REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

We are here to serve you. You elected us to provide you with good advice at Town Meetings and to see that the Town is well managed during the course of the year. That is not always an easy task. But we take the job seriously and give it our best. We meet each Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. and our first half hour is open to unscheduled visits by anyone with a problem or a complaint. We try very hard to listen to the community.

We want Town services to be both good and affordable. It is difficult to draw the line on how much is affordable or to set priorities, but we must. As times get tougher we must work together more than ever. We are proud of both our union and our non union employees who accepted a wage freeze for 1991.

Taxes went down in 1990 by \$.10 per thousand, due to our restraint. That may not seem like much, but it reversed a long upward trend.

The Board worked on many projects in 1990, but none was more satisfactory than the reaction to the Swift River Covered Bridge. The Special Town Meeting support was great, and the outpouring of money and support by many private citizens was truly overwhelming. Thank you for your community spirit.

The many fine unpaid members of our Boards and Committees keep ours a government by the people and deserve our gratitude. In addition to their normal Selectmen duties, Raymond Leavitt, Jr., stepped forward to organize local economic development efforts and chairs the Fire Advisory Committee, and Cynthia Briggs serves on the Highway Advisory Task Force and the Planning Board.

It has been my pleasure to have served you the past 3 years and I thank you for your support.

CONWAY TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Karl Seidenstuecker Auditorium at Kennett High School, Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1991, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1 through 16 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-11.1 and 147-24 by modifying the regulations and the Shoreline Protection District boundaries along Pequawket Pond.

ARTICLE 3. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-4, 147-6, 147-11.B(3), 147-15.E, and 147-11.1.B(4) by consolidating and modifying the provisions of the code pertaining to non-conforming uses, lots and structures into one Code Section 147-4.

ARTICLE 4. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-12.A by correcting a typographical mistake in the Commercial Home Occupations regulations.

ARTICLE 5. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-13.D by clarifying the text to provide for two separate special exceptions within the Wetlands Conservation District.

ARTICLE 6. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-6 and 147-17.2 by modifying the structure height regulations and adding new definitions.

ARTICLE 7. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-14.D(2) (b) by clarifying the text regarding allowance of replacement of existing septic systems within the Floodplain Conservation District.

ARTICLE 8. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 7 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19.G(5) (c) (4) by allowing gas stations to use readerboard signs to display gasoline prices.

ARTICLE 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 8 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19.G.1 by adding a new section (a) to permit signs with a message area of up to eighty (80) square feet for large, multi-use business complexes and certain residential developments.

ARTICLE 10. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 9 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Hawkers and Peddlers Code amending provisions of Conway Code 102-4 by adding a new Section 102-4.1 to permit food vending carts to be regulated and permitted by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 11. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 10 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Building Construction, Non residential and Multifamily Code amending provisions of Conway Code 89 by incorporating the BOCA Basic Building Code, 1990 edition, for non residential and multifamily structures of three or more units and deleting reference and incorporation of the 1984 edition.

ARTICLE 12. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 11 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Town Life Safety Code amending provisions of Conway Code 90-1 by incorporating the Life Safety Code, NFPA Doc. No. 101, 1988 edition, and deleting reference and incorporation of the 1981 edition.

ARTICLE 13. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 12 as proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for a Town Septic Ordinance to be appropriately numbered and incorporated at length in the Conway Code.

