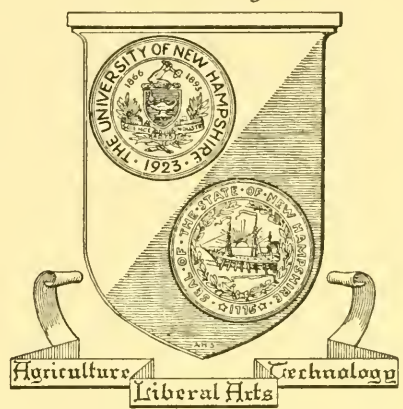

ORDINANCES AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight.
A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to a Street Light.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Street Lights cause an electric street light to be installed on Duffy Court.

Passed December 1, 1938.

To the City Councils of the City of Keene, New Hampshire:

The undersigned desires to establish a trust fund of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00), the income only to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the cemetery lot known as the Milo Smith lot in the north division of Woodland Cemetery and desires the City of Keene to accept the same for the purposes above stated.

On notice that the City Councils accept the said trust fund, the amount will be paid over.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the Milo A. Smith Cemetery Fund.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the City of Keene by its councils, hereby accepts the Milo A. Smith Cemetery Fund of One Hundred Fifty Dollars, in trust, however, the income to be used for the care of Lot No. 329 in Woodland Cemetery.

The City Clerk shall receipt for said fund which shall be invested by the Trustees fo Trust Funds according to law.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the Minnewawa Bridge.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Highways and Bridges be and hereby is authorized to cause a suitable bridge to be constructed on the branch road over Minnewawa Brook. The bridge to be constructed in accordance with specifications prepared by the City Engineer; and that a sum not exceeding \$7,367.00 be appropriated for that purpose, from any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Passed December 1, 1938.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to clearing Ashuelot and Branch Rivers and the Beaver Brook.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Water Works, Sewers and Drains be and hereby is authorized to apply to the W. P. A. for

free labor in clearing the Ashuelot and Branch Rivers and the Beaver Brook from fallen timber and that a sum not exceeding \$2,000.00 be and hereby is appropriated for the city's share of the expense thereof, and that the money be raised by taxation.

Passed December 1, 1938.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to Water and Sewer in Avalon Place.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Joint Standing Committee on Water Works, Sewers and Drains be and hereby is authorized to cause a water main laid in Avalon Place at an estimated cost of \$550.00 to be charged to the water department and also a sewer main be laid at a cost of \$175.00 and that said \$175.00 be and hereby is appropriated from any money in the sewer department not otherwise appropriated for that purpose.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the Paul F. Babbidge Cemetery Fund.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the City of Keene by its councils, hereby accepts the Paul F. Babbidge Cemetery Fund of Two Hundred (200) Dollars, in trust, however, the income to be used for the care of Lot. No. 532 in Section 13 of Woodland Cemetery.

The City Clerk shall receipt for said fund which shall be invested by the Trustees of Trust Funds according to law.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to a Temporary Loan.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That for the purpose of paying such claims against the City of Keene as may fall due during the current municipal term, the Joint Standing Committee on Finance and the City Treasurer of said City

be and hereby are authorized and empowered to make such temporary loans, from time to time, for the use of said city of sums not exceeding in the aggregate the amount of Three Hundred Thousand (300,000) Dollars; said loans being in anticipation of taxes of the present municipal year and hereby expressly made payable therefrom; said treasurer giving for said loans the notes of said city, bearing interest, or discounted and signed by said treasurer and the mayor of said City of Keene and payable within one year from their respective dates; and be it further resolved that the above resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

That the Joint Standing Committee on Bridges and Streets be and hereby is authorized to purchase one tractor sidewalk snow plow and that the sum of \$1,985.00 be taken from the appropriation of the Highway Department.

AN ORDINANCE in amendment of the Zoning Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Section 1. Amend Section 19 by adding the following Section D at the end of said Section 19:—

D. The board may authorize in special cases in any zoning district, a use other than that permitted by its prescribed limitations, provided that the granting of such special use will not be contrary to the public interests or tend to defeat the purpose of the ordinance, and that the refusal to grant a requested use will, owing to the special conditions, result in unnecessary hardship, and prevent the doing of substantial justice.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the City of Keene by its councils, hereby accepts the Charles H. Mason Cemetery Fund of Two Hundred Dollars, in trust, however, the income to be used for the care of Lot No. 361 in Woodland Cemetery.

The City Clerk shall receipt for said fund which shall be invested by the Trustees of Trust Funds according to law.

Passed March 2, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to the conveying of land in Keene.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Mayor is hereby authorized to convey the following described premises to Sophia Merchant of Keene.

Beginning at a stake in the ground located N13-45E 71 feet from an elm stump in the old Concord road. Thence N36-45E 63 feet to a stake at the South side of a dwelling house. Thence N45-30E 240 feet, passing through to a stake at a stone wall, this line borders land of Sophia Merchant. Thence S55-15E along land now or formerly of one Cota a distance of 4.1 feet to a stake located 12 feet Westerly from the Westerly edge of the Concord road concrete pavement. Thence southerly 311.2 feet along a line parallel with, and 12 feet Westerly from the aforesaid Westerly edge of the Concord road concrete pavement to a stake. Thence N13-45E 4.3 feet to the place of beginning, containing about 5416 square feet of land.

The City of Keene is to receive from Sophia Merchant the following described premises in Keene.

Beginning at a stake in the Northerly line of the old Concord road, so called, said stake being located N13-45E 26.7 feet from an elm stump as shown on plan drawn by H. B. O'Neil C. E. and dated December, 1929 showing an exchange of lands between Sophia Merchant and the City of Keene. Thence N13-45E 40 feet to a stake in the ground, said stake being located 12 feet Westerly from the Westerly edge of the Concord road concrete pavement. Thence Southerly 65.5 feet more or less along a line 12 feet Westerly from, and parallel with the Westerly edge of the Concord road pavement to a stake in Beaver Brook. Thence S77-45E 51 feet more or less to the place of beginning, containing about 1020 square feet of land.

That the City of Keene by its councils, hereby accepts the Edward J. Kingsbury Cemetery Fund of Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) in trust, however, the income to be used for the care of Lots 6, 7 and 8 Circle Plot, in Woodland Cemetery.

The City Clerk shall receipt for said fund which shall be invested by the Trustees of Trust Funds according to law.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to a Band Stand.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the sum of Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$550.00) be and hereby is appropriated from any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the erection of a permanent band stand in Fuller Park under the direction of the City Engineer.

REPORT OF THE 1939 COMMITTEE ON CONSOLIDATION

Your committee has met and carried out its instruction to study and bring in a plan for consolidation of various departments in the city. It has called before it all of the superintendents for detailed reports and has made a careful study of policy, personnel and interrelationship of work in all departments.

