The Official Bicentennial Symbol

The American Revolution Bicentennial symbol is derived from the stars, stripes, and colors of the United

States flag.

The symbol takes the form of an American 5-pointed star in white, surrounded by continuous red, white and blue stripes which form a second star. This double star is symbolic of the two centuries which have passed since the American Revolution.

These colorful stripes also evoke a feeling of festivity and suggest the

furled bunting traditionally used in times of celebration throughout the nation.

The symbol is contemporary in design in keeping with the forward-looking goals of the Bicentennial celebration:

"to forge a new national commitment, a new spirit for '76, a spirit which will unite the nation in purpose and dedication to the advancement of human welfare as it moves into its third century."

The Bicentennial Flag

In the Spring of 1972, the Littleton Colonial Club approved the Community Improvement project of the Beautification Committee; that of restoring the long-neglected Opera House in the Littleton Town building, which was built in 1895 and was for many generations the center of Littleton activity.

The committee of 10 members went to work planning ways to raise

funds for its gigantic task.

On July 19, 1972, a kick-off dinner with over 300 persons attending, was held in the kitchenless old hall, and "The Friends of the Opera House Restoration" organization was formed.

In December 1972, work began with a clean-up detail of 40 members of

the Littleton Square Dance Club.

In January of 1973, plastering and painting workmen were hired by the Selectmen.

A new lighting system was installed in April of 1973.

In May 1973, the New Hampshire State Senate met for the first time in

the Opera House.

Senator Andrew Poulsen, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in 1973, sent in an application for a Bicentennial Flag, to Dr. Duane Squires, Chairman of the N.H. Bicentennial Commission.

In June 1973, the first concert was held, with Leon Botstein conducting

the Jefferson Chorus and the Franconia College Orchestra.

Land next to the Opera House was acquired by the Town in 1974 to use

as a park and parking lot.

In April, Littleton received the first Bicentennial Flag in the State of New Hampshire, for its Restoration of the Opera House project.

The occasion came on the eve of the 199th anniversary of Paul Revere's

ride to Concord and Lexington.

Mrs. Georgia Ireland, Regional Coordinator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration; Mr. Gilbert Center, State Executive Director; and Dr. J. Duane Squires, Chairman of the State American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, were there to present the Flag to Louis A. Thompson, then Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, who received it on behalf of the Town of Littleton.

Mr. Center noted, "Great days are ahead, your program of observance is outstanding, with its central theme of restoring this lovely old Opera

House."

Governor Meldrim Thomson ended his address saying, "May the light

of patriotism which set you ablaze, grow in intensity!"

The Selectmen have appointed a three member Littleton Bicentennial Committee to head the festival activities for 1976. They are: Chairman, Mrs. Edson J. Berry; Mrs. Andrew Poulsen, and Dr. Richard Hill.

LITTLETON WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, quali-

fied to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the second day of March next, being the first Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, one Park Commissioner for one year, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 37 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, relating to the town manager plan; the following question to be printed on the official ballot, namely: "Do you favor adoption of the town manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?"

If the foregoing Article is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to advertise the position in a salary range of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) and to appoint a Selection Committee of five (5) to interview applicants; and further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to enable the Board of Selectmen to employ the applicant recommended by said Selection Committee for the period of two (2) months prior to the retirement of the present Assistant to the Selectmen on January 31, 1977.

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of abolishing the Planning Board and abolishing the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Littleton as proposed by written petition of voters addressed to the Planning Board for the Town of Littleton?

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Health Officer, Hospital, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Fixed Charges, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Bicentennial Committee, Whitefield Airport, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, Conservation Commission, White Mountain Community Services, Dutch Elm, Town Road Aid (A), Highway Subsidy, Hydrants,

North Country Home Health Agency, White Mountain Region Association, and other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1976 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any State and/or Federal aid and/or funds available at any time relating to disasters or emergencies within the Town, and to expend such funds for repair and relief.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$1,900.00) for the purpose of performing surveys, soil borings and cadastral work related to the preparation of the Facility Plan on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq., 6 Stat. Sec. 16 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or notes not to exceed One Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars \$(1,-900,00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or other enabling authority, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Littleton, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq, 6 Stat. Sec. 16 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to construct a storm drain approximately thirteen hundred (1,300) feet in length along South Street and approximately one thousand (1,000) feet in length on River, Ammonosuc and Saranac Streets. and to raise and appropriate for such purpose the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase certain Highway Department maintenance equipment (the Selectmen to require written bids), salt, asphalt, sand, gravel and patch for use by the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate for said purposes the sum of Sixty-three Thousand Dollars (\$63,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Sixty-three Thousand Dollars (\$63,000.00) for these purposes from the Revenue Sharing

Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to acquire and install a new boiler in the Littleton Public Library and to repair the chimneys in said Library building, and to raise and appropriate for said purposes the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for the boiler and Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the chimney repairs; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said total sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) for these purposes from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to make certain necessary repairs in the Town Building, and to raise and appropriate for this purpose and for the maintenance of said Town Building the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Police cruiser, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to defray the cost of lighting the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the voters of the Town of Littleton will instruct their Senator and Representatives to the General Court to file appropriate legislation revising county boundary lines such that the Town of Littleton secedes from Grafton County and becomes annexed to Coos County all in the interest of a better county government at less expense to the taxpayer. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from the Littleton Industrial Development Corporation of certain strips of land fifty (50) feet in width for an extension or extensions of South Street as a public way within the Town.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to authorize the Commissioners of the Littleton Water & Light Department to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-five Thousand Dollars (\$95,000.00) for the purpose of constructing water lines and electric lines to the boundary of the land under Option to

