

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**ANNUAL TOWN MEETING  
WOLFEBORO, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

March 6, 1973

Brewster Town Hall

10:00 AM

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the Meeting was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by the Moderator, Russell Chase.

After reading Article 1 and 2 pertaining to the election of officers, a motion was made by Thomas O'Dowd and seconded by Don Guzman, to refrain from reading the entire warrant until the evening meeting. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the moderator. Balloting took place from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M., at which time Thomas O'Dowd made the motion that the meeting adjourn to reconvene at Kingswood Regional High School at 7:00 P.M. to consider the remaining Articles contained in the warrant. Seconded by Don Guzman, and carried.

At 7:00 P.M. the meeting was called to order by Moderator Russell Chase. Mr. Chase asked Robert F. Thurrell who had served as moderator for Wolfeboro for over 25 years, to stand for recognition from the gathering.

As Mr. Chase was acting as Moderator for the first time, he explained the procedures he planned to follow when conducting the Town Meeting. Henry Stevens made the motion, seconded by Guy Foss to refrain from reading the entire Warrant, but read each Article as it is acted upon, voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 3.** To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote passed by Article 18 of the Warrant for the 1971 Annual Town Meeting; appropriate for the construction and equipping of a sewage treatment plant, \$1,500,000.00 or any other sum; determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; authorize the Selectmen to contract for and accept any Federal or State construction grants in connection with this project; or take any other action relative thereto. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.) Dr. Lawrence S. Toms made the motion to accept Article 3 as read, seconded by Robert Thurrell, voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the moderator. Balloting by written ballot began at 7:10 P.M. and the polls were kept

open for the required two hour period. Three hundred fifty five (355) ballots were cast. 336 Yes 19 No.

**Article 4.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the construction of a Police-Fire Station Building, to determine whether such an appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, or to take any other action relative thereto. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.) Dr. Lawrence S. Toms made the motion to pass over Article 4 until Articles 5, 6 & 7 were acted upon, seconded by Charles E. Foss. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 5.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund for period January 1, 1972 to December 31, 1973, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purpose in the amount indicated or take any other action hereon: (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Appropriation	Amount
Partial payment toward Police-Fire Building	\$40,029.00

Motion made by Leslie Rankin, seconded by Dr. Warren Brodrick to accept Article 5 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the funds received from the sale of the Bell Shop, Lehner Street, and the sale of land known as "Brown's Pasture" through tax sale for the purpose as follows: (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Partial Payment toward Police-Fire Building	\$23,500.00

Motion was made by Dr. Lawrence S. Toms, seconded by Leslie Rankin, to accept Article 6 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 7.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize funds held by the Trustees of Trust Funds, known as the Martha A. Goodwin Funds for the following purpose: (This Article

recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Partial Payment toward Police-Fire Building	\$96,000.00

Motion was made by Charles Foss, seconded by Alan Stevens to accept Article 7 as read. A Motion was made to amend Article 7 not to exceed \$60,000. Seconded by Warren Thompson. Discussion followed. Voice vote on the Amendment was in the negative. Voice vote was then taken on Article 7 as originally read, and was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 4.** A motion was made to raise \$90,000.00 by Municipal Finance Act. Seconded by John McDermott, Balloting started at 7:58 P.M. and the polls were kept open the required two hours. Result was 375 ballots cast, 293 yes 82 no.

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise. Motion was made by John Ballard, seconded by Marshall Murray to accept Article 8 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 9.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes. Motion made by Donald Hallock, seconded by Norman Rankin. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in this report and listed in the Budget. Motion was made by Dr. Lawrence S. Toms to postpone action on Article 10 until Article 16 has been acted upon, seconded by Guy L. Foss. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will approve the allocation of all funds received from the sale of timber cut on Town owned land for the sole use of the Conservation Commission bank account and withdrawn only with the approval of the Board of Selectmen and a majority of the Conservation Commission.

(This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.) Motion was made by Gordon Reade, seconded by C. Warren Brodrick to accept Article 11 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 12.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to advertise for sealed bids for the sale of Clay Pit located on Middleton Road, and authorize them to reject all bids and negotiate for the sale of said properties should the highest bid, in their opinion, not meet with the best interest of the Town. Motion was made by Richard S. Clarke, seconded by Warren Thompson, to adopt Article 12 as read. Guy L. Foss explained the location of Clay Pit. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 13.** To see if the Town will establish a Contingency Fund of \$10,000.00 to meet the cost of expenses not anticipated that may arise during the year. A detailed report of all Expenditures from the Contingency Fund shall be made by the Selectmen and published with the Town Report. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.) Motion was made by John Ballard, seconded by Donald Brookes to accept Article 13 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 14.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the Wolfeboro Planning and Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Planning Board. Voted by written ballot. All passed in the affirmative.

**Article 15.** To take the sense of the qualified voters as to when licenses are issued for public functions under RSA Chapters 105 and 286; for the Town to institute a fee to cover the cost of additional Police protection as authorized by State Statutes. This cost is currently being defrayed by Town appropriations to the Police Department. Motion made by Otis Bird seconded by Raymond Berry to adopt Article 15 as read. Discussion followed. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 16.** To see if the Town will authorize the expenditure of \$11,500.00 to be transferred from the Capital Reserve Fund for the following purchases:



a. Reimburse the General Fund in the amount of \$5,000.00 for purchasing of the sidewalk plow. (This procedure was voted at the 1972 Town Meeting)

b. Withdraw \$3,000.00 to be applied toward the purchase of two (2) trucks for the Highway Department.

c. Withdraw \$3,500.00 for the purchasing of a new police cruiser for the Police Department.