ARTICLE 14. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 13 as proposed by Petition of Susan H. Battles and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19. G by adding a new section (8) which would allow reduction of sign setback for signs obstructed by a nonconforming sign or structure on an adjoining property. Not Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 15. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 14 as proposed by Petition of Susan H. Battles and others for the Town Zoning Ordinance amending provisions of Conway Code 147-19.G(1) by adding a new subsection (a) to permit signs with a message area of up to one hundred (100) square feet for large, multi-use business complexes and certain residential developments. Not Recommended by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 16. To see whether or not the Town will vote to approve the new Charter recommended by the Charter Commission.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) for the purpose of hiring TRAFFIC CONTROL people to direct traffic at key intersections for 115 days starting the last weekend in June. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to purchase a HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT SEVEN YARD DUMPTRUCK, together with snow plow rigging. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to ASSIST THE MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL in developing economic policies and action designed to provide balanced long range economic planning and development for the valley towns. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to implement a HOUSE NUMBERING AND FIRE LANE SYSTEM throughout the Town. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) to provide 26 STREET LIGHTS on Route 16 between the intersection of Route 16 & 302 and Artist Falls Road. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to CONSTRUCT A ROAD BETWEEN ZODIAC WAY AND SETTLERS' GREEN COMMON COURT DRIVE, a distance of 700 feet. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) to provide a part time (25 hours per week) RECREATION ASSISTANT for the Parks & Recreation Department. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to purchase a FIRE TANK TRUCK as recommended by the Fire Advisory Committee. Agreeable to a petition signed by Raymond E. Leavitt, Jr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to purchase FIRE DEPARTMENT EQUIPMENT for the Fire Departments. Agreeable to a petition signed by Raymond E. Leavitt, Jr. and others. Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (2-8-0).

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of Thirty One Thousand Dollars (\$31,000) over a period of ten (10) years, to be repaid by a Betterment Tax on lot owners of HUNTING RIDGE ROAD, under RSA 239. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Three Hundred Five Thousand One Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars (\$2,305,128) for the purpose of funding employee pay and benefits in accordance with the schedules and terms set forth below:

To limit payroll expenditures to 85% of the pay in effect, as of October 1, 1990, for all individual employees' positions. Meaning and intending to make a 15% cut in pay for all Town of Conway employees.

To limit employee benefits to a funding contribution by the Town of 50% of health care premium cost, and zero percent contribution for dental care premium cost.

A cap of 5 days sick leave per year, non accumulative, is established as a standard for Town employees.

Passage of this article confirms the voters' failure to ratify those contracts between the Board of Selectmen and the Police Commissioners and various organized labor groups.

The funds raised and appropriated for payroll purposes are not to exceed \$1,649,537. The funds raised and appropriated for employee benefits are not to exceed \$655,591.

By voter approval of this article, other pay and benefit cost contained in other parts of this year's Town of Conway Warrant are deemed to be redundant and are to be deleted from those articles.

The Board of Selectmen and Police Commissioners are directed to prepare future budgets with a payroll and benefit article, similar to this article, to allow voters a clear option to ratify or not ratify a proposed bargaining agreement. The Board of Selectmen and Police Commissioners are further reminded that all proposed bargaining agreements are subject to voter ratification, and subsequent funding approval by this legislative body. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kevan O'Brien and others.

Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (0-10-0).

ARTICLE 28. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of funding employees' pay and benefits in accordance with schedules and terms set forth below:

To limit payroll expenditures to the 1990-1991 accepted budget which in effect shows no increase in salaries and wages over the 1990 level. Passage of this article confirms the voters' failure to ratify those contracts between the Board of Selectmen and the Police Commission and various organized labor groups. Agreeable to a petition signed by Adam B. Hirshan and others.

Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Jane Hopkins and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-1).

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$17,850) for the support of the CHILDREN AND YOUTH PROJECT OF MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Brooks and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Cynthia L. Martin and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-0).

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Three Thousand Seven Hundred Nineteen Dollars (\$23,719) for support of the GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul O. Ashnault and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-1-2).

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for operating expenses for the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paul O. Ashnault and others. Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (4-6-0).

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Six Hundred Dollars for the VISITINGNURSESERVICESOFNORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars for the COMMUNITY ACTION OUTREACH PROGRAM, and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) for the support of the BIG BROTHER/BIG SISTER ORGANIZATION administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gloria L. Luken and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-1).

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$6,945) to assist the FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Suzanne Nash and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Ten Dollars (\$10,510) to assist CARROLL COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy Simard and others. Not Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-6-0).

