#### **TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the eleventh day of March 1986 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 to purchase jointly with the Town of Jackson a parcel of land lying northerly of the presently owned Bartlett/Jackson land on Rte. 16 at the town line. Said parcel containing approximately 25 acres more or less. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance pursuant to NH RSA 676:17: Any violation of the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance is punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$100.00 for each day that such violation is found by a court to continue after the conviction date or after the date on which the violator received written notice from the municipality that he is in violation of the Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance whichever date is earlier. Selectmen favor. ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,600.00 for the purchase of a new sander and to authorize the removal of \$7,600.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said sander. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,497.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser and to authorize the removal of \$11,497.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said cruiser. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to purchase a parcel of land approximately 0.7 acres known as the "big rock" swimming hole on River Street in Bartlett Village and to authorize the removal of \$5,000.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said land. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for engineering and installation of monitoring wells and related items at the sanitary landfill, septage area, and stump dump. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to place in the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to add to the Bicentennial Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,000.00 for the purchase of a new two wheel drive highway truck, plow frame, and body. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to repaint a fire truck, rewire the Glen Fire Station, and replace the front doors at the Town Hall and authorize the removal of \$4,000.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund for payment of said work. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 16. Appointment of a seven member commission to evaluate the status of the Town fire departments. To make recommendations for staffing; operating procedures; equipment purchases or modifications; proposed budget figures for operating and five year capital improvement for structures and major expense items; the chairman of this commission is to be elected by its members, only one Selectman is to be on this commission. Funds appropriated are to be used for travel, phone, consultants, testing of equipment and systems including paying for fire dept. members time when working on tasks required by the commission. \$5,000 if funds this commission will be effective for 1 year (article typed as received, no editorial changes have been made). Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas M. Caughey and others. Selectmen oppose, commission established in 1976.

ARTICLE 17. Selectmen in the Town of Bartlett be limited to two "consecutive" terms. Not prohibiting an individual from three or more terms not consecutive. To be effective March 1987 election. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas M. Caughey and others. Selectmen oppose - article is illegal.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,559.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.80 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,380.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley. Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy J. Hodgkins and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the 1986 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gail F. Paine and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.00 for support of the Community Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Farley and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services and \$750.00 for the Gibson Center Meals Program. Total of \$2,650.00. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,720.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Rob Richardson and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to assist the Carroll County Family Planning and PreNatal Program (Family Health Center). Agreeable to a petition signed by Rob Richardson and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00) in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph D. Van Note, Jr. and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and/or save harmless any person, from time to time, employed by the Town, any member of its Board of Selectmen, any administrative staff members, any member of agencies, boards, committees, or commissions, and/or any elected or appointed Town Officials, all acting for and/or to the benefit of the Town of Bartlett from any personal financial loss or damage and/or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment from any of the following:

A. By reason of any act or omission constituting a violation of the civil rights of any employee or any person under any federal and/or State law or constitution if such act or omission is not committed with malice and the indemnified person at the time of such act or omission was acting within the scope of his/her employment or office, and

B. By reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his/her employment or office;

This vote to remain valid until revoked or modified by subsequent vote of said Town. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to establish the position of full time Recreation Director for the Town of Bartlett and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the initial period of July 1, 1986 to December 31, 1986. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathlyn Nealley and others. Chandler favors, Hodgkins and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### **SELECTMEN'S REPORT**

Growth continues to be the single most important factor affecting the immediate and long range future of the Town of Bartlett. It impacts on every aspect of the environment, economy, and administration of the Town.

