## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham in the County of Strafford, in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at twelve of the clock, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

And you are hereby further notified to meet at said town hall in said New Durham at seven o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as are necessary to defray the expenses of town government for the ensuing year in accordance with the recommendations of the budget committee.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter plowing in the usual way on the following roads: Dame Road, Valley Road, Cross Road.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the moderator to appoint a three member committee to make recommendations for celebration of the 200th anniversary of the town charter and report at the next town meeting.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to give a quitclaim deed to the abutters of the old Marsh Hill Road, so called. Downing and Shaw abutters. (By request).

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the GMC truck and use the money to transfer the equipment from said truck to a new truck if one is purchased.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to request the selectmen to publish the amount of money they paid the State Tax Commission for the reassessment of all property in New Durham each year in their annual

report to the town. This article to be voted by paper vote. (By request).

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to notify the property owner in writing anytime it becomes necessary to raise or lower the assessed value of his property. This article to be voted by paper vote. (By request).

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to give each and every property owner in the town an itemized account of their assessment for the tax year of 1961 and to see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to cover the cost of same. This article to be voted by paper vote. (By request)

Article 11. To see if the voters of the Town of New Durham will vote to rescind all previous action concerning the appointing of the budget committee members at large and will henceforth vote to elect the members by ballot at the annual town meeting; electing this year two members for one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years. After this, as vacancies occur, members are to be elected for a term of three years. (By request)

Article 12. To see if the town will take any action in regards to the Town Clerk's salary. (by request)

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to charge (\$2.00) two dollars each for copies of assessment records and apply the money toward purchase of copying equipment.

Article 14. To hear reports of any committees previously appointed and due to report.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The two major concerns of the Police Department have shown a decrease during the past year. Through cooperation with the State Police and Motor Vehicle Department, the efforts of the local Department, have caused a decline in the traffic accidents which is one of the main concern. With the exception of the property thefts that were attributed to two escapees from the County Jail in August, no major loss through theft has been experienced. The attention given the summer pro-

perty both during the time it was occupied and during the winter months of being unoccupied have proven a strong deterrent to would be thieves.

It was an unfortunate experience to have a traffic fatality mar the record of the town this year. The ever-present problem of liquor and automobiles is on the increase. This is being augmented by the high incidents of minors being found with intoxicants in their possession. An all out effort by the law enforcement agencies in the area will be continued in order to suppress this problem, as total elimination is a high improbability.

The efficiency of the operation of the Department through its radio communication with Alton Police and State Police, on the statewide network, has been increased further through the addition of a newer mobile set. The older set was installed in the Alton Police Ambulance. With the small use it will get in this unit it might prove suitable for quite some time.

The Police Department anticipates that the skyrocketing traffic load already on the highway will be increased with the opening of the new construction, and with it, a higher rate of accidents. With the funds allotted and the time available when not devoted to other Police services, an effort will be made to keep highway safety hazards at a minimum.

The Police Department again expresses its appreciation for the many acts of assistance, that lessened the problems throughout the year; namely the Police Departments of Alton, Farmington, and Rochester, and the men of the State Police and Fish and Game Department who serve us locally, along with our new resident Motor Vehicle Inspector John Fuller.

We will continue our efforts on behalf of the citizens to insure safety in person, property and possessions, and hope that the excellent cooperation of the towns people will continue to be forthcoming.

### FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

#### PREVENTION IS YOUR BUSINESS

by Robert W. Smith

(District Chief)

Carelessness, HUMAN CARELESSNESS, causes 9 out of 10 forest fires. Each year 200,000 fires burn over 30 million acres in the United States. This represents 5 percent of our nation's woodlands being wasted each year. Every fire takes its toll. Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are



destroyed—all because MANY are CARELESS with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. YOU can put an end to this shameful waste! PREVENTION is YOUR business!

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First—by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second—by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for you and for them.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning—don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles—make sure they are out—use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

## CIVIL DEFENSE

Our local C. D. unit has been on the alert this past year in several areas, and a word of commendation is due the many people who have cooperated so well. Your C. D. Director can say with pleasure and pride that he has never been denied or refused any request for co-operation or aid from the townspeople of New Durham.

We point with pride to the success of the telephone fan-out warning system which involves 14 key people each in turn calling everyone else in town with a telephone, under the direction of Mrs. Helen Nixon, Deputy Director. Incidentally, this system was used also at the request of the State Public Health Dept. to advertise the coming of the Chest X-Ray, which response was declared very successful by the State authorities.

We participated in two National Civil Defense alerts to the extent of transmitting the warning and showing a C. D. movie at the school.

On the occasion of the hurricane alert last fall the New Durham Control Center was activated with the Director on duty to aid in communications. We were in two way radio contact with two different departments and listened in on a third to be ready to call for any assistance that might be needed. Through C. D. cooperation, our Forest Fire warden has a two way radio in his car & with the portable "walkie-talkie" we obtained through C. D. we were in two way contact with him as he patrolled the town roads checking for trees and wires down which we were in turn able to report to the County C. D. headquarters over our special C. D. radio network. The manager of our telephone company is also an amateur radio operator in Farmington so he tuned in on the C. D. network and received reports of telephone wires down and stood by for any emergency messages the State and local police might wish to transmit as we listened in on the police radio.

The C. D. fire truck was inspected by a Federal C. D. inspector to see if it was properly used and reported his satisfaction that all was correct.

We have obtained through government surplus supplies \$412.49 worth at a cost to us of \$15.69. Most of these were stored at the town hall for emergency use as blankets, protective clothing, tools, etc.

The forestry radio for the Forest Fire Warden's car obtained through matching C. D. funds cost the town \$169.27. This sum was obtained by gifts and the town forest fire appropriation.

Your director hopes to conduct a C. D. training program during 1961.

## PUBLIC LIBRARY

### NEW DURHAM FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

#### Report of Trustees

The library has shown a considerable increase in activity this year. The number of persons visiting the building has remained about the same as usual but the Librarians have extended the library service considerably in order to better serve the community. During the summer a collection of books was deposited at Taylor's Snack Bar at Merrymeeting Lake and another was taken by Mrs. Thomas Miles on New Durham Ridge and loaned out from her home. The reaction to this idea was favorable from all concerned. We are contemplating a continuation of this service.

In the Fall, the Librarians held a meeting with the School Board and the new teachers to see how we could better serve the school children and it was decided to take a collection to the school house and have Mrs. Overman go to the school each week to loan books instead of the previous practice of the children crossing the highway to the library. This has proven a more satisfactory arrangement.

It was voted to send Mrs. Overman to the Library Institute at the University again this year where she took a special course in Library service to children.

Rev. Overman has brought 52 books from the State Library in answer to special requests from the com-

munity for books not in our library and the State Bookmobile has deposited a total of 975 books to supplement our collection. The State Library Commission has given us a grant of new books valued at \$183.77. (This amount does not appear in the financial statement because we did not receive the money, only the books of our choosing). We have also received the gift of 25 adult fiction books from the Gilman Library in Alton, and some technical books from Mr. James Martin of New Durham.
