INAUGURAL ADDRESS

by Mayor Joshua Studley

Gentlemen of the City Council:

I greatly appreciate the honor that has been conferred upon me by the citizens of Rochester and, having taken the oath of office as your Mayor for the ensuing year, shall endeavor to fulfill the duties of that office to the best of my ability.

Realizing the responsibilities which are facing us, I feel that it is my privilege and duty to frankly and honestly state to you some of the problems with which we are confronted.

The responsibility of selecting the heads of the various departments of our City rests entirely upon you gentlemen of the City Council, and I trust that in making these selections every precaution will be taken to elect only those who will cooperate with the committees to be appointed by me as your Mayor, so that through harmony and earnestness a forward-reaching program may be developed.

It was not the intention of our forefathers in drafting our City Charter that the Mayor should dictate the policies of our City Government, but that all of our problems should be faced openly, and be frankly discussed, in order to determine the best course to pursue for the good of the City.

I am, therefore, pleased to return to this City Council any of its privileges that may have been withheld and give you the full right to rule and govern our City, according to the City Charter and the revised Ordinances.

With full knowledge concerning each problem as it is presented, and with ample time for full discussion, your honorable body will be privileged to act on each question.

I desire at this time to bring to your attention the following subjects for your careful thought and consideration.

Public Schools

The citizens of our City are extremely fortunate in having an exceptionally fine school system, the standards of which have been raised under the prudent leadership of our School Board and its Superintendent.

This advancement has been materially aided and made possible by the unselfish, generous spirit of the Spaulding family, in presenting for the youth of our City a new high school building, completely equipped in all its departments and which is proclaimed by leading educators to be one of the finest in the country.

We should cherish the memory of the donors of this gift and it is our responsibility to see that this Memorial is properly cared for, and unselfishly maintained.

I am of the opinion that the advantages of the Spaulding High School should be available for adult education classes, as well as for our youth. Many will be attracted by the educational advantages of our City, thereby increasing our population, trade, industry and homes.

Water Works

Our City can boast of one of the finest, economical water systems in this section.

With the increased demands for water, it is necessary that we should at all times anticipate the future needs of this department.

When consistent with public demand, it is advisable to make such extensions as may be deemed necessary by the Committee with the advice and counsel of its able Superintendent.

It is quite probable that there may be some parts of our City not amply supplied with water to give the proper fire protection, or with sewers to protect the health of our citizens.

These conditions should be given their deserved consideration.

Highway Department

In these days of heavy motor traffic, a city is judged by the condition of its highways, and this department is one to receive the most thoughtful as well as economical consideration.

It seems very essential that the main traffic highways of our City should be surveyed by competent engineers and plans made for modern safety improvements for the protection of our citizens.

The sidewalks on our main thoroughfares should also be carefully inspected and maintained to prevent unnecessary accidents.

The rural routes over which our school buses travel in transporting our children to the public schools should be properly repaired.

Shade Trees, Parks and Commons

Recently, all of New England was struck by a severe tropical storm which destroyed many shade trees in this city, and seriously damaged many of those that still remain. Rochester should have a definite program including the improvement and care of our parks and the setting of new shade trees.

Skating rinks should be located in several parts of the City and kept free from snow, as well as properly supervised, thereby affording an opportunity for the youth of our City to enjoy this fine sport and to keep our citizens off the river to prevent serious accidents.

Health

The welfare of our citizens is one of the vital problems constantly before us. Serious consideration should be given to the extension of our sanitary sewerage system.

Library

The over-crowded condition of our Library has been called to the attention of our City Council many times in the past, and it is imperative that action be taken to relieve the situation. I trust that something definite will be accomplished this year.

Fire Department

The Fire Department is one of which we can be justly proud, and its record speaks for itself. Its equipment and its personnel must always be maintained to that degree of supremacy that our property may always be fully protected.

Public Buildings

Our City Hall and some of the other public buildings are sadly in need of repairs, a condition which reflects upon the City and should be remedied after careful study as soon as possible.

Police Department

The requirements of this department have constantly increased, owing to modes of transportation. The parking problem is still very serious, and much thought should be given to solving this condition. Firm, friendly courtesy should always be the aim of our officers in maintaining the regulations of this department as well as the safety and protection of our citizens.

Relief

Those people of our City who, through no fault of their own, now need assistance will be cared for, and no worthy case brought to our attention will go unaided. The weak and infirm will receive sympathetic consideration.

Finances

The following is a statement of the gross funded debt for the year ending December 31, 1939:

This shows a total debt as of the close of 1939 of \$193,823.24, divided as follows: Water debt, \$67,000.00, payable from revenue of the Water Works; Municipal debt, payable from tax levies, \$126,823.24. This is substantially larger than the debt was a year ago. On January 1, 1939, the total debt was \$153,884.72, divided as follows: Water debt, \$68,000.00, payable from revenue of the Water Works; and Municipal debt, payable from tax levies, \$85,884.72.

From 1936 to 1940 the net debt of our City has increased over 60%. This cannot be dismissed by saying that the new high school is the cause of it, for of the moneys owed by the City only approximately 13% is occasioned by the erection of that building. An examination of the City records will disclose other municipal activities contributing their share toward the indebtedness. Of the total debt, \$33,987.25 is payable during

the year 1940. This is an increase of \$6,087.25 over the amount payable in 1939. Payments due on the City debt mean that from the income received by the City over \$3 per each thousand of assessed valuation is necessary to pay debts previously incurred. This is an increase of more than 100% over the amount necessary to pay old debts in 1936, when only \$1.40 per thousand of assessed valuation was necessary for debt retirement.

The financial statement and comments, which I have just brought to your attention, reveal that we must face the facts and, as a City government, adopt a sound financial program.

