


ORGANIZATION

of the City Government

Tuesday, March 22, 1938

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the City Council for the municipal year of 1938. and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

In the absence of the Mayor Councilman Smith was chosen Chairman Protein and he assumed the duties of the office.

The Clerk read a statement of the votes cast for Mayor and Councilmen as returned by the Clerks of the several wards, and Chairman Smith referred same to the Committee on Elections and Returns, who retired, canvassed the returns, and returned reporting their finding of the statement made by the City Clerk correct, and Mr. Smith declared Hon. Edward J. Gallagher elected Mayor of the City of Laconia for the ensuing year.

Councilmen Kimball, Shelley, and Jewett were appointed a committee to wait on the Mayor Elect and escort him to the chair. Mayor Gallagher was introduced to the Council and visiting friends by Councilman Kimball. The oath of office was administered to Mayor Gallagher and Councilmen Smith, St. Jacques, Kimball Jewett, Shelley, and Sleeper by Frederick A. Tilton, Esq.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Walter M. Richardson after which the Mayor delivered his inaugural address giving a resume of the accomplishments attained during the past year.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

Gentlemen of the Council:

Before proceeding with my inaugural address, I deem it fitting that we should stand in silent reverence for thirty seconds out of respect to the memory of our late ex-Mayor Alfred C. Wyatt and Councilman-Senator George C. Stafford, both of whom were upon the stage at the Laconia Gardens at the inauguration last March.

Please stand in silence for 30 seconds.

CITY FINANCES

On February 15, 1937, the serial debt of the City of Laconia was \$475,750.00 and the amount of unpaid notes was \$100,000, making a city debt of \$575,750.

On February 15, 1938, the serial debt of the city was \$421,750 and the amount of unpaid notes was \$75,000, making a city debt of \$496,750.

In comparing the above statements, it will be noticed that there was a decrease in the amount of the city debt of \$79,000 for the fiscal year ended Feb. 15, 1938.

Our balance sheet shows current assets to be \$158,-559.61 and current liabilities to be \$144,715.88, thereby leaving a balance of current assets over current liabilities of \$11,843.73 for the year just ended, as compared to \$3,-273.56 for the previous year.

I consider this a very creditable showing, but we must carry on and make even a better financial statement possible for the year upon which we start today. This may be accomplished only by "Planning Our Work and Working Our Plan."

The subject of taxes is the most discussed topic of the day, as every one is concerned in one way or another. When I mentioned in my previous inaugural address that the then tax rate of \$36.40 was the highest Laconia had known since it became a city, little did I realize that I would see during my term as mayor a rate of \$43.00 caused, not by ruthless spending by your Mayor and Council, but by the increase in County Taxes. As a result, the real property owners of the city had to pay the large increases in their taxes if possible. To prove that many were unable to do so, I quote the amount of unpaid taxes for 1937, \$83,145.24.

What will happen in the next few years if the amount of unpaid taxes continues to increase as it has for the past few years? This is one of the serious problems with which we will be faced this year. Something must be done and the present time is none too soon.

We take account of stock and find we are carrying on the books of the city at present nearly \$130,000 in unpaid taxes. I believe it as necessary to try our best to decrease this item to the advantage of the city as it is to decrease the city debt and shall do all in my power to accomplish this with your co-operation.

As practically the entire revenue of the city is derived from taxes, I feel that this department should be considered in the future more than it has in the past. Upon the recommendation of a state tax commissioner with whom I conferred here yesterday, I shall ask that the board of assessors be made a full time job, since it apparently would be to the best interest of the city to have them so. I shall ask that the practice of each assessor having a district himself be stopped and that a majority of the board be present at

each appraisal of real property; that the tax collector be furnished with sufficient office help to enable him to go out and collect taxes. I ask your co-operation with the interest of the taxpayer in mind.

FEDERAL AID

Recently there has been made an appraisal of WPA projects in Belknap County. The report for the City of Laconia was made by Mr. Henry T. Turner, acting without compensation upon my invitation. Mr. Turner brought out the interesting fact it is a "fair estimate" that one million dollars has been expended in this county in various federal programs during the last five years. He estimates the City of Laconia's contributions at \$125,000, an average of \$25,000 a year for each of the five years, and a similar contribution of \$125,000 by Belknap County over the same period.

It is expected two WPA projects, The Weirs fire wells and the retaining wall at the high school athletic field, will be started Thursday of this week. Applications for projects on all of the city parks have been filed and are being considered by WPA officials. Fair Street Extension will be completed this year with the city in all probability receiving a WPA contribution toward the expense.

The most notable business development in Laconia during the past year, the acquisition of the C. A. Lund Ski company, is undoubtedly traceable to the close proximity of Laconia to the Gilford Recreational Center, a WPA project, which has had a monthly federal payroll this winter, and at this very time, of \$12,000 a month. The city did its bit by donating the factory site for the Lund company.

Winnisquam Pollution

I stated at my previous inauguration that I expected nothing would result from the bill in the legislature asking

an appropriation of \$100,000 for this purpose and was correct in my prediction. I do feel, however that sufficient contacts have been made by myself and others in Washington so Laconia will be included should the Merrimack River project be carried out as recommended by the National Water Resources Board. I promise my continued efforts in that direction.

Schools

I believe Laconia stands second to no other city when the matter of education of its children is under discussion and it is my hope and expectation that this distinction will be maintained the present year. I notice in reading the report of the School Board that the teacher's salaries have been partially restored to the level upon which they had been operating before the so-called depression and I ask that the balance necessary to complete the restoration be granted this year if possible.

PUBLIC WHARVES

A matter that caused considerable discussion last summer and which is bound to appear again this year is the renting of wharves at The Weirs for the accommodation of those coming into the harbor by boat. My position last year was that both the Irwin and Lavallee wharves should be rented. After personally investigating conditions last summer, I am more than ever convinced the extra amount needed for the renting of both wharves should be appropriated and recommend at this time such action. Only through the courtesy of Capt. Leander Lavallee of the Steamer Mount Washington were much-needed facilities made available last summer without cost to the city.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Through the ability of the Fire Department to keep losses at a minimum, the City of Laconia enjoys the lowest

possible insurance rate, Class A-1. Last year I recommended the purchase of a new ladder truck for the Lakeport station but no action was taken in that direction. Once more I recommend the same and state I believe there comes a time when the expenditure of a little money is economical rather than extravagant.

ALTERNATE ROAD TO WEIRS

Almost at the beginning of my administration as Mayor a petition was presented signed by many influential citizens of Laconia suggesting the laying out of a new highway on the westerly side of Lake Paugus from Ward Six to connect with the Daniel Webster highway above The Weirs, and, while the proposition seems almost fantastic to many of us at present, many homes and hamlets have sprung from just such visions as this.

Some of our oldest inhabitants recall reminiscenses of their ancestors to the effect that many years ago there was a settlement of happy families in the vicinity which bordered on a range-way that ran from some point near the present Laconia Country Club to The Weirs cross-road. Several of the old cellars are still visible proof of their existence.

A new road on the west side of Lake Paugus, while not of immediate necessity, should receive consideration to open taxable property and provide an avenue for traffic between Lakeport and The Weirs, relieving the main artery.

