RECORDS OF COUNTY CONVENTION

FIRST MEETING

January 8, 1947

The first meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation was held in the Gallery of Representatives Hall, directly following the afternoon session for the purpose of organization.

The meeting was called to order by Representative Oaks of Claremont Proceeded to ballot for chairman. On motion of Representative Converse of Claremont, the clerk cast one ballot for Representative Oakes of Claremont for chairman. Representative Oakes had a majority of all votes cast, was declared elected. On motion of Representative Converse of Claremont the chairman was instructed to cast one ballot for Representative Read of Plainfield for clerk. One vote was cast and Read of Plainfield was declared elected clerk.

The following delegates answered the roll call: Violet of Acworth; Beaudry, Brooks, Cahalan, Converse, Oaks, Russell, and Townsend all of Claremont; Tewksbury of Cornish; Johnson, Kenerson, Perry and Woodhull of Newport; Read of Plainfield; Russell of Sunapee.

Chairman Oakes appointed the following to serve on the Finance Committee: Russell of Sunapee, Chairman; Beaudry of Claremont, Violet of Acworth, Kenerson of Newport and Cahalan of Claremont.

As there was no other business in order, the motion was made to adjourn subject to call of chairman. Members of Claremont delegation asked to remain for discussion on town affairs.

SECOND MEETING

February 13, 1947,

The Sullivan County Delegation met in the House Gallery Thursday February 13, 1947, directly following the afternoon session. Roll Call: Present: Violet of Acworth, Beaudry, Brooks, Conve.se, Oakes, Ramsay, Russell all of Claremont; Tewksbury of Cornish; Johnson, Perry, Woodhull of Newport; Read of Plainfield; Russell of Sunapee.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Oaks. It was voted to meet at the County Farm in Unity on Monday, February 17, 1947, 10:30 o'clock a.m. for the purpose of discussing the bugdet with the County Commissioners. It was voted to ask Solicitor Hamlin and Sheriff McCusker to be present, also other County Officers. Chairman Tony Russell of the Finance Committee explained some items in the budget. Violet of Acworth discussed at some length the Welfare situation in Sullivan County.

Motion to adjourn.

Sullivan County Home, Unity, N. H.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Oakes to discuss and adopt the county budget for 1947.

Roll Call: Members of delegation present; Violet of Acworth; Beaudry, Brooks, Cahalan, Converse, Oakes, Ramsay, Russell, Townsend of Claremont, Tewksbury of Cornish; Johnson, Kenerson, Perry, Woodhull of Newport; Read of Plainfield; Russell of Sunapee. Senator Rowell of Newport was an invited guest. Commissioner Pierce presented the budget and gave a comprehensive picture of affairs of the county. Mrs. Helen Bartlett of the County Office in Newport was present with records for reference. Commissioner Pierce at this time, commended Mr. and Mrs. William George, Superintendents of the County Farm for the cooperation and splendid service they have rendered. He read a letter from the Inspectors, from the State Board of Welfare and Public Health congratulating them on the excellent care of patients and members at the home.

Discussion of Welfare cases followed with recommendation that there be some investigation. New barn well near completion. Asked the delegation for an appropriation to finance razing the old barns. Parts to be salvaged.

Stanley Colby, Farm Bureau Agent for Sullivan County, explained their estimated expenditures for 1947. Questions by members to clarify the significance of Farm Bureau work to the citizens. in relation to the expense to the County. Senator Rowell suggested the delagetion ask for representation when Farm Bureau makes up its budget.

Recess for dinner. Chairman Oakes thanked Mr. and Mrs. George in behalf of the delegation for the very fine dinner and their gracious hospitality. Delegation returned to Chapel.

Executive Session. Budget Chairman Russell gave a report with recommendations of the committee. Discussion followed. Motion 1; Representative Russell of Sunapee moved that "we authorize the Commissioners to spend an additional sum of \$7100.00 for completion of barn, and razing of old barns." Representative Russell of Claremont seconded motion. All voted in the affirmative.

Motion was made by Representative Brooks of Claremont "that the finance committee be empowered to investigate the Sheriffs Department," all voted in favor.

Motion made by Woodhull "that the Chairman appoint a committee of three to work with the commissioners to investigate and study our Welfare Problem." Chairman Oakes appointed Read of Plainfield Chairman, Brooks of Claremont and Violet of Acworth.

Motion made and supported "to authorize the Finance Committee to interview the Register of Probate to discuss the Clerk of Probate hire." All voted in favor.

Motion made by Russell of Sunapee, supported by Beaudry of Claremont, "that the County Budget as proposed by the delegation, amounting to \$ 288,000.00 be adpoted, and that we vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$155,000.00 the amount for our 1947 budget.

It was voted by the delegation to ask the Farm Bureau for a complete Budget for 1947.

Clerk was instructed to write Farm Bureau President and suggest that a member of the delegation and commissioner be allowed to confer with them when making up their budget in the future. Meeting adjourned 3:15 p. m.