I desire particularly that your honorable body should give special attention to the following recommendations:

- 1. That a sidewalk be constructed on the Rochester Hill Road.
- 2. That the sanitary sewers be extended on Washington Street.
- 3. That the City Hall and the Ward House in Ward 6 be repaired, and that the crowded condition of our City Library be remedied.
- 4. That the rural routes over which our school buses travel be improved.
- 5. That the Water Department protect its source of supply and extend its lines.
- 6. That the City streets and sidewalks be kept clean, well cleared of snow, sanded when necessary, and every precaution taken to protect the public welfare.

Finally, gentlemen, with good roads bringing people into our City, with police and fire protection of a high standard, with healthy, wholesome and cheerful surroundings, and with unexcelled educational opportunities, Rochester will grow, progress and prosper. May we all work together so that when the history of this year is recorded, we, its officials, may feel gratified with our accomplishments.

IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

Passed by the City Council, 1940

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE PROVIDING A SUBSTITUTE TO SIGN CHECKS IN THE ABSENCE OF THE CITY TREASURER

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 6 of Chapter IV of the Public Ordinances be amended by adding at the end thereof the following, "provided, however, that the city council in the absence or disability of either the city treasurer or the mayor may appoint some other person to sign in his place," so that said section will read as follows:

6. Payment of all claims as approved in accordance with the preceding section shall be made by check drawn and signed by the city treasurer and countersigned by the mayor, provided, however, that the city council in the absence or disability of either the city treasurer or the mayor may appoint some other person to sign in his place.

Passed January 2, 1940.

RESOLUTION, AMENDMENT TO ORDERS AND RULES RELATING TO SPECIAL POLICE

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Rules and Orders of the City Council be amended by adding after section 43 a new section to read as follows:

43a. Appointments for special police shall be referred to the committee on police for investigation, said committee to report at the next subsequent meeting and no confirmation of said appointments shall be voted by the council until the report of said committee is returned.

RESOLUTION TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Finance Committee be authorized to hire in anticipation of taxes, a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Said sum to be hired on notes of the City and to be placed at such times as the best interest of the City require.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE RULES AND ORDERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Section 1. Amend Section 1 of the Rules and Orders of the City Council by striking out the entire section and substituting the following: Section 1. Regular meetings of the City Council shall be held in the Council Chambers in the City Hall on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:30 o'clock P. M., except that the regular meeting in the month of November shall be held on the Wednesday following the first Monday of said month at 7:30 o'clock P. M., and the regular meeting for the month of December shall be held on the Thursday following the first Tuesday of said month at 7:30 o'clock P. M.; provided, however, that if any such days shall fall upon a legal holiday, said meeting shall be held on the day following at the same time.

Section 2. Amend said Rules and Orders of the City Council by adding after Section 1, the following new sections: 1a. Special meetings may be called at any time by the mayor, and shall be called by the clerk upon petition of at least six members of the council, upon written notice to said councilmen at least forty-eight hours prior to said meeting, said notice stating the purpose for which the meeting is called. 1b. The mayor shall take the chair precisely at the hour appointed for the meeting, and call the members to order, and within ten minutes, or sooner if a quorum be present, shall cause the roll to be called, and the names of the members present to be recorded. The clerk shall also record the names of the members coming in after the calling of the roll.

Section 3. Amend said Rules and Orders of the City Council by adding after Section 13 a new section. 13a. To be valid, the right of veto of the mayor must be exercised within seventy-two hours after action by the council.

Section 4. Amend Section 29 of the Rules and Orders of the City Council by inserting after the words, "fair hand" the words, "or typewritten" so that said section shall read: Section 29. All reports and other papers, submitted to the city council, shall be written in a fair hand or typewritten, and no report, or endorsement of any kind shall be made on the reports, memorials, or other papers, referred to committees. And the clerk shall make copies of any papers to be reported by the committees at the request of the chairman thereof.

Section 5. Section 42 of the Rules and Orders of the City Council relating to messages to the mayor and council is hereby repealed.

Section 6. Section 46 of the Rules and Orders of the City Council relating to the lay-out of streets and highways is hereby repealed.

Section 7. Section 57 of the Rules and Orders of the City Council relating to pay of clerks and stewards of certain fire companies is hereby repealed.

RESOLUTION TO RENUMBER THE RULES AND ORDERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL AND HAVE THE SAME PRINTED

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the committee on printing be and hereby is authorized to renumber as may be necessary the sections of the rules and orders of the mayor and city council of the City of Rochester as amended, and have the same printed in small convenient paper pamphlet form.

AMENDMENT TO POLICE ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: 1. Amend Section 8, Chapter V of the Public Ordinances of the City of Rochester by striking out said section and inserting in lieu thereof the following: Section 8. All police officers shall be on duty six days a week during such hours as may be prescribed by the City Marshal.

- 2. Section 9, of Chapter 5 of the Public Ordinances relating to regulations for police officers in Gonic, East Rochester, is hereby repealed.
- 3. Amend Section 1 of Chapter XXIII of the Public Ordinances by striking out the following: "(6) Police at Gonic, one hundred dollars, payable semi-annually, (7) Police at East Rochester, one hundred dollars, payable semi-annually."
- 4. Amend Section 2 of Chapter XXIV of the Public Ordinances by striking out the word "four" in the fifth line thereof, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "six" and by striking out the words "police officer at Gonic, police at East Rochester" in the fifth and sixth lines thereof so that said section shall read as follows: Section 2. The city council shall annually on the first Wednesday of January or at an adjourned meeting thereof, elect by ballot and majority vote, for a term of one year, the following officers; city clerk, city marshal, assistant marshal, six patrolmen, city solicitor, city treasurer, city accountant, collector of taxes, street commissioner, superintendent of water works and sewers, chief of fire department, five deputy chiefs of the fire department, one of whom shall be from Gonic, one from East Rochester, and one from the permanent firemen at the Central Station, manager of the opera house.
- 5. Amend Section 6 of Chapter 5 of the Public Ordinances of the City of Rochester by striking out the words, "except those at East Rochester and Gonic" so that said section shall read as follows: Section 6. All police officers before going on duty shall report at the police station to the city marshal for orders. No police officer shall be absent from duty without permission of the marshal.

