TENTATIVE WARRANT
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison, in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison on Tuesday, March 13, 1951, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see what action Town will take in regard to discount on Taxes.

4. To see if the voters will authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$12,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of Taxes for the current municipal year and, to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefore. Said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to tar the road leading from West Ossipee Road to Public Bathing Beach, and raise and appropriate money for same.

To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March, 1951, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district,

and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept for use of school purposes such funds or grant-in-aid as may be obtainable from state, federal, or other sources.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$364.80 as the district's share of the salary and travel expense of a supervisory union music supervisor. The appropriation and use of such sum to be contingent upon appropriation by the other districts of Supervisory Union No. 36 of their respective shares.

11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for equipment and support of the Hot Lunch Program.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Madison:

During the school year 1949-50 teachers in the Madison schools were Mrs. Erma Lyman, Principal and grades 7 and 8; Mrs. Martha Kelley grades 5 and 6 at the Madison school. At the Silver Lake school grades 1, 2, and 3, Mrs. Manora Clayton, with Mrs. Winifred Harmon the last half of the year. No profession bears a heavier burden of responsibility than the teaching profession. Small children come into our schools to develop knowledges, skills, and attitudes that are to be theirs for a lifetime. It is the purpose of your teachers to guide and help their pupils to acquire these desirable attributes to the maximum degree. To the degree that the teacher is successful the future of the child, as an adult, is assured, assuming other influences are favorable. Your teachers are well aware of their responsibility. This is evidenced by the high quality of their work and their devotion to the welfare of their pupils. Mrs. Kelley and Mrs. Lyman attended the summer school at the University of New Hampshire last summer.

At the beginning of the current year grades one and two only were housed at the Silver Lake School. Mrs. Ethel Berry of Tamworth, formerly teacher at the Birch Intervale School, Wonalancet, was engaged as primary teacher. Mrs. Berry has an excellent background of training and experience. She comes to your schools highly recommended. In the Madison School Mrs. Kelley now has grades 3, 4, and 5, and Mrs. Lyman has grades 6, 7 and 8.

By the time this reaches the reader the grades in the Silver Lake School will have been moved to the new room constructed as an addition to the Madison

School. This is a modern, well equipped classroom providing ample room and facilities for present-day teaching methods. At a cost of approximately \$6000.00 it probably cannot be matched by any room constructed in the state during the past year at anywhere near a comparable price.

Miracles can be accomplished by friends and neighbors. This has been amply demonstrated by the work of the P. T. A. in transforming the basement room of the Madison School into an exceptionally attractive and well appointed cafeteria. This is not merely a fine project well done, but it is most timely. There is every evidence that the years ahead are going to be most difficult. Probably every boy, and possibly every girl, will serve for a period in the armed forces of this country. With the problems our children are going to face they will need competently trained minds and strong, vigorous bodies. The noon lunch program now sponsored by the P. T. A. will be a valuable contribution toward these ends.

Last year 28 Madison high school pupils were registered at Kennett High School. Madison can be proud that several of these pupils distinguished themselves by capturing more than their share of the honors. Eight were graduated in June. As of September, 1950 25 Madison pupils were enrolled at Kennett High School.

Costs of education in Madison for 1949-50 are shown by the figures below:

The excessive cost per elementary pupil is due, largely, to expense of transporting pupils over long distances of rough roads.

For some years school board members of Supervisory Union No. 36 have discussed the matter of hiring a music supervisor for the Union. Such a supervisor would provide instruction in both vocal and instrumental work in the schools of the union. The supervisor's time would be allocated principally, on the basis of the number of pupils in the district. In some instances two rooms could be combined for instruction. In general the supervisor could spend about one hour each week in each classroom. In addition to actual instruction the supervisor would organize the work in music for the teachers to carry on during the rest of the week. It is usual for such supervisors to present one or more concerts at some central place with pupils from all districts participating. At the Supervisory Union Budget meeting held December 20, 1950 it was voted to recommend that a special article be inserted in each district warrant to see if the district will vote to appropriate its share of the cost of a music supervisor. The total cost of hiring a music supervisor, including salary and travel expense is estimated at \$3200.00 a year. Madison's share of this for next year would be \$364.80.

The active cooperation of the School Board, teachers, pupils, and citizens is gratefully acknowledged.