The fact that there has been such a development along The Weirs Boulevard means a slowing down of traffic. A great deal of the traffic between the two highways would be diverted to a new road, thus relieving the boulevard for through traffic. I think there are many angles to be studied and the assembling of all facts for or against this road will be helpful.

PARKS

Laconia can rightly boast of its playgrounds and of its attention to its youngsters. No better sites for recreation are available anywhere and it is very gratifying to note the interest displayed by the parents in making their own particular park just a little better than the other. The city has expended much money during the past year to improve parks. In the very near future there will be presented to the city council for adoption an ordinance changing the name of Pearl Street Grounds to Stafford Park in memory of our late beloved councilman who gave so untiringly of his time and effort to make a suitable place for baseball games. Also, I believe ways and means should be devised for the erection of a suitable grand stand at the park.

CITY PARKING LOT

It has been most pleasing to me to observe the popularity and general use of the public parking space in the rear of City Hall since the area was almost doubled through the acquisition of 2,000 loads of fill, given at my suggestion by the F. W. Woolworth company through its local manager, Mr. Earl E. Bates.

WEIRS AVIATION

Just when it looked as though aviation at The Weirs was to be a memory rather than a reality, I succeeded in having the Public Service Commission come to my office for a conference with the officials of the Winnipesaukee Flying Service which resulted, after an all day session, in the return of the ships to The Weirs and resumption of activity at the scaplane base.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

I spoke very strongly in favor of a new lock-up in my inaugural address last year and although I would like to be able to say a lock-up in the City of Laconia is not needed,

the fact remains it is a necessity here as elsewhere. We have one of the worst lock-ups in the state, if not the worst. For a small amount of money this situation could be corrected and I recommend as one of the major items to be considered this year, a *Solution* of this problem.

Tax Collector's Office

The unfortunate incident which occurred in our tax collector's office during my term as mayor is one that I regret exceedingly, but I wish to say, as all our city officials will readily acknowledge, I have persistently endeavored to ascertain if possible just what happened.

PLANNING

A planning board is important for the welfare of the city. A committee made up of city officials, citizens, or citizens and city officials together, should be able to function in a manner that would prevent hasty decisions. It would not mean approval of all projects recommended. Those selected would be known to be of ultimate benefit and fit into the city's growth. In my opinion any reasonable expenditure for long-range planning could be justified.

TAX CHART

Each one present this morning has received a tax chart compiled by Councilman Ralph C. Kimball of Ward Three, showing the analysis of expenditures of the City of Laconia during the fiscal year ended Feb. 15, 1938. I wish publicly to express my appreciation to Councilman Kimball for thus bringing graphically to the attention of the taxpayers the manner in which their tax dollar was distributed.

STREET DEPARTMENT

The street department under City Engineer French continues to function efficiently and has kept well within the budget.

SUPPORT OF POOR

Welfare and Relief still stand out prominently in the finances of the city and I believe that under Overseer Randlett this department has operated at the lowest possible cost.

Taxpayers' associations have come into existence in a number of cities, owing to the great increase in relief expenditures. It is to be hoped Laconia will have one of these organizations before long, co-operating with relief and other city officials, including the mayor and council, to effect wise economies.

FORESTRY BUILDING

Last August Congress approved an appropriation of \$220,000, recommended by U. S. Senator Fred H. Brown, for construction of a headquarters building in Laconia for the White Mountain National Forest. This will cause the headquarters to remain in Laconia permanently and in effect provide a large-size, well-paid industry.

WIDENING UNION AVE.

I recommend the widening of Union Ave., at Simon-eau's store to relieve the congestion of traffic at that point.

IN CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the members of the council and all the departments for the loyal support given me during the past year. I realize that without it we could not have completed the twelve months with such a creditable financial showing.

I have personally put in a lot of time and covered much territory at no expense to the city, including several trips to Washington, As you will notice in the report of the Laconia Hospital in the city report I have given my salary as mayor to that institution as it has become payable. At my own expense a secretary has been furnished so that the mayor's office could be open at all times to the public. On the night of Feb. 14, 1938, it was voted by the council, for which please accept my thanks, that I be reimbursed in the amount expended for a secretary because you believed the city had received far more than the face value of the sum involved in the convenience to yourselves and the general public.

During the past year I have come to realize increasingly the sincere and earnest desire that so many of the citizens. have for the preservation of all the best traditions and features of Laconia and for the development of a civic program worthy of that heritage. They have come to me with suggestions, some of which I have embodied in the foregoing remarks, with encouragement, with consideration when problems have arisen. I am grateful for what they have shared with me and express to them the thanks of the council as well as of the mayor.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

for payment of bills against the city

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge, and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 p.m., at the City Clerk's Office.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Laconia:

The customary annual report of the Laconia School Board is herewith presented for your information. For the facts relative to administration of our public schools your attention is respectfully called to the superintendent's report. It is our purpose not to dwell upon matters adequately covered by his report, but there are always certain facts and events occurring each year which are worthy of special mention, and we shall briefly call some of these to mind.

The most obvious evidence of our school system is the buildings themselves. We are pleased to state that in general our buildings and equipment are in good shape. Although the appropriation has been kept down as low as possible during the past few years, repairs have been carried on in an economical manner in order to protect the very material investment which the people have. We have had many compliments from visitors and others about the condition of our buildings and especially regarding our Practical Arts building.

But there is more to education than bricks and mortar, and most of our attention this year has been directed to broadening the curriculum, to prepare boys and girls for their places in life, whether they attend college or not. We have tried to raise the standard of conduct of students in and out of school. We have modified our system somewhat in order to recognize individual differences. Classes in guidance have been added in order to aid students in finding the position in life for which they are best fitted. There is a stronger feeling each year that schools should prepare for life regardless of what one plans to do. It is possible that

courses in character training, etiquette and similar subjects should be added to our curriculum. A course in agriculture is under consideration if there is sufficient demand. It is my personal feeling that there should be more co-ordination, if possible, between our vocational training and local industries, perhaps by apprentice training courses. The superintendent and school board are ever on the alert to find ways of improving our methods of education.

This year again there will be talk of economy in city government. In this connection I wish to call your attention to the comparative costs of education in the state contained in the superintendent's report. We have tried to keep all expenses down as low as possible, but it is obvious from the fact that out of our appropriation of \$127,500.00 last year approximately 75% was expended for teaching salaries and of the balance nearly all was for fixed charges, that it is difficult to save any substantial sum without cutting salaries or dismissing teachers. As the teaching load is now heavier than advisable, the latter is practically impossible. As to the former, many salaries do not even now conform to the schedule set up by the Board. Each year we have more pupils, the enrollment last year being the largest ever. We cannot meet this increase in numbers by decreasing appropriations without seriously impairing the efficiency of our system. It is hoped that our problems of burdensome taxation may be solved in some other way.

We wish to express our gratitude to all who have been of assistance to us during the past year. Friendly and constructive criticism is not only acceptable but welcome.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January, 1939

Members of the School Board:

The annual report of the superintendent, the twentysecond of the present incumbent, is submitted for your consideration.

