

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hill in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hill on Tuesday, the 2nd of March next at 1:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident sixty-five years of age up to seventy-five, a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years of age up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least five years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of thirty-five thousand dollars?
 - 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Polls Will Be Open At 1:00 P.M. And May Not Be Closed Before 6:30 P.M.

The business meeting to consider the remaining Articles of this Warrant will be open at the Town Hall on Saturday, the 6th day of March next at 1:00 p.m.

- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To authorize the Selectmen to borrow for the Town by the issue of notes, a sum not to exceed \$25,000 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1976, said notes to be expressly payable from taxes within one year from the date of their issuance, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes, and to provide for the sale thereof.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$361 for the continuation of services to low income people of Hill through the Franklin Area Center of The Community Action Program Belknap-Merrimack Counties Inc. as per petition.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the support of the N. H. Humane Society.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 to defray, for the period beginning July 1, 1976, the cost of suitable solid waste disposal in order to comply with State Laws governing the disposal of such solid waste after July 1, 1976; to further empower the Selectmen to make such alterations at the present dump site as may be necessary to comply with said State Laws; to further empower the Selectmen to adopt and enforce such rules and regulations as may be necessary to control the collection and disposal of solid waste in the Town; to further empower the Selectmen to make such agreements and enter into such contracts as may be necessary to accomplish the purposes of this article.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$500 from the accrued income of the Ferrin Fund and to place said sum in the Capital Reserve Fund for Police Department Cruiser.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for Fire Department hose.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept as a Town road the Right-of-Way into the Frost Development from Dearborn Road.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell by quitclaim deed to Charles Hollenbeck for the sum of \$1,200 a certain tract of Town land on the northerly side of Route 3-A bounded by Polo and Hollenbeck land, being the same conveyed by Harold A. Woodward, Administrator of the Estate of Ella E. Woodward to Hill Village Improvement Association, Inc. on April 15, 1941, and recorded in Merrimack County Registry of Deeds, Book 560, Page 579. Said sale to be subject to the following restrictions: (a) no mobile homes shall be located on said property; (b) no subdivision shall be made of such property, and (c) said property shall be governed by the Village District zoning restrictions with the above two exceptions.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to Public Service Company of New Hampshire easement rights for electric transmission lines, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen determine to be in the best interests of the Town, across land of the Town situated northeasterly and southwesterly of New Hampshire Route 3-A at a location approximately one-half mile northerly of the Hill Post Office.
- 13. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

"WHEREAS, certain areas of Hill are subject to periodic flooding from streams and rivers, causing serious damage to properties within these areas, and

"WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

"WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

"WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, and 156A.

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

"1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

- "2. Vests the Selectmen with the responsibility, authority and means, to:
- "(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- "(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present use and occupancy of the floodplain.
- "(c) Cooperate with Federal, state, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- "(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- "3. Appoints the Board of Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- "4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program."
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulations pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:

"The Board of Selectmen shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (I) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (II) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistent to flood damage, and (III) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage."

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

During the past year three sub-division applications were acted upon. Due to the economic recession very little new construction and very few sales of real estate took place.

We expect 1976 and subsequent years to be recovery years and anticipate much more activity in these areas than the last two years have produced.

The Board has given much consideration to the possibility of implementing Zoning Ordinance amendments to further restrict the placing of mobile homes in the community. Granting special exceptions for the purpose of mobile home placement with little regard for the type of homes already constructed in the immediate neighborhood can have a very detrimental effect on the market value of those homes already built. Reduced market values result in reduced assessed values of these properties which can later result in a higher tax rate for all real estate owners in order to achieve the necessary tax revenue to pay the expenses of running the Town.

There are a number of nearby communities presently having a ratio of mobile homes to conventional homes as high as 1-1 and even higher. The Board feels that now is the time to take the necessary steps to prevent this type of ratio from occurring here.

We would like to know how the citizens of the town feel about this important matter and are scheduling two Public Hearings to take place in late March and April to find out. We hope to see you there.

REPORT OF VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department responded to 16 fire calls, 11 dump, 3 chimney fires, 2 brush fires and assisted the Franklin Rescue Squad on four calls to the Town of Hill. Eleven Mutual Aid calls were answered to neighboring towns

Firemen received in excess of 320 man-hours of training including special courses, weekly inspection, monthly training and Mutual Aid drills. Six men attended Fire School at Lily Pond, Gilford, and Vocational Technical School in Laconia.

