#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

#### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the report of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges, and take any action relating thereto.
- **5.** To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$246.43, the State to contribute \$1,642.88.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for Civil Defense.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or set aside for the purchase of fire equipment.
- 8. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay Town note due Laconia National Bank due December 31, 1952.

- 9. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
- 11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library purposes.
- 12. To raise and appropriate money for Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.
- 13. To raise and appropriate money for Parks and Playgrounds.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for a Doctor's bonus or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.
- **16.** To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Week and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 17. To raise the sum of \$1,000.00 toward Village sidewalks and authorize the selectmen to hire money to complete the same payable \$1,000.00 a year the first note payable December 31, 1953.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$54.98 to the White Mountain Regional Association.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Industrial and Development Committee and raise money for same.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$2,500.00 to be used as the balance needed to purchase a new fire truck and vote to buy same.
- 21. To see what action the Town will take relative to the purchase of settees or chairs for Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase land and buildings known as the Warren Garage from Ronald Graves, to be used for storing town equipment and raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.
- 23. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the Town.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1952 and determine the date and percentage of same.
- 25. To authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 26. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

#### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Warren for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agents, Library Trustees and Trustees of Trust Funds.

#### **Financial Statements**

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1950—Dec. 31, 1951 (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1950 and December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$2,200.72 during 1951.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$669.75, plus a net revenue surplus of \$441.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,110.78.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1951, is indicated in Exhibit F.

#### **Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

#### **General Comments**

#### National Forest Reserve Fund:

It is noted that the full amount of the National Forest Reserve Fund, \$540.06, was included in the 1951 budget and tax rate calculation sheet as estimated revenue. Inasmuch as one half of this fund, \$270.03, was paid over to the school district as required by law, only one half of the total amount of anticipated revenue from this source should be included as estimated revenue in the town budget.

#### Cemetery Trust Fund Income:

Inasmuch as the income from the cemetery trust funds is expended in addition to the amount appropriated for cemeteries, the cemetery trust fund income should not be included as an estimated revenue item in the town budget and tax rate calculation sheet.

#### Conclusion

The accounts of all town officers which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting and

financial procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the prescribed methods and procedure.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Warren for their assistance during the course of the audit.

In the summer of 1951 we drew up, and had published, advertising folders for the town. We have quite a supply of these on hand for use in the coming months.

We have scheduled a conference with the Industrial Division of the New Hampshire Planning and Development Commission for February 21st and hope to receive further advice from that source.

Many small towns have the same type of committee and are finding it a slow process, but not a discouraging one. This committee is prepared to continue with its present procedure and also hopes to open new ways to meet our problem.

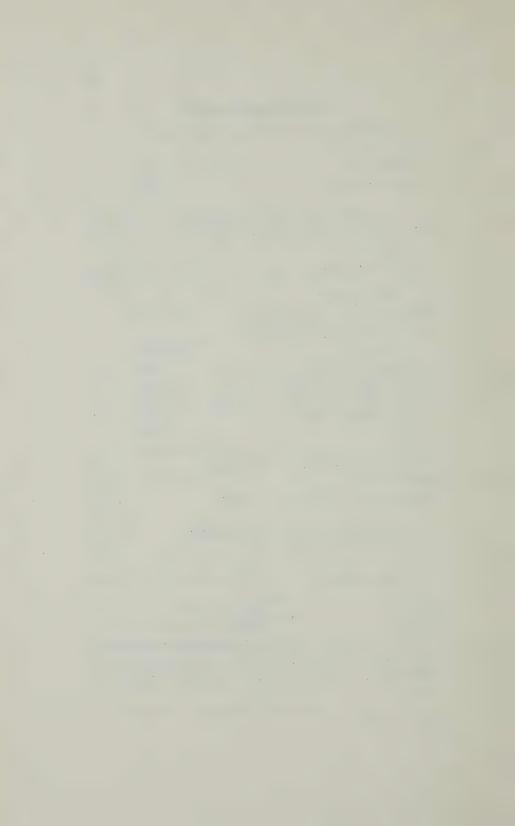

The consolidated school opened on September 5th, 1951, with an enrollment of 90 pupils, including five

from Benton. There were also 29 secondary pupils from Warren registered in high schools.

Mr. John Ahern, of Plymouth, replaced Mr. Fleming as principal and teacher of grades 7 and 8. Miss Rita Blaney of Bethlehem replaced Mrs. Hackett in grades 5 and 6. Both Mr. Ahern and Miss Blaney have degrees in education from Plymouth Teachers College. Mr. Ahern had previously taught at Seabrook, N. H. Mrs. Helen Evans and Mrs. Barbara Pike continue with their excellent work in grades 3 and 4 and 1 and 2 respectively. Mrs. Christie Goodwin Ritchie replaced Miss Emery as music supervisor. Mrs. Muriel LaMott of Haverhill has replaced Miss Helen Latulippe, who resigned last May, as district nurse.

The school board is to be commended for continuing its plan of redecorating one or more rooms each year, thus keeping the building in excellent condition. Movable furniture was purchased to accommodate the increased enrollment in the 7th and 8th grade room. It is hoped that this type of furniture will be used more extensively each year.

The P.T.A. has again made a valuable contribution to the school in providing facilities for the school lunch program, as well as other projects during the year. Since the school tries to develop the physical, as well as the mental growth of the child, these programs have unseen values which are most important. Mrs. Keysar continues to act, not only as cook, but as school lunch supervisor, in her usual efficient capacity.

The secondary school costs now being charged to tuition paying districts are more nearly reaching actual instructional and operational cost levels, where previously only cost of instruction was charged. This change makes the advisability of a cooperative secondary school, which was so strongly recommended three years ago, even more pertinent, both in terms of a more economical tuition cost basis and in terms of val-

ue received for dollars spent. Warren's share of the estimated cost of building such a school would amount to approximately 63 cents per week for an owner of taxable property assessed at \$5,000. Can the district afford not to work toward such a school to accomodate grades VII through XII? May I strongly recommend that a planning committee be appointed at the annual school district meeting to make further study of the project.

This splendid cooperation on the part of the P.T.A., the parents, the teachers, and school board members is greatly appreciated by me, and for which I wish to express my thanks. Our great concern is the need for continued emphasis upon education for democracy.

Continuously heavy lumbering operations following the hurricane has produced more than 4 billion board feet of lumber. This lumber helped win World War II, meet post war needs and now the current requirements for the Korean military action. But it has added nearly 900,000 acres of slash to our already sizeable slash problem.
