#### NOTICE

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR OPERATING A BOX

Opening a box does not give alarm: pull down handle. Anyone sounding alarm to remain at box to direct fireman. Second alarm to be sounded by order of the chief engineer only. Test alarm every day at 12.45. Do not sound alarm unless necessary.

### ALTON TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Alton in the county of Belknap, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Alton, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:
- Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay all necessary charges of the town for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, in addition to that required by law.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow necessary monies in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the public library, in addition to that required by law.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$733.74, provided that the state will contribute \$2,934.97, for Class V roads, so called.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, to be expended under state supervision, for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust. (By request).
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of the brown tail and gypsy moths, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department. (By request).

- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all property taxes for the 1941 assessment, two percent to August 31, and one percent to September 30, inclusive.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (By request).
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the Huggins hospital at Wolfeboro. (By request).
- Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the Laconia hospital. (By request).
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for winter sports, the same to be disbursed under the supervision of the board of selectmen. (By request).
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for summer activities, the same to be disbursed under the supervision of the board of selectmen. (By request).
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (By request).
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for an Old Home Day celebration. (By request).
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty dollars (\$40.00) for annual membership dues in The New Hampshire Municipal League. (By request).
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the board of selectmen to appoint annually as Chief of Police of Alton for the ensuing year, the Constable, who shall have been duly elected at the regular town meeting of that year; such appointment to be made at the next regular meeting of the board of select-

men following said election; this article to be effective upon its passage, superseding all previous articles passed in any town meeting regarding such appointment. (By petition).

- Article 19. To see what action the town wishes to take relative to the purchase of land and the erection of a Public Library building as provided for by the Oliver J. M. Gilman Library Building Fund. (By request).
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to sell a fifty foot right-of-way through the railroad yard at Alton Bay to the state of New Hampshire. (By request).
- Article 21. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 22. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year, to elect one selectman for three years, one library trustee, one trustee of trust funds and two water commissioners, one for two years and one for the ensuing three years.

Board of Selectmen Alton, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

In accordance with the request of your town, as expressed by a vote taken at the annual meeting in March, an audit and examination of the town accounts has been made by this division. Submitted herewith is a report of the audit, including Schedules as hereafter listed.

#### FINANCES

Statements have been prepared showing the trend of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes during the period from January 31, 1931, to January 31, 1940, (Schedule A): and comparing Revenues, Appropriations and Expenditures for the years 1939, 1938, 1937 and 1936. (Schedules B, C, D and E.)

Schedule A segregates Water and Other Long Term Notes. It is shown that during the period from 1931 to 1940 Water Debt increased by \$14,650.00 while other long term debt decreased by \$31,598.01. During the same period the Net Debt (excess of Total Liabilities over Total Assets) decreased by \$8,574.56. The Assessed Valuation of Property increased by approximately \$140,000.00, and the amount of annual tax levies increased by more than \$10,000.00. The average town tax rate as compared to the average tax rate was as follows:

The Long Term Indebtedness of the town is in the form of notes which were outstanding on January 31, 1949, as follows:

Schedule F lists separately these Notes by issues showing the amounts of annual maturities.

Principal payments on the Trunk Line Completion (Highway) Note are increased annually until 1946 when the final payment becomes due. Payments on the Note issued on account of the purchase of Railroad Property become due in the amount of \$850.00 annually, the final payment being 1958. The amount necessary to meet maturities of these notes is raised each year by taxation.

In case of the Water Notes, payments on account of principal and interest are made out of earnings of the department. On one note there is an outstanding balance of \$7,600.00. On this note a principal payment of \$400.00 is made each year, the last payment becoming due in 1958. There are eleven notes bearing interest at the rate of  $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ , amounting to \$11,300.00. In this series the notes mature in varying amounts from \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00 annually, up to and including the year 1947. In addition there are seven notes issued at a 3% rate, amounting to \$11,759.00, maturing in amounts of \$500.00 to \$5,000.00. Maturities of this series are in the years 1944, 1947, 1948, 1949 and 1950.

Inasmuch as the annual maturities of notes in these last two series are of varying amounts and in many cases amount to more than can be paid out of the earning of the water department, new notes will probably be issued to take up old ones as has been the practice in the past.

It is our suggestion and recommendation, however, that a general refunding of notes in these two series, amounting in all to \$23,050,00, by the issuance of serial

notes in denominations of \$1,090.00, be made. If this were done the entire debt would be paid up in approximately twenty years and the present practice of renewing notes would not have to be resorted to.

Schedules B, C, D and E present comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures and estimated and actual revenues for the years 1939, 1938, 1937 and 1936.

#### SELECTMEN'S AND TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS

Our andit covered the fiscal year ending January 31, 1940, and the period from February 1, 1940, to August 28, 1940. The Vouchers issued by the Selectmen during this time were examined as were also the supporting invoices and payrolls. The amounts were compared with the entries in the Receipts and Payments Book and classification of expenditures noted.

The checks issued by the Treasurer were compared with the Selectmen's orders. The total amount of expenditures, as shown by the Treasurer's Cash Book, was in agreement with the total as indicated in the Selectmen's records. The Treasurer's receipts were checked by source insofar as possible.

