History records, on June 15, 1895 one Henry F. Green, then Chairman of Board of Selectmen in Littleton, N.H. received the keys to the new Town Building at the dedication ceremony.

Architects Howard and Austin of Boston, Mass. designed the building; the foundation was laid by Ward and Douglas of Barre, Vermont; Contractor of the superstructure was Wm. C. Edwards of Chelmsford, Mass.; Plumbing and heating by Lynch and Richardson; Decorating and frescoing by B. F. McDonnell and painting by Jackson and Elkins.

By 1944 the tower spire had greatly deteriorated and the town fathers hired James J. Viette of Littleton to remove it.

In 1972 the Littleton Colonial Club established a restoration committee, which in turn organized the "Friends of the Opera House Restoration" membership, and funds for restoring the old Opera House supplemented the town monies.

In 1973 the Selectmen, comprising Sen. Andrew Poulson, Chairman, Louis Thompson, and Ronald Marsh resolved to have the new spire built.

Recognition of the restoration project came from far and near. May 7, 1973 the Town Building was entered on the "National Register of Historic Places" in Washington, D.C. The same year, the national publication "Old Glory," a report on the Grass Roots History Primer, printed in California by the America the Beautiful Fund, devoted a full page to the Littleton Town Building Restoration.

On April 18, 1974 Littleton was the first town in N.H. to receive the BiCentennial Flag because of the restoration of the Opera House, which covers the 3 BiCentennial themes—Heritage 1976, Festival U.S.A., and Horizons 1976.

October 28, 1974, was the day the new spire was erected, with Selectman Louis Thompson's promise fulfilled. The spire was built and erected by Mr. and Mrs. Moore of the Hi-Line Construction Co. of Bethlehem, N.H.

On the same day, the Littleton Area Historical Society presented the Town with a weathervane as an American Revolution BiCentennial Gift. The weathervane, 7 feet tall, resembles the original and features an arrow with a 48" spread and a large "L" scroll, created by Lawrence and Grace Tinkham of the Golden Eagle Shop in Hampton Falls, N.H.

On June 15, 1975 the Town Building will celebrate its 80th anniversary.

## LITTLETON WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the fourth day of March next, being the first Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1: To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

ARTICLE 2: Do you favor adoption of the Town Manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?

If the Town Manager plan is adopted, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for salary and to defray expenses of the Town Manager. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town to change the classification of a certain tract of land of Littleton Sand & Gravel Co. and Clinton H. Kelley from Commercial to Industrial; this Amendment having been approved by the Planning Board of the Town and being on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town to change the present classification of a certain parcel of land located on Route 18 in the Town from Residential to Industrial; this Amendment having been disapproved by the Planning Board of the Town and being on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 5: Shall the action whereby the Town of Littleton adopted the provisions in accordance with R.S.A. 60 for absentee ballot for the election of town officers be rescinded? (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 6: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Bicentennial Committee,

Whitefield Airport, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, Conservation Commission, White Mountain Community Services, Dutch Elm, Town Road Aid (A & B), Highway Subsidy, Hydrants, North Country Home Health Agency, and other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1975 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, namely:

That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Littleton; and that said New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to sponsor a project under Section 8 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof: (a) existing standard housing, not to exceed twenty (20) units; (b) rehabilitated housing, not to exceed twenty (20) units; (c) newly constructed housing not to exceed ten (10) units.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 55:9-a and R.S.A. 55:9-b giving the Town Clerk the same powers and duties of city clerks in registering new voters. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will authorize the Littleton Park Commission to employ a full time Recreation Director. Said Park Commission to develop a comprehensive program of recreational activities and perform other duties in accordance with R.S.A. 31:44 through 31:50. This Director would assume duties after the 1976 Town Meeting. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to designate East Street as a scenic road according to the Scenic Road Bill—R.S.A. 253:17 and 18, as of August 1971. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewer line in Railroad Street, including necessary manholes and eight (8) inch transite pipe, extending a distance of approximately three thousand two hundred and two (3,202) feet easterly from the existing sewer line at the intersection of Drew Street and Railroad Street, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Eighty Thousand

Dollars (\$80,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to construct a storm drain, approximately one thousand nine hundred forty (1,940) feet in length, beginning at Knight Avenue and running northerly along Maple Street to Oak Hill Avenue, and also running easterly and westerly along High Street, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Twenty-three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$23,500.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Twenty-three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$23,500.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to purchase three (3) trucks (two 3-ton trucks and one 1-ton truck, the Selectmen to require written bids), salt, asphalt, sand, gravel and patch for use by the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate for said purposes the sum of Seventy-three Thousand Dollars (\$73,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Seventy-three Thousand Dollars (\$73,000.00) for these purposes from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to repair cracks in walls, paint, and install a new 200 AMP entrance in the Littleton Public Library, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to make certain necessary repairs in the Town Building, and to raise and appropriate for this purpose and for the maintenance of said Town Building the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new police cruiser and walkie talkie radio and decals, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.



ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to place fill in the parking areas adjacent to the Town Building, and to raise and appropriate for this purpose the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 76:15-a of the Revised Statutes Annotated providing for the semi-annual collection of taxes in the Town.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any State and/or Federal aid and/or funds available at any time relating to disasters or emergencies within the Town, and to expend such funds for repair and relief.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with R.S.A. 36:19-a. This will provide the Town with an opportunity to review and approve or disapprove plans for non-residential development.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), for the purpose of preparing a facilities plan on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq., 6 Stat. Sec. 16 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Littleton, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq., 6 Stat. Sec. 16 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to repair the dam in the brook in the Dells in accordance with directive of the New Hampshire Water Resources Board, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to accept the decision of the New Hampshire Public Works and Highway Department re the location and construction of the proposed extension of Interstate Route 93.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the North Country Council, organized in July, 1973, under R.S.A. 36:45-53. The Council has been designated by the State Office of Comprehensive Planning to be the official planning commission for New Hampshire Planning Region One. The objectives of the Council are to provide local planning assistance to member Towns, to work on problems of area-wide concern. The Selectmen appoint two representatives to the Council. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-three Dollars (\$4,453.00) as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1975. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses; regional planning studies; technical assistance to member communities; coordination with local, State and Federal agencies; and other programs of the Council. These are used in conjunction with State and Federal funds. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to defray the cost of lighting the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE 30: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 31: To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 32: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT — 1974

In the spring of 1974, your librarian was busy with extra assignment consisting of writing a project which would involve other libraries and add to their present services. Our project was books-by-mail for the older people and tapes and recorders for the elderly and handicapped. To your librarian, it seemed important to reach out to these people to complete our services. To the judges of the projects, our plans did not reach enough people. Also, the handicapped part of the project has been tried in another area. We did not get \$50,000 as did Lancaster for a project to the north of us. We did get \$3,250 as a service center library. The library board asked special permission of Mr. Emil Allen, Jr., N.H. State Librarian to spend five hundred dollars of this amount for some new tables and chairs for the children's room. Permission was granted for the furniture.

One hundred sixteen films from the N.H. State Library were shown to 1,467 people during 1974. Among the groups that came to the library for films were: Future Teachers of America, the Junior Auxiliary of the American Legion, Brownie troops, White Mountain Reading Club and various classes from the elementary and parochial schools. Once a month the library sponsors a program for the Senior Citizens Meals-on-Wheels group at the Knights of Columbus Home.

We have been visited by high school English classes, D. E. classes, grade school classes, history classes for local history. National Library Week there were displays, films, an art and writing contest at the grade schools for which the library presented books as prizes.

Last summer Sylvia Smith of the University of Maine and Carol Ann Riley of the University of Michigan each worked 10 weeks for the library as work-study students from their respective universities. Through their efforts and plans, the children enjoyed the White Mountain Summer Reading Club which ended with a party, films, refreshments and prizes for achievement.

The old Littleton papers, listed in detail in last year's report, are now on microfilm. The total cost was \$846 of which the Distributive Education class raised money by auction and paid \$400. We wish to thank these young people for helping us give such valuable local history material to the Littleton public at a time when the papers were ready to turn to dust.

The White Mountain Garden Club gave money for ten books on gardening and subscriptions to 2 magazines for which we are most grateful. If any members read this report, I might add that the librarians and public really missed the flowers last summer.

The Littleton Garden Club made the library 2 wreaths for the doors at Christmas time. They are accepting the challenge of improving the library lawn in such a way as to discourage the paths made across the lawn by thoughtless persons.

Nineteen books have been given to the library in 1974 as memorials to Maurice Plant, Helen Mayer Revoir, Mark T. Gardner, Mrs. Rose Perry, Greta Eastman Wiley, Wilbur W. Craigie, Jr., Charles Higgins, Mr. and Mrs. Morris A. Moore, Mrs. Ruth Gamelin, Mrs. Kenneth Bixby, Mrs. George Henry Tilton, Jr., Edward R. Cole and Garvin A. Coates.