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) to defray the operating expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. Agreeable to a petition signed by David P. Cruz and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the purpose of running and maintaining the Conway Information Booth, to be carried out and accounted for by the CONWAY VILLAGE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Debbie Sweeney and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$1,300) to be used for insurance of the EASTMAN-LORD MUSEUM. Agreeable to a petition signed by Suzanne C. Levesque and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Nine Dollars (\$2,709) in support of CARROLL COUNTY AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & RAPE'S SHELTER FOR BATTERED WOMEN AND CHILDREN. Agreeable to a petition signed by H. Gardner Smith, Jr. and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Five Dollars (\$4,785) for the EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC., said sum being equal to \$.50 per person in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francoise J. Burdette and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-2).

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to establish a TRUST FUND FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF THE SWIFT RIVER COVERED BRIDGE and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts and money and expend those funds for maintenance and long term care.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept APPLECROFT LANE ROAD, being approximately 1200', running Westerly from Route 113 in Conway with a cul-de-sac at the end, subject to a deed being received from Coleman Properties, Inc., the cul-de-sac radius to be extended 45' of paved surface and appropriate bounds being in place. Agreeable to a petition signed by Edward G. Venti and others.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept as a Town road the extension of DANDIVUE ROAD, located in the Village At Cedar Creek subdivision, the right-of-way being 50 feet in width and approximately 1350 feet in length from where it connects to Dandi View Road, an existing Town road, to and including its intersection with Evergreen Drive, said road to be thereafter maintained as a Town road. The Selectmen's acceptance would be conditional on the following: a) all road bounds to be set; b) deed approval; c) final completion of remaining shoulder work. Agreeable to a petition signed by David A. Burdette and others.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined school, town and county tax budgets, in anticipation of town, county and school purposes.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town of Conway, N.H. to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Conway, N.H. applied for, and to receive and expend them in accordance with the purposes thereof.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Capital Reserve Funds established by the Town from time to time and disburse the same in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were created respectively.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, any real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Collector's Deed; except when it is being sold back to the former owner, or to a party who has succeeded to the title of the former owner, in which case private sale may be utilized; any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before the next annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 51. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

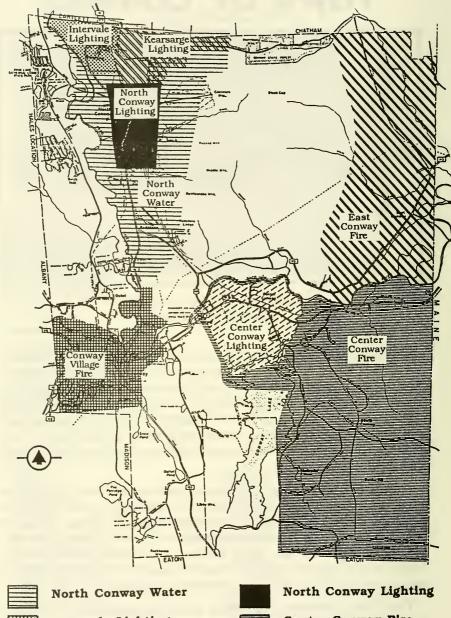
The Town of Conway, New Hampshire, established 1765, population 9121, is composed of the villages of Conway, North Conway, Center Conway, East Conway, and Redstone, has a three member Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and open Town Meeting form of government. There is a School District with an annual meeting and seven (7) elected School Board members, a public library with an elected Board of Trustees, an elected Planning Board and elected Police Commission.

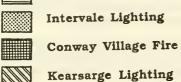
The Town has overlapping special service districts or precincts which provide services the Town as a whole does not provide, such as street lights, water, sewer, and sidewalks. The Town contracts with the village district fire departments to provide service to non-precinct areas, and the Town contracts with the North Conway Ambulance Company and Conway Village Fire District to provide ambulance service to all Town residents under one tax bill.

The Town disposes of garbage and has mandatory recycling, however, pickup is available through private enterprise.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town as of and for the year ended December 31, 1989, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway at December 31, 1989, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town at December 31, 1989, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

SPECIAL TAX ASSESSING REPORT

There are over 7,000 properties in Conway with hundreds of sales. At the present time we have to look at, for example, property "A" which was sold on April 1, 1989, for a fair value and comparing that property to property "B" which sold for less on April 1, 1990, being assessed the same as "A" in order to maintain equity as 1989 was our base year.

