DOG LICENSES

It's the Law

1. EVERY DOG, three months old or older, MUST HAVE A LICENSE. These are obtained from the Town Clerk. This must be done EVERY YEAR BEFORE APRIL 30.

2. EVERY DOG must have a certificate showing that it has been VACCINATED FOR RABIES.

3. Every dog must wear its license tag: (RSA 442-a).

4. License Fees: (RSA 466:4)
\$3.50 - all neutered dogs
\$6.00 - all unneutered dogs

5. SHELBURNE HAS A LEASH LAW No dog may be allowed to run at large unless it is accompainied by the owner or custodian. (RSA 466:30-a).

Chester was born in Jefferson, N.H. and moved to Shelburne in 1916. His father went to work for Charles Hamlin, who owned the farm where John Carlson now lives and where Steve Tassey has his barn and cattle. When he came to Shelburne, they moved into the Red Cottage, owned by the Hamlins, where Ray Danforth now lives.

Chet grew up in Shelburne and was educated in the local schools, graduating from Gorham High School. He was a self employed dairy farmer, having bought the Chandler farm in 1945, which he operated until the new road went through. He then went to work for the Berlin Dairy.

Chet was very active in town affairs, serving in the following capacities:

Chet was also the backbone of the local Grange, Winthrop #315, for years and years. Chet served as Master of the Grange for 15 terms, and he was the youngest master, being elected when he was only 21 years old.

Chet never met a stranger, and he was never too busy to converse with or help anyone. None of us will forget that cheery "Hell-oo".

#### TOWN OF SHELBURNE, N.H.

The Polls will be open at 5:00 P.M. and closed not before 9:00 P.M. to the inhabitants of the Town of Shelburne in the County of Coos in the said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Shelburne Town Hall in said Shelburne on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, 1988, at 7:00 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

1. To CHOOSE ALL NECESSARY TOWN OFFICERS FOR THE YEAR ENSUING (printed ballot).

2. To HEAR SUCH REPORTS OF TOWN OFFICERS HERETOFORE CHOSEN AND PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO.

3. To see if the Town will VOTE TO ACCEPT THE PROPOSAL FROM THE TOWN OF GORHAM FOR POLICE PROTECTION AND TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE SEVEN THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED AND TWENTY ONE DOLLARS (\$7,621.00) FOR THAT PURPOSE. This proposal includes dispatch service, a daily patrol of all roads to the State Line, and 24 hour response to emergency calls and is based on a per use basis.

4. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$118,717.00 for General Operations.

5. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) TO REPLACE ONE OVERHEAD GARAGE DOOR AT THE TOWN GARAGE.

6. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE TWO THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$2,400) FOR THE PURPOSE OF A RIDING LAWN MOWER FOR MOWING THE CEMETERIES.

7. To see if the Town will VOTE TO APPROPRIATE \$24.42 PLUS ANY ACCRUED INTEREST TO DATE OF WITHDRAWAL TO BE USED FOR THE MEMORIAL FOREST AND TO AUTHORIZE THE WITHDRAWAL OF THIS AMOUNT FROM THE FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING ACCOUNT.

8. To see if the Town will VOTE TO ESTABLISH A CAPITAL RESERVE FUND UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF RSA 35:1 FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT.

9. To see if the Town will VOTE TO CHANGE THE PURPOSE OF THE EXISTING HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND TO THE HEAVY HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING HEAVY HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT. 10. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF FIVE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED TWENTY FIVE DOLLARS (\$5,325.00) TO PURCHASE A NEW DUMP BODY FOR THE TOWN TRUCK AND AUTHORIZE THE WITHDRAWAL OF TWO THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND TWENTY FIVE DOLLARS (\$2,325.00) FROM THE HEAVY HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND AND THE BALANCE THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) TO COME FROM GENERAL TAXATION.

11. To see if the Town will VOTE TO ESTABLISH A CAPITAL RESERVE FUND UNDER THE PROVISION OF RSA 35:1 FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING A FIRE TRUCK.

12. To see if the Town will VOTE TO CHANGE THE FURPOSE OF THE EXISTING FIRE TRUCK CAPITAL RESERVE FUND TO THE FIRE HYDRANT EXTENSION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF BUILDING A FIRE HYDRANT LINE TO THE TOWN GARAGE AND EVENTUALLY TO THE VILLAGE CENTER, AND TO DESIGNATE THE SELECTMEN AS AGENTS TO EXPEND.

13. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000) TO BE ADDED TO THE FIRE HYDRANT EXTENSION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND previously established.

14. To see if the Town will VOTE TO CHANGE THE TAX COLLECTORS SALARY TO A FIXED AMOUNT RATHER THAN A PERCENT OF TOTAL TAXES COLLECTED AND TO ALLOW THE SELECTMEN AND TAX COLLECTOR TO SET THAT RATE.

15. To see if the Town will VOTE TO APPROVE THAT EXPENDITURES BE ITEMIZED IN THE ANNUAL REPORT AS WAS DONE PRIOR TO 1983.

16. To see if the Town will VOTE TO ABOLISH THE POSITION OF CONSTABLE AS A BALLOT POSITION IN THE TOWN OF SHELBURNE, TO BE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1989.

17. To see if the Town will VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.

18. To see if the Town will VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO APPLY FOR, RECEIVE AND EXPEND FEDERAL AND STATE GRANTS WHICH MAY BECOME AVAILABLE DURING THE COURSE OF THE YEAR, accordance with RSA 31:95b and also too accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

19. To see if the Town will VOTE TO NAME THE AREA DESIGNATED AS A PUBLIC PARK AS THE CHESTER HAYES MEMORIAL PARK.

20. "Shall we ADOPT THE PROVISIONS OF RSA 80:58-86 FOR A REAL ESTATE TAX LIEN PROCEDURE? These statues provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes".

21. TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE SAID MEETING.

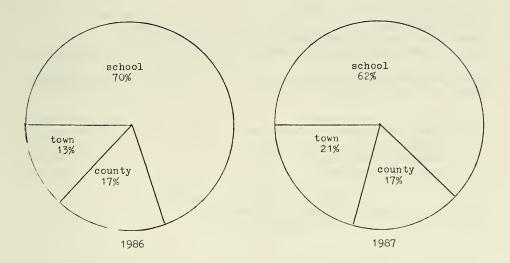

#### SHELBURNE TRUST FUND

The Shelburne Trust Funds are made up of one Common Trust Fund for perpetual care of 41 cemetery plots and one additional cemetery perpetual care fund which will be combined with the Common Trust in 1988. No new trust funds were created in 1987 since the town did not vote to accept unspecified funds.

There are four Capital Reserve Funds. School Bus, Fire Truck, Highway Equipment and Cemetery Maintenance.

All of the trust and capital reserve funds are invested at local savings banks in savings accounts, long-term certificates or money market accounts as appropriate.

Detailed accounts have been delivered to the town secretary, town auditor, the Attorney General and the Department of Revenue Administration.

#### NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council was extremely busy in 1987 as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to North Country communities.

As a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45, the Council is responsible for assisting its member communities in local town planning, regional planning, economic development and numerous other community services. In addition to the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legistlative and funding issues with the state and federal governments.

The North Country is experiencing tremendous growth and development pressures. The Council is dedicated to assisting towns with the impacts associated with these pressures. In order to more efficiently serve its membership, the Council has assigned a staff person to respond to each town's request for assistance. In this way, continuity between the town and the Council is ensured and the overall effectiveness of the Council is increased. In Shelburne, the Council attended Planning Board meetings and a site visit and also provided technical assistance on site plan regulations.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

#### MEMORIAL FOREST

An intensive fertilization program provided for an improved lawn area within the Memorial for 1987. A limited and site specific herbicide treatment resulted in the mortality of poison ivy and undesirable stump sprouting. The purchase of a power brush cutter greatly increased the area that could be cleared of small undesirable growth. The accumulated brush was disposed of by burning.

During 1988 a continued program of fertilization, brush removal and general upgrading will continue. A planting program of paper birch seedlings is hoped to be undertaken. If anyone would like to volunteer to help in the Memorial PLEASE contact any member of the Forest Commission. Your help would be greatly appreciated.

#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission continues to work on a water quality survey for the Town of Shelburne. Many drinking water systems have been sampled and tested at The Laboratory of the NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in Concord. Some problems have turned up, and although it is unhappy news, it is best to be aware of any contaminates in the water we drink.

We encourage all households to have their water checked to establish its present quality. We also hope that test results will be reported to the Commission so that a file may be developed to help protect the future quality of our drinking water.