(Sections a, b, and c, of this Article approved by the Budget Committee)

The Funds are to be transferred from the Trustees of Trust Funds and transferred to the Town of Wolfeboro with purchases to be made by the Board of Selectmen. Motion was made by Dr. Lawrence S. Toms to adopt Article 16 as read, seconded by Leslie Rankin. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 10.** Motion was made by Dr. Lawrence S. Toms, seconded by Guy L. Foss to adopt Article 10 as read. Douglas Parsons made an amendment to Article 10 to increase the Library appropriation from \$7,200. to 9,200. Seconded by George Walker. Voice vote on the amendment was in the affirmative. Voice vote on Article 10 as amended was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 17.** To see if the Town will vote that No Public Hearings on proposed amendments to the Town's Zoning Ordinances may be held without including a detailed statement of the proposed changes in all the legally required notices that must be published in the Granite State News. (This Article presented by petition.) Motion made by Henry Maxfield, seconded by Leslie Rankin to adopt Article 17 as read. A motion was made by Russell Clafin, seconded by C. Warren Brodrick to amend Article 17 by adding after the word "changes" the phrase "known at the time of publication" and changing the words "the Granite State News" to "a paper of general circulation in the town", so that the Article shall read: Article 17. To see if the Town will vote that No Public Hearings on proposed amendments to the Town's Zoning Ordinances may be held without including a detailed statement of the proposed changes known at the time of publication in all the legally

required notices that must be published in a paper of general circulation in the town. George Walker made a motion, seconded by Edward Ryan to divide the Amendment. Show of hands was in the affirmative. Voice vote on the first division of the amendment was not clear, so a show of hands was yes 136, and no 176 — vote in the negative. Vote on the seconded part of the amendment, regarding paper notices, was in the affirmative. Voice vote on Article 17 as amended was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 18.** To see if the Town will vote on the following: Do you favor the continuation of the Town Manager Plan as now in force in this Town? (This Article presented by petition) Voted on by ballot. Results were as follows: Yes 578 No 298.

**Article 19.** To see if the Town will vote to designate the following Town-owned secondary roads as Scenic Roads under provisions of RSA 253:17 and 18:

1. Cotton Valley Road from Frost Corner up over Cotton Mountain to the Stoneham Road.
2. Stoneham Road from Dimon Corner to the top of Cotton Mountain Road to the Brookfield Line.
3. Pleasant Valley Road from the junction of Route 28 to the Brookfield Line.

The purpose being to protect, enhance, and maintain the scenic beauty of Wolfeboro. And, further, that the Selectmen of said Wolfeboro shall, regarding such roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7 (I).

Motion was made by John Ballard, seconded by Warren Thompson to adopt Article 19 as read. Discussion followed. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so declared by the Moderator.

**Article 20.** To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Study Committee, to report back to the Town, with recommendations for adopting a Building Code, Plumbing Code and Electric Code. Motion was made by Peter Brewitt, seconded by Alan Stevens to adopt Article 20 as read. Voice vote was in the affirmative and so carried.

**Article 21.** To conduct such other business that may legally come before the meeting. Richard S. Clarke expressed thanks to Russell Chase for the excellent job he did in conducting the Town Meeting. Motion was made and seconded to recess to the Town Hall for the counting of the ballots.

Town meeting ended at 12:15 with the administering of the oath of office to all those newly elected officers present, the others to receive the oath from the Town Clerk.

# REPORT OF THE BUILDING CODES STUDY COMMITTEE

To: The Board of Selectmen and Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro.

In response to your vote at the last annual Town Meeting, a study committee was selected by the Board of Selectmen. The committee was set up with three sub-committees each chaired by one member. Those men selected were as followed:

Electrical Code Committee - Ernest S. Jones  
Building Code Committee - D. Davis Mitchell  
Plumbing Code Committee - Frank Langevin

Through the summer and early fall, the various committees met several times, studied various codes, and made many recommendations. These recommendations were submitted to me and I then met with the Board of Selectmen and presented the various reports and answered questions. At that meeting, the Selectmen suggested that they would review the reports and call on us if they wanted further clarification.

Briefly, the Electrical Committee recommends that the Town adopt the National Electrical Code as the standard for all future wiring.

The Building Code Committee also recommended utilizing the National Building Code as a standard for all building. This committee also recommended a section of the Concord, New Hampshire Code that is relevant to mobile homes, and swimming pools, etc. It was also felt that all future buildings in Wolfeboro should be equipped with heat and smoke detectors.

The Plumbing Code Committee recommended that the BOCA Basic Plumbing Code be adopted as the standard for future plumbing.

This group generally felt that plumbers and electricians should be licensed but noted that New Hampshire does not presently have a State Licensing Board. The committee was in full agreement that to adopt these recommendations would be of little or no value unless some arrangement is made to have fully qualified inspectors to supervise or inspect the work that is done.

This is only a summary of major points that were studied and discussed and reported to the Board of Selectmen. I would like to thank those men who served on the committees giving

many hours of their time so that these recommendations could be made to you. These men feel that these recommendations, if adopted, will help to protect the public and insure a better community.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## TOWN WARRANT

### THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Town Hall Building in said Wolfeboro on Tuesday, the 5th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to six o'clock in the afternoon at which time an adjournment will take place, and the meeting will be called to order at seven o'clock in the afternoon at the Kingswood Regional High School, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Treasurer for one year, one Auditor for two years, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Police Commissioner for three years and three members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 3. To vote (1) to recind the vote passed under Article 3 of the Warrant for the 1973 annual town meeting; (2) to appropriate \$1,500,000 for the construction and equipping of a sewage treatment plant; (3) to authorize the Selectmen to raise this appropriation by borrowing \$1,500,000 under the Municipal Finance Act; and (4) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to contract for and accept Federal or State aid which shall be spent for the project provided that the total authorized borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of Federal construction grants. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 4. To vote (1) to appropriate \$1,210,000 for the acquisition of land and the construction thereon of additional tertiary facilities for the Town's sewage systems and treatment works; (2) to authorize the Selectmen to raise this appropriation by borrowing \$1,210,000 under the Municipal



Finance Act; and (3) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to contract for and accept Federal or State aid which shall be spent for the project provided that the total authorized borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of Federal construction grants. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund for period from October 1, 1973 to December 31, 1974 established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purpose in the amount indicated or take any other action hereon: (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in this report and listed in the Budget.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will approve the allocation of all funds received from sale of timber cut on Town owned land for the sole use of the Conservation Commission bank account and withdrawn only with the approval of the Board of Selectmen and a majority of the Conservation Commission.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will establish a Contingency Fund of \$10,000 to meet the cost of expenses not anticipated that

may arise during the year. A detailed report of all expenditures from the Contingency Fund shall be made by the Selectmen and published with the Town Report.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendments to the Wolfeboro Planning and Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Planning Board and by petition to amend the Planning and Zoning Ordinance so as to establish an Historic District and authorize the appointment of an Historic District Commission.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the voters of the Town of Wolfeboro will authorize the Selectmen to lease to the Wolfeboro Branch Railroad Club the old Wolfeboro Railroad Station, said building to be restored by the Club, over a period of years and used as a Railroad Station. The above mentioned lease would be for a period of five (5) years, with an option to renew for another five (5) years, at a rent not to exceed \$100.00 per month. (This Article presented by petition). (This Article not recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will approve of the present fire station being made available to the organizations of the Town as a community center upon completion of the new building. (This Article presented by petition)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise an amount not to exceed \$18,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a Youth Center (Approximately 800 square feet). The exact location of the building site to be determined by the Board of Selectmen. (This Article presented by petition) (This Article not recommended by the Budget Committee or the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and contract for and accept from, to spend any and all money made available to the Town through the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration or any other State or Federal Agency, to repair damage that occurred during a period or time when a disaster was declared.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to contribute to the Wolfeboro "Meals on Wheels Program", the sum of \$3,168.00.

