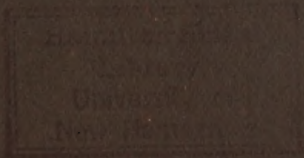

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

Pursuant to an act of the legislature passed at the January session, 1913, entitled "An Act to Establish Water Works in the Town of Pembroke," the selectmen appointed Rufus B. Robinson, Fred W. Saltmarsh, Gedeon Petit, Fred M. Pettengill and George E. Gordon, water commissioners, and said board of water commissioners, after qualifying, organized with Rufus B. Robinson, chairman, Fred W. Saltmarsh, secretary, and George E. Gordon, treasurer.

The first work done by the board was to have a survey made for a pipe line from Pleasant Pond in the town of Deerfield to Suncook village; also a survey for a pipe line up Pembroke Street, with estimates for the cost of constructing said lines. The services of Dudley & Sawyer, hydraulic engineers from Manchester, were secured to make the survey and estimates for the proposed pipe lines, and they completed their survey about June 14, after which a special town meeting was called, at which time the following votes were passed:

First. Voted, that the town of Pembroke, N. H., does and hereby accepts and adopts the act of the legislature passed at the January session, 1913, entitled "An Act to Establish Water Works in the Town of Pemboke."

Second. That the town of Pembroke, N. H., is hereby authorized and empowered to borrow a sum of money not exceeding \$200,000 on the credit of the town, from time to time, as the same is deemed necessary and expedient, for the purpose of defraying the expense of purchasing real estate, rights in real estate, water rights, streams, springs, ponds, lakes and other rights and property for the construction, maintaining, repairing, extending, enlarging and operating said water works, and to issue from time to time the coupon bonds of said town of the denomination of \$500

and \$1,000 each, payable to the bearer, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of each February and August of each year during the life of said bonds; said bonds and coupons to be in the form prescribed by law, agreeable to chapter 43, laws of 1895, entitled "An Act Authorizing Municipal Corporations to Issue Bonds"; said bonds and coupons to be made payable at the National State Capital Bank, Concord, N. H.; said bonds to be signed by a majority of the selectmen and countersigned by the town treasurer according to law. The first series of said bonds to the amount of \$20,000 shall become due and payable ten years from date; thereafter for nine succeeding years, the sum of \$5,000 shall be due and payable each year, and on the twentieth year the balance of all the bonds issued under this said act and this vote shall become due and payable.

And it is further resolved, that all said bonds issued by the authority of said act and this resolution, shall be exempt from taxation when held by the inhabitants of any town in which said water works may extend.

Third. Voted, that the board of water commissioners are hereby authorized to purchase the property, rights and franchises of the Suncook Water Works Company, agreeably to said act of the legislature, and in case said board of water commissioners are unable to agree with the owners of said Suncook Water Works Company on the price of their property, said commissioners are hereby authorized to apply in the name of said town to the trial term of the Superior Court for the county of Merrimack to have the damages determined agreeably to said act of the legislature.

Fourth. Voted, that the construction, management, control and direction of said water works is hereby placed in the board of water commissioners heretofore chosen, or hereafter to be chosen, agreeably to the terms of said act of the legislature, with full power to carry out all the provisions of said act, except as otherwise directed by vote of said town.

Fifth. Voted, that the board of water commissioners are hereby authorized to settle with the owners all damages arising by reason of the terms of section 2 of said act.

Sixth. Voted, that the matter of compensation of said board of water commissioners shall be left with the selectmen to award them reasonable compensation for their services.

The first work done by our commission after the special town meeting was to try to purchase the property of the Suncook Water Company, but could not make a satisfactory trade with them, so we directed our attorney, Nathaniel E. Martin, to make application to the court to have a commissioner appointed to determine what price the town should pay. It is the intention of your water commission to construct a pipe line from Pleasant Pond to Suncook village; also a line up Pembroke Street the coming season so as to have the new supply in readiness as soon as possible after the present system is taken over.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The supervisory district of Penacook, Pembroke and Allenstown was discontinued last summer and a new district constituted, consisting of the towns of Pembroke, Allenstown and Epsom, and Mr. Henry S. Roberts, an experienced educator, was elected superintendent, at a salary of \$1200 a year, Pembroke paying one half his salary and receiving one half his time. Mr. Roberts at once assumed the duties of the office, and established his home at Suncook. This makes a compact district, and gives Pembroke and Allenstown the advantage of a resident superintendent, and we hope for its continuance.

The accompanying report of the superintendent sets forth fully the condition and needs of the schools, and its suggestions and recommendations merit careful consideration.

The contract with the trustees of Pembroke Academy for high school instruction expires this spring. The school board recommends its renewal, and has put an article in the school meeting warrant for that purpose.

Minor repairs have been made on the schoolhouses during the year; they are in fairly good condition, and no extensive repairs will have to be made for the coming year.