The State has imposed conditions (monitoring wells) on the Town Landfill, septage disposal area, and stump dump which are designed to monitor water quality and which will represent a significant investment in tax dollars. Bartlett's current capacity for disposal of solid waste. septage, and stumpage is rapidly diminishing and the town will soon be facing major investment in acquisition of new facilities and/or capabilities. At the same time the disposal capacity is diminishing, the generation of waste is increasing at historic rates. The year 1985 saw an increase in the assessed value of real estate in the Town of Bartlett of \$9.5 million in new construction, the largest annual increase in history and there are no signs of let up in the rate of increase. This increase in valuation provides additional taxes which will act to offset the increased costs created by the rapid growth in Bartlett; costs such as law and order, firefighting, administration, waste disposal, and road maintenance. Your Board of Selectmen has begun the necessary planning to assure that adequate and least cost facilities and capabilities are in place when they are needed.

The citizens of Bartlett enacted a Zoning Ordinance in 1985. It is working well. The major enforcement activities to date have involved signs and setbacks and no appeals were made to the Zoning Board of Adjustment in 1985. The Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board are mutually concerned over the rate and density of growth in Bartlett and have had informal discussions involving a need for more stringent density requirements. Of course, no change can be made to the Zoning Ordinance without properly warned public hearings.

With your approval major improvements have been made to the Town Hall. All of us who work here want to say thank you. We think that the citizens of Bartlett now have one of the best small town administrative facilities in the State of New Hampshire.

Christmas of 1985 witnessed what may become a Bartlett tradition rivalling our celebration of the 4th of July. Organized by the Bartlett School/Community Partnership Program a tree lighting ceremony and parade was conducted in the town square in Bartlett Village. It was well attended and extremely well received. This is a real fine community effort and deserves the participation and appreciation of all Bartlett citizens. The 4th of July Parade continues to gain support and interest. The Town can be proud of those who plan for and participate in the parade. All citizens and businesses are encouraged to participate. We are not looking for expensive or elaborate ideas. Sometimes the simplest float can be a winner. Join the rest of your neighbors in celebration of the most significant event in American history.

The Town has an opportunity to acquire a small piece of land on River Street at the "big rock" swimming hole. Several Bartlett mothers brought to the attention of the Selectmen that what used to be a nice quiet swimming hole for smaller children has now become a very popular recreation spot for out-of-towners rendering it unusable for Bartlett children. The owner of the land (0.7 acres) has agreed to sell the lot to the Town of Bartlett for \$5,000.00. There is a warrant article in this report requesting your approval to buy the land. The Selectmen would institute the controls necessary to restrict usage to Bartlett citizens.

The Town's financial situation continues to be strong. The State no longer allows accumulation of large surpluses which removes the surplus as a source of capital reserve accumulation forcing the Selectmen to do some very careful planning in order to properly correlate future needs and current tax rates. The best way to provide for future needs, of course, is to appropriate capital reserve funds for specific purposes. The Town's capital reserves now exceed \$215,000.00. The details are shown elsewhere in this report. The Town must continue to add to this amount each year to insure that funds are available for known future needs.

The Town is now in the enviable position of having no long term debt. The final \$15,000.00 payment for the fire trucks was made in 1985. It is something like making the last payment on the home mortgage. A historical note which may be of interest; the last five investments funded with long term debt were: River Street Bridge (\$60,000), Bear Mt. Road (\$21,000), Town Garage (\$50,000), East Branch Bridge (\$16,000) and Fire Trucks (\$80,000).

The Towns of Bartlett and Jackson have an opportunity to purchase a 25 acre parcel of land abutting the jointly owned parcel located at the Bartlett-Jackson town line. The towns were unsuccessful in attempts to purchase this parcel coincident with the purchase of the 165 acre parcel in 1984. Purchase of this parcel will expand and protect the uses to which the current parcel can be put thereby increasing its value and utility. Bartlett's share of the \$22,000 cost would be \$11,000 and the Selectmen urge you to support the article appearing in the warrant.

The Town of Bartlett is extremely fortunate in the community spirit and cooperation of its citizens. The many and diversified activities conducted in Bartlett each year are the result of many long dedicated and voluntary hours on the part of people who love their community. The Board of Selectmen wish to say thank you and urge any of you who would similarly like to serve your community to indicate your willingness and desires to the Board.

## BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT 1985

- \* two-day institute "CONNECTING" at UNH on young adult literature

- visited three combined school/public libraries in N.H. and conducted a nationwide survey of combined libraries as part of her integrative study to provide a policy agreement between the school and public library.

The purchase of the photocopier has been a valuable asset to the library. It is being used by the community and the school which is sharing in its cost and servicing.

# BARTLETT-JACKSON EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

The service covers the towns of Bartlett, Jackson, Glen, Intervale and both Crawford and Pinkham Notch to the Carroll County line. We are funded by tax dollars and charge for our service. Residents are charged \$25.00. Nonresidents are charged a \$75.00 base rate. We also charge for mileage when transporting out of our area.

We are based at the Glen Fire Station located on Route 302 in Glen. We are not connected with the Fire Dept. We use a "Type Two" van ambulance. This unit is equipped with the best of supplies and all "State of the art" equipment. We are radio dispatched 24 hours a day by the Carroll County Sheriff's Department Dispatch Center. We have direct communications with the local hospital as well as ten other medical centers throughout New England.

Our fifteen attendants are all Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technician/Advanced Level. All of our attendants have been trained in emergency vehicle operation. Many members have completed other advanced levels of emergency medical and rescue training.

The area is covered 24 hours per day 365 days per year by three EMT's at any given time. We provide emergency coverage for the residents. Other private services in the area provide non-emergency transportation to other medical centers.

We have mandatory training on the first Wednesday of each month. This takes place at the Glen Fire Station and all are welcome. All members of the squad are trained to handle emergency care of any kind, from minor injury to major trauma.

We offer a cost free program to area residents. Project "Medic-Alarm" is offered to persons who have a medical condition. Applicants complete a form and providing the person qualifies, they are issued an I.D. number that is to be used when calling our dispatch center requesting the ambulance. 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# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

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## MINUTES TOWN OF BARTLETT 1985 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the twelfth day of March 1985 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant on February 20, 1985 at the Post Offices in Glen, Bartlett, and Intervale and at the Town Hall in Intervale, the place of meeting, all public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Signed by Frederick T. Hodgkins, Gene G. chandler, and James F. Chadbourne, Board of Selectmen."

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Moderator Paine read the results of the election as follows:

Auditor (1 year) - Linda Burns - 159 Selectman (3 years) - Frederick T. Hodgkins - 162 Trustee of Trust Funds (3 years) - Albert Henn - 158 Library Trustees (3 years/vote for two) -Flora Jones - 154 Kathleen Head - 144 with various write-ins

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion to accept the budget of \$495,476.00 by Gene Chandler, seconded by James Chadbourne. Explanation of each budget item was given by Frederick

Hodgkins. Some discussion ensued re: miles of town road and Stump Dump policies. Norman Head questioned why the airport item had no money spent last year and why no money was appropriated this year. Chandler explained that no request had been received for the money and that the policy is for a letter requesting the appropriation be submitted. Robert Gregory made a motion to amend the budget to include \$300.00 for last year and add \$400.00 for this year's appropriation. Moderator Paine ruled the motion out of order because a special article appears on the warrant to handle this item. David Taylor asked why the money appropriated for the special articles last year did not appear on the budget. Chandler stated it was merely an oversight and would be included in future years. Motion was made by James Chadbourne, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins to accept the budget as read. Joseph Keleman asked why the revenues for Business Profits Tax and Meals and Rooms Tax were not broken down as in previous years. Chandler replies that it was because the State does not break it down anymore, it is received as a block called Shared Revenues. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion to accept the article as discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion to accept the article as read by David Taylor, seconded by John Murphy. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion to accept the article as read by Gene Chandler, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to revoke so much of Article 1. Special Town Meeting, November 29, 1983 that authorizes the raising and borrowing of \$92,000.00 for purchasing jointly with the Town of Jackson certain real estate situated in the towns of Bartlett and Jackson. The land was purchased with appropriated surplus funds and this authorization is no longer required. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Frederick Hodgkins, seconded by Gene Chandler. Brief explanation of article by Hodgkins. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,500.00 to do necessary repairs and renovations of the Town Hall

