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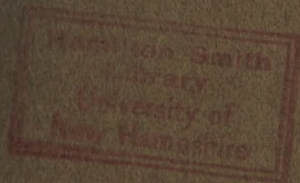

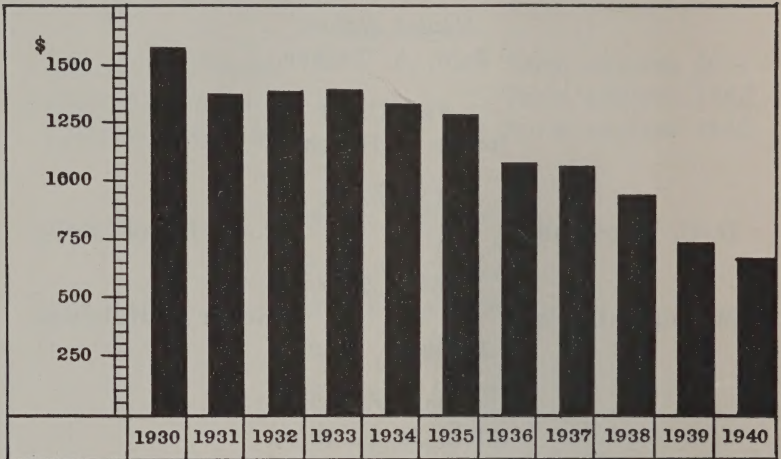

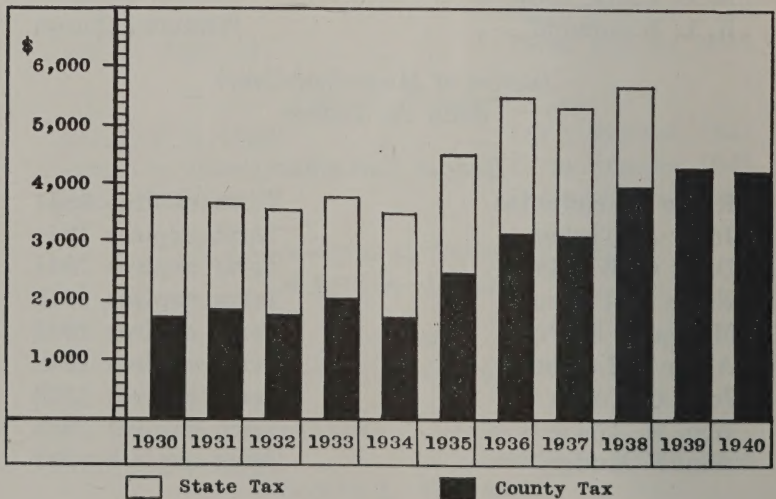

 1930-1940

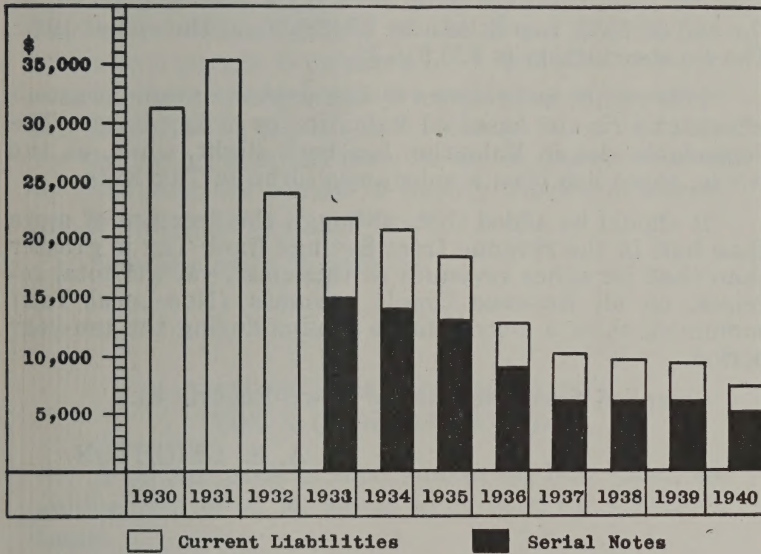

It will be observed from the foregoing charts that, in spite of declining revenue from Non-Local Tax Sources and substantial increases in expenditures for Non-Local Purposes, the Total Town Liabilities outstanding have been reduced from the high point of a little over \$35,000.00, at the end of 1931, to a little over \$7,000.00, at the end of 1940. The total reduction is \$23,910.13.

This result, as is shown by the preceding table, was not effected by rise in Assessed Valuation or in Tax Rate. The dependable rise in Valuation has been slight, while, on the whole, there has been a substantial drop in Tax Rate.

It should be added that, although the decrease of more than half in the revenue from Savings Bank Tax is greater than that for other revenues of this class, yet the total receipts, on all Revenue Credit accounts (Non-Local Tax) combined, show a very definite decline during the ten-year period.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE

According to the Forest Laws of the State of New Hampshire, Section 35:

“Any person, by himself or agent causing or kindling a fire without permit of the forest fire warden, when such permit is required . . . and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fires shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil action for the payment to the town of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.”

This law must be enforced.

**A GIFT OF A. M. MORSE TO THE
TOWN OF NORTHWOOD**

A certain piece of land located on Bow Lake, adjoining land of A. M. Morse to be used for a bathing beach.

The Town of Northwood agrees to place and keep a four-foot fence of woven wire with a barbed wire top on the 92-foot line adjoining my property in good repair at the town's expense and further agrees that nothing will be sold or charged for on this land deeded to the Town of Northwood by me for the use and pleasure of the townspeople.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same.
3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II Road known as Mountain Avenue and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,137.00, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$442.31.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$920.00 for street lighting.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for care of cemeteries as provided in Chapter 55, Section 4, Laws of 1925.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of that required by law for the Northwood Public Library.

