TOWN MEETING

March 13, 14 & 29, 1990

The annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator, R. Bruce Smith on Tuesday, March 13, 1990 at 11:00 a.m. with the reading of Articles One and two of the Warrent and declaring the polls open. The remainder of the Articles are to be considered on Wednesday, March 14 at 7:00 p.m. after a recess.

Article 1 - To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The result of balloting was as follows:

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Ballot vote: All Zoning Changes voted in the affirmative and declared approved by the Moderator.

Polls declared closed at 7:00 p.m. by Moderator, R. Bruce Smith with Town Meeting to resume at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 14.

Town Meeting was called to order Wednesday, March 14, 1990 at 7:08 p.m. after recessing the evening before.

The 1950's mural by Everett Warner was displayed for the viewing pleasure of the Townspeople during the 1990 Town Meeting.

Moderator R. Bruce Smith read the results of Articles 1 & 2.

ARTICLE 3 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130,000 for the relocation of Partridge Brook Road and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$100,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. The balance of \$30,000 to be raised by general taxation. Bond or note to be paid off in five years.

Discussion: Concern that to repair the old bridge would exceed the costs of moving the road to the other side of the corn field (North of its position now). Old bridge would be torn up and road torn up also and used as fill in road's new location if article is passed. To replace bridge, Selectmen say State's estimate of the cost would be \$575,000 of which the state would pay 2/3 of the estimate and would be done sometime after three years. Town could relocate the road this year. To tear up the bridge is estimated to cost \$5,000. Road relocation would eliminate costs of bridge maintenance and avoid spring flooding as new location is higher than present location.

Selectmen feel if bridge remains as is, weight load should be reduced from 6 ton (as is now) to 3 ton. Discussion of closing the road was met with much concern of Fire Protection of those who live on the river if Fire Trucks, etc. have to detour around Park Hill.

Commissioners state that bridge and road lands need to be even swap in order not to lose corn crop.

It was stated that the Town Highway crew could complete the job in approximately eight weeks and that it would take an estimated 22,000 yards of fill. Some of the work would be contracted out. Question as to capability of Town's equipment to handle this much work was raised. Concern as to if it would cost us more in repair of equipment than to bid this job out and save on our present equip-

ment was voiced.

Questions then moved and seconded.

Polls opened at 7:29 p.m. - Ballot vote: must be 2/3 majority.

Polls declared closed at 8:29 p.m.

Article voted in the negative and does not pass.

Motion was made to continue with warrant while waiting the one hour while waiting for polls to close. Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4 - To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take any action relative hereto. Moved and seconded.

Motion made to amend the 1989 Town Meeting minutes printed in the Annual Report as follows:

In the heading, after 11:00 a.m. to add: Tuesday, March 14th; and after 7 p.m. to add: Wednesday, March 15th.

In ARTICLE 1, under Auditors: change for one year Kathryn DeFreitas 24* to: for two years Kathryn DeFreitas 24*

In ARTICLE 9, to add: Motion made from the floor to raise and appropriate \$10,000 to use as Selectmen see fit to begin a Recycling Station in Town. Motion was made and seconded and voted in the affirmative.

In the last line of minutes to change 9:45 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. March 14th. Amendment moved and seconded. Article voted in the affirmative as amended.

ARTICLE 5 - To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the Jotham Lord Fund.

It was moved to place monies toward use by the Town Library. Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6 - To see if the Town will permit school activities and the playing of basketball in the Town Hall under regulations prescribed by the Selectmen, until the next Annual Meeting.

Moved to accept, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7 - To see if the Town will vote to accept a bequest of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) under the Will of Frances T. Neff for the use of the Westmoreland Public Library.

Voted to accept, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8 - To see if the Town will vote to accept One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) from the Great Meadow Grange to establish a scholarship for a Westmoreland Senior.

Moved to accept and seconded.

Discussion: This scholarship is to be awarded to the Town's most improved High School Senior in his/her four years of high school through the Trustees of Trust Funds. Information as to determination of how this is to be is written out in the original documentation of monies and is on file with the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9 - To see if the Town will vote to accept new Cemetary Trust Funds in the amount of \$1,225.