Based upon this study the committee has made the conclusion that consolidation is best served,—1. By making permanent and mandatory the trial of joint-operation of the departments of streets, bridges, drains, sewers and waterworks. 2. By allowing the park and cemetery departments to function as separate units.

In order to complete the consolidation recommended, your committee has concluded that the following steps are necessary and advisable:

1. That the city solicitor prepare the necessary changes in the ordinances to place the direction of the departments of streets, bridges, drains, sewers and water in the hands of one committee and one superintendent, the combination of these departments to be known as the Public Works Department of the City of Keene.
2. That the city solicitor prepare the necessary changes in the ordinances to allow the salary of the superintendent to be set at \$4,000 yearly, \$1,400 to be charged to highway expense, \$1,400 to waterworks expense, \$600 to drains and \$600 to sewers. The superintendent shall maintain his own car.

3. That the joint committee on streets and water be authorized to conduct a survey for a suitable building or location for new quarters for these departments, including the offices and records.
4. That when and if this location is found, the land and buildings committee be authorized to approach the owners for possible purchase and cost to the city.
5. That the streets and waterworks committee and the land and building committee be authorized to plan and secure the cost of any necessary repairs, alterations or building connected with the new location.
6. That the finance committee prepare the necessary joint resolutions allowing the purchase of a possible new location, alterations or repairs to the same, and the procuring of the necessary money to pay for same by issue of bonds in the usual and legal manner.

Your committee also recommends passage of the ordinance change to set the annual salary of the Park Commissioner at \$500.

The committee also wishes to call your attention to the fact that acceptance by you of this report is only your approval of having these surveys made and these ordinances and resolutions drawn to be submitted to you for approval or rejection.

Members of this committee who were present at the meeting at which this report was adopted were Mayor Holbrook, as presiding officer, and Aldermen McAllister, Park, and Nims, and Councilmen Stanford, Bruce, Robertson, and City Solicitor Kimball, all of whom voted in the affirmative.

AN ORDINANCE amending Chapter XXXV, Section 9 of the City Ordinances.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the third line of section 9 of Chapter 35 be amended by striking out the words "two thousand" and inserting in place thereof "twenty-four hundred."

Passed April 20, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to Portable Fire Pumper.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the sum of \$385.00 be and hereby is appropriated for the purchase of a portable fire pumper, under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department. Said amount to be raised by taxation the present year.

Passed April 20, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to Lease of Land.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Down Timber Committee be and it is hereby authorized to lease land of the New England Box Company for \$50.00 per year, for the purpose of sticking up lumber on the Fowler lot, so-called, on north side of Arch Street.

Passed April 20, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to collections and discounts on Taxes.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the tax collector be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to allow a discount of two per centum on all taxes assessed the present year, which shall be paid on or before August 1st, 1939, except poll taxes, which are due and payable April 1st, 1939.

That the tax collector is hereby authorized to give notice in writing of persons whose taxes shall be unpaid, after the same have been due and payable for a period of two weeks and if the said taxes are not paid within fourteen days after the said notice, then the said collector may charge twenty cents for said notice and may distrain for the same.

That the tax collector is hereby authorized to appoint such deputies as he may see fit, which said deputies shall be sworn, give bond to the satisfaction of the city, and have the powers of collectors, and who may be removed at the pleasure of the collector.

Passed April 20, 1939.

AN ORDINANCE Amending Chapter 35, Section 21 of the City Ordinances.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That Section 21, of Chapter 35 be stricken out and the following section substituted in place thereof.

Section 21. The park commissioner shall receive in full for his services and all the duties pertaining to his office, the sum of five hundred dollars per year, payable monthly. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1939.

Passed April 20, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to City Hall.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the free use of City Hall be granted to John Sedgwick Post, No. 4, G. A. R., for the usual Memorial Day Observance.

Passed May 4, 1939.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to an Appropriation for Welfare Department.

Resolved by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the sum of Five Thousand Dollars be and hereby is appropriated for the Welfare Department and that the said sum be raised by taxation the present year.

Passed May 4, 1939.

AN ORDINANCE to establish a Public Works Department.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Amend the Chapters III and V by striking out the same and inserting in place thereof a new Chapter III as follows:

Chapter III
Public Works Department

Section 1. The city councils shall in the month of January of each year and also whenever any vacancy shall occur by resignation or otherwise, elect a superintendent of public works in convention and by joint ballot to hold his office until the first Tuesday of January next succeeding his election and until another is chosen in his stead, unless removed by the city councils.

Section 2. The superintendent of public works under the direction and control of the city councils shall have the immediate care, supervision and general charge of all the highways, streets, lanes, sidewalks, bridges, drains, sewers and water works and shall do all such things in the construction, maintenance, repair, alteration and management, as he may be directed to do by the said city councils.

Highways: Article 1. The superintendent shall cause all the highways, streets, lanes, sidewalks, bridges, to be kept in repair, so as to be safe and convenient for travelers and their conveyances at all seasons of the year. He shall, under the direction of the city councils make all necessary contracts and certify accounts for the supply of labor or materias he may require in the discharge of his official duties.

Article 2. Whenever any highway or bridge or street of the city shall, from want of necessary repairs or by reason of any alteration or repairs being made, of any drain, common sewer or culvert being open or constructed across or through the same, be unsafe or inconvenient for travelers or passengers, said superintendent shall forthwith put up a suitable fence across such highway, street or bridge, and exclude all travelers from passing over the same; or cause the part thereof so rendered unsafe or inconvenient, as aforesaid, to be enclosed by a sufficient fence, which shall be kept standing so long as the same shall remain unsafe or inconvenient; and he shall fix one or more lighted lanterns to said fence, to be kept there every night from twilight in the evening and through the whole night so long as said fence shall be kept standing. No person shall enter or go upon any highway, street or road under construction or undergoing repairs which has been closed by the superintendent of streets in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3, Article 2 of the City Ordinances. Any person violating the provisions of Article 2 of this ordinance shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars.

Article 3. If, at certain seasons of the year, weather or other conditions make it advisable that certain highways or sections of highways be closed to certain classes or weights of vehicles to avoid damage to such highways or sections thereof, said Superintendent shall, with the approval of the city councils close such highways or sections thereof to the class or classes of vehicles causing or liable to cause damage for such time as may be necessary. When such highways or sections thereof are to be closed said superintendent shall cause a notice thereof to be posted at each end of such highways or sections thereof. Any person violating this section by using such highway or sections thereof when closed and properly posted shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00 for each offense.