11. To see if the Town will vote a discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before July 15, 1940.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.

13. To see if the Town will increase the Budget Committee from nine members to twelve, and elect or appoint one man for one year, one for two years, and one for three years.

14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to use the sum of \$700.00 of Cash Surplus, on hand as of January 31, 1941, for the purpose of prepaying Serial Note No. AA11, and will raise and appropriate the further sum of \$300.00 for the same purpose, in order to complete the prepayment of said Serial Note No. AA11 during the current fiscal year ending January 31, 1942, in accordance with the recommendation of the Budget Committee.

15. To see if the Town is willing to sell the iron road roller to the State Highway Department.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to improve the lot given to the Town by A. M. Morse for a bathing beach.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to start a tax map of the Town.

18. To see if the Town will renew the lease of the school lot as a whole or lease for 99 years cottage lots on Lucas Pond on said school lot to individuals to erect cottages and raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to survey the lots.

19. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

To the Citizens of Northwood:

Our forest lands represent a substantial proportion of the town's valuation. They provide income to our citizens, from the sale of forest products and through employment to woods workers. The protection of our forest lands is essential to the continued welfare of the town. Fire is the forests' worst enemy. It not only destroys the growing crop but leaves the land in such condition that nothing of value will grow for a long period of years. In addition it costs good tax money to extinguish forest fires.

An analysis of forest fire records indicates that 97 per cent are man-caused and consequently avoidable.

Carelessness and failure to comply with reasonable regulations governing the building of fires in and near woodlands has been costly to both towns and individuals. Through elimination of the human equation, forest fire losses would be reduced to a minimum. This is possible if every citizen would be careful, familiarize himself with burning regulations, comply with them and then use proper discretion.

We have been particularly fortunate in this town since the hurricane in not having had more serious fires. This is due in part to the strictness of our wardens in issuing permits and splendid cooperation on the part of the public. Great care is needed because conditions in our blown-down areas are more critical with down material drying out and becoming more highly inflammable. *The continued cooperation of every one is necessary.*

We should all remember that:

1. *Written permission of the local forest fire warden to burn brush, rubbish or other debris in or near woodlands or where fire may be communicated to woodlands is necessary when the ground is not covered with snow.* Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable—

- a. To a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
- b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
- c. For damages to abutting owners if the fire runs onto the abutters' property.

2. It is a violation of the Forest Laws of the state to—

- a. Drop or throw any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable

to cause a fire, from any vehicle while the same is upon a public highway or private way.

- b. Drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty by a fine of \$25.00.

3. You should promptly notify your local forest fire warden of any fires you see.

4. The forest laws are being more strictly enforced each year.

Your cooperation will save the warden considerable worry; you and your town much trouble and expense.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Northwood:

Last year there were 104 pupils registered in the elementary schools of Northwood. Of those not previously registered elsewhere in the state, 54 were boys and 42 were girls. The schools were actually in session 350 half days, with an aggregate attendance of 30,485. The enrollment by grades ranged from nine in the second grade to nineteen in the seventh grade. Eighty-seven pupils were promoted and five retained. The average September ages of all pupils ranged from six years and three months in Grade I to thirteen years and seven months in Grade VIII. Eleven pupils were graduated from the eighth grade in June. Nineteen pupils were under eight years of age, 70 between eight and fourteen, and seven aged fourteen or over. The average attendance was 87.09, average absence 4.01, and per cent of attendance 95.59. There were 87 cases of tardiness (including those caused by transportation difficulties), but six pupils were not absent nor tardy during the year. Fifty-nine pupils were transported at district expense, while 57 others had their tuition paid in high school. Of the regular teachers, three held permanent certificates and one a license. The average total experience of the regular teachers was over twenty years. Thirteen school board meetings were held during the year. Visits to the schools included 19 by board members, 106 by the superintendent, and 455 by other citizens.

The per pupil cost of elementary schools in Northwood for the year 1939-40 was \$88.83, occupying a median position among the districts in Union No. 44. The current costs per \$1,000 of equalized valuation were \$7.76, of which the district furnished \$6.19 and

the state \$1.57. High school costs were \$6.13 and other current costs \$.86, making a total of \$14.75 per \$1,000 of valuation. It costs less than \$100 to keep a child in school, as against an average of several times that amount to maintain an inmate in a penal institution. The "cost of instruction" in Coe-Brown Academy last year was \$132.15 per pupil (in addition to maintenance costs, etc.), for which service the district paid \$79.56, indicating the contribution, financially as well as otherwise, which the founders of the Academy have been making to the community. There is considerable support for pending legislation for state aid toward high school costs.

The school nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, made 156 visits to Northwood schools last year, besides many visits to homes. The largest number of defects disclosed by the annual health examination related to teeth. Two-thirds of these were corrected during the year. Thirty-one pupils received certificates of complete care at the dental clinic arranged by the nurse and sponsored by the Harvey Lake Women's Club, with Dr. C. H. Manning as dentist.

In the annual "Scholarship Day" contest (sometimes referred to as the "battle of brains") held May 4, 1940, at Keene Teachers College, Coe-Brown Academy placed second in Current Events and third in Chemistry, in competition with schools throughout the state.

Our school transporters have willingly complied with stricter regulations imposed by the State Motor Vehicle Department for school buses, including several safety features agreed upon throughout the country. A uniform printed contract form prescribed by the State Board of Education has also been adopted.

At the present time, schools are being maintained in Northwood as follows:
