#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Piermont Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- l. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges.
  - 4. To raise and appropriate money for town road aid.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street Lights and Blinker.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Library.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money to finish repairs on new Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Fire Department.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committee for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountain Region Association for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1958.

#### TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collectors Deeds or otherwise.
- 16. To hear reports from committee on a Town dump and appropriate money for the same.
- 17. To see what the Town wishes to do about repairing buildings on the Bean place, and what shall be done with the land.
- 18. To discuss building a road on the back side of Armington Pond to land owned by Watson and other property owners.
- 19. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate money for Liability and Compensation Insurance.
- 20. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Nineteen fifty eight has been an exciting year for the Piermont Public Library. At Town Meeting, it was voted to use the Library for the much-needed extra school room and to move it into the house across the street which the Town voted to buy from the Bean Estate. After this purchase was completed, in August, alterations were begun by Glen Perkins and, by throwing three rooms into one, adequate space was secured. Work has also been done on the connecting room which will, later, be used for a reading room. With the \$1,000.00 appropriated for this work, we feel that Mr. Perkins has accomplished a great deal and the result is both satisfactory and attractive.

The move was made in late August and the Library was closed to the public on August 23 and 26 but was opened again on Saturday, August 30, and business was brisk as it has continued to be.

Instead of a decrease, as was the case last year, circulation has increased by 2,237, due largely to the cooperation of the teachers who come to the Library with their pupils and allow them ample time for the selection of books. The Tuesday evening session also helps, and the novelty of a new Library has stimulated public interest. The ample supply of books from the larger Bookmobile has also made a significant contribution to our circulation figures.

It is good to know that in 1958 Piermont stood second in the State of New Hampshire for circulation per capita. A gift of \$25.00 from Mrs. Mary Babbitt to be used for a much needed library sign was greatly appreciated by the Library Trustees. An excellent table, given by Mrs. Floyd Smith, is already in use; Floyd Smith has donated the electric clock, formerly used in his store, and, as usual, we have received gifts of books from friends and from the Haverhill and Woodsville Libraries.

The Library Trustees and the Librarian appreciate the generous support of the Town and the continuing interest of all.

Mrs. Shirley Metcalf accepted the position to teach grades 5 and 6. Miss Kennett moved into the new room with the third and fourth grade pupils.

The teaching staff is most appreciative of the more nearly ideal teaching conditions in the Piermont system and each teacher is doing excellent work in the classroom. The work room for the lunch operator is undoubtedly the least convenient, both for cooking and for serving, of any part of the system.

Your interest in your child helps make his school life happy and successful. Make certain that your child recognizes and understands your support of his full-time job of going to school. A tangible way of showing interest in your child is by visiting school.

- Encourage your child to do his best without "pushing" him into tasks beyond his energy and interest.
- 2. Remember that all children are different in abilities and personalities.
- 3. Guide your child to do his work with diligence, imagination, and excellence.
- Confer with teachers about your child to discuss the difficulties and misunderstandings ever present in the complex growing up of children.
- 5. Provide home experiences that may be closely related to school work such as individual projects and reports.
- 6. Schedule and attend parent-teacher conferences.

Appreciation is again expressed for the loyalty of the teachers and co-workers. Also, for the continued support of the citizens of the district in school affairs. The constructive policies of the school board are most gratifying.

Routine vision and hearing tests were completed. When defects were found, written notices were sent to the parents. It is important that the child is seen by his doctor, for further examination, when symptoms of defects are found. Failing grades are sometimes the result of vision, hearing or other physical defects.

Five pupils received polio inoculations at the polio clinic held in the fall. There are still some children who have not completed the series. The vaccine has proven its value and now is a good time to complete the three inoculations or to get the first two before the polio season begins this summer.

The use of the metal index card file has been a great time saver in recording information on the individual health cards.

I want to thank Mr. Bennett, the teachers, parents and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in the school health program.