Article 4. The superintendent shall annually on or before the first day of December, make a written report of his doings to the city councils which shall include an inventory of the property in the city in his custody and control, a full and itemized statement showing in what manner and in what localities the expenses of his department have been incurred and making such recommendations as he may deem advisable for the best interests of the city. He shall judiciously expend such sums of money as may be necessary, out of the yearly appropriations, for the repairs of highways of the city, and shall each week file in the office of the city clerk an approved pay-roll, setting forth the names of all persons hired, the length of time each has been employed and the amount of compensation. He shall also state the localities in which work has been done during the week. He shall have charge of the teams, tools and other equipment of the highway department and shall see that the same are kept in suitable repair and are properly housed. He shall expend such appropriations as may be made by the city councils for permanent construction upon such streets and highways and in such manner as he may be directed by the city councils. He shall have no power to create any debt against the city for any purpose in excess of the appropriation therefor and all appropriations shall be expended for the purpose designated by the city councils and not otherwise. The superintendent shall, when ordered by the city councils to repair any highway or street, give at least thirty days' notice, in writing, to all parties having pipes, conduits or other property beneath the surface of such street, of such order, that repairs upon water, sewer, drain and gas pipes, or electric or telephone conduits may be made before said highway or street may be repaired or reconstructed; and when such repairs shall have been made, said highway or street shall not be disturbed or excavations made, except by permission the city councils, but in cases of emergency the mayor may give permission to make repairs upon pipes or conduits beneath the street, under the direction of the superintendent of streets, and he may, at his discretion, cause said parties making such repairs, to give a suitable bond to leave the highway after such repairs have been made in a condition satisfactory to the superintendent of streets. No persons or corporation shall excavate or otherwise disturb any concrete, asphalt, stone, brick or other similar pavement without consent of the city councils (except in case of unusual emergency when permission may be granted by the mayor) and when such permission is given said pavement shall not be excavated or removed till the person or corporation procuring said permission for the purpose of doing any necessary work shall file a bond with the city clerk to the approval of the mayor conditioned to restore said pavement after said work is done to a condition as good as before the same was disturbed, and the work of excavation and removal and restoration shall in all such cases be done under the direction of the superintendent.

Article 5. Any person or corporation owning pipes laid in the streets or highways of the city, desiring to relay or repair the same, shall, before digging up any ground where the same are laid, notify the superintendent of streets of their purpose, and the superintendent of streets shall have supervision of the same and shall be responsible for the street or highway so dug up being restored to as

good a condition as it was in previously, the expense of such supervision to be assumed by said person or corporation.

Article 6. The management of the incinerating plant for destruction of rubbish, garbage and other waste, shall be under the direction of the superintendent.

All material brought to the incinerating plant for disposal shall be classified as follows:

A—Dead animals weighing 200 pounds, or less.

B—Ashes and like material.

C—Rubbish and garbage.

Dead animals, weighing 200 pounds, or less, can be easily cared for and will be accepted for destruction.

Ashes and like material that would smother the fire shall be kept separate from rubbish and garbage.

A place will be provided for their disposal at the plant.

Rubbish and garbage will include all waste material not covered by the first two classifications. Tin cans, glass bottles, broken crockery and like articles cannot be destroyed in the incinerator. These articles will be disposed of at the plant only if brought there in separate containers. All combustible materials must be kept clear of salt, water and other substances that prevent combustion.

Swill, offal, fish heads and other putrid, decaying and offensive matter, brought in receptacles other than metal, must be destroyed with the container.

No waste shall be brought to the plant before eight o'clock a. m. or after 4:30 p. m., without special arrangement with the attendant.

No person shall dump or cause to be dumped, any rubbish, garbage or other material on or about the premises of the incinerating plant, except under the supervision and direction of attendant.

All trucks or other vehicles used to convey materials to the plant shall be covered so as to prevent papers or other articles from blowing or falling from said trucks or vehicles. No materials brought from other towns shall be accepted at the plant.

Any violation of this section shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Water works, Sewers and Drains: Article 1. The construction, maintenance and management of the water works, sewers and drains shall be carried out by the city councils, and said city councils shall hereafter exercise all the powers vested in them by an act of the legislature approved July 3, 1873, entitled "An act to establish the city of Keene".

Article 2. The immediate care and supervision of the water works, sewers and drains shall be vested in the superintendent.

Article 3. The superintendent shall take charge of the reservoirs, aqueduct, lands and other property connected with the water works, and of the sewers and drains, as the city councils may, from time to time, direct, and shall perform all such services in relation thereto as may be required of him by said city councils; and he shall annually, on or before the first day of December, present to the city councils a report of the general condition of the works; also, a statement of the expenditures, the number of water takers, the number

of sewer connections, the number of cases in which the water has been cut off, and such other matters as he may deem expedient.

Article 4. The superintendent shall, before the first day of January, April, July and October of each year, make and deliver to the collector of taxes and water assessments a true record of all such bills.

Article 5. The superintendent shall keep suitable books, in which shall be entered the names of all persons who take water, the kind of building, the name of the street, the nature of the use, the number of takers, the amount charged and amount of abatements, which shall always be open to the inspection of any member of the city councils. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen shall examine and approve all abatements of Twenty-five dollars or more of water assessments before said abatements shall become effective.

Article 6. All bills for expenditures for the water works, sewers or drains shall, before they are presented to the auditor, be approved by the joint standing committee on water works, sewers and drains, if contracted in making extensions, and by the superintendent if incurred in making repairs, and by the board of mayor and aldermen if incurred for drains constructed in connection with macadamizing.

Article 7. Money received on account of the water department and the sewer department, whether from the collection of water rates, or in payment for labor done by the water department and the sewer department or in payment for property or the use of property belonging to the water department or the sewer department, shall be paid weekly or oftener into the city treasury, and shall be placed to the credit of the water and sewer departments; and shall be and constitute an appropriation for the payment of the ordinary expenses of the water and sewer departments, the interest and principal of water and sewer bonds or loans, the expense of new construction in the water or sewer departments and of additions to the water or sewer department plant, and any other expenses strictly on account of and for the purposes of the water and sewer departments.

Article 8. The rent for the use of water shall be payable on the first day of January, April, July and October, and if not paid on or before the 20th day of the month due, the water shall be shut off without notice to the consumer and the water shall not again be let on except upon the payment of the rent due and the additional sum of one dollar to cover the expenses of shutting off and turning on the water. The board of mayor and aldermen shall cause all buildings connected with the water mains or services to be equipped with suitable meters for the measurement of water supplied to the inhabitants. The size of the standard meter for a dwelling house shall be determined by the joint standing committee on water works, sewers and drains; provided, however, that any person requiring a larger meter than the standard size so adopted shall pay to the water department the difference in cost thereof.