We have heard stories from other parts of the country about losses which schools have suffered, of schools closed, of teachers going without their salaries, of lack of supplies and text books. Nothing like this has taken place in Laconia. There has been curtailment, of course. Many of our teachers are not receiving the salaries they are entitled to according to the salary schedule. For several years the teachers have not had the benefit of the regulation regarding sick leave which allowed a teacher to be absent not more than five days in any one year because of personal illness or on account of serious illness or death of some member of her immediate family without loss of pay. The number of teachers in the elementary schools has been reduced although the enrollment has remained nearly the same. In the high school the average number of pupils per teacher was 28 last year (it is more this year), while the average for the state was 21.7.

I believe that the teachers did not abuse the sick leave privilege. I hope that soon it will be possible to restore this to them as I am convinced that many times teachers go into school and teach when both they and the children would be better off if they should remain at home.

ATTENDANCE

Parents are legally responsible for attendance at school at all times the schools are in session of all children between the ages of 8 and 16 years unless they have completed the eight grade. Attendance in our schools for the most part is good and there are very few cases of habitual truancy. In most cases of this kind the blame is on the part of parents who neglect their children entirely or are careless about getting them off to school on time. Teachers, the school nurse, and the truant officer co-operate in cases of absence, and try to have children in school unless they are sick.

Tuition in the elementary schools is \$1.25 a week; in grades seven and eight, \$1.75 a week; in the upper four grades of the high school, \$2.00 a week. About \$8,000.00 will be received from tuition this year.

It is unknown what effect the crection of a new elementary building in Gilford and a new high school building in Tilton will have upon the number of children in our schools from other towns. It is safe to say, however, that receipts from tuitions will be considerably less after this year.

SCHOOL PROPERTY

After enduring the crowded conditions in the high school so many years the teachers and pupils appreciate the change that was brought about by the erection of the Practical Arts building. Even now there is no unused space at the high school, and there is not room enough in the auditorium for the whole school to assemble at one time.

Recently two delegations from the school board and the city council of a city in New Hampshire have spent considerable time inspecting our buildings. Their comments regarding equipment and courses in the high school were very favorable.

Several of the class rooms in the main building should be painted this year.

Many trees in the grove back of the athletic field were blown down last September. These were sawed into boards which were stacked to be used, when dry, in the mechanic arts department. A skating rink is being maintained again this year and is used not only by boys and girls but by adults in the neighborhood. The total cost of this project is \$7.50, the amount paid for several loads of gravel, as all of the work is done by N. Y. A. boys.

The class rooms and corridors at Washington Street and Batchelder Street and several class rooms at Academy street were painted last summer. The walk at Gilford Avenue School was made over, and minor necessary repairs were made at all buildings.

The interior of the Harvard Street School should be painted this year and the walks at Washington Street need to be recovered.

Outside a few panes of glass, a few slate shingles, and a few bricks from chimneys, very little damage was done to the school buildings by the storm last September.

Much credit is due the school janitors for care they give the buildings. It is unfortunate that better recreational facilities cannot be provided at the Batchelder Street and the Gilford Avenue Schools.

SCHOOL WORK

Two teachers of the high school staff were married during the summer. Their places were taken by Miss Ada Tait, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, who has had several years' experience, and Mr. James Leh, a graduate of Keene.

For the first time in several years all Freshmen are required to take a course in mathematics, the choice being between Algebra and Junior Business Training and Applied Mathematics. Algebra should be taken by all pupils who are planning to go to a post-secondary school. Geometry is taken in the Sophomore year by those who need only two years of mathematics and in the Junior year by those who take Algebra II in the Sophomore year.

A course in Guidance for one-half year is given in the Eighth grade in place of Junior Business Training. This course attempts to present aspects of professions and business lines which may help a pupil in deciding what field he wishes to enter.

Pupils are not permitted to take Typewriting and Stenography unless their work in English has been satisfactory. It is hoped that parents will study carefully the report cards that their children take home at the end of each quarter and confer with the teachers regarding the records.

An attempt is made to provide activities that will be of interest and value to every child. Parents are asked to urge their children to enroll in one activity so that he can receive the benefit to be derived from the programs of the club of his choice.

Two changes of teachers were made in the elementary schools: Mrs. Saunders was transferred to special work at the high school, her place being taken by Miss Hammond; and Miss McGarry replaced Miss Ruth Young at Mechanic Street.

Much to our surprise enrollment in the first grades in all of the buildings this year is larger than it has been for some time, so that the total enrollment in the elementary schools now is only two less than it was last year. If equally large first grades continue for a few years additional teachers will be needed in the grades as one-fourth of the teachers have more than 40 pupils at the present time.

Last year intelligence tests and standard reading tests were given in all of the schools, and further reading tests have been given in the first three grades this year. With these facts about each child the teacher is able to adjust the work to the child's ability.

A new system in reading has been introduced in the first grade this year and all details of the system are being followed carefully. The material will be introduced as the present first grade goes on from year to year. While it is too early to judge the final results it is plainly seen that there is a decided improvement in the first grade reading this year.

Among the activities of the elementary schools the operetta given by the pupils of the Academy Street school was outstanding. While productions of this kind take much time on the part of the teachers and the pupils, it is felt that one worthwhile activity by each building a year could be of much value to the children.

More parents are urged to visit the schools frequently and to follow the work of their children from grade to grade.

Welfare and Health

Attention is called to a few laws for the protection of children. No child shall attend school unless he has been vaccinated; or has had smallpox; or has submitted not less than three times to vaccination; or holds a certificate of the local board of health that he is an unfit subject for vaccination. Children must be over fourteen years of age before they can be exhibited professionally in any public

place. Sale of toy pistols or other toy firearms, for the explosion of percussion caps or blank cartridges, and the possession of air rifles are prohibited. Children under fourteen may not be admitted to any place of amusement required by law to be licensed, after sunset, or during the hours the public schools are in session, unless accompanied by an adult. Children under eighteen are not permitted at any time in places of amusement known as dance-houses and concert-saloons, or any licensed billiard or pool room unless accompanied by parent or guardian.

The sale of cigarettes or tobacco in any other form to minors and the gift of cigarettes, snuff, or tobacco in any other form to a child under eighteen years of age are prohibited.

Every effort is being made to safeguard the health of the children, and physical examinations are made as often as possible. It can readily be seen that with approximately three thousand children in the schools this is a stupendous task for one nurse.

This year for the first time, the school nurse is employed for eleven months from August fifteen to the fifteenth of July. During the last two weeks in August a check-up of the children who were to begin school this year was made and the results were very satisfactory. After the close of schools in June it will be possible to do much follow-up work, which will include removal of tonsils and adenoids and treatment of other defects.

FEDERAL AID

When the Federal Government withdrew part of the funds for the support of the nursery schools one year ago, it was felt that the project was of such value that funds for one-half the cost of the supplies were included in this year's appropriation. As has been pointed out in previous reports these schools fill a great need in the lives of many children. The enrollment has averaged more than one hundred during the past year.

The National Youth Administration is providing funds up to \$6.00 a month each for twenty-seven pupils, nineteen boys and eight girls, in the high school. These boys and girls do clerical work, have charge of the scenery, and do many different kinds of work about the building and grounds under the supervision of one of the teachers.