including relocation of the police department office to the basement and zoning of the Town Hall heating system. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Gene Chandler, seconded by Howard Nichols. Richard Barrows stated that he felt the money appropriation was OK, but didn't feel it was necessary to take the downstairs for the police department; the dining room should be left alone. Gene Chandler explained the renovations in detail. Chandler then stated that he would like to make a motion to amend the article to increase the appropriation by \$2,500.00 giving a total of \$23,000.00 for the renovations. Much discussion ensued re: possible solutions for the utilization of space at town hall. Vote was then taken on the amendment to increase the appropriation to \$23,000, amendment passed. More discussion ensued. Motion was made by Richard Plusch to amend the article to cover just the maintenance/repair costs of \$16,000.00, seconded by James Chadbourne. Vote was taken, amendment failed. Norman Head made the motion to remove the words "to the basement" from the article and add at the end "subject to the ratification of a relocation plan developed by a committee consisting of the Selectmen and 4 townspeople", seconded by William Fabrizio. Frichard Patch stated that he felt the committee should be selected from people present now. Benson Howard made a motion to move the question, seconded by Deanna Howard. Vote was taken to move the question, so moved. Vote was taken on the amendment by Norman Head, amendment passed. Vote was taken on the article, article passed.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,863.00 for the purchase of a new Volvo police cruiser and authorize the removal of \$9,863.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund for the payment of said cruiser. General Revenue Sharing Fund for the payment of said cruiser. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Richard Plusch, seconded by Gail Paine. Brief discussion. Richard Tilton asked why a Volvo if it cost \$2,800 in repairs at Presidential Motors. Gene Chandler explained that the \$2,800 included repairs on two cruisers that had 90,000 and 130,000 miles on them. John Randall asked what the trade-in was on the old cruiser. Bob Kurz answered that a new cruiser was about \$16,000 and it must be a \$6,000 allowance. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,900.00 for the purchase of a new 4 wheel drive truck and authorize the removal of \$24,000.00 from the General Revneue Sharing Fund towards payment of said truck. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Gene Chandler, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. Chandler explained the article. Richard Plusch asked if the truck cost \$74,000 or where was the rest of the money coming from. Chandler explained that \$24,000 would be out of Revenue Sharing and the balance from taxes. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to be used in addition to \$16,700.00 raised in 1984 to insulate

and repair the Town Garage roof. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Frederick Hodgkins, Howard Nichols seconded. Hodgkins spoke to the article. John Murphy raised the question of the cost difference between what was estimated last year and this year. Gene Chandler explained that after an engineer studied the problem, the study revealed more work was necessary. John Randall stated that he had reviewed the specs on the job as it went out to bid and felt it was a very good solution. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to expand and lay out lots at the Glen Cemetery. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Gene Chandler, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. Hodgkins explained that the cemetery simply had run out of room. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be placed in the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Frederick Hodgkins, James Chadbourne seconded. Hodgkins explained that this was in anticipation of future expense for solid waste disposal, most likely an incinerator. Joseph Keleman stated that he felt that his tax dollars should pay for things now and let him get the interest on his money instead of the town. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund in preparation for Bartlett's Bicentennial observation in 1992. Selectmen favor. Motin to accept the article with the change in year to 1990 made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,635.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Sylvia Clemons and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by James Chadbourne, seconded by John Murphy. No one present to speak to the article. John Murphy stated that he thought it was customary in the past that if no one was present to speak to the article that no money was appropriated. Moderator agreed that that had been the custom. Gail Paine spoke for the article although she did not sign the petition. Nancy Hodgkins then spoke for the article and the program. Donna Tetley expanded on some of the programs offered. Gene Chandler stated that if the organization needed the money they should at least show up to speak for it at Town Meeting. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to hire a summer recreation director, a part-time arts & crafts person, and to subsidize the Red Cross Swimming Program. The recreation program is held in conjunction with the Bartlett Summer School Program.

