Art. 2. To receive all reports and act thereon.

Motion made by Bernard Whiting, seconded by Stanley Dow that this Article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purpose for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see what action the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and to take any necessary action thereto.



Motion made by Everett Thurber to continue the Town Forest Committee, and that a new member be chosen from the floor. Gerald Strout nominated Gilbert Pinkney. Nomination ceased. Motion Carried.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 for the annual expense of use to the Newport Sanitary Land Fill.

Motion made by Phillip Tirrell, seconded by Rachel Tirrell, that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$821.43 for the T.R.A.; the State will contribute \$5,476.19.

Motion made by Everett Thurber, seconded by Alma Richards that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 to help maintain the Newport Hospital.

Motion made by Stanley Dow, seconded by Harold Starkey that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Fire Department's annual expenses, and \$500.00 for Trust Fund.

Motion made by Phillip Tirrell, seconded by Harold Whiting that this motion be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase Insurance for the Town and raise \$4,000.00 to cover expense thereof.

Motion made by Alma Richards, seconded by Harold Whiting that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,200.00 for the Town's share of Social Security for its employees.

There being a mistake on the Printers part this should read \$1500 instead of \$1200. Motion made by Rachel Tirrell, seconded by Gerald Strout, that the amount of \$1500 be raised. Motion Carried.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$645.00 for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.

Motion made by Stanley Dow, seconded by Susan Hamilton, that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$106.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Motion made by Laura Strout that we do not raise the \$106.00, this motion was seconded by several. Motion Carried.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to allow 3% discount of taxes, if paid on or before September 1st, based on 80% of last year's taxes and 2% discount on taxes if paid on or before October 1st using the same basis.

Motion made by Everett Thurber, seconded by Gerald Strout that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will raise \$860.00 to help maintain the Newport Ambulance Service and assure the Town of Ambulance Service.

Motion made by Elizabeth Wirkkala, seconded by Myrtie Starkey that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,270.60 for the fourth payment on the Loader and Backhoe.

Motion made by Carol Whiting, seconded by Gerald Strout that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to continue membership of the Regional Planning Commission, now organized and named the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council, and to appropriate the sum of \$296.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the Regional Planning Commission to be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.

Motion made by Phillip Tirrell, seconded by Jean Fijux that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,500.00 for interest on notes.

Motion made by Alma Richards, seconded by Mary McCullough that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to adopt Resolution A:

Whereas, certain areas of Lempster are subject to periodic flooding and mud slides from (Streams, Rivers, Lakes), causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

Whereas, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

Whereas, it is the intent of this Board of Selectmen to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and mud slide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood and mud slide hazards; and



Whereas, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to (CITE APPROPRIATE SECTION OF STATE LAW AND ANY OTHER RELEVANT AUTHORITY);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board of Selectmen hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it will enact as necessary, and maintain in force for those areas having flood or mud slide hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests Selectmen with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special floodland mud slide hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain area.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain areas in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain area management measures.

3. Appoints Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations of the lowest floor of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

Motion made by Everett Thurber, seconded by Laura Strout that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Resolution B:

Whereas, Lempster has adopted and is enforcing cite Building Code, and;

Whereas, Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations of the aforesaid prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure in the Flood Prone Area without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the Building Inspector.

Whereas the Building Inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Selectmen of Lempster: as follows:

1. That the Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage; and
2. That the Building Inspector shall review subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments to assure that (i) all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate floor damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
3. That the State Water Pollution Board shall require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding.

Motion made by Everett Thurber, seconded by Gerald Strout, that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to have Articles and their vote in Annual Reports of the town, and eliminate summary of taxable property not required in the Report.



Motion made by Mary McPhee, seconded by Hugh Yates that this article be tabled. Motion Carried.

- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen sell the Old Dodge Truck by sealed bid.