As shop experience is necessary for teachers in adult education to qualify so that the school may receive federal aid and as only one of the teachers in the evening school has had this experience, the school receives only \$80.00, which is two thirds of the salary, from Federal funds towards the support of the evening schools.

The enrollment in the classes in English, Shop, Cabinet Making, and the commercial subjects has held up well this year.

Other Activities

Last Spring the high school teams won first place in Bookkeeping and third place in Algebra in the State Scholarship Contests.

The Lakonian won the international first place award in the 1938 Annual Quill and Scroll Critical Service. It was also awarded third place in the annual Columbia Scholastic Press Association contest.

Many other awards and honors have come to the school and to individual pupils.

A sound motion picture machine was presented to the school by the Class of 1938 and other organizations of the school.

A class in automobile driving was conducted during the year. The purpose of this course is to teach boys and girls how to drive correctly and to prepare them for examinations for drivers' licenses.

The graduates of our schools are a credit to the schools, to the city, and, above all, to their parents. Reports of our graduates in post-secondary institutions, are for the most, satisfactory. Many favorable comments are also received from employers of our boys and girls.

Costs of our schools when compared with other schools are very reasonable. These costs are always on file in my office and may be obtained by anyone who is interested in these comparisons.

The median per pupil cost in public elementary schools in New Hampshire for 1937-1938 was \$79.98. The average cost for the pupils in the elementary schools of the twelve cities (including Claremont) was \$75.15. The per pupil cost in the public elementary schools of Laconia was \$61.35. The lowest in the state was \$49.48; the highest, \$283.61.

The average current cost of education per \$1000.00 of equalized valuation in the cities for 1937-1938 was \$8.43. The cost in Laconia was \$8.16. The lowest in the state was \$3.08; the highest, \$30.10.

The median per pupil expenditure in public high schools for 1937-1938 was \$105.33. The average cost for the pupils in the high schools of the twelve cities was \$98.57. The per pupil cost in Laconia High School was \$98.55. The lowest in the state was \$71.15; the highest, \$179.32.

Another pleasant and successful year has been made possible by the co-operation of the School Board, the teachers, and the citizens of Laconia.

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Laconia City Council:

Many years ago there lived on Court Street in Laconia a lady known to her many neighbors and friends as Aunt Rhoda Ladd. She was loved and respected by all of those whose *privilege* it was to know her. After her passing to the other land her will was opened and found to contain in the disposition of her property a provision that whenever a sum was raised sufficient with her bequest to make in amount ten thousand dollars, the residue of her estate might be used to establish a cottage Hospital. The Laconia Hospital Association was organized and soon after the required amount was raised and her house was enlarged and a small beginning made.

The first year only eleven patients were admitted and the second year thirty-eight, from that to the present time a steady gain has been made. In 1938 our reports show that 2286 patients were admitted, requiring an expenditure of \$159,157.73. This shows briefly the large increase in the service rendered and the tremendous increase in expenses for care and maintenance. With this phenominal growth several enlargements have had to be made and a little inquiry will reveal the fact that a good hospital has been maintained rated today as an A-1 Hospital. It has excellent management, and a medical and surgical staff that ranks as one of the first in this or any other state.

What is much needed today to carry on the work in a better way is a children's ward, so that better care can be given the little folks. The Rotary Club have realized the necessity of this outlay and have already raised for this purpose about twenty-two hundred dollars, they have

plans for a Fair at which they hope to add a *substantial* sum. It is hoped and expected that all will be glad of this opportunity to assist them with a generous hand in their effort. An estimate of the *necessary* expense for providing a children's ward is about twelve thousand dollars.

Since the *beginning* of our hospital the Woman's Hospital Aid Association has been a strong factor in bringing a large degree of success in every effort that has been made in our work. No written words can express to them the debt of gratitude we owe them for their long and faithful service so well rendered.

The records of the forming of the Laconia Hospital Association, gives the date of incorporation as November 10, 1893, which marks 1938 as the forty-fifth year and the fortieth since the establishing of the Laconia Hospital in 1898, and a long jump from 47 admissions to the hospital in 1900 to 2286 admissions in 1938.

With an average of 72 patients per day this would indicate we have nearly reached the limit of our capacity.

During the past year considerable new equipment has been purchased. From funds provided by the Rotary Club the Maternity suite was equipped with 16 Gatz Beds and

a MacEchern Maternity bed in the delivery room. In the three-bed wards curtains on rods replaced screens. The latest addition is a Luminaire ceiling light in the delivery room.

A gift from Dr. Abbie Little, supplemented by contributions from the doctors on the staff and two dentists, purchased a new Operating Table for room 'C' in surgery. Gifts to their attending physician by Mr. Arthur J. Mead of Meredith, and Mr. and Mrs. Nathaniel W. Lillie of Brookline, Massachusetts, paid for a second McKesson suction machine for surgery. Minor instruments were also contributed by other doctors.

The ladies of the Hospital Aid equipped the four-bed surgical ward for women with Gatz Beds, Hospo-Lites and Judd cubical curtains, also bought two much needed cribs with mattresses, and a Chrome Gastro Evacuator.

The Hospital Aid under the able leadership of Mrs. Bernice Rowe have been most active in behalf of the hospital. Our demand on the different bands increases as we grow, and the Aid has spent \$786.39 the past year, often providing balance of requirements for the different bands where funds were not equal to providing same.

In order to keep the hospital clean and attractive, many of the chairs and ottomans in private rooms were recovered and walls and corridors freshened by painting. The woodwork on the outside of hospital and nurses' home received two coats of paint this past year.

We were fortunate not to have had serious damage from the Hurricane. The chimney at the nurses' cottage required repair and from the number of slates found on the grounds, I expect our roofs will need attention this Spring.

This year is a red letter year in the history of the X-ray, laboratory and out-patient departments. Due to the increasing number of patients and the never-ending demand for more modern equipment and methods this department found itself badly handicapped both for space and certain new equipment. We have now a department equal to any in the State. Our enlargement program is not as yet complete but we have taken care of all the pressing needs and we are indeed proud of this year's achievements. This was made possible by a gift from Mrs. Gurdon M. Maynard of New York, in memory of her father, Ex-Governor Henry B. Quinby, also a bequest from the estate of Helen T. Edgerly.

In order to give additional space a suite of rooms previously occupied by the hospital employees has been completely remodeled. A large inner corridor absorbed into the room space and giving all rooms a door into the main corridor, providing more sunlight and better air conditions.

We are now using twelve rooms. The new equipment of the rooms is a wonderful help. I think it would be of interest to describe the purpose of each room and what we have for equipment.

The first room on the North side of the corridor is used for a drug supply room. This room contains all of the drugs and the drug equipment needed for the entire hospital. A great many drugs are required in a hospital of this size and we have an unusually well supplied drug stock.

The second room is a laboratory room. Here all of the chemical analysis, bacteriological and tissue examinations, urine analysis, blood examinations, preparation of vaccines, and all of the tests ever called for in any routine hospital laboratory are done. We are one of the few hospitals in the State that do our own tissue examinations. All of this requires special equipment and we have the best.

The third room is a good sized lavatory room that has been fitted up for the special purpose of giving colonic irrigations and work of this type.