Article 9. No person shall bathe in, catch or take fish from any of the reservoir ponds or brooks connected with and forming part of the water supply of the city of Keene. Nor shall any person, without permission of the superintendent of water works, place or use a boat

upon any of said reservoir ponds or cross or go upon said reservoir ponds or brooks upon the ice with a team or teams, or otherwise.

Any person violating any of the provisions of Sect. 11 of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Article 10. The water, sewer and drain department shall make all water and sewer connections and furnish and lay all pipe and other materials for the same, to the inside of the cellar wall for the following fees:

Sewer, \$11.00 to Street line:

From Street line to cellar 40c per ft. plus cost of pipe based on 5 ft. 4 in. extra heavy soil pipe at 50c per ft., or \$2.50 per section.

Water, $\frac{3}{4}$ " tap, $\frac{3}{4}$ " pipe to Street line \$11.00:

From street line to cellar 40c per ft. $\frac{3}{4}$ " lever handle stop and waste cock, \$1.65.

$\frac{3}{4}$ " tap, 1" pipe to street line, \$12.00. From street line to cellar 45c per foot. 1" lever handle stop and waste cock, \$2.50.

1" tap, 1" pipe to street line, \$13.50. From street line to cellar 45c per foot. 1" lever handle stop and waste cock, \$2.50.

1" tap, $1\frac{1}{4}$ " pipe to street line, \$15. From street line to cellar, 50c per foot, $1\frac{1}{4}$ " wheel valve, \$4.00.

From the mains to the street line in cement and brick paved streets the cost of pipe and labor.

No tap shall be made larger than 1" except by special permission, with proportionate charge for stock and labor.

Anyone preferring brass pipe may have it by paying the difference in cost. In no case shall the water be turned on or the soil pipe used until the above charges shall have been paid.

Article 11. All stop boxes placed in highways of this city, with the upper end at the surface of the street, shall be covered with a suitable iron cover with a drop flange to properly fit the inside of said boxes, of not less than five inches in depth, the whole to be of such weight and construction as not to be displaced by the passage over them of animals or carriages. All gas and water boxes, sewer manholes and flush tanks, with covers designed to be at the surface of the public highways of this city, which may have been thrown up by the frost, or from which the gravel has been worn away, shall be at once brought to grade, either by the replacing of gravel, or by the sinking or shortening of such boxes, and kept in such relation to the streets at all seasons of the year; and it shall be the duty of the superintendent to see that the boxes and covers, whether belonging to the city or individuals, in the public highways of Keene, are made to conform to the requirements of this ordinance, and kept in such condition.

Article 12. The superintendent is hereby directed to carry out and enforce the rules and regulations of the Keene Water Works as adopted by the city councils. Said superintendent is hereby authorized and empowered to establish such system of inspection as he may deem necessary to see that said rules and regulations are observed and enforced, and to report to the proper officials, for action, any violation thereof.

In cases of misrepresentation, misuse or waste of water, non-payment of rent, or for neglect or refusal to comply with the established rules and regulations of the water works, the superintendent may cause the supply to be shut off and withheld from any service pipe until the cause of the complaint is removed and the sum of one dollar is paid for the expense of shutting off the water.

The right to shut off the water for repairs, extensions and other necessary purposes of the works, is at all times reserved; also in case of scarcity, or deficient supply, the use for garden hose and other purposes for which comparatively low rates are charged, are to be subject to such restrictions as may be deemed necessary to meet the exigencies of the occasion. And in case of fire, it is the duty of all users to shut off and discontinue, as far as practicable, all draughts from the works which may lessen the pressure at the fire hydrants.

AN ORDINANCE relating to establishment of City Planning Board.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Sect. 1. That the provisions of Chapter 55 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, 1935, as amended by Public Acts of New Hampshire,

1937, be hereby adopted by the City of Keene, for the creation of a City Planning Board, in so far as below set forth.

Sect. 2. That said City Planning Board shall consist of nine members, namely, the Mayor, one of the administrative officials of the municipality, who shall be selected by the Mayor, and a member of the City Councils who shall be selected by the City Councils, the first three members above named being ex-officio members of said City Planning Board, and six persons who shall be appointed by the Mayor.

Sect. 3. That all members of said City Planning Board shall be residents of said city and shall serve as members without compensation and the appointed members shall hold no other municipal office, except that one of such appointed members may be a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The terms of ex-officio members shall correspond to their respective official tenures, or in case of an administrative official selected by the Mayor shall terminate with the term of the Mayor selecting him and/or her. The terms of the appointed members shall be as follows: one for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years, one for five years, and one for six years, and thereafter terms of appointed officers shall be for six years each. Vacancies occurring in membership of the said City Planning Board, otherwise than through the expiration of the term shall be filled for the duration of the unexpired term by the Mayor, except in case of the member selected by the City Councils, wherein if such a vacancy occur it shall be filled by appointment by the City Councils.

Sect. 4. Members of the City Planning Board, other than members selected by the City Councils may, after public hearing, be removed by the Mayor for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office. The Mayor shall file with the City Clerk a written statement of reasons for such removal.

Sect. 5. The said City Planning Board shall elect its chairman from amongst the appointed members and create and fill such other offices as it may deem necessary for its work. The term of the chairman shall be one year, with eligibility for re-election. The said Board shall hold at least one regular meeting in each month. Said Board shall adopt rules for the transaction of business and shall keep a record of its resolutions, transactions, findings and determinations, which record shall be a public record and kept in an office designated for said records.

Sect. 6. The said Planning Board may appoint such employes as it may deem necessary for its work, whose appointment, promotion, demotion and removal shall be subject to the same provisions of law as govern other corresponding civil employes of the municipality. The said Planning Board may also contract with city planners, engineers, architects, and other consultants for such services as it may require. The expenditures of the Planning Board, exclusive of gifts, shall be within the amounts appropriated for that purpose by the City Councils.

Sect. 7. It shall be the function and duty of said Planning Board established under the provisions of this Ordinance, to make and to perfect from time to time, so far as funds appropriated for

such purpose will permit, a city plan, for the development of the municipality, including any areas outside of its boundaries which, in the Planning Board's judgment, bear relation to the planning of the municipality. Such city plan, with the accompanying necessary maps, plats, charts and descriptive matters, may be designed with the intention of showing as fully as is possible and practical the said Planning Board's recommendations for the desirable development of the City.

Sect. 8. In the course of the preparation of such city plan the Planning Board may make careful and comprehensive surveys and studies of existing conditions and of data and information relative to the probable future growth of the municipality and its environs. The city plan shall be made with the general purpose of guiding and accomplishing a co-ordinated, adjusted, and harmonious development of the municipality and its environs which will, in accordance with existing and probable future needs, best promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, or the general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development; including among other things, adequate provision for traffic, the promotion of safety from fire and other dangers, adequate provision for light and air, the promotion of good civic design and arrangement, wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, and the adequate provision of public utilities and other public requirements.