In Conway in 1989, the base year or revaluation year, the State determined that we were at 100% of value, on the average. In normal times real estate appreciates in value and by now our ratio (assessments against actual sales prices) would be less than 100%. These not being normal times (in other words decreasing property values) our ratio in 1990 will be 10% to 15% higher on the average. Add to that the fact that there is always an area of approximately 10%, which is normal leeway in the case of mass appraisal.

The State of New Hampshire, Dept. of Revenue Administration (D.R.A.) oversees the local Assessors and annually conducts a study of assessments of certain properties which have sold in a community against their assessed value to determine the level of assessment or ratio to actual sales in a given year as of April 1st.

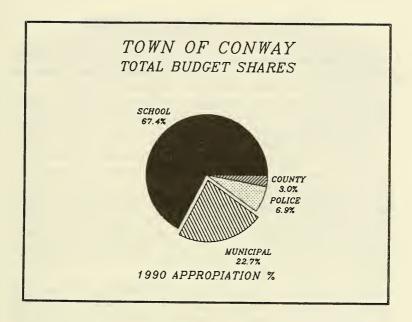
The 1989 revaluation was done 11 years after the 1978 revaluation. We want property values to resemble assessed values, however, that is too difficult to perform each year. The tax rate can be affected by an increase in total value or a decrease in total value so that a \$15.00 tax rate at 115% of value would actually be \$17.25 if the total value of the Town was adjusted by 15%.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

to the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Conway

Environmental issues, concern for the economy and traffic problems dominated much of the Town's attention and efforts in 1990, and the same issues are likely to continue into 1991.

Recycling and the new landfill permitting were both very successful. Much of the credit goes to Town Engineer, Scott Johnstone, who has been tenacious at both. At year's end the Town had received all necessary State permits for the new landfill and was preparing to purchase the 178 acres, to be opened in late fall of 1991. This project started with a site search in 1986.

Another long standing problem which moved closer to solution was the Kearsarge Metallurgical Corp. Superfund Site on Mill Street in Conway Village, which has threatened groundwater since 1982. By September the EPA announced a decision to begin cleanup within 2 years by onsite pumping and treatment of groundwater and removal of the waste pile at a cost of \$7.2 million. This could take up to ten years.

The economy has suffered in 1990 and as the State and regional recession continues, we must be concerned about when things will improve. The Town has been supporting the effort of the newly formed Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council, a public/private partnership. Even though the 1990 Town tax rate fell 15%, the loss of jobs in the construction and manufacturing sectors has pushed many to the edge, fueling an intense scrutiny of Town and School budgets and personnel.

The Town also was very active in reviewing loan applications for Conway's revolving loan fund designed for small manufacturing and assembly firms, as a bank credit crunch set in.

Despite the slow economy, traffic was as congested as ever. A salute goes to the Police Department and the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber Valley Hosts: the former for trying to move traffic at key intersections, and the latter for trying to soothe frayed tempers when it does not move. The New Hampshire Dept. of Transportation's interest in a solution was rekindled in 1990 with passage of legislation to design an upgrade of Route 16. This could mean any number of outcomes and several committees, including the Highway Advisory Task Force, have been actively formulating local plans to avoid destruction of the villages and improvements to E2. We should all pay close attention in 1991.

Thank you for your support and the opportunity to serve the Town.

TOWN PLANNER'S REPORT

Although I have not been here long, I suspect that Conway, like most other New Hampshire towns, was caught off guard by the mid-80s economic boom. Growth and development was fast and furious. The influx of new stores, new houses, new roads and new people left in its wake a Conway different than that of just a decade ago. Yet many of the Town's characteristics have survived intact. While in a lull in the economy, I believe that now is the best time to take stock of our situation and make our plans for the future.

The most vital part of our planning efforts will be the writing and implementing of a new Master Plan. In 1990, the Planning Board adopted the first of 18 reports which comprise this plan. Remaining reports will be prepared and updated on an on-going basis, with two or three prepared or amended each year. The Plan focuses on land use, but related topics including transportation, public facilities, population, housing, recreation and economic development are included. The goal of the Master Plan is to establish a comprehensive land use and development strategy for the Town.

