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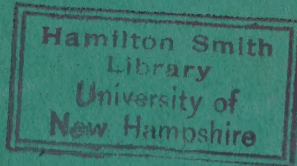

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and polls close at six p. m., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same.

3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II Road known as Mountain Avenue and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,140.00, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$445.37.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town highways.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$920.00 for street lighting.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for care of cemeteries as provided in Chapter 55, Section 4, Laws of 1925.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of that required by law for the Northwood Public Library.

11. To see if the Town will vote a discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before July 15, 1942.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.

13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,350.00 to construct a State Aid bridge on Mountain Avenue.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Serial Notes.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to purchase a chassis for the fire truck at the Ridge.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to improve the public parking place at Lucas Pond.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and ratify the granting of a right-of-way by the Selectmen to New Hampshire Electric Cooperative, Inc., for the purpose of constructing and maintaining its electric lines over and across property owned by the Town.

19. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

Note: Because of the extra dry season, we had to get almost twice as much evergreen as usual, and the Auxiliary worked 50% longer making the usual quantity of wreaths—the evergreen being of very poor quality.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

The 1941 fire season was the worst on record in the State of New Hampshire. More fires occurred, more area was burned over, greater damage was done to our woodlands, higher losses were sustained in other real property burned and the cost of suppressing fires was greater.

There will, perhaps, never be more ideal conditions for fire than existed in 1941. A scarcity of rain left the forests in a highly inflammable condition. The accompanying high winds spread fires with almost lightning rapidity through the parched forest lands. These conditions, coupled with human carelessness, made 1941 outstanding in the state's forest fire record.

As we approach the 1942 fire season, we wonder just what may be in store for us. The woodlands are in as critical condition as they were last year, if not more so. Blown down trees still clutter sizeable acreages of our woodland areas; the increased tempo in lumbering operations due to war demands is each day adding to the fire hazard an ever increasing number of acres of slash land; and we face the coming fire season with greatly reduced personnel, due to the shifting of men from our small communities into the armed forces of the country and into defense industries. If, however, everyone will be careful, if they will follow the rules and regulations laid down for the use of fire in and around woodlands, much of our difficulties will be eliminated—our fires kept few in number with a consequent saving of expense to town and State.

There are so many possibilities for trouble this year it will require the wholehearted and patriotic cooperation of everyone concerned if we are to avoid serious difficulties. Persons hostile to the best interests of our country and subnormal individuals affected by

the excitement of the times may easily cause tremendous confusion and disruption of local activities by deliberately starting fires in our woodlands. Suspicious circumstances connected with every fire should be made known to the proper authorities. Wardens and Deputies are being instructed this year to investigate all fires carefully. Parties at fault will be held strictly responsible. With our forces weakened, it becomes more necessary for everyone to comply with regulations which have been set up to govern the use of fire in our woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden to burn brush or other debris in or near woodlands, or where fire may be communicated to such lands, once the snow has left the ground. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable

a. To a fine not to exceed \$500.00 or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.

b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.

c. For damage to abutting owners if fire runs upon abutters' property.

2. DON'T drop or throw from any vehicle while same is upon a public highway or private way and DON'T drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty with a fine of not more than \$25.00.

3. DON'T fail to promptly notify your local warden of any fires you see.

Defense activities have been receiving the attention of the schools, as well as the rest of the community. Most of the teachers have taken courses as air-raid wardens or special classes in first aid. General instructions have been sent to all schools in regard to shelters, drills, and the special teaching of first aid and responsibilities of a citizen. Mr. Roger D. Hutchins, Chairman of the School Board, and the Superintendent attended the one-day air-raid school for school authorities, held in Concord. Detailed plans for each local school are being worked out by teachers, school board members, and wardens. In case of a warning, children living in the vicinity will be sent home; others will be conducted to places chosen for their safety, and there kept occupied with interesting activities. Care is taken, especially with younger children, to inculcate an attitude of calmness and confidence. Northwood was one of the first towns in the state to have pupils fingerprinted, a few years ago, and arrangements have been made with the State police to complete this as a defense measure. The Academy property and personnel have been most generously devoted to defense needs.

The school nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, reports that all pupils received a health examination. All were found vaccinated. Some defects found were corrected, including complete dental care for 30 pupils by Dr. Manning at the dental clinic sponsored, as for many years previous, by the Harvey Lake Woman's Club. A scientific test of hearing by means of the audiometer showed little impairment. Outside of a few cases of whooping cough, there was no general occurrence of contagious disease in the schools during the year. The nurse took special measures to secure needed orthopedic treatment. The hot lunch program has been continued, with the willing cooperation of teachers, cooks, and pupils, with the assistance of the district appropriation and the federal surplus commodities.

In addition to the regular tests of school intelligence and achievement, the Durrell Individual Analysis of Reading Difficulties has been furnished for use by the teachers. Mrs. Constant and Miss Marison took an extension course with the author of this test this winter. All of our teachers are qualified to administer and score standard tests and to use the results for diagnostic and remedial work, as well as to construct and use their own informal and instructional tests. Our music instruction is quite worth while. The hall at the Ridge should be provided with a stage and piano. Similar improvements at the Narrows have been much appreciated by parents and friends attending graduations and other entertainments. Those having charge of young children would do well to make them familiar with nursery songs and singing games, so that when they come to school they may be able to carry a tune. Such training of the ear in the earliest years would greatly help the later music teaching in school.

James Durling went to represent New Hampshire at the regional contest in dairy cattle judging at the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield, Massachusetts, as a result of a state-wide contest in our state.

The usual Scholarship Contest held at the Teachers Colleges will be suspended for the duration of the war. Our schools are likely to face some serious handicaps as a result of wartime restrictions, but ways will be found to carry on their work, which is so essential to growing the sturdy fiber of the nation.
