



HISTORY OF WOODSTOCK

The valley where Woodstock is located was first owned by the Algonquin Indians, who left few traces of their life here. On Bejeaud's land there is a 3-sided mound about 60 feet high that is thought to be of Indian origin. Legends say that Chief Pemigewasset used to stand on this mound and watch for the canoes of hostile tribes coming upriver.

In 1763 Governor Benning Wentworth granted the land for the town to Eli DeMeritt. The town was called Peeling because, in running the lines to form the town, a little slice was taken from each of the surrounding towns.

None of the first grantees settled and the land was regranted to Nathaniel Cushman who called it Fairfield. He did not settle here and the land was again granted to the original grantees.

James McNorton and his family were the first settlers. In 1773 they settled on the east side of the river about one mile above the covered bridge. When he heard of the Revolution he went to war and was killed at Valley Forge. His wife remained for four years before she returned to her former home.

After the Revolution many settlers took up grants — the Bryants, Barrons, Foxes, Smiths, Darlings, Russells and Pinkhams.

Peeling's first town meeting was held in 1800 when 20 votes were cast for governor. They also chose a moderator, town clerk, three selectmen, a constable and two surveyors, one for the east side of the river and one for the west side.

In 1810 Thomas Pinkham gave land for the first public cemetery. Strangely enough, he was the first one buried in it.

A church society was organized in 1812 and in 1830 the first church was built near the covered bridge.

The first doctor in Woodstock was Dr. Symmes Sawyer who came from Weare in 1819. His was the first family to settle on Mt. Cilley which grew to be quite a large settlement.

The major industry on Mt. Cilley and in the valley was raising California potatoes to supply the starch mills. Woodstock also had sawmills and grist mills, until, in 1852 there were 15 mills in town.

The first school was located by the railroad tracks near the covered birdge. At one time there were five school districts in town, each with its own school house.

The first road in Woodstock connected it to Landaff. Later a road was built through Franconia Notch which gave some communication with the outside world.

In 1898 the town water system was laid. This greatly improved sanitary conditions and helped fire prevention.

Our 100th anniversary was celebrated in 1900. Early in the morning a cannon was fired. Governor Rollins arrived and in the evening there was a ball in his honor. The exercises closed with a 100-gun salute commemorating the age of Woodstock as a town.

To the Inhabitants in the Town of Woodstock, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- 3. To see if a discount of 3% will be allowed on taxes paid on or before the first of September or a later date to be set by the Selectmen and if the sum of twenty cents shall be added to each poll tax not paid on or before September 15th.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as posted.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Property taken on tax titles.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for a skating rink on the school grounds.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of the Kancamagus Ski Area.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND SCHOOL NURSING SERVICES

Woodstock — Lincoln Area Dec. 31, 1961 to Dec. 31, 1962

Total number of visits made to homes was 1,282. Of this number 18 were to new mothers; 10 to prenatal cases; to infants under one month, 64; one month to two years, 60; pre-school, 12; medical, 200; chronics, 400; Crippled Children's Services, 90; visits communicable disease and suspects, 13; unclassified visits, i. e. to those not taken under care, Welfare cases, Clinic connected, etc., 403.

Conferences with State and County case workers, 23. Nurse's Workshops and meetings attended, 9.

Visits to schools in the area totaled 215. Nurse's examinations were carried out on 328 pupils. Trips to optometrists, 4; to Hitchcock Clinic, Hanover, 1; to Hitchcock clinic for therapy, 4. Two children attended pediatric clinic and one to orthopedic in Littleton. Athletic examinations were carried out on 89 pupils by Dr. Ralph Parker. Practically every school child received the three types of Sabin Oral Polio vaccine this Summer and Fall.

Through the Bureau of Dental Health Services we were able to secure a Dental Hygienist to conduct a clinic for pre-school children. At this type of clinic the hygienist cleans the teeth and applies three applications of fluorine, the latter being an agent which aids in the prevention of tooth decay. Forty-six children were taken care of at this time. Due to the short period of time alloted to us, it was not possible to accept a larger number.

The Red Cross Blood Bank Mobile came in May. Mrs. Mary Clark representing the Daughters of Isabella and Mrs. Mable Hamnett of No. Woodstock were appointed chairmen. This visit was very successful.

Three Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine clinics were con-

ducted in July, August and September for ages six weeks old and over. The July clinic at which Type I was given had an attendance of 1,257, Type III was given in August with an attendance of 1,105 and Type II, given in September, had an attendance of 1,082.

The Christmas program was substantially aided this year by the High School students, Knights of Columbus, the Littleton Lodge of Elks, Daughters of Isabella and the American Legion Auxiliary.

I wish to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the ladies of No. Woodstock and Lincoln who gave many hours of their time to assist at the clinics and the Blood Bank. I would also like to thank Roger Stewart, Principal of the High School, and Jack Stack, custodian, for continual cooperation

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help keep our

fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.

If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.

Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the

dav.

4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.

5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.

 If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instil in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had two fires; we burned 1/4 acres. Permits issued 76.





PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

At the time of this writing, it is all too evident that the school year is half over. Time certainly passes rapidly. Several new additions to the school have been very beneficial to each and every student this year. With the advent of a full-fledged hot lunch program operated by two capable cooks, Mrs. Clara Cloud and Mrs. Charles Georgia, your school has been tremendously improved. I have noticed that since this new program was started the students seem much more alert and "wide-awake" in the afternoon. A hot meal can very conceivably make the difference between success and failure in an afternoon of schoolwork. I would like to offer my thanks to the mothers who have volunteered their services in helping to serve the meals at noon.