Sect. 9. The Planning Board may adopt the city plan as a whole by a single resolution or may by successive resolutions adopt successive parts of the plan, said parts corresponding with major geographical sections or divisions of the municipality or with functional subdivisions of the subject matter of the plan, and may adopt any amendment or extension thereof or addition thereto. Such city plan shall be a public record, but its purpose and effect shall be solely to aid the Planning Board in the performance of its duties. The adoption of the city plan or any amendment thereof shall by resolution carried by the affirmative votes of not less than a majority of all the members of the Planning Board. The resolution shall refer expressly to the maps, descriptive matter, and other matters intended by the Planning Board to form the whole or part of the plan, and the action taken shall be recorded on the adopted plan or part thereof adopted by the identifying signature of the chairman or secretary of the Planning Board, and a copy of the plan or part thereof shall be certified to the City Councils.

Sect. 10. The Planning Board shall have authority to promote public interest in and understanding of the city plan and of the official map of the municipality as hereinafter described and to that end may publish and distribute copies of the city plan, or of the aforesaid official map, or of any report and may employ such other means of publicity and education as it may deem advisable. Members of the Planning Board, when duly authorized by the said Planning Board, may attend city planning conferences or meetings of city planning institutes or hearings upon pending city planning legislation, and the Planning Board may, by resolution spread upon its minutes, pay the reasonable traveling expenses incident to such attendance. The Planning Board shall have authority to make such investigations, maps and reports, and recommendations in connection therewith, relating to the planning and development of the municipality, as

seem desirable to it. The Planning Board may, from time to time, report and recommend to the appropriate public officials and public agencies programs for the development of the municipality, for the erection of public structures and improvements and for the financing thereof. It shall be part of the Planning Board's duties to consult and advise with public officials and agencies, public utility companies, civic, educational, professional, research, and other organizations, and with citizens with relation to the protecting or carrying out of the city plan, and to make recommendations relating to the development of the municipality. The Planning Board shall have the right to accept and use gifts for the exercise of its functions. All public officials shall, upon request, furnish to the Planning Board, within a reasonable period of time, such available information as it may properly require for its work. In general, the Planning Board may be given such powers as may be necessary to enable it to fulfill its functions, promote municipal planning, or carry out the purposes of this Ordinance; provided the total expenditures of said Board shall not exceed the appropriation for its expenses.

Sect. 11. The Planning Board may, from time to time, recommend to council amendments of the zoning map or additions thereto to conform to the Board's recommendations for the zoning regulation of the territory comprised within approved subdivisions.

Sect. 13. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

PUBLIC WORKS

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

Continuing the work made necessary by the disaster of 1938, we cleaned the banks of the Ashuelot river from the Swanzeey line to the stone bridge in Court street with the help of W. P. A. labor.

We built a new bridge over the Branch just off the Marlboro road replacing the one carried off by the flood. It is a cement structure with a span twelve feet greater than the old bridge. Built with city funds at a cost of \$7,900.

By an act of the legislature towns and cities which had spent in excess of one eighth of one percent of their assessed valuation in rehabilitation work were entitled to assistance from the state in continuing the work. Having already spent over \$23,000. the state took over the further expense.

Under the direction of the State Highway Department stumps and trees have been removed from the highway. They have also removed much of the debris in the streams near our bridges.

Our own department has resurfaced many of the gravel walks, and repaired and renewed about 1,800 square yards of cement walks out of this fund. The total contribution by the state was over \$17,000.

The bed of the Branch through the City Pasture was filled four to eight feet in depth with gravel brought in with the high water. It has been cleaned out and the material used to fill around the Incinerator and other buildings in the pasture.

A new cold patch shed has been built we think above the highwater line and is so constructed that the material can be heated, mixed and dumped into trucks without further handling.

Another wood shed has been built and both sheds are now well filled with wood.

A storage shed has been built to house materials salvaged from the dump. We have also built a new pipe rack above the high water line.

During the flood our storage supply of water pipe was filled with rubbish and filth. This pipe has been thoroughly cleaned with live steam and replaced in the new racks.

All these buildings have been built by our employees and the lumber used was cut from our down timber.

Hidden damages continue to arise as results of the disaster. We can meet them only as they come to light.

Our oil and tar operations have been curtailed this year. It has been our aim to oil first the streets that were flooded and then the hill roads as far as possible. It is not economy to cut this appropriation too much. It costs about 5 cents per square yard to oil a road that is in good condition using about one fifth of a gallon of oil per square yard but if the road is allowed to go too long it takes about one and one half gallons for the same space. Oil costs nearly 12 cents per gallon.

A new house being built on Blossom street we have further graded the street and made water and sewer connections.

Stanhope avenue has been graded at the further end and water and sewer line extended to the new broadcasting station.

Vine street recently laid out we have laid water and sewer pipe and graded the street.

Grading in Avalon street and Martell court also has been extended.

In addition to W. P. A. labor used during the clean up period and the financial aid from the state, we have had considerable W. P. A. labor as a relief measure. In order to receive this assistance the city as sponsor must make certain contributions.

Nearly all of this labor has been used on the water shed in Roxbury.

Chopping, hauling logs, sawing and sticking cost \$3,651.20. Cutting, hauling, sawing and piling wood cost \$1,698.05.

Building new wood shed, \$515.32.

We now have 174,773 feet of pine plank on sticks in Marlboro, and 150 cords of wood in Roxbury and 400 cords in shed at City Pasture. We have received from the Welfare department \$788 for wood.

In replacing the water pipe washed out in the stream at Main street bridge we have gone three and one half feet below the bed of the stream and incased the pipe in cement. Cost \$1,601.95.

The same precautions were taken in relaying the pipe crossing the Branch at South Keene. Cost \$2,164.40.

There are other points where water pipes cross the streams that should have attention.

After 14 years of continuous service the Beech Hill filter has been refilled with 32 inches of beach sand. Each time the filters are cleaned a certain amount of sand has to be taken out. The work was done according to specifications of the State Board of Health.

The filter in Roxbury will have to be refilled with sand soon.

We recommend that filters and pipe yard be suitably fenced.

