#### TOWN WARRANT

#### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House is said New Hampton on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$711.75 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,745.00.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and tarring of improved Class V roads.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to tar the improved portion of the Pinnacle Hill Road.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,853.41 plus interest to defray the cost of replanking one-half of the lower New Hampton-Bristol Steel Bridge.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve and tar the road leading from the steel bridge towards the mill of Calley and Currier Co.
- 9. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to continue construction of the road leading from the Plaisted School House Road towards the residence of Dean Babbitt.
- 10. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to widen and gravel the .4 mile of road from the Plaisted School House to Henry Benton's and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Forest Fire Equipment.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135.00 for the purchase of an additional length of suction hose for the Precinct Fire Truck.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of Hospitals.
- 14. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of old cemeteries.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and maintenance of the New Hampton Village Cemetery.

- 19. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176.00 to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 20. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176.00 to the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Newfound Region.
- 21. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light near the entrance to the mill of Calley and Currier Co. and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 22. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to deed to the New Hampton Baptist Church, the point of land in front of, and joining the Church property and located between the upper and lower roads.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept bequests as given the Town in the will of the late Ada F. Brown and to make payment of same to the New Hampton Village Cemetery Association.
- 24. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to Gates and Bars, that portion of the Gordon Hill Road, so called, situated on the property of D. Jerome Gordon.
- 25. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system in lieu of the so-called Australian ballot system as provided in Chapter 22 of the Acts of 1943.

- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the construction of a cement floor in the new tractor house.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Ashland Town Line, through the Dickson property, so-called, to the J. J. Smith property, so-called, now owned by Thomas Baxter, a distance of approximately one and one-half miles.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to purchase Workmen's Compensation Insurance to cover its employees, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 30. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to games of Beano be adopted in this town? (This question appears on the printed ballot.)
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local Forest Fire Warden is very glad to report that there were very few forest fires during the year 1950.

The expense to the town for forest fires was a little over \$60 for the entire year. All of our forest fires this year were caused by fires for which no permit had been given. There were 37 permits issued this year.

- No. 1 Always secure a written permit from your Warden before kindling a fire when the ground is not covered with snow.
- No. 2 Be careful with matches and smoking equipment while in or near woodlands. When motoring use ash trays in your car rather than windows.
- No. 3 Call your warden promptly when smoke or fire is seen.
- No. 4 If a fire is kindled without a permit the party is responsible for all costs involved in the warden's investigation.

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in or near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 90% of all forest fires result from human carelessness. We may say forest fires are our most shameful waste.

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of our forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditures of public funds to extinguish them.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the New Hampton School District:

I herewith submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The schools of the nation, state and local districts are faced with a greater responsibility than has been theirs in the past. The future depends almost wholly upon the products of our schools. The youth of today must assume the task of getting the most out of their years of education in order that this knowledge will enable them to bring about and maintain a peaceful world. The citizens of the districts are charged with the responsibility of furnishing the tools, staff and materials with which the training of our youth can be accomplished.

In New Hampton you have provided generously for the improvement of your school plant. When the doors of the Community School were thrown open on September 11, 1950 to greet an opening day enrollment of 72, another milestone in education was reached. You have a building which compares favorably with any in the state. The years of service it will provide for the youth of New Hampton will be many and fruitful.

Your schools opened in September with Mr. George Rochfort, Jr. as Principal, Miss Mildred Currier, teacher of grades 4, 5 and 6, and Mrs. Edith Plant, teacher of grades 1, 2 and 3. A great deal of preparation and planning was done for the opening. The smooth and efficient operation proved the worth of this planning.

A well-knit program was fashioned for the school. Immediately the problem of textbooks became a major one. Again study and thought was needed to determine the starting point. Since the reading system was the only one which had been in use at all schools, no major needs there were evidenced. However, new textbooks and added instructional materials were obtained for the language arts, arithmetic and spelling. It is hoped that future purchases can be made in the fields of history, geography, science and health.

The program of the school has been enriched by making use of the rich human resources that New Hampton has to offer. Instruction in art has been provided through the generosity of Mr. Robbins, local artist. His work has done much to bring about an appreciation of, and an interest in, art. The P.T.A. has generously supported this program by furnishing the materials needed.

Another instance of enrichment of program is the work of Mrs. Bicknell. From her the children of the primary room have had the opportunity to learn singing and dancing games. The intermediate group have this same opportunity and in addition have instruction in square dancing. The Junior High group are receiving instruction in square dancing. All groups are being taught good posture.

Mrs. Watts, the music supervisor, is devoting time beyond the regular school program to give instruction on the piano. Many pupils have availed themselves of this opportunity.

The school lunch program has been one of the highlights of the school. We are most fortunate in having Mrs. Davis as the cook for the program. Meals of well balanced nutritional value are served daily to almost all the children. Mrs. Davis is assisted by some students, and through the efforts of the P.T.A., one mother daily.

Because of recent curtailment of the federal aid on meals the voluntary assistance has helped to keep the cost of meals down. In order to keep the cost of materials to a minimum it was felt that a reexamination of purchasing should be made. The problem of milk appeared to be out of line where cost was concerned. Bids were requested after Blake's Dairy notified the school that they could not supply milk after the first of the year. The low bidder, selected by the Superintendent and the Principal, was Schofield's Dairy. A substantial saving was made in this item. Schofield's is giving satisfactory service.

The school nurse is giving good service to New Hampton pupils. Through her cooperation with the Principal every pupil in the school obtained fluorine treatment for their teeth. Necessary transportation was furnished by the P.T.A.