The 1946 tank truck was sold to the Stinson Lake Corp. for \$500. In addition, the Fire Department through special projects; food sales, etc., has raised another \$932 to go towards the purchase of equipment for the new fire truck which includes radio, nozzles, hydrant valve, spanner wrenches, adapting fittings, etc. Total price of equipment purchased \$1,874. All equipment except radio was purchased at wholesale price totaling \$1,439.

Delivery of the new truck is expected approximately the middle of March; later verification will be posted.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

An amount of \$500 was put in the capital reserve towards a new cruiser. The car is running fairly well but some more money has to be laid out for more repairs. The cruiser has 84,000 miles on it, and as it has little or no rust, the money spent will be worth it.

Added to the four channel radio in the cruiser are two walkie-talkie hand held radios. With the kits that go with them in the Chief's car and the Deputy Chief's car it gives us three mobile units to be used in case of an emergency. This new equipment has a value of about \$2,500 and the cost to the town was abolt \$110. This was done through the Crime Commission.

The addition of Trooper Kenneth Benoit living in Hill Center is going to be of help in the protection for the town. Mrs. Carol Anderson ,who is working for the Concord Police in the uniform section, was sworn in as a Special for the Town of Hill.

Leo Corliss, a Special, patrols the Murray Hill section and puts in many, many hours for which he declines to take any pay.

Everett Tucker is studying the search of fingerprints at crime scenes, and his efforts helped in proving the participation of a person in a local burglary. Some new and useful equipment has been added to the fingerprint kits.

Robert Harris, a police officer for the City of Franklin, has been very helpful a number of times in assisting this department when help was needed.

Deputy Chief Warren Forsyth and I gathered enough evidence so that a request was asked for help by the State Police. This resulted in the cleanup of eleven burglaries and fourteen larcenies which involved a group between the ages of 14 and 19 years.

The way 1976 is starting, with a new group developing, I am asking the parents to know where your children are and what they are doing.

Please — If you observe something that looks suspicious, call on the police to check it out. Thank you for your past cooperation.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

The programs that we have been involved in this year center around the building of Reading, Language Arts, Mathematics, and Health curricula. SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

School Meeting

Pursuant to the attached warrant, the annual school district meeting of the Town of Hill was called to order by James E. Quimby, Moderator at 1:00 P.M. on March 1, 1975, at the Town Hall.

The warrant was read, article by article.

- 1. Voted to determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix compensation of any other officers or agents of the district in the total of \$440.00.
- 2. Voted to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and officers as printed in the annual report.
 - 3. Voted to pass over Article 3.
- 4. Voted to authorize the School Board to receive in the name of the district a sum of \$1,000 from the income of the Ferrin Fund to pay for capital improvements at the Jennie Blake School.
- 5. Voted to authorize the School Board to accept lots No. 85 through 95 from the Town to be held for a future school site if the Town should vote to transfer these lots to the School District.
- 6. Voted to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of financing the future construction of a school building pursuant to RSA 35:1 and further, voted an appropriation of \$500 therefor. Said fund, if established by the district shall be in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town as specified in RSA 35:2.
- 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$155,772.18 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriations, which is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 8. Edward Amsden requested a "sense of the meeting" with respect to returning to use of old form of auditing; that is, electing an auditor at the regular annual elections. The meeting was in favor of such action.

There being no further business at this time, the meeting recessed until 1:00 P.M., March 4, 1975, for the purpose of electing officers.

Meeting called to order on March 4, 1975, at 1:00 P.M. for the election of School officials. The warrant was read, article by article.

Polls closed at 6:00 P.M. The following officials were elected:

REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Citizens of Hill:

It is difficult to write a report from the Office of the Superintendent because so much worthy of comment happens during a school year. Since it is impossible to cover all that has happened, we shall try to touch upon those things which we believe should be of concern to the public.

NEW STAFF MEMBERS AT THE JENNIE D. BLAKE SCHOOL

Our first observation is regarding the staff at the Jennie D. Blake School. The school district is very fortunate in securing the services of the new staff members — Melanie Gay, Georgette Huckins and Harold Tuttle and maintaining the services of Patricia Athanas. These staff members have the background and experience that will make the Jennie D. Blake School one of the best elementary schools in the State. By working together and calling upon the strength of each person, we shall establish a strong team of teachers, who will continue working toward meeting the needs of each child. The staff will also need the support and advice of the parents and citizens in building the school program. Please refer to the Report of the Principal for more information concerning the staff and the program at the Jennie D. Blake School.

