THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls Will Be Open From 2:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wentworth Town Hall in said Wentworth on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at two of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- *2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117a of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano be adopted in this Town.
 - 4. To see if the Town will approve the 1976 Report.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town highways and bridges for the ensuing year (summer and winter).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept TRA for construction, maintenance and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V highways, and raise and appropriate or set aside for such purposes the sum of \$644.63, the State to contribute \$4,297.51.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for snow removal and/or road equipment.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

- 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to replace broken hose.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new fire fighting equipment.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Dump.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Mt. Mooselaukee Health Center.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for the Cottage Hospital Volunteer Ambulance District.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate in support of the Cottage Hospital, Woodsville, N.H.
- 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Common and Athletic Field.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Webster Memorial Library to negotiate the sale and/or lease of small portions of Library land to those abutters to said land in order to quiet title to said land.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the continuance of the Baker River Audio-Visual Center established by Federal Grant in 1974.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$425.00 as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1977. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses; regional planning studies; technical assistance to member communities; coordination with local, State and Federal agencies; and other programs of the Council. These are used in conjunction with State and Federal funds.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to apply for and receive Federal Disaster Assistance Funds through the State Disaster Coordinating Office as such funds become available.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums as may be necessary to defray costs in anticipation of the Federal Assistance Disaster Funds to be received through the State Disaster Coordinating Office.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the Town Planning Board.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500.00) for tax mapping the Town and authorize the withdrawal of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be paid from Capital Reverve Funds previously voted for that purpose.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to exempt itself from the requirements of RSA 55:9a and RSA 55:9b in the event House Bill 94 is voted into law.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to one of the Town Trustees for keeping the Town Trustee books.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept the following roads upon construction to minimum Town Road Aid standards:
 - A. A road from Route 25, following the line of Hooper Hill Road to the Donald C. Nelson property and continuing westerly to the Rowentown Road.
 - B. A road from a point on the North Dorchester Road westerly of the Gerald Hutchins' residence southerly and westerly, crossing Cheever Road to a point on North Dorchester Road near Simpson Bridge.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to abandon, and convey to the New Hampshire Water Resources Board by quitclaim deed, the following sections of road:
 - A. North Dorchester Road from a point westerly of Gerald F. Hutchins' residence, westerly to a point near Simpson Bridge.

- B. Cheever Road from its intersection with the North Dorchester Road, southerly for a distance of approximately 1600 feet.
- C. Rowentown Road, from its intersection with the North Dorchester Road, westerly to a point approximately 250 feet westerly of the Rowentown Bridge.
- D. Hooper Hill Road, from its intersection with the North Dorchester Road, northerly to a point near the Donald E. Nelson property.
- 31. To see what disposition the Town desires to make of the \$850 plus interest received from the sale of the 1940 Ford fire truck.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money if necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

*Article 2 to be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

Librarian's Report

Growth in service in the library continued sharply until mid-year, but has declined since then. The 1976 circulation rose 275 over 1975. The New Hampshire Library Statistics shows Wentworth tied in third place in per capita circulation (17.8) in towns under 2,000 in the entire state and once again number one in Bookmobile use in the North Country.

The Librarian attended the training session on Audio Visual service given at PSC by the State Library.

We borrowed 5,802 books and records from the Bookmobile in four visits and 72 direct from Interlibrary Loan.

The paperback book swap has proved a very active service and we always welcome more. Forty one books and six records were purchased with the money collected from fines and lost material. Two hundred and fifty one books have been given to the library this year.

Our part-time RN is now working twenty hours a week more than in 1975 for a total of 26 hours. This gives the Agency 106 hours weekly for available nursing care.

REPORT OF THE NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

The Council met with the Selectmen to review the revised federal flood insurance maps. The Council will be working on the appeal for changes of these maps. The Council met with local officials on one occasion.

The Council assisted the NH Public Utilities Commission in preparing an application for Economic Development Administration funds which are being

used to improve the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line.

On a regional level, North Country Council, Inc. completed the Overall Economic Development Program, a blueprint for increasing the region's economic potential. The Council assisted several communities in making progress with the development of their Industrial Parks, projects which will benefit residents of adjacent communities. With the passage of the Local Public Works Act of 1976, the Council provided some form of technical assistance to 25 potential grant applicants. A wood utilization project is investigating how forest products, the region's most important natural resource, can be used more advantageously to the region's benefit. Word was received in late 1976 that the Federal Highway Administration approved the Public Transportation Demonstration project.

On a community planning level, in addition to local technical services, the Council prepared a report entitled "Model Subdivision Regulations" as a guide for local planning boards. A series of four lectures on planning board activities was sponsored in the spring; the Council co-sponsored a series of five municipal law lectures in September and October. Both were well attended. "Guidelines for Municipal Tax Mapping" provides communities with information on what to look for when preparing a tax map.

<u>Planning News</u>, the Council's quarterly newsletter, disseminates useful information on community planning, economic development, state legislation, court decisions, and general activities to interested persons in town. A town resident can be placed on the mailing list by contacting the town's NCC representative or the Council office in Franconia, N.H., at 823-8108.

In helping communities with their planning, the Council attends approximately 200 night meetings a year.

