THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canaan in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Canaan Elementary School in said Canaan on Tuesday, the Fifth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax revenues.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey by quitclaim deed all property acquired by tax deed, or to take any other action thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to receive partial payments from any person, firm or corporation owning taxable property and before tax bills of the amount of taxes assessed against said property for the year has been received. Such sums shall be divisible by ten but not less than ten dollars, and the Tax Collector shall receive such payments and give a receipt therefor and credit the amount toward the amount of taxes eventually assessed against said property.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or State Aid in the name of the Town of Canaan.

- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to build a new dock (removable, floating or stationary) at the location of the present Town owned dock on Canaan Street Lake at a cost not to exceed \$7,000.00.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Recreation Commission consisting of five citizens, who shall serve without pay, to be appointed by the Selectmen. The two persons first appointed shall serve for three years; the two persons next appointed for two years; the fifth person appointed for one year. Their successors shall be appointed for three years. Vacancies as they occur shall be filled for unexpired term only. Said Commission to operate and maintain the Canaan Town Beach, and to make reasonable charges for the use thereof.
- 8. To see if the Town will impose a tow-away ordinance (at vehicle owner expense) of violators of parking rules at Town Beach area.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Canaan Recreation Commission to hold a public meeting each year prior to opening the Town Beach to discuss rules regulations, fees and amount of money to be spent on salaries.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish the follow-lowing ordinance:

"Under the provisions of Chapter 466, Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, the Selectmen of Canaan hereby orders that all dogs within the limits of Canaan shall be restrained from running at large. A dog shall be deemed to be restrained from running at large when it is kept upon the property of its owner or keeper, or is kept within an enclosure on the property of its owner or keeper, or is kept on a leash or is under the immediate control of its owner or keeper."

The failure of the owner or keeper of a dog to comply with this order may subject the owner or keeper to a fine up to \$25.00.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make prorata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to employ the services of the State of New Hampshire assessors to obtain more equalized assessments or take any action thereto.
- 13. Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters: To see if the Town will vote to designate Codfish Hill from the Westerly point where the paved road surface now ends to the intersection of Sawyer Hill Road, and Sawyer Hill Road from the intersection of Talbert Road to the intersection of Hinkson Road as scenic under the

provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18, for the purposes of protection and enhancing the scenic beauty of Canaan, and further, that the Selectmen of said Town, Canaan, shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7(I).

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at a previous Town meeting that permanent police officers shall be elected by ballot; and commencing with the 1975 annual meeting and thereafter the Chief of Police shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 41, Section 47.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Canaan Board of Selectmen to issue and enforce the following Building Permit Ordinance for the Town of Canaan, or act thereon:

SECTION I. On and after the date upon which this Ordinance is adopted by the Town of Canaan it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to construct or establish any preconstructed building or edifice, including mobile homes, on any plot of land in the Township of Canaan without having obtained a written building permit issued by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Canaan. The cost of such permit will be one dollar (\$1.00) and application for such permit must be made in writing to the Board of Selectmen in the form required by them, at least seven days before starting construction or of moving a structure onto said property.

SECTION II. PENALTY. Any person or persons, or corporation who violates any provision of this Ordinance may, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) or more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) and each day's failure of compliance with such provisions may constitute a separate violation.

- 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 17. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or any other officers heretofor chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of seven (7), one to be a selectman, one to be a Historic District Commissioner, to study the alternatives, hold public hearing and present a plan of use in regards to the Old Meeting House and that when the taking up of all other articles of this warrant is completed this meeting be adjourned to July 2, 1974 at which time it will reconvene to take any appropriate action on this article.

MASCOMA AREA HEALTH COUNCIL

Summary of Services for Town Report January 1, 1973 to December 31, 1973

Born out of the Town Meetings in 1969, the Council is completing its fifth year of service to Canaan, Enfield, Grafton and Orange. Serving a population of a little more than 5,000, the Council's two nurses (each working half time) provide nursing in the home and a complete health

prevention and health promotion program.

In 1969 the Council began quarterly immunization clinics for all preschoolers. In 1971 this service was expanded to the present monthly Well Child Conferences. An average of 185 preschool children is enrolled in this free program, which is heavily supported by the Bureau of Maternal and Child Health, New Hampshire Division of Public Health. Under this program, each child regularly receives a full physical examination, all necessary immunizations, and tests for vision and hearing. Parents are seen with the children, problems are discussed and if necessary referred for further treatment. The Council's nurses make follow up visits when needed. For any child who will not see a private physician the Council provides the full physical exam necessary for entrance to kindergarten or first grade. It is also under contract to supervise the health of the children in the Headstart program.

Nutritionists are available at each clinic, and are also available to adults needing help on dietary matters. A representative of Planned Parenthood is also available for counseling when needed.