Moved to accept, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10 - To see if the Town will vote to allow the Conservation Commission to have up to seven (7) members and up to three (3) alternate members in accordance with RSA 36-A.

Moved to accept and seconded.

Discussion: Voted at 1973 Town Meeting to have three members. The Commission would like to have up to seven members and three alternates as allowed.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 11 - To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for the Conservation Commission for 1990.

Moved to appropriate and seconded.

Discussion: Monies to be used for fees, stationary products and mailings, etc.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12 - To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990, and that day shall be set aside for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching "Decade of the Environment".

Moved and seconded.

Discussion: "Plant a tree and touch a life of the next generation." If any have ideas or are in need of ideas, contact Marshall Patmos or Marshall Gordon.

Voted in the affirmative.

Motion made to skip over Article 13 due to ballot vote requirement on this Article and return to this Article when Article 3 is counted and to take in Article 14 while waiting.

Motion seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance for the Operation of the Westmoreland Transfer Station and Recycling Facility:

1. Purpose

This Ordinance provides for the proper, efficient disposal of solid waste for the Town of Westmoreland through the operation of a Transfer Station and Recycling Facility.

2. Admission

The Transfer Station and Recycling Facility will be open for use by residents and property owners of the Town of Westmoreland. A Transfer Station Permit sticker, available at the Town Hall, must be plainly visible. Each household is allowed one permit at no charge. The fee for a second permit is one dollar; the fee for additional permits is five dollars each.

At this Facility, there will be no commercial dumping and no disposal of waste generated outside the Town of Westmoreland.

The Transfer Station and Recycling Facility will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Wednesday and Saturday throughout the year exclusive of the Holidays of Christmas, New Year's Day, Memorial Day and July 4.

3. Recyclables

Recycling of the following items is mandatory:

- A. Glass - according to color: clear, brown and green
- B. Newspapers
- C. Aluminum cans
- D. HDPE Plastic (milk jugs, most opaque plastics)
- E. PET Plastic (soda containers)
- F. Corrugated Cardboard
- G. Magazines

4. Items accepted at Transfer Station

- A. Ordinary household, non-hazardous waste - no charge
- B. Compostable garden waste - no charge
- C. Brush and tree limbs up to five inches in diameter; burnable building material scraps - no charge
- D. Miscellaneous Items:
 - Appliances - \$10
 - Lawnmowers, Bicycles - \$3
 - Tires: Car tires - \$2; Truck tires - \$4
 - Batteries - \$2
 - Motor Oil - no charge
 - Bulky items (mattresses, box springs) - \$5

5. Items Not Accepted at Transfer Station

- A. Hazardous Waste - as defined in NH Solid Waste Rules Part He-P 1901.03 (v)
- B. Dead Animals
- C. Sludge and Septic Wastes

6. Violations

It shall be a violation of this Ordinance and other Town and State Ordinance to dump trash at or near the gate to this Facility, to dispose of trash along the roadways, and to maintain "home dumps" to avoid the intent of this Ordinance. The gate will be locked at all times when the Facility is not open to the public. Anyone entering the Facility when the gate is locked is guilty of trespass and shall be charged with violating the terms of this Ordinance. Containers shall be opened at the request of the attendant to verify that recyclables are being separated and disposed of properly. Failure to comply with this request shall be a violation of this Ordinance.

7. Penalty

Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall not be permitted to use this facility until such time as the Selectmen reinstate the privilege, and such person may be subject to a fine of up to \$250 for each violation.

8. Provisions

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision of this Ordinance nor the validity of this Ordinance as a whole. This Ordinance may be amended by the Selectmen after a duly posted public hearing.

Moved and Seconded.

Discussion: To request of the Selectmen that receipts could be given for articles of which tipping fees are charged.

Request that road clean-up should not be charged. It was requested by the Selectmen that the individual involved in road clean-up should see the Selectmen on an individual basis of this problem.

In August, the Town was awarded the full \$10,000 grant of matching funds for recycling. Selectmen are using these funds to purchase bins for recyclables and a pole barn with a cement floor to keep the recyclables under cover.

Question as to closing of the dump was still hanging over our heads. Selectmen stated that the Engineer sent all tests to the State and other information of what the Town has done to the State. We haven't heard back from the State on these as of yet.

