. 15, 1938

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

As Secretary of the Park Commission, I submit the following report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1937.

The Park Commission feel that considerable progress has been made during the year in their program of expansion. Two tennis courts were completed at Opechee Park. Additional work at the Point and a Life-Saver stationed there made bathing and swimming facilities available to adults and a large number of tourists while the Cove was in use by the children of the playground.

Under the auspices of the National Youth Administration, considerable work was done on the bathing beach at Leavitt Park. Grading has been done extensively at all the Parks. Several large pieces of equipment were purchased and installed at each of the parks. Attendance at all parks was very large, far exceeding that of any previous summers.

LEAVITT PARK

Again Mr. Charles Peterson and Miss Sarah Tilton had charge of the activities at this playground. An average daily attendance of 245 children meant that on some days there were well on to 400 children in attendance.

The Twi-Light League Baseball which had been so popular for several years were superseded by Soft Ball.

The usual carnivals were held during the season; the annual Woman's Club carnival; the carnival of the church of Our Lady of the Lakes and the Playground carnival.

The bathing beach was cleared along the waterfront by the National Youth Administration boys. Over 600 stumps were pulled up; a wide path cleared from the Park to the waterfront; the waterfront was walled up; a bath house constructed; four or five tables with seats constructed and a fireplace built. A new raft with diving board and tower was built to replace the old which was considered unsafe for further use.

The house built on Leavitt Park several years ago was moved to higher ground with the expectation of building a cement cellar under it so that a furnace may be installed, making the house available during the winter. An appropriation by the City Council for money to build two tennis courts at Leavitt Park could not be used this Fall because the house was not moved in time to start putting in the foundations for the courts on the old site of the house, as planned, but these will be started immediately upon the frost being out of the ground.

A request for W.P.A. funds for grading and fencing Leavitt Park has been submitted.

REPORT ON OPECHEE PARK PLAYGROUND, 1937

Many needed improvements were made at the park this past year. One of the old tennis courts was resurfaced, this gives us four first-class tennis courts, and from early June until late fall these courts are used continually. All of the buildings were repainted, and a new foundation was put under the ward room. The bath house on the point was put

in first-class condition, and a life guard was on duty during part of July and all of the month of August. The soft ball league was given the use of the grounds evenings, and three diamonds were made available for them. Several hundred people watched these games, and it is hoped that this sport will remain popular as it furnishes recreation for a large number of our citizens.

The park was also made available for the Aqueductan Celebration held in August. In fact, from the middle of June until the first of October Opechee Park was in use from early morning until late at night.

Mr. John Hobson and Miss McCauley were in charge of the playground proper and their report follows.

REPORT OF PLAYGROUND ATTENDANTS

The Opechee Park Playground had an average attendance of three hundred and seventy-nine children. The morning average was one hundred and eighteen, and the afternoon average was two hundred and sixty-one; the total for the summer being eighteen thousand, one hundred and ninety-two.

Visitors from out of state spoke frequently of the fine location and excellent equipment of Opechee Park comparing it as an equal with the best playgrounds of the east.

The attendance during August was somewhat cut down by the rumor of Impetigo spreading throughout the city.

Stealing was prevalent throughout the season due mainly to lack of proper facilities for the children to lock up their clothing while in swimming.

The addition of several pieces of apparatus, namely, ocean wave, jungle gym, water slide and two small floats, and a life saving boat aided greatly in making the park a more enjoyable playground.

Various competitive sports were played namely, ten baseball games with outside teams; two track meets; a tennis tournament, and two ping pong tournaments.

The children spent a great deal of time in the water. Life saving and instruction classes were held daily. The American Life Saving standards were used and we passed forty beginners, sixteen swimmers and ten life savers. Approximately a dozen older boys and girls did preliminary work in life saving with us and successfully passed their tests at summer camps.

REPORT OF WYATT PARK PLAYGROUND FOR 1937

Some improvements were made during the past season. Such as covering over the black dirt surface which made the ground somewhat undesirable for children to play on. The tennis court was resurfaced. A skating rink was in use during the winter and a light was installed so it could be used at night. Two lights will be installed permanently next season.

Some new equipment was installed, some of the equipment was purchased by the city and some by the Wyatt Park Club.

It is recommended that the building be made larger so it can be used by the children to change their skates.

The Park Commission through the Mayor has made application for a Government Project to grade in the park as well as to install a fence around the Park and to install a drainage system, which is badly needed. At time of this report going to print it is unknown as to the standing of this project.

Wyatt Park Playground has made considerable progress in the last two and three years. Much of the credit for this progress belongs to the members of the Wyatt Park Club. The grounds are used as much after the regular hours as during them. The playground was in charge of Miss Phyllis Caswell.

REPORT OF ATTENDANTS

The average attendance at the park in the morning were forty-two and in the afternoon sixty-four. The total number of children to attend the playground during the season was four thousand three hundred and four.

This summer at Wyatt Park we had a fairly balanced program of strenuous outdoor activities and indoor handicrafts and games. Our outdoor games of volley ball, soft ball, tennis and basketball were curtailed in the early part of the summer due to the heat. These games drew a large group of older teen age boys and a tennis tournament and competing soft ball teams were very favorably received. The indoor ping pong and checker tournaments were also popular.

The girls sewing groups made hot pan holders, and the younger ones made bean bags and dolls clothes. Both the older boys and girls as well as the younger ones enjoyed making spatles prints and a limited amount of soap carving.

Outside of the routine playground activities we had a most successful Pet Show, followed by a doll carriage and tricycle parade.

The sprinkler was turned on for a short time on hot days and the children played under the spray. Our smallest attendance usually was on hot days when the swimming at other parks drew them away and the lack of shade at Wyatt Park made it imperative that they play inside of the play-house.

