TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. \$6500. is approved by the finance committee.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$5700.00 is Approved.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanding roads. \$800.00 is Approved.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges. \$500. Approved.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$25.00 Approved.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. The sum recommended to be raised as a whole is \$250. Approved.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for repair of road equipment, road maintenance and general highway. \$1000.00 is Approved.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the support of

the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and apprise taxable property.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Tarvia. \$2500.00 is Approved.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep and maintenance of the Tamworth Fire Precinct. \$500.00 is Approved.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep of the Wonalancet Fire Precinct. \$100.00 is Approved.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$162.00 to the Lake Region Association for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising of the town calling attention to the resources and natural advantages in cooperation with other town in the Lake Region. Approved by Committee.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for white pine blister rust control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Not Approved.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 to be divided equally among the three road agents for cutting bushes on the road side. Approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the upkeep and care of shrubs and plants around the Town Buildings. Approved.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real-estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for Laconia Hospital, North Conway Hospital, and Huggins Hospital. The sum recommended by your committee is \$100.00 to Laconia Hospital, and \$25.00 each to the other two. Approved.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency. Approved.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Firemen's Insurance, which is at the rate of \$3.00 per year for each member in good standing of the Firemen's Association. This being in compliance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, Section IV chapter 146 Paragraph 16. Approved.

22. To see if the town will vote to purchase Six \$1000.00 Government Bonds, to be paid out of town surplus and set up as a sinking fund with the \$2000. Bonds purchased last April, making a total of \$8000.00 that can be used by a vote of the town for post war projects. Approved.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to drain and improve the road from Lamont Smith's house to Prof. N. Henry Black's residence. \$200. Approved.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$378.29 for town road aid, the State contributing the sum of \$1513.16 Approved.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to meet printing, postage and other expenses of a Council or Committee to arrange possible work for home coming Veterans. Approved.

26. To Choose a Selectman for three years; Also to Choose a Selectman for one year; to choose a Town

Clerk, Tax Collector, Town Treasurer, Highway agents, Auditors and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

27. To see if the town will vote to keep the polls open until six of the clock in the afternoon.

28. To transact any other business that may come legally before said meeting.

In spite of difficulties we have made real progress this past year by achieving our goal of establishing a year round Nursing Service. We are grateful for the generous response for extra funds from the Town and summer friends.

We were sorry to have Miss Lang leave us in October. Because of the shortage of trained nurses we are temporarily carrying on with an excellent Practical Nurse, Mrs. Elizabeth Buck, who is giving her services to the Townspeople where ever and when ever needed.

Clinics were attended in Sanbornville, Concord and Laconia.

Dental clinics were held with 42 children receiving dental certificates.

The Pre-school clinic in Town Hall in September was very successful, 27 children coming for examinations and 14 receiving toxoid.

Dressings were sterilized at Laconia Hospital. Our finances are in good condition as shown by the Treasurer's report.

Because of transportation restrictions we are still meeting only every other month.

The following Committee is responsible for maintaining the Nursing Service, meetings, membership, etc. We shall endeavor in the coming months to continue our same high standards of Nursing Service.

TAMWORTH FIRE PRECINCT

Commissioners Report

During the period (Jan. 1, 1943 to Dec. 31, 1943) there were 23 fires including a call to Freedom for assistance at a woods fire. Of these fires 12 were chimney fires, one due to sparks on a wooden roof, one overheated chimney, 4 due to lightning, one due to an unprotected stove pipe in a wooden partition, one caused by sparks from a B & M R. R. Engine, one automobile fire and 2 unknown.

From this it will appear that most fires are caused by lightning and chimneys.

The total fire damage for the above period amounted to \$604.19 — a very low figure for the third consecutive year.

As you know there is a great scarcity of man power to handle fire apparatus. At the same time there never was such a great potential exposure as at present, due in great measure to the immense slash areas.

All persons are urged to use every precaution, and not to burn brush or refuse of any kind unless the ground is snow covered or unless you receive written permission from Warden E. H. Remick.