No funds have become available for the long hoped for dental program, but this past year, with generous financial help from the Lions Clubs of Canaan and Enfield the Council was able to institute a new program of counseling on preventive dentistry.

The Council depends for support on the four towns served, each of which contributes annually on the basis of its population, and on Medicaid and Medicare where it is applicable. While we must of necessity set a charge for services other than the free preschool clinics, the services are available to everyone, regardless of ability to pay that charge.

At present our nurses are Mrs. Gertrude Clark, R.N. of Grafton and Mrs. Toni Sadowsky of West Lebanon. During the year 1973 they have made almost 1,500 visits to area residents for nursing service, health promotion, counseling or support.

In November of 1973 the Council, in cooperation with local physicians and the American Cancer Society, offered to area women a free clinic testing program for cancer. We hope another such program can be offered in 1974. In addition, plans are now being made with the Council on Aging for an Adult Health Screening program to be held annually in the area.

The Council is governed by a volunteer board of directors elected from the four towns, and its medical policies and practices are supervised by a Medical Advisory Board consisting of area physicians and several volunteers.

The Council maintains its office in the Health Room at Mascoma Valley Regional High School, with its own telephone (632-7234). It is heavily dependent on, and grateful to, the Methodist Churches of Canaan and Enfield and the School, which provide space for its clinics and meetings, and to the school for its office space there. A pamphlet describing the Council and its work and service is available on resquest. Its monthly meetings (first Monday evenings at the School) are open to the public, and visitors and volunteers are welcomed.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

As our main objective of developing a Master Plan for the Town of Canaan the Planning Board members, with the help of volunteers, undertook a house-to-house survey last spring. The purpose of the survey was threefold, namely: 1. To obtain population data by age, sex, school and employment characteristics, 2. To gather land use information to be incorporated into a land use map and, 3. To determine those elements that the residents of Canaan are most concerned about and want to see improved. This was a major task requiring many hours of participation. Although the work was only 80% completed it will give a good picture of how the town has been growing. The land use information is presently being mapped by the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

As an important part of developing a Master Plan the Planning Board began a series of open public meetings this fall. The purpose of the meetings was 1. To inform the public of our activities — particularly the survey findings, 2. To describe purpose of planning in Canaan and to get the public involved in determining goals and objectives that can affect future town growth and tax rates and 3. To initiate a public forum to bring up opposing viewpoints.

We had two very interesting meetings, one concerning small town planning in New Hampshire and the other a very interesting talk and discussion on mobile homes and how they affect tax rates and ways to protect the owners interests as well as the towns'. There was only a minimal turnout at these meetings which did not correspond to the interest indicated by our survey.

Our survey indicated extreme interest in local employment (businesses), in school problems and in taxes (as

expected) among other concerns. Many also felt a need for recreational facilities for the elderly as well as for student-age children. We hope to expand public interest in the coming year.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In March of 1973 at the Canaan Town Meeting it was voted to establish a Conservation Commission in the town consisting of 5 members. It is this commission's function to assist selectmen and policy making bodies in making resource related decisions, promote proper use of the area's natural resources and municipally owned lands, receive gifts of money or property in the name of the town and oversee their management, distribute conservation materials to citizen's groups and act as a facilitator in individuals' and the town resource problem solving.

In Canaan this year much was done in the way of organization and sponsorship of projects. The commission consisting of members with diverse backgrounds had to organize their information and establish priorities for the needs of the town. The priorities decided upon were:

- 1. The flooding (high water level) in the town of Canaan.
- 2. The necessity of proper soils information.
- 3. The both unsightly and dangerous junk car situation.
- 4. The necessity of finding a site for the open land fill to be ready for operation in 1975.

The commission had to find resources for attacking these problems and then to oversee the proper development of a solution to each.

- 1. With the assistance of this commission a careful one year study is being undertaken to determine the Indian River's relationship to the annual flooding problem in Canaan.
- 2. The United States Soil Conservation Service will be doing a comprehensive soils mapping of 19,000

acres. This map is necessary in determining proper development of Canaan.

The Conservation Commission received grants totalling \$4,750.00 for this purpose. The town allocated \$2,000.00 and the Ford Foundation matched this money with \$2,750.00.

- 3. The Conservation Commission recognized the junk car situation and undertook the removal of 30 cars this year from the town. Next year the Commission hopes to expand this project with the cooperation of the town's citizens again.
- 4. The Conservation Commission has requested help from the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council, the regional planning agency for a solution to the land fill dump sight situation. A report is planned with an eye to a regional solution.

The Conservation Commission meets monthly, Ordinarily the second Monday of the month at the selectmen's office. Public concern and participation is urged.

This year has been very busy and hopefully during 1974 the culmination of much of this work will be seen.

UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council (formerly the Upper Valley Planning and Development Council) has two members from the Town of Canaan who have gone to the monthly meetings in our first year of re-entry into the Council, John Hammond representing the Planning Board and Mary Thompson representing the Conservation Commission. A joint committee consisting of these two members as well as the chairman of the two respective organizations was formed to coordinate requests to the Council.

Through the joint committee and the council representatives the Town of Canaan submitted a list of items for the council to work on to compliment the work of the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission. These items included 1. an aerial photogrammetric mosaic of the Town of Canaan at a scale of 1" equals 1000 feet. 2. A land use map on appropriate base maps. 3. A delineation of soils as mapped by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service to date and 4. A report on the sanitary landfill dump site problem in Canaan. Prior to Town Meeting we hope to have the results of these requests.

REPORT OF THE CANAAN HISTORICAL MUSEUM 1973

The Museum was founded in the Bi-Centennial Year of 1961. It is located on the second floor of the Town Library and is to be open Saturdays from 1 P. M. to 4 P. M. July 6 through August 31, 1974, and by special appointment for schools and groups. Admission is free and help is voluntary. Funds are acquired through \$1.00 membership donations, sales of food, handicrafts, cards, maps, and Bi-Centennial Histories.

The annual opening Tea was held June 30th with Mrs. Edward L. Stevens and Mrs. Norman C. Wakely in charge. Both these ladies had served as curators in the past.

The Museum is a member of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and is situated on Canaan Street in The Canaan Historic District, which is listed in The National Register of Historic Places in Washington, D. C. It is also a member of The Associated Historical Societies of New Hampshire.

The attendence grows and interesting new articles are given to the Museum each year. It is hoped that all our townspeople will stop by often for visits.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION REPORT

Five years ago the Canaan Historic District and the Canaan Historic District Commission were created and established by town vote, under authority granted by State enabling legislation. This was a pioneering effort. The first Commission and its successors faced problems of philosophy and procedure for which there was no precedent to indicate a solution. They proceeded cautiously through research and experience, developing guidelines which have worked reasonably well.

Drawing on this experience, the Commission has concentrated, during 1973, on the drafting of a coherent philosophy of purpose and on writing revised and more specific regulations. This ordinance will be voted on at Town Meeting, March 1974 and although this is not radically different from our old guidelines, we have attempted to make them more workable.

The Commission has also been busy this year raising money for the preservation of the Town Meeting House. The Third Art of Northern New England Show, held at Cardigan Mountain School August 4th to 12th, received a great deal of enthusiastic support and realized a profit of three thousand dollars for the Town Meeting House. Our heartfelt thanks go to all those who supported this momentous task by being patrons, contributing their time, helping with the actual physical operation, loaning paintings and purchasing paintings.

Funds from the Art Show together with previous fund raising attempts went toward the first phase of the preservation of the Town Meeting House. After a great deal of research as to the proper steps of preservation the selectmen authorized Mr. Philip Baker of Antrim, N. H. to do the foundation work using the money the Historic Commission had raised for that purpose.

The final acceptance of both the Town Meeting House and the entire Historic District in the National Register of Historic Places in Washington, D. C. was received.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN RECREATION COMMITTEE

This is the first year of the town recreation committee working as a group. Much of the early months were therefore spent discovering what recreational facilities the Town of Canaan possessed. First we found that the playground equipment at Williams Field was in a dangerous state and required removal. The Committee then attacked the problem of the Town Beach where they spread sand, obtained and placed buoys, obtained and placed picnic tables, built and placed a Life-Guard Stand, had a telephone installed, cleared brush from the beach area, marked a parking area, and put up a beach sign.

There was one other major task at the beach facing the Committee: the Dock. In early spring, when work at the beach began, the dock was hanging precariously into the lake. We thought that it would be a simple task to jack up the end and straighten out the existing supports. We had a sad awakening: the ice had made the supports useless and the ice and water had rotted the underside of the dock away. After many volunteer man-hours and many disappointing attempts a "stop gap one season repair" was completed. The fact that the dock was beyond restoration was made more evident in the Fall when additional repairs were attempted and the rotten underside was realized.

A 4th of July Celebration was coordinated at which time the town enjoyed a Parade and many races. This being a success we tried a Labor Day Observance, featuring a "Men vs. Women Softball Game"—won by the women. Later in the year a Harvest Festival was held.

The Committee wishes to thank all the people and organizations who were so generous with money, ma-

terials, and labor in helping us. We also thank the citizens of Canaan for their patience with us as this was our first year.

We hope that next year can be a bigger and better year for Recreation in the Town of Canaan, but we remind you that the dock at the beach last year must be removed. If we are to have any dock at the beach, a new one will have to be installed.