RESOLUTION TO EXTEND THE SEWER AND WATER LINES TO THE LOCATION OF THE NEW FRISBIE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

WHEREAS, the Frisbie Memorial Hospital of the City of Rochester, contemplates the erection of a new hospital building on a site to be selected;

AND WHEREAS, there is a possibility that said site may be outside the present sewer and water lines of said City of Rochester;

NOW, THEREORE, be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the said City of Rochester that said City if necessary extend its sewer and water lines to said new hospital, the said City bearing the expense of such extension of said sewer and water lines up to one thousand (1,000') feet of such extensions.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES FOR 1940

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That there shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, with such overlay as may be found necessary, on the polls and ratable estates within said city, \$356,315.62 to defray the necessary expenses of the city for the ensuing year, which together with the sums which may be received from various sources, is hereby appropriated.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO PARKING

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Amend Section 4 of Chapter 14 of the Public Ordinances by striking out from the third line thereof the words, "North Main Street and" so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 4. All parking of motor vehicles on the foregoing designated streets shall be within the marks placed upon the highway as follows: Hanson Street all parking shall be parallel with the curbing; on the westerly side of Central Square all parking shall be at right angles to the curbing; on all other parts of the foregoing named highways all motor vehicles shall be parked at an angle of approximately thirty-three degrees.

RESOLUTION TO USE OLD HIGH SCHOOL LOT FOR PARKING SPACE

WHEREAS, the gift of the Spaulding families toward the construction of the Spaulding High School was made conditional upon the use of the land upon which the old High School stood being approved by the Spaulding families;

AND WHEREAS, the said Spaulding families have agreed to the use of a portion of said land for a public parking lot under the following terms and conditions:—

- 1. That the front half of said lot shall be developed and landscaped with appropriate shrubbery, plants, flowers, etc.;
- 2. That the parking lot proper be hidden from view from the street by appropriate hedges or trees;
- 3. That the parking lot be kept free from excessive noise and be properly lighted and policed at all times;
- 4. That said Spaulding families shall be the final judges as to whether or not there has been a breach of these conditions;
- 5. That upon breach of any of the foregoing terms and conditions, the parking lot be discontinued and the land be put to such further use as may be approved by said Spaulding families;
- NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:—1. That the aforementioned terms and conditions be accepted by said City of Rochester;
- 2. That the Committee on Shade Trees, Parks and Commons be and hereby are authorized to develop and landscape the front half of the old High School lot, so-called, situate off Wakefield Street with appropriate shrubbery, plants, flowers, etc.;
- 3. That the Committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains be and hereby are authorized to develop the rear half of said lot for a public parking space and to see that said lot is properly lighted at all times;
- 4. That the Committee on Shade Trees, Parks and Commons be and hereby are authorized to hide said parking lot from the street by appropriate hedges or trees;
- 5. That the said parking lot shall be properly policed and kept free from noise at all times;
- 6. That if at any time the said Spaulding families are of the opinion that there has been a breach of any of the foregoing terms and conditions, said parking lot shall be discontinued and the land put to such further use as said Spaulding families shall approve.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO PARKING RULES

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Amend Section 6 of Chapter XIV of the Public Ordinances by adding after the words Arrow Street in the sixth line thereof the words, "easterly side of Congress Street from Arrow Street to Charles Street" so that said section as amended shall read:

Section 6. No vehicle shall be parked or left standing within the City of Rochester upon parts of the following streets: Bridge Street between Bridge and Main Street; Union Street between a point one hundred feet easterly from Main Street

and Main Street; Congress Street from Central Square to Arrow Street; easterly side of Congress Street from Arrow Street to Charles Street; Liberty Street between a point fifty feet westerly from Main Street and Main Street, and between a point fifty feet easterly from Charles Street and Charles Street; Hanson Street on the northerly side between a point fifty feet easterly from Central Square and Central Square. No person shall park or leave standing a motor vehicle within ten feet of any fire hydrant.

RESOLUTION TO PAINT TRAFFIC PARKING LINES

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the committee on police be and hereby is authorized and directed to paint and lay out the streets of the City in accordance with Section 4 of Chapter 14 of the Public Ordinances as amended on May 7, 1940.

Passed June 4, 1940.

AMENDMENT TO PARKING ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That we amend Section 3 of Chapter XIV of the General Ordinances by adding after the words Central Avenue in the eighth line thereof the words "northerly side of Autumn Street" so that said Ordinance as amended shall read as follows:

Section 3. Except Sundays and holidays, no person between the hours of 7 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M. shall be allowed to park or cause to stand a motor vehicle for more than one hour on North Main Street from Bridge Street to Central Square, on the whole of Central Square; on South Main Street from Central Square to Portland Street; on Hanson Street from Central Square to Central Avenue and on the northerly side of Autumn Street. Provided, however, that this section shall not be applicable to operators of licensed taxis when in locations allotted to them as a taxi stand nor to any buses when in locations allotted to them on the easterly side of Parson Main Monument nor to any motor vehicle of the Police Department when in space allotted to it on the southerly side of Parson Main Monument.

RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE TORRENT HOSE HOUSE AND LOT

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That there be and hereby is appropriated from monies not otherwise appropriated the sum of Two Hundred Sixty (\$260.) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing all rights of Bessie Wentworth in the Torrent Engine House No. 2 and the lot of land upon which the same stands;

That the Mayor be and hereby is authorized for and on behalf of said City of Rochester to purchase the rights of the said Bessie Wentworth therein, and to receive a deed thereof to the City of Rochester.