Agreeable to a petition signed by L. Joseph Rivers and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept by Gail Paine, seconded by Geraldine Tilton. Joe Rivers spoke to the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to support the Eastern Slope Regional Airport in Fryeburg, Maine. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Robert Gregory, seconded by James Chadbourne. Robert Gregory made a motion to amend the article to include \$300.00 from last year and \$100.00 for this year, seconded by Howard Nichols. Robert Gregory explained that the airport was used for the Table Mt. Fire in providing water and as a Medivac base for medical emergencies. Richard Patch stated that he felt last year's \$300 was water over the dam but can't understand why we are supporting a Maine airport. A vote was taken on the amendment with a standing vote necessary. Results of the standing vote were 43 in favor of the amendment, 31 opposed. Vote was taken on the article, article passed. (Final amount appropriated was \$700.00).

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard L. Barrows and others. Selectmen favor \$1,500.00. Motion to accept the article as read by Richard Barrows, seconded by Robert Gregory. Barrows spoke for the article. Rose Ann Murtha asked why the Selectmen favored \$1,500.00. Chandler stated that it was such a jump from last year's appropriation, that they had never supported such an increase. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the support of the Gibson Nutrition Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard L. Barrows and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Richard Barrows, seconded by Richard Plusch. Barrows spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to cover expenses incurred in developing a child identification and registry handbook that will include a voluntary finger printing session in April at the Bartlett School. Agreeable to a petition signed by Chief of Police Robert Snow and others. Motion to accept the article as read by Frederick Hodgkins, seconded by Howard Nichols. Joe Rivers spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,066.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C & Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy Hodgkins and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Nancy Hodgkins, seconded by Gail Paine. Nancy Hodgkins spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Farley and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Michael Farley, seconded by Scott Gregory. Farley spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lois Nelson and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion to accept the article as read by Gail Paine, seconded by Frederick Hodgkins. No one present to speak for the article. Rose Ann Murtha asked why the Selectmen felt the way they did. Hodgkins stated he felt it helped to promote the valley and keep our economy going. Gene Chandler stated that he felt it was not an appropriate town expenditure. James Chadbourne agreed with Chandler. Joseph Keleman spoke for the article. Steve Eastman spoke for the article. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Constance Spencer and others. Hodgkins favors \$300.00, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Limited motion by Gene G. Chandler to appropriate \$165.00, seconded by Benson Howard. Nancy Hodgkins spoke for the article. Frederick T. Hodgkins made a motion to amend the article to appropriate \$500, seconded by Gail Paine. Vote was taken on the amendment, amendment passed. Vote was taken on the article, article passed. (Final amount appropriated was \$500.00).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 in support of the Carroll County Program on Domestic Violence. Agreeable to a petition signed by Geraldine Tilton and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion to accept the article as read by Geraldine Tilton, seconded by Robert Gregory. Tilton spoke for the article. James Chadbourne asked what the program did. Tilton responded. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,483.25 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. said sum being equal to \$1.75 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Terrie Kroger, seconded by Howard Nichols. Kroger spoke for the article. No discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by George Scott Gregory and others. Selectmen favor \$1,000. Motion to accept the article as read by George Scott Gregory,