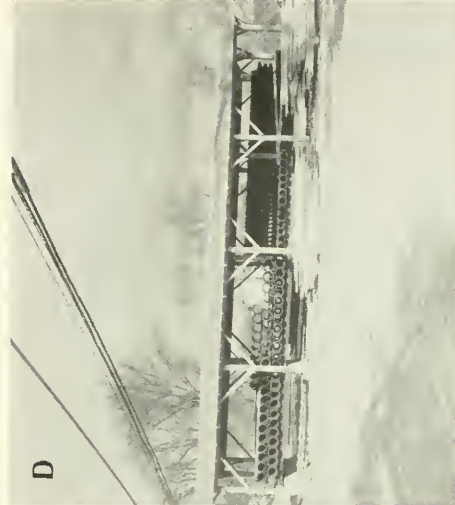

REPORT OF THE PARK COMMISSIONER

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:—

The work of the Park department during the past year has, of necessity, largely been an effort to clear up hurricane damage in the hard hit park areas with the least possible expense to the city. As there was an added appropriation of only \$1,500 for this work it was necessary to depend to a great extent upon W. P. A. labor and, owing to various federal projects which took precedence, the number of available men was disappointing, dwindling much of the time from the expected 50 to 8 or 10. It was also impossible to use this labor in the parks while other lumbering operations were in progress with a consequent delay in starting work.

The first project was in clearing the areas around the Robin Hood Swimming Pool and Field, which was made ready for the largest season in its history, although several hundred stumps still remain to be burned or carted away. As is well known, the thousands of beautiful pines at Wheelock Park were practically all destroyed and most of the years clearing has been done here. The entrance arch was badly broken and the building twisted and crushed with much of the roof gone; these have been repaired and the entrance approach graded, curbed and seeded, with a border planting of Iris as a start toward restoring the beauty of the park. Up to this time approximately 6,500 stumps have been pulled up, carted away and the ground cleared and leveled but probably an equal area still remains to be cleared, a considerable part of which it is hoped can be done this winter.

The state generously cleared strips 50 feet wide on each side of the road through the Dinsmoor and Faulkner and Colony woods, where all the trees were destroyed and work is now being continued here by the park department. In the Ladies Park, though not under the supervision of the commissioner, work has been undertaken at the suggestion of the committee, and the area at the junction of Park Avenue and Arch Street has been graded, loamed and seeded and a field stone curb and border of 1,200 Iris bulbs, kindly donated by Keene Teachers College placed along the streets. With all possible down timbebr sold, the work of clearing the remaining debris is now being done, and much slash awaits the coming of snow to be burned.

Supervision of playgrounds was this year given to the Park department and, because of the destruction of Wheelock Park, a new playground was established at Fuller Park; much of the apparatus at Wheelock Park was badly damaged by falling trees but this was repaired and moved to Fuller and Robin Hood Parks at a cost of about \$200. A shelter with water and toilet facilities was built at Fuller Park at an expense of \$550 and the playground operated with three supervisors at a cost of \$350. The daily attendance ran from 75 to 90 and it is felt that it was such a success that it should be continued. A larger playground, with more supervisors and added facilities, was also operated at Robin Hood Park with a greatly increased attendance and the closing "circuses" at each of the playgrounds brought out larger participation and attendance of parents and citizens than ever before.

Robin Hood Pool was, as usual, the most popular recreation spot and all attendance records were broken with over 400 present on many days. Again under the efficient supervision of Mr. Newell Paire and an able corps of life savers, the pool was open every day and evening throughout the summer and for the sixth consecutive season without a serious accident. The boats at the pool were so badly damaged in rescue service during the flood that it was necessary to buy four new ones, which were in constant use during the season.

It is planned to keep the southern part of Robin Hood Pool cleared for skating during the winter; a portion of the bath house has been refloored and stoves put in for heating for the convenience of skaters and it is hoped to have an attendant present afternoons and evenings and also to have the area flood-lighted.

Approximately \$2,600 was received by the special committee from the sale of fallen pine and spruce in the parks and this has been allotted to the various areas in the hope that it may be used in replanting and restoring the parks as

a contribution to principal rather than income. None of this money has been used as yet as it has been recommended that no replanting should be done for at least a year following the destruction.

It is recommended that clearing be continued during the winter and that work on a long term program, following a carefully developed plan, be started next year.

An approximate division of the years expenditures in the various areas accompanies this report.

REPORT OF CITY ENGINEER AND BUILDING INSPECTOR

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:—

My report is herewith submitted for the year 1939.

The usual routine engineering work has been done for the several city departments and repair of hurricane damage has been continued this year.

Lines and grades have been given on many streets for city work and also for the benefit of others who were building or repairing houses.

Plans have been drawn and estimates made for constructing concrete sidewalks, buildings, and other city projects.

More than the usual amount of municipal building, and repairs to city buildings has been done this year, including a new roof on part of city hall and repairs in the basement. The fire station has received general repairs on both the exterior and interior. A new band stand was erected in Fuller park.

Considerable time and information has been given the State and Federal Government engineers on flood control and other surveys.

The department of Labor also requires monthly reports on the progress of building construction and the Bureau of Labor statistics has been active in compiling building data of previous years.

Additional lots have been laid out in Greenlawn and Woodland cemeteries. There has been more building work this year than for several years past and among the buildings completed or under construction may be mentioned the extensive additions to the high school, an addition to the Elliott Community Hospital and the reconstruction of the Whipple block, also the modernized Ball block and a new Public Service of N. H. building. A new grade school building on Wood street, and a broadcasting studio on Dunbar street connected with the broadcasting station being built in West Keene.

The Trustees of the Keene Public Library submit the following report for the year 1939.

A necessary improvement in the building was completed during the year. For sometime there had been inadequate space for much valuable reference material. To fill this need, the basement under the stack room has been renovated. The walls and floor were painted, old shelves rearranged and new ones added. This makes available to library patrons the magazine and newspaper files, and many useful books and gifts for which there was no place in the stack room.

In the purchase of new books, the reduced income of several of the book funds have greatly hindered the committee in fulfilling the demand.

The Trustees recognize and appreciate the continued loyalty and efficiency of Miss Saxton and the library staff. A detailed account of the work and activities at the library is given in the librarian's report.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of the Keene Public Library:

The report for the year 1938-1939.

In reviewing the year, the one thing that stands out especially is the reconditioning of the lower stack and furnishing it with steel shelving suitable for newspapers and unbound magazines.

The moving of periodicals, Federal and State documents from various parts of the library, the arranging of the Seward collection, and the less-used books which from time to time have been removed from the book room to make more room, the discarding of superseded or unnecessary material, all took much planning and time, and only those who have lived and worked under the former conditions, can truly appreciate the convenience and indeed the pleasure of merely going down a short flight of stairs to find a needed book or magazine on shelves well-ordered and marked.

This moving leaves us with a room on the second floor, sufficiently large to accommodate groups in the city which need a place for Board or Committee meetings, more accessible than our third floor Hall. I hope that you, The Trustees, will feel that it may be re-decorated and a new lighting system installed so that it can be used in the coming months. That would also give a place for the museum cases in the so-called Club room and thus provide more place for the Junior department. Seven different associations have used one or the other of these rooms fifty times during the year.