the Burndy Corporation. This money so raised shall be repaid from revenues of the Littleton Water & Light Department within a period of three (3) years and not from real estate taxation.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewer line in South Street, as extended, including necessary man-holes and fourteen inch (14") pipes, extending a distance of approximately thirty-six hundred (3.600) feet and connecting with the Town sewage treatment plant, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of the sum of Fifty-two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000,00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972; and further, to raise the balance of said sum, namely Ninety-eight Thousand Dollars (\$98,000.00) by the issuance of Serial Bonds or notes in said amount under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or other enabling authority, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for construction of roadways, sewer lines, storm drains and drainage facilities in the South Street Extension area, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated, and for this purpose to authorize the issuance of Serial Bonds or notes of the Town under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or other enabling authority; the aforesaid appropriation being conditioned upon the grant of additional Federal funds from the Economic Development Administration in the additional sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) upon application for said funds made by the Selectmen on behalf of the Town.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) to pay the amount of the installment payable by the Town to New England Power Company pursuant to the Decree of the Grafton Superior Court entered on March 12, 1975 in the tax abatement suits previously brought by said Company against the Town.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to construct a recreation building and tennis court complex at Apthorp; providing that one-half of this total project cost be reimbursed to the Town of Littleton under Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Program. (This Article inserted upon written application of the Park Commissioners.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$3,920.00) as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1976. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses, regional planning studies, technical assistance to member communities, coordination with local, State and Federal agencies, and other programs of the Council. These funds may be used in conjunction with State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to permit a group home to be located in Littleton; such home to be under the direction of the Mountain Area Youth Home, Inc., and to serve young people age 13-18 who have encountered family, legal, or emotional difficulties; such home to be under the careful supervision of approved and qualified staff. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 23. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the financial statements of the funds and account groups of the Town of Littleton for the year ended December 31, 1975, listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets and, accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets required by generally accepted accounting principles is not included in the financial report.

The records of the District Court for the four months ending April 30, 1975 were not audited by us. The Division of Municipal Accounting, Department of Revenue Administration, State of New Hampshire performed this audit and will issue a report on it.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the table of contents present fairly the financial position of the funds and account groups of the Town of Littleton at December 31, 1975, and the results of operations of these funds and account groups for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

Bases of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed by all funds, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. Modifications in this method from the accrual basis are as follows:

a. Inventory items are recorded as expenditures when purchased

b. Revenues are recorded as received in cash except for property taxes which are accrued.

c. Interest expense is recorded as payments are made.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

General Fixed Assets

General fixed assets are recorded as expenditures when purchased. No depreciation is provided on general fixed assets.

2. Parking Meter Fund

The resources of the parking meter reserve fund can be expended for the purchase and maintenance of parking meters and for street and highway related expenses.

3. New England Power Company Settlement

Subsequent to December 31, 1974, a settlement was reached with New England Power Company in their suit against the town for abatement of several years' taxes. The settlement was for \$1,700,000 plus interest at 6% from March 1, 1975, to be paid over six years according to the schedule included in Exhibit E.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the financial statements of the funds and account groups of the Town of Littleton for the year ended December 31, 1974, listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and, accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets required by generally accepted accounting principles is not included in the financial report.

The records of the District Court were not audited by us. The Division of Municipal Accounting, Department of Revenue Administration, State of New Hampshire performed this audit and will issue a report on the records of the Court for the year ended December 31, 1974.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the table of contents present fairly the financial position of the funds and account groups of the Town of Littleton at December 31, 1974, and the results of operations of these funds and account groups for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

Bases of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed by all funds, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. Modifications in this method from the accrual basis are as follows:

- a. The cash balance is stated as of January 9, 1975, to allow town officials to remit to the treasurer amounts received through December 31, 1974. This procedure is in accordance with generally accepted practices of New Hampshire municipalities. This practice does not materially misstate the financial position of the Town of Littleton as of December 31, 1974.
- b. Inventory items are recorded as expenditures when purchased.
- c. Revenues are recorded as received in cash except for property taxes which are accrued.
 - d. Interest expense is recorded as payments are made.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

General Fixed Assets

General fixed assets are recorded as expenditures when purchased. No depreciation is provided on general fixed assets.

2. Parking Meter Fund

The resources of the parking meter reserve fund can be expended for the purchase and maintenance of parking meters and for street and highway related expenses. During 1974, \$5,500 was expended for repair of the parking lot at the Lakeway Elementary School, and the balance of the total expenditures of \$16,894 was spent for parking meter and street related expenses.

3. New England Power Company Settlement

Subsequent to December 31, 1974, a settlement was reached with New England Power Company in their suit against the town for abatement of several years' taxes. The settlement was for \$1,700,000 plus interest at 6% from March 1, 1975, to be paid over six years according to the schedule included in Exhibit E.

Legal fees of \$30,000 are included in encumbrances for general government in Exhibit B.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Littleton, New Hampshire 03561 Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973. This examination was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk

for retention as part of the Town's permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Planning Board, Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds. An examination of the District Court records is currently being conducted and a separate report of that audit will be issued upon completion thereof.

Comparative Balance Sheets—As of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the General Fund as of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the Town decreased by \$17,299 in 1973 from \$151,501 to \$134,202.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$8,387, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$72,040, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$80,427.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets—Long-Term Indebtedness—as of December 31, 1972, and December 31, 1973 are shown in Exhibit A-5. The outstanding long-term debt of the Town decreased by \$52,000 during 1973, from \$447,000 to \$395,000.

Statement of Annual Debt Service Requirement: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements, including principal and interest, as of December 31, 1973, is contained in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

Revenue Sharing Fund:

Statement of Revenue, Expenditures, Encumbrances and

Fund Balance (Exhibit B-2)

The fiscal activity in the Revenue Sharing Fund account during the year is disclosed in Exhibit B-2.

As stated therein, available and unexpended funds at January 1, 1973, amounted to \$38,831. During the year, entitlement payments of \$117,650 were received from the Federal Government and interest totaling \$4,615 was realized on investments of idle funds. Consequently, total funds available in 1973 for authorized expenditures amounted to \$161,096. The 1973 Town Meeting appropriated the sum of \$133,000 towards the cost of reconstructing Main Street from Cottage Street Bridge to Maple Street. Accordingly, this sum was duly encumbered at December 31, 1973 and the balance of unexpended and unencumbered funds available for subsequent appropriation by the Town, at that date, was calculated to be \$28,096.