Motion made by Susan Hamilton, seconded by Phillip Tirrell, to accept the first part of this article, that is to have articles and their votes in the Annual Reports of the Town but not to eliminate summary of Taxable Property. Motion Carried.

- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Revenue Sharing Fund \$5,189.20 for the purpose of tax Mapping, and transfer to the General Administration Account.

Motion made by Bernard Whiting, seconded by Phillip Tirrell, that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$300 for the expense of The Planning Board.

Motion made by Elizabeth Wirkkala, seconded by Barbara Richards, that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to establish a conservation commission under the provisions of R.S.A. 36A, and that the Selectmen shall appoint said commission, to consist of (seven) members, within 30 days of the said annual meeting, and that said selectmen shall also designate, for the purpose of calling the first commission meeting, a temporary chairman.

Motion made by Stanley Dow, seconded by Arthur Randall, that this article be tabled. This motion was not carried. After a discussion, a new motion was in order. Motion made by Myrtie Starkey, seconded by several that this article be accepted as read. Motion Carried.

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT - 1977

During 1977 the Planning Board reviewed 8 subdivisions within the town, involving 31 parcels. After all final plats were received and abutters' hearings held, the board approved the following subdivisions: major subdivisions (three or more parcels): that of Vincent Volpe, Hilltop Acres; minor subdivisions (two parcels): that of Harold Shanklin, Earl Chadwick III, Robert and Joan Fellage and Arline Allen. The following subdivisions are as yet incomplete: major subdivisions, that of Land Bank Trust (formerly property of Allen) and that of High View Church Farm, lots 48-53 Maplewood Manor; minor subdivisions: that of Barry and Catherine Wade and that of Edward and Marion Kosotsky.

After holding public hearings, the board voted to adopt the Lempster Highway Access Ordinance and also voted to amend the subdivision regulations to include this ordinance. It requires that all new driveways within the town be reviewed by the board before construction, so that the safety of the traveling public and the condition of our roads be further protected. Copies of the ordinance are available.

The board met with Guy Wheelock, of the Soil Conservation Service in February to discuss obtaining soil survey maps for the town, which would enable the board and other agencies in town to better determine soil suitability and soil usages. The board has encouraged the selectmen to obtain these maps.

As in past years, board members attended legal seminars in Lebanon, sponsored by the N.H. Municipal Association, to keep abreast of recent changes and attitudes in municipal law. These were found to be very helpful.

Currently the board, in conjunction with the Conservation Commission, is preparing a questionnaire to evaluate attitudes and ideas in town as to the future growth of Lempster.

The selectmen have appointed Gilbert Pinkney to fill the vacancy created by John Wirkkala's resignation and Joseph Clendenin as new member. In addition, Edward McCullough, Ruth LeClair and Ralph Keeler were appointed as alternate members to serve in an advisory capacity to the board. Bernard C. Whiting was appointed Building Inspector by selectmen to replace Charles S. Dow, who moved out of town.

We would like to thank Leon Geil, Sullivan County Engineer, and Robert Ward, Regional Planner, for their valued assistance during the past year.

The Planning Board meets the first Monday of each month at the office in East Lempster at 7:30 p.m. All are encouraged and welcome to attend.

## HOME HEALTH AGENCY REPORT

Your Home Health Agency has been very busy this year, making a total of 900 more visits than 1976 and adding 6 new services or programs to our many functions. Services offered to residents of Lempster include; skilled nursing services such as dressing changes, injections ordered by a doctor; rehabilitation services such as physical therapy; preventive services such as health promotion and maternal-child health programs (including immunization, dental, and well-child clinics).

During the past year we have established a weekly Discharge Planning Program with the four hospitals serving the area and are now able to assist families with early discharges. We have also added the federal WIC (Women, Infants, Children) food supplement program, a Senior Hypertension Screening Program held monthly in Newport, Home Health Aides services, and general health guidance to all persons regardless of age who need the service.

