In Witness Thereof we have met to set our hand and cause the seal of the Town of New Durham to be affixed; done at New Durham, New Hampshire, this twelfth day of February in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and sixty-two.

TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Durham in the County of Strafford, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at twelve of the clock, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

And you are hereby further notified to meet at said Town Hall in said New Durham at seven o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as are necessary to defray the expenses of town government for the ensuing year in accordance with the recommendations of the budget committee.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter plowing in the usual way on the following roads: Valley Road and Cross Road.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the pay of Highway personnel to the State level, in accordance with the recommendation of the budget committee.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Fire Commissioners to dispose of the old Chevrolet chassis, believed to be a 1937 model.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken on Article 7 of the Town Warrant of March 1959 when they voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Collector of Taxes, beginning in March 1960, and hereafter vote to elect a Collector of Taxes, beginning the second Tuesday of March 1963. (By petition.)

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to provide the use of the town hall, at the discretion of the Selectmen, free of charge for youth activities of the town. (By petition.)

Article 9. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to transfer to the New Durham School District a certain tract or parcel of land situated on the westerly side of Ridge Road in New Durham, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the junction of the Ridge Road and the Shirley Road, so called; thence southerly by said Ridge Road 1,000 feet, more or less, to a stake; thence north-westerly by Shirley land 870 feet, more or less, to a stake; thence northeasterly by said Shirley land 1,240 feet, more or less, to a point of beginning, being a triangular parcel.

The transfer be conditioned upon a new school being authorized and the authority to make said transfer be limited to a period of three years from this date. (By petition.)

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to start a tar road on the South Wolfeboro-Middleton Road in the town of New Durham, Said tar to be put on either end of New Durham, of which the Selectmen and Road Agents see fit. (By petition.)

Article 11. To hear the report of the Bi-Centennial Celebration Committee and any other committees due to report.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to celebrate the 200th year of the incorporation of the town and the signing of its charter by fitting exercises and events and to select a committee to carry out the plans they deem advisable. Said committee to work in close cooperation with the Selectmen.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 in addition to the recommendation of the Budget Committee for the Library to be used for the purchase of good recent adult fiction, and that we apply for State Aid to add to this collection so that we may be of better service to the adults of our town. (Recommended by Library Trustees.)

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

MASTER'S REPORT

This is a petition of the Farmington Fish & Game Club., Inc., praying for an abatement of taxes assessed by the Town of New Durham. The parties stipulated and agreed that these proceedings might apply to the years 1958, 1959, 1960 and 1961, — the petitioner reserving the right to pursue his claim for exemption for the years 1960 and 1961 under the provision of RSA Chapter 72, Section 23.

It was agreed that petitioner having met all requirements provided by statute, the petition was properly before the Superior Court.

It was agreed that property was assessed for all years throughout the town at approximately 70% of its true or sound value.

The Master had a view, not only of the property here involved, but also of several other lake-front properties within the Town of New Durham.

Prior to the assessment for the year 1959, the Town employed the New Hampshire Tax Commission to make a complete re-appraisal of property in the Town for tax purposes. The appraisal was made by Robert E. Cunningham, an employee of the Commission. Thereafter the appraisals were spot checked by Cunningham. The Town accepted the sound or fair market values as found by Cunningham.

Cunningham's appraisal of the land was primarily based upon acreage valuation for the years 1957 and 1958 and on water-front valuations for the years 1960 and 1961.

The petitioner's property consists of some hundred or less acres. A good portion of the property fronts on a pond of some thirty or so acres. Also a portion of the land fronts on the highway leading from New Durham to Farmington. Situate on the property is a club house, two boat houses and a restaurant building.

The pond has an average depth of about four feet. It has a muddy bottom. In the upper end of the pond stumps are still showing and in the rear and on one side it is swampy in nature. The pond is not desirable for swimming nor can it be used in safety by motor boats. In its present condition its uses are pretty much limited to non-motor boating and fishing. The petitioner has a gross income of from \$500 to \$700 a year from boat rentals. To make the pond adaptable for other uses would require great expenditures on the part of the developer. He would have to pull the pond down, go in with a bulldozer and other equipment to pull the stumps. Due to the condition of the soil underneath the pond, there is some doubt as to whether heavy equipment could be used. Roadways would have to be built to develop individual lot frontage which would sell in the market.

The buildings situate on the land are all of frame construction. The club house is approximately 24x30 feet and has a porch 10x30. It is in good condition. One boat house 18x30 is in fair condition, — the other boat house 16x26 is in poor condition. The restaurant building consists of an old main building to which two small sections were added later. There are two wells and three septic tanks located on the premises.

The Town placed a sound or fair value of \$7,809.00 on the building improvements and appurtenances exclusive of septic tanks and wells for the years 1958 and 1959 and \$8,170.00 for the years 1960 and 1961. The Master finds that such appraisals were fair and reasonable.

The big problem involved in the case is setting values upon the land and especially that portion thereof which fronts upon the pond. The petitioner's expert testified that, due to the condition of the pond and the cost of development, the pond frontage was without market value. An expert called by the petitionee placed a value of \$20,000.00 upon the same frontage.

For the tax years 1958 and 1959 the taxing authority disregarded the pond frontage as such and taxed all the land on an acreage basis. The five acres of highway frontage were valued at \$420.00 an acre and the balance of the land ranged from \$50.00 to \$20.00 an acre, — a total value for all land of \$8,800 for both years.

