## TOWN WARRANT

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet in Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of agents or auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of highways, bridges and sidewalks more than the law requires for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to oil the highway leading from Gay's Corner by Joseph Cricenti's and over Burpee Hill to the State Road near Harold Messer's, and make appropriation for the same.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the construction of a sidewalk from Jane A. Tracy's new residence to Dr. Cleveland's residence.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2812.50, and the State to give \$2812.00, for State Aid Construction, and make appropriation of the same.

13. To see if the Town will build a new road from the Lakeside Road to Guy F. Williams' new residence, and make appropriation for the same.

14. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to run a pipe to the meadow land between Charles E. Shepard's ice house and Frank Mastin's house and make appropriation for the same.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Hydrant service.

16. To see whether beer or other alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99 Section 22 of the Public Statutes.

17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Municipal Court.

18. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding Zoning in New London.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Roller House, so-called (with its contents), situated west of Wilbur Knowlton's on the state highway.



20. To see if the Town will vote to put the highway on South Pleasant Street and Old Main Street, beginning at the foot of School House Hill and extending to the residence of George Graves, in condition, and oil and make appropriation for the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF ZONING COMMISSION

It is the unanimous opinion of the members of this commission that New London will greatly profit by a simplified form of zoning and it is their sincere hope that, in due time, it will be adopted.

The Zoning Ordinances of nine cities and towns have been investigated and studied and it was felt that that of Hanover, New Hampshire was best suited to the needs of New London. This one has been rewritten and considerably simplified with the removal of all unnecessary red tape, so that it might more properly fit the needs of New London.

There have been three informal public meetings held upon the subject of Zoning For New London, as well as the two formal Public Hearings, required by law. While these meetings contributed their share towards further refinements in the proposed Zoning Ordinance, still your commission feels that there should be more refinement of the proposed ordinance, as it exists today.

Therefore, The Zoning Commission recommends that no vote be taken at this year's Town Meeting upon proposed Zoning Ordinance for New London, and that the duties of the present Commission be extended for further study.

## TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

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### Librarian's Report

For the Year ending October 1, 1933

The record of the seventh year of the library and associated activities is as varied as that of any preceding year.

The usual organizations have met regularly throughout the year. The hall and club room have been in use for other occasional meetings or recitals. Pleasure in the garden has been expressed by many people. The lilies in the pool have been in continuous bloom this season. The Woman's Club held a garden party late in June, introducing Mrs. Josephine Holmes, who was organizing the New London Players. The Garden Club entertained the Franklin Garden Club during a round of visits to New London gardens in July. An article called "Garden Jauntings", in the August number of *House Beautiful* described the library garden as one visitor saw it.

A number of evening entertainments were held in the assembly hall during the fall and winter months. On Anniversary Night Mrs. Tracy entertained an audience with her beautiful colored pictures of New London and vicinity. During Good Book Week the librarian showed Memo pictures made on her trip to Alaska. In February the Scytheville Technical Society sponsored ski movies, also presenting John W. McCrillis as a speaker. A helpful, illustrated talk on "Insect Pests" was given by Guy F. Williams in April.

The three major exhibitions were of interest and well attended, and were as follows: Costumes from Burma, collected and loaned by the Buker twins; a collection of textiles from many parts of the world, loaned by Mr. and Mrs. Francisco J. Manrique; and the exhibition of photographic studies by George F. Slade, whose work has received numerous foreign awards. Classes from the art department at Colby Junior College visited the different exhibits on several occasions.

On a Saturday afternoon in October Mrs. Tracy showed her colored pictures to nearly one hundred children and their friends, after which the children were treated to ice cream and candy. During Good Book Week a book parade was arranged in the post office window, and classes from the Colby Hill School were invited to hear a special radio program. Classes in the use of the library were held this year. Pupils were assigned questions that took them to the different reference books and to the card catalog. Teachers have also brought groups to the library for study purposes. The Walter Damrosch music appreciation course given regularly over the radio was attended by four classes accompanied by their teachers, Miss Hirsch and Miss Lord. One afternoon the children from Grades I and II gave a puppet show at the library. Whenever the weather is suitable for outdoor games one of the Saturday afternoon hours for the children is spent in games played in the library garden.

As in former years the choral and orchestra instruction was in charge of Mr. Plumpton. The joint concert which closed the musical season in June was interestingly arranged to show the work of first, second and third year pupils in the young people's orchestra. Considerable credit is due Mr. Plumpton and his orchestra for the results obtained from one class a week.

According to the custom of years the building was decorated for the holiday season, a community Christmas program was presented and followed by carol singing about town, conveyance for the singers being provided by Charles E. Shepard & Son. The new year was observed by open house, trustees and librarians welcoming all visitors.