With our increased services, we have been keeping statistics which indicate each participating town is receiving visits in relative proportion to its population size. You may note that despite the overall budget increase, we have been able to maintain the same per capita request for the fifth consecutive year, and that Town appropriations have dropped from 33% of last year's budget to approximately 20% of this year's budget request.

We now have the equivalent of 3.4 full-time staff nurses, and participate in the Dartmouth Medical School Program which provides the staff with the latest medical information.

We are pleased to note the active participation of community residents on our Board of Trustees, and the increased referrals from residents concerned for their neighbors' welfare. We appreciate this community involvement and welcome your continued support for the agency.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands, (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of  $\frac{1}{4}$  of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

## **WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL STATUS REPORT FOR 1977**

Forest insect and disease technicians of this Division examined 910 acres in your town during 1977 to determine the need for white pine blister rust control. This survey revealed no serious problems, so town appropriations are not requested for 1978, as authorized under the provisions of RSA 223.

As you may be aware, currant and gooseberry bushes, commonly called RIBES, are the alternate host of this fungus disease. Their presence is necessary to transmit the disease to white pine trees. Control measures remove RIBES plants considered to be hazardous to surrounding white pine.

The Division's blister rust program has been an ongoing activity since 1918. We continually monitor the situation in towns within the pine control area and report our findings to appropriate town officials. The existing good condition of your pine forests in relation to blister rust may be of interest to forest landowners.

## 1977 CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

There have been two seminars this year sponsored by Civil Defense which were attended by the director and deputy-director. The first one in January was on Grant-in-Aid Programs and the second one in September on Basic Civil Defense Programs.

The local Civil Defense has been able to obtain different items and equipment for different areas of the Town at a very small handling charge.

Started this year is a Radiological Defense Monitoring Course involving a home study correspondence course and practical training. Two have completed the home study portion and more people are needed to take this course before the practical training will be given. The home study courses are available through the director for anyone who is interested.

## 1977 FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

This year we have again had fifteen fires as follows: brush (5), dump (3), mutual aid (3), chimney (3), downed power line (1).

A very disturbing fact is that two of the three chimney fires became house fires before the trucks arrived. Both were saved even though at one we had three pumps fail to operate properly. Training had a very important part in this.

This year we have had eighteen different firefighters in eight different fire schools with several going to more than one for a total of forty-five training days.

Due to communication problems at the scene of the fire, we have purchased radios for each piece of equipment.

This year we had a chance to pick up some equipment for the cost of going to get it. We were able to get three trucks and two generators all of which need work done on them.

We also placed a successful bid on Sunapee's 1953 Ford which appears to be in good condition. This truck was totally paid for from monies raised by the Fire Department in various fund raising activities.

This year we have had four join and one leave the department.

The department joined the Connecticut River Valley Fire Mutual Aid Association. This Mutual Aid gives us extra equipment and manpower up and down both sides of the Connecticut River should we need it.

Much time has been spent in maintaining, up-grading, and procuring equipment. Also much time has been spent in fund raising activities allowing us to get more equipment than our normal budget would allow.

The department is always willing to try and answer any questions you might have about fire safety.

## REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

Many members of the Fire Department felt there should be an explanation outlining our reasons for our request for allocations. Two fires that the Department was called to this year forced us to re-assess our goals and purposes. In February of 1977 we encountered a fire at the McCullough's house. After several equipment failures, a stuck throttle on our pumper, a main pump breakdown, a burst water supply hose, along with many minor problems the house was narrowly saved due to a high level of training. Later in the year, at Long Pond we were called to another fire that could have easily developed into a life threatening fire that possible could not have been handled with Lempster's equipment.

The re-assessment led to an outlining of the goals and purposes of the fire Department. It was decided that our main purpose was to save lives and that our second main purpose was to save property. The department lacks the equipment to rescue people from smoke filled buildings, and it also lacks basic first aid equipment. Its firefighting equipment is antiquated and often fails to function properly and its building is in bad need of repair. It was obvious that neither the first nor the second main purpose was being efficiently met.