(This Article not recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following codes:

1. National Electrical Code, 1971 Edition.
2. National Building Code, 1967 Edition and a section of the Concord, New Hampshire Code that applies to mobile homes, swimming pools, etc.
3. BOCA Basic Plumbing Code, 1970 Second Edition.
4. And to further adopt any updated edition of the above mentioned codes. (This Article recommended by the Building Codes Study Committee)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to present to the next annual Town Meeting, a program for fees, enforcement, licenses, inspection and all other costs and procedures required to enforce the three building codes.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote \$15,000.00 to be applied to the construction costs of the Police-Fire Building to cover the deficit from the Goodwin Fund as voted at the 1973 Town Meeting. (This Article recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund; expenditure from same to be only upon approval of Town Meeting. Source of fund to be derived as follows for 1974, if available:

Municipal Electric Department from earnings	\$7,500 00
Water and Sewer Department from earnings	5,000.00
Town from Surplus	20,000.00

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to carry over until 1975, all funds available from the Town and State of New Hampshire for the reconstruction of Waumbec Road, under the TRA program.

ARTICLE 22. And to conduct such other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Budget Committee has carefully reviewed the Budget requests of the Board of Selectmen and the Police Commission. Of prime concern have been the payrolls of the various town departments. This year the cost of living increase granted to non-salaried employees was 7.9 percent, which accounts for a substantial percentage of the increase in the total budget. A sub-committee of the Budget Committee will continue to update the present Employment Policy of the Town Departments.

The following areas within the budget require brief comment or clarification:

Back Bay, \$13,000.00 — an additional \$3,000.00 for a drainage survey has been added to the annual \$10,000. commitment.

Public Safety Building, \$52,406.00 — is divided in the following manner:

\$24,700.00 Contract Cost overrun

15,000.00 Value loss of the Goodwin Fund

6,934.00 For Equipment and furnishings

5,772.00 For maintenance, insurance, phones and heat.

Wharves, \$12,000.00. A concrete and steel pile dock replacement in the central wharf area.

New Construction, \$25,150.00 — \$3,000.00 for public rest rooms in the present Youth Center, the remainder to rebuild a portion of Lehner Street.

Sewer & Tertiary Treatment, \$1,500,000.00—Due to a legal technicality the Town Meeting is being asked, for the third time, to approve the Sewer Project.

This year an additional \$1,210,000. for tertiary treatment is presented for approval. The town's share is \$60,500.00 to be raised by bond issue, the remainder to be from State and Federal Sources.

The Budget Committee has repeated last year's request to establish a Capital Reserve. An explanation with some of the arguments both pro and con follow the formal budget. It has also been brought to the attention of the Chairman that mention should be made of the fact that the budget figures and recommendation as presented only reflect majority opinion. In some instances dissent over an item or the philosophy that led to that item have been duly recognized and so entered in the minutes.

### CAPITAL RESERVE REPORT

The Budget Committee in accord with the Board of Selectmen repeat the proposal for a capital reserve. We have incorporated improvements we hope will have more appeal to the voter. Expenditures from the fund will be made only with the approval of the Town Meeting. Contributions will be received on an available basis for a period of three years, from surplus and the revenue departments. At the end of this time, along with \$12,000. of original funds and interest, an amount of \$136,000. will be available. The equipment listed below should be replaced along the outline given. We realize that circumstances and economic conditions may alter this plan to a certain extent, but it is a plan for the future, something unavailable in prior years.

Any discussion of this proposal brings forth the argument whereby the reserve will save uninflated dollars to buy equipment with an inflated price. The argument continues stating that it would be better to borrow the money and repay with inflated dollars. However, this latter policy would be from the tax dollar, whereas the reserve would be from surplus funds only.

### **REQUEST TO USE CONTINGENCY FUND MONEY**

#### **I IN 1973 BUDGET**

We, the undersigned, Board of Selectmen of Wolfeboro, New Hampshire ask the approval of the Wolfeboro Budget Committee to use Contingency Fund money contained in the 1973 Budget for the following:

1. **PLANS FOR PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING:** Since no money was appropriated during 1973 to reproduce plans, specifications and other miscellaneous costs related to the Public Safety Building (Police—Fire Building), we ask that \$547.07 be reimbursed to the General Fund from the Contingency Fund.

2. **ELECTION & REGISTRATION:** We ask that \$484.36 be reimbursed to the General Fund from the Contingency Fund to cover the amount above the budgeted figure for 1973. The reason for the additional cost was the extra Town Meeting that was necessary for accepting the Disaster Funds.

3. **RESCUE SQUAD TRAINING COURSE:** We ask that \$273.00 be reimbursed to the General Fund from the Contingency Fund to cover the additional cost to the Rescue Squad for their having to send their personnel to classes to qualify for Emergency Medical Training.

4. **PUBLIC WORKS:** We ask that \$3,000.00 be reimbursed to the General Fund from the Contingency Fund to cover the expenditures for having to purchase tires in view of the fact that there would be a shortage and price increase.

5. **DOG OFFICER:** We ask that \$239.43 be reimbursed to the General Fund from the Contingency Fund to cover the additional cost for the Dog Officer. At the time the 1973 Budget was being prepared, this work was being done by a member of the Police Department. With the hiring of a new Dog Officer, independent of the Police Department, the hourly rate and

mileage exceeded the budget.

Should all items meet with your approval, this would amount to \$4,543.86 being withdrawn from the Contingency Fund.