Ed not only had the respect of all working near him but let us feel that he had respect for us too. He was listening and he cared.

I wish to thank each member of the library board for time and effort on behalf of the library. I wish to thank the N.H. State Library for its many services. I wish to thank Sylvia Smith and Carol A. Riley who made our summer staff stronger. I wish to thank Nancy King, Sandra Fillion and Karen McLellan who helped after school and evenings. I wish to thank Ellen Morrow and Patricia Stillings. We all thank the people of Littleton for their support.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

### STREETS AND HIGHWAYS

During the winter months we plowed, sanded, salted and cleaned up, trying to keep the streets, sidewalks and outside roads in good traveling condition for the public. We also cut brush and trees on Stevens Road, Farr Hill and Brickyard Roads.

After our winter maintenance we started working on Fox Ridge Road hauling gravel about 2000 cu. yds. bank run from Clough Pit on Lisbon Road. Also 300 Cu. yds. of crushed gravel to grade it up, and we removed stump and replaced culverts on this road. We rebuilt Dells Road from the bridge to Mr. Simons residence and oiled the road from Lisbon Road to St. Johnsbury Road. We oiled Chiswick Ave., Ely St., Carleton Street, Bryan St., Hadley St., and West Elm St. from Fairview Ave. to Elm St. We did grade patch work with hot top on upper school part of Oak Hill Ave., Saranac, Drew and West Drew Streets.

We hauled crushed gravel onto most of our back roads trying to smooth them up and to keep the public up out of the mud. We rebuilt some 80 catch basins around town, and I expect there will be more this coming summer as salt keeps deteriorating the old bricks and blocks which they were built with.

The sweeper was out trying to keep our streets and roads clean, and the grader was out on dirt roads trying to keep them free of pot holes.

The sand that was cleaned up after oiling was put back into the winter sand pile at the Town Garage if it was free of glass and paper.

We also did some conduit work on Main St. for the new Traffic light that was installed by the Town Building.

We helped finish cleaning up the property by the Town Building and put up fencing around the cellar hole. We also did some work on Mill and Main Streets trying to make it easier for the trailer trucks to get back up onto Main Street. We lowered it back of the sidewalks so as the dolly wheels on the trailer trucks would not hit as they were coming up after making deliveries to the back of stores and to A. N. Farr Co.

We did a lot of cold patching, handwork, both on our streets and outside roads.

The manhole covers were raised on Main Street for the paving job that was done on same, this was done so there would not be

holes in the new hottop, if we had to get into the sewer lines or storm drain for flushing of same or repair work on them.

Three (3) of the town trucks worked for the paving co. hauling hot top onto our streets, Main, Meadow St., Oak Hill Ave., from School to Pleasant St., High Street from School to Pleasant, Clay from High to Main St. We had to work about ten days cleaning up after the wind and rain storm of July 4th.

We had to take over and complete the TRA project on Brook Road, this consisted of underdrain, culverts, basins, excavation, hauling in bank run gravel crushed for top and oiling of same and seeding of the banks and slopes. We also had to cut some trees and brush for this job.

This past fall we hauled in some 6000 Cu. yds. of sand for winter maintenance. This was hauled in from the town pit.

#### **DUMP**

We hauled some 4700 cu. yds. of cover from the town pit, also we cut some trees and brush at the dump for some ditch work that had to be done there.

The sweepings from the sweeper were picked up from the different dumping places that the sweeper unloads at these various places. This material was also hauled into the dump and used for cover.

#### **SIDEWALKS**

We repaired some of the curbing on High St. and repaved some of the sidewalk from Jackson to Pleasant St. Repaved part of West Main St. also replaced planking on the foot bridge that crosses the river from Riverside Drive to Saranac St. and replaced some planking on the Beacon St. bridge sidewalk.

#### **SEWERS**

We installed 186 L. F. of 8" sewer line on West Drew; also placed one manhole on West Drew Street. We had to run 7 house connections from the Main line on the Brook Road before reconstruction of that road. We dug up and relaid sewer line on Auburn St. to get the sewerage to run in the right direction. We rodded and flushed a number of the main lines. We installed about 160 L. F. of 6" line on South Street, so as to get a home into the sewer line, we installed and repaired some (30) septic systems this past season.

## LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1974 was a fine year for the Fire Service. It started with the January regular meetings and mid-month Officers meetings, when each officer was assigned to a particular part of the training program for the summer months. The job was completed and proved very successful. The highlight of the year was the burning of the former Woodsville Hospital, a two-day training program with a lot of reality provided by Mother Nature (wind). Our aerial was used at the school and proved to be very effective.

Also the annual two day Twin State Fire School was held at Bradford, Vt. All fire schools were well attended by Littleton fire fighters. These schools are held on weekends, and the firemen do not get paid for attending. My sincere thanks to the dedicated firemen.

Now, there are two major problems facing the fire service. (1) A new attack pumper to replace a 1931 American LaFrance, a 44-year old faithful piece of equipment. Replacement cost now to be in the area of \$60,000. (2) Housing or Fire Station. Over the years there have been several studies made in reference to a fire station and all have recommended relocation. For one reason or another, nothing has come of it. Now we can add over crowding. We are filled wall to wall. This does affect the maintenance and training with the equipment.

Fire equipment is not used every day but it must be in condition to respond at any time, to any emergency. The extinguishing of fires, the methods used and the equipment used, is changing and we must keep abreast of it. To do all these things we must have room.

First, we must choose a site, second we must apply a building to suit our needs on this particular site, keeping in mind that the present station can be used as a sub station to house some equipment.

True, this may not be the best time to bring this problem out, but it is getting unbearable. I think we should take a hard look at Revenue Sharing to solve these problems.

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## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

**EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Summary of Activities Jan. - Dec. 1974

**A. GENERAL SERVICES**

Received 524 new individual requests for mental health services to area individuals and families. Many of these were of a severe, emergency nature. (A 12% increase over 1973).

Held 3,296 counseling sessions with individuals, families or groups from the region served by WMCS. (A 12% increase over 1973).

Held 1,190 consultation sessions with other professional persons and volunteers (doctors, nurses, social workers, attorneys, etc.) and organizations concerning those individuals they were attempting to serve. (A 72% increase over 1973).

Held 266 education and community planning sessions with and for interested professional and lay persons in the region served by WMCS. (A 34% decrease from 1973).

**Continued to Provide:**

Pre-admission screening and after care services for patients entering and leaving the New Hampshire Hospital, Concord. Social-psychological evaluations for schools, courts, and state vocational rehabilitation services.

Participation in a bi-monthly in-service training program for those in the helping professions. The goal of this program is to provide new information, skills and coordination of services for individuals seeking help in our local communities. Expanded this program by involving local human service organizations in the planning of these training sessions.

Counseling to individuals and consultation to the Administration at the Grafton County Home and House of Correction.

Weekly psychiatric consultation to physicians and to hospital staff serving patients hospitalized in our local general hospitals.

A monthly in-service program for community and school nursing personnel. Intensive diagnostic and inpatient care in our local hospitals for those individuals experiencing emotional problems. This is made partly possible by the presence of a psychiatric nurse and a full-time psychiatrist on White Mountain Community Services' staff.

**Added and/or expanded the following programs:**

A 24-hour-a-day on-call emergency service for problems that need immediate attention. A White Mountain Community Services professional staff member is on-call at all times.

A partial hospitalization program to provide more extensive care for those individuals for whom regular one-to-one therapy is not sufficient. This program is being provided in the local communities (there are groups in Lincoln and Littleton and one

is being planned to begin in Woodsville in January of 1975). Courses in Advanced Group Work Techniques, Precision Teaching, and Marriage and the Family. (Sponsored in conjunction with UNH, offering graduate level credit.)

A monthly training and consultation conference in Woodsville involving professionals from various local human service organizations.

The purpose is to acquaint participants with a "Team Approach" for working with clients with multiple problems. (For example, physical illness, emotional problems and unemployment present in one individual or family.) Multi-problem cases are presented (without names to insure confidentiality) and participants are encouraged to contribute to the problem-solving process. In this way inter-agency cooperation is facilitated and professional learning enhanced.

## **B. SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH**

### **Continued to Provide:**

School consultation on a weekly basis to schools in Supervisory Unions #23 and #35.

Services at the Children's Development Center (formerly the Lisbon Development Center) now in its fifth year of operation. The services have been expanded to 15 children (formerly 10) and to a full-year program (formerly nine months). The Center provides a program of training and development for handicapped children unable to attend public schools.