However, the 1974 Town Meeting rescinded the vote taken by the 1973 Town Meeting, pertaining to the appropriation of Revenue Sharing Funds for the reconstruction of Main Street. The amount allocated for this purpose from Revenue Sharing sources, was reduced from \$133,000 to \$50,000 and the scope of the project was modified accordingly. Thus, the reduction of \$83,000 (\$133,000, minus \$50,000) must

be restored to the Revenue Sharing Fund on the books of the Town in 1974, in accordance with federal legislation governing Revenue Sharing monies.

Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)

The fiscal activity in the Parking Meter Reserve Fund in 1973 is disclosed in Exhibit B-4.

As stated therein, the unappropriated fund balance at the beginning of the year was \$26,487. Parking meter collections during the year totaled \$10,767. Expenditures and encumbrances, amounting to \$34,019 were charged to the account during the period. The amount of unappropriated and unencumbered funds at December 31, 1973 was, therefore, reduced to \$3.235.

It must be noted, however, that the vote of the 1973 Town Meeting, appropriating the sum of \$26,000 from Parking Meter cash to defray in part, the cost of reconstructing Main Street from Cottage Street Bridge to Maple Street, was also rescinded by the 1974 Town Meeting. Consequently, the last stated amount must be restored to the Parking Meter Reserve Fund account on the books of the Town in 1974.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

As noted previously, our examination of the accounts and records of the Clerk of the District Court for the fiscal year 1973 has not been completed at this time. This phase of the audit will be finalized in due course, however, and we shall issue a separate report of our findings pertaining thereto at a later date.

GENERAL COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS Long-Term Notes Authorized—Unissued \$120,000: (Exhibit A-1) Appropriation for Payment of Authorized Notes—Not Issued— \$55.800: (Exhibit A-3)

As disclosed in the general fund comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures (Exhibit A-3), the sum of \$77,800 was raised in the 1973 town budget for maturing payments on outstanding long-term notes.

However, a review of the Town's debt service schedule as of Dec. 31, 1972, which was included as part of our audit report for the year then ended, disclosed that the aggregate sum of maturing long-term notes in 1973 was actually only \$22,000. Consequently, we determined that the sum of \$55,800 was raised in excess of statutory debt service payments due during the fiscal year.

Our inquiries concerning this matter revealed that the long-term notes authorized by previous town meetings to defray in part the cost of sewer construction on Lisbon Road have never been issued, contrary to the vote of the Town. Instead, monies have been raised in both the 1973 and 1974 town budgets to pay for that portion of the expenses which were originally scheduled to be paid from the proceeds of long-term notes authorized for the above sewer project.

In accordance with the original vote of the Town, the gross appropriation for this project (monies for which were raised either by taxation, transferred from other projects, or were anticipated from the sale of long-term notes) was originally set up on the 1971 records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles prescribed for governmental entities.

The inclusion of monies in the 1973 and 1974 town budgets to provide for the payment of expenditures incident to this sewer project in effect caused the raising of duplicate appropriations for that pur-

pose.

In order to place a measure of accounting control over the sums raised or appropriated to date, we have transferred the sum raised in the 1973 budget for debt service on the unissued notes, namely \$55,800, to the 1971 appropriation, carried forward for Lisbon Road sewer construction. The application of this transfer to that account results in a cash overdraft of \$4,257 to date on the said project. The amount originally authorized to be raised by long-term notes (\$120,000) is carried forward to 1974 as a liability to offset an asset item of like amount carried under the designation of long-term notes authorized—unissued.

This, in our opinion, reflects more accurately the actual current financial condition of the Town as of December 31, 1973 as affected by the fiscal transactions relating to the Lisbon Road sewer construction project.

It is recommended that the next town meeting rescind the vote of the previous town meetings, pertaining to that portion of the appropriation for the Lisbon Road sewer construction which was originally voted to be financed by the proceeds of long-term notes.

Appropriations to be Raised on Gross Basis:

During the course of this examination, we reviewed the 1973 budget printed in the town report and in the process discovered that several departmental appropriations were raised "net" of income or refunds expected. Included among these appropriations are those for the Police Department, Parks and Playgrounds, Treatment Plant Operation and Streets and Highways.

It is further noted that expenditures of \$8,019 were made from the Parking Meter Fund during the year, although no appropriation was included for that purpose in the budget. We respectfully point out that all appropriations raised for Town purposes, must be stated on a gross basis in the budget, irrespective of the source of revenues or resources which are anticipated or used as offsets thereto.

Planning Board:

As stated in our last report, the maintenance of a special checking account by the Planning Board for the administration of appropriations received from the Town, is contrary to the provisions of R.S.A. 41:29, which stipulates that "The Town Treasurer shall have

custody of all monies belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only on orders of the selectmen."

Accordingly, the balance in this checking account, amounting to \$190 as of December 31, 1973 (Exhibit F) should be transferred to the town treasury during the ensuing year.

Unredeemed Taxes:

As indicated in Exhibit C-2, as of December 31, 1973, unredeemed taxes from tax sales of the levies of 1970 and prior years were as follows:

Inasmuch as the statutory two year redemption period has expired on these unredeemed taxes, the Tax Collector should deed all of the properties involved to the Town. The execution of tax deeds on all properties which are in default of redemption is required by the provisions of R.S.A. 80:38.

Litigation:

On September 26, 1974, the Supreme Court of the State of New Hampshire upheld a previous decision of the Superior Court concerning the abatement of certain taxes levied on the properties of New England Power Company by the Town of Littleton for the years 1969, 1970 and 1971.