The Treasurer's Cash Book balance as of August 28, 1940, was in agreement with the reconciled bank balance of like date. (Schedule G)

The Selectmen and Treasurer are commended on the method employed in filing Vouchers, Invoices and Payrolls, which made these records readily accessible for purposes of audit.

#### TAXES

The collection of taxes in Alton is highly satisfactory. It is noted, however, that in a few instances there are unredeemed taxes extending back over a period of more than the two years during which redemptions may be made. It is recommended that in such cases the owners be notified that the town will take deeds to their property if redemptions are not made within a reasonable time, (30 days is suggested). A complete list of unredeemed taxes, which have been bought by the town, indicated by year of levy is contained in Schedule I.

#### TOWN CLERK

The accounts of the Town Clerk were examined and a summarized statement showing motor vehicle per-

mits and dog licenses issued as well as remittances to the Treasurer by the Town Clerk, is presented in Schedule H.

#### WATER DEPARTMENT

The accounts of the Treasurer of the Water Department were audited, and the balance on hand as of September 7, 1940, as indicated by the Cash Book, reconciled with the bank balance of this date. (Schedule J)

Uncollected water rents amounted to \$2,484.56. Of this amount \$698.46 represented 1940 accounts, and \$1,786.10 previous years. It is recommended that some action be taken to enforce the collection of delinquent accounts, some of which are for considerable amounts and extend over a period of several years. A detailed list of all uncollected water rents is contained in Schedule K.

#### SUMMARY

One of the chief financial problems of the town, which has heretofore been referred to, is the rearrangement of the water debt payment schedule. In order to avoid the necessity of having to renew notes because departmental earnings are insufficient to take care of maturities, it is again recommended that approximately \$23,000.00 of the present outstanding notes be refunded by the issuance of serial notes or bonds in denominations of \$1,000.00, payable over a period of twenty years.

The amount outstanding on the note issued for the purchase of the railroad property is \$16,150.00. Although \$850.00 is raised by taxation each year to reduce the principal of this note, receipts from the future sale of lots from this property should help materially to offset the annual payments of principal and interest.

Matters relating to accounting and reporting procedure were discussed with the various town officials during the course of the audit and are not enumerated in this report.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 211, Section 31, of the Laws of 1939, a copy of this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report of the town.

# REPORT OF STATE AUDIT OF TRUST FUNDS

February 21, 1941.

Trustees of Trust Funds Alton, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

I submit herewith the report of an audit of the Trust Funds of the town of Alton which has been made by this division for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, in accordance with the request of your town as expressed by a vote taken at the annual meeting in March

for an audit and examination of the town accounts. As the trust fund records were not available when the general audit was made due to the incapacity of one of the trustees this part of the audit was postponed to this later date.

A statement has been prepared showing the trust funds held by the trustees together with the activity of the income account for the fiscal year just ended. (Schedule A) Another statement showing the manner in which the various funds and accumulated income are invested is presented in Schedule B.

In arriving at the total of trust fund principal and accumulated income, the income to be allocated to the various accounts for the past fiscal year as indicated on a statement prepared by the trustees was added to the amount of such funds and the balances of unexpended income as shown by the ledger accounts as of February 1, 1940. From this total the expenditures actually made before the date of this andit were deducted. The resulting amount, \$50,078.88, represents the actual amount of trust fund principal and unexpended income as of February 6, 1941. It was understood by the auditor, however, that further expenditures chargeable to the last fiscal year were to be made before the accounts were actually closed for the year.

The securities in which the funds are invested were examined and found to be in order. The verification of the amounts deposited in savings banks was made by reference to the pass books on which interest for the year ended December 31, 1940, had been entered in each instance. The balance of the checking account was in agreement with the reconciled statement of the Farmington National Bank as of January 25, 1941.

During the course of the andit the question of disposition of certain undistributed income which has accumulated over a period of years was raised by the trustees. It is my belief that inasmuch as it would be practically impossible at this late date to ascertain its source or to allocate it to the proper accounts the trustees would be within their rights in using it for such purposes as they might use other trust fund income.

## (b) Administrative Problems

The 1939 session of the legislature passed a law authorizing the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to inspect any motor vehicle used for the purpose of transporting school children. In November of that year the Motor Vehicle Department issued a set of requirements for school busses. These new requirements necessitated the checking of many vehicles being used and caused a number of minor adjustments. On July 1, 1940, two other sets of requirements were issued which forbade the use for school transportation of many vehicles formerly used for such purpose. The problem thrown onto school boards and superintendents with these new regulations were truly serious because of the difficulty of finding vehicles that conformed to the new requirements and of finding ways of financing the purchase of these new and more expensive vehicles. During the summer four new school busses were purchased in this supervisory union;

one for Pittsfield, one for Wolfeboro, one for Alton and one for Tuftonboro. A good part of the superintendent's time during the summer was spent in work on the details of the thirty-five different transportation contracts in the union. About half of the vehicles used this year were not used by their present owners for school transportation last year. As no provisions were made by the Motor Vehicle Department for inspecting the vehicles used for school transportation to see whether or not they met the requirements set up by the department, much added work was thrown onto the school boards and superintendent. The total amount which will be spent for the transportation of children in this supervisory union during the year 1940-41 will be about \$19,500.