In addition, T.E.M.P.O., Inc., a sheltered workshop for developmentally disabled persons between the ages of 15 and 25 was begun in September, 1974. This program provides job skills training through contracts obtained from local business and industry. The workshop is currently licensed to provide training to ten individuals.

A screening and referral program for handicapped persons of all ages is being developed.

### **In Addition:**

During the summer of 1974 a pilot program for developmentally handicapped children, ages 2-10, was operated in Haverhill. This program is now being considered by Governor and Council for full funding and if approved will begin regular operations early in 1975.

Participated in Supervisory Union #23 Fall Teacher Orientation Workshop.

**C. SERVICES TO THE ELDERLY**

Continued the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (fourth year) to help retired persons continue to be meaningfully involved in their community affairs through their volunteer efforts. Because of this program 65 different area organizations (such as the local schools and Grafton County Home) received the valuable services of 405 senior volunteers, who contributed a total of 39,000 volunteer hours of work during 1974.

White Mountain Community Services is approved as a comprehensive mental health center by the New Hampshire Department of Mental Health and is affiliated with the following state and national organizations: New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Clinics; Northern New Hampshire Mental Health System; New Hampshire Health and Welfare Conference.

This non-profit agency is governed by a 40-man Board of Directors of local citizens. Elections are held each year at the time of the agency's Annual Meeting (May). All meetings of the board are open to the public and citizens are encouraged to attend. All money voted or contributed to White Mountain Community Services is used to support local needs. This agency serves 22 towns totally, a resident population of 23,900.

## PARK COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The Littleton Park Commissioners wish to thank our regular staff and volunteers for their unselfish time and efforts which they have given to our Parks and Playgrounds and to our Recreation program.

During the summer and fall our new playing field at Remich Park was given quite a bit of attention. The baseball diamond was cut out and a new backstop was also installed. The field was given its first test to see whether or not it could take the abuse and punishment it was designed for. The Littleton High School girls Field Hockey squad helped with the testing by playing and painting on the new surface. The results were good, and now the field is ready for use by the public and also for use by the athletic teams in our area.

Future plans for our recreation facilities call for new tennis court construction and for a new locker room facility to be built near the Aphthorp Common. Also in our future plans we hope to have a full time recreation director. The Parks and Recreation system is growing and the need for full time direction is becoming more and more necessary.

The Littleton Park Commission would like to thank the people of Littleton for their cooperation and look forward to their continued support in the future.

## LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The annual report for 1974 shows that there was a total of 580 arrests made by the Littleton Police Department. The Department investigated a total of 207 motor vehicle accidents in which there were 23 persons injured and one pedestrian killed.

Of criminal arrests, theft is the most frequent with 74, there were 22 for Assault, 19 Fraud, 31 Drugs, 14 Default, 13 Disorderly Conduct, 8 Liquor Laws, 14 Criminal Mischief, 5 Harrassment, 8 Receiving Stolen Goods, 4 Criminal Trespass, 7 Criminal Threatening, 4 Depositing Trash, 9 Drunk, 3 Fugitives, 2 Forgery, 22 Burglary, 2 Reckless Conduct, 2 Resisting Arrest, 2 Possession of Explosives, 4 Neglect, 4 Neglected, 2 Violation of Probation, 1 Contributing to the Delinquency of Minors, 1 False Report of a Crime, 1 False Swearing, 1 Aggravated Assault, 1 False Alarm, 2 Rape, 27 Arrested for other Agencies, 11 Unmanageable Juveniles and 11 Dog Law Violators were prosecuted in the court. There was a total of 231 Criminal Arrests made of which 102 were juveniles. The increase in juvenile violators is of great concern to the Department and Chief Nocky feels that it is largely due to lack of parental control, in many cases.

There were 249 arrests for motor vehicle offenses of which Excessive Speed was again the most numerous with 84 offenses, followed by DWI at 41, Uninspected Motor Vehicles 36, Solid Line Violations 13, Defective Equipment 11, License Violations 19, Registration Violations 9, Conduct After an Accident 9, Stop Signs 8, Motor Cycle Violations 4, Right of Way 4, Reckless Operation 2, Reckless Operation (Death Resulting) 1, Following too Close 1, Misuse of Plates 1, Failure to Report an Accident 1, Excessive Noise with a Motor Vehicle 1, Transporting Drugs 2, and taking a Motor Vehicle Without Authority 2, for a total of 249 Motor Vehicle Offenses.