The Conservation Commission has also agreed to walk with the Planning Board to assure that any new gravel pit operations in the Village does not damage the water supply.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1987 was a good year for the Shelburne Fire Department. There were 6 fire calls, two of which were chimney fires, one illegal brush fire, one woods fire, one oil burner fire, and one which was caused by a short circuit and did not cause any serious damage. We held our 12 monthly meetings, with an average of 6 men in attendance. Instruction periods were held on the trucks and on various pieces of equipment. A \$500 scholarship was given to Timothy Bevins, by the department and we are planning to give another one this year. The department also sponsored the children's Halloween party, held at the Town Hall. Anyone desiring to have their fields burned this Spring is asked to contact Chief William Davenport at 466-2971 as soon as possible.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1987 brought many changes to the Village of Shelburne. Several roads were accepted as town roads after the article on the ballot in 1987 and much negotiation using RSA 231:28-31 for conditional road acceptance. Although we have come along way in solving this problem there are still areas where work needs to be done for roads. Nevertheless, we are glad to be working in the direction to unify the road system in Shelburne and hopefully curtail future difficulty with the roads.

Following last year's town meeting we have been without local police protection. This year we have a good option. The town of Gorham was approached to outline a proposal for Shelburne which we feel is a good deal at this time. The plan includes a daily (or seven weekly) patrol of all roads to the state line, use of emergency number and dispatch service and 24 hour response to emergency situations. The amount stated in the warrant article must be raised and appropriated to be available but billing from Gorham will be based on a per use basis with quarterly billing. Our local position of Constable will remain on the ballot for this year. The Selectmen have placed an article on the warrant to abolish the position as a ballot item. The position of Constable in Shelburne traditionally fulfulls law enforcement and individual protection, the State of New Hampshire requires specific training to accomplish that job. The Selectmen strongly suggest that the job of Police Protection be it through Gorham or from within Shelburne be evaluated and appointed through an interview process rather than ballot election.

The New Hampshire division of charitable trusts has been throughout the state, investigating the Capital Reserve Funds held by towns. The department does not want to deny a town their reserves, they just want to make sure that all accounting procedures have been handled correctly. Our Capital Reserves are in good shape except for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve and the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve. We have worked with the Charitable Trust Division in Concord through Mrs. Terry Knowles and Mr. Whitney to repair these current funds. The two articles to create these funds accomplishes one task. Specificity and purpose of the funds is addressed in the subsequent articles. Budgetary concerns are a nationwide topic this year and Shelburne is not immune. As the town gathers property and takes on responsibilities some costs are going to rise. Be cautious as you would in your personal finances to make accurate comparisons. Be sure the rate you are evaluating will purchase the result you need. Municipality accounting is difficult. Towns are charged with responsibilities and financial liabilities that may appear incidential and simple, but in reality are controlled procedures dictated by a higher authority (State specifications). We believe that if too many corners are randomly cut, and the procedures required for a specific service are not followed that the higher regulatory body will not hesitate to shut us off.

We feel comfortable that the Town is in good shape and we will continue to investigate cost cutting measures without cutting services.

#### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

#### CEMETERY REPORT

We have approximately 41 perpetual care lots and 254 lots without perpetual care.

#### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

1. The proposed new "river zone" was approved by a vote of Town Meeting in 1987.

2. The application of Gorham Sand & Gravel for a gravel pit permit on the property bordering Meadow Rd. was considered. The application was not approved after the appropriate number of public hearings. This application is still being contested.

3. The Meyers-Chapman-Wheeler subdivision was approved.

4. By vote of Town Meeting in March, 1983, the Planning Board was authorized and enpowered "to approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for nonresidential uses or for multi-family dwelling units other than one and two family dwellings, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or re-subdivision of the site", (article #40, March 1983). The Planning Board, after due consideration and the proper public hearings, has adopted Site Plan Review Regulations.

In the upcoming months the following will be a few of the items under discussion:

1. Two new subdivisions of property are presently at the "pre-application" stage. Public hearings on these will be held at the appropriate times.

2. Although the Planning Board has approved Site Plan, Shelburne's zoning does not, at this time, contain reference to multi-family dwellings other than duplexes. This possible change will have to be discussed with an eye to the best usage of land and public hearings held.

3. The Planning Board wil also be discussing and evaluating the possible incorporation of soils-based lot size determination in our subdivision regulation.

These items will be discussed in anticipation of further rapid development, with the desire, because of this valley's physical configuaration, to give each citizen the best assurance of maintaining good ground and surface water quality, and in an attempt to allow for the "best use" of the land.

