## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the town of Marlow in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said Marlow on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.

3. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise the salaries of the Selectmen and Tax Collector.

5. To see if the town will vote to elect a building committee.

6. To see if the town will apply for Class Five money known as T.R.A. and raise the sum of \$300.20 required by the State.

7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.

8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Library.

9. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money by temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

11. To authorize the tax collector to give two per cent cash discount on all property and personal taxes for payments made within 30 days after the date of tax bill, and empower the collector to appoint a deputy collector.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to improve Town Cemeteries.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell or administer all real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collectors Deeds.

15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to those items in the Town budget not covered in the preceding articles.

16. To see if the Town will vote for the white pine blister rust control, and raise or appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for same.

17. To see what action the Town will take to raise and appropriate \$94.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital.

18. To hear the reports of officers, agents and committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Marlow which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

“Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such. . . . .”

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, and the period from January 1st to November 30th, 1950. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I —Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1949

Section II —Period January 1st to November 30th, 1950

Section III—Statistical Table—Ten Year Statement of  
Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—Dec. 31, 1948-Dec. 31, 1949:  
(Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1948 and December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus increased by \$478.03 during 1949.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—  
Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,080.91, less a net revenue surplus of \$558.94, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$521.97.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of November 30th, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit K.

## AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks

were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### School Appropriation Account:

An analysis of the School District appropriation account for the period from December 31, 1946 to December 31, 1949, is made in Exhibit F. It will be noted that the balance due the School District as of December 31, 1948 and December 31, 1949, as indicated therein, differed from the balance as shown in the Balance Sheets for these years (as per the printed annual reports) as follows:

The audited balance of \$2,862.95, as of December 31, 1949, should be used as the basis for determining the balance due the School District on December 31, 1950, following the method used in preparing Exhibit F of this report.

#### Highway Equipment Fund:

The town meeting of 1948 voted to set up a highway equipment fund to be made up of money received from the rental of town highway equipment to the State and to other towns. This fund as indicated by the appropriation statement (Exhibit C), amounted to \$1,660.55 on December 31, 1949. A like amount was set-up as a liability item in the balance sheet of December 31, 1949. (Exhibit A).

It is recommended that this fund be turned over to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds the same as is required in the case of Capital Reserve Funds. Annual additions to the fund should likewise be treated in the same manner.

### Invoices and Bills:

It is recommended that supporting invoices and bills be attached to the Selectmen's Vouchers which are issued in payment thereof.

### Town Clerk:

It was noted that the Town Clerk was not bonded. A surety bond should be furnished by the Clerk as required by Section 42, Chapter 59, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

The Town Clerk should also adopt the use of the prescribed form of cash book for recording motor vehicle permits and dog licenses.

### Town Treasurer:

It is suggested that the Town Treasurer adopt the procedure of countersigning the Selectmen's orders, which can then be used as negotiable checks, instead of the present method of issuing a separate treasurer's check for each order. If this recommendation is adopted the vouchers, orders and checks will be in the same numerical sequence and the possibility of any difference between the amount of an order and check eliminated.

The Treasurer should also record bank deposits in the cash book and the amount of the bank deposits should correspond with the cash book receipts to date of deposit.

### Conclusion:

The accounts which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting and financial procedure, with exceptions as herein indicated, conformed to the uniform methods prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Marlow for their assistance during the course of the audit.

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### PROPOSED SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Marlow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall, in said district on the 13th of March, 1951, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose agents, auditors, committees, or other officers in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see what sum of money, not to exceed \$300, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing a porch roof on the school.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlow:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as superintendent of your school.

A number of improvements have been made in your school building since last spring. Probably the most important was the installation of a water system. This has been advocated for a number of years, and last summer seemed to be the best time to complete this project. Through the cooperation of the school board and various public-spirited citizens of the town it was found possible to provide flush toilets and running water. An adequate supply of water is insured through the use of two wells, one for drinking purposes and the other for sanitation. The teachers and pupils are much pleased with these facilities, and better health standards can be maintained now that they are a reality.

The P.T.A. has done much for the school, sponsoring a Halloween Party last fall, providing Christmas presents for all at the Holiday season, and furnishing the major portion of the cost of milk for the children during the winter months. Jump ropes, bean bags and hand balls have been donated to the school.

For many years we have noted a need for some type of shelter over the entrance to the school. The children have no place to stand or wait on stormy days except in the school rooms. There is considerable danger of falling ice and snow during the winter. Many towns have built roofs over the school porches so as to eliminate these dangers. The school board is recommending that similar steps be taken here.

The school children are participating in the WKNE spelling contests sponsored by the Keene Sentinel.

Last Spring the school board was able to purchase a bus, and this fall they have combined the transportation

routes with a resulting saving to the town. The state has inspected the facilities and found them in satisfactory condition.

### HEALTH REPORT

Health inspection of pupils showed the following defects:

46 pupils were inspected.

25 pupils were in need of dental care.

3 pupils had defective vision—uncorrected.

7 pupils were advised to have throat and nose examination by their family physician.

4 pupils had dental care.

1 pupil had special eye examination and defect corrected.
