You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Fremont, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To consider the report of the Budget Committee and to raise such sums of money under the proposed budget as the Town deems necessary.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 toward the purchase of a tank truck for the Fremont Fire Department.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established at Town Meeting, March thirteenth, 1956, under provisions of Chapter 34 RSA for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing Town highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at private sale or public auction land acquired by Tax Collector's deed.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws, relating to playing Beano be adopted in this Town?"
- 8. To transact any other business that may be deemed necessary.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Following is a report of what has been done in your town by the State Health Department during the past year.

The third polio clinic of a series of three was held on April 17, 1957, at the Ellis School. Attendance was 133. Of these:

14 received first polio shots

28 received second polio shots

91 received third polio shots

I hope that those who had not completed the series have by now done so at their own doctors.

I have visited your town on several occasions and have taken care of health problems as they arose.

Defects found were referred to physicians or to the proper agencies or clinics for correction. Social problems were referred to the Welfare Department.

I hope to conduct well-baby clinics in the spring.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Regular monthly meetings have been held on the third Thursday of each month at the school. As was voted at the 1957 Town Meeting the Board was increased from five to seven members.

In April Dr. Wesson of the University of Vermont Medical School spent a day in Fremont discussing the medical needs of the community. He suggested a survey early this year after the effect of the new doctor in Raymond could be evaluated.

Information has been obtained regarding markers for unmarked graves of veterans of any war. There are a number of such graves in town and it is hoped something may be accomplished in obtaining markers. Anyone having any data concerning the records of these men will assist by contacting a member of the Planning Board.

An aerial mosaic map of the town has been obtained and from this property line maps and other maps may be made.

Ordinances regarding subdivision of land have been drawn up and a public hearing will be held for discussion of same in the immediate future.

Your Planning Board was represented by Mr. Arthur Small at a series of seminars on planning and zoning sponsored by the State Planning and Development Commission and the University of New Hampshire.

Your town will grow in the years ahead; with your suggestions and help your planning Board can help assure the future growth of a well-ordered community. All meetings are open to the public and we welcome your suggestions.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF

The Fire Department answered thirteen calls during 1957—besides many unlisted calls to the town dump. We have a dangerous condition there and instead of being a convenience to the townspeople, it is fast becoming a problem and maybe a hazard. Some one, or several people, or maybe out-of-town "junkies" looking for scrap metal, keep setting the dump on fire. This fire creeps back under the top fill and burns for weeks. While this is not serious in the winter, it is during the other seasons. No fire should be started there and anyone seen starting one should be reported.

Another problem of the Fire Department is that of children calling the emergency fire department number. This number comes over the Red Network and rings in four locations, causing four busy men to hustle and answer, only to hear the click of a receiver being replaced. Parents should check with their children on this practice.

This year the Fire Department has constructed a protective building over the twenty-five foot wide well at the Depot. This is a fine supply of water and during the drought of last summer it had eight and a half feet of water. When an electric pump is installed it will be a fine source of water from which to fill our tank trucks as well as providing water for stock, gardens, etc., during dry times.

A very successful carnival was held last summer. This not only paid for all carnival equipment, including tents, wiring, games, etc., but put a small balance in the bank. With good luck next year we hope to donate one thousand dollars toward the purchase of a used fire truck to replace our old Model T Ford.

I want to thank the many people who work hard for the good of the Fire Department during the year, not only fighting fires, but working on money raising affairs, plowing out the Fire House, keeping records, and the many, many things needed to keep our Voluntary Fire Department an asset to the town.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Fremont

It is with pleasure that I present my annual report to you:

It may be true that Russia leads the United States in the production of engineers and scientists. But that is only one side of the story. The other side raises many questions as to just how far education is extending among Russian youth, and how good that education is.

Does the average Russian child receive as much education as the American boy or girl? Is Russian education below, equal to, or superior to that of the American system?

A little intensive reading in this field of recent educational literature reveals that about one-third of the youth of Russia reach what compares with the upper three grades of an American high school. By contrast, in America, 75 percent of the young people reach these grades. As for higher education, less than seven Russians of every 1,000 are receiving university training at college level.

Facts indicate that two-thirds of the Russian children are denied educational opportunities beyond the seventh grade. The reason for this denial is acute shortage of classrooms! Despite the publicity of an expanded building program, half of the 195,000 local schools in Russia are inadequate because of space shortage.

The same overcrowding is extended to the university level; enrollment has risen 110 per cent since 1940, but available space has expanded at this level only 37 per cent.

Under such conditions, tens of thousands of Russian children—the majority—are removed from local schools at about 14 years of age and sent to work. Do we want this in our schools? I don't think so!

This unfortunate group constitutes a pool of cheap, mobile labor under the guise of educational procedure—procedure that terminates in coal mines and factories.

Russia is trying to impress the world through such scientific feats as Sputnik I and Sputnik II. True, Russia has increased its number of scientists, but at the expense of the majority of its citizens.

Russia is being criticized by Russians for the over loading of engineering students, leaving the students little or no time for independent study.

Alexander G. Koral, a Russian-affairs specialist at the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, stated recently that while Russia is expanding its whole educational program, chiefly to meet Communist military objectives, there is no immediate threat that Soviet education is about to match or surpass that of the United States.

I believe that much damage has been done to our educational system during the past twenty years by the disciples of PROGRESSIVE education. We are now ready for the pendulum to swing back to the essential methods and policies for our public schools:

- 1. Reading to be taught in early grades, with emphasis upon phonetics.
- 2. Cursive writing to be taught, starting in the third grade, with emphasis on drill.
- 3. Spelling to be taught as a subject, in conjunction with reading, with emphasis on phonetics.
- 4. Basic arithmetic to be taught in the first seven grades.
- 5. History, civics and geography to be taught as separate subjects.
- 6. The essentials of grammar and the structure of English to be taught in the early grades.
- 7. Greater use of written essay-type examinations should be made available.
- 8. A reasonable amount of homework should be required, and parents should be encouraged to supervise home study.
- 9. Promotion should be determined primarily by proficiency.

Your school board deserves much credit in giving so much time and thought in the preparation of the budget. They have made an honest attempt to see that the budget is well proportioned for the educational needs of your children.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to the pupils, school board, P. T. A., citizens and teachers for whose understanding, patience and kindness have made the school year one of success.

When a notice goes home to a parent requesting examination by an eye specialist, it is sent with confidence that the school test has been done under the most accurate conditions possible. Of course, when defects are found in school, it does not necessarily mean that the child needs glasses—this must be the doctor's decision.

Many thanks to the P. T. A. who again sponsored a dental clinic; also to the Salvation Army who generously donated to it. The dental health education program now being given by the state hygienist will provide a much needed incentive to the children to take care of their teeth.

Registration day was held in the spring for children entering school in the fall. These children were given an opportunity to see school in action, and those who had not been vaccinated were done in conjunction with the State Department of Health.

First graders will not be admitted to school in the fall without vaccination unless they have written excuse from the family doctor.

Thanks are due Mrs. Davies for her fine care of the building.