All the Officers of the Littleton Police Department were Certified by the Police Standards and Training Council of the State of New Hampshire. New police officers Paul Leach and Louis Babin have successfully completed the New Hampshire Recruit Police Training Academy's six week course and have been Certified. Kenneth Westover has joined the Department and will attend the Academy as soon as there is an opening. Other members of the Department will be attending courses in Prosecutors Training and advanced Officers training during the early months of 1975.

## LITTLETON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission met ten times since March 1974. Considerable improvements were made at the Dells, which continues to be managed by the Commission under an agreement made with the Park Commission (1967). The Dells is a natural and picnic area, enjoyed for its unspoiled natural surroundings by both residents and visitors. A special meeting took place on May 21 when the Selectmen joined the Commissioners for an on-site inspection of the Dells property. Since that time, the Selectmen have given substantial encouragement to the Commission in its management responsibilities. In a joint meeting with the Park Commission on August 13, the relationship between the two commissions was further clarified with respect to the Dells. Interest from a trust fund established by James Remich may be used for Dells care and maintenance.

A paper collection depot was established in August, using a Town shed on Washington Street. Regular collection days have been set up and publicized on a monthly basis for the receipt of paper for recycling.

The Commission has been represented at hearings concerning the Connecticut River Basin; Interstate 93; land use, open pit incineration as an alternative to landfill waste disposal; and a proposed local quarry. The Commission has endorsed the concept of flood plain insurance for the Town. A position paper regarding I-93 and Franconia Notch State Park was prepared for the firm of VTN.

At the request of the Littleton Garden Club, the Commission has investigated the feasibility of tree planting in Remich Park and has reported its findings to that Club.

Advice to interested residents has been offered to assist in the setting up of Scenic Roads.

The Commission intends to explore some natural area possibilities for the Town owned Kilburn Crags.

**STATEMENT OF ALL SERVICES**

The following is a statement of all services rendered to residents of the 15 towns we cover: 4,800 nursing visits, 18 Physical Therapist visits.

In the 3 months of 1974 that Homemaker Home Health Aide Service was in effect, the aides made 581 visits or approximately 1,300 hours of service. We held 6 Child Health Clinics and conducted one series of Expectant Parents Classes.

The following is a statement of services rendered to the people of Littleton.

The nursing staff made 1,020 visits to residents of Littleton. There were 5 Physical Therapist visits. There were 275 Homemaker Home Health Aide visits. This represents 1,300 visits to the residents of Littleton. Coupled with Child Health and Expectant Parents Classes, this represents approximately \$16,735.00 in services to the residents of your town in 1974. Of this amount \$5,946.00 was charged to the town Account. Last year the appropriation was \$5,500.00 so the remaining \$446.00 was paid for from other funds.

The Child Health Clinic continues to provide a needed service for residents of the area North Country Home Health Agency covers. These clinics are primarily geared to low income families especially those children not under regular medical attention. The age groups are primarily birth to 5 years although exceptions will be made in special circumstances. Immunizations and T. B. tests are available for any child who needs them.

The Expectant Parents Classes being held in Littleton, Woodsville, Lisbon and Lincoln. The series of 5 classes will be held once in each of these towns this year. They are available to anyone who wishes to attend. The people attending receive instruction in Child Birth, Diet and Nutrition, Baby Care, Exercises and many basic facts about prenatal care.

These two components plus visiting to high risk new borns are partially funded with a small grant from the Division of Public Health, Bureau of Maternal and Child Health.

The nursing, physical therapy and Homemaker Home Health Aides components are very important to the residents of the towns we serve. These services help to reduce hospital stays, assist people to return to as high a degree of independent functioning as possible. They also allow people to recuperate at home with more familiar surroundings and with family and friends. This service also saves money as it is less costly than extended hospital stays.

An example of this is a 43 year old male who had been on our caseload due to quadriplegia who has been hospitalized for a myocardial infarction. He develops a Decubitus ulcer due to poor skin condition and immobilization. He spends two months in the hospital and is discharged to an extended care facility for two weeks, for observation of cardiac status, continuing decubitus care and physical therapy. The patient is then discharged to his home with doctors orders to dress the decubitus ulcer daily and monitor cardiac status which requires skilled nursing. The physical therapist is called in to consult and plan exercise therapy for the patient and to monitor his continuing physical therapy.

A Homemaker Home Health Aide is prescribed for daily bath and skin care, to prepare meals and assist patient with eating 2 times daily, to do range of motion exercises, aiming at the goal of ambulation with braces which had been the patient's status prior to this illness.