Discussion on change of hours from 8 to 5 to 8 to 4 on Wednesday and Saturday. Strongly urged the Selectmen to change hours back. Cost difference would run approximately \$1,000 to \$1,500 per year. Hours can be changed under provisions #8.

In #2 Admissions, Paragraph 3, "No commercial dumping" is said by the Selectmen to mean other dumping outfits. Items from Town businesses can be dumped in the Town in which the business is.

Motion made to amend Article 14, #2 Admission, Paragraph 4, Hours to read "8 AM to 4PM Wednesdays and 9 AM to 5 PM Saturdays"..

Amendment moved and seconded.

Amended article voted in the affirmative.

Polls declared closed on Article 3 at 8:29 pm

Results read by Moderator when counted. See Article 3 for results.

ARTICLE 13 - By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to adopt provisions of RSA 72:28 V & VI for and optional exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for Veterans seeking exemptions. The optional Veteran's exemption is \$100 rather than \$50.

Moved and seconded. Polls closed at 9:01 p.m.

Ballot vote: Yes 72 No 61

Article voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 17 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to paint the Town Hall at a cost not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

Moved and seconded.

Discussion: Painting would be external, including the steeple. It will be painted with two coats and will be put to bid.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 18 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt optional adjusted elderly exemption from the property tax. The optional exemption based on assessed value, for qualifying taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 to 75 years of age \$10,000; for a person 75 years up

to 80 years \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his/her spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$12,000; and own net assets of \$25,000 or less excluding the value of the person's residence.

Moved and seconded.

Discussion: Net income is clarified as net taxable income by the Selectmen. Person's residence includes regular furnishings. It is thought at most there would be ten residents in Town applying for this exemption and are in need of this. Polls declared closed at 9:28 p.m.

Ballot vote: Yes 106 No 7

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 19 - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may be available during the course of the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 20 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$491, 332, which represents the bottom line of the posted budget (MS -7). Said sum is inclusive of all special articles addressed.

Moved and seconded.

Moved to read: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$361,332 which represents the bottom line of the budget (MS-7). Said sum is inclusive of all special articles addressed except Article 3, concerning the relocation of Partridge Brook Road.

Seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 21 - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 22 - To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Mention made to advise Selectmen that new constable should patrol Partridge Brook Road due to bridge safety.

Motion from the floor (Arthur Steinheuser) to reconsider Article 3. Seconded (by Richard Stavseth).

Discussion: It is costing us every day to send busses all the way around Park Hill. Maybe we should close the road and re-address the issue next year. Cannot put a price on a life possibly lost due to bridge safety.

Motion made to move questions.

Request for a ballot vote made.

Ballot vote: Polls closed at 10:09 p.m.

 Yes 54 No 26

Voted in the affirmative.

Motion to recess Town Meeting until Thursday, March 29, 1990 at 7:00 p.m. to reconsider Article 3.

Meeting recessed at 10:20 p.m.

*Unapproved Minutes.

Town Meeting was called to order on March 29, 1990 at 7:06 p.m. to reconsider Article 3.

Notes explained before meeting to begin were that NO STANDEES in the Hallway would be allowed. If anyone is to speak, they must use the microphone as there are people downstairs also. Also, we cannot reconsider a reconsidered meeting.

Motion we re-read by Moderator R. Bruce Smith.

ARTICLE 3 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130,000 for the relocation of Partridge Brook Road and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$100,000 of bonds and notes in accordance with provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Town officials to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes and determine the rate of interest thereon. The balance of \$30,000 to be raised by general taxation. Bond or note to be paid off in five years.

Motion made by Arthur Steinheuser and Seconded by Richard Stavseth. Discussion: The distance of Partridge Brook Road from Rt 63 to the River Road is 1.2 miles; the distance from the same point on Route 63, around Park Hill, down River Road South is 2 miles. This means time is lost in emergencies. In safety services, the first 2-3 minutes are the telltale of what is to happen.