The extension work in the two schools where deposit libraries have been placed and the book service to the patients at the Hospital have again met with success and favor. It is possible that a similar plan should be started in another school the coming year. Vacation reading was interestingly planned for the summer and participated in by a large number of children. The library supplements the schools in helping to train intelligent citizens and we feel that the boys and girls are gaining much of value from these carefully prepared lists with their amusement. Book Week was observed with exhibits of new and old books and an entertainment by the Girl Scouts of Troop No. 1, in Parker Hall under the leadership of Miss Jane Dickinson. To all of them, we owe thanks. Eight story hours were given during the winter. The attendance was 503.

Early in November, there was an exhibition of drawings and paintings, by people in this vicinity, secured and placed by Miss Helena Putnam, which was enjoyed by 150 visitors aside from numbers of regular patrons who took time to examine them and express approval of the art interest of the young and older exhibitors.

Since last March when we began making a record of the number of people using the reading and reference rooms, the attendance has been 12,632—an average of about 50 a day. 804 new borrowers were registered during the year, which brings the total number of registered borrowers since September 1936 to 6,039 or 44% of the population. Of these, 33 are non-residents. At the beginning of the year there were 31,224 volumes and at the close, 31,567. The circulation of books shows an increase of 2,306. The whole number lent for home use, was 94,868, of these 20,456 were from the Junior department. In inter-library loan service, 27 volumes have been borrowed from other libraries and 59 lent to other libraries. 107 phonograph records were sent to us from the State library for the use of our borrowers. The pamphlet and picture collections have been recently revised. The present files are of good working material.

The librarian and children's librarian have spoken on Books or the Library work to several groups and three members of the Staff have attended library meetings.

It is a pleasure to express gratitude to the Staff for willing cooperation in all undertakings also to Mr. Farrar, who supervised the moving, and to the Sentinel Printing Co. for many favors. It has been a privilege to work with you, as a Board, and I am glad to acknowledge special help from Mr. Palmer

and Mr. Kingsbury who had charge of the re-decorating and furnishing of the lower stack. Following is the cash account.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

To his honor the Mayor and Members of the City Councils:

Your City Solicitor reports activities for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1939 as follows:

At the beginning of the year the City of Keene was involved in the following suits:

- Kingsbury Machine Tool Corporation vs. City of Keene.
- Faulkner & Colony Manufacturing Company vs. City of Keene.
- Golding Keene Company, et als vs. City of Keene.
- Kate C. Dort vs. City of Keene.
- Herman Claywood vs. City of Keene.
- James E. Brady vs. City of Keene.

The suits of Kingsbury Machine & Tool Corporation, Faulkner & Colony Manufacturing Company and Golding Keene Company against the City of Keene were brought for the abatement of taxes. The petitioners have made no attempt to dispose of these cases and they are still pending.

The action of Kate C. Dort vs. City of Keene. The plaintiff alleged that certain acts of the City had caused water to flood the cellar of her house at 25 Elm Street, for which she sought to collect damages. At the February Term the plaintiff took a voluntary non suit, thereby disposing of this action.

The suit of Herman Claywood vs. the City of Keene, is an action to recover damages which the plaintiff alleges were caused to his property due to the failure of installing adequate drains under June Street when said street was constructed. No effort has been made by counsel for the plaintiff to have this case disposed of, and it is still pending.

The case of James E. Brady vs. City of Keene was an action in which Mr. Brady filed a petition in Superior Court to compel the City to permit the erection of a filling station at 186 Main Street. At the conclusion of the plaintiff's case the City's motion to dismiss was granted. To this order the plaintiff accepted and the case was transferred to the Supreme Court. In December 1938, the Supreme Court upheld the decision of the Superior Court and the petition was denied.

The following action brought by the City of Keene was pending at beginning of the year.

City of Keene vs. Ida Tatelman, et als.

This suit was brought several years ago in an effort to secure an injunction against the use of the premises on Winchester Street as an automobile graveyard. Several attempts have been made by your solicitor to dispose of this

matter, and at the February Term 1939 I requested that the defendants be ruled in contempt for failing to clean up the premises as previously ordered by the court. This request was denied on the ground that the defendants were not residents of this State and therefore the Court had no jurisdiction. During the past year large quantities of junk have been removed and the general appearance of the premises has been greatly improved.

The following action was brought during the present year against the City of Keene.

John Elliot, Attorney vs. City of Keene.

The action of John Elliot, Attorney vs. the City of Keene was brought for the abatement of taxes. No effort has been made by counsel for the petitioner to dispose of this case and it is still pending.

All criminal cases falling within the jurisdiction of the City Solicitor were prosecuted in the Municipal Court. The City Solicitor has also advised the officers of the City and members as to the law in various matters, and has drawn all the necessary deeds, agreements and other instruments requested.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CEMETERIES

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I submit the report of the Cemetery department for the year ending November 30, 1939.

We have had during the year 125 adult and 7 infant burials.

It was necessary to leave much of the Hurricane work until this year, at which time there were many lots to be regraded and stones reset.

During the year of 1938 the land was so wet we were unable to draw out any loam, but this year we have drawn out many loads which will be available for filling depressions and regrading lots.

We have this year bought filling to cover a plot in Woodland Extension and we hope to cover the same with loam the coming season so as to provide room for about 50 new lots.

We have sold 24 lots at \$100.00 each, 1 at \$80.00, 1 at \$60.00, 3 at \$50.00, 2 at \$40.00, 1 at \$25.00 and 4 at \$20.00.

At the present time we are caring for 215 lots annual care and 623 lots perpetual care.

The collections for the year have been \$4,717.00.

REPORT OF WELFARE DEPARTMENT

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I hereby submit the report of the Welfare Department for the year ending December 1st, 1939.

During the past year the City has had to bear the entire burden of direct relief as no State or Federal Aid was available. The cost of maintaining families and single persons on direct relief has shown a sharp decrease, while the cost of old age assistance has shown an even sharper increase.

The cost of old age assistance is divided between the Federal Government, the State of New Hampshire and the City of Keene, the Federal Government paying 50%, the State of New Hampshire 25% and the City of Keene 25%.

The number of direct relief cases dropped from 112 in December 1938 to 54 in December 1939. Old age assistance cases increased from 58 to 89 cases during the same period. Beginning January 1st, 1940 the eligibility age limit for old age assistance cases is reduced from seventy years to sixty-five years. It is estimated that this change is the age limit will increase the cost of old age assistance at least 50%.

The total expenditures of the Welfare Department for 1939 show a decrease of \$11,373.34 compared with the expenditures of 1938.