The Department felt that the town did want basic fire protection so we devised a plan to achieve that. The first step was the purchase of a used pumper bought with monies raised totally through the efforts of members and interested townspeople. Yet its ability to raise its own money is limited and there are many things that need to be done immediately. Therefore, the members felt that they should turn to the town for the funds necessary to raise the status of fire protection in the town to an efficient minimum fire protection level.

The members would like to point out that over twenty-one hundred hours of time were donated by its members last year in fire fighting, training, fund-raising and related time consuming needs. All those hours were given by various people at no cost, however, all that time seems wasted if the Fire Department cannot effectively fulfill its purpose of serving the needs of the town due to problems of funding. These allocations would raise the level of fire protection to where the knowledge and abilities of the members along with adequate equipment could safely and effectively serve the needs of the people of Lempster.

## LEMPSTER CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

### February 1, 1978

The Lempster Conservation Commission was established by vote of the town meeting on March 8, 1977. The Selectmen, as instructed, appointed the seven member Commission and our first meeting was held on April 26, 1977.

The Commission sponsored a Spring Birdwalk on May 28 and 26 species were spotted at various habitats around the town. At the Commission's request, Leon Geil, Sullivan County engineer, spoke at a public meeting at the Town Hall on June 27. His topic was Alternatives to Open Dump Burning and he emphasized recycling and county-wide cooperation to solve waste disposal problems. Since that meeting, the Commission has begun a study of these problems by collecting data, by discussion with the Selectmen, and by attending seminars on the subject (several members attended a Recycling program on November 29 in Concord). On October 1, the Commission began collecting bundled newspaper in the shed behind Union Hall. Limited pick-up is available for those unable to do heavy lifting. An area of the Town Dump has also been designated for setting aside scrap metal such as auto frames, old stoves, refrigerators and tin cans. We are looking into the feasibility of recycling glass and aluminum.

The Commission set up an Information Booth and a Demonstration Compost Heap at the Grange Fair on September 17. We are presently clearing a small walking trail to Duck Pond on Town Forrest land near Long Pond that will eventually be used for nature study by schoolchildren and adults of the community.

During the fall, several members of the Conservation Commission attended legal seminars sponsored by the NH Municipal Association which were held to provide community officials with basic legal guidance to help them function more effectively.

The Commission has begun work on a questionnaire in conjunction with the Planning Board to determine the interests and needs of the people of Lempster regarding the town's natural resources and future growth. We are compiling information on all open space and watershed areas in our town for the purpose of proper utilization of these areas.

The Conservation Commission meets the last Tuesday of every month at 7:30 P.M. in the Selectmen's Office, East Lempster. We welcome all interested citizens to participate in our activities and to attend these regular meetings. Several citizens - Margaret Bragg, Dick Diehl, Ted LeClair and Mildred and Rob Ralph - have actively joined in our meetings and projects as unofficial "Associate" members.

We are a new committee working for the benefit of all in our community. Share your interests and needs with us.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Co-operative School District:

### ENROLLMENT

The present number of students totals 127 in Grades 1-8. The pupil-teacher ratio in Grades 2 and 3 is 31 students. This exceeds the State Minimum Standards in addition to being a double grade set-up which makes a more difficult teaching situation.

Sixty-seven students are attending high school: 7 at Sunapee, 1 at Stratton Mountain, and 59 at Newport. One student is attending the Claremont Vocational Rehabilitation Center.

### SPECIAL SERVICES

The needs of several students are being met within the school with the addition of a Special Education position this year. Outside specialists are reinforcing the work of the Pupil Placement Team in providing an appropriate program for certain students who require other than a regular program. This action is mandated by P.L. 94-142, the federal Handicapped Children Act. The diversity of student needs will no longer permit a one-program-for-all type of operation.