The amount of receipts for the past year has been less than in previous years and than was anticipated when the last school meeting was held. This was due to failure to qualify for state aid through lack of attendance large enough to meet the requirements of the law. The amount of such aid for the previous year was \$1,036.75. Under the amended law, it is reasonably certain, the district will qualify the present year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Board and Citizens of Pembroke:

I have the honor of submitting to you my first report of your schools.

In this report I briefly discuss some educational problems of general interest with suggestions for making the school curriculum more efficient.

The New Ideal in Education.

In speaking of the new ideal in education there is grave danger of being misunderstood; or, at least, of not being correctly and thoroughly understood in what we mean by that term. The important and distinctive function of the school is the development of the entire child, mentally, morally and physically. The method by which this development is obtained, rather than the result, constitutes the novelty of the ideal.

The offering of more ample and varied opportunities and exercises for development, and the giving to the child a greater power of self-adjustment to his environment, comprise what is vital and important in the new ideal in education.

The Parent-Teachers Association.

The school is but one of five organized social agencies for helping and uplifting humanity, each, of course, in its own way,—the home, school, church, community and state.

Delinquent parents demand of the school the work which is the legitimate duty of the home; the church, whose duty it is to teach righteousness, makes urgent demands upon the school; business demands a higher degree of skill than the school is able to confer; the state demands that the school send out law-abiding, honest and upright citizens. These five agencies must reinforce one another, and when each

assumes its own share of responsibility and leaves the school to perform its specific duty of development, then and not until then, may we realize the fullest service of the school.

The Parent-Teachers Association as an organization composed of parents, citizens and teachers, offers an opportunity for these five agencies to work unitedly for the uplift of school and community. Regular meetings should be held where educational, social and civic problems be discussed, questions asked and opinions freely given.

The teachers of Allenstown, Epsom, Hooksett and Pembroke formed an association with the hope of interesting parents and citizens in this movement. Temporary officers were elected to serve until permanent officers could be chosen from among parents and citizens. The two meetings which have been held were well attended by the public. At the second one State Superintendent Morrison clearly and forcibly explained the aim of, and benefits resulting from, this organization. At this meeting Miss Alice Harris, assistant superintendent of the schools of Worcester, Mass., gave a talk on Reading, which was sound, thorough and helpful.

The Schoolhouse as a Social Center.

The public school plant, idle half the time, should be made to furnish the social center for the many and varied community interests. The spelling school, literary debates or lyceum, the singing school and other amusements indulged in a generation ago, could be revived with interest and profit and more modern social and economic needs discussed. Humanity is always seeking social enjoyment, and if wholesome amusement is not furnished in rural communities the boys and girls will migrate to the large social centers.

Another and equally important benefit of the social center is the getting of the people together for the influence of the gathering in producing harmony of thought and unity of action.

Manual Training and Domestic Science.

The introduction of manual training and domestic science in the school curriculum would make a great advance in our school results. Their educational value is twofold,—disciplinary and practical.

Work is done for the purpose of training the hand and the eye and to familiarize the child with constructive principles and methods. The aim is not only to make an object of value, but more important to know how to make it. Of equal importance is manual training in its power to arouse an interest to remain in school and to perform more accurately and intensely the work of the rest of the daily program.

The School Home.

The school home is an important factor in the education of the child and its influence leaves a lasting impression upon the mind either for the beautiful or for the ugly. It has been truthfully said: "The public school is the place to which we should turn chief attention in our effort to promote a more beautiful life in America. The schoolhouse and school grounds should be beautiful and the child should be surrounded by beauty in the schoolroom from first to last. Trained in the habit of seeing beauty and knowing it, he will come instinctively to hate ugliness in the house and in the street as he goes out in life."

To do good mental and moral work, the child needs a clean, well-heated, properly lighted and ventilated school building and beautiful surroundings. Whittier, feeling the absence of these beneficent influences which broaden and ennoble life and enrich human experience, said:

"Still sits the schoolhouse by the road,
A ragged beggar sunning."

A child having gone to school amid beautiful surroundings will look back to it with pride and say with the poet Schiller:

“It is only through the morning gate of the beautiful that you can penetrate into the realm of knowledge. That which we feel here as beauty we shall know one day as truth.”

Attendance.

There is no one thing to be named which contributes so largely to the perplexities of the teacher and to the injury of the scholar as irregular attendance. Real sickness of the child is a reason for absence from school and in some instances illness in the family. If parents would visit the schools to familiarize themselves with the necessity of punctuality of the scholars, both for the progress of the school and the formation of good character in their children, they would, I think, co-operate more heartily with the teachers in securing perfect attendance.

In conclusion, I wish to say that in general the schools of this district are well governed and are making a commendable degree of progress. While certain conditions are unfavorable and need constant and intelligent effort for improvement, yet it is doubtless true that the schools of this district compare favorably with schools of corresponding communities.

The citizens of Pembroke are to be congratulated for the establishment in their midst of the Pembroke Academy. It behooves parents to be more earnest to respond to this great educational advantage by having their sons and daughters trained with the higher general culture of this institution.

I desire to thank the citizens, teachers and school board for their assistance and hearty co-operation.
