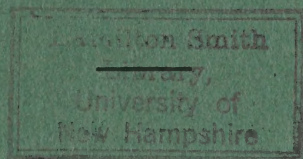

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall, in said Lyme on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers as printed.

3. To see what compensation the town will allow its various officers the ensuing year.

4. To see what order the town will adopt in relation to the Savings Bank Tax, R. R. Tax, Auto Permit Fees, Interest and Dividend Tax and Insurance Tax the ensuing year.

5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.

6. To see if the town will raise, and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control the ensuing year.

7. To see if the town will vote to adopt the budget as prepared by the budget committee or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer certain parcels of land taken for taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the town will vote to allow bank discount on all taxes paid before Nov. 1, 1933.

11. To see if the town will vote to purchase additional equipment for the fire department and raise money therefor.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Lyme:

The fourteenth report in the series of annual reports since the passage of the State law, concerning supervision, of the Lyme School District, is presented as a part of the report of the School Board to the School District. It is the fifth prepared by the present writer.

Survey

The work of the year has progressed along satisfactory lines. It was with regret that, due to lessened income, it was impossible to continue the work in music. But one change in Teachers occurred at the end of the School year, thus enabling each Teacher to go forward with her pupils in their efforts to meet the requirements of the next few years. The Health work has continued successfully. Several children have received positive medical treatment, which has enabled them to carry on in their school work more effectively. Lyme may well be proud that in this period she has been able to avoid any serious retardations in her educational work.

Budget

The restricted Budget of last year made necessary by the vote of the District, in order to meet the request of the Governor for lessened appropriations, has made it necessary to curtail some of the activities of the Schools. This curtailment has been done with the utmost care to avoid as much as possible lessened educational advantages.

One of the items in the Budget, that of High School Tuition, is a growing item. This is due to the fact that a greater number of pupils are entering high schools than formerly, and to the added fact that tuition rates are a little nearer to the actual cost of tuition on a per pupil basis in the communities to which our pupils are sent, than was the case in previous years. Next year this item of the Budget must be larger, as the number of pupils who will be

in high school is likely to be increased by about one hundred percent. The Budget which has been prepared for you, and to be presented through you to the community, has recognized this fact.

This Budget has been decreased in practically all of the items. It calls for \$1500.00 less than the Budget presented last year. This Budget cannot be further reduced without serious detriment to your schools. The item for Teachers' Salaries alone is \$1750.00 less than the same item for Teachers' Salaries ten years ago. As many items as possible have been adjusted to meet the changing situations. It must be remembered, however, that the Budget includes items over which the District has no control. It should be borne in mind that, should the income as a result of possible lessened State Aid or as a result of failure to receive income from the Dog Tax, as is the case this year, be lessened, it will mean an almost impossible situation, and one likely to necessitate District action by the March Meeting of 1934.

Attendance

The School Board, and School community of Lyme, should bear in mind that during the past eight years, the Average Membership in the Schools has increased forty-two percent. This accounts for practically all of any increased cost of Schools to the community in that period. It has been possible to maintain a comparatively low cost, only through careful economies, brought about by closing small schools, and decreasing the amounts utilized for the purchase of Fuel, Janitor Service, Transportation, and the like. It should be borne in mind that any consideration of the costs of the schools should have due regard for this difference of increased attendance, both in the Lyme Schools themselves, and in the number of Lyme pupils who are attending High School elsewhere.

Repairs

Only the necessary repairs have been made during this year. The satisfactory condition to which the School Buildings have been brought during the

past few years will make it unnecessary to expend large sums, unless unforeseen circumstances arise. It is expected that careful planning will enable the Board to keep the Buildings in about the present state of repair.

This year, the parents and pupils, of one of the one-room schools, have made their contribution toward improving the surroundings. The residents of the Whipple School District gave of their time and labor, and the pupils worked very diligently re-grading and re-fencing the School yard, at no expense to the School District. This makes the surroundings of that Building very much more satisfactory and home-like. At the same time, it provided an activity which was helpful to the pupils themselves.

Health

It is regrettable that in times of stress it seems desirable, from an economic standpoint, to lessen the amount of work to be done for the Health of the pupils in the schools. So many children have received such care as to improve their work in the classroom, and as to improve their general Health, that this phase of the community service has more than compensated for the cost to the community. Its curtailment should be considered by the community only as a temporary expedient. The work should be resumed at such a time as the obligations of the District become less burdensome.

Conclusion

An effort has been made, this year, to lessen the amount of material presented as a part of the Report, to the end of some slight saving in the cost of printing. No item has been omitted which seemed to have a definite value from the standpoint of a record of the activities of the Schools.

Such recommendations as have been made in previous years have been met with a splendid cooperation, on the part of the Board and the community. Several of these recommendations have involved expenditures of money, but in the end have resulted in actual economies. Your Superintendent is mindful

of the needs of the community, and wishes not to place upon the citizens educational burdens beyond those requiring reasonable proficiency, nor beyond the capacity of the community to maintain.

It has been, and is considered, a very definite part of the Educational work to make it constructive and efficient. It can be truly said that the conditions of the Schools, from an Educational standpoint, are the best that they have been since my acquaintance with them. The history of Lyme indicates that she wishes the Youth of her Town to receive as many of the benefits of life, as it is possible for her to give. To do this, the present adjustments in the expenditures should be regarded as temporary expedients, subject only to the needs and economies necessitated by circumstances. This has, and will enable Lyme, to continue her standing among her sister Towns and communities in the State, as one which is thoughtful of the well-being of her entire citizenry.

Times of distress are likely to bring human beings closer together in a common cause. Your Superintendent wishes to share with the citizens, the pupils, teachers, and the board, the burdens which we must all bear with fortitude and hopefulness. The greatest contribution which we all may make to our community, is to see to it that our youthful citizens are given such advantages as may help them to live their lives in the complex society into which they will soon be placed.

The Enrollment for the year ending June 1932, shows a very definite increase, as does the Average Membership and Average Attendance. When this is compared to the Attendance in 1925, it shows that the Enrollment has increased twenty-three per cent, and the Average Membership forty-two per cent. This fact should be borne in mind whenever appropriations are considered.

The Percent of Attendance in the Schools was not quite as commendable as for the previous year. This was no doubt due to illness of pupils. The Whipple School had the greatest Percent of Attendance for the year. The number of Tardinesses is still greater than should be found in schools where the pupils are conveniently situated to reach the building on time. The attention of parents is called to the desirability of promptness in this regard.