## SELECTMEN'S PROGRESS REPORT

The annual report to the inhabitants of Wolfeboro, by the Selectmen, becomes more of a pleasure at each writing. We believe that 1973 has been another in a series of successful and productive years for the Town.

The College Road project, after much effort and planning, has been completed to Frost Corner thus allowing plans to be made to utilize TRA Funds on another area of our highway program.

The policy adopted for using gas tax funds to rebuild in-town roads allowed the Town to rebuild Central Avenue and Railroad with a projection of the complete rebuilding of Lehner Street in the near future. We realize this needs to be done in stages, but its completion should prove an asset to the Town.

A new compressor and new air tanks were installed at the present fire station and thanks to the staff of the Fire Department, much of the cost was saved by the work done by the Department.

The inhabitants of the Town went on record as not in favor of the site proposed for the Route 28 by-pass as proposed by the State Department of Highways and we understand this project has been dropped for the immediate future.

The Back Bay recreational area is well ahead of schedule and we hope the total project will be completed and available by 1975, but prior to that time, we hope several phases will be usable and operating. We wish to thank the civic groups within the Town for assistance in planning and also for contributions of funds.

Mr. Joseph Milot was appointed Dog Officer for the Town in the Spring of 1973 and following public hearings, a Dog Ordinance was adopted for the Town. We congratulate Mr. Milot on the commendable work he has done in this field.

The voters, at the 1973 Town Meeting approved funds for the new Police-Fire Building and the contract was awarded to

the Beaver Corporation early in the Fall. We find ourselves unable to list the number of persons, contractors and sub-contractors to whom we are indebted for the speedy and efficient results we have seen to date as we have watched the work progress on this project.

Final plans for the sewage treatment plant were approved by both State and Federal Agencies and we believe the project will go out for bids early in 1974. The proposed water line, voted for the North Main Street stand pipe, we will attempt to construct at the same time, thus utilizing one resident engineer for both projects at a substantial saving for the Town. In this same area, the Town was informed that funds were available for Tertiary Treatment of the waste water from the Sewage Treatment Plant. The Selectmen were informed that these funds must be applied for prior to February 1, 1974 or the funds would go to another area. This date being more than a month prior to Town Meeting, the Selectmen decided to apply for the funds and the agencies involved agreed to allow the application to be worded "contingent on the vote of the Town at its next annual Town Meeting." This has reserved the monies until the voters have had an opportunity to take action.

The contract for the purchase of power between the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire and the Town of Wolfeboro expired on October 25, 1973. A new contract was negotiated and the Town, in the contract, insisted on being able to operate our Municipal Plant at the discretion of, and in the best interest of, the inhabitants of Wolfeboro. Public Service agreed to this stipulation and as a result, much needed maintenance and overhauling was done to make certain the operating plant was placed in the best conditions possible. The Town also has retained sufficient personnel to operate whenever necessary.

Late in the year, a new problem presented itself to the Town in the form of a fuel and gasoline shortage. Following many meetings, an almost unbelievable cooperation from all departments and the officials of the Regional School, an allocation system was devised which we believe will allow complete service to continue, with only a minimum of inconvenience and no major hardships.

The Town was again able to reduce the tax rate without a general increase in assessments. The Board did place a moratorium on building in effect, in order to allow the Town to have some control over growth in the areas where additional requests for utility services would have been dangerous to the health and welfare of the Townspeople as a whole, but we anticipate this problem will be solved in the very near future.

We wish to express our gratitude to the inhabitants, both resident and non-resident, for the support and cooperation extended to us and hope your confidence placed in us has not caused you regret.

We wish to end our report by saying thank you to all those employees and Department heads for a job well done and with your continued assistance and dedication, Wolfeboro will always be a Town whose name is spoken of with respect and pride.

# REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

1973

The year of 1973 was essentially an average healthy one. There are fewer cases of children's contagious diseases such as measles, mumps, German measles, etc. due to the increased number of children that have been immunized. Each year the number of cases of these diseases should continue to lessen because the State of New Hampshire law requires all adequate immunizations before attending school. A notable exception is the elimination of vaccination against smallpox by Federal law because of the absence of this disease in this country for many years and the danger, even though exceedingly rare, of a reaction to the vaccination.

Cases of venereal disease are still occurring but to no great number in this community.

The new Modern Sinclair Wing at Huggins Hospital has been most successful and patients, especially, have been most pleased. The Public Health Nursing Association, the Carroll County Mental Health offices, and, most recently, the office for the Meals on Wheels are now located in the hospital.

The community has been most fortunate in having Dr. Margaret Deutsch and Dr. Larry Deutsch establish their offices in the hospital in their specialty of Family Practice.

With the Energy Crisis and Watergate in everyones mind, we should remember that Pollution and Ecology are still as important as ever and they require our interest and our cooperation.

As always, discussion of the health situation in Wolfeboro would not be complete without giving appreciation to our Public Health Nursing personnel, to our Ambulance Service, to our Rescue Squad and to our Carroll County Mental Health Services.

# Report of Wolfeboro Highway Department

## 1973

In summarizing the activities of this department, it should be brought to the attention of everyone that this department participated in more different and varied projects this year than it has in the past. Because of projects like Railroad and Central Avenues which were rebuilt, it was the opinion of the Selectmen that the job could be accomplished quicker and cheaper if the personnel of the various departments could pitch in for a short period of time. This has been done during the past two years when Glendon St. and the center of town was both done utilizing the employees of this department. The Back Bay Recreational Area also consumed some of the year for this department. As sand was trucked in, loam moved around and other work, this department contributed their efforts and manpower.

At the 1973 Town Meeting, the people of Wolfeboro raised sufficient money to complete the College Road project. This action was taken by the Town in lieu of prolonging the work for three years at the normal rate. Since this was a sizeable project, the department employees and equipment spent the better part of July and August assisting the State of New Hampshire to complete the work. Now that it is completed, everyone is proud of the efforts of all who participated.

The reconstruction of Railroad and Central Avenues utilized the efforts and ingenuity of everyone concerned. To utilize the present sidewalks, making the finished project look like new sidewalks and granite curbing, required the patience and imagination of everyone. The existing roadway was too good to throw away, therefore, reshaping was the answer. To our summer residents who left after Labor Day of 1972 and didn't return till June of 1973, what a change they saw.