The loans and gifts made to Tracy Memorial show the interest that friends have in its growth and welfare. The loan of numerous historical curios has made possible interesting desk exhibits during the year. An outstanding annual loan for the winter months is the collection of nearly 200 volumes from the library of Mr. and Mrs. Francisco J. Manrique. The painting of Mt. Sunapee, hanging in the club room, is loaned by the artist, George O. Draper. Lack of space prevents the listing of each individual gift, but the library has been fortunate in receiving several unusual gifts during the past year. Two framed paintings, done by artists connected with the Tracy family, have been presented and hung in the reading room and in the club

room. Mrs. Victor M. Cutter made a generous gift of books to the children's room, also several volumes for adult readers. Considerable Shepard genealogical material has been received from Ernest A. Sawyer of West Somerville, Mass. Herbert D. Swift has placed a nicely bound copy of the New London News in the library. Mrs. Jan Leach presented the collection of post card views of the Basque country secured for her talk before the Woman's Club. Two valuable additions to the growing picture file were the gifts of Mrs. F. P. Denny, two volumes of mounted photographs and prints from many parts of the world, two folios of unmounted photographs, and ten excellent books on art subjects; and Mrs. F. J. Manrique's gift of four folios of remarkable photographs of foreign architecture, paintings and sculpture, numbering several hundred pictures.

Mrs. Tracy, in her usual generous manner, has presented the books "Immigrant gifts to American Life", "Emergency Work Relief", and the beautifully bound and much admired autographed edition of the works of the late John Galsworthy, in six volumes.

The International Mind Alcove collection of books on the life and customs of different countries is increasingly popular and now contains about seventy-five volumes, all gifts from the Division of Intercourse and Education of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. The maximum number of titles to be received is one hundred. Four new books are added every three months.

The library was responsible for the local book drive for the C. C. C. camps. Sixty-five books were collected and sent from New London.

The closing of the library for July and August was an emergency measure that brought expressions of regret on every hand and the re-opening of the library on September 1st was the opportunity for the resuming of library privileges, enjoyed by an increasing number of borrowers. Various repairs and some re-decoration took place while the building was closed. The garden was open to visitors, as usual, throughout the summer. Renters of deposit boxes had access to their boxes upon application to Mr. Robbins.

The regular library staff has continued to serve the community. Mrs. Allie J. Sargent has exchanged books weekly for the readers of Elkins. Miss Eunice Stanley was part-time assistant during the winter months. The librarian

attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at Peterborough in August, and visited the MacDowell Colony. At the time of the burial of Mrs. Myra B. Lord, who served the New London library in its earlier days, the library was closed for an hour as a mark of respect. Trustees and the librarian attended the service.

The greater use of the library is apparent when one considers the statistics for the same months of the years 1932 and 1933. Such consideration shows that with 733 fewer visitors nearly 1,000 more books were circulated. These figures prove a real increase in the use of the library by townspeople and school children, summer people and Colby Junior College. Visitors for the ten months that the library was open numbered 19,789. The circulation of books and magazines for the same period totaled 15,817.

Books added to the library were 615. Of this number 428 were purchased, and 187 titles were gifts.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, New London, N. H.:

The most noteworthy accomplishment during this year is the solving of the problem of more room for the high school. We have added two rooms to the third floor of the school as the two small rooms which we used last year were used as a temporary measure, and were not large enough for the classes. The present quarters are very satisfactory, indeed, and should care for the school for a long time to come. The laboratory is equipped with the most modern type of tables, which were made locally.

The expense of this undertaking was considerable, but I think with reasonable care we will be able to pay it out of regular budget, and also maintain our regular expenses. This is partly due to some balance which we carried over from previous years, and partly to the fact that this year is at the very bottom of the depression, with consequently lower prices. I speak of this, because I do not want to give the impression that we can reduce the budget by the amount of this cost, now that the job is done.

We had one change in our faculty this year. Miss Grace Gould has replaced Miss Marjorie Cleveland, who left to teach in her home town.

As this is being written, we are in process of improving the condition of our plant by means of money granted through the CWA. Elkins School in particular has needed painting and some general repairs, but due to the need of making room for the high school it had been necessary previously to let this go. We have tried to correct the unsatisfactory conditions due to the toilet at this school, but have been only partly successful. It is probable that something more will need to be done.

As I said last year, it takes time to build a new organization, whether a business or a high school. I feel that we are gradually developing a school of which you will be proud. We are also working on the improvement of our elementary grades.

Personally I have enjoyed my contacts with your Board this year. No one who has not served on a board has any idea of the time and effort which membership costs. You have given both cheerfully.