#### To the Citizens of the Shelburne School District:

After the many disruptions of the 1986-87 school year it was imperative that the new year 1987-88 begin on a sound footing. We were successful in doing just that under the able leadership of Vice Principal William Kaczenski, Acting Principal Lynn Hartman and the efforts of our experienced professional staff. A great deal of credit also goes to our support staff and our students. We have chosen to move ahead, to begin anew, to focus on what is best for our students and the communities we serve.

The Shelburne & Randolph School Boards, after two years of effort, have successfully concluded their negotiations with Gorham and have adopted a new tuition formula, a tuition formula which for all practical purposes stabilizes or reduces rates for 1988-89. Had the number of school children remained the same for 1988-89 the expenditures would have remained at 1987-88 levels. Unfortunately, growth in the community had resulted in more children of school age entering the system and this in turn has increased projected expenditures for 1988-89.

What changes will the new tuition formula bring about? Let me focus on just a few:

- Tuition rates will be computed on actual expenditures and enrollments and not on projected expenditures and enrollments,
- Tuition rates will be more competitive with those of the Berlin School System,
- 3. Tuition expenditures for equal numbers of students would have remained the same for 1988-89.
- 4. The change in tuition formula was able to be implemented in one year rather than over 3-5 years as discussed earlier,
- 5. The Gorham School Board has demonstrated that it is willing to listen to its neighbors and work out its differences with them,

6. The settlement continues a long standing relationship with Gorham for the education of Shelburne children.

The new tuition formula adopted by all three school boards will be fairer to everyone. In the past the tuition charges were based on the appropriation voted by the people in March and the expected numbers of children expected to be in school in the fall of the coming school year. The new formula is based on actual costs and actual children. This makes the Gorham tuition rates more competitive with Berlin as well as the State of New Hampshire. Needless to say the outcome is welcome, particularly at a time when costs are climbing and the number of children are on the increase. Your school board should be complimented for its effort on behalf of the people of Shelburne.

#### S.A.U. Study

Last March the voters of the Gorham School District voted to approve a petition article sponsored by the Gorham Committee for Better Schools to make a study of the feasibility of Gorham going it alone and pulling out of the S.A.U. It was the position of some and claimed by Mr. Denis Fournier and others that a substantial savings could be realized by Gorham in the administrative costs of the school system. The study was projected to cost nothing. The study has since been undertaken and the results are expected to be forthcoming at the Annual Meeting in March of this year.

Recent events have clouded the work of the S.A.U. Study Committee. Independent of the Committee and without its knowledge or consent a second petition article has been submitted by some of the same individuals who had initiated the first petition article. The second article requests the N.H. State Legislature to make a feasibility study of forming a new S.A.U. with Gorham, Randolph, and Shelburne. This article is being put forward before the Committee comes out with its report. Perhaps more importantly Shelburne, unlike that of the 1st article, has been included in the new formation without even the courtesy of being asked. These individuals have taken it upon themselves, and by doing so, have suggested they know better then Shelburne itself what is best for Shelburne. I find what has happened truly unfortunate. These people who have the audacity to even suggest they know what is best for Shelburne speak only for themselves. They do not speak for the people of Shelburne or the people of Gorham and should not be allowed to disrupt a long standing and historical relationship which has stood for many years and, if level heads prevail, will stand for many more.

#### Transportation

The transportation schedule for 1988-89 may very well change. Due to the numbers of children enrolled and expected to enroll in the fall the school board has decided to give serious consideration to double running the morning bus route. This would result in the junior-senior high school students being transported at nearly the same time as this year. However, the elementary students would be transported at a much later time. The benefits of such an arrangement are obvious. Elementary children would not only arrive approxi-

mately 45 minutes later (8:15 A.M.) and not be required to wait nearly an hour before school begins but also not be required to ride the bus with much older students for part of the day. The final decision will remain with the voters at the Annual Meeting on March 8th, 1988.

#### Summary

Though local educational issues have continued to plague and distract us from the task of education we continue to become a stronger school system. We have been fortunate to employ good administrative staff to take over the leadership roles of the schools. Our students continue to demonstrate their maturity and their interest in a quality education. And our school board continues to provide strong and decisive leadership. What more can one expect?

I wish to thank the members of the school board, particularly Gail Newell, for their leadership. It has been a pleasure working with you.

And in closing I wish to thank the people of Shelburne for allowing me the opportunity to serve as your Superintendent of Schools.