The judgment rendered against the Town of Littleton in this case, obligates the Town to abate and refund taxes in the amount of \$746,277.37 to New England Power Company in addition to interest at six percent (6%) from date of payment by the taxpayer. Accordingly, there is an unrecorded liability amounting to \$882,838.81 at December 31, 1973, which amount is computed as follows:

In addition, applications for abatement of taxes assessed and paid by New England Power Company for the levies of 1967, 1968, 1972 and 1973, were likewise pending at December 31, 1973. These applications covered taxes amounting to \$1,357,704.06, computed as follows:

We are informed that New England Power Company may agree to accept whatever final abatements are agreed upon in the latter instance and the abatements and refunds resulting from the court judgment in the form of abatements against tax levies to be made in fiscal year 1975 and thereafter.

The amounts stated above are not included in the liabilities shown in the general fund Comparative Balance Sheets (Exhibit A-1), but because of their significance must be considered in proper evaluation of the Town's current financial condition.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21 require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town of Littleton. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT — 1975

You may be surprised to learn that as we, in 1976, are to celebrate the Bicentennial of the American Revolution, we could be celebrating 175 years of libraries in Littleton. These libraries have been "The Social Library in Littleton" in 1801, "Proprietors of Glynville Library" in 1813, "People's Circulating Library" in 1858, "Littleton Village Library" in 1866 and finally, the Littleton Public Library which opened January 24, 1890, but was organized in 1889 and became tax supported. Our present library will be 87 years old early in the Bicentennial year.

The Library Development Program and the Statewide Borrower's Card have been doing some good work but it is time the Littleton Public Library and its librarian should be able to work with surrounding small libraries more, especially with Service Center funds given by the state. These libraries could be asked to help select books to be purchased, or cassettes and players, rather than receiving a list of library materials chosen by Littleton without consulting them. The

libraries need to be working together.

Revenue Sharing Funds allowed the library to redecorate the lobby and stairwell, the librarian's office, and the adult reading room. These funds also allowed us to start updating the old electrical system in the library. The children's room has new lights which it has

needed for the 10 years of its existence upstairs.

Soliciting of funds from local organizations took place by board members Cynthia Farquharson and Marlene Baker as they planned to make the children's room "more child oriented." Red and white curtains replaced drapes, bright paints were applied to older furniture and the book shelving, decals were applied to the window shades, a mobile was purchased, pictures were added. A divider and three new tables and twelve colorful chairs were purchased with special permission from the late Emil W. Allen, Jr., New Hampshire State Librarian, to use Service Center Funds not exceeding \$500.00 We spent \$476.68 of our \$3,253.00. Our work study girls, Sylvia Smith and Karen McLellan painted and adjusted curtains in the summer of 1975.

We are most grateful to the V.F.W., the Littleton Lodge of Elks, Littleton Emblem Club, and The Eagles for their contribution of money for this project. The Eagles also gave money for the elderly which was used for more recent sight-saving large print books.

Local artists gave of their time and talent. Claude Brusseau did a very bright-colored painting of the "Seven Dwarfs" and Ellen Morrow did a painting of "Mary Poppins." A child of any age would enjoy the pictures hung in the children's room. If you have not seen these paintings, do take a trip upstairs in the library.

109 showings of films obtained from the New Hampshire State Library were shown to 1377 people. All ages, from kindergarten tots to Senior Citizens, enjoyed being entertained and educated on a

variety of subjects.

We wish to thank the White Mountain Garden Club for their

gift of money for books on gardening. The Littleton Garden Club receives our grateful thanks for pruning the fast-growing bushes and for the beautiful Christmas wreaths received in December. We also wish to thank the Friday Club for their check to help buy books.

Memorial books were presented to the library in memory of Maurice Plant, Edward W. Morehouse, Mrs. Elizabeth Tabbut, Elizabeth Gray Edson, Phillip Goodell, Fannie Billings Heald, Helene Mayer Revoir, Mark Miles, Effie Willey, George E. Morrill, George Irving Andrew, Enzo Serafini, and Sylvia Stevens Jacobs. Arrangements were made for memorials to Gregory Lee Santy. These will be in next year's report.

I wish to thank the people of Littleton for my years of service in their fast-growing library. I wish to thank board members and State Library Staff. I wish to thank the 1975 summer work-study girls, Sylvia Smith and Karen McLellan. I wish to thank Nancy King and Melissa Stearns. I especially wish to thank Ellen Morrow and

Patricia Stillings.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS

During the winter months we tried to keep our streets, sidewalks and outside roads in good condition for your safe traveling. The work done consisted of plowing, sanding, salting, and the removal of snow from the streets. Also, during the winter months, we cut brush

and trees along our roads and hauled cover into the dump.

This summer we installed on High, Maple and Church Streets some 3,200 feet of storm drain and replaced 32 catch basins. After this work was completed, Town equipment worked with LaBraney's Paving Co. and the above streets were covered with hot top. We laid hot top on the Brook Road, Highland Avenue Spruce Street, Fairview Street, Hill Street, some of South Street was covered with a grader patch of hot top. One hundred eighty feet of storm drain was installed on Patriot's Drive to accommodate a new section of the Strain development and the street was patched after work was completed.

We hauled in some 3,080 yards of fill for the Town Building parking lot, put down the base coating of hot top and built the guard railing around the lot. Hill Top Road was ditched from the Hoffmann residence to the end of the road. The material from this work was

hauled to the town dump and used for cover.

Also, this road was grader patched with hot top from Route 18 to the Green residence and the rest of the road was patched the best we could by hand, hoping next summer we can continue with hot top. Also, on this project some culverts were replaced and extensions were put on to get them out of the traveled portion of the roadway.

Mann's Hill Road was ditched on both sides from Mrs. Tunney's residence to the cemetery. Some culverts were replaced on this project also and most of this material was hauled into the town dump. The rest of the way to the Dalton town line we ditched in spots, hoping next season to continue and do the job the same as on this end. Some gravel was hauled onto most of our graveled roads. On the Cyr road, or Brook's road off Mt. Eustis Road, we rebuilt some 400 feet of road, installing culverts, blasting out ledge, and regraveling it. Ditch work was done from the Marsh residence to Turgeon's on Walker Hill Road. This work consisted of blasting out some ledge, cleaning up same, and hauling in some gravel.