The fourth and fifth rooms are occupied by the new shock proof deep therapy X-ray that was purchased this year. This is of the latest type and has reduced out treatment time to one-fifth its usual time with the old equipment, not to mention the time saved in not requiring the draping of patients. The machine is absolutely shock proof, no danger to patient or operator. This gives the machine added flexibility that is very important in certain types of treatments. While this apparatus is primarily for the treatment of malignant conditions it is also used with much benefit in a great number of benign conditions, such as asthma, mastoiditis and sinusitis.

The sixth, Orthopedic Room, is for the reducing and treatment of fractures. This is to be known as the Helen T. Edgerly Room. It is equipped with a Special Halley Fracture Table as well as a flat top table. The plumbing is adapted to this type of work and has a special trap which prevents bits of plaster plugging the main sewers. Just off the plaster room are two large closets, one for plaster supplies etc., and the other for all the various splints and appliances used in fracture work.

The next room is used as a minor surgery. It is well equipped with a small operating table, operating lamp and necessary small utility tables. Gifts from Dr. Melba Stew-

art Perley include an electric sterilizer, some instruments and a new instrument cabinet. This room is used for minor surgery on out-patients and accident cases. One of its most important uses is for the examination room and biopsy room in connection with the cancer clinic that is held twice a month. It is also used for the orthopedic clinic that is held every other month. Attendance at both of these clinics have greatly increased the past year.

The eighth room is the metabolism room. It is equipped with two beds, the metabolism machine and a weighing scale. When not being used for metabolism tests we use this room for out-patients to rest in when taking tests or having pictures taken in the radiographic department. It is necessary to keep some of the cases all day and this furnishes them a handy and comfortable place. It is also used as a recovery room for patients that have been given as anaesthetic in the out-patient but who are not going to be admitted to the hospital.

The last room on this side is used as a physiotherapy room. It is equipped with a fine hospital sized short wave diathermy of the latest model. A steri-lamp used for the treatment of various skin disorders and infections, and infra-red lamp used for baking and relieving deep pain, such as muscle and joint pains. An ultra-violet lamp that give off rays similar to sunshine and is used as artificial sunshine. It is both tonic and healing. In addition to lamp treatments, massages and manipulations are given, this treatment is especially valuable in restoring fractured limbs to normal function quicker and better than would ordinarily result. The diathermy and steri-lamp were purchased this year.

On the South side of the corridor, opposite the drug room, is a small room where accident patients are received. Here also out-patients dressings and treatments are done. A very useful and much used room.

Next in line is a combined office and record room. In this room are the view boxes and stereoscopic apparatus. The records and films are filed in steel cabinets and kept for a number of years before they are transferred to the store-room. Not the least of the additions this year was a book-case for this room, providing a safe and clean place for a number of very fine reference books.

Joining this is the radiographic department where the developing and loading of film cassets is done.

On the opposite side this room opens into the radio-graphic room where most of the X-ray pictures are taken; for those not taken here we use the new shock proof portable machine which can be easily transported to any room or place where electric current is available. This machine can be moved to homes when patients cannot come to the hospital. Another most important advantage is that pictures can be taken in the operating room during operations. Being shock-proof the danger from shock or anaesthetic is eliminated. It is the best machine of its kind that has ever been on the market.

Adjoining this is the fluoroscopic room with a tilt fluoroscopic table, a separate unit from the rest of the radiographic equipment. In this room also superficial X-ray treatments are given for different forms of skin trouble.

The last room on this side at present is a store-room. This will eventually be remodeled into a dressing room for the department.

This brief description gives an idea of the progress made in this department the past six months.

Now that we have met this need for adult patients, we are hopeful that our cherished plans for accommodations for children may be realized during this coming year. This past year, aside from 298 births, we have cared for 342 children, under 12 years of age, giving 2323 days service. These little folks had to be tucked in with adults or in private rooms, wherever we could find room for them. Adults in general have been very kind in tolerating fretty children. This annoyance when one is ill should not be necessary. Then too, children are so much happier to be together. May we not make "A Children's Ward" our project for 1939?

We have grown all around our culinary department, without making any enlargement. That this department is able to maintain the reputation it has is remarkable under present conditions.

A new kitchen is another of our urgent needs which we wish could be realized.

The personnel of the hospital has remained the same with the following exceptions. Last April Mrs. Helen King, graduate of our school in 1920, took the position of night supervisor, in December, Miss Esther E. Cass, who had held positions in the hospital for the past seven years and the past year as Director of Nursing, resigned to accept a position in her own school, New England Deaconess Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts. This position was filled by Miss Marion Page, graduate of St. John's Hospital Brooklyn, New York.

This Fall Mrs. Mariam Lamothe, supervisor in the operating room, took a six weeks Post Graduate Course at

the New England Baptist Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts.

Regular meetings of the staff members have been held each month with increasing attendance and interest. Special committees have been appointed to increase the general efficiency and standards of the hospital.

I wish to thank the many friends of the hospital who manifested their interest in so many ways. The Boston Heralds provided by Maher's Book Store are eagerly looked for each morning by the patients.

We have a debt of gratitude to the Telephone Company and the Public Service Company, also to the Police Department, for their thoughtfulness during the Hurricane, which caused us so little inconvenience.

I wish to express to the trustees my appreciation for the time granted me during my hospital experience and to the whole hospital personnel for the many considerations shown me I am profoundly thankful.

During the past summer health conditions at the Weirs believed to be due to water supply or contamination were investigated in conjunction with representatives of the State Board of Health and the results of the same made known to the city council at their meeting, which was also attended by a representative of the State Board of Health.

The board of health has also been notified by the State Board of Health that unless conditions are remedied at the Weirs before the summer season opens that the State Board of Health will take steps to force action in that locality.

There has been no improvement in the conditions present in the Court Street section of the city and those streets leading off from the lower Court Street where drainage problems will present themselves as in the past years during the spring season and which demand early attention to forestall the usual flood of complaints. The same is true of the section of Lakeport in the vicinity of Belvidere and Appleton Streets and Dell Avenue.

During the coming season it will be necessary to prohibit bathing in the section of Lakeport at the site of the old ice houses by order of the State Board of Health. This will require policing of the section to prevent bathing after posting warnings. The reason for this requirement is the proximity of the bathing beach to the intake of the city water supply.

During the past year there have been no serious epidemics of contagious diseases with about an average number of scattered cases of a contagious nature.

The reports of the district nurse and milk inspector have been submitted separately and their work has been very satisfactory.

REPORT OF THE MILK INSPECTOR

Milk inspection work was carried on as in other years in Laconia.

The demand for pasteurized milk increases each year, and Laconia now has three modern, fully equipped pasteurizing plants. Several more distant plants supply local dealers during the summer months when the demand for pasteurized milk is above normal.

Constant checking and re-checking of milk and milk products samples by this department show a continued production of best quality milk under steadily improving conditions. The increased demand for more and better allied milk products makes necessary careful checking to insure up-to-standard products.

This year there was more cooperation with State Health officials insuring better results in the milk sold to the consumer.

There has been a general improvement in farm dairy equipment due, perhaps, to more careful checking, the increased price of milk, and better living conditions for farmers.

A gas-heated, steam sterilizer, purchased for use in the testing laboratory, has proven very helpful and time-saving in sterilizing testing equipment.