A complete record of each case handled by this department is on file in the office of the overseer of the poor.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To His Honor the Mayor, and Board of Aldermen:

I hereby submit my report for the year ending November 30, 1939.

There were 24 Bell alarms, 380 Still alarms, making a total of 404 alarms. 38 of these calls were out of town.

The number of alarms the department has answered for the year is 27 more than that of last year.

The fire loss for the year will be larger than last year, as there has been a number of fires that resulted in quite a loss, and some from sprinkler systems.

The inspection of buildings which is carried out monthly, continues to show very good results, as there is a better understanding between the business men, merchants, and the fire department.

The motor fire apparatus and its equipment is in very good condition. The pumping engines have been tested for their pumping capacities and all of them showed a good reserve over capacity.

Engine No. 2 will need to have the leather cups or packings and also the valves changed the coming year as ten years is very fair service for them.

The department has purchased a forest fire pump, with all the necessary equipment, two lengths of 1½" suction with strainer, one Wye with gate valves, one relief valve, and two nozzles with three sizes of tips, also 1,000 feet of 1½" single jacket rubber lined hose. This makes 2,500 feet for forest fire use, and the forestry department has 2,500 feet here also with a portable pump. This gives very good protection from forest fires, also there is a C. C. C. Camp in West Swanzey of 200 young men, which we can call in a case of a large forest fire.

The department has also purchased a cellar pump with a capacity of 250 gallons a minute or 15,000 gallons per hour.

There will have to be purchased new tires for the City Service Ladder Truck and the Emergency truck, as these tires are six years old.

The department has on hand 10,750 feet of 2½" double jacket rubber lined hose and 2,900 feet of 1½" single jacket rubber lined hose, and 1,200 feet of linen unlined hose at South Keene in hose house.

There has been 200 feet of unserviceable hose turned over to the Public Works Department.

The fire alarm, its circuits and equipment are in very good condition. There has been installed a new seven pair cable from fire alarm room to the pole outside, this is a lead covered cable. The fire alarm boxes have been painted during the year.

The two new alarm boxes purchased this year for replacement, are Box 46 Court Street Corner of School, and 115 Church Street corner Valley. There will be some changing over on No. 1 circuit on Marlboro Street from Eastern Avenue to South Keene, as the Telephone Co. have changed their lines over on new poles, and will take down the old ones, which the alarm circuits are now on.

Fire Headquarters is now in very fine condition, as the Land and Building Committee have painted the Station inside and out, and have repaired the roof which had been leaking, also remodeled the Shower Bath and tiled the same.

The Board of Engineers recommend the purchase of 1,000 feet of fire hose, two fire alarm boxes for replacement, also tires for the City Service Ladder Truck, and Emergency Truck, also repacking the pumps and renewing the valves on Engine No. 2.

To His Honor the Mayor, Members of the City Government, Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department, Land and Buildings Committee, Officers and members of Fire Department, and to the Police Department, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for the good support and co-operation rendered to me during the year.

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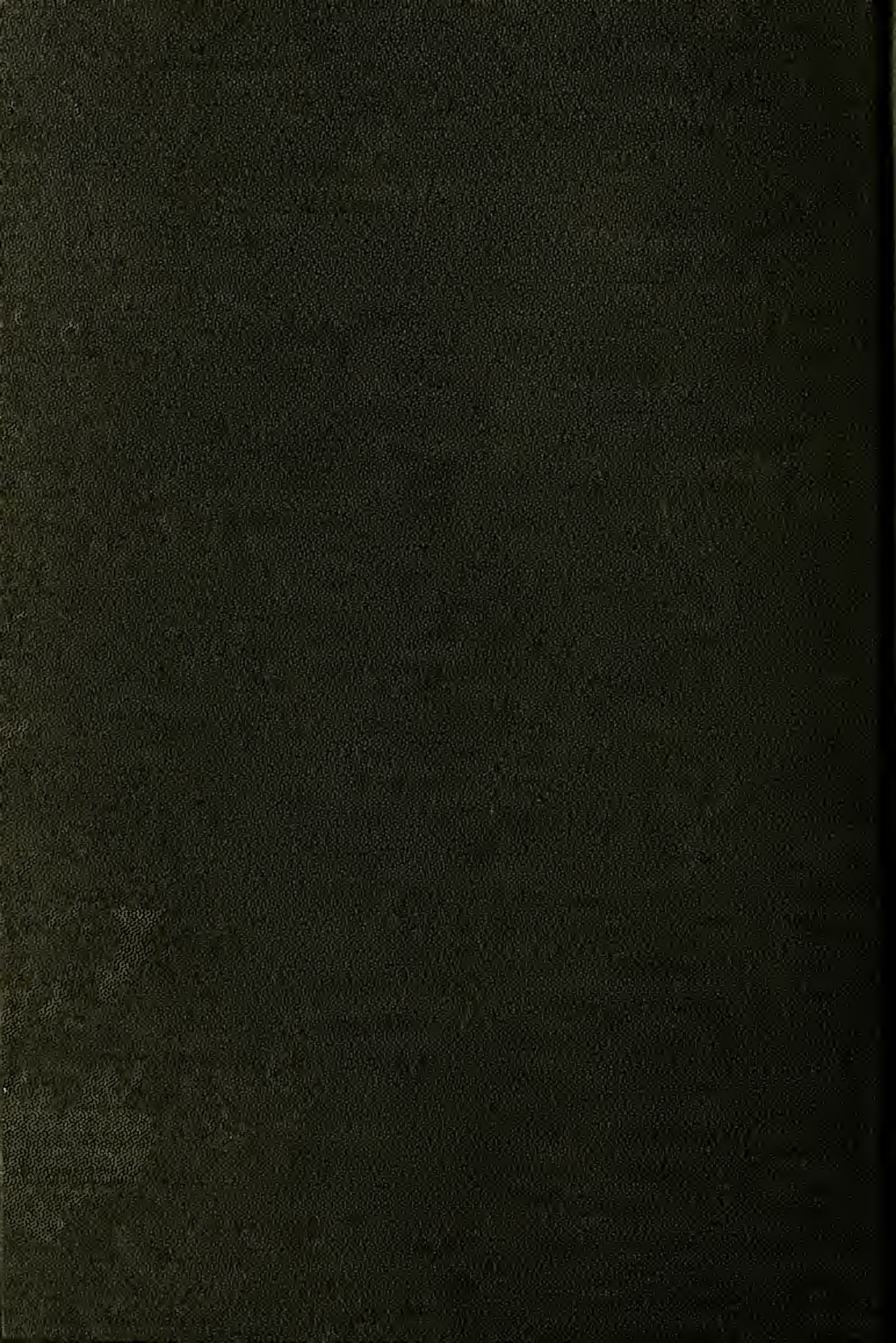