RESOLUTION THAT NO RUBBISH BE COLLECTED ON HOLIDAYS

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains be and hereby is directed to amend and change their rules and regulations relative to the collection of rubbish, so that none of the work be done by the City or its agent on November 11, Armistice Day, May 30, Memorial Day, and July 4, Independence Day.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT A DEED FROM RALPH AND MARTIN BROCK

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Mayor be and hereby is authorized to accept in behalf of said City a deed to a right of way across land of Ralph A. and Martin S. Brock on the easterly side of Hussey Road where the 12-inch pipe is now laid.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY FOR ADDITIONS AND REPAIRS AT PUBLIC LIBRARY

Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Finance Committee be authorized and directed to raise for and on behalf of the City of Rochester, through the issue of notes as provided in Chapter 59 of Public Laws, the sum of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars, said sum to be placed in a specific account and used only for additions and repairs to the Public Library. Said notes to bear interest at no greater rate than 3%.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY FOR WATER WORKS EXTENSION ON WHITEHALL ROAD

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO CLAIMS AND ACCOUNTS

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Amend Section 2 of Chapter 4 of the Public Ordinances of the City of Rochester by striking out the words "folded, filed and numbered" in the seventh and eighth lines so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 2. The Superintendent of Schools shall receive all accounts and claims from persons having demands against the school board. The librarian from persons against the trustees of the Public Library and the City Clerk from persons for all other demands. They shall examine all such accounts and claims and see that they are correctly cast and present the same to one or the other of the Committees as shall be appropriate as provided in the following sections.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY ON NOTES FOR SEWER EXTENSION ON AUTUMN STREET, E. R.

R. The same to constitute a part of the City debt and placed at such a rate and in such places as will best serve the interest of the City.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO PARKING RULES

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 3 of Chapter XIV be amended by striking out the whole thereof, and inserting in its place the following:

Section 3. No person between the hours of 7 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M. on all week days excepting Saturdays, and on Saturdays between 7 o'clock A. M. and 9 o'clock P. M., shall be allowed to park or cause to stand a motor vehicle for more than one hour on North Main Street from Bridge Street to Central Square: on the whole of Central Square; on South Main Street from Central Square to Liberty Street, and on Hanson Street from Central Square to Central Avenue. Provided, however, this section shall not be applicable to operators of licensed taxis when in locations allotted to them as a taxi stand, nor to any buses when in locations allotted to them on the easterly side of Parson Main Monument, nor to any motor vehicle of the Police Department when in the space allotted to it on the southerly side of Parson Main Monument.

The foregoing ordinance does not apply to holidays.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO PARKING TRUCKS

Be it ordained by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Amend Section 4 of Chapter XIV as heretofore amended by adding Section 4A to read as follows:

4A. That no motor truck measuring over all more than eighteen feet in length shall be permitted to park on either side of North Main Street from Central Square to Bridge Street, or on either side of South Main Street from Congress Street to Portland Street, except at such times as the City Marshal may have given his permission so to do.

This Ordinance shall not apply to Interstate buses operating under permission of the Public Service Commission, ambulances or trucks operated by the City of Rochester.

Pease of said Rochester in the County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire on or about April 4, 1939, offered to convey to said City of Rochester a triangular tract of land with one hundred forty-seven (147) feet frontage on Charles Street and one hundred fifty-three (153) feet frontage on Hancock Street.

And Whereas, said City of Rochester on April 4, 1939, accepted said offer.

And whereas, more than one year has elapsed and no satisfactory deed of conveyance has been executed by said Pease and delivered to said City of Rochester.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of said Rochester that the acceptance of said John B. Pease be and is hereby revoked and made null and void, and that said John B. Pease be granted leave to withdraw his said offer.

2. That said Mayor and City Council hereby go on record as approving such an abatement of taxes to the purchaser of the entire plant as a going concern, as will induce such purchaser to operate the plant and provide employment to the citi-

zens of said City.



Gentlemen: I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1940. The following alarms were answered by the department in the city proper: 18 bell alarms, 11 auto fires, 156 still alarms, 3 out of town calls, 1 false alarm, 23 brush and grass fires, 1 engineer's call. East Rochester: 31 calls, 25 bell alarms, 6 still alarms, 4 false alarms, 11 chimney fires, 10 brush-grass fires, 5 buildings, 1 boy lost. Gonic: 36 calls, 19 chimney fires, 2 false alarms, 6 brush-grass fires, 7 buildings, 2 auto fires, making a total of 241 alarms for the year.

We assisted on January 8th, Springvale Me.; July 9th, So. Lebanon, Me., and October 31st, W. Lebanon, Me.

I will recommend at this time for your consideration the reconstruction and enlarging of the fire alarm system, as the city is growing and many new homes are being built in sections where there are no fire alarm boxes.

Once again I call to your attention the need of another man at the Central Station.

We have purchased 1,050 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch and 500 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hose and installed a new alarm box at the corner of Twombly and North Main Streets, number 242. Also, many repairs have been made to the present system.

In the near future a Foam Generator should be purchased as this is the only equipment to subdue gasoline and oil fires, and the city has a large amount of gasoline storage and oil burners now installed.

I also recommend the purchase of a car or light truck for exchange of a 1925 Reo as we have a great deal of work that this car is needed for.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to his Honor, the Mayor, members of the City Council, Committee on Fire

Department and members of the Board of Engineers and members of the Department and persons who rendered us help and good will, I extend my sincere appreciation for the fine support rendered me during the year.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen: The Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library respectfully submits its forty-seventh annual report, for the year 1940; also the financial reports of the Librarian and Treasurer.

We refer you to the report of the librarian for statistical results of the year's work.

The library has been closed to the public for several weeks now, while the addition and alterations authorized by your board during the past year are being carried out. We expect these renovations will be completed very shortly and the library will then be in a position to render more efficient service to its patrons than it has in the past.