There were fewer complaints of unsatisfactory milk brought to the Inspector's attention by consumers than in any other year.

There was little change in the number of dairies, producers, and dealers supplying Laconia with milk this year.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of Laconia:

We are invited by our City Clerk to make a report for the Laconia Public Library for the year ending at this time.

As a beginning a little story is told of our generous benefactor that well illustrates how we have today the Gale Memorial Library. Mr. Gale lived in Belmont on a little farm and walked to Laconia each day to attend to his duties as President of the Belknap Savings Bank. He was a man of very prudent habits and to save the wear on his boots he came barefoot until near the village. By such prudent habits his fortune was accumulated that has enabled us to enjoy without cost the use and benefits of our beautiful Gale Memorial Library.

Your trustees desire to do all in their power to maintain proper service, care for all funds entrusted for investment and safety, keep in proper condition the Gale Library and the Goss Library building at Lakeport, and as far as finances will permit provide good books. Our effort in every way to raise the standard of our library to the highest attainable point that our income will permit. To this end we solicit the co-operation and advice of all. Such assistance will be gratefully received and appreciated.

The income from the Gale fund is not what it used to be owing to reduced interest rates in that fund on all bonds and securities. The expenses of the Library are as small as it is possible to make them and no member of the Board of Trustees has ever received a penny for any service remered.

It is worth of mention that the executors of the will of Napoleon B. Gale, who were also Trustees of the Gale Fund, Erastus P. Jewell, John T. Busiel, Edwin F. Burleigh, and Charles F. Pitman gave years of their time in perfecting plans and caring for the funds left in their hands, and received no compensation for any service ever rendered. Many today did not know these men and of the service they so freely gave. Those who did know them will be glad of this reminder of their work that was so well done, and all will be happier by this tribute to their memory.

The circulation of books during the past year at the Gale Library was 67,938 and at the Goss Library 15,747, making a total circulation of 83,685, showing a gain during the past year of 3,819 over 1937. The WPA worker during 1938 has covered 1,289 books, mended 1,145, shellacked 2,365, new labels with numbers 2,365.

412 books have been presented to the Gale Library and 41 to the Goss Library.

TRUST FUNDS

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council, Laconia, N. H.:

We strongly advise the need of adequate funds to provide for "perpetual care" of lots, in the city's care. We further advise those leaving funds to first get in touch with the caretaker of the cemetery and learn of the yearly expense of the lot and extra care that might be necessary, also what "perpetual care" covers. Based on the present interest rate we would advise leaving the amount of \$200.00 as a minimum fund. Small funds are acceptable but do not yield sufficient income to place the lot in perpetual care.

In some cases of small funds where the grass had entirely "run out" the trustees deemed it advisable to let the interest accumulate until sufficient amount was available for regrading or making over.

It was necessary to make over several lots, bunch grass was removed and extra fertilizer was used on many lots.

Where funds permitted flowers were placed on the lots Memorial Day and in three cases on Mother's Day also. In two cases the funds permitted flowers to be placed on the lots weekly throughout the season.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, New Hampshire February 11, 1939

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We hereby submit the thirty-eighth annual report of the Board of Public Works, together with the detailed report and suggestions made to us by the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

All appropriations and expenditures under the several accounts are shown in detail, and we are able to report that much of the routine maintenance work of the year has been carried on together with such special work as has been provided for, and also certain authorized work including Hurricane repairs and W.P.A. Rehabilitation Project No. 1922. On account of reduced appropriations it has been impossible to carry on the usual amount of work and this Department has found it necessary to curtail and hold down expenditures in many cases considerably below the normal level. This situation has, of course, been reflected in the reduced amount of labor employed, as well as service rendered.

We have endeavored to cooperate, however, in your efforts to make a reduction in expenditures the past year, in order that the tax burden might be relieved.

Town Road Aid Funds to the amount of \$4,395.40 were expended on Class V roads four-fifths of this sum being furnished by the State.

In the matter of aid from the State in road construction, the ensuing year, the City is offered an option of one of two proposals; viz.; to reconstruct a section of Elm street, which is on the State Highway Secondary System, the State furnishing \$3,487.00 and the City an equal amount, or to accept Town Road Aid for use on Class V roads, the City appropriating \$879.69 and the State furnishing \$3,518.75.

In the matter of proposed work for the coming season, we would not urge any sizable construction program or special work involving the expenditure of a large sum of money. However, it is a fact that this class of work is of great assistance in reducing unemployment and consequent reduction of relief expenditures, and on this account alone, if for no other reason it would seem to us advisable to provide a reasonable amount of construction.

There are certain streets which have been laid out by the Council which should be drained, graded and surfaced and a number of drains reconstructed, and there is a strong demand for the construction of new sidewalks in various locations.

Inasmuch as the expenditure for labor as compared with equipment and material on these jobs is relatively larger than in many types of public work, it would seem that the above suggestions merit careful consideration.

We would ask a study of the City Engineer's report in which is included a detailed account of work accomplished during the past year and some valuable suggestions on the needs of the Department for the year ensuing.

The City of Laconia has a large investment in improved streets and sidewalks which should be protected by adequate maintenance. It is not economy to allow the street

surfaces to disintegrate and the sidewalks to become rough and broken. A sufficient appropriation for maintenance, winter expense and the customary all-year services rendered by this Department seems imperative.

BRIDGES

The highway bridges are generally in good repair, but some work will be necessary on concrete curbs and abutments.

The wooden bridge at Mill street will need some repairs to the floor system.

Two small wooden bridges on the Hilliard road were destroyed during the September hurricane and flood. These were replaced by wooden bridges, which should be good for a year or two. Eventually, a new concrete bridge should built at this point.

The Messer street and Fair street steel bridges should be repainted this summer.

CLEANING STREETS

This is a constantly increasing expenditure as new streets are added and more attention must be given the business district due to papers and rubbish scattered from automobiles, stores, etc.

COLLECTION OF REFUSE AND GARBAGE

The existing contract with Mr. W. G. Hamilton was continued. Mr. Hamilton has performed satisfactory service. There are constant requests for extension of this service from outside areas but it is impossible to grant these requests unless a larger appropriation is made.

DRAINS

There were no appropriations made for drain construction except in connection with W. P. A. projects on Fair street extension and Brigham street.

Existing drains on North Main street, Dartmouth, Harvard. Whipple avenue, South Main street, north from Wyatt Park, Court street, north from Durkee Brook and Union avenue, north from Jewett street are not large enough to take the water during heavy rains and should be rebuilt as soon as funds can be appropriated. The estimated cost of reconstructing the above mentioned drains is:

MAINTENANCE OF MACADAM ROADS

Some of the bituminous macadam pavements built twenty years or more ago should be resurfaced this coming season. Union Avenue from Casino Square to Bridge Street gets a very heavy traffic and should be attended to as soon as possible. Elm Street from School Street northerly needs attention. The estimated cost of surfacing these two streets is \$5,613.00.

Sanitary Sewers

The usual maintenance and repairs were given the sewers. One extension on the newly laid out Parker Street, 544' in length was made. This project was paid for in part by the owner who developed the project.

