### TOWN WARRANT

#### (L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Stratham on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for Highway improvements, raise and appropriate money for same.
- 4. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold in Town as permitted under local option laws of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate, acquired by the town, through tax collectors deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to sell its rights in a certain plot of land known as 'a town or public landing' (containing one acre more or less) situated on the banks of the Squamscott River, at the end of River road and bounded by River road, lands of Walter Queen and heirs of

Richard M. Scammon. Providing that there shall always be a public right of way to the river, and that preference in this sale be given to either of the said abutters.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the selectmen to deed to Charles H. Chase the town's rights, in as much of a piece of land as is not required for highway purposes; said piece of land being the land between said Chase's home farm and the South Side road; provided there shall be no expense to the town.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to improve Greenwood cemetery by further cleaning and laying out some lots on the unused part and by reseting some of the stones on the used part, raise and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to put in some water holes at various places in town, for use in case of fire, raise and appropriate money for same.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The number of pupils enrolled in the local schools during the last year was, as will be seen from Table II, the largest number in any year since 1918. The total enrollment up to this time this year is seventeen less. A study of the column "Total Pupils" in Table II shows interesting changes in the last fifteen years, as does the enrollment at each school. Table I shows that schooling is being furnished now to 118 pupils; last year at this time the corresponding figure was 128. Both Table I and Table II are worthy of detailed study for they show facts which tell much about the quality of the schools.

Eleven of last year's pupils entered grade seven in Exeter or Portsmouth and are doing work there which reflects credit on the teachers whom they have had for several years.

I hope that, when the district is financially able to provide special instruction in music, we may resume this service. The present corps of teachers include music in their plans, and music is taught in accordance with the plans, but a special teacher of this more or less technical subject would add greatly to the general good result. A yearly concert meeting of all the pupils of the district where the year's work in music is displayed to the public has been very beneficial. There are numerous times every year when older people wish they had been taught to sing. We shall add to the happiness of the future generation if we provide them with all possible instruction in music now. These pupils grow up to be citizens of the town, and whatever is done for them and by them now in the schools will be reflected fifteen or twenty years hence in the type of citizenship they display then.

The responsibility of providing the safest and wisest instruction in all subjects, including the art of living happily together, is a large one; much depends on it. It can only be provided by a wise and competent teaching force.

The quiet but competent work of the school nurse is also to be commended. No year can be free from illness; since my last report the usual amount has come to the Stratham schools. Prompt inspection by both nurse and health officer, however, have brought as much freedom as possible from illness.

You are to be congratulated again on the results of your attention to repairs. Every plant looks better and is better than it was a year ago. You have personally done much work for the schools and have given them much thought for which there is no pay except the satisfaction of knowing that you have helped to bring happiness and usefulness to future Stratham citizens.

My report would not be complete without commenting on the live interest of parents and citizens in our schools. The results of their labor will appear more and more in the form of material not usually provided by school districts, and in various kinds of aid to the teachers. We confidently hope and expect that better schools will be the result.