The expectation is that it will take 3-4 months for the patient to return to his prior status of feeding, dressing, transferring to wheel chair and walking with braces.

The total cost of our service for this patient would be \$1,223.00. A comparable stay in a nursing facility would cost \$4,800.00. Taking the figures from the hospital stay and nursing facility the total cost would be \$11,400.00. Taking the cost of the hospital stay and two weeks in the nursing facility plus the amount of time under our care the total cost is \$8,243.00. This represents a savings of over \$3,000.00 on this case. As you can see, this is a substantial savings to whomever is paying the bill. The cost of all these services eventually come from the tax or public dollar at some level.

In the past year, we co-sponsored an Adult Health Screening Clinic in Lincoln-North Woodstock area. We are now considering sponsoring these clinics for all the areas we cover. This would probably mean 4 or 5 such clinics a year. We are investigating funding from different sources to help defray the cost of these clinics. There are also plans for diabetic teaching classes to help instruct people with diabetes in terms of medication, diet and exercises.

We are also looking into the possibility of adding new services by next year.

We wish to thank all of the agencies and individuals who have cooperated with us in the past year. Having served on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Home Health Agencies has pointed out to me that the agencies in the Littleton area have one of the highest spirits of cooperation of any area in the country.

## LITTLETON PLANNING BOARD

There are six members of the Board: Maurice Stearns, Chairman; John Streeter; Stephanie Eaton; James Baker; Daniel Edgar, Secretary-Treasurer; and William Hauck. Mr. Hauck joined the Board in March and brought with him a wealth of expertise in soil analysis and comprehensive land planning.

During the year the Board considered 35 subdivision requests, of which two were major subdivisions and three were proposed mobile home parks. In addition, three public hearings concerning proposed subdivisions were held.

On occasion the Board has been criticized for not fulfilling its role of planning. Due to the time element the Board has been forced to confine its attention to the immediate and pressing problems of subdivisions.

Board members have been increasingly concerned with the lack of long-range planning in our town. We decided that we must commit more time to planning. As a first step toward comprehensive planning we met with the chairmen of approximately forty organizations located in Littleton. The purpose of the meeting was to assess and inventory the tangible and intangible assets and liabilities of our town.

A group, from those in attendance, was selected to aid the Planning Board in the development of a questionnaire to be used in a door-to-door survey within the next few months. Hopefully, the results of the survey will enable the Board to determine the type and extent of growth desired in our town and provide a base from which we may begin to develop a comprehensive plan.

## WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSION REPORT

The year 1974 has not been an easy one for your Airport Commissioners. Our problems started in April of last year when we learned that we were in danger of losing our summer passenger service.

After many meetings with various state agencies and air lines, we were faced with two alternatives. One was for two-stop service from Whitefield to Boston which we would have to subsidize with a payment of \$5,000.00. This was rejected because we felt that it was not feasible, and because passenger dissatisfaction would be detrimental to our future plans. The other plan offered one-stop service at a cost of \$10,000.00. The commission made a determined effort to raise the subsidy and failed. Everyone knows the result; we went without passenger service.

The recent decision, by the Civil Aeronautics Board, which deleted Laconia, Berlin, and Whitefield from certificated service, has further complicated the issue. It now falls on the shoulders of the above communities to make their own arrangements for service. We are presently initiating steps that will, hopefully, provide us with service. The White Mountain Regional Association has joined our endeavors, and we welcome their assistance. It is hoped that we will have completed successful arrangements by March 1st.

The commission reluctantly accepted the resignation of George Graber from the position of airport manager. The resignation was effective October 1, 1974. We are presently involved in securing his replacement. There are several applicants, and to insure that we pick the right man for the job, we are screening them carefully.

In spite of everything, the airport continues to be well used and activity is on the increase. There have been two new hangars constructed, and the Federal

Aeronautics Commission for the construction of a partial instrument landing system. Installation of the new electronic equipment has been halted for the winter months, and it will be completed in the spring. The installed cost of the equipment will be about \$75,000.00 and it is being paid for, in total, by state and federal agencies.

We call your attention to an article which appears in the Whitefield Town Warrant. It asks for an appropriation of \$56,000.00, and will, if accepted, provide funds for the construction of a general maintenance and airplane storage hangar. It is our determination, that with continued prudent administration, we can construct and pay for the hangar without additional burden to the area.