In 1977, the Council will continue to provide community planning services to member municipalities. The Council will complete work on a Land Use Program and Housing Program in 1977. Efforts to help communities with economic development will continue. The Council's Economic Development Committee will be investigating the probable impact of the lessening of energy supplies for the North Country and how the Council can assist through the community and regional planning process.

The Council sincerely appreciates and thanks the town for its support and participation. The support and participation of the town has enabled the Council to provide an impressive package of local and regional services.

Another year has ended, and again, due primarily to the selfless concern of many people, our area has had available the services of a volunteer corps of well-trained licensed ambulance driver-attendants dedicated to alleviating the ills and suffering of their fellow citizens. It is a group of which we can be proud. These people work with no remuneration other than the gratification of a job well done. It is only by the concerted efforts of all our citizens that a service such as this is possible.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF and TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

Memorial Day was marked at the Sunday Church service by Harold Brown reading the names of those who served our country.

In June, Freedom Scrolls signed by the school children and the townsfolk were forwarded to Concord to be shipped to Valley Forge with thousands of others from all over the country.

July 4, naturally, was a big day. At two o'clock Grover Breck tolled the Church bell 200 times and then a parade, formed in Bernier's parking lot, marched up to and around the Common and down to Hamilton Field where costume prizes were awarded and refreshments served the participants.

All kinds of field games and contests were next enjoyed ending with a tug-a-war helped by the Wentworth and Warren firemen. Festivities were in charge of Candy and George Ports.

In August, we presented the Little Red Wagon, a troupe of delightful players from UNH, who sang, danced, mimed and generally enthralled everyone on the Common.

The Bi-Cen Players (formed during our own Bicentennial in 1966) presented "You Can't Take It With You", a three-act comedy by Kaufman and Hart on October 8, 9, and 10. They were subsidized by money from the Bicen. Fund, but with the receipts from three well-attended nights they were able to repay the Fund.

Directed by Marcella Hoffmann assisted by Brenda Coddaire, Wanita Downing, George Evers, Cecilia Jones, and Judy and Colin McKinnon, the cast included: Irene, Conrad, and Therese Deutsch, Meredith Champlin, Thomas Latus, Jack Jones, Clinton Hutchins, Carole Ann Bernier, Francis Muzzey, Gary Jesseman, Ruth and Thomas Tilson, Candace and George Ports, Sharon Bird, Milo Cheney, Alfred Brown, and Edward Cheney.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Wentworth, in the County of Grafton, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wentworth School in said district on the third day of March, 1977 at 7:30 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers.
- 2. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to negotiate and execute on behalf of the School District written contracts with other School Districts for the education of secondary school pupils provided, however, that the School Board shall not enter into any written contract providing for aid for tuition to be paid to any other School District in excess of that tuition which would be paid to the Plymouth AREA High School.
- 3. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to negotiate and execute on behalf of the School District written contracts with private secondary schools that aid to tuition be provided, not to exceed that tuition which would be paid to Plymouth AREA High School, to those students wishing to attend a private school.
- 4. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to study the feasibility and benefits of withdrawal from Supervisory Union #48 and alignment with an alternate Union.
- 5. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to enter into a study leading to the possible formation of a Cooperative School District with the Town of Orford and to formulate a Cooperative School Planning Board.
- 6. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to sell the old school site, the money from said sale to go into a Capital Reserve Fund.
 - 7. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum

of \$360 for course reimbursement for teachers to be expended at School Board authorization.

- 8. To see if the School District will vote for a modification of present bus routes from the so-called portal to portal basis to a fixed station bus route.
- 9.To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$3110 to defray unanticipated expenditures for special education and related transportation during the school year 1976-1977.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, accept, and expend on behalf of the School District all gifts, advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be available or forthcoming from the United States government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other federal, state, or local agency.
- 11. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, employees and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

WENTWORTH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL Principal's Report

On August 26th, I accepted the position of Principal, assuming operational management on Sept. first. All four new teachers met each other on September second. School opened, on time, September sixth.

With a priority of Safety and Sanitation, I instituted a sweeping analysis of needs. Fire regulations were immediately put into effect. The School was scrubbed top to bottom. All wooden desk tops were sanded of five years accumulation of verbiage and re-finished; labor by the Principal with resident volunteers using material donated by the P.T.O.

Pupil pride and responsibility in the School was emphasized. Sportsmanship as an educational behavior goal was make a requirement for continued school team membership. In Physical Education the development of motor skills as a basis of team skills was instituted. The Winter Thursday PM Program was expanded and amended to include skating and gymnastics, so that no child was excluded due to monetary or personal causes.

A new form of Report Cards was presented to point out the seriousness of the "back to basics" in academic subjects. Long range curriculum development, based upon Wentworth pupil needs, rather than material available, has begun.

It is hoped that the Town will support the efforts of its Teachers to bring the School up to national norms.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1975-76

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be make for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$20,000 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1975-1976 was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$17,500 was prorated among the school districts comprising the Supervisory Union. Allowance for \$1,000 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of the Assistant Superintendent during 1975-1976 was made up as follows: \$2,350 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$14,650 was prorated as stated above. Allowance for \$1,500 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