The work of the library has been carried on this year in the same efficient manner by Miss Parshley and her very capable corps of assistants.

As Trustees we appreciate this service.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library:

Gentlemen:—A report of the library work for the year 1940 is herewith presented. A year in which many of the long felt needs of the library are about to be satisfied.

The additional space for books, many conveniences for carrying on the work, freshly decorated rooms, refinished floors and tables, better lighting and a new heating system will be fully appreciated. The citizens, especially those who patronize the library, the trustees and those of us who carry on the work do indeed feel grateful to the Mayor and the City Council for making the additions and changes possible.

For lack of money some things which were planned have had to be omitted such as, floors covered and sound proof, new and more comfortable chairs and transferring the children's room to the second floor with new and suitable furnishings.

The work during the last few months of the year has necessarily been rather sketchy and chaotic. Circulation has gone on, however, and the same attention given to readers and students.

During the little more than ten months which the library has been open 91,088 books went out from the library, 18,139 of the number from the children's room. In addition, 1,969 books were given out from the East Rochester Branch and 5,803 from the Gonic Branch thus making the entire circulation of library books 98,860. More than 5,000 books are in the hands of library readers at the time of this report and the date of opening is anxiously awaited.

For several weeks before closing, November 9, the reading and reference rooms were not pleasant places for readers and students hence a decrease in the number for the year, a total of 13,782. Of this number 3,075 were counted in the children's room.

The additions of the year have exceeded a thousand volumes, 1,080 to be exact, with many valuable and helpful books among them. This number does not include the private library of the late Franklin McDuffee with its splendid collection of more than 1,700 volumes, given by his mother and sister; nor does it include 148 light stories of romance, mystery and adventure which have not been accessioned.

In order to make room on the shelves 229 accessioned and unaccessioned government documents have been returned to the Department of Public Documents at Washington. Two hundred and eighty-two bound volumes of the Congressional Globe and Record, with their indexes, and dating back to 1833 and Reports of the United States Commissioner of Education have been turned over to the Spaulding High School as a permanent loan. The number of accessioned volumes belonging to the library at the present time is 37,971.

The work with children and young people is a most interesting part of the work and much care and thought is given to the selection of their books. A most successful summer reading contest was carried on. That there are many good readers among the children of Rochester is shown by the 18,139 books given out to them during the year.

Both of the branch libraries are doing creditable work. I would call your attention to the number of books given out from the Gonic Branch conducted by Mrs. Agnes Evans at her home on School Street. Mrs. Evans has visited the schools in order to interest the children in her little library and has opened it an extra hour in the afternoon that the many commuting pupils may have the privilege of changing their books.

East Rochester has a library of its own. Its librarian, Miss Steadman, has looked after the 300 Rochester books which are sent over for their use in a commendable manner making all necessary reports.

The table of statistics which is a part of this report will give you a clear and concise idea of the work in its various branches.

The year 1940 has been an unusual and hectic one with important decisions to be made quickly and always with a thought for the future as well as the present. The members of the staff have been faithful and untiring in their efforts to make the best of necessary inconveniences while attending to the wants of the public and taking the best care possible of the books. The hundreds of books which have had to be moved from room to room, from shelf to table, from table to floor, wrapped in paper for their protection, carefully cleaned by cloth or vacuum has not been as interesting as passing books over the counter to a seeking public.

When an unexpectedly heavy rain came while the roofs old and new were not functioning properly and the stack room was flooded, it was only the quick work of the staff, assisted by the janitor, carpenters and contractor and the kindness of Gordon Cushing, chief of the Fire Department, who brought and adjusted the rubber blankets belonging to the department, which prevented hundreds of valuable books from being destroyed. As a result only 41 were permanently disfigured.

With you the Board of Trustees, the librarian and staff as well as our many readers are eagerly awaiting the opening day.

I wish at this time to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to all donors of books, of periodicals and of flowers which made the library so attractive during the summer,—to the assistants for their loyal cooperation and help, to the janitor for his patience and ever ready assistance,—and to you, the Board of Trustees, for your advice and encouragement.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Rochester School Board:

I herewith submit my annual report which is the eighth under my supervision and the forty-ninth in the series of such reports. The report presents a discussion of those items which are believed to be of interest to the general public or about which I have received specific inquiries. Should anyone have a question about any matter not here presented he is urged to seek information from my office.

CHANGES IN TEACHING STAFF

Mr. Adolph J. Leocha was called into military service for an indefinite term which led to his resignation as a teacher in the high school. The vacancy thus created was filled by the election of Mr. Carl I. Harriman, formerly an instructor in Pinkerton Academy of Derry, N. H. Miss Alice D. Goodwin, at her request, was transferred from the principalship of the East Rochester school to the high school to replace Mrs. Geraldine Willey Titus who resigned. Mr. Alva Z. Allen resigned as teacher of biology and physical geography to accept the headmastership of the Goffstown High School. He was succeeded by Mr. Paul R. Doe who formerly taught in Pembroke Academy.

The only elementary school changes were both in East Rochester where Miss Marie Nixon was advanced to the principalship and Miss Marjory N. Shaw was elected teacher of grades five and six. Miss Shaw formerly taught in Gorham, Maine.

ADULT CLASSES

Throughout the winter of 1940 adult recreation classes were organized and conducted by members of the high school faculty in the field of physical education. These classes were for the benefit of both men and women who were charged a membership fee calculated to pay the instructors and to return something to the school department for building maintenance. A similar plan will be followed in the 1941 classes which we hope will be able to reach a much larger number of people than a year ago.

Evening school classes have been planned to begin on January 2, 1941, and to continue for twenty-four nights. Acting in joint meeting and in accordance with school board instructions the Teachers and Salaries Committee and the Textbooks and Supplies Committee adopted the plan of procedure next stated. (1) The fee for registration shall be one dollar; (2) a charge of fifteen cents per lesson shall be made; (3) residence in Rochester is not necessary for registration; (4) no class will be organized for fewer than ten people, but may be continued for fewer than ten if those remaining assume financial responsibility.