Our average daily attendance of 106 shows the necessity of constant supervision since the ages of the children varied widely. With such groups it was necessary to have at least four different age programs. Children from one to four or five usually contented themselves in the sand boxes or cutting out paper dolls. Children from six to twelve require a constantly varied program. They become restless if held at one thing for any length of time. To them the activity is primary and the equipment secondary. The older groups need only to be started along any line of activity and they maintain their own interest. They take favorably to team competition, while the younger ones prefer individual rivalry.

There are infinite possibilities at Wyatt Park playground and a steady development of the program will be of value to all children for their social and physical welfare.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Edward J. Gallagher, Mayor, and the City Council, Laconia, N. H.:

Gentlemen :

Having completed the audit of the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1938, I present the following Statements showing the financial condition of the City as of that date.

Exhibit I—Appropriation Account year ended February 15, 1938.

Exhibit II—Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as of February 15, 1938.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as of February 15, 1938.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows :

ASSETS

Cash \$20,042.42

This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements with the records of the City Treasurer and compared with the ledger of the City Clerk: an audit of each monthly draft is made by the City Auditor as a final check upon all bills before payment is made by the Treasurer.

Property Sold to City for Taxes \$41,965.82

During the fiscal year ending February 15, 1938, tax payers redeemed taxes to leave the above amount due the City.

Accounts Receivable Taxes \$86,827.79

The Collector's record of unpaid taxes was examined by me and compared with the records kept by the City Clerk; at the time of the resignation of Martha E. Johnson as Collector of Taxes, a complete audit of the entire accounts was made by the State Tax Commission Office, a detailed statement of which may be found in another section of the City Report.

Warrants from the Board of Assessors to the City Tax Collector covering the commitment of all taxes was examined and all abatements were examined to see that they were approved by the Board of Assessors.

Account Receivable—

Balance Due From Martha E. Johnson \$7,096.24

The report of the audit by the State Tax Commission Office showed a shortage in cash in the office of Tax Collector Martha E. Johnson of \$22,096.24; of this amount, \$15,000 has been paid to the City by the Bonding Company with the provision that the City of Laconia agrees to faith-

fully and diligently prosecute to judgment against Martha E. Johnson an action in the name of the City of Laconia, New Hampshire as plaintiff for the recovery of \$22,096.24, whether by the action now pending in the New Hampshire Superior Court or by other appropriate action, and that the City will use due diligence in collecting the amount of any judgment recovered in any such action; and in case the said action against said Martha E. Johnson results in the entry of a judgment in favor of Johnson or a final adjudication in her favor, adjudicating and deciding that said Johnson is not liable to the City on account of the apparent shortage in her accounts hereinbefore referred to, the City agrees that it will forthwith repay to the Bonding company the sum of \$15,000. herewith paid to the City by the Surety, or such part thereof as it shall be adjudged in such action does not represent a liability of said Johnson to the City. In any case, the City will pay all costs, damages and attorney's fees which may at any time accrue in connection with the said action, and will hold the Surety harmless in connection therewith.

Out of any monies recovered from said Johnson or from any other persons other than the Surety as a result of such action or otherwise, which may be applicable to the said claim of the City against said Johnson, the City, will, after retaining the sum of \$7,096.24, pay any balance coming into its hands to the Surety and will thereupon, upon request of the Surety, assign to or upon the order of the Surety the said judgment and all of its rights against said Johnson or against any other person or persons by virtue thereof.

LIABILITIES

Miscellaneous Liabilities \$1,383.37

This account remained at practically the same amount as last year.

Leavitt Fund \$683.43

This account was examined and verified.

Credit Balance \$11,843.73

The above amount represents the excess of current assets over current liabilities; this amount is greater than the excess of last year by the sum of \$8,570.17 due to the fact that a great amount of time was spent by the Mayor and Council with the heads of the different departments in an effort to obtain accurate amounts needed to carry on the various Departments during the year; this method showed unusual results for there was only \$423.74 in overdrafts during the year

The Departments of the City are to be congratulated upon their cooperation with the Mayor and City Council in making such financial statement possible.

Motor Vehicle Taxes 1938 \$1,210.73

The amount of Motor Vehicle Fees received by the City Clerk was checked and verified with the receipts of the City Treasurer; this amount is smaller than that of last year by the sum of \$1,763.36 due to the change in the date of Motor Vehicle Registration.

Notes \$75,000.00

The above amount of notes represents money borrowed in anticipation of unpaid taxes on short term notes to meet the current expenses of the City; this amount of unpaid notes shows a decrease of \$25,000 in the amount due at the end of the last fiscal year.

Unexpended Appropriations \$62,553.52

Appropriations made during the year were verified with the records of the City Council and expenditures were properly approved by Treasury Warrants; all transfers were approved by the Mayor and Council.

A full itemized account of the appropriations, receipts, transfers and unexpended appropriations may be found in Exhibit 1.

SERIAL DEBT

The Serial Debt outstanding as of February 15, 1938 is detailed in Exhibit IV of this report and shows a Net Debt of \$421,750.00 as compared to one of \$475,750.00 on February 15, 1937; this represents a decrease of \$54,000 in the Debt this year as compared to an increase of \$78,000 in the previous year.

This amount of decrease in the Serial Debt together with the decrease of \$25,000 in Notes Unpaid make a fine showing for the Mayor and Council for the year just ended.

CEMETERY TRUST FUNDS

The following statement of *Trust Funds* was verified by examining all pass books of Savings Banks and securities held by the Trustees and by checking all the expenditures with the Savings bank books. All receipts and expenditures are recorded properly on their records.