Other projects for the year was the surfacing of the town leased parking lot at the rear of the Hatch Theater. Also,

the Mast Landing parking area was graveled and tarred. Four hundred and forty feet of culvert pipe was used to change the pipes at various locations. Because of the heavy rains at the end of June, the State of New Hampshire was eligible for Disaster Funds from the Federal Government. Wolfeboro became eligible for over \$3,000.00 of this money to repair sections of roadway which was damaged.

Roads that were oiled were Oakwood Road, Helen Bryant, Haines Hill Stoneham, Pleasant Valley, End of Forest Road, Cotton Mt., and others totaling 42 per cent of the non permanent paved roads. This work was required because of the quick thaw the area had last March and April.

The Town purchased two new dump trucks for this department during 1973. Since the original purchase order was not filled by October, the Selectmen authorized the quick purchase of two and the price to be within the amount of the budget. These were found, equipped with snow plows and made ready for winter. They are not the normal orange color at this time but they will be next year when time permits.

The energy crisis hit this department during December when the allocation of gas was cut back unexpectedly. Because of the fine winter weather and very little snow, this department cut back their normal use of gasoline and helped the Town and School District to operate on a cut back schedule.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many towns people who have helped me so much and a thank you to all of the town employees of the departments for their help and cooperation.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

### WATER DEPARTMENT — 1973

The main line meter reading for 1973 was 158,713,000 gallons. The average daily flow was 434,830 gallons. The average flow per minute was 306 gallons.

I stated last year that the 10'' water line was ready for bids, but due to unforeseen circumstances, this did not happen. It should take place in 1974.

I commented on how well people in arrears were doing with their accounts, but that has levelled off. It seems there is a certain element of people that must be lonely; phone calls and notes are a form of entertainment, they get enough of them. Rates charged for water and services are most always debated by these people as a means of stalling payment that much longer. If a bill is rendered that is not satisfactory, the time to debate it is when you get the bill. It could be to your benefit and the sooner it is settled makes for better relationship between you and the Department. Our paying customers realize this.

Replacing 2" galvanized line with 6" cast iron pipe on Pine Street, has not been completed yet since the 2" pipe left the road and went into peoples' lawns to avoid the ledge, so by staying in the road we have had to blast ledge that comes to the surface. Hopefully, we will be able to complete this project in 1974.

The major work scheduled for 1974 is getting the 10" main from Pine Hill Cemetery across country to North Main Street.

I wish to thank all Department heads and personnel for their cooperation this past year.

Gentlemen:

Herewith the annual report of the Wolfeforo Police Department for the year 1973 and comparisons with the year 1972. Included are activities of the department, annual police budget and chief's report.

The following figures reflect the changes in reported crimes from January 1973 to June 1973 in those areas most affected by crime rise.

Violent crimes increased 3 per cent in the northeastern states and 12 per cent in the rural areas in the same region.

It is readily noticeable that once again the rural areas of the northeastern states have shown a substantial increase of crime, especially in crimes of violence and it should be pointed out that the town of Wolfeforo falls within this reporting area, although these increases are not reflected in our yearly report for 1973. We feel that this is true because the citizens of Wolfeforo have chosen to give their local police department the tools with which to work, namely a realistic budget and the men necessary to carry out a good prevention program.

In the area of motor vehicle activity, it should be noted that there was a decrease in drunken driver arrests for the second year. Sixty eight DWI arrests in 1972 and forty eight in 1973: although there was a total of eighty four breathalyzer tests performed in 1973, thirty six tests were performed for other departments. This indicates a decline of 29 per cent of DWI arrests in 1973 although motor vehicle arrests show a gain of 4 per cent in 1973. This indicates that the department carried on an effective prevention program on the highways which resulted in fewer people willing to take the chance of driving after drinking and perhaps being arrested or causing death or injury while under the influence of liquor. This is good.

Although our criminal activities indicate fewer cases, a decline of 59 per cent, criminal arrests decreased by only 21 per cent, which indicates that although there were fewer criminal cases, more arrests were made, carrying more cases to a successful conclusion. This is also reflected in a decline of 20 per cent of hours spent in the courts.

It should be noted that there is an increase in hours of training. Most of the hours were spent in Portsmouth, Manchester, Laconia, Concord and Lincoln, by all of the permanent as well as special officers. Most of the training involved the new criminal code which was established by the legislature and became law the latter part of 1973. Lieut. Stevens also attended another semester at St. Anselm's college where he is studying for a degree in law enforcement and criminal justice. His last semester consisted of four courses for which he received two A's and two B's for his efforts. This training is most necessary for policemen of today and we are most fortunate to have dedicated men who will take the necessary training so that they may become better qualified as policemen.

Many hours were also spent in attending various meetings and seminars by Chief Wentworth, as well as his participation as a member of several county and town committees including the study committee which was involved in the new Fire-Police-Rescue building. At this time, the building is well on its way to completion and will probably be available for occupancy by the middle of the year.



Once again, the department carried on the Christmas program. Several hundreds of dollars worth of food and toys, donated by the townspeople were delivered to deserving youngsters in the town, as well as to many of our older citizens. We also distributed food, plants, fruits and gifts to all Wolfeboro residents, who are now living at the Carroll County Home. This was especially pleasurable, as we were able to see firsthand, how well these people are cared for at the home and we would urge everyone to make a visit to the home and see for themselves. The program was under the most able direction of Lorrie Wright of this department, and without her we would not have been able to proceed with such efficiency. We would like to take this opportunity to thank our many friends who were unselfish in their donations and who also provided much help in other ways to make the program a success and we look forward to the coming year and the program.

The department wishes to thank all who have been so helpful in so many ways to the men on the police force and in the office. This includes all of the other town departments with whom we have worked so closely the past year and to whom we pledge our support for the coming year.

# PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS DEPARTMENT

The start of the 1972-73 ski season started early with a large snow storm toward the end of November. This snow storm turned out to be the base for all our skiing and other snow falls and lasted through the ski season. Skiing ended short of Easter in '73; generally it goes up to Easter and beyond.

Many new cross country ski trails have been made through the woods around Abenaki Ski Area. The sport of cross country ski touring (although not a new sport by any means) has really boomed. It seems everyone, from the very young to the very old, is out ski touring. It's a great family sport and a very good exercise.