The Capital Improvements Program, or CIP, is the Town's other basic plan. The CIP is a tool which allows evaluation of major purchases which the Town expects to make during the upcoming six years. In it you will find recommendations regarding acquisition of major capital items like buildings, land, trucks, and other expensive pieces of equipment. Its purpose is to schedule capital purchases and plan its financing to stabilize the annual rate of spending on capital goods. This, in turn, helps keep tax rates stable. Used in conjunction with the Master Plan, the CIP can be very helpful in making the Town's provision of public services and facilities efficient and cost effective.

Regulations. This is apt to be a sore subject with some people, but not one which can be ignored. Our land use regulations (zoning, subdivision, site plan review) are survivors of a hectic time. During the boom they were amended and patched as problems arose, but there was no time for complete rewrites. It is my hope that each of the major regulations will be fully evaluated and comprehensively rewritten within the next few years. However, I see little point in revising these regulations until we have established the Town's goals. These regulations are intended to implement the Town's plans, so we should get the plans revised first. Expect simplified processes for applicants and comprehensive standards for project designs.

In closing, I would like to thank the Planning Board for the many, many hours they volunteer, and for what is all too often a thankless job. And I would like to thank everyone who participates in the planning process.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

This year showed a significant increase in requests for police services which went from 8,171 in 1989 to 8,558 in 1990. The number of the top nine UCR crimes went up to a total of 892, which is 77 more than we had in the previous year. Even though traffic was down, we had a large increase in calls for service which, I believe, can be attributed to the economy. It seems that when the economy drops, crime goes up.

In 1990 we lost four police officers to other Departments. Two of them went to the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, one to the Oxford (Maine) Sheriff's Department, and one to the Bartlett Police Department. These four men were replaced by four very capable officers: Bruce Ela, who was awarded first place in the shooting category at the 92nd recruit training academy; Arnold Lord, who was selected as the outstanding officer at the same academy session; Gary Anderson, who came to us with seven years experience in the Portland (Maine) Police Department; and Tommie McKenzie, who is currently attending the NH Police Standards and Training Academy in Concord.

The Conway Police Department also has two officers who teach at the police academy: Christopher Perley, our prosecutor, teaches at the prosecution school; and Patrolman Brian Doherty instructs at the Camouflage and Concealment classes.

This shows you the fine caliber of people at the Conway Police Department who serve your community.

In the spring of 1990, we had three Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) groups graduate. I was quite impressed with the attitude of these young people and I think that the D.A.R.E. program is one of the finest anti drug programs in our schools today. If we are able to keep this program going, I am sure that we will see some great results in the future.

At this time, I want to thank the members of the police department for their dedication, loyalty, and for all the uncompensated hours that have been donated to this Department because of their interest in the community.

To the citizens of Conway, thank you for your support. We will continue to serve you to the best of our ability.

REPORT OF THE CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

Due to the down turn in the economy, this past year has been very difficult for the Police Commission. We have been faced with the process of cutting expenses and keeping the budget to the minimum. As an elected Commission, we have been entrusted the goal of providing the Police Department services to the Town of Conway to which it has become accustomed, while at the same time being cost effective.

This past year the Conway Police Department has been faced with an increased rate of calls for service. Sadly, this number is expected to continue increasing as the economy deepens into recession. It is our intention to continue to provide these services and try to reduce the costs of doing so. The liability rate has hit an all time high. This, coupled with increased costs of electricity, telephone, vehicle maintenance, labor and general running of operations, has made cuts an extensive undertaking. The Commission has worked diligently to accomplish this goal.

The 911 system was instituted in 1990. The use of this number has been invaluable to those requiring emergency assistance.

Easing the traffic flow during peak times continues to be of concern to the Commission. This year we have had additional personnel in place at various problem areas. A special article will be presented in 1991 to see if the town will fund the continuation of this project.

The quality and professionalism of the Conway Police Department is to be commended. The Commission wishes to thank all for their dedication to duty and their sincere concerns for the welfare of the citizens of the Town of Conway.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT REPORT

Last year, in this report we discussed what the Public Works Department is and what it does for you. It seems appropriate to again focus on the latter of these items so that we may all better understand where our tax money is spent.