#### PART V AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

## (a) Report of the Headmaster, Austin L. Howard To the superintendent of schools and the members of the school board:

I hereby submit my second annual report of the Alton high school which opened on September 3rd, with an enrollment of 86 pupils. Transfers and withdrawals have reduced the registration until at present there are 81 pupils divided as follows: Seniors, 20; juniors, 14; sophomores, 14; freshmen, 33. The total enrollment at the present time is 88.

On June 14, 1940, 19 pupils were graduated from this school and are at present located as follows:

Twenty-nine tuition pupils are registered in the high school: Four from Barnstead; nine from Gilmanton; fourteen from New Durham; and two from Wolfe-

boro.

Four new subjects have been added to our curriculum: Civics, Consumer Buying, Human Relations and Practical Mechanics. Physics, which has not been offered during the past several years, is being offered this year.

There has been one change in the teaching staff. Mr. Leroy Guptill, B. S., replaced Mr. Donald H. Mc-

Leod as teacher of agriculture.

New equipment which has been purchased this year includes the following: Equipment and apparatus for the Physics laboratory; tools and equipment for Practical Mechanics and an electric refrigerator for Home Economics. New text books have been purchased for Physics, Civics, Consumer Buying and Human Relations. In addition to these books, several reference books have also been purchased. New music has been purchased for our chorus.

Athletics have been self supporting and have furnished a small surplus for the purchase of additional

equipment.

Our annual winter carnival was scheduled to be held on February 14th and 15th. The grade school events were scheduled for Friday afternoon. The high school events which were scheduled for Saturday were postponed until March 8th because of unfavorable weather conditions. The carnival ball and the queen contest

contributed to the financial success of the winter carnival.

An association known as The Student Activities Association of Alton high school has been formed. The purpose of this association is to promote a feeling of cooperation between members of the student body and council by creating in the minds of the students and council members the idea that the school is what they wish to make it and this purpose can be carried out only with the cooperation of the student body, the members of the council and the teachers. All extra-curricular activities of the school are under the direction of this association. To date the association has been functioning in an excellent manner.

A night school class in automobile mechanics is being conducted under the Out-of-School Rural Youth Defense Program. Mr. Ed Downing has been hired as the instructor. The class has been held in the building owned by Miss Brown which is located next to the school

property.

There seems to be a definite need for a full program in industrial arts and it is hoped that the School Board will make it possible to offer four years of industrial arts to the pupils of Alton high school instead of the present two-year plan. If the industrial arts program is to be conducted in Alton high school it will be necessary for us to have additional shop facilities. This problem could be solved by acquiring the building and property owned by Miss Brown which is located adjacent to the school property which I understand could be purchased from Miss Brown at a very reasonable price. February 14, 1941

(b) Report of School Health Work, Ruth S. Langille To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of schools:

The health record of the Alton pupils continues to be very good. Very few cases of contagious diseases

were reported last year.

The school dental clinic completed in the spring and sponsored by the Alton Parents' club was very successful and it is hoped that this good foundation work will not be entirely lost by abandoning the project. In many cases the work was done with the expectation that it would be a continual process and could be carefully followed up to insure eventual healthy teeth.

Following will be found the record of the dental clinic: 98 pupils done—96 completed.

Of the 98 pupils done, 48 paid in full for the work and 2 paid part. Parents of 48 pupils either felt they could not pay for the work or failed to pay necessitating \$185.50 to be paid by the Parents' club and contributions from Red Cross, Woman's club and friends.

This large amount of work was done with 178 sittings and 46 trips to Pittsfield necessary. Many of these pupils had never had any dental work done and in two cases 19 and 24 fillings were necessary in one mouth.

Another year if the work is kept up there should only be necessary from one half to one third of this amount of work; and cost.

Other connective work was accomplished throughout the year. Twenty of the 30 pupils who needed them were fitted to glasses. Thirteen of the 39 pupils who needed tonsil and adenoid operations were done. One child with defective hearing had specialist attention. Six were examined by Dr. Kerr in chest clinics. One child had all necessary orthopedic attention by Dr. Ezra Jones at Manchester and is under the supervision, every other week, of Mrs. Carrie Price, Physiotherapist.

Alton schools had the benefit of the surplus commodities program, and apples, oranges, grapefruit juice, raisins, butter and canned peaches were distributed to the schools. This with the hot lunch program made it

possible for every child to have extra nourishment at school.

Slowly the health standard of Alton pupils is being raised to higher levels by the correction of these physical defects which tend to keep a growing child retarded. As yet we have not approached a 100% mark in this respect but we are now up above the 60% level.

I wish at this time to thank parents, teachers and friends of the Alton pupils for encouraging and helping with this work, especially the Parents' club, which remained faithful to the school in its dental clinic needs. It was a big job well begun.

- Article 9. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 10. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