The Tramway Safety Board in the Department of Safety for the State of New Hampshire, disapproved of our motor house observation station and our safety gates. The observer on duty in the observation station is supposed to see the complete length of the tow line. At present, only about 1/3 of the lift line is observed. Therefore, the motor house observation station must be raised 7½ feet in order for the man on duty to be able to see the full length of the lift line.

A letter to the State Safety Board asking for an extension of time until next year was turned down. But we were given an alternative of hiring a man to stand at the bottom at the place where the people get on the lift line. The man at the base must have a telephone for communication with the man at the top and a safety switch at hand which will shut off motor instantly.

Last winter, the Chairman of the Tramway Safety Board gave me a rough estimate of about \$1500.00 to replace what we have there with a better and more efficient design, better engineered and constructed. What we have there now, you must remember, is probably 20 years old, or more.

In short, we don't have the money in the budget to re-build the observation station or to hire a man for the loading spot, so we are going to have to depend on volunteers which may give us a problem.

The Swift Water Girl Scout Council had a 3-day camporee

at the Abenaki Ski Area in July. Although we had a little rain, everyone had a wonderful time.

Back Bay Skating Rink was slow again in starting due to the rain and warm weather and no frost in the ground, but by January 6, 1974 we had good ice, probably better than we have had in two years. Again this year, Sandy McKenzie was chosen for the job of supervising, maintaining and flooding the skating rink.

Once again, Brewster Academy has come through for us and have permitted us to use Brewster Gym, free of charge, on Wednesday and Thursday nights, for the Wolfeboro Youth Basketball League. There is no other gym available to us, and we are especially grateful to Brewster Academy to help us during the energy crisis.

We have again 5 Basketball teams, made up of boys from the 4th, 5th and 6th Grades. As Commissioner of the Wolfeboro Youth Basketball League's 5 Teams, I want to thank Dennis Bean for the tremendous help, time and effort he has put into this Basketball program. I want to thank all of the coaches, referees and timekeepers, and of course, a great deal of thanks to the sponsors: North Conway Lumber, Hart Motor, Diamond International, Radio Wolfeboro-WASR and Wolfeboro Oil Company. Without their financial contribution, encouragement and enthusiasm the program could not succeed. A pat on the back goes to all of the players for their fine team effort and sportsmanship.

The Wolfeboro Junior Tennis Program went very well again in 1973 with over 100 boys and girls, between the ages of 10 and 18 participating. The tennis Courts were rented by the Town from Brewster Academy and classes were held from 9:00 A.M. to 12 noon, Monday through Friday. The boy who took the number one seed position in the tennis tournament was Scott Guzman. And for the number one seed position for girls, Debbie Hale, who has won the big cup two years in a row.

The 1973 swimming lessons held at Brewster Beach was a successful program. We have requested that a new raft be acquired in the Spring of 1974. The Kingswood High School

Vocation Class is willing to build the raft, the Town to provide the materials.

During 1973, I attended most of the N. H. Parks & Recreation Society meetings held the second Wednesday of each month at many of the Recreation Areas all over the State of New Hampshire.

These meetings are clinics and classes for the members of the society to keep up to date in new ideas and changes in the field of recreation. Also, to see how other Parks & Recreation Areas are operated and maintained.

I also participated in several tennis clinics which were held in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, and have now qualified as a U. S. Professional Tennis Instructor.

In October, I attended a 2-day National Ski Patrol System First Aid refresher course at Waterville Valley.

The coming of Spring and Summer of 1974 will see, I hope, a big step forward in the development of the Back Bay Playground. I think the play area for the small children will be well on its way; the Little League ball field will be seeded, although it may not be ready for use until late Summer or early Fall. We hope to be able to start the Tennis Courts in August.

I wish to thank Brewster Academy for making the tennis courts and the gymnasium available to the Town for our programs, and to also thank all of the individuals and municipal departments who have assisted me in my programs this year.

# LIBBY MUSEUM TRUST

Trustees of the Libby Museum  
Wolfeboro, New Hampshire

Dear Sirs,

The Libby Museum was host to approximately 6,000 visitors last summer in spite of the threatened shortages of fuel in early June. There were fewer visitors from distant states, but an increase in visitors from New Hampshire and York County, Maine.

Three large cash gifts were received in 1973. The first from the Camp Kehonka Service Fund in the amount of \$100.00 was donated by the campers for exhibit materials. Two unrestricted gifts in the amount of \$100.00 each were received from Mr. and Mrs. Richard W. Kilburn of New Jersey and Mrs. C.R. Baisley of Reading, Massachusetts. Mrs. Baisley is a granddaughter of the founder, Dr. Libby.

Mr. Perkins, the taxidermist of Barnstead, donated a mounted red squirrel. Mr. Fred B. Smith of Mirror Lake, donated a piece of rock which he found near the West shore of Mirror Lake. It appears to be lava rock. In December, 1973, the museum was fortunate to receive from Mr. Mike Czysz, a Town employee, a small mole. The animal has been taken to the taxidermist and will be on exhibition in 1974. The Museum director donated a picture of Mr. Arthur Walden, the founder of Chinook Kennels, with his lead dog, "Chinook". The picture was taken before leaving for the South Pole on the first Byrd expedition.

During the winter of 1972-73, the Trustees, working with funds previously donated, were able to have the old barn, which was located in the rear of the Museum, torn down and removed. The area will probably be made into a parking lot. The old barn was a fire hazard and an eyesore.

The Wolfeboro Garden Club workers, under Mrs. Janet Stuart, again planted the annual flowers in the terraced trays at the Museum. The Municipal Electric Department furnished

electricity for lighting the Museum all year. The Wolfeboro Water Department donated the water for Museum use. Each day the Wolfeboro Police Department checked the doors and the night lighting of the Museum. The local paper, The Granite State News, carried notes of events at the Museum. The local radio station WASR, mentioned the Museum on the air. Several local artists loaned their paintings to brighten the wall spaces. I wish to thank the Museum volunteers, The Wolfeboro Board of Selectmen, who are the Trustees of the Museum, Mr. Guy L. Krapp, Town Manager, Mrs. Rachael Jones, Mrs. Olena Jordan, Mrs. Patricia Waterman, the members of the Wolfeboro Town Departments and the local artists. Special thanks to the individual donors for their generosity.