The good news for the coming year is that Public Works will operate on less money than the previous year for the second year in a row. We believe we can do this with only a slight reduction in services to the taxpayers by simply tightening our belts and becoming more creative.

Two of the primary services provided to the citizens of the Town include garbage disposal and highway maintenance. In the past year, the impact of mandatory recycling has hit full force as we recycled over 2,000,000 pounds of garbage. Our goal for 1991 is an increase of a half a million pounds. We also will begin construction of the new landfill and will be working with the Cooperative Extension Service to teach citizens how to compost at home. By composting at home you, as an individual, can save tax dollars and create a product which you can use at home.

Our highway maintenance continues to be first rate. During the past year we rebuilt Allard Hill Road and half of Rockhouse Mountain Road while still keeping the rest of the Town's streets in excellent shape. The Conway Lake Dam was also reconstructed for about 50% of the expected cost. In 1991 we will continue our paving program and will be experimenting with various methods of deicing our streets so that we can keep the streets passable and be better neighbors with our environment.

Our Parks and Recreation programs have had to grow during the past year due to the realignment of the School District. With more children now at Pine Tree School, the Town has had to expand the programs in that school. As a result you will find a special article in the warrant to fund the continuation of a part time recreation assistant. Without this part time position it is very questionable and highly unlikely that the programs in Pine Tree School can continue.

On a sadder note, the beautiful fountain at Washington Park seems to continually be vandalized. If such action continues in 1991 we will have to consider removing it. It is my hope that, together we can find out who is performing these acts of vandalism so that such action will not be necessary.

The Town's technical staff has been equally busy this year. Although fewer building permits were pulled this year, see graph,

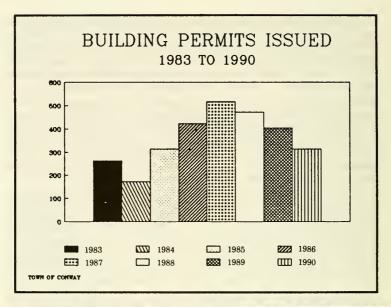
the Building Inspector performed 1100 inspections in 1990. This is identical to the number performed in 1989. Additionally, he found 174 code violations compared to 175 in 1989. The Fire Inspector performed 1027 inspections this past year compared to about 1050 in 1989. Additionally, he was part of a program which taught over 900 local children about fire prevention. As we approach 1991, it is as important as ever to be conscious of life safety measures. Great progress has been made in the past but, as with so many programs, it is only thru continued effort that public buildings will remain safe for the general public. In line with this commitment is a request to update the existing BOCA Code from the 1984 version to the 1990 version and the existing Life Safety Code from the 1981 version to the 1988 version.

During this year of very slow growth one of the only good things that has happened is that the Town Planner has been afforded the time to make significant progress at long term planning projects. By doing these projects now, we will be better prepared to face the future. Such projects as Master Plan update to Capital Improvement Plan updates were worked on this year, and 1991 should see significant progress made on these types of projects.

The department has been busy on the engineering front as well this year. From designing sidewalks for the two school additions to obtaining permits for the new landfill, to working on the transportation woes of the area, it has been a busy time. Probably the most significant of these items is the work being done on transportation. Undoubtedly, this will be the number one issue facing us in the next five years. Although I am usually a pessimist, I truly believe that progress is being made. The change of attitude from the State coupled with the willingness of the local people to get involved signals to me that the wind is blowing in the right direction. As a beginning to this process, the Selectmen are offering to the voters the opportunity to make a connection between the streets of Settlers Green and Zodiac Way. Although this will not significantly impact the traffic flow by itself, it is important as a start and will become a vital part of the overall solution.

In closing, I would like to thank each person of this Town for your continued support of the Public Works Department. It is a pleasure to work in a Town where Public Works is considered important and is supported by the taxpayers. We will continue to serve the needs of the Town in a conservative, fiscally responsible manner so that the burden does not become too large for you to bear.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

There has been a significant increase in the number of people using the library and the number of reference questions answered by the staff in 1990. 28,828 people visited the library and 6,600 reference questions were answered.