seconded by Lois Gregory. A representative from the Center of Hope was given permission to speak for the article. Len Friedman asked why the Selectmen favored \$1,000.00. Gene Chandler stated that it was to cover the number of Bartlett residents that were there. Discussion ensued as to the number of people there and whether they were Bartlett residents or placed there by the State. Gene Chandler made a motion to amend the article to appropriate \$1,000.00, seconded by James Chadbourne. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment, amendment passed. Vote was taken on the article, article passed.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the 1985 Capital Budget of The Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a peition signed by Lois K. Gregory and others. Selectmen favor. Motion to accept the article as read by Lois Gregory, seconded by George Scott Gregory. Joseph Keleman asked why a resident and a non-resident pay the same thing at the hospital, why doesn't the resident get a break? Lois Gregory stated that all people pay the same for their expenses at the hospital, this money was for equipment. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article passed.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Richard Patch made a motion to have the Town Hall Renovation Committee as voted on in Article 7 be selected from those present, seconded by Norman Head. Vote was taken, article passed. Moderator asked all those interested in being on the committee to contact Frederick Hodgkins after the meeting.

Joseph Keleman made a motion to move Town Meeting to the School, seconded by Terrie Kroger. Gene Chandler stated that he felt we should wait until the Town Hall Renovation Committe came up with their solution before moving Town Meeting since there is still plenty of room at Town Hall. David Taylor stated that the Selectmen can decide wherever Town Meeting needs to be and leave the decision up to them. No further discussion. Vote was taken, article was defeated.

Frederick Hodgkins asked James Chadbourne to review the progress of the Zoning Ordinance. Chadbourne reviewed the progress and future plans of the Zoning Study Committee.

Motion was made by Richard Patch to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Richard Barrows. Vote was taken, meeting adjourned at 10:15 PM.

TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY-LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more. Violation = fine of \$10.00/day from beginning of construction plus up to \$100.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.

- SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.
- ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- STUMP DUMP REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.
- ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation = fine of \$25.00.
- TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.
- EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of \$10.00 + board reimbursement.
- PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation + fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.
- SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.
- ZONING ORDINANCE: covers setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, signs, etc. Copies available at Town Hall.

Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Dr. Francis M. Murphy

#### STATE OF THE SCHOOLS

In the year since my last report to you in this booklet, a great deal has happened. The New Hampshire Legislature has approved a bill allowing retroactive payment to the Conway School Board for building aid for having an AREA school, if by 1988 Conway succeeds with the sending towns in officially becoming an AREA school. The law requires many things in order to be so considered. We have met that code since 1961 with one notable exception. In order to be an AREA school, the towns must elect, or have their moderator appoint, an AREA School Planning Committee to write the contract (AREA Plan) under which the school will run. If we had done this in 1961 when our present contract was initiated, the state would be paying 55% of our capital building costs instead of the present 30%. Such an agreement would be benefitting us by about \$50,000 per year. In the time elapsed since the passage of the bill to the deadline in 1988, the state would be responsible to pay us \$150,000. This is the chief benefit of the plan from a Conway perspective.

What's in it for the sending towns? Make no doubt about it, Conway owns and controls Kennett High School. However, an APEA agreement could formalize the outlying towns' rights to have input to the Kennett budget, program, and operations. Further, presently none of the outlying towns has any long term agreement with Conway about the rights to secure for their children space for junior high school students or elementary students. The Conway School Board could exclude the Albany and Eaton K-6 students any year without notice, or the Freedom, Madison, and Jackson junior high students. Such an arrangement does not lead to good planning and is perilous for the towns involved. The present high school contract extends only to 1993, after which each town would have to negotiate whether or not they could continue at Kennett High School and how the tuition costs would be apportioned. In such negotiations the towns would be relatively powerless to seek their own advantage. An AREA agreement could and should address all of these problems. With the substantial sum of money to benefit the Conway School District at risk, the outlying towns are presently in their best negotiating posture.

