## COMMISSIONER'S REPORT.

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### *To the Citizens of Belknap County:*

In compliance with the requirements of the laws of New Hampshire, your Commissioners herewith submit the report of their financial transactions for the year ending December 31, 1917, and a statement of the financial condition of the county at the end of the year, together with the reports of the other county officers required by law. Attention is called to these reports for detailed information regarding the work done in different departments of the county's business.

Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Batchelder, as superintendent and matron of the farm, alms-house and house of correction, have demonstrated their qualifications for the positions they hold by the manner in which they have met and solved the many unusual problems with which they have been confronted during the past year.

The farm crops were good with the exception of potatoes, which were damaged on account of weather conditions.

A five-acre piece of winter rye produced 163 bushels of grain, which has been of much value on account of the shortage of wheat.

As might be expected there has been an increase in running expenses in all departments of the county's work over those of last year.

As we were not at war when the year's appropriation was made, it was made for peace conditions, and many of the conditions that we have been obliged to meet were

not in evidence at that time and were not considered in making the appropriations, but for a large part of the year have drawn heavily on the county's finances and occasioned the hiring of more money than usual in anticipation of taxes.

There has been a marked decrease in the number of house of correction prisoners, which made it necessary to hire help to do the work which the prisoners have usually done.

We purchased a manure spreader, reaper and a hay fork, which solved the help question in those particular lines of work, without which much of the work could not have been done at the proper time.

The interior of the inmate's departments, including the women's dining room, have been repaired and put in first-class condition and a number of other improvements made, at an expense of \$2,378.01.

A telephone system has been installed at the farm, and has proved itself a valuable asset in the efficient conduct of the work of the institution.

The appropriation has been \$32,000.00 for the past ten years. Previous to 1909 it varied from \$30,000.00 to \$35,500.00, according to the conditions the county had to meet. It is evident if the present high prices continue that it will be impossible to meet the running expenses without an increased appropriation.

Recent acts of the Legislature have also placed new financial burdens upon the county which must be added to the usual expenses.

We wish to express our most hearty thanks to the various county, city and town officials and all other citizens who in any way have rendered assistance to the county or those whom the county has been called on to aid.

In closing my fifth annual report as superintendent of Belknap County Farm, I refer with regret to the increased cost of board; but if the taxpayers will bear in mind that about everything purchased for the farm has increased in

price from fifty percent to one hundred and fifty percent, they will readily see the cause. Then, again, I refer with pride to the commissioners' efforts in making extensive repairs in the inmates rooms, so that at the present time they have very desirable apartments.

I wish to thank the commissioners, County Delegation and all taxpayers for the many improvements that have been made, and the interest they have taken in the welfare of the institution. Also, Mrs. Batchelder and myself wish to extend our hearty thanks to all who assisted in making our Christmas entertainment the best ever.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

*To the Honorable Commissioners of Belknap County:*

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit herein my report as Chaplain of the County Farm for the ten months ending October 31, at which time my removal from the city made my resignation as Chaplain necessary.

The usual religious services have been conducted each month with the exception of July and August, and these ministrations have been made as helpful as possible to the inmates of the Farm. Also by personal touch with them, the Chaplain has sought to give that friendliness and good cheer by which lives are blessed.

During the year there was an unusual amount of sickness resulting in death, as the Superintendent's report will show, and the Chaplain was called upon to officiate at four of these funerals.

The work done with those in the Jail and House of Correction is, of necessity, limited, and yet right there is an opportunity for a work that may be fruitful, a redemption that shall bless mankind.

The fact that the number in both the Jail and House of Correction is so small is a cause of congratulation to Belknap County, and when the State prohibitory law becomes effective we may confidently look for even a less number of law-breakers.

Again the Chaplain would express his sincere appreciation of the unfailing courtesy and co-operation of the Superintendent and his wife in making his work as agreeable as possible, and to count for the most; and for the splendid assistance of the employees of the institution. It is with regret that this fellowship is severed.

## SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

---

*To the Commissioners of Belknap County:*

I beg leave to submit herewith a report of this office for the year ending December 31, 1917.

At the March term of court, 1917, only five indictments were found: Two for obtaining money under false pretences, one for breaking and entering and larceny, one for larceny, and one for fraudulent sale. Convictions were obtained and disposition made of all these cases except the last, in which case the respondent has never been located and taken into custody. Of eight old cases standing on the docket at this term, disposition was made of six, by various orders of the court, and the other two were continued to the October term. At this time also three police court appeals were entered, all of which were continued to the October term.

At the October term, 1917, fourteen indictments were found: Two for statutory rape, one for attempted rape, two for larceny, four for burglary, three for attempted robbery, one for adultery, and one for first degree murder. The murder case has recently been disposed of by the court by the imposition of a sentence of life imprisonment upon the plea of the respondent of guilty to murder in the first degree. State prison sentences were imposed in two of the rape cases as well as in the attempted robbery cases. Jail sentences were imposed in one of the burglary cases and in one of the larceny cases, but no disposition has yet been made in five of the indictments, in three of these because the respondents are still at large, in another because the respondent is serving a sentence elsewhere, and the remaining one was continued to the March term, 1918. Two police court appeals were entered at this term, both of which

were continued to the March term. Disposition was also made, by various orders of the court, of eight old cases standing on the docket.

The Supreme court has rendered a decree in the case of the town of Tilton against the city of Concord which I referred to in my last report, the prosecution being made by me at the request of the town of Tilton, in which it is held that a settlement acquired in a town or city is lost, while aid is still being furnished, after ten years from the time the pauper commenced to acquire such settlement, the pauper then becoming a county charge.