Application has been made to the Federal Govt. for the "loan" of a new 500 gallon front mounted pump to be installed, if acquired, on the 1932 Ford. The cost to the Gov't would be \$1300, and the town would not be called on to pay more than the small cost of installation. This pump would, if secured, be of value especially at present, to help take care of large slash areas and resulting fires.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard has been and is

being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

SCHOLARSHIP

Your School Board is very happy indeed to announce the granting of a college scholarship to the students of Tamworth High School.

The scholarship is open to any student who has attended the Tamworth High School for a period of four years. The award will be made to that boy or girl who has the best all round record in the four years, with emphasis placed on scholarship, spirit and co-operation. The scholarship is for four years and amounts to five hundred dollars each year. In other words, that boy or girl who receives it will receive in the four years of college a total of two thousand dollars.

The period of the scholarship is for ten years, which is to say that ten of our boys or girls have an opportunity of receiving it.

It is unnecessary to point out that this scholarship is something unusual. It offers to the boys and girls of Tamworth an opportunity of the greatest importance and value, and should stimulate them in their work at school.

Although your School Board is not at liberty at present to name the donor of the scholarship, it can publically express appreciation for the splendid opportunity our boys and girls now have.

ARTICLE TEN OF WARRANT

For a number of years now, your school board has had under consideration a proposal to move the Elementary pupils to the first floor of the High School, and move the High School to the top floor. There are many reasons for this, which we feel are apparent.

In the first place, should there ever be a fire in the building, it would undoubtedly be necessary to use the fire escape. The hall well serves as a flue, and flames would undoubtedly sweep up making use of the fire escape imperative. The children in the Elementary grades are familiar with the fire escape, and fire drills are held periodically to keep them familiar with the procedure. However, it is one thing to conduct a quiet fire drill, and quite another to go through the same procedure under stress of an actual fire. We feel that the older boys and girls would be infinitely more capable to make use of the fire escape, should it ever become necessary. We feel this to be especially true since a fire would probably occur in the winter when the fire escape would be icy. It would be possible to evacuate the two downstairs rooms in a matter of seconds, and the youngsters occupying them would be out of the building before any fire could make any appreciable progress. From a safety angle then, we feel the change is most desirable.

In the second place, there would be less use of the stairs by the children of the elementary grades, and this would make for more quiet in the building.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Tamworth:

This report is submitted to you after only two weeks in your Union. I am particularly pleased to begin work here as it brings me back to a part of New Hampshire with which I am somewhat familiar. I anticipate a great deal of pleasure from being your Superintendent of Schools.

School supervision in Union 36 has been upset the last few months because of the changes in superintendents. Much of the responsibility which is normally the administrator's has had to be assumed by the school board members. They and the teachers are to be commended for the fine conditions that have been maintained in the schools.

The Scholarship Fund reported to you by your School Board is an excellent contribution for the cause of education by some friend of the Tamworth schools.

Tamworth has been fortunate in having the following teachers this year: Mr. Joseph Bragdon, Headmaster of the High School; Mrs. Helen M. Hamill, assisting in the High School; Mrs. Carroll Grace, Primary, 1 - 4; Mr. Edwin Blackey, grades 5 - 8; Mrs. Elva Bickford, grades 1 - 4, South Tamworth; Mrs. Ruth V. Chick, grades 5 - 8; Miss Frances Thompson, Chocorua, and Mrs. Marion Bickford, Chocorua. Extreme scarcity of teachers makes us wonder how all positions will be filled for the school year 1944 - 1945. This year former teachers felt a sense of patriotic duty to return to the profession when local conditions became critical. I assume that it will be from this group that many districts will find faithful teachers.

Citizens of Tamworth undoubtedly recognize the fact that the costs of maintaining schools are rising along with the increased cost of everything else. Taxes, living conditions, and the great scarcity of teachers have necessitated increased salaries; the cost

of materials and labor makes all kinds of repairs higher, and other expenses have risen proportionally.

It seems extremely important during these times of unsettled conditions that the best education possible in reading, writing, arithmetic and citizenship be maintained. This necessitates an unusual amount of effort, thought and patience on the part of citizens, teachers and pupils. It is only through the cooperation of all concerned that the generation now growing up can be given an adequate education.