This fall we did 3,000 feet of T.R.A. work on the Stevens or Lyman Road (this is off Route 135 on the Monroe Road). This work consisted of cutting trees and brush, replacing culverts, ditching, and graveling. 4,484 yards of bankrun gravel and 1,600 yards of

crushed gravel was hauled onto this road.

Last spring 5,000 yards of sand was hauled from the Moore Reservoir and stock piled at the Treatment Plant. This fall, we hauled into the Town garage stock pile 4,600 yards of sand from the town pit for winter sanding. We had some 2,000 yards left from last year. We hauled in some 1,000 yards of crushed gravel and stock piled this at the town garage.

DUMP

We hauled in 10,912 yards of fill from the town pit on the Mt. Eustis Road. This, along with other material hauled from various projects done by the Highway Department, was used for cover.

SEWERS

We worked on 14 existing septic systems, installed 12 new systems, also several lines were rodded and flushed to keep a good flow, trying to prevent any stoppage in the lines.

SIDEWALKS

On Pleasant Street, 430 feet of new curbing was put in, and a new sidewalk installed back of the curbing. The remaining portion of Main Street was hot topped by LaBraney's paving. This project had been started in 1974 after Main Street was paved.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Another year has come to pass, but 1975 will long be remembered by the Littleton firemen. On the night of August 21st, at 11 p.m., the relatively young group of firemen drove in on a frightening sight, the 5-story Ellingwood Trucking Company fully involved.

To retard this fire until Mutual Aid could come in was a feat in itself. This I say proudly. The timely arrival of the surrounding towns, namely Franconia, Bethlehem, Whitefield, Lisbon, and St. Johnsbury with men and equipment, and several other towns that sent in manpower. A tribute to Twin State Mutual Aid. All made possible through the cooperation of our local Police, Water & Light, and Highway Departments. Splendid cooperation!!

The taxpayers who saw fit to buy us the aerial ladder a few years ago now realize the value of this piece of equipment. True, we

will be using it again.

This coming year we hope to improve our local as well as Twin State Mutual Aid radio communications. I'm sure we can improve it so that we can better expedite our services.

We are also looking at 4" hose for supply lines. We call it above ground water mains. Used to supply hoses and equipment at fire scenes that require long lays and large volumes of water.

Hopefully to replace the old Ford tanker with a new chassis and a used 1500 gallon tank, similar to what we have done when we replaced the last tanker. Then we could possibly set one tanker up in the Partridge Lake area with an Auxiliary Department made up from local and summer residents.

Another major item is the replacement of Engine #1, a 1931 American LaFrance, a 1000 gallon per minute pumper. The replacement of this unit could cost from 60 to \$70,000. I recommend that one-half the estimated cost be set aside from Revenue Sharing funds, spec and put out for bid the recommend unit, the next year withhold the balance of the contract. It will take at least 1 year in production.

The last major problem still is a new station. We don't need any more surveys to tell us that a new location is recommended. It would almost seem that we qualify for some form of Federal Grant. Maybe a study in this direction could prove beneficial either way. Let's make a definite move to resolve the problem.

Outlook for '76? More fires!

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT Summary of Activities Jan. - Dec. 1975

A. GENERAL SERVICES°

Received 514 new individual requests for mental health services to area individuals and families. Many of these were of a severe, emergency nature. (A 2% decrease over 1974).

Held 3,397 counseling sessions with individuals, families or groups from the region served by White Mountain Community

Services. (A 3% increase over 1974).

Held 1,200 consultation sessions with other professional persons and volunteers (doctors, nurses, social workers, attorneys, etc.) and organizations concerning those individuals they were attempting to serve. (Same as 1974).

Held 270 education and community planning sessions with and for interested professional and lay persons in the region served by White Mountain Community Services. (Same as 1974).

Short a full-time psychiatrist for six months. Short a full-time psychologist for the full year.

Continued to Provide:

Pre-admission screening and after care services for patients entering and leaving the New Hampshire Hospital, Concord. Social-psychological evaluations for schools, courts, and state vo-

cational rehabiliation services.

Weekly psychiatric consultation to physicians and to hospital staff serving patients hospitalized in our local general hospitals. A monthly in-service program for community and school nursing personnel. Intensive diagnostic and inpatient care in our local hospitals for those individuals experiencing emotional problems. This was made partly possible by the presence of a psychiatric nurse and a full-time psychiatrist on White Mountain Community Services' staff. (for six months). A 24-hour-a-day on-call emergency service for problems that need immediate attention. A White Mountain Community Services professional staff member is on-call at all times.

A partial hospitalization program to provide more extensive care for those individuals for whom regular one-to-one therapy is not sufficient. This program is being provided in the local communities (there are groups in Littleton, Whitefield and Woodsville). Course in Marriage and the Family. (Sponsored in conjunction with UNH, offering graduate level credit.)

A monthly training and consultation conference in Woodsville involving professionals from various local human service organizations. The purpose is to acquaint participants with a "Team Approach" for working with clients with multiple problems, (For

example, physical illness, emotional problems and unemployment present in one individual or family.) Multi-problem cases are presented (without names to insure confidentiality) and participants are encouraged to contribute to the problem-solving process. In this way inter-agency cooperation is facilitated and professional learning enhanced.

Added and/or expanded the following programs:

A monthly in-service program for community clergy representing at least seven of the communities served by White Mountain Community Services.

Have held two planning sessions with area law enforcement personnel which will result in a crisis intervention training program

to begin in the near future.

A program of decentralization was begun in September 1975. Two White Mountain Community Services staff members provide services two days a week out of Beatrice Weeks Memorial Hospital in Lancaster and two staff members provide services two days a week out of Cottage Hospital in Woodsville. Two additional staff members will begin providing services two days a week at the Lin-Wood Medical Center in Lincoln in January 1976.

B. SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH

School consultation on a weekly basis to schools in Supervisory Unions #23 and #35. Increased the number of agency staff in-

volved from one to four.