## WOLFEBORO HISTORICAL SOCIETY

To the Board of Selectmen  
Wolfeboro, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

The year 1973 brought some changes, some improvements and increased interest, not only among those attending the varied programs, but by the hundreds of visitors to both the Clark House and to the Pleasant Valley School House on the Clark House grounds. An experimental innovation was tried, informal meetings being held in the Wolfeboro National Bank during January, February, March and April, which were well attended by many of the "local" members, and which proved especially stimulating and served to keep up the interest until Clark House was again open. We are indeed grateful to John W. McDermott for the use of the Bank's Directors' Room.

The chimney on Clark House, upon close inspection, showed an alarming tendency to disintegrate, so it was decided to use the money that had been appropriated to paint the school house to build a new chimney for Clark House. The painting of the School House and some reinforcing of the "underpinnings" of Clark House will have to be done in 1974.

Even before Clark House and the Pleasant Valley School House were officially opened, guided tours were given to Scout Troops and to certain grades from Carpenter School.

Two picnic tables with benches were made by students studying carpentry at Kingswood Regional High School and presented to the Historical Society and were frequently enjoyed by our visitors as well as our assistants.

Again in 1973 the members of the Wolfeboro Historical Society enjoyed programs covering a wide variety of topics. The season opened with the May 7th meeting at the Pleasant Valley School House. Dr. Lincoln Page speaking on "the Geological History of the Area." Dr. Page is the Director of the New England Division, U. S. Geological Survey. On June 4th, also at the School House, Mr. Russell Chase, Town Moderator, spoke on the "Historic District Plan for Wolfeboro." On July

2nd., at the Undercroft of All Saints Episcopal Church, Professor Allen R. Foley, President of the Vermont Historical Society, and noted Vermont humorist, harmonized history and humor. Monday, August 6, members and friends of the Wolfeboro Historical Society met at the railroad station to take a ride on the Wolfeborough Railroad to Wolfeborough Junction (Sanbornville) and return, celebrating the first trip 101 years ago. # BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

Early in 1973, Wayne J. Kelloway, Chairman and Guy L. Foss, resigned from the Board. The Selectmen then appointed Robert Smith and Philip Oxnam as new members. Later in the year, Allan Buckman was appointed as a permanent alternate to serve in the absence of any regular member.

Thirty-four cases were reviewed by the Board, which appears to be an all time yearly high. One case involved a rehearing. Upon second denial of the requested variance, the petitioner appealed his case to the Superior Court where it is still pending.

Twenty-two hearings were for special exceptions; fourteen to create multi-family dwellings; seven were on home occupation and one involved a Church location. Of twelve variance hearings, six involved lot requirement regulations; five were for signs larger than the ordinance permits and one case was for underground storage of gasoline in the residence district.

Seven of the thirty-four hearings (20 percent) resulted in a denial of the requested exception or variance. In several cases specific conditions were made a part of the granted appeal.

Based on case experiences, this Board made several suggestions and recommendations to the Town Planning Board for clarification, changes or additions in the present Zoning Ordinance, since the Planning Board is wholly responsible for recommending changes in the ordinance to the voters at Town Meeting.

# CONSERVATION COMMISSION

## ANNUAL REPORT

The Conservation Commission has had a busy year. Much of our meeting time has been taken up with review of requests for permits for dredge and fill and for dock repair. Most of the work resulted from the unusual draw down of Lake Wentworth this year.

We have taken a membership in the N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions. The resources available to us through this have been valuable on many occasions

We have worked with the Town Beautification Committee on the Glendon Street project, with credit to them for this.

As a product of our study of numerous bogs, swamps, marshes and streams of vital importance to wildlife and our water resources, we have proposed to the Selectmen and Planning Board a wet land ordinance.

A grant of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) has been awarded to us from the Ford Foundation to be used to survey and establish boundaries of three or four parcels of town-owned land. One of these plots will be developed to be used as a nursery area. The forested parcels will have timber stand improvement, with some trees to be cut by townspeople to use as fuel wood.

We have again worked closely with the Town Tree Warden, Mr. Lyman Belknap, in planting street trees and pruning and fertilizing those previously planted.

We continue to work on a comprehensive land use plan, based on an updated soils map of the Town.

I take great pleasure in presenting to the public the report of the activities of the Wolfeboro Rescue Squad for the year 1973.

As is our custom, we first would like to present the statistics of your squad's training, and type of calls received.

Continuing with the report, we find that once again various members of the team were busy instructing various groups in our state in the field of Emergency Care and Rescue. These squadmen trained over 750 people from all walks of life representing everything from housewives and babysitters to fire, police, rescue and ambulance personnel. We also continued our program of speaking to different organizations, to inform them of the functions of your Rescue Squad. We also were fortunate to be asked to put on a mock disaster for Tamworth Rescue, which we did in May of last year. Much valuable information was learned by all parties concerned. Because of its success, you might be interested to know that your squad regularly puts these exercises on for the training of its own personnel. Rescue 1 also participated in a simulated school bus accident near Parson's Furniture last May. This was held in conjunction with Huggins Hospital, Lakeside Ambulance Service, and the Alton Ambulance Corps.

Rescue 1 had a rust proofing job done early this past summer. Some areas of wear were showing, so we put the truck through what might be termed preventative maintenance. This was done to alleviate what could have been a major expense in the next 2 or 3 years. The new 4 channel State Police Radio was installed, and our communications capability greatly improved. As a note of information we can now act as a mobile command center in case of disaster as we can communicate on 7 different frequencies. Eventually we will add the statewide hospital frequency, which will enable us to talk directly to emergency rooms from the truck, without having to relay messages through a dispatcher. Presently the dispatcher has to give information to the hospital via telephone.

As usual, we could not even begin to inform you of your squad's activities anywhere near adequately, as space just will not allow it. Let it suffice to say that we had an extremely busy year last year, and 1974 looks as if it will be even busier. As of the 30th of January we had already logged 9 runs. Once again may we remind you that if you would like to learn more about your squad, we have members who are most willing to present a program for your group or organization.

This year, as last, may we once again thank all of you who have so willingly supported us. Your belief in us is most certainly shown in this year's run statistics.

Finally, remember that safety is not only our business; it's yours also, but if you should ever have need of our services, don't hesitate to call us. After all, we are your Rescue Squad.

# Chief Engineer's Report

To the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro:

I hereby submit my reports for the year 1973.