As a result of the crowding of the Henney History Room and the Children's Room, the trustees have engaged the architectural firm of Ingram/Wallace to provide initial analysis and preliminary schematic designs to relieve the crowding and provide the greatest potential for the library for the next twenty years. Town manager, Curt Lunt, and Town Engineer, Scott Johnstone, gave professional assistance in the selection of the architects. Cost of this project will be paid for from a grant from Keith Henney.

The children's librarian, Olga Morrill, promoted a "Children for World Peace" campaign, in which children made cards urging peace and sending them to Saddam Hussein. This campaign attracted nation-wide attention, and an anonymous gift was received to provide postage.

A story writing contest for children, "Tales from the Dark Side," was held. 81 stories were written and prizes given to winners. Similar contests will be held in the future, and the collection will be compiled so young writers may enjoy each others' creativity.

Earth Day was observed by the planting of three small blue spruce trees on the library grounds by Verland Ohlson. The trees were donated by Verlene and Robert Hamilton.

May 1, Law Day, was observed by Attorneys Cooper, Fauver and Deans being in the library to give advice to patrons.

In October the library started opening on Sundays from 1 to 4 p.m. These hours will continue on a trial basis for six months, at which time the trustees will review the activities and determine whether or not to continue them.

Mrs. Ann Cullinan, history librarian, has been writing a monthly column for the Reporter on interesting and sometimes amusing incidents recorded in the Henney History Room.

Adult reading/discussion programs, funded by the New Hampshire Humanities Council have been well attended.

A Federal grant for \$23,000 was awarded to the library to implement a literacy program in cooperation with the Adult Tutorial Program of Tri-County Community Action. This grant provides computers and staff to establish a literacy center.

Volunteers, who continue to make a great contribution to the library, were honored with a coffee hour.

Mrs. Margaret Marschner, librarian, has completed 20 years of service with the library. Under her direction the library has become completely modernized, and is a model to other libraries of its size in the state. We are proud of the position of the Conway Public Library which is due largely to her leadership.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1990

In 1990, the Conservation Commission's twentieth year, the Commissioners have been involved in numerous projects, each representing the diversity of natural resource issues facing our community. Planning for the development of a Natural Resource Inventory was this past year's big project. The Commissioners also worked on recycling, the highway upgrade and bypass projects, shorefront zoning, land acquisition and bike paths, as well as laying the groundwork for some important upcoming projects.

In the past year we had one membership change. Due to his move to another town, Ken Cargill resigned from the Commission. His position was filled by Kathleen Frenette with Sue Walker serving as an alternate.

Town Engineer and Public Works Director, Scott Johnstone, and Town Planner, Steve Burns, continued to be very helpful in assisting the Commission with our many land use projects. We are also grateful to the many other town officials and staff, in addition to numerous townspeople, for their assistance in the following projects:

- 1. NATURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY: As part of the update for Conway's Master Plan, the Commission reviewed the present Master Plan and recommended changes and additions to better detail the natural resources in the town such as geology, soils, aquifers and floodplains, wildlife habitats and air quality. In August the Commission hired a consultant to assist them in the development of a Natural Resource Inventory and the production of a series of map overlays to correspond to the inventory text. In November the Commission held its first public hearing on the Inventory with several community members stepping forward to lend a hand in the project. The project is slated for completion by July 1991.
- 2. RECYCLING: This January marked the first anniversary of Conway's recycling program. Thanks to the efforts of the local commercial haulers, businesses, Tin Mt. Conservation Center, the Lower Mt. Washington Valley Solid Waste District, and most importantly, you the residents, the program's first year has been a great success. Other recycling highlights: In April recycling for businesses was inaugurated and in May an Open House was held at the Solid Waste Facility with tours, games and prizes, and in July tin/steel cans were added to the items for recycling.
 - 3. TOWN PROPERTIES: In November, in accordance with the

Forest Management Plan for Whitaker Woods, a selective 10 acre timber cut was completed in the northwest corner of this town property. As specified in the management plan, special care was given to maintaining the recreational, aesthetic and wildlife habitat integrity of this area. In addition, we are grateful to the MWV Ski Touring Association for providing top notch grooming for the Whitaker Woods cross country trails. In other news: site visits were conducted by the Commissioners to other town conservation properties to assess and plan for future management, educational and recreational projects. In November, a plaque was installed to commemorate the donation by Gene Hussey of the Hussey Field. This installation is part of a Pequawket Foundation project to acknowledge gifts of property to the town.