Services at the Children's Development Center now in its sixth year of operation. The services are provided to 15 children for a full-year program. The Center provides a program of training and development for handicapped children unable to attend public schools.

T.E.M.P.O., Inc., a sheltered workshop for developmentally disabled persons between the ages of 15 and 25 began in September, 1974 and has been increased to 25 individuals. This program provides job skills training through contracts obtained from local business and industry. The workshop is now a vocational rehabilitation designated facility.

Haverhill Development Center was approved by Governor and Council in March 1975. This program now provides services to six severely developmentally disabled children between the ages

of 2-12 in the Haverhill area.

C. SERVICES TO THE ELDERLY

Continued the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (fifth year) to help retired persons continue to be meaningfully involved in their community affairs through their volunteer efforts. Because of this program 65 different area organizations (such as the local schools and Grafton County Home) received the valuable services of 405 senior volunteers, who contributed a total of 39,000 volunteer hours of work during 1975. This program will be continued in the coming year within the 22 towns serviced in the White

Mountain Community Services' catchment area.

White Mountain Community Services is approved as a comprehensive mental health center by the New Hampshire Department of Mental Health and is affiliated with the following state and national organizations: New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Clinics; Northern New Hampshire Mental Health System; New Hampshire Health and Welfare Conference.

This non-profit agency is governed by a 40-man Board of Directors of local citizens. Elections are held each year at the time of the agency's Annual Meeting (May). All meetings of the board are open to the public and citizens are encouraged to attend. All money voted or contributed to White Mountain Community Services is used to support local needs. This agency serves 22 towns totally, a resident

population of 23,900.

The new playing surface at Remich Park received its first year round use. Beginning with baseball in May, through the many activities of the Summer Recreation Program, ending with field hockey and football in the fall. We really have a fine playing field we can all appreciate and be proud of. Also added to the field were four sets of bleachers freshly painted over by Darrell Champagne and his hard working staff. In addition Darrell constructed a video and movie tower to aid the high school in filming and taping the football games, and it is very useful for the local and visiting radio stations in broadcasting these football games.

Pierre Lafitte, Summer Recreation Director reports that the Park and Swim Programs served more local people and visitors than ever before. LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During 1975 the Littleton Police Department made a total of 1,045 arrests. There were 619 arrests and summons issued for Motor Vehicle Offenses, 349 arrests for Criminal Offenses and 77 for Juvenile Offenses. The Department investigated a total of 264 accidents, six of which involved motorcycles, one bicycle and three pedestrians. It is interesting to note that there were twice as many male operators involved in accidents as females.

Of adult criminal arrests Disorderly Conduct was the most frequent with 38, followed by 31 for Theft, 24 Assault, 2 Aggravated Assault, 14 Criminal Threatening, 1 Arson, 12 Criminal Mischief, 11 Burglary, 19 Criminal Trespass, 1 Robbery, 16 Receiving Stolen Property, 3 Theft of Services, 14 Forgery, 12 Issuing Bad Checks, 1 Non-Support, 14 Resisting Arrest or Detention, 1 Escape, 2 False Fire Alarms and 1 for Accomplice to False Fire Alarm, 1 Harrassment 22 Intoxication, 4 Unauthorized Use of Firearms or Fireworks, 1 Permit for Pyrotechnic, 4 Accomplice to Theft, 3 Concealment of Merchandise, 2 Indecent Exposure of Lewdness, 6 Assault on Police Officers, 2 Accessory to Burglary, 6 Failure to Answer Summons, 2 Carrying Concealed Firearms, 12 Selling Without Hawkers and Peddlars License, 3 Default, 2 Pedestrians on Limited Access Highway, 1 Habitual Offender, 5 Disobeying a Police Officer, 5 Littering, 4 Neglected Child, 5 Derisive Words, 9 Prohibited Sales of Alcoholic Beverage, 4 Being Knowingly Present (Controlled Drugs), 8 Possession of Controlled Drugs, 1 Purchasing Controlled Drugs, 19 Sales of Controlled Drugs, 2 Conspiracy to Violate the Controlled Drug Act, 5 Violations of Probation. There were 5 for Failure to License a Dog and 18 for Allowing Dogs to Run at Large. There were 77 Juvenile Offenses with Theft being the most predominant with a total of 25.

Of Motor Vehicle Violations, Speeding was the most numerous with 260, followed by 84 for DWI, 5 Failure to File Proof of Financial Responsibility, 33 Operating without a License, 25 Operating Unregistered Motor Vehicles, 64 Uninspected Motor Vehicles, 6 Misuse of Plates, 6 Stop Light or Stop Sign Violations, 27 Passing on Solid Lines, 10 Allowing Unlicensed Operators, 10 Defective Equipment, 2 Reckless Operation, 7 Operating After Revocation or suspension, 1 Passing a School Bus, 7 Disorderly Conduct with a Motor Vehicle, 6 Conduct after an Accident, 27 Bald Tires, 8 Operating Motorcycles Without Head or Face Protection, 5 Following Too Closely, 2 Failure to Grant Right of Way, 1 Obscured Vision, 2 Defective Exhaust, 1 Failure to Yield to Emergency Vehicles, 2 Excessive Bumper Height, 6 Taking a Motor Vehicle Without Authority and 1 for Failure to Keep to the Right of the Highway.

Officer Kenneth Westover completed the New Hampshire Recruit Police Training and is a certified Police Officer. Officer Louis Babin attended the ASAP Breathalyzer Course and is a Certified Breathalyzer Operator. Chief Nocky attended the Police Prosecutor Course offered by the Police Standards and Training Council at the

New Hampshire Vocational Technical College in Concord. Lt. Caswell has been promoted to Deputy Chief and has attended a Specialized Course in Police Management and Training—Factors Influencing DWI Arrests. All Department Officers attended a Seminar instructing them on the New Juvenile Laws which went into effect with the passage of Senate Bill 18.