Sullivan County Delegation met at County Farm at 2:00 o'clock at call of Chairman Oakes. Clerk called roll, all present. Clerk read resignation of Chairman Oakes. Voted for new Chairman, Converse and Russell tied. Converse moved to make it unanimous for Russell. Converse acted as temporary Chairman. Commissioners invited to explain need for extra funds to complete new barn. Discussion followed. Mr. Beaudry moved to grant commissioners authority to borrow upon short term notes of the county the sum of \$8500 00 to complete the building of the new barn at the Sullivan County Home.

Mr. Woodhull moved to adjourn.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws, the biennial audit and examination of the accounts of Sullivan County has been made by this Division. The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1945 and December 31, 1946. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report is made up in three sections as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Home.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

COMPARATIVE BALANCE SHEETS: (Exhibits A & G)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended Dec ember 31, 1944-1945, and December 31, 1945-1946, are presented in Exhibits A and G, respectively. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$3,603.92 in 1945 and decreased by \$3,832.74 in 1946.

RECONCILIATION OF CHANGE IN FINANCIAL CONDITION:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1945 (Exhibit A-1)

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1946 (Exhibit G-1)

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which affected the change in financial condition of the County during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1945 and December 31, 1946, are included in Exhibits A-1 and G-1, respectively.

The increase in Net Debt during the year 1945 amounted to \$3,603.92. The factors which caused this were as follows:

COMPARATIVE STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS AND EXPENDITURES — ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUES:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1945 (Exhibits B & C) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1946 (Exhibits H & I)

In the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, a net revenue surplus of \$6,930.09, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,819.82, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,110.27.

A net overdraft of appropriations of \$10,539.07, less a net

revenue surplus of \$6,842.28, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$3,696.79 in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946.

SUMMARIES OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1945 (Exhibit D) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1946 (Exhibit K)

Summaries of the receipts and expenditures of the County, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, for the years 1945 and 1946, are presented in Exhibits D and K, respectively.

STATISTICAL TABLES:

The third section of the report is comprised of statistical tables covering a ten year period from 1937 to 1946, a statement of bonded indebtedness (showing annual maturities) as of December 31, 1946, and a list of the County Officers'surety bonds. The ten year comparative tables are as follows:

ACCOUNTS OF COMMISSIONERS AND TREASURER

An examination was made of all orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the periods under review. Supporting invoices and payrolls were likewise examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1946, is indicated in Exhibit K.

CLERK OF THE SUPERIOR COURT

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Sullivan County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

COUNTY HOME

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Home were examined. Receipts of the Home were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash hook, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through remittances made to the County Treasurer.

Classified summaries of receipts and expenditures of the County Home for the years 1945 and 1946 are presented in Exhibits E and L, respectively.

GENERAL COMMENTS

In the report of our previous biennial audit for the years 1943 and 1944, the balance sheet of December 31, 1944, included as liabilities the following items:

"APPROPRIATION BALANCES:

Cottage for Help	\$2,500.00

The first item represented an appropriation included in the 1944 County Budget, while the second item was insurance received during 1944 on account of a barn which was destroyed by fire

It is noted, however, that in the County Budget for 1945, provision was made to take care of each of these items by the following appropriations included therein:

It is apparent therefore that these unexpended appropriation balances at the close of 1944, amounting to \$9,354.00, were not considered as such when the 1945 budget was prepared. In view of this fact it was necessary to make a corresponding revision in the balance sheet of December 31, which is included in Exhibit A of this report.

No expenditures were made during 1945 either on account of the County Home Barn or the House for County Home Employees, and at the close of that year the unexpended balances of each of these appropriations, amounting to \$8,854.00 and \$2,500.00, respectively, were included in the Balance Sheet liabilities. (Exhibit A).

During 1946, an expenditure of \$6,410.99 was made on the New Barn Account, leaving an unexpended balance of \$2,443.01, which appears as a liability item in the Balance Sheet of December 31, 1946, As no expenditure was made in 1946 on account of the House for Employees, the original amount of the appropriation for this purpose of \$2,500.00 was likewise set up as a liability item on December 31, 1946.

CONCLUSION:

The accounts and records of all county officials which were examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as noted, conformed to the standard procedure prescribed by this Division.

In conformance with Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, a copy of this report or a summary of its essential features should be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety. The publication of Exhibits is optional.

The appreciation and thanks of the members of this Division is hereby expressed to the officials of Sullivan County and the office staff for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith present the Annual Report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and the Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1947.

Children

The relief for children continues to climb. In 1945 the cost was \$14,040.48; in 1946 it was \$20,955.67; and in 1947 it has reached a high of \$23,207.33. For 1948 we have estimated an expenditure for children amounting to \$35,000.00. In addition to the monthly rate for board and care we furnish extra aid in the form of medical, footwear and clothing hospitalization and dental. We have recommended action on this problem. The Commissioners believe a study should be made, with the thought in mind of one or more counties erecting suitable homes for these children, where they will have proper care and be brought up under religeous training. They are our future citizens.