The Road Agent, Wesley Staples was asked to explain the situation as he saw it. He thought we should relocate the road. The State recommends that a 3 ton passenger car alone should be posted. The abutments are gone. By relocating, there would be no bridge maintenance. It would be far enough away from the spring flooding. We cannot use just a culvert on this road - it must be a bridge in this area; it is a 30' span. To rebuild this 1920's bridge would not be worth the money as the cement underneath is all gone. We can post this for 3 ton limit but cannot tell how long the bridge will hold up even at that.

Debate on closing of the road. Too badly needed to be closed. Costing the Town approximately \$750 per year to re-route busses. The road could be done by fall if the Town votes it through.

Motion to move questions. Seconded.

Polls declared open at 7:24 p.m.

Polls declared closed at 8:24 p.m.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 19: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN & STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.

1990 began on a positive note for the planning arm of the Monadnock Area Solid Waste Districts. 149 M received 10 solid proposals from a variety of Solid Waste Reduction/Disposal Companies in response to the 1989 RFP (Request For Proposals). A comprehensive review of these proposals was conducted by the District Technical Committee in the spring of 1990. The various types of technology included: incineration, compaction and encapsulation, commercial landfills and composting. Evaluation criteria included costs, company experience, company financial strength and a variety of environmental and permitting concerns. Based largely on lowest projected service fee and local political support, the composting solution offered by the Bedminster Bioconversion Co. of N.J. was recommended for further consideration. In July of 1990, the SWSWMD turned the study over to the AVRDD towns for evaluation. The remainder of 1990 was relatively quiet as the SWSWMD towns followed the review process being conducted by the AVRDD. Anticipating that the schedule for 1991 would remain similar, 149 M passed forward a budget fully funded from reserve monies. No dues are assessed to the towns for 1991.

53 ASHUELOT VALLEY REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

1990 was quite a busy year for the implementation group of towns. We began with an active search for a Recycling Consultant to assist Wendy Smith and the District in formulating an RFQ/RFP for a District wide recycling effort. Considerable discussion occurred on exactly what role the District should play in recycling. While some towns were quite successful with their own programs, others had difficulties with the marketing of certain materials. Deliberations continued through the summer and into the fall with the District Consultant and the District Recycling Committee.

The AVRDD conducted a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in the spring of 1990. Normally scheduled in the fall, this years Spring Day seemed to go well, bringing forward some new participants.

In July, the AVRDD formed a "Selection Committee" chaired by Wayne Whippie of Westmoreland. The committees purpose was to conduct a more complete review of the Composting Proposal presented by Bedminster Bioconversion. If the outcome was positive, the District might then enter into formal negotiations. After considerable evaluation by District Engineers and committee members, a split decision in support of Bedminster was passed on to the District in November. The District voted to support Bedminster by a wide margin, subject to a commitment from the city of Keene, the District's largest member. The city of Keene formed a Solid Waste Sub-Committee of the City Council to evaluate the solid waste options available to the city in December. The AVRDD year ended in an "on hold" mode, awaiting word from Keene prior to proceeding.

Once again, the difficult task of finding an economic and environmentally acceptable solution to our Regions Solid Waste Disposal problems has ended the District.

RECYCLING

During 1990, the terms of the Governor's Recycling Program were fulfilled: one more container for the recyclables was purchased (five containers had been purchased in 1989); the pole building to shelter the recyclables was constructed; and the \$10,000 matching grant money was presented to the Town.

Starkey Builders, with assistance from the Road Department, constructed the 19' x 55' pole barn style shelter. Some used materials were incorporated, in the spirit of recycling, and the cost of the building was held to a minimum.

In the past year, the recyclables totaled:

- 150 cu. yds. newspaper (the County Farm shreds our newspaper for cattle bedding)
- 80 cu. yds. glass - or approximately 33 tons
- 80 cu. yds. corrugated cardboard
- 2380 lbs. aluminum cans
- 140 cu. yds. plastic containers
- 30 cu. yds. tin (added after the recycling program was underway)
- An undetermined amount of leaves and garden debris that were composted.

To use the Transfer Station/Recycling Facility, residents must display transfer station stickers on (attached to) their vehicles and must sort out all recyclables from their trash. Plastic containers, especially milk jugs, and aluminum and tin cans must be crushed. Newspapers must not contain magazines or glossy advertising circulars.