Principal activities of the Littleton Conservation Commission during the past year have centered on work at the Dells. The Conservation Commission requested that, with the accumulated interest monies from the Remich Trust Fund, the Parks Department have a new property boundary survey made of the Dells! All corners are now marked with iron pins. Additional maintenance work was done, such as repairing picnic tables and fireplaces. The N.H. National Guard, as a public service gesture, removed several fallen trees from the Dells pond. The Commission is grateful for this assistance. Some heavy undergrowth, dead trees, and hanging branches were also removed.

Other Conservation Commission activities included collecting newspapers which have just been sold to a recycling company in Dover, N.H.

Consideration is presently being given to the purchase of aerial photos from which numerous resource inventories can be made and shown through the use of overlays.

One dredge and fill application was received for consideration. The application was approved and involved the removal of crushed stone from the Moore Reservoir.

The results of this survey were to enable the Board to determine the type and extent of growth desired in our town and provide a base to develop a comprehensive plan for the town. The response to the questionnaire was only 23% return. Although the data secured is not statistically reliable it is useful for whatever attitude trends are identified. The Study Committee will continue to work with the survey and towns people for a statistically reliable response.

During the year the Board considered 17 subdivision requests, disapproving only 1. Of these 17 requests 4 were major subdivisions and 3 were proposed mobile home park or additions to existing parks. In addition, 5 public hearings concerning proposed sub-

divisions were held.

One of the large subdivisions involved the industrial park property at the Littleton Sand and Gravel. The approval of this plan shall have a positive effect on our town's short and long range planning. The Burndy Corporation is already developing a section of the Industrial Park and with the continuing work of the Littleton Industrial Development Corporation the town shall benefit from the efforts of the Corporation, Selectmen and Planning Board.

Heald, Miss Mary Heald.

The Community House hostess, Mrs. Ann Fillion (whose husband John is the custodian) presented her second annual report as follows:

"The year 1975 was a busy one at the Community House from start to finish with only a slight decrease in activity during the Summer months. The approximate total of people using the house for the year is 18,625.

Several new groups have met at the House this year. They include: AARP, Citizens for Safe Energy, Community Affairs Committee, Continuing Education Dept. of Franconia College, Group Home, Goodnews Club, Fred Harris Association, IBEW Union, McDonalds Restaurant, Miracle Maid Distributors, Nursing Mothers Group, Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, Women's Concern Center and White Mts. Center for the Arts. This brings the total number of organizations using the facilities during the year to 55. Reservations for parties, showers, and receptions were also made by several individuals.

It was occasionally necessary to ask smaller groups to change their regular meeting room to accommodate large groups on the main floor. A suggestion was made that the House phone in the kitchen be moved to a more central location so that meetings in progress would not be disrupted when someone is called to the phone. The kitchen is frequently used as a meeting room when several groups are using the House at the same time. The third floor can no longer be used for public assembly due to fire regulations.

The "Children's Room" on the second floor was painted, ceiling repaired and new curtains were purchased for the windows. Repairs were made in the public restrooms on the second and third floor and new linoleum was installed. Electrical repair was also begun.

Monetary contributions were turned over to the president. Other contributions include a floor lamp from the Senior Citizens and an electric can opener and dish drainer for the kitchen from the Every Penny Counts group. As of Dec. 31 the petty cash account had a balance of 56 cents from an annual allotment of \$50.

Storage space may become a problem as the number of groups and organizations regularly meeting at the House increases. Presently material and equipment is stored for the: Historical Society, American Legion and Auxiliary, Red Cross, Senior Citizens, Bible Study, Great Books, Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, WMCS, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Two definite storage area problems are the second floor of the Barn and the Home Health Equipment in the basement.

It is hoped that the Community House and grounds appear neat and attractive and that the public feels welcome to make use of

its facilities."

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

January 22, 1976

I believe this past year, through the combined effort of the various committees and hard working employees, produced a very productive year for the LITTLETON COMMUNITY CENTER. As reported in the Treasurer's Report the Community Center has progressed through this past year well within its budget limits and enters 1976 on a sound financial basis. I feel that the people of Littleton have seen their tax dollars put to work in an area where the town people of all ages have derived the full benefit of their investment.

The Property Committee, headed by Mr. Edson Berry, has completed improvements and repairs in a number of areas throughout the Community Center including re-lining the furnace, new floor covering on the second and third floor bathrooms and starting the re-wiring of the main building. The continuing of this wiring is

already scheduled for the coming year.

Our custodian, Mr. John Fillion, did a fine job on removing the old fence and bushes in the rear of our property and cleaning up this area.

Our Personnel Committee, headed by Miss Frances Heald, undertook and completed the much needed basic policies and procedures regarding the hiring of employees and the employees responsibilities to the various users of the Center. This document, which was approved by the Executive Committee on December 4, 1975, combined many hours of research with numerous committee meetings and Miss Heald and her committee deserve the high honor of recognition.

Our Planning and Programming Committee, headed by Mr. Winston Merrill, started our first program of promoting the Community House which resulted in the largest increase of donations in many years. I hope to continue this promotion during 1976.

In closing this report let me say that a company is only as good as its employees. With this in mind, stop and consider the smoothness with which the internal wheels of this Center turned this past year organizing and scheduling dates and times for nearly 55 groups and involving some 18,625 people of all ages throughout the year.

With this consideration I think you will agree with me in stating that our Hostess, Mrs. Ann Fillion, did an outstanding job throughout 1975, and I look forward to working with Ann and John during

1976.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSION REPORT

1975 has been a most eventful year for your airport. Our search for an airport manager ended in May with the selection of Mr. Roland Ferland of Whitefield. Roland began his aviation career as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam, and has since achieved ratings in private and commercial fixed wing aircraft, as well as an instrument rating.

In addition to the duties of airport manager, Roland also has a fixed base operation. He offers many services to airport users.

Since becoming airport manager, Roland has kept a record of airport use. There have been 1,946 aircraft landings and departures and 6,262 passengers in and out since then.

Flights from Whitefield to Boston and New York via Lebanon began in July and continued through December on a daily basis. The flights are subsidized by a grant from the State of New Hampshire and have not proved financially self-sufficient to date. Reevaluation of the flight is currently underway.