4. DREDGE AND FILL PERMITS: Due to this year's economic slowdown, the Commission reviewed fewer Wetland Board applications. Several sites were visited to aid in making determinations of impact and the Commission continued its monitoring of a project started last year in and around a significant wetland.

In the coming year the Conservation Commission will continue to work on projects promoting the conservation, protection and enjoyment of our town's natural resources. We welcome your ideas and participation at our monthly meetings held at the Town Hall. Contact any of the following commissioners for more information.

REPORT OF TOWN OF CONWAY PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT 1990

The Conway Parks and Recreation Department is responsible for recreation programs, facilities, parks and cemeteries. This year I have listed three main areas to let you know what services this department provides to you.

RECREATION PROGRAMS: The department provides a number of different programs to the residents and visitors of the Town of Conway. During the summer months we offer swimming lessons at Echo Lake State Park and Conway Lake Beach. Over 300 children were enrolled in this program. A summer playground program offered at the Conway Recreation Center for ages 6 to 12 is still very popular. Tennis lessons are offered at Davis Park, youth track program, youth soccer, Junior Baseball Team for ages 13 to 16 and a Co-ed adult volleyball program. These are just a few of the popular programs being offered in 1990. During the fall, winter and spring seasons the emphasis is given to Conway Elementary School and Pine Tree Elementary School students. We provide the traditional youth sports such as soccer, flag football, street hockey, basketball, ice hockey, recreation skating, softball, T-Ball, and gymnastics. Also special events such as the Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween Party, trips to Ice Capades, trips to sporting events and other activities are very popular. In addition, we provide an arts & crafts program and a number of programs with other organizations and recreation departments.

This fall the number of participants has more than doubled at the Conway Elementary and Pine Tree Elementary Schools. An example of this increase is in our basketball program that had 4 boys teams and 2 girls teams in 1989. This year we have 10 boys teams and 6 girls teams. As your Parks & Recreation Director and being a one man department, the need is there to hire an assistant to help provide programs for the additional children enrolled. Johnny Eastman has been working on a part-time basis this fall and winter to help meet this increased participation due to the redistricting of elementary students to the new Pine Tree School this fall.

PARKS: During the spring through fall months I supervise a crew of two to three people in taking care of the following parks: Davis Park, Conway Lake Beach, Smith Eastman Bridge Park, First River Bridge Park, Nasby King Field, Washington Street Park, Cassie Davidson Park and Swift River Bridge Park. In addition to these parks we take care of the outside maintenance and grounds of the Conway Police Station, Court House Complex, Town Hall, Town Garage, Conway Public Library, Old Police

Station, Conway Recreation Center, Conservation Lands and a number of other small parks within our town. We also provide rubbish pickup in both North Conway and Conway Villages.

Twenty-five trees and lilac shrubs were planted within our parks and along streets this past year. I organized an Arbor Day Program held in Center Conway with Governor Greg as guest of honor. Along with a group of local youngsters, he helped in the planting of a maple tree that was donated by the State of New Hampshire.

CEMETERIES: There are over 57 cemeteries within our townsome as small as one headstone and others quite large. The Parks Department takes care of mowing and maintenance of twenty-five cemeteries.

This year I started a new maintenance program to repair and restore cemeteries throughout the town. In 1990, 24 headstones were repaired in the Davidson Cemetery in Center Conway, Hales Cemetery in Conway and Willey Cemetery in North Conway. The Sparhawk Cemetery in Conway is being restored and in 1991 the headstones will be repaired as we continue our maintenance program.

I would like to thank Gene Gray and Ron Morton for the many hours they have worked in our parks and cemeteries. I would also like to thank all the volunteers, for without their support the Conway Parks & Recreation Department would not be able to provide the various programs and services to the citizens of the Town of Conway.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.