## **BUDGET**

Present expenditures and a small drop in tuition students make it possible to stay within the 1977-78 budget.

The 1978-79 budget contains a request for a General Aide. This would pick up the present CETA-II, federally-financed position.

A new transportation contract has been signed with Charles Newton. He has purchased new and larger buses which should continue to provide good service for the next five years.

While a slight drop in enrollment has abated the immediate urgency for more space, the facilities for the Special Education program are minimal. Some funds are budgeted to provide for improving the present area.

## **CONCLUSION**

Mention of a number of special projects and activities are made in the Report of the Head Teacher. It is heartening to realize that the staff is truly interested in the students. It is a pleasure to indicate that the staff works well together, is reasonable in its requests and makes good use of what is provided. The interest and support of the citizens is the best indicator for a continued, cooperative relationship on the part of all the staff in dealing with your children.

## **REPORT OF HEAD TEACHER**

Nineteen Seventy-Seven has been another year in the period of growth and change of the Goshen-Lempster School. Growth, in the form of a new faculty position created to serve our special educational needs, brought to us Mrs. Cynthia Fellows of Lempster. In September, Mrs. Fellows enthusiastically accepted the challenge of developing skills within our exceptional students, and, as her program progresses, her effectiveness is exhibited by the happy faces of her students. A change occurred among our kitchen staff as Mrs. Jane Miller was replaced by Mrs. Linda Smith of Newport, maintaining an excellent hot lunch program. A welcome addition in September was Mrs. Rachel Tirrell, kitchen and teacher aide (funded through CETA). Mrs. Tirrell provides much needed help in the kitchen and much desired help in the classroom.

The Title I, ESEA program remained involved this past year in aiding our students overcome reading deficiencies. A change took place in the part-time staff as Miss Snow Wakeman, Remedial Reading, was replaced by Mr. Robert Mullen who comes to Goshen-Lempster once each week.



Also Mr. Keith Kendall, Home Visitor, was succeeded by Mrs. Susan Currier who consults with our Title I staff one afternoon a week about visitations with parents of Title I students at their homes. Mr. Robert Purmort continues as our full-time Reading Aide. He and the other staff members are engaged in a reading and self-improvement project aimed at nurturing skills in reading and language arts and increasing self-esteem, self-awareness and motivation.

Last winter and spring our school was visited by International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegates, presenting to the student assemblies a slide discussion of their recent experiences overseas. On February 1st, Barbara Roberts informed us about the United Kingdom, and, on May 31st, Katherine Foster gave her account of New Zealand. The delegates, college students, spend from six months to a year in their respective countries. The program, organized through the Sullivan County Extension Service Council, serves to enthuse the students in their social studies as they acquire knowledge about other cultures in a manner which is as close as possible to being firsthand.

Field trips are an essential deviation from the norm needed to stimulate the student educationally. Field trips made in 1977 were:

During April, the seventh grade went to Plimoth Plantation and the Marine Academy at Buzzard's Bay, Mass. with Mr. Harrison.

During May, the eighth grade went to Sturbridge Village with Mr. Bonfiglio and Mrs. Harrison.

During October, several eighth grade students went to Nantucket, in conjunction with a literary study of **Moby Dick**, with Mr. Harrison.

Also during October, the sixth, seventh and eighth grade students went to the Squam Lakes Science Center in Holderness with Mr. Bonfiglio and Mr. Harrison.

As June approached, the eighth grade class members began to finish out their Goshen-Lempster experience with a day trip to the Newport High School, choosing a curriculum for the upcoming school year and familiarizing themselves with the school layout. Then Mr. Harrison and Mr. Bonfiglio took the class for a fun trip to the Riverside Amusement Park in Agawam, Mass. Graduation took place on the evening of June 22nd at the Lempster Town Hall. The Valedictorian was Daniel Kimball of Lempster, and the Salutatorian was James Jones of Goshen. The Reverend William Geertz performed the Invocation and the Benediction; Mr. Peterson conducted the music; and Mr. Edward LeClair, School Board Chairperson, presented the diplomas. After the ceremony, the graduates and their parents gathered at the school for reception sponsored by the P.T.C. and the mothers of the seventh grade students.