For the year 1960 and 1961 a different method of calculating land values was used. The highway frontage was continued at \$420.00 an acre, and the bulk of the rest of the land value was based upon water frontage. The highway frontage valuation was decreased by a depreciation factor of .163% for excess foot frontage in 1961 but no such factor was allowed in 1960.

As values are matters of judgment, the taxing authority can not be held to methematical accuracy. That fact that a portion of the property may be disproportionately taxed is not alone grounds for abatement. Before an abatement may be allowed, it must be shown that the tax the taxpayer has to pay on his entire property is disproportionate. The burden of establishing this fact is on the taxpayer.

In the present case, the Master has considered all the evidence presented including replacement costs, original costs, actual sales or other properties in the town, estimates of experts, evidence of the actual condition of the property, rent and use of property, his view of the property itself and other properties within the town.

In order that the record may be maintained in the future in the same manner as in previous years, the findings here made follow the same divisions of the land as that presently carried on the assessor's computation card. The Master finds the fair or sound value of the land to be the same for all years here involved and to be as follows:

The total sound value for the years 1958 and 1959 is therefore found to be \$14,890.00 and for the years 1960 and 1961 \$15,251.00 using the ratio of 70% as per agreement of the parties, the Master finds the total assessed value for 1958 and 1959 should have been \$10,423.00 and for 1960 and 1961 \$10,675.70.

Recommendation

The Master recommends that the petitioner be granted a rebate to the extent that he was taxed over and above an assessed valuation of \$10,423.00 for the years 1958 and 1959 and over and above \$10,675.70 for the years 1960 and 1961. The Master further recommends that interest be allowed on the amount rebated from December first of each of the respective years to date of rebate.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

In accordance with National Policy, your Civil Defense unit has been alert for any and all information available for the Fallout shelter program. The Director has furnished information to several interested parties for individual shelters and has cooperated with the State C.D. office in a survey of public shelter facilities. We feel that the Town Hall cellar has excellent possibilities for development of a community shelter for over 50 people and as such would be eligible for consideration under the national plan for designating such shelters and providing supplies and equipment.

The Director took the course of training in radiation detection put on by Laconia C.D. He also attended three Meetings for instruction and information; two in Concord and one in Laconia.

We have taken steps to improve our radio communications for emergency use. We have added another crystal to the official RACES Civil Defense network set at the Town Hall and can communicate with either Strafford or Belknap County headquarters. We are also able to communicate on this network with three stations in Alton. Inasmuch as Citizen's Band radio is expanding rapidly and becoming increasingly important we feel that we should become a part of this local network which is being established in Alton and New Durham. We have already set up the organization on paper and have applied for a municipal license for a town network of mobile radios to unify all private sets in case of emergency. To this end we are asking the town for a Citizen's Band radio installation at the Civil Defense control center, in the Town Hall.

We are also on the lookout for Government Surplus supplies and equipment that would be of value to the various departments of the town.

We are constantly alert to see what new possibilities are available for the protection of our citizens either in national or local emergencies. We hope none of our preparation will be necessary to use, but as with the Fire Department, we want to be ready and able to give the best service possible, when needed.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT

Service has been the keynote of the New Durham Library again this year. Our Librarian, Rev. C. Vaughn Overman has been more active this year than ever before in providing quick service from the State Library where he is employed week days, to supplement the limited collection we have in our own library.

As a result of the extra effort of the previous year at Merrymeeting Lake quite a few of our summer residents remembered that we were here this year and we served several patrons who had never been in our library before. We hope to see them again next summer as well as their neighbors.

Our Librarian tells us that the greatest activity this year has been requests for material for school work and the World Book Encyclopedia we purchased a year ago has been in constant demand, as has also the reference material we received through State Aid for the purpose of increasing our service to the school children. Incidently our service to school children has been unique among libraries in that the library has been opened this fall for an additional one or two evenings a week for supervised study with the Librarian actively directing the students in their school work in such areas as they were having difficulty. We feel that our service to our school children is one of our strong points.

Our weakest point is in the field of good adult fiction. There are a great many of our townspeople who have never seen the inside of the library by their own admission. Others have said that they read all the books they were interested in, years ago and haven't been able to find any new books here. Others have said that they were patronizing other libraries because they had new adult fiction. We realize that with our limited budget and the high price of books it is almost impossible to be of much service in this field. Our only hope in this field is in outside help such as State Aid or large private donations. State Aid can be received if we make a positive effort ourselves toward a certain goal and we could receive matching funds as the State Library Commission sees fit if they feel it a worthy goal. To implement this goal we are recommending that the sum of \$200.00 additional be raised and appropriated for the purchase of good recent adult fiction to be selected with the advice of a representative of the State Library and that we apply for State Aid to add to this collection so that we may be of better service to the adults of our town.

It is interesting to note the number of people by age groups whom we have served this year. There were 60 children, 55 adults, and 46 young people of junior and senior high school age, making a total of 161 different people we have served. Our circulation statistics are listed below. We have added 177 new books and discarded 150.

We might add that if more of our people were to ask for more of the recent fiction we could get quite a few from the State Bookmobile. We are using this service a great deal for children's books but very few are in demand on the adult level so we haven't asked for them. We received 915 books this year.

A volunteer project is in progress by Mrs. Janet Berry and Mrs. Mildred Swett consisting of making catalogue cards of our non-fiction books.