One of the questions people ask about an APFA agreement is, Can a town pull out of it once it's begun? The law states that any town, with a 2/3 vote, can withdraw from an AREA agreement with a one year warning anytime after the AREA agreement has been in force for three years. If the AREA school enters a capital building expense (like a new building), the withdrawing school has to continue to pay its share of that capital expense until it is paid off. However, the AREA agreement law holds that such capital expenses must be approved not only by the receiving school but also by the sending school. In short, withdrawal from an AREA agreement plan is far easier than withdrawal from the present contract. At this time no one is asking any of the towns to agree to an AREA agreement. What the voters are being asked for is to agree to send three representatives, at least one of which is a school board member, to a planning committee to create such a plan. Only after the plan is created will the voters be asked to approve or disapprove the plan. Even a town skeptical about having an AREA agreement is wise to send representatives to the planning committee because unless the town is represented on the planning committee, they will have no input in the final plan; and such a plan could be beneficial to any of the towns in SAU #9 if it is done well.

Other developments of note this year include a focus on discipline in the junior/senior high school. The Kennett administrative staff has been reorganized so that all five full-time administrators have discipline responsibilities instead of only one. It is tougher and tougher for students to get away with disciplinary infractions at the junior/senior high school. We have set up an in-school suspension room so that suspended students need not be released on the streets, but instead are forced to continue their studies in an isolated room away from their friends.

The junior high school at Kennett has finally been completely separated from the senior high school. Students do not have to leave the junior high to speak to an administrator or go to the guidance office. The teachers in the junior high have created their own bell schedule and their own program, including welcome and new junior high activities.

The new K-12 computer curriculum is being piloted in a number of schools, and after revision this summer, will be implemented throughout the SAU. The science and language arts curriculum are in the midst of a complete revision (K-12). Language arts includes reading, writing, and spelling.

Through cooperation with the Red Jacket and the Chamber of Commerce, it looks as though we will be able to borrow the Birchmont Tavern next year as an instructional space to install a new culinary arts program, training our students to work in restaurants here in the Valley. The Adult Education program in the Conway School District, begun on a shoestring, has developed well in its first year. It looks as though by July 1 the district will have made a small profit in the area of adult education. The programs offered have been diverse, ranging from a one night seminar about Halley's comet, to a six week program training people to become bank tellers. We have been able to put together a small but dedicated group of people to earn their high school equivalency degree, and have brought the Berlin Vocational Technical School to Kennett to offer still more educational opportunities to our community.

As of this writing, we still do not have the results from the state-wide achievement testing. Preliminary results from the state indicate that the SAU overall tested above average for schools in the State of New Hampshire. We are not yet the best school in the state, merely a good school working very hard to become better.

Our Community/School Partnership Committee worked vigorously and continued to provide good coverage of our school and community activities through our newsletter. We appreciate the support we received from our business people who sponsored ads in the newsletter to defray the expenses.

The Bartlett Public and School Library celebrated their 25th year of cooperative programming.

Students participated in a "Read Across America" challenged by Presidential Motors. Students met that challenge and received a VCR donated by Dale Goodwin and Presidential Motors staff.

We were appreciative to Gene and Jean Roberts for their donation of a 19" color television in memory of their son Brian.

Students participated in the Race to Beat Cancer, raising \$200.00, sponsored two skiers with Christopher and Tricia Sullivan among the winners.

Our sports program provided many thrills; our boys basketball team won the Kennett Invitational Tournament. Our middle grade soccer team won the Madison Tournament.

A highlight of our year in the arts was the presentation of the King & I by the Drama Club and an outstanding performance by our school band and chorus.

The Community/School Partnership sponsored a computer awareness night, and sponsored a Child Identification Program put on by Chief Snow and his staff.

Our achievement testing results in basic skills were outstanding, and students scored above the national norm in 90% of all areas tested.

CPP became a practical course offering for 8th graders; we are grateful to the instructors for their time and expertise, Kathy Haley and Frank Graves.

Twenty-nine students graduated to Kennett High School. The ceremony was held in the gym. The Rev. Frank Graichen gave the invocation, and Mrs. Arden Schoen gave the community address. Student addresses were given by class President Lara Pelzar, Cheri Chisholm, and Craig Garland. Graduation awards were presented to the following:
