

A Word from the Selectmen

It has been the practice during the past few years for the Selectmen to point out on this page to the voters that the tax rate and the taxes for the coming year are set to a large extent by the expenditures voted at the March School and Town meetings. This holds true this year as much as it has in the past and careful consideration should be given by the voters to the amount of money raised and how it should be spent, keeping in mind the need for the proper maintenance of the town roads, buildings, equipment, and cemeteries.

On August 13th a 6 inch rainfall in an hour over Croydon Mountain resulted in some of the most extensive damage to roads and bridges in the history of this town. For its size Cornish had suffered more than any other community in the state. We found that under state law the town was eligible for financial aid from the state, and immediately filed application for this aid and started work to repair the damage. A Special Town Meeting was called which authorized the Selectmen to make use of the state aid and to borrow funds necessary to complete repairs. Two stretches of road in South Cornish were abandoned in order to save rebuilding a bridge and to get away from maintaining a road too close to the brook. The so called "Sky Line Drive" may be a little steep, but only a limited amount of funds was available for that stretch of road. It is the opinion of the Selectmen that the future development of the Newport-Cornish road will require a straight road there later on.

As the result of a check we made of the mileage of the class V roads in town revealed that Cornish qualifies for Duncan Fund Aid to the town roads and also for an increase in TRA funds.

The old four wheel drive Ford truck which was in need of considerable repairs before winter was traded in, and a new GMC Truck was purchased with money from the Capital Reserve Fund. Also a new Bushmaster power brush cutter was bought for the Highway department.

We wish to draw your attention to the graph which appears on another page of this report. This was prepared by

the Cornish History Committee and drawn by Harold Dean, and will give you an idea of what the expenditures have been in Cornish for the past one hundred years.

The Trustees of Trust Funds wish to acknowledge receipt of \$100.00 for the care of the Christine Spaulding lot in Edminster Cemetery. Also \$200.00 for the care of the Loretta Sanderson lot in Childs Cemetery, omitted last year.

We wish to extend our thanks for the \$100.00 presented to the Town by the 4-H Hilltoppers and Hillcrafters and the \$50.00 received from the Cornish Fair Association, both sums to be used for improvements to the Town Hall.

We want to thank the heads of departments and committees and all residents for the cooperation and help we have received from them during the year; and we take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the prompt service, advice, and aid, which we received from the Department of Public Works and Highways in Concord, the Governor and Council, and Division No. 4 of the Highway Department in Lebanon.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,395,000 for the third payment on the Fire Truck.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the first payment of the 1955 flood damage.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the capital reserve for purchasing new highway equipment.

6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer on property acquired through tax sales and liens.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money if necessary in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see what action the Town will take in having the unpaid taxes printed in the Town Report.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old road, (washed out by the 1955 flood). Leading Easterly from Charles Bruce place to land owned by Wilfred Benware.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$772.62, the State to contribute the sum of \$5,150.81 for Town Road Aid.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,663.14 for highway maintenance.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing new highway equipment and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

13. By request—To see if the Town will vote to put in two more exits in the Town Hall, and raise and appropriate the necessary amount for same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Town Planning Board.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association for the purpose of promoting and publicizing the natural advantages of the Town together with other Towns in the region.

16. By request—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five for a year to study the possibility of forming a Town Cemetery Association with the idea that it will eventually be self-supporting, and to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for the use of the said committee. This committee to report at the next annual meeting.

17. By request—To see if the Town will vote to charge a fee of \$50.00 to be paid to the Town Treasurer for all future interments in Cemeteries maintained by the Town, and to see what portion thereof shall be paid to the sexton for the opening and closing of the graves; and to see whether the balance shall be paid over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Maintenance of said Cemeteries.

18. By request—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 to purchase a power lawn mower to be used in Town Cemeteries and Parks.

19. To see what action the Town wishes to take with regard to painting the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

20. To hear reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and committees here-to-fore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Amount Raised by Taxes.

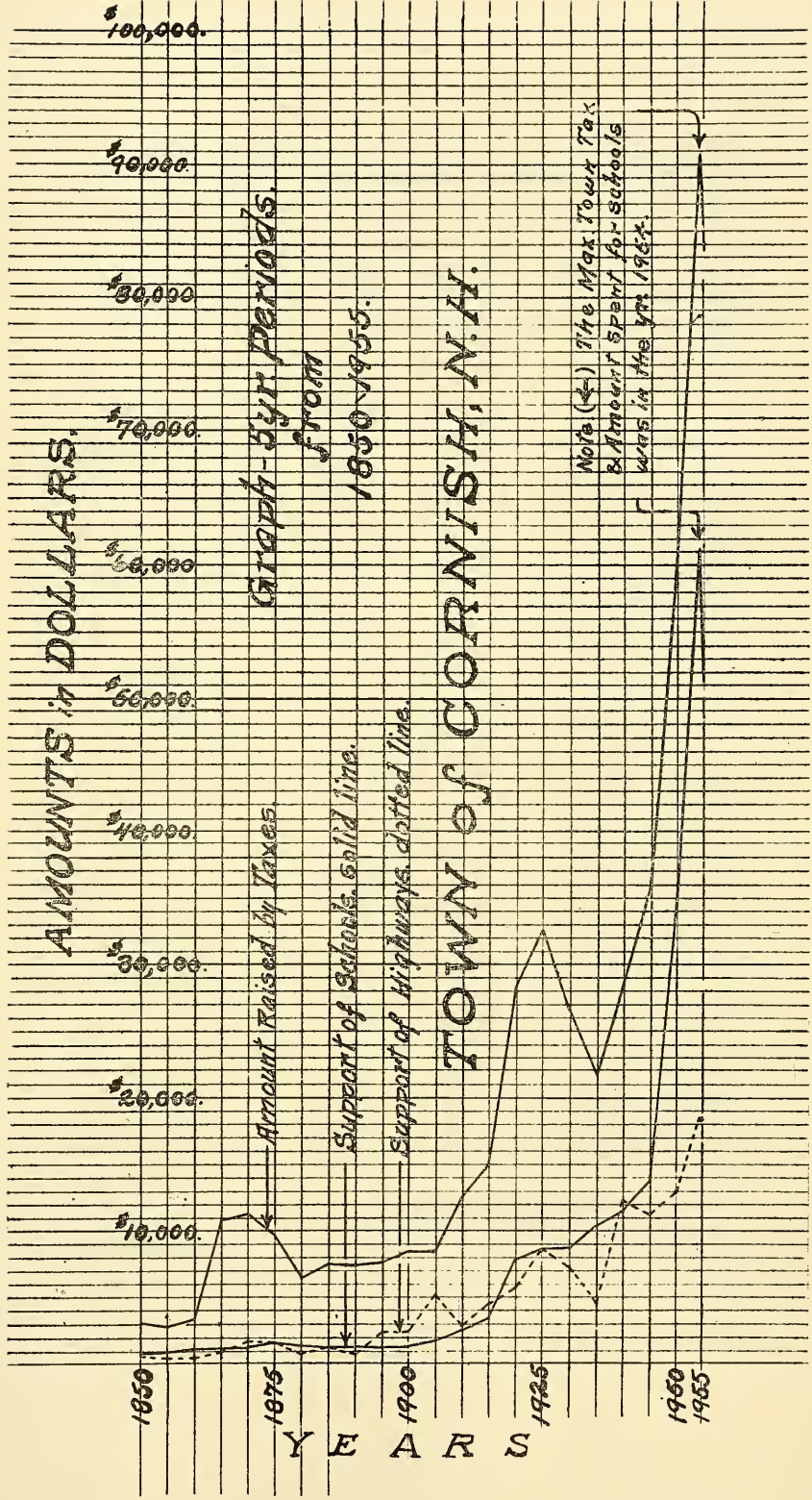

Report of The Cornish Civil Defense, 1955

Cornish Civil Defense continued its activities during 1955 with increased momentum and meetings.

In accordance with the wishes of President Eisenhower and his advisors as well as Admiral Brinkman, head of Civil Defense for New Hampshire and his staff the plans formulated by our organization resulted in readiness for any emergency.

Meetings were held on January 31, February 28, March 26, June 27. The meetings were attended by a sizeable group of Cornish citizens and special speakers from Concord. Among the distinguished guests were Senator Sarah E. Otis head of Women's participation CDO New Hampshire, Mr. George Moses, Captain Cutting head N. H. State Police, Mr. Bumford Director of Health, Sanitation and Special Weapons, N. H., Major Myles King U.S. Army Airforce in charge of Ground Observers, Mr. Robinson, State Fire Marshall, and Admiral Brinkman.

One by one the important phases of Civil Defense were discussed by these speakers in their respective fields.

An important demonstration in Fire-fighting and the use of extinguishers was given by Mr. Ellsworth Atwood at one meeting clearly showing the necessity of skill and knowledge in this vital phase of home defense in war or peace.

An important phase of familiarizing members of the Cornish Civil Defense and those interested in joining is the use of Motion Pictures released by the Federal Government. In order to be able to show these a Projector had to be purchased with matching Funds. (The Federal Government paying half of the cost.)

A request was made by the Director for donations. The enthusiastic cooperation of all groups in Cornish was clearly manifest toward Cornish Civil Defense as all rallied and contributed toward the Projector. Subsequent to it's acquisition the Projector was in constant use by the Cornish School, Church and Civic Groups and the Civil Defense.

At the last Civil Defense meeting it was resolved that future meetings of the CD organization in Cornish will be held in the the form of Round-Table discussions with all participating. Members and guests will meet and take part in the planning

while dining together. Until an actual War-Emergency exists those who will work together in danger will get to know each other well.

The work of the Planning Board this year has been to make and discuss plans and ways of improving the Town. Mr. Carlson of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association met with us to explain the work and activities of that group. We understand that a town can put as little or as much toward this area association as they wish. Therefore we are recommending that the town raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars toward this and feel that it would be a good investment.

We have investigated the idea of having all the telephones in town on one exchange. We feel that such action would do much to unify the town. There is some prospect of this being accomplished when the dial system is installed. However, we are told that nothing can be done now on this project. We would appreciate your ideas. What do you think of the idea? Does it sound practical to you?

We have discussed and have hopes that some organization in town will want to develop and sponsor at least one roadside picnic area in town. There are too few such conveniences in this area and surely it would be an addition to have an attractive place in our town for motorists or townspeople to stop and rest.

Through our discussions we have come to feel that some long range program of cemetery care and improvement is ad-

visible. We are also recommending that the existing twenty dollar burial fee be increased to fifty dollars in order to accomplish the previous recommendation.

The Board would appreciate your cooperation in bringing to our attention any ideas or suggestions that you may have for the betterment of the town.

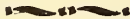

Report of Cornish History Committee

The Committee wishes to report that the work is progressing as well as can be expected. We are at present working on the Genealogy part of the History. This is the work that takes the most time. We are trying to get the Genealogy of all persons who have lived in Town from 1910 to date. These facts include birthplace and date; marriage, place and date; date of coming to Cornish and where these people came from to Cornish.

This coming year we are going to try and get the Military records of all Cornish men or women who have been in any branch of the service, either in War Service or peace time. If those who have been in the Service at any time from 1910 to date will give us that information, it will be, a great help to the Committee.

We think that we will be able to go on with our work without asking for any money in addition to what is left of the first appropriation.

In closing the Committee would call to the attention to all Cornish residents that you can be of great help to us if you will give us the information mentioned above without our having to come to you personally to get it. It will save a great deal of travel and time on our part.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Mrs. Freda Monroe transferred from grade three to grade one as a replacement for Mrs. Barton who resigned to accept a position in Claremont. Mrs. Marjerie Kidder continued as grade two teacher. Mrs. Lillian Symons transferred from grade four to grade three.

Mrs. Maxine Eggert, a graduate of the university of New Hampshire, was employed to teach grade four. Miss Doris Williams is teaching grade five. Mr. Merle Eggert, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was employed to teach grade six. Mr. and Mrs. Eggert attended the University of New Hampshire during the summer to obtain permits to teach in the elementary grades. Mr. Eggert replaced Mrs. Nettie Johnson who resigned to accept a position in Norwich, Vermont.

Mrs. Eva Bernard is teaching the seventh grade and Mr. Laurence Lennon is teaching the eighth grade and is the principal.

In spite of all the changes in teaching staff the school has operated very smoothly and I feel that the boys and girls are receiving a good basic education. Several activities have been sponsored by the school and an increased emphasis has been given to recreation particularly in softball, baseball, basketball and skiing.

Mrs. Ruth Wood has continued in charge of the hot lunch program with the assistance of Mrs. Weld. This program continues to offer an excellent meal to the boys and girls at a very reasonable price. Surplus foods still enable the program to offer variety without increasing the cost per pupil.

It is through the co-operation of organizations and individuals that the physical plant and equipment have been improved. Additional landscaping and playground equipment has been completed or installed. There is still need to do more work and provide more facilities for the increasing enrollment.

At present there are two hundred and thirty-six pupils in the eight grades. It is anticipated that twenty-two will gradu-

ate from the eighth grade and that approximately thirty-six will enter the first grade in September. This will mean an enrollment figure of about two hundred and fifty with thirty or more pupils in each of six rooms.

With the probability that half the faculty will change it will be most difficult to fill the vacancies with experienced, well qualified teachers. At present the salaries paid in Cornish are the lowest of any paid in Supervisory Union No. 5.

Miss Florence MacIver has been able to continue her work most effectively. Through her inspections and home visits the absentees due to illness are reduced and boys and girls are made aware of the importance of good health in daily living.

The building is utilized increasingly by the various organizations and for school functions.

The school board, teachers and your superintendent are most appreciative of your co-operation and support. We hope that we are giving the boys and girls a very good basic training in citizenship and are providing them with the necessary tools for further educational training.

Report of The School Nurse

This past year has been a most eventful one in the field of preventive medicine. Through the efforts of Dr. Jonas Salk and his co-workers, a vaccine to be used in the prevention of Poliomyelitis was licensed and made available to all children in the first and second grades in schools throughout the country. This was a tremendous step toward stamping out Poliomyelitis.

Cooperating under a nationwide program the State Department of Health conducted large clinics for the administration of the vaccine. In order for a child to receive the inoculations of the vaccine it was necessary for the parents of a child to sign a permission slip. Despite some of the unfavorable reports about the vaccine, the response of the parents toward the program was very good. The enthusiasm of the children toward these inoculations was amazing. No unfavorable reactions were reported in our area.

Further clinics for the administration of Salk Vaccine are being planned. Children through the age of fourteen years are to be included in the next clinics.

It seems wonderful to think that at last there is available an immunizing agent capable of preventing paralytic polio and its many tragedies. This is certainly a very important step in guarding the health of our children, now and in the future.

Interest on the part of the parents is so very essential to the success of these programs. As always the parents have cooperated. It is a very great pleasure to work with you and with your children. Combined interest of everyone is what brings about improved health programs for the children.

— NOTES —

VIOLATORS ARE SUBJECT TO THESE PENALTIES

Anyone letting a fire escape from control, whether or not he has a permit to kindle the fire, is liable for the costs of extinguishing the fire.

Anyone found guilty of dropping inflammable material in or near woodland shall be fined not more than \$25.

A person failing to report an uncontrolled brush or forest fire is liable to a fine of not more than \$10.

For kindling a fire in woodland of another without permission of the owner, or for kindling any fire without a permit when a permit is required, a person may be fined not more than \$200, or imprisoned 60 days.

DAMAGES

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the owner all damages done by such fire.

BE SURE — GET A PERMIT

Incinerators must be tight, with a close mesh screen, and be on clean ground away from inflammable material. A steel barrel with screen top is most commonly used

Open fireplaces used to burn rubbish are classed as incinerators.

Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its spread.

Never burn in dry, windy weather.

Have incinerators inspected by the Forest Fire Warden and get his written permit.

Dangers from Fires in Woodlands

WOODLAND LITTER, WHEN DRY, IS HIGHLY INFLAMMABLE AND FIRES CAN QUICKLY GET OUT OF CONTROL. WE REQUEST YOUR COOPERATION TO CONTROL ALL FIRES SO THAT LIVES AND PROPERTY MAY NOT BE ENDANGERED OR DESTROYED, AND FORESTS BE KEPT GREEN TO FURNISH THE NATURAL BEAUTY WE ALL ENJOY AND TO GROW TIMBER WE WILL NEED.

WHAT IS "WOODLAND"?

The term "woodland" is defined by law to include "cut-over land, slash and such other land as bears a sufficient amount of wood growth, wood, weeds, grass or other growth as to be likely to be burned over."

IT IS UNLAWFUL TO—

Throw down lighted matches, cigarettes, or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.

Burn brush, rubbish, grass or other materials when the ground is not covered with snow, without written permission from the Forest Fire Warden.

Kindle a camp or cooking fire on your own land without permission of the Forest Fire Warden or on land of another without also first obtaining written permission of the owner or his authorized agent.

Leave an open fire burning unattended.

Fail to report a forest or brush fire that is out of control.

Start any outdoor fires or to smoke in woodlands when a ban or woodlands closure is in effect.