Open House was held during American Education Week. Parents, students, members of the School Board, and staff members assembled at the school at 7:00 P.M., November 17, for a program of student speakers and slides of school activities. Refreshments were provided in the form of a bake



sale sponsored by the eighth grade class. After the assembly, parents wandered into the individual classrooms where they browsed through instructional materials and consulted with the teachers about their childrens' progress. Fulfillment for all was evidenced by friendly conversations and cheerful faces.

The Goshen-Lempster School receives many services aimed at maintaining the physical, emotional and social health of its students. Mrs. June Buck, School Nurse, continues periodic health examinations of students. Mr. Thomas Maynard, Counseling Center of Sullivan County, meets monthly with the staff and Mr. Alphonse Soucy, Teacher Consultant, to discuss student problems. Last spring, in preparation for the Special Education Program, psychometric evaluations of some students were made by the Specialists in Assessment of Intellectual Functioning (SAIF). The information derived from these testings were used by the Pupil Placement Team (the staff and Mr. Soucy) to devise programs for the students. The team meets periodically to discuss the progress of particular special education students and to plan programs for future students. In addition, we are receiving psycho-educational services offered by Central New Hampshire Educational Services, Inc. as qualified specialists are dispatched to our school from time to time to diagnose learning problems and to provide a means for dealing with the problems.

The standard daily curriculum is complemented by such services and endeavors as:

Mr. Peterson's chorus instruction (as an extra at the end of the day) as well as the Christmas assembly he conducted for and by the students.

Mrs. Lohman's excursions to the Towle School Media Center's "Books on Exhibit". She transported fifth through eighth grade students the entire week of November 28th so that they might browse through a collection of some of the best publications of the current year.

Educational TV (Channel 52/Keene) offers excellent programs used to enhance classroom activities.

Mr. Edward Baker's fire assembly during Fire Prevention Week. The Goshen Fire Chief presented a safety program, consisting of films and a discussion on the use of fire extinguishers.

Mrs. Ruth LeClair's devotion of time to direct two plays to be put on by the students during the February vacation.

A donation of \$50.00 by the former pupils of Mrs. Susie B. Hurd used to purchase some playground and educational equipment.

The students' collection of Campbell Soup labels to cash in on a special program. Last Spring, the labels were traded in for two basket balls, three baseball bases, and a volley ball set.

The seventh and eighth grade students are encouraged to engage in group ventures, hence imparting to them the feeling of the power and the satisfaction of cooperative effort. At the beginning of each school year they elect officers, and, throughout the year, they conduct class meetings via the use of parliamentary procedure. At the meetings, the discussion is usually concerned with financial endeavors in an effort to boost the class treasury for a fun class trip. Some of the activities involved are:

**Greenhouse** - The seventh grade starts tomato and pepper plants in February in preparation for a sale to members of the community in June.

**Dances** - The eighth grade class sponsors several dances throughout the year. They organize the function entirely on their own, designating student committees to handle decorations, music, refreshments, finances, chaperons, and clean-up.

In conclusion, I wish to record a sense of deep appreciation to each member of the community whose friendship and support in the common enterprise of the Goshen-Lempster School has meant a rewarding year for all of those associated with the school.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School in Lempster on the 18th day of March 1978 at 4 o'clock p.m. to act upon Articles 1, 2, and 3, the meeting to be recessed and opened again at 7 o'clock p.m. to act upon the remaining Articles in the Warrant. (Articles 4 through 7.)

ARTICLE 1: To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: To choose one Member of the School Board from Lempster for the ensuing five years.

ARTICLE 3: To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.