The Department answered a total of 77 alarms which consisted of 5 Box Alarms, 5 Engineer Calls, and 67 Still Alarms. The type of alarms were for 31 Structural Fires, 12 Automobile Fires, 7 Grass Fires, 5 Mutual Aid Fires, 5 L. P. Gas Leaks, 4 Gasoline Spills, 9 Dump Fires, 2 Fire Boat Rescues, 1 Boat Fire, and 1 Disaster Drill.

In responding to the calls the Department used 764 man hours of labor, traveled 421 miles, 5 hours of fire boat travel, used 1250 feet of 2½" hose, 800 feet of 1½" hose, 2250 feet of ¾" hose, 72 feet of ladders, and 18 lbs. dry chemical.

The estimated value of property, where the damage exceeded \$100.00 totaled \$265,000.00 and the estimated loss \$31,600.00. Several losses have not been completed at this time. We had three persons burned by L.P. Gas explosions, one very seriously.

The Department had to replace the old fire alarm air compressor and storage tanks because of State Regulations on Pressure Vessels. The new compressor and tanks were installed at the present fire station and the air horns were moved from the former Bell Shop, bringing all of the fire alarms to the present station. Also, we had to replace the solenoid operated air valve for the horns. We replaced 1775 feet of wire on the Main Street circuit and about 1500 feet on the Wolfeboro Falls circuit. We purchased two new Federal ten-ten home receivers for call firemen.

We replaced 500 feet of 2½" hose, 9 firemen's helmets, 21 helmet shields and added 1 new MSA mask.

The members of the Department assisted the local schools and the hospital with fire drills, conducted 8 classes in the use of First Aid Fire Extinguishers, made 9 complete building inspections, inspected the fire extinguishers in the schools, and hospital, inspected 32 oil burners and checked 63 chimneys as requested by the owners.

There were 12 members that attended the Fire School at Gilford Training Center, 2 attended the building construction seminar at Laconia Vocational-Technical School; 3 members

attended the hospital evacuation and fire safety training at the New Hampshire State Hospital; 1 member attended the fire training program at Barrington, New Hampshire; 1 member attended the New England Spring Fire Conference; 1 member attended the New England Fire Chiefs Association Conference and the Fire Officers Seminar at Bedford, New Hampshire.

I would like to thank the local insurance agents for their cooperation and donations to our October Fire Prevention Program. Also, I would like to thank the Selectmen, Town Manager, and the various Town Departments for the cooperation that we received from them.

# Report of the Forest Fire Warden

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72 percent of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

# REPORT OF MUNICIPAL ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT WOLFEBORO NEW HAMPSHIRE

## 1973 Annual Report

During the year 1973, the Municipal Electric Department continued to grow in sales, but at a rate that was considerably less than 1972. The growth was 4.3 per cent during 1973 with a higher peak demand of 6,200 KW occurring on January 7, 1973. Again, much of the growth is in the new homes being built with electric heat. There were though, several cases where those who catered to the tourist trade enlarged their facilities as well as the temporary addition to the Kingswood High School.

In order to supply this growth, the department continued to make improvements and enlargements to the system. The capital improvements amounted to \$57,000 and consisted mostly to enlarging of the existing lines. Those that were enlarged were from the Power Plant to the Post Office and to Keewaydin Road. Also, the wire was purchased for the South Main St. circuit as far as Pleasant Valley Road. This installation will take place early in 1974. In addition to the above improvements, larger transformers, metering and services were installed to take care of the additional growth at various locations.

New developments continue to be planned and enlarged. In these areas, Piping Rock, Hamilton Trailer Park, Robin Acres, Crickett Hill Estates and Basset Road, the department extended their facilities at the cost of the developer and will be reimbursed under the reimbursement policy.

Areas where growth had exceeded the facilities again plagued the department. Barndoor Island and Penn Air Estates were two such places where the demand outgrew the facilities. These will be enlarged in the 1974 program.

The Department's 10 year contract with Public Service of New Hampshire to man, maintain and generate power on call from Public Service terminated on October 24, 1973. This change was known for several years when the department was notified that Public Service could not renew this contract. From October 24, 1973, the department will purchase their entire electrical requirements on a new purchase contract. The

present plant will be maintained for emergency use and what other use the department may deem necessary. The new purchasing contract will be considerably more expensive to the department, but when the expenses of the generating plant are decreased, it is hoped that the total will be no greater than the total of the past for the two operations.

Public Service was granted a rate increase during 1973 by the Federal Power Commission. An increase was permitted subject to reimbursement if the final rate was lower than expected. This resulted in the department having to charge a surcharge so as to recover the increase in cost of the power. This surcharge which resulted because of the increase in power cost plus the changing of contracts caused considerable confusion and financial loss to the department in revenue. The fuel charge, which showed up on the electric bills during 1973, will be around for quite some time in the future. Near the end of the year, the Selectmen were prepared to authorize a rate study of the entire charges for electricity. With a change of the type of operation, purchasing at a higher cost and there being no updating of the existing rates for some time, it was the intent of the Selectmen that the whole program should be studied.

The energy crisis started in November with a scare being implanted in everyone's mind as to whether there would be sufficient fuel to generate the electric requirements of everyone. The Selectmen, wishing to conform to the requests of those who were forecasting the crisis, authorized the turning off of 115 street lights that were felt to not be necessary. Thermostats were turned back, extra lights were turned off and every type of measure was taken to conserve. Whether this attitude will continue into 1974 is questionable. The voltage reduction which takes place between 5 and 9 p.m. will continue for sometime because it does show as an appreciable reduction in requirements.

Many changes in personnel took place during 1973. Mr. H.E. Erickson, Manager of the department for 19 years, resigned to take a position as Safety Director of Northeast Public Power Association. Miriam Leavitt, retired as bookkeeper for the department after 27½ years. Mr. Loren Piper, Power Plant Sup. retired in November after 28 years of service. Henry Hutchins, Plant Operator for 22 years was transferred to the

Public Works Garage where his mechanical abilities will be used in equipment repair. Mr. Lawrence N. Smart, having not missed a day of work in 23½ years, retired in December. Mr. Smart will continue to be available to the department for special metering work. It would be hard at this time to recite the devotion and conscientious efforts of these people during their many faithful years with the department. With their leaving, goes years of experience and knowledge, but all have offered and agreed to come back and help when needed.

With the closing of the power plant, people who have trouble are to call the Police Department Number 569-1444 during the hours when the Town Offices are not open.