New Hampton is a most fortunate community in having the Gordon-Nash Library. Through their gererosity the school has the use of a motion picture projector and beaded screen, an adjustable speed automatic record player, a new encyclopedia and many books. Through the efforts of the librarian a meeting was held with the teachers to plan good reading and to bring the library services into the school.

The maintenance of the school plant has given us a great deal of discomfort. In order that the building be maintained properly it should have constant care. Included in the budget request is a sum for janitor service which we hope will allow for the proper plant maintenance.

There are still many things which will command our attention in the future in order to provide for the youth of the community. The old Village School would serve as an excellent building in which a shop program for boys, sewing for girls, and activities programs for all could be carried out. Thought should be given to extending the heating line to the old building to make it usable and comfortable.

Many visitors have called at the school in official and unofficial capacities. All have been loud in their praise of the building. It will continue to be one of the stops for building committees that are planning schools for their communities.

It has been a source of distinct pleasure to work with the P.T.A., the library trustees, School Board, teachers and citizens of New Hampton. The spirit of cooperation and helpfulness abounds. It is heartening that the community is shouldering its responsibility with such determination and are providing the best for its youth. I deeply appreciate this and express the wish that our future relationships continue to be fruitful and worthwhile.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Since the school year is from September 1 to June 30, a report in the middle of the year is not too satisfactory. Perhaps it would be well to explain the routine necessary in covering several towns. In September routine inspections are made, including checking on vaccination of all new-comers. Health records are rearranged according to new grades and new lists of names of those now attending are made, copied from the teachers' registers. Then the complete rounds of all schools are made for weighing and measuring and during this contact it is usually a good time to give individual instruction in health habits.

At the beginning of this year the nurse attempted to set up a schedule of regular visits to each town, but because it is necessary to take doctors' appointments when convenient to them, whether it be for physical examinations in the schools, dental or eye clinics, or other services, a nurse's schedule has to be quite flexible. In New Hampton the physical examination has not been completed at the time this report is written. Dr. Walker has agreed to do this work, sometime in early spring.

My time for the use of the Maico (which is the instrument used for ear-testing) came early in this school year and all present were done when the rounds were made. It is possible that later in the year my district will have a chance to have the machine for a re-checking. With few exceptions, the hearing loss cases found are traceable to wax in the ears or enlarged tonsils and can be corrected.

The next will be the vision testing which will probably come within the next few weeks or whenever the electric machine is available, as several nurses use this equipment.

Dental defects top the list as shown by physical examination. With the shortage of dentists in the

locality, it is almost impossible to keep up with fillings and extractions, to say nothing of cleanings. But most parents persevere and do get the work completed. Having the fluorine team in October was a very satisfactory program, with a hundred per cent attendance and cooperation from the parents. The long distance for transporting seventy children at first seemed out of the question, but the response to a call for drivers and the job accomplished was really greatly appreciated by all, and much thanks is due those who did the transporting.

Some sort of corrective posture work in the schools is quite obviously needed. The orthopedic clinic is available for extreme cases, but the majority of posture defects (which includes flat feet) could better be done by regular daily exercises. In one town when there was a rather large number of children found with flat feet it was possible to arrange a visit from the physical therapist connected with the State Department of Health and instruct the children individually in corrective exercises.

In checking through the school health records, we have found a considerable number of children who have not received immunization against diptheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This is usually done during the child's first year, as is the smallpox vaccination, with a booster dose given before entering school, available through the family physician or to all children up to eight years of age through the State Health Clinic held in all towns, annually.

It seems as if a great deal of time is used transporting children long distances rather than in doing actual work of school nursing, though in some cases it IS important for the nurse to accompany the child. In all cases, except rare emergency, one or the other parent should take part in the effort.

### FINAL REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE

Your building committee has held no formal meetings during the past year, but the Chairman and Clerk have prepared this report as a final summary of the building project.

The completion of the building proceeded smoothly last spring, and, as all must be aware, dedication exercises were held June 14, 1950, in connection with the graduation of eighth grade pupils, the last to be graduated from our old one-room schools. Governor Adams was the principal speaker at the dedication and the building was filled to capacity with many visitors from out of town as well as townspeople.

School opened in the new building on September 11, and on September 18, your Chairman met with the School Board, the Superintendent, the architect and the contractor for a final inspection and approval of the building. At this time the building was formally accepted by the School Board upon approval and recommendation of the architect, subject to completion of a few minor details. Final payment on the general contract was made November 20, 1950.

A report on the expenditure of the building fund and the actual cost of the building may be of interest at this time as only a part of this appears on the School Board's financial statement in this year's town report, which includes no payments made after June 30, 1950, the close of the school fiscal year.

The building costs figure at 57c per cubic foot or \$11.27 per square foot. The architect's fee, exclusive of the \$1,200.00 paid for the new plans prepared when it was decided to abandon the original plans for enlarging the old schoolhouse, amount to somewhat less than the usual 6% of the general contract bid, due to the fact that the first payment was figured on the bids on the original plans. Incidentally, this first payment of \$2,520.00 was made out of surplus funds for the year 1947-48 prior to the sale of the bonds and setting up of the special fund. Miscellaneous expenses of bonds, legal services and insurance amount to about  $1\frac{1}{2}$ % of the total.

Some additional landscaping and improvement of the playground should be done and it is hoped that sale of the Hanaford School and some discarded equipment such as seats and desks may furnish funds for this purpose. It has been the policy of the School Board, however, to retain sufficient furnishings to equip the old schoolhouse should it ever become necessary to use this for classroom purposes.

The work of the building committee is now completed and it is recommended that the committee be discharged.