The prosecution of wife and child deserters still requires much attention. Every effort is being made to put a stop to this nefarious practice. Otherwise, except for a remarkable era of crime in June and July of 1917, the criminal situation seems constantly to improve. On April 1st, 1917, the law went into effect depriving solicitors of extra compensation for the prosecution of illegal sales of intoxicating liquor. Notwithstanding, this office has continued diligently to look after such cases, and a considerable number of convictions have been made in the police courts. Recently this condition also appears to be improved, due perhaps, however, to the high cost of living.

County Delegation met at the Court House in Laconia on above date, the following members being present: Messrs. Clough, Cotton, Sanborn, Page, Spring, Johnson, Lowe, Seaverns, Pearson, Sanborn, Munsey, Leavitt, Torsey and Tilton.

In the absence of Chairman Wright, Clerk Pearson called the meeting to order and the convention chose Major Charles E. Tilton temporary chairman.

Col. Stephen S. Jewett, Chairman of the Belknap County Bar Association, addressed the delegation in regard to the need of more room in the Offices of Register of Deeds and Register of Probate, and recommended that the county purchase land and build a separate building east of the Court House for the Register of Deeds.

Judge Frank P. Tilton advocated an addition to the present structure and George B. Cox spoke in favor of an addition.

Judge F. M. Beckford addressed the meeting in regard to the lack of room in the Court House; also Rep. Spring spoke along the same lines.

Architect Albert H. Dow submitted estimates of a separate building at \$31,000.00 and an addition to the present building of \$33,000.00, both estimates meaning fireproof construction. After remarks by several others, adjournment was made to the County Farm for dinner. The

buildings and stock were inspected by the delegation. Commissioner Randlett called the delegation to order in the dining room and spoke in regard to the needs of the county for the coming two years.

Clerk of Court Edwin P. Thompson addressed the meeting in regard to the increase in court expenses in the future.

Leland M. James said he thought the County Agent should have an increase in salary of \$300 annually.

Rep. E. H. Shannon spoke about the fixed expenses of the county, saying that they could not be avoided and in his opinion it was better to pay as you go.

Harry E. Morrison of Orford, Commissioner of Grafton county, made remarks about the increased cost of help and provisions used by counties and thought counties should have increased appropriations on that account.

Clerk of Court Thompson spoke further in relation to court expenses, saying that during his thirty-two years' connection with the court he had noticed that there was increased cost in maintaining the court. The witness fees and pay of jurors had increased and he thought the appropriation recommended by the Commissioners would all be needed, but if it was not all needed the balance would keep for the next year.

Rep. Tilton asked for information in regard to the price and quantity of coal.

On motion of Pearson a vote of thanks was extended to Supt. and Mrs. Batchelder and the Commissioners for the excellent dinner served.

On motion of Rep. Tilton, it was voted to adjourn.

The Belknap County Delegation met at 10 A. M., Chairman Wright presiding. Messrs. Merrill, Shannon and Torsey were absent.

Rep. Spring spoke to the delegation relative to the need of installing sprinklers in the Court House at Laconia so that the county might have the benefit of reduced insurance rates.

F. E. Pearson talked about the same matter.

On motion of Mr. Dodge of Laconia the chair appointed a committee consisting of Spring and Sanborn of Laconia and Tilton of Tilton to look into the question of insurance and the cost of placing a sprinkler system in the Court House.

Mr. Dodge then addressed the delegation in relation to the purchase of more land near the Court House.

On motion of Rep. Clough of Alton it was voted to refer the matter of acquiring more land and making changes at the Court House to the delegation of the next legislature.

Mr. Page of Gilmanton brought up the matter of appropriation. He said that the delegation should come prepared next week to take final action in the matter.

Remarks were made by Mr. Dodge on the same subject; also as to the need of better fire protection at the Court House.

Rep. Clough made inquiries and remarks along the same lines.

On motion of Mr. Lowe it was voted to adjourn.

Concord, N. H., April 3, 1917.

A meeting of the delegation convened on the above date, presided over by Chairman Wright.

Roll call of members showed 18 present and Royal L. Page, Leonard B. Morrill and William R. Clough absent. The chairman addressed the Delegation regarding the appropriation, sprinkler proposition and jurors' room at the Court House. Rep. Shannon spoke about matters pertaining to the appropriation.

Mr. Dodge was of the opinion that the appropriation should not exceed \$28,000 per year.

The meeting then adjourned until 3 P. M.

The adjourned meeting assembled at 3 P. M.

Mr. Shannon brought up the matter of appropriation and moved that \$32,000 be raised for the expenses of Belknap county for the year 1917. The motion was seconded. Rep. Dodge offered an amendment to the motion by substituting \$28,000 in place of \$32,000.

The amendment was lost.

Mr. Dodge then moved that the meeting adjourn until 9.45. A division of the meeting was called for, resulting in 6 voting for and 11 against adjournment.

The delegation then voted to appropriate \$32,000 for the calendar year 1917, eight members voting for and five against the proposition.

Mr. Shannon then moved that we appropriate \$31,000 for the year 1918. Mr. Dodge moved for an amendment, asking that the amount be made \$30,000. The amendment was lost. The delegation then voted to make the appropriation for 1918 \$31,000.

Mr. Wright recommended that the County Commissioners install a suitable sprinkler system in the Court House.

On motion of Mr. Shannon the meeting then adjourned.