MAIN PRIORITIES FOR THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The three school boards of Hill, Franklin, and Winnisquam Regional make up the Supervisory Union Eighteen Board. At the April meeting of the Supervisory Union Board, the Committee on the evaluation of the Superintendent was charged "to review the goals and objectives of each of the districts in SU No. 18 to develop the main priorities that the Superintendent will be expected to meet during the ensuing year."

This Fall — after each of the school boards decided on what its main priorities would be — the Committee met with the Superintendent to establish the top priorities for the Supervisory Union from the lists submitted by the three district school boards. These priorities were adopted by the Supervisory Union Eighteen Board at its October meeting. Whereas this is the first time that the Supervisory Union Eighteen Board is implementing a procedure of this kind, the Committee expects to work closely with the Superintendent and shall attempt to identify what changes can be made to improve on this procedure. Board members and staff members have been urged to make suggestions which will improve and/or modify this process and which will help us all in improving the operation of our school districts. If any resident feels that there are other areas of concern which should be considered as priorities, please contact the members of your school board.

The following are the priorities that the Committee has identified as the Top Priorities for Supervisory Union Eighteen school districts. These are considered as responsibilities in addition to the everyday basic administration and supervision of the school districts. The Superintendent expects to be held accountable for his performance in achieving these priority goals.

- 1. Evaluate and improve the curriculum in the areas of Reading, Language Arts, Math, Career Education, Health Education and Special Education for educable mentally retarded children.
- 2. Improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the current staff evaluation process. Position descriptions for all areas are to be written and utilized in the evaluation process.
- 3. Improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the district's programming for the special needs of its handicapped children.
- 4. Evaluate third-party arrangements and determine if they are cost effective.
- 5. Develop a three-year plan which will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the administration and supervision of the school districts.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

Another important area that has received a great deal of attention and work has been staff development. Staff development is a process of professional growth which deals with the recertification of staff members who have been certified by the State to serve in the public schools in New Hampshire. The State Board of Education established board guidelines for development. Supervisory Union No. 18 developed and is administering a plan which was designed to meet the needs of the staff in Hill and the other two school districts in the Supervisory Union. Essentially, local staff development has replaced the old State Board of Education and the Hill School Board regulations which required earning six college credits every five years to maintain one's certification. In addition to college courses, local inservice programs, workshops, conferences, out-of-district visitations, independent study and work on committees are examples of eligible activity designs within the State and local guidelines. The upServisory Union Eighteen Staff Development Committee is broadly representative of not only the professional staff, but the community and student body as well. Representatives from Hill are Melanie Gay for the teachers and Lee Ann Forsythe for the parents and community.

AUTHORIZED REGIONAL ENROLLMENT AREA (AREA)

At a special school district meeting in Hill, a committee was elected to study the feasibility of a long term State-approved tuition agreement with Franklin as the receiving district, with Hill and perhaps Andover as the sending districts. Listed below are some advantages of an AREA agreement:

- 1. Provides a means of cooperation between communities with differing governmental structure, and provides mutual guarantees and benefits.
- 2. Provides State incentive aid which is credited according to the Written Plan.
- 3. Does not preclude a cooperative since districts may convert to a cooperative after five years.
- 4. Permits withdrawal from the AREA arrangement after three years.

Advantages for "Sanding District"

- 1. Is assured a "high school" or other school organization for an extended period of time.
- 2. Is assured a tuition rate based on the conditions outlined in the Written Plan.
- 3. Is assured of some *say* in the practices and policies of the school program in an advisory capacity.
- 4. May provide significant educational benefits by a more permanent association between districts where a cooperative arrangement is not feasible.

Advantages for "Receiving District"

- 1. Is assured a predictable pupil population in a tuition arrangement.
- 2. Is assured additional school building aid and assistance from The New Hampshire School Building Authority.
- 3. Permits continued legal control over ownership of property, school program and policies, and school costs.
- 4. Provides increased borrowing capability in relation to number of pupils from sending district.
- 5. May provide additional tuition that could encourage expanding the educational program in the receiving district.

William Cummings II, John Lynch, and Frederick Thomson are representing Hill on the planning committee. These gentlemen will present a status report on the feasibility of an AREA agreement with Franklin at the school district meeting.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF ASSISTANCE

On behalf of the Hill School Board, the Administration expresses thanks and appreciation for all of the assistance rendered to the schools and to the children by the P.T.O., the Board of Selectmen, many organizations and residents of Hill. The school children of Hill are being educated well and the Administration would like to take this opportunity to thank the staffs of the Jennie D. Blake School and the Franklin Junior-Senior High School for the fine job they have done this year. Most of all the Administration would like to thank you, the taxpayers and parents, for the excellent support we have received. You have been more than understanding and most generous.