Your children are also benefitting greatly from the purchase of a Bell and Howell Auto-Load movie projector and a Heyer duplicator. I hope you have noticed the difference between the clearness of school menus printed before and those printed after the purchase of the new duplicator. Hardly a day passes when we do not use both of these new additions in our classrooms. Films are very helpful in the teaching and learning of all school projects, and without the new duplicator the activities of the home economics club and the school newspaper would be seriously hampered.

Several teachers have taken professional courses during the year and are still in the process of doing so. We realize that a capable teacher must be constantly aware of the recent trends and changes in educational leadership.

I am rather concerned about the fact that few parents have visited school to inquire about the progress of their children. A successful, intelligent citizen is developed through a co-operation between both home and school, not one by itself.

In the event that any difference of opinion should arise concerning your child, I suggest that you come to school and speak to the person involved. Many minor problems could well be solved if the complainant would go to the right person and discuss the problem with him. We at the school will be glad to discuss any phase of your child's education in a cordial, democratic manner.

In closing, I wish to state that your vote on the bond issue was very reassuring to us at school. You have presented your children with a gift, the results of which they will use for a lifetime.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Hereby submitted is my final annual report as your Superintendent of Schools by virtue of the fact that you have voted to become part of a school district with Lincoln and it has been decided that the Co-operative will be part of the Lisbon Supervisory Union.

You should be congratulated for taking this step which undoubtedly will allow your children grades 1-12 to obtain a better education. I am sure, however, you all realize that such a venture, at least in the initial phases, is going to cost you more for education.

Beginning in September there were a number of staff changes in your elementary school. Mrs. Amos and Mrs. Gay retired, Miss Bayley could not return because of illness and Mr. McCoy and Mr. Beaudin both went to New York state to teach. We were fortunate in being able to secure capable replacements. Usually when as many as five out of eight teachers do not return to a school system there is quite a long adjustment period before things return to normal but in this particular instance, it did not happen. Miss Avery, a 1962 graduate of Nasson College was employed to replace Mrs. Amos in grade 2; Miss Wiersma, a transfer student to Plymouth Teachers College, replaced Miss Bayley; Mrs. Lowden, a P. T. C. graduate with a great deal of experience, replaced Mrs. Gay; and Miss Jackson, a U. N. H. graduate who has been teaching in Boston, was moved into the position vacated by Mr. McCoy. I was indeed sorry to see Mr. Beaudin, the Principal, leave because I feel for many years he did an outstanding job as administrator and director of extra curricular activities, but we were fortunate in obtaining Mr. Cushman who has assumed the Principalship and, for his first year, is doing an outstanding job. If it is possible, I do not think the Cooperative District would make any mistake in employing any of these teachers.

I am very happy as I am sure are some of the parents for the hot lunch program that has been instituted. Because of space there have been many problems but slowly they are being overcome and a fine new lunch program has developed. The mothers who are volunteering to help should have your sincere thanks. All other school functions proceed about the same with Achievement and Mental Ability tests being administered regularly.

We are in need of replacing some series of our textbooks that have been used for about four years but I shall leave this to the new administration so that more coordination and articulation between your two elementary schools may result.

I wish to take this opportunity of thanking the board members both present and past for the help and cooperation during the time when I have been your superintendent. Our associations have always been on the highest plane and I am sure that any betterment of the education of Woodstock children has been due much to their help.

My sincere best wishes and regards go with you into your new Cooperative School venture.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotations: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1961-1962 received a salary of \$8500 which was made up as follows: \$4250 paid from the per capita tax and \$4250 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1200 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

REPORT OF THE KANCAMAGUS SKI CLUB

In the year since last Town Meeting Day the Kancamagus Ski Slope has been much more fully developed, with the skiing needs of the children of the towns of Lincoln and Woodstock in mind.

Thanks to the \$1,000 from Lincoln and \$500 from Woodstock a much needed addition to the warm-up hut was installed; a longer and stronger new tow rope bought; the slopes grass-seeded; and the parking area, upper slope and site for the hut addition enlarged and improved by bulldozing.

The Kancamagus Ski Club has undertaken the full cost of operating the area: labor of operators, utilities, gasoline, heat, awards for grammar school races and office supplies. For the understanding of the townspeople to the needs of the past year and the uses of the towns' monies a list of the costs of improvements of the past year is as follows:

Plans for this year include principally an extension of the present rope tow by approximately 100 feet higher on the hill. This will permit the new rope to be used to the fullest advantage and mean better access to the side trails as well as a needed longer open slope. Wood cutting and extensive bulldozing will be necessary as well as raising the motor hut to a higher foundation farther up the hill. The same amount raised by each town as last year will take care of this cost.

The participation by larger numbers of children and adults alike in the use of the facilities offered at the ski slope has greatly exceeded the hopes of those who have volunteered their time and services to the area. Extra hours of running the tow, more help in supervision and more instructors for lessons all were gladly provided to take care of the increase of need. This year a total of 189 students (136 in Grammar School and 53 in High School) and 73 adults are members of the Kancamagus Ski Club. A majority of the students take weekly lessons, and 20 adults are in two evening classes, all of which show an increase of interest as well as ability. This inter-town project has brought a fine unity to this interest as well as a healthful medium for all persons in the towns that far out-weighs its expense.