The airport localizer, an instrument which gives pilots a centerline for landing, was commissioned August 7th. It greatly increases the safety factor when landing in inclement weather.

Future priorities for the airport include the establishment of direct passenger flights to Boston in a continuing effort to better serve our communities. Also, we are in the process of investigating ways of making the airport more financially self-sufficient. Construction of a new town hangar is such a way.

The Commission wishes to thank the area communities for their financial and moral support. We also give a special note of thanks to the White Mountains Region Association for helping us secure the commercial flights. We invite all interested citizens to attend our regular meetings, scheduled for the last Monday of each month.

SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION 1975 (38th Year)

On November 21, 1974, the directors of your White Mountains Region Association voted to change its fiscal year from Sept. 1 - Aug. 31 to July 1 - June 30 in order to conform to the State's fiscal year. Due to this change the summary will cover activities for a ten month period (Sept. 1, 1974 to June 30, 1975), instead of the usual twelve month period. Please note that under new guidelines, the State will help fund your Region Association by matching the amount of monies raised by the communities.

Your Association sponsored a very successful and meaningful marketing seminar for the vacation/recreation industry of northern New Hampshire. The two-day seminar addressed such topics as "What is Marketing," "Marketing Analysis," "Development of a Marketing Program," "Advertising Decisions," "Appearance of Establishment," "Brochure Design" and "Packaging Vacation Facilities."

The Region has a new magazine, Outlook, published by your Association. The magazine, which is distributed free to all WMRA members, selectmen, schools, libraries and businessmen in the region, is designed to serve as an in-house chamber of commerce type publication for northern New Hampshire.

Regarding transportation matters, your Association became a participating agency in the experimental air/land demonstration for the region. The project, funded by a grant from the N.E. Regional Commission and sponsored by the N.H. Office of Comprehensive Planning, includes daily round trip flights between the Whitefield Regional Airport and the Lebanon Airport, with connecting flights to Boston and New York. In addition, a bus/taxi system operates between Berlin and Whitefield. The Association entered into a \$10,000 contract with the N.H. Office of Comprehensive Planning in an effort to increase passenger useage through promotion and advertising of both air and ground systems.

In other activities, the Association continues to publish the N.H. Accommodations and Dining Directory, the Where-to-Stay folder, and the White Mts. Map, the Fall Foliage Shunpike folder, and the Canoeing and Kayaking folder, as well as publishing the weekly bulletin of lodging inquiries. It also distributes other state and local brochures in an effort to bolster the north country's economy.

Your Association's executive director again attended the Spring-field Exposition in an effort to boost the four-season vacation travel trade in the region. While there, he spoke on Hartford (Conn.) radio about the region and what it has to offer. In addition, he also attended the Boston Sportsman's Show in an effort to attract visitors to our region.

The Region Association is participating in 4-H programs in Coos, Carroll and Grafton Counties under somewhat different guidelines. As a result of a meeting between the Association and the three 4-H agents, it was decided to divide up the approximately \$600 among the three counties, with each county to spend its proportionate share as it sees fit. The only requirement is that each county must give the Association an accounting of how those funds were spent.

In late May-early June, your executive director spent several days distributing bulk orders of WMRA promotional brochures to the numerous chamber of commerce information booths in the region as well as several State Highway rest areas. In addition, with the very able assistance of Mrs. Simonds, numerous bulk orders of brochures were sent to travel clubs, Automobile Associations, and Travel Agencies throughout the country and Canada.

With respect to the N.H. Council of Region Associations, of which your executive director is secretary, it was disclosed at a meeting during the year that the State, beginning in the second year of the biennium, will fund each Association on the basis of the "local share." Specifically, the amount of State funds received will be determined by the amount and number of communities which appropriate. Under this system, it would appear this region would gain financially, but only if the north country communities continue to support its Association.

Your executive director was privileged to participate on an ad hoc committee set up to design and publish a brochure, Tourism/Recreation Equals Jobs and Taxes. An informational brochure of this type, which spells out the significance of this industry to the region and to the State, has been sorely needed.

Other activities of your executive director and the Association during this ten-month period include: Appropriated funds to assist in the publication of a Christmas Tree Vendor's List in an effort to assist the 1.7 million dollar industry in the northern three counties, attended numerous executive committees and full board meetings of the White Mountains Center for Music and the Arts for which your executive director serves as secretary. (Parenthetically, the Association distributes Festival folders around the region and through the mails in answer to numerous written inquiries), attended several meetings with personnel from VTN, the organization which has undertaken the Franconia Notch environmental impact project for the State; attended numerous budget hearings, met with many selectmen in the region to better acquaint them with the activities of this Association, spoke





History was made on Sunday, May 21, 1967, when the Littleton Area Historical Society held its first organizational meeting in the Littleton Congregational Church Hall.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Andrew Poulsen, and the sponsorship of the Littleton Colonial Club, the original organizing committee was comprised of Mrs. Arlin T. Doane, Mrs. Reginald E. Willey, Col. Walter E. Lorence, Mrs. Lorence, Mrs. Wilson Lewis, Mrs. Albert Blasenak, Mr. John H. Colby, Mrs. George Kilbourne, and Mrs. Eva Ladd Dobson.

Enthusiasm generated the attendance of some sixty people; and the objectives of the Society were promulgated in an effort to collect memorabilia and items of historical importance, to display and disseminate such information as would enhance and record the area's history and significance.

Since that time, the Society has endeavored to carry out its program, and the highlight of one of its most recent efforts has been the cooperative effort to restore the original appearance of the Town Building. The Littleton Selectmen, under Chairman Louis Thompson, authorized the rebuilding of the spire (removed many years ago), and the Historical Society presented a handsome reproduction of the original weathervane to top the spire, upon the erection in October of 1974.

Plans are now being formulated, with the prospect of a permanent museum, for the display of the Historical Society's items, and accessibility to the public during the years ahead.