Through their cooperation, residents have made the recycling program successful - and, it is hoped, the program will be even more successful in the future.

WESTMORELAND CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission was voted in at the Town Meeting in 1973. Due to concerns for orderly growth, developmental pressures and environmental conservation, the Commission was reactivated in the fall of 1989 and authorized at the March 1990 Town Meeting to have up to seven members and three alternates. Authorized by RSA 36A, the charge of the Commission is to protect and conserve the land and water resources of Westmoreland.

The Commission has been compiling an index of all land and water resources of the town. It is preparing conservation information for the residents of Westmoreland.

The Commission received and reviewed five dredge and fill permits and wetland applications. The Commission is always looking for interested and enthusiastic residents to serve on their sub-committees. If you are interested, please contact one of the members. Commission meetings are held the first Tuesday of each month.

- ARTICLE 1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 2. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1991-1992 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money (pursuant to R.S.A. 198:20-b).
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters of the Westmoreland School District will vote to increase the size of the Westmoreland School Board to five members, in accordance with R.S.A. 671:4. If this article is adopted, on Town Meeting Day, 1992, voters will elect three school board members: one to a three-year term, one to a two-year term, and one to a one-year term. 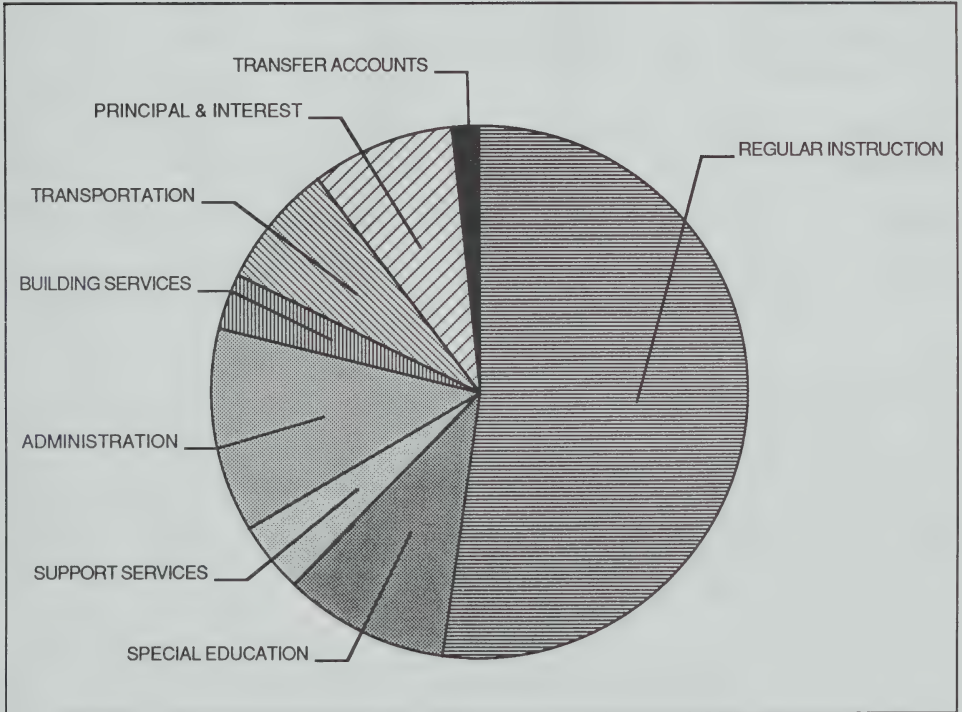

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, R. Bruce Smith, at 11:00 A.M. The School Warrant and Article 1 were then read by the Moderator and after he declared the polls open, voting commenced. The polls were closed at 7:00 P.M. The ballots were then counted and the results of the election were as follows:

For School District Moderator for the ensuing year:
R. Bruce Smith - 219 votes and was declared elected.

For Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years:
Theresa Russell - 236 votes and was declared elected.

For Member of the School Board for the ensuing year:
Sarah Bonneau - 178 votes and was declared elected.

For School District Treasurer from July 1, 1990, for the ensuing year:
Paula A. McKane - 245 votes and was declared elected.

For School District Auditor for the ensuing two years:
Write-in candidates declined to serve.