The hangar will provide a future manager or fixed base operator with another tool. It will enable him to increase the traffic and the number of planes based at Whitefield. This increases his income potential and will, in turn, make the job more desirable. It must also be stated that the Regional Airport receives a share of the registration fees charged to planes that are based at Whitefield. Because of a total lack of hangar rental space, we lose this revenue and traffic.

We wish to thank the area towns for their financial and moral support. We also thank all of the individuals who have aided us, and we hope we can continue the fine working relationship that we have enjoyed in the past.

**SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION  
1974 (37th Year)**

Your Region Association during the year 1974 was active in several cooperative programs. They included the White Mts. Center for Music and the Arts, an experimental mass highway transportation system, and the White Mts. '74 summer advertising program.

With respect to the Center (formerly called the White Mountains Art and Music Festival), your Region Association has contributed substantial in-kind services. As a board member and secretary, your Association's Executive Director handles many of the day to day details for the Center. In addition, the Association provided office space for the Center during May and June and was responsible for much publicity. Furthermore, the Association's secretary was on loan to the Center, half-time, for May and June.

Your Region Association provided assistance in setting up and implementing an experimental bus system. Communities served by the 10-week summer system included Berlin, Gorham, Milan, Groveton, Lancaster, Whitefield, Littleton, Franconia, Bethlehem, Twin Mountain, Jefferson, Randolph, Conway, North Conway and Jackson. During the first half of 1975, it is hoped a federal proposal will be approved which will permit the experiment to continue and to provide service to other communities.

Your Region Association was a major participant in White Mountains '74 cooperative advertising campaign designed to bolster the economy of the recreation industry this past summer. Your Region Association appropriated \$2500 to participate in the program. In addition to investing \$2500, your Association answered all written and telephoned inquiries which were generated by the advertising. As a result your Association responded to those inquiries with some 3500 vacation planning kits. Those participating included the White Mts. Attractions Association, the White Mts. Center for Music and the Arts, the New England Regional Commission, the Governor's office and Waumbek Village.

Other activities and projects of your Region Association include: participation in a newly created N. H. Travel Council, annual solicitation for the two accommodations brochures, distribution of WMRA folders, sponsorship of a conference on proposed wilderness areas in the White Mountain National Forest, solicitation for business memberships, presentation of 4-H awards and certificates, subscriptions to National 4-H magazines for group leaders in the three northern counties, assistance at the N. H. information booth at the Springfield Exposition to promote travel in northern N. H., the writing of several letters to the N. H. Congressional delegation and others protesting the proposed closing of numerous campgrounds

and picnic areas in the White Mt. National Forest, also the writing of letters to many of the same group protesting the low priority tourism and recreation was to receive under a fuel allocation program, financial contributions to the restoration of the Bedell Covered Bridge, to the Mount Washington Observatory (in memory of Joe Dodge), and to the White Mts. Museum of Forest History. The WMRA also has helped out on some publicity for the proposed museum as well as some modest fund raising.

In addition, earlier in the year, the WMRA surveyed some thirty gasoline stations each week. The information on gasoline supplies was then relayed to the Dept. of Resources and Economic Development where it was used to aid out-of-state travelers.

Finally, your executive director wrote numerous news releases, two newsletters, some special articles for publications, and spoke on several radio programs in the region.

Answered 5,942 inquiries and wrote 101 personal letters.

Planned activities for 1975 are: (1) investigate the possibility of helping to provide regularly scheduled air service to Whitefield and Berlin; (2) publish a new quarterly magazine for the region; (3) modernize and revise the White Mountains Map; (4) publish the Where to Stay and the New Hampshire Accommodations and Dining directories; (5) participate in the joint experimental rural highway and transportation project; (6) continue the Association's work with the White Mountains Center for Music and the Arts; (7) explore further the possibility of preparing and publishing a Christmas tree dealers vendor list; (8) participate in the Springfield, Mass. Exposition; (9) continue to answer some 6,000 inquiries generated through advertising; (10) distribute WMRA folders to information booths around the region and to some State Highway Rest areas; (11) continue the Association's efforts on behalf of the White Mountains Museum of Forest History; (12) continue writing news releases about White Mountains Region Association's activities and help promote other regional events; (14) keep abreast of all important legislation that pertains to the region during the next legislative session; (15) continue to participate actively in the newly created New Hampshire Travel Council; (16) continue to publish the Bulletin of Lodging Inquiries and Real Estate Bulletin.