It is further understood that all books and materials of instruction are to be furnished by enrollees.

The facilities of our machine shop have been made available for training in occupations essential to national defense. A course of forty hours per week for ten weeks is planned to conform to requirements for total reimbursement from government funds. While this work is under the immediate supervision of public school authorities it is conducted in cooperation with and on advice from an Advisory Committee which equally represents both employer and employee groups. Membership in the course is open to men who are unemployed and is intended to serve the double purpose of contributing man power to defense industries and of re-establishing trainees economically.

COMMUNITY USE OF BUILDING

The foregoing discussion leads naturally to this next statement. Throughout the first full year of operation the renting of school facilities has been at the discretion of the Superintendent of Schools and the Schoolhouses and Grounds Committee who have tried to develop a policy that would at once serve the public and protect school interests. That experience in examining individual applications has gradually led to the formation of a policy which is rather clearly defined. I hope that the 1941 Schoolhouses and Grounds Committee may present to the School Board a sufficiently detailed plan of procedure to remove the necessity of individual decisions as new requests are presented.

The original intention was to apply rentals directly on fuel and maintenance bills, but that plan was abandoned on advice from the City Accountant. It was his opinion that such bills should be paid in full and charged against the school appropriation so that the exact amount of each bill, unreduced by application of rental receipts, would be shown. Reimbursement in the form of rental receipts would then be added to the school appropriation as a debit to balance the previous credit.

Any discussion of building rental raises the question of how far the school department can or ought to go in extending rentfree privileges. It has been felt that the actual cost of heat, light, and janitor service should be collected whenever the building is used by or for any organization whose work is not a regularly scheduled school activity. This means that many times we have had to submit a bill to organizations whose work and purpose might seem to entitle them to special consideration. However, it does not seem proper to build up the expense of school operation by financing any service not directly chargeable to and administered as a school activity.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Our school lunch program consists of the high school cafeteria service throughout the year and that at Maple Street School during January and February.

Since September, 1940, the high school cafeteria has been carried on by three women assisted by a group of pupils who are paid in food for their work. The women employed are Mrs.

Myrtle Stacy, Mrs. Alice Jackson, and Mrs. Margaret Wallace. Approximately 400 pupils are fed each day at low cost and from a menu which meets the test of nutrition requirements. In fact, our proposed menu was approved by a representative of the State Board of Health before the first meal was prepared, and at no time have considerations of profit taken precedence over health aims.

The cafeteria is operated by the school under the supervision and approval of the Schoolhouses and Grounds Committee. A cafeteria account is set up as suggested by the City Accountant and all bills are paid by check. Quarterly audits show the financial status of the cafeteria account. Food supplies are purchased in bulk and on bid. Daily cost sheets are made up by the cafeteria manager so that we have a constant check on costs and on inventory. The audit of November 27, 1940, showed a net worth of \$435.48 which is the profit since September, 1939. When the cash balance is a little larger we shall begin serving more food for the same money to prevent further accumulation until such time as it is needed.

The Maple Street School has a kitchen in which hot lunches can be prepared and served. Mrs. Helen Kidder is employed to carry on that lunch program during the cold months of January and February. An attempt has been made to operate it after the February vacation but without much success. This lunch service is never quite self-supporting so that a part of Mrs. Kidder's pay is made up by the school department. That payment rarely exceeds thirty cents a day in addition to the lunch profits.

No other lunch service is sponsored by the school department, although at both the Gonic and East Rochester school teacher initiative has resulted in providing something hot to supplement lunches brought from home. Since the older girls of grades seven and eight were withdrawn from our elementary schools the teachers often lack competent help in the preparation of hot lunches.

SCHOOL HEALTH

The outstanding accomplishment in school health has been the organization of a dental clinic. The clinic was made possible through the cooperation of all the dentists of Rochester who have generously offered to give as much of their time as is necessary to do the work. The service is available for first grade pupils in any public or approved private school in the city this first year. In succeeding years we plan to carry along those who have been started in the clinic and to include each entering grade. This plan will ultimately extend dental service to pupils in grades one through six. In the acceptance of clinic patients special care is exercised not to invade the field of private practice.

It is my opinion that we ought not to ask or expect dentists to give their time after this first year of organization, but that financial provision should be made for paid services. It is also my understanding that such financial provision cannot legally be included in the school budget. I therefore recommend

that the School Board request a city appropriation to extend dental clinic benefits to all school children of Rochester.

The schedule of the school nurse has been revised to include regular visits to parochial schools instead of having her visits on call only. It is felt that her services in the promotion of school health will thus be productive of better results.

JANITORS

The first full year of occupancy of the Spaulding High School building seems to point quite definitely to the need for more janitor-time. Throughout the fall and winter of 1939-40 four men were not able to keep all parts of the building in as good condition as they wanted to maintain it. They were still less able to do so when outside duties on the grounds reduced the amount of time for inside work. Allowing two weeks for vacations the men were kept busy all summer cleaning and making ready for the fall opening of school. Experience also showed that the equivalent of full time for one man is necessary for proper care and maintenance of the school grounds.

As the building is used more extensively for adult and community purposes we shall need one man on duty nights. Such service is almost indispensable during the winter months when heavy repair expense might result from failure of heating controls to function properly.

I recommend the employment of one additional janitor at the high school. No change in terms of employment of elementary school janitors is recommended.

TRANSPORTATION

The rapid increase in home building in several sections of the city indicates that our transportation problems are to be increased. In my opinion we shall, within a year, find that at least one more bus must be put into operation if our schedules are to remain satisfactory either to parents or to the school.