SIDEWALKS

No appropriation was made for new sidewalks. Repairs and resurfacing amounted to 3,783 square yards. Funds were not available to do some of the resurfacing which was needed.

STORAGE SHED

The September hurricane destroyed the storage shed and buildings occupied by this department on Union Avenue and we are handicapped for storage room.

A plan was prepared for a new building at Messer Street yard and an estimate of \$2,782.00 was made of the probable cost of the same. As no funds were available nothing could be done with this matter but it should have early attention.

STREET OILING AND TARRING

This appropriation results in greatly improving the surfaces of streets and outside roads and saves much in washouts and general care. I would recommend that \$1,000.00 be added to this appropriation to extend the oilings on the Blueberry Road and to give the Roller Coaster Road another coat of tar.

WINTER EXPENSES

Our snow equipment is generally in good condition except for trucks which should be exchanged as they are getting worn and of course expensive to keep in repair.

Much of our snow fence is old, broken and beyond repair. I recommend the purchase of 2,000 feet of new fence.

It is very difficult to get horses to draw sidewalk plows. The department takes in thirteen outside horses during the winter.

GENERAL

Two new streets were laid out by the City Council, viz. Praker Street and an extension of North Street from Massachusetts Avenue northerly. No funds have been provided to drain, grade or surface these streets. The hurricane and flood of Sept. 21st caused a great deal of emergency work. Hundreds of shade trees were blown down in streets and parks and roofs, church steeples and debris littered the streets, and many washouts were caused on streets and roads. Pavements, sidewalks and curbing were destroyed.

One of the difficult operations was the digging out and removal of large tree stumps, \$4,755.16 was the immediate cost to the department for hurricane and flood damage together with \$1,423.93 for sponsor's contribution to the W. P. A. Emergency work.

The work of this department during the past year has been unusually great. It has included the trial in Superior Court of two lengthy and involved matters. The first was the trial of the City of Laconia vs. Martha E. Johnson, to recover for money which she had collected as Tax Collector, and which she had failed to turn over to the City. In this matter the City obtained judgment for the full amount of \$22,096.00, with interest and costs of this from the Bonding Company. Every effort has been made to collect the balance, but the prospects are not encouraging.

In the case of Draper vs. Laconia the Court rendered a verdict against the City, and while an appeal to the Supreme Court was considered the Mayor and Council decided against it.

There have been drawn two proposed leases in connection with the Laconia Shoe Company plant on Water street, and the indications are that one of these will have been signed before publication of this report.

The Law Department has drawn and executed a number of deeds, both to and from the City. This has involved examination of titles in most instances. In connection with the purchase of new fire apparatus the Law Department has drawn a series of notes to cover payment therefore.

The solicitor has attended the Council Meetings regularly, and has endeavored at all times to be of service to all departments.

It is recommended that a thorough study be made of the City Charter and the Ordinances with a view to complete revision thereof. This has not been done for more than twenty years, and they are in very bad condition.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Laconia:

Gentlemen:

It is my privilege and duty to submit herewith my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending February 15, 1939.

The relief problem has been more serious than anticipated at the time of making appropriations. Full time employment has decreased and part time more general. Only one hosiery mill is in operation and that employing very few people. Many of them on part time schedule. The only bright outlook is the pick up at Scott and Williams.

The regulation for obtaining jobs on W.P.A. projects have been radically changed, so that no person can get a job unless he has been a project employee and left for private work since June 21, 1938, and many have been removed for various reasons. It is expected more liberal regulations will be granted in the near future.

New applicants for relief are mostly 100% relief except for an occasional day's work. A few have found employment on blown timber, those not familiar with woods work are not wanted. There are very few opportunities for women formerly employed in hosiery mills, many of them with families depending on their earnings are applying for relief.

There are twenty-nine more O.A.A. cases than one year ago, the amount spent for this type of relief is less than last year for the reason of greater refunds by the State. Beginning January 1, 1940 the age of those entitled to receive O.A.A. will be sixty-five years or over instead of seventy the present age requirement.

The amount charged to this department as shown by the treasurer's report exceeds the appropriation, to find the net cost of regular relief there should be deducted the following items: transportation of men to projects \$4,029.20, sewing project expense to meet Federal requirements \$795.11, and \$3,308.12 for labor furnished other departments without cost to them. A total of \$8,132.43.

The State allottment for relief refunds to it's subdivisions was insufficient to meet the payments, consequently this department had to assume in round numbers \$800.00 additional relief cost not anticipated at the time of making appropriations.

Until private employment absorbs W.P.A. workers the wisdom of continuing project work cannot be doubted, the projects to be maintained should be those of the greatest benefit to the community. Projects entail an expense on the locality sponsoring them. The big item of expense is the pay roll which is entirely assumed by the Federal Government. The pay roll in Belknap County varies monthly, a fair average is \$16,000.00; without this pay roll the greater part of this amount would be reflected in relief cost, principally to Laconia under the head of City relief cost and an increased County tax.

At the beginning of the present session of the legislature there was hope that some changes might be made in the administration of relief laws that would enable relief officers to cope more successfully with chiselers, also maintain a permanent State refund for the benefit of local property tax payers, at present there seems to be no progress in securing the desired legislation.

PARK COMMISSION

Laconia, N. H. Feb. 15, 1939

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

As Secretary of the Park Commission, I submit the following report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1938.

The Park Commission has been very gratified at the increased interest among the parents of the city in our playgrounds as evidenced by the forming of the two new clubs, the Leavitt Park Social club and the Opechee Park club, which together with the Wyatt Park club have planned and executed various activities for the children of the playgrounds at each end of the city.

The Wyatt Park club, besides sponsoring several card parties for social times among its members has raised money by this means to hold both a summer and winter play day to which any child in the city was welcomed. Competitive races with prizes were held and hot dogs, sandwiches, cookies and cocoa or ice cream cones distributed to all children attending.

The Leavitt Park club has sponsored dancing parties at the Community House open to boys or girls of the city over twelve years of age. Twenty dances and four parties have been held during the winter and from the admission price of ten cents, a combination radio and victorla and fifty

new records have been purchased. An average attendance of eighty boys and girls from all parts of the city testify to the popularity of these parties.

The Opechee Park club hold monthly meetings and they have had five card parties and a Summer Carnival for the raising of money. They provided prizes for the events of a Field Day for the children last summer and have sponsored two Winter Play Days with prizes for skating and skiing events and have served hot dogs, sandwiches, marshmallow and cocoa to all children attending.

Each of these clubs have very definite plans for enlarged activities and for the supplying of needed equipment for the children's enjoyment.

WYATT PARK PLAYGROUND

Wyatt Park playground was under the supervision of Miss Edith Raymond. The average daily attendance was one hundred twenty-five.

As the majority of children attending this playground are quite young, much time was spent in the construction and furnishing of doll houses, making paper flowers, weaving of mats and in playing the circle, group games. An abundance of equipment which little folk enjoy such as sand boxes, slides, swings, keep them well occupied. A doll carriage parade, a decorated bicycle parade and a picnic at Gardner's Grove were among the special events.

LEAVITT PARK PLAYGROUND

Leavitt Park Playground was under the direction of Mr. Charles Peterson and Miss Jessie Dutrizac during the summer of 1938. The average daily attendance was approximately 250 children.