For School District Clerk for the ensuing year:
Lois K. Merry - 233 votes and was declared elected.

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, R. Bruce Smith, at 7:06 P.M. After the Pledge of Allegiance the Moderator read the warrant. Mr. Smith briefly reviewed the rules of procedure and introduced the guests at the meeting: H. Charles Larracey, Superintendent of Schools for S.A.U. #29; Deane Haskell, Assistant Superintendent for Business; Mark Genovesi, Assistant Superintendent for the Towns; Bruce Thielen, Director of Special Education; Janice Lefebvre, Principal of Westmoreland School; Phillip McCormack, Assistant Superintendent for Keene; Patricia Trow Parent, Manager of Personnel Services; and Douglas Hatfield, Attorney representing the Westmoreland School District.

A motion was made by School Board Chairman Sarah Bonneau and it was seconded to make note of the individuals present who are entitled to explain or clarify issues raised during the meeting. The motion carried by voice vote and the above mentioned guests as well as the School Board members were listed as those able to speak to such issues. The Moderator then read Article 1.

Article 1. A motion was made by John J. Laurent that the District appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$750,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of designing, constructing an addition to, and renovation of the Westmoreland Elementary School, and related costs, in accordance with plans and specifications on file with the Office of the Superintendent of Schools in Keene, New Hampshire, and to raise said sum by the issuance of bonds or notes of the District pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 33, the terms and conditions of said bonds and notes to be determined by the school board, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

The motion was seconded and Mr. Laurent spoke first to the Article. He mentioned ways in which the Facilities Committee had pared down the plan which was presented last year and stressed that the present plan is economical and meets the needs of Westmoreland as cheaply as is reasonably possible. Some discussion followed and a motion was made by Frances Laurent to move the question. It was seconded but failed to pass by a show of hands (yes - 118; no - 127). Debate continued centering around the extra expenses involved in maintaining the addition. Opinions were expressed both for and against the proposed addition. Robert Bonneau made a motion to move the question. It was seconded and passed by a hand vote. The ballot vote on Article 1 commenced when the polls opened at 7:54 P.M. The polls closed at 8:54 P.M. and the vote was as follows: yes - 207; no 115. The Article failed to pass by the needed 2/3 majority.

Jack Laurent made a motion to reconsider Article 1. It was seconded and passed by a show of hands. Some debate followed concerning the rules for reconsideration. The meeting must be re-convened no sooner than seven days. It was moved and seconded to re-consider Article 1 at 8:30 P.M. on March 29th. The time of reconsideration was then voted on and passed by hand vote 145 to 45. David Adams made a motion to recess the District Meeting until March 29th due to the problem of considering other budget questions before the vote on Article 1. It was seconded and passed 162 to 6 by hand vote. The meeting was recessed at 9:23 P.M.

MARCH 29, 1990

The recessed meeting was re-convened at 8:38 P.M. by Moderator R. Bruce Smith. He described the rules for reconsideration briefly and additionally he noted that the figure \$85,000.00 in Article 8 had been changed to \$50,000.00.

The Moderator then read Article 1 and invited Jack Laurent to speak to the Article first because he had asked for reconsideration. Mr. Laurent cited the advantage of the addition noting that the climate in the construction industry is excellent for building now, and that there are no hidden costs in the plan. Many residents spoke in favor of the project mentioning such issues as school population, the poor economy of renting a portable classroom, and the chronic

problem of funding state mandates. Voices in opposition mentioned the mandated programs as the cause of a surplus of teaching personnel and the possible alternative of sending the 7th and 8th graders to Keene Junior High School. Before voting began, the Moderator read the Article again. The polls opened at 9:09 P.M. and closed at 10:09 P.M. Article 1 failed to pass by a 2/3 majority. The vote was: yes - 264; no - 149.

Article 2. Before consideration of Article 2, a petition was presented by John Frye to request that Articles 5, 6 and 7 be voted on by secret ballot. According to New Hampshire law, because five voters who had signed this petition were present at the meeting, it was allowed. John Frye also presented a resolution that the names of the graduates, salaries of staff, and class enrollment figures be published in the town report every year. With that modification, Sarah Bonneau made a motion to accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and to pass any related vote. It was seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 3. Sarah Bonneau made a motion to have the District authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1990-1991 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money (pursuant to R.S.A. 198:20-b). It was seconded and following brief discussion, passed by voice vote.