The Records Building

All the detailed plans have been brought up to date by the architects Orcutt and Martson, and they will soon put out feeler bids for the construction, and in the early summer months they hope to inform the building committee as to the bids.

New Cow Barn

This building is nearly completed. Due to strikes, 28 steel framed windows have not been delivered. The barn is modern in every way. The costs have been much higher than ever anticipated, but its construction is very good and it will give many years of valuable service.

County Home

It will be of interest to the Public to know that since 1944 the increase in merchandise which the Home has to purchase has amounted to 77%. Yet in spite of these heavy costs and with more inmates, the percentage of cost for maintaining the County Home and Farm has only increased 20%.

To the Public

We here want to give credit to the fine and loyal employees, and to thank the Public for entertainments and gifts at Christmas. We have purchased a new sound and motion pitcure machine for the enjoyment of the people at the Home.

We have sent special invitations to all Lodges and Orders to visit the Home,—also to the general public. We hope they will take advantage of this invitation and visit the institution.

In compiling our annual report for 1947, we were impressed by the increased cost of our purchased supplies. By referring to our 1944 bills and comparing prices of the basis commodities like coal, clothing, grain, flour, medicines, etc., with current prices we found the increased cost to be over 80. The full effect of this increased cost has been softened somewhat by a 53 gain in the cash income.

There has been a larger population at the Home than in the past few years, especially in the Hospital which has been filled to capacity most of the year. Our staff of employees has changed but little during the year, and to them, we extend our greatest appreciation for their work and loyalty

We wish to thank the various organizations and groups who have sent gifts, flowers, and given entertainments to the people at the Home.

We extend a cordial invitation to the people of our County to visit and inspect the Home at any time.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

December 31, 1947

To the County Commissioners of the County of Sullivan, New Hampshire:

I submit herewith my annual report as County Solicitor.

The year just past has been an unusually active one. During the year the following cases have been disposed of in the Superior Court:

State v Mildred Flint, forgery.

State v Louis Gouin, desertion or willful neglect or refusal to provide support of children under 16 years of age.

State v Francis Miller, desertion or willful neglect or refusal to provide support of children under 16 years of age.

State v George Fargo, desertion or willful neglect or refusal to provide support of children under 16 years of age.

State v Rowland Delmont Wheeler, desertion or willful neglect or refusal to provide support of children under 16 years of age.

State v Ruth St. Francis, Arson

State v Clemment Adelard Companion, Unnatural and lascivious act.

State v Lawrence Sherwin, fraud.

State v Archie D. Newton, Larceny.

State v Francis A. Delorier, assault with intent to kill, robbery and assault upon officers while in the performance of their duty.

State v Eugene Calhoun, aggravated assault.

State v Archille Corriveau, murder

State v Donald Heath, breaking, entering and larcenv.

State v Wilfred Boucher, breaking, entering and larceny.

State v Raymond Cornwell, breaking, entering and larceny.

State v Stanton Edward Goulette, larceny.

State v Lyle LaFayette Hutchins, larceny

Many of these cases have been disposed of under the new law which

permits respondents to waive indictment.

In addition to these cases there have been numerous non-support, larceny, simple assault and other cases disposed of in the Municipal Courts. In addition to all these cases, the latter part of December there was a poisoning of three employees of the Sullivan County Home, the investigation of which at the time of this report has not been completed.

Aside from appearances in court, about one-half of the time of the Solicitor each day is taken up with interviews of the people who have complaints to make and investigations to be followed through on behalf of the Sheriff's department.

I cannot say too much in praise of the cooperation that I have received from the State Police, the Sheriff's department, the police departments of the various towns in the County and the City of Claremont.

Again I want to point out that we have no adequate Jail in Sullivan County and no adequate House of Correction facilities. All prisoners bound over to the Superior Court have to be transported to the Hillsborough County Jail at Manchester, or if there is a hearing between the original arraignment and the time when actual hearing is held to ascertain probable cause prisoners must be transported to and from Manchester. The House of Correction is not set up so as to adequately provide for incarceration of unruly and troublesome prisoners. Outside of those who are sent to the State Prison in Concord it is the duty of each County to provide Jails and Houses of Correction for their prisoners. I cannot too strongly recommend that attention be given to the building of a Jail for the County of Sullivan and that the Jail should not be situated at the County Home in Unity. It is very desirable that the Jail and House of Correction be separated, for the jail prisoners if they are allowed to mingle with House of Correction prisoners can cause a great deal of trouble and inconvenience for the Jailer and Turnkey of the House of Correction. If a Jail is provided away from the County Home at Unity it is quite probable that the necessary steps can be taken to correct the conditions that exist in the socalled Jail there so that the House of Correction at the County Home may become adequate and have the proper supervision.

I wish to extend my appreciation to Superintendent and Mrs. George, to Dr. Munroe and the County Commissioners for their cooperation during the year.

Every County except one other County in the State provided for an increase in salary of their Solicitors, but the County delegation in Sullivan County forgot that there was a Solicitor. I hope that at the next session of the legislature that my successor's salary will be increased.