As usual, the beach at Sandy Shore was the leading attraction. Fifty children earned Beginners Buttons while twenty more qualified for more difficult buttons. These tests, of course, must be preceded with gradual development of confidence on the part of the candidate—sometimes requiring a good part of the summer to obtain the strength, proficiency and confidence to pass.

Tournaments were constantly being held on the playground. Opportunity was given for many of the younger boys and girls in woodwork and needlecraft.

Forty-five boys and girls enjoyed attending the Gilford Old Home Day parade under the supervision of Miss Dutrizac, as guests of the First National Stores Inc., who furnished transportation and lunch.

The girls' trip to Mt. Belknap is always much anticipated and this year was one of their best. As usual, the girls were accompanied by the directors and several of the mothers.

A total of fifty-four boys made the trip to Mt. Belknap on their annual overnight hike. Camp Director, Mr. Peterson assisted by Mr. Carl Smith accompanied the boys. This experience is a high adventure in the early life of many of the boys who look forward each year to the trip. The playground baseball team was very successful winning three games from Opechee Park.

The Twilight League was carried on with four teams playing a 36 game schedule with three games each week. The average attendance at these games was approximately two hundred.

OPECHEE PARK PLAYGROUND

Opechee Park Playground, under the supervision of Mr. John Hobson and Miss Phyllis Caswell had an average daily attendance of three hundred ninety.

Swimming, as usual, held first place in the attractions. Over sixty children received Beginner's Buttons and thirty-four their Swimmer's Buttons. The Life Saving classes were well attended, over forty taking class instruction while six passed their Junior and Senior examinations.

Ten baseball games, two track meets, four tennis tournaments, four ping pong tournaments and two horse shoe contests were held during the season.

Tennis was more popular than ever. Without exception the tennis courts were filled with players of all ages from morning till night.

IMPROVEMENTS AT THE PARKS

The completion of the cellar under the Community House at Leavitt Park and the installation of a furnace has made the house available all winter and it has been used not only by the younger group for their weekly dances as before mentioned, but by numerous organizations in the city. In fact there is scarcely an evening when the lights are not on and the cars parked around, emphasizing the fact that it is a real "Community House". Two tennis courts are practically completed on the old site of the house and will be available at the beginning of the 1939 season.

The grading at Wyatt Park is nearly completed—this having been financed partly by the Wyatt Park Club and party by the use of funds from the Park appropriation.

The hurricane damage was greatest at Opechee Park. This has been partially repaired by W.P.A. labor and will have to be completed before the playground opens its 1939 season. The acquisition of the "cove" socalled, between the grandstand and Wilcox's ice house will be a welcome addition to the bathing facilities this coming year.

The playgrounds of our city and the playground facilities should be a source of pride to every citizen. They are used, not only for the eight weeks supervised "Playground Season" during each summer, but continually, all the year round, by adults as well as children and provide a real source of healthful, outdoor recreation and enjoyment.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Edward J. Gallagher, Mayor, and the City Council, Laconia, N. H.:

Gentlemen:

Having completed the audit of the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ended February 15, 1939, I present the following Statements showing the financial condition of the City as of that date.

Exhibit 1—Appropriation Account year ended February 15, 1939.

Exhibit II-Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as of February 15, 1939.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as of February 15, 1939.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows:

Cash \$13,017.44

This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements with the records of the City Treasurer and compared with the ledger of the City Clerk: an audit of each monthly draft is made by the City Auditor as a final check upon all bills before payment is made by the Treasurer.

Property Sold to City for Taxes \$42,099.22

During the fiscal year ending February 15, 1939, tax-payers redeemed taxes to leave the above amount due the City.

Accounts Receivable Taxes

\$72,411.29

The Collector's record of unpaid taxes was examined by me and compared with the records kept by the City Clerk; the record of taxes paid was examined and compared with the report of the City Treasurer.

Warrants from the Board of Assessors to the City Tax Collector covering the commitment of all taxes was examined and all abatements were examined to see that they were approved by the Board of Assessors.

The Tax Collector should be commended for the effort made by him during his first full year in the office to clear up many of the old accounts carried on the books; also for the fine showing made by him in the collection of 1938 taxes; a balance of \$64,493.63 being outstanding February 15, 1939 as compared to \$83,145.24 on February 15, 1938.

Accounts Receivable:

Balance Duc from Martha E. Johnson

\$7,096.24

A Court action in the name of the City of Laconia as plaintiff for the recovery of \$22,096.24 against Martha E. Johnson resulted in a judgment in favor of the City for the full amount; the Bonding Company having paid the \$15,000 limit of the Policy, the above amount remains unpaid.

Property Acquired by Tax Deeds

\$2,274.74

During the year Tax Deeds were taken by the City as a result of Unpaid Taxes of long standing to total the above amount.

Leavitt Fund—Overdraft

\$161.07

The Leavitt Fund had a balance February 15, 1938 of \$683.43; the amount of income received during the year was \$663.46 and the expenditures \$1,407.96 thereby leaving a deficit of the above amount as an Account Receivable due the City.

LIABILITIES

Miscellaneous Liabilities

\$1,417.37

This account was increased by a few dollars during the • year.

Leavitt Fund-Overdrawn

\$161.07

This account was examined and verified; a detailed statement will be found under the head of Accounts Receivable.

Balance Deficit

\$3,866.39 .

The above amount represents the excess of current liabilities over current assets: the fact that a deficit occurs during the year cannot be charged to the Mayor and City Council directly nor to the Department Heads of the City as the Hurricane Damage of over \$5,000 and the overdraft of the Support of Poor account of \$9,741 were items over which they had no control; the Draper judgment of \$1,539 as a result of the Weirs fire station also had to be paid this year; as no appropriations were made for these items, it was necessary to take care of these overdrafts by means of transfers from the Excess and Deficiency account.

Motor Vehicle Taxes 1939

\$1,084.46

The amount of Motor Vehicle Fees received by the City Clerk was checked and verified with the receipts of the City Treasurer and the Permit Cards.

Notes

\$75,000.00

The above amount of Notes represents money borrowed in anticipation of unpaid taxes on short term notes to meet the current expenses of the City; This amount remains the same as at the end of the last fiscal year.

Unexpended Appropriations

\$62,490.32

Appropriations made during the year were verified with the records of the City Council and expenditures were properly approved by Treasury Warrants: all transfers were approved by the Mayor and City Council.

Fire Equipment

\$13,177.45

This amount was raised during the year for the purchase of new Fire Equipment; \$6,000 by means of Serial Notes and the balance of \$7,177.45 by a transfer from the the Highways and Bridges account.

SERIAL DEBT

The Serial Debt outstanding as of Feb. 15, 1939 is detailed in Exhibit IV of this report and shows a Net Debt of \$373,750.00 as compared to one of \$421,750.00 on Feb. 15, 1938: this represents a decrease of \$48,000 during the fiscal year ended February 15, 1939.

The Mayor and City Council are to be congratulated upon the fact that the serial Debt has not been increased taking into consideration the amounts of money that they have been forced to spend during the year. A full itemized account of the appropriations, receipts, transfers and unexpended appropriations may be found in Exhibit 1 of this report.

By Chapter 106 N. H.