Article 4. A motion was made by Gordon Adams to pass over Article 4 due to the failure of Article 1. It was seconded and carried by voice vote.

Article 5. A motion was made by Sarah Bonneau that the District raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Seven Thousand (\$27,000.00) Dollars to pay for the costs to rent a portable classroom for a period of one year and also to pay for related expenses, or to take any other action in relation thereto. The motion was seconded and discussion followed about the type of portable classroom, its availability and the possibility of adding a modular unit instead. Sarah Bonneau proposed an amendment to Article 5 which would insert the words "or rent with an option to buy" following the words "for a period of one year". It was seconded, and a voice vote being questionable, a hand vote indicated passage by 111 to 48. A second amendment which proposed limiting the amount noted in Article 5 strictly to \$27,000.00 was defeated. A ballot vote was then conducted on the amended Article 5. It passed by 97 to 96. Gordon Adams made a motion to recess the meeting until April 6th due to the late hour. It was seconded and passed by voice vote. The meeting recessed at 11:30 P.M.

APRIL 6, 1990

The meeting was reconvened at 7:06 P.M. Sarah Bonneau moved to suspend the meeting rules and consider Articles 9 and 8 next and in that order. It was seconded and the motion passed by voice vote after no debate.

Article 9. Sarah Bonneau made a motion that the District should raise and appropriate One Million, Two-Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand, Two-Hundred Ninety-Seven (\$1,275,297.00) Dollars for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. The motion was seconded and discussion ensued. An increase was anticipated in teachers' salaries although negotiations are still going on and a temporary agreement is in effect. A ballot vote followed and Article 9 carried by a vote of 149 to 117.

Article 8. A motion was made by Sarah Bonneau that the District should raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars to fund the anticipated deficit in the 1989-1990 budget, or to take any other action in relation thereto. The motion was seconded and discussion followed regarding the drop in the dollar amount from \$85,000.00 to \$50,000.00. Some portion of the fees for out-of-district placement for special education cases were recovered through claims on insurance which the District carries for coverage in these cases. Questions were raised concerning the number of due process cases which the school district filed on parents regarding special education placements in the past three or four years. SAU #29 was called inefficient at running a special education program and the District was accused of harassment of parents and students needing special education. Bruce Thielen, Director of Special Education for Unit #29 responded with information about these questions. Better programs which will be available soon at both Keene High School and Keene Junior High School may solve some of these problems. Discussion followed concerning the particulars of the cases in Westmoreland although full disclosure is illegal in some areas of inquiry. Following a motion to move the question which was seconded and passed by voice vote, the Article was voted on. It carried by voice vote. Sarah Bonneau moved to consider Articles 6 and 7 jointly in the interests of efficiency. The motion was seconded and passed by voice vote.

Articles 6 and 7. A motion was made by Sarah Bonneau that the District establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 35 for the purpose of construction and/or renovation of school buildings and/or related costs for said construction and/or renovation, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,00.00) Dollars to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund. It was seconded and discussion followed. A motion was made by Talbot Hood to amend these Articles to read \$123,000.00 instead of \$100,000.00, including the figure from Article 5 (\$27,000.00) to add to the existing school building only what is required to meet the N.H.

Code, i.e. a library. This motion was seconded. The attorney for the Westmoreland School District, Douglas Hatfield, noted that such an amendment is inappropriate considering the scope of the Warrant and could not be considered under Articles 6 and 7. It would be appropriate under a reconsideration of Article 1. Moderator Smith ruled the amendment out of order, and read Articles 6 and 7 again upon request. Tal Hood made a motion to table these Articles. It was seconded and carried by voice vote. Articles 6 and 7 were tabled.