My discussion of this subject in previous reports has pointed to the fact that demands for service on established routes are often more exacting than can be reconciled with reason. Because a child lives on a bus route it should not excuse him from effort comparable with that required of children who live in the heart of the city. Past experience seems to show that when a concession is made in one section of the city there are immediate demands in other places which more and more tax patience as well as financial ability to carry the load.

The following statement of transportation facts will perhaps be helpful in understanding the school department point of view on this topic. The weekly pay roll for contract carriers is \$319. Our September report to the State Board of Education showed that 411 pupils are being transported to public and parochial schools. The total cost of transportation in 1940 will approximate \$12,600. The city is not required by law to furnish transportation to any child who lives less than two miles from the school to which he is assigned. The city may require pupils to walk a distance not to exceed one mile to meet an estab-

lished route. There is an absence of uniformity in requirements placed on pupils who live on different routes.

I believe the solution of our transportation problems will be promoted when school board action definitely states: (1) whether the minimum distance for transportation shall be one, one and one-half, or two miles; (2) whether the distance agreed upon shall be uniform throughout the city; (3) the greatest distance pupils may be required to walk to meet a school bus.

TEACHERS

The increase in pupil enrollment in the East Rochester School has been steady during the last few years. We now have five grades in that building with an average membership of thirty-one and one small grade of sixteen pupils who will go to the high school next year. There is no reason to suppose that the entering grade next September will be smaller than has been the case for the last three years, hence our plans should be made accordingly. We must, therefore, make provision for a sixth teacher beginning in September, so that neither teachers nor pupils shall find themselves in a less favorable position than those in our other schools.

Attention has frequently been called to the heavy pupil load carried by high school teachers which, in many instances, is approximately twenty per cent in excess of best practice. It is not desirable to continue that condition. The only way to avoid it is to provide more teacher time and that means at least one more teacher. Two more would be better. The specific fields or departments in which the additional teachers will be needed can be definitely stated only when registrations and electives for next year have been completed.

It is true that we have several students doing cadet teaching each year but they are available almost wholly in the second semester and then not for the entire second half of our school year. Cadet teachers cannot be depended upon to satisfy the need for more instructors for two reasons: (1) they cannot be with us throughout the year and (2) they ought never to be accepted in our school to fill positions for which regular teachers should be employed.

MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE PROBLEMS

Age of Entrance:

School Board Regulations require that every child enrolled in grade one must have reached the age of five years and nine months on or before September 1. Younger pupils who have previously been enrolled in another public school system may transfer to our first grade if their families take up Rochester residence. This regulation always seems to bear most heavily on those individuals whose age lacks only a few days of that required with the result that frequent requests are made for waiving the regulation. They must all be refused in order to be fair to all parties. Furthermore, the wisdom of enrolling younger children is open to question. It is my opinion, based on the conclusions of research workers, that six years is the minimum age at which children can profitably engage in the

routine work of a school room. One additional year spent in building a physical reserve and guaranteeing the right to enjoy normal childhood is more valuable than one devoted to premature schooling. The year gained by early enrollment will very likely be lost in the interim between the conclusion of public school grades and entrance to employment or higher institutions. That year of enforced idleness or waning interest is fraught with far greater hazards than as though the beginning of school experience had been deferred.

At the end of each year the very serious problem of promotion is presented. The unrest and overwork of pupils who have been reluctantly promoted, in contrast with the happier progress of those who have repeated a grade in which a stronger foundation was needed, convince me that we must be more exacting in our promotions. In grades one and two especially, no promotions will be granted in cases where there is a reasonable doubt as to the child's ability to do the work of the next The temporary disappointment of non-promotion is not nearly so serious as the continued depression due to an attempt to struggle through work for which one is not prepared. Every other consideration is secondary to the ultimate best interest of the child. Let us no longer think of repeating a grade as something to be shunned whatever the cost may be, but rather let us think of it as a further guarantee of happier success in the grade ahead. We must stop entertaining any notion of sacrificing child happiness on the altar of family pride.

Not only at the beginning and the end but throughout the whole year as well we have to face the problem of requests to permit attendance in a school other than the one a child should attend. To grant such requests would establish a precedent that might prove very troublesome later on. As a safeguard, the policy has been set up of allowing registration out of the school territory when parents request that a child be permitted to finish the year in his original school instead of transferring in the second half if the family changes its place of residence. In such cases we assume no responsibility for transportation if it is needed. In still other cases necessity or the plainly demonstrated welfare of a child results in his enrollment in a school of our choice.

Handicapped children whose condition does not permit their enrollment and attendance in a regular school must be furnished home instruction suitable to their needs. There are now two such children in Rochester for whom the School Department is required to engage an instructor. Our statutory obligation will be met with due regard to both the interests of the children concerned and financial limitations of the department. The law in question has been operative since the legislative session of two years ago.

RETURN OF SCHOOL CENSUS

The comparative census returns for 1939 and 1940 tell an interesting story about Rochester school membership. Our experience is the opposite of those places which report a slowly declining school population since ours is slowly increasing.

The most significant single item is that concerning handicapped children. We are fortunate that so many of them are able to pursue their education in the regular way. Only two require special instruction as discussed elsewhere in this report.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

February 25, 1941.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as headmaster of the High School.

The following table is designed to show a comparative study over a thirteen-year period of our school enrollment.

The steady increase in enrollment is significant even notwithstanding the natural increase caused by bringing the seventh and eighth grades into the high school.

The teacher load of 28 pupils per teacher has remained at a constant figure for the past four years keeping our load well above the state average of 22 pupils per teacher.

The percentage of pupils leaving school has remained the same for two years. It was to have been expected that as more jobs became available through a speeding up of industry, greater numbers of students would leave school to enter employment. As is indicated only 6% of the students in Grades 9-12 withdrew.

The figure of 118 graduates which was 71% of the class which had entered Grade 9 four years earlier is significant in that it indicates the fact that children are remaining in school longer which explains part of our increase in enrollment over a period of years.

