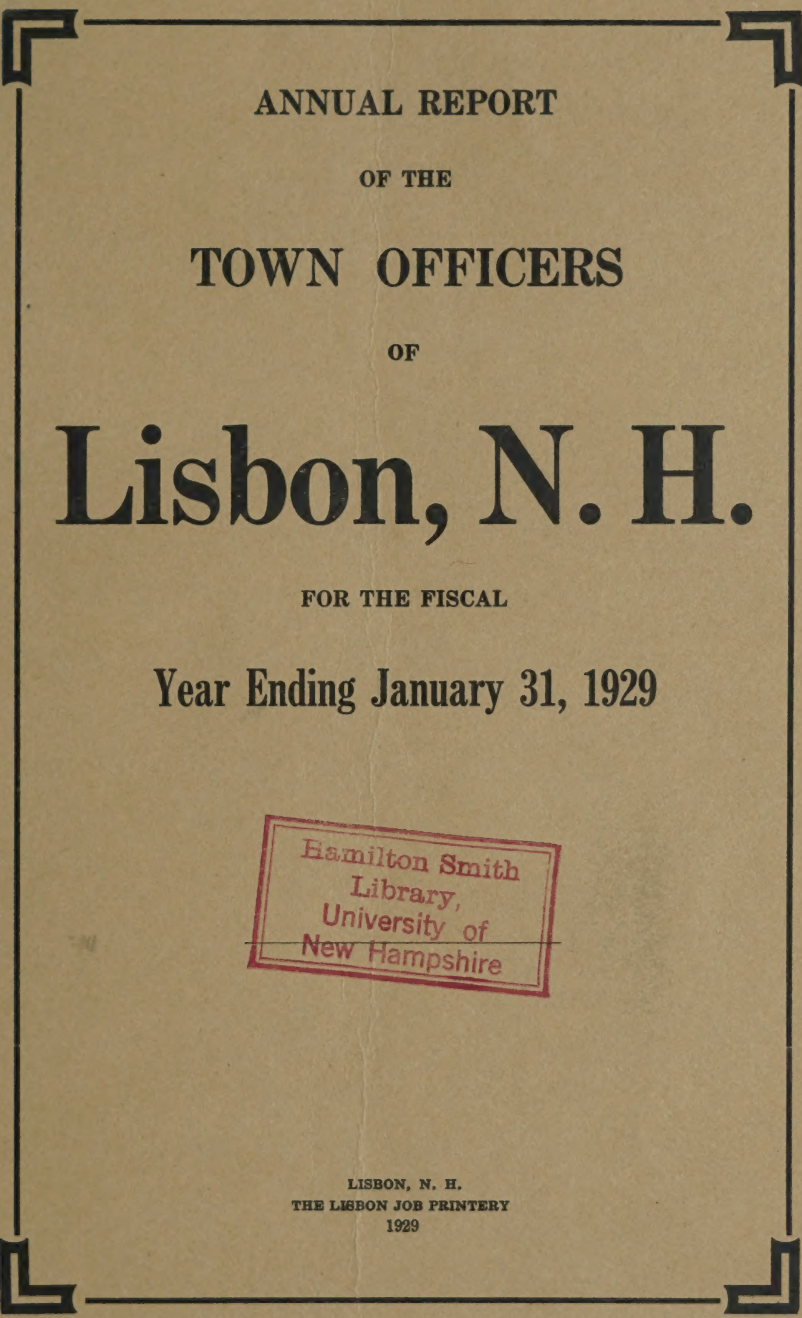

# WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Lisbon, in the county of Grafton and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lisbon on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and to make appropriations for the same.

Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors and special committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Art. 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of the highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue druggists' permits to any druggist who is a registered pharmacist doing business in Lisbon to sell liquor for medical use upon a physician's prescription, under the provision of Chapter 147, Sec. 14 of the Laws of 1917.

Art. 6. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public libraries in addition to what is required by law, and to determine how the same shall be divided.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to discount all taxes paid on or before July 5th, 1929.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to light the streets of Lisbon Village District all night during the entire year; Sugar Hill from the dwelling of H. J. Field to the Hotel Lookoff, the Baptist church through Lover's lane to Franconia line, from Goodnow school house to the Homestead, and from the Lisbon and Franconia town line to the dwelling of Joseph Pelletier. Sugar Hill and vicinity to be lighted the entire year until midnight, and from five A. M. until daylight. All of the above premises to be lighted with electricity; and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to light the highway leading from Fred Aldrich's to George Hunt's, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for lighting Barrett's station at North Lisbon.

Art. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the benefit of the District Nursing association.

Art. 12. To see what action the town will take towards applying for state aid for the maintenance of the trunk line and state aid highways, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money to secure the same.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid construction, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to properly observe Old Home Day.

Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate four hundred dollars to help destroy the white pine blister.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to repair the road leading from Peckett's to Voorhees'.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to repair the road leading from the Roscoe Bean place to the Blake place, and to the Smith place, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to repair the road from Pearl lake to Sugar Hill, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to improve and repair the highway leading from the Parker place, so called, by the Bishop farm to the Lyman road, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to build and extend the road leading by the Bullis-Nelson cottage some six hundred feet to a cottage now under construction, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for same.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement sidewalk from the Bean place, so called, to Franconia line, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from Voorhees' to Harold Aldrich's.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to plow the town roads of the town, and if so to raise and appropriate the necessary money for same.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to oil the road from the corner at the Homestead on Sugar Hill, past the Sunset Hill House, to Hotel Lookoff, and the road leading to Peckett's from its intersection with the Franconia road, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for same.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to extend the cement sidewalk on Sugar Hill, commencing where the walk left off this year and going towards Hotel Lookoff.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to employ the steam shovel, if in their discretion they deem it wise, for the purpose of making an opening in the overflow on Harry Young's meadow, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to employ the steam shovel, if in their discretion they deem it wise, on the Ammonoosuc river in Lisbon village, next to the Boynton meadow, to divert the current away from the bank, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money to paint the clock on the Advent church on Sugar Hill.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money to help fix up the Sugar Hill park in front of the dwelling of K. W. Noyes.

Art. 31. To see what action the town will take towards fixing the compensation of the tax collector.



Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to repair the Town Hall, and if so to raise and appropriate the necessary funds for same.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$300.00 for a series of band concerts during the summer.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of laying out new lots, grading, etc., in the new cemetery.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I wish to especially thank Mr. and Mrs. Willard D. Smith for the deed of the land in front of the library lawn. Not only myself but Mrs. Richardson were most happy to know that after all these years we can have the grading completed as planned.

Beginning January 12th the schedule of the library hours was changed. It has worked out very satisfactorily, but with the summer season the schedule will be changed to the regular hours.

In October the death of Mrs. Winnie B. LaBelle took my most valued and efficient assistant who for the past three years gave her time so willingly. She is greatly missed by me as well as the patrons of the library.

To the board of trustees I wish to extend my thanks for their hearty co-operation as I close my twenty-first annual report.