Thirty-one per cent of the Class of 1940 or 37 students out of 118, after graduating from high school, continued their education at some other institution. The other 69% were potential seekers of employment. In a later section of this report I will indicate what they are now doing.

I wish to comment briefly on the 85 students who have left school this year. Discounting those who have transferred to other schools, it is apparent that more students have left this year to enter employment than has been true for several years. However, notwithstanding this fact, estimates as to probable enrollment for the year 1941-42 suggest that there will probably be close to 1,000 students in the school next year.

The very large figures for Grades 8 and 9 are the result of tuition pupils starting their work in Grade 9 from outside towns and an unusual number of new families moving into town during the past year.

I should briefly report on the annual convention of the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association which was held here in October. Nearly 3,000 teachers were entertained on that occasion and the kindness of the City Council and School Department should not be overlooked as one of the contributing factors to the success of the convention. As past president of the Association, may I express our appreciation to the Department and to the Council for extending the invitation to meet in Rochester.

Of the total number it is gratifying to note that only seven were unemployed. The types of employment into which our graduates enter, however, raises a question as to whether or not our training is of specific value to them in their jobs.

The statement indicates a balance of nearly \$300 which it is proposed will serve as a fund to replace breakage and for new equipment. If the financial condition of the Cafeteria continues to be as good, we can reduce prices still further to provide lunches at even lower prices for our students.

Our accounts are audited every three months and the audit for the first three months of the current year showed a profit of \$140.55 for that period.

We serve some 400 students daily and give employment to about 25 students who earn their lunches working in the kitchen.

NATIONAL YOUTH ADMINISTRATION

There are at present 26 boys and girls in the school above the age of 16 who have been given employment for which they are being paid with federal funds under the National Youth Administration. During the past six years this administration has spent some \$160,000 in the secondary schools of New Hampshire to provide money to assist students to remain in school.

The average payment to each of these pupils will be about \$5.67 per month this year for which the students are required to work 24 hours each month. These students are getting work experience in various fields, clerical, library training, care of equipment in the shops and athletic department, care of the athletic fields, and other types of work.

All work is under the supervision of teachers and it is expected that this experience will not only help to keep these students in school, but it will also help to make them more valuable to prospective employers later on.

NEW COURSE OFFERED

Two years ago when the Industrial Survey of Rochester was made, plans were prepared to use the material as the basis of a course to be offered to our students, particularly those who wished to have some knowledge of the industries located in our city and the possible types of employment which might be available to them upon completion of their school work.

This year, approval having been secured from the State Department of Education, the course is being offered to a group of seniors. The work commenced following the mid-year as a half-unit course and is being taught by Mrs. Palmer. The course not only includes study of all the industries of Rochester, but of the more important industries of New England. A feature of the course is the visit which is to be made to the industry being studied and during which the student may have an opportunity to learn at first hand some of the things he has been studying in the course.

I hope that eventually many more of our students will avail themselves of the opportunities made possible through this course.

In thinking about any educational system we should consider results. I have been thinking about our students and their experiences after they leave high school. Probably the 30% who go on to college are getting additional preparation for their work in life, but the other 70% have had all the training for the work they are going to do when they graduate from our high schools.

It would seem appropriate to examine our program of education constantly in terms of the needs of these boys and girls to prepare themselves to go to work. I would like to see our system make it possible for large numbers of our boys and girls to get work experiences as part of their education. This might have to be worked out on some cooperative plan with local industries, or it might involve a sampling of different occupations by variously qualified students.

In the last analysis, however, these students will not be able to get jobs without training, they will not be able to hold those jobs without right attitudes towards work. I would like to suggest the value, at an early date, of considering ways and means of combining education and work experiences for those of our students who we know are expecting to become job-holders immediately following their graduation from high school.

In conclusion may I again state, as I have in the past, that your teachers have a common understanding of the problems which face us in educating children in these troublesome times, and I am sure that you will find them willing to devote themselves courageously to the task that lies ahead.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as School Nurse for the year 1940.

The general health of the students was good during the past year. There was an epidemic of measles during the spring and chicken-pox prevailed during the fall term. The most common cause of absences is the common cold.

One of the most important advances in the health program was realized during 1940 with the establishing of a Dental Clinic at the Spaulding High School, for the use of children in the first grades of the public and parochial schools who are unable to pay regular dental fees. The dentists of Rochester have given their services and have worked very hard to make this clinic possible. I would like at this time to thank the dentists for their many kindnesses to me.

Physical inspections are being given to all new students in the school system. Dr. N. K. Chesley has shown a very keen interest in this work and as a result many of the students have

had corrective work done.

All of the routine examinations have been carried on and a great many home visits have been made in connection with this work. There was an opportunity in September to test all of the grammar school children's hearing. The audiometer was loaned to us by the State Board of Education for a few weeks. This is the first accurate hearing test which has been done for several years.

Orthopedic therapy clinics have been held at the Clinic Room at the High School for the benefit of the crippled children of Rochester. A nurse and a registered physio-therapist from the State Department of Health are in charge of this work. They visit the school every two weeks. The treatments advised

by Dr. Ezra Jones of Manchester are carried out.

A Tuberculin Skin Testing Clinic was held at the Spaulding High School in May, 1940. About one hundred and fifty students and teachers availed themselves of this privilege. There were six persons who reacted to this test and they were x-rayed at the Frisbie Memorial Hospital. None of the persons x-rayed were found to have tuberculosis. Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, assisted by Dr. N. K. Chesley, gave the test. Another skin testing clinic is being planned for the spring of 1941.

Through the generosity of local charitable organizations it has been possible to supply milk to undernourished children, furnish clothing to others and correct many physical defects. I would like to express my appreciation in behalf of the children

for these many favors.

I take this time, Mr. Rollins, to thank you and the teachers for their cooperation and kindness in the past year.