Tal Hood then made a motion to return to Article 1. It was seconded and discussion followed involving concern about the brief time span allotted to consideration of the newly-proposed construction plan. A voice vote being questionable, a hand vote was taken on returning to Article 1. It passed 111 to 104. Tal Hood then moved to amend Article 1 to read \$123,000.00. The motion was seconded. He spoke first to the Amendment. David Adams made a motion to amend Article 1 to read \$450,000.00 which would cover construction costs of the addition without the gym. It was seconded and Mr. Adams noted that this plan could be an appropriate compromise. Further, upon questioning, the members of the School Board conceded agreement with this proposal. The estimated cost of the bond would be \$112,700.00 per year over 5 years for principle and interest. State aid would provide 30% of the principle. A question was raised concerning the affirmative vote on the \$27,00.00 portable classroom. In the event that Article 1 passed, the \$27,000.00 expenditure could be reconsidered. A vote then followed on the \$450,000.00 amendment. It carried by unanimous voice vote.

Article 10. Sarah Bonneau made a motion to pass Article 10, which states: We, the residents of the Westmoreland School District, find the State of New Hampshire to be negligent in the funding of public education, thus creating an undue burden on the local property taxpayers. We demand that the State of New Hampshire Legislature begin in earnest to study methods for substantially increasing State aid to education. The motion was seconded and in the discussion that followed, the point was made that this Article in effect requests a State income tax. The Article carried by a hand vote 127 to 85.

Sarah Bonneau moved to recess the meeting until May 11th when the amended Article 1 would be reconsidered. It was seconded. The meeting would "clean up" all remaining articles including Articles 6 and 7 which were tabled. The motion passed by voice vote and the meeting recessed at 9:37 P.M.

MAY 11, 1990

Moderator R. Bruce Smith called the reconvened meeting to order at 7:04 P.M. and introduced School Board Member Walter Carroll who announced that Nancy Belsky, Mathematics teacher at Westmoreland School has won a competition and will be attending a program offered this summer by the NASA National Science Teachers Association (NSTA). She was one of 1,000 applicants and will be part of the Space, Science and Technology Division.

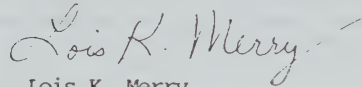
Article 1. Moderator Smith read the amended Article 1 and following brief discussion, voting commenced. The polls opened at 7:15 P.M. and closed at 8:15 P.M. Three-hundred fourteen votes were cast and resulted in the following: yes - 243; no - 71. Article 1 passed by the needed 2/3 majority.

Article 4. Sarah Bonneau moved to return to Article 4. The motion was seconded and passed by voice vote. Ms. Bonneau moved to amend the Article to read \$18,220.00, the interest payment on the \$450,000.00 bond. The motion was seconded and it passed by voice vote.

Article 5. Walter Carroll moved to return to Article 5. The motion was seconded and passed by voice vote. Mr. Carroll then moved to rescind action taken on Article 5. It was seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 11. There was no further business to consider in this meeting. Lauren Bressett moved to adjourn the Westmoreland School District Meeting. It was seconded and passed by voice vote. The meeting adjourned at 8:30 P.M.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This was a year of transition for the Westmoreland School -- a year that will be remembered primarily as a year of new construction. Much of the winter of 1990 was spent making final plans for the new construction. Contractor bidding was completed in early August. Baybutt Construction Company, the successful bidder, broke ground on the new addition on September 7, and the construction was 90 percent complete by the end of the year.

At the end of June, Mrs. Janice Lefebvre left Westmoreland after five years of dedicated service as the principal of Westmoreland School. I came to Westmoreland, having spent the last three years as a middle school principal in Massachusetts, and discovered a spirited teaching staff, a hard-working group of students and supportive parents. Enthusiasm for the new wing, for the positive effect it will have on staff and students, has been building steadily since September.

It is time now for us to move forward and utilize our new found space to its maximum benefit for the children of Westmoreland. The physical education teacher will now have a room in which to hold classes during inclement weather. The art teacher will have a small storage area in which to store works in progress or projects which require drying. The guidance counselor will have a room in which to meet with students. Students will be able to eat their lunch in a common dining area, and students will be able to gather for school-wide assemblies. Other specialists, such as our speech and language therapist and our testing consultant in special education will soon have room in which to work with students. We will have much-needed storage space for paper, which is currently stored in the outside shed or piled high in the teachers' room. Now the older students will have a separate wing for their growing minds and bodies.

Five new people joined our staff in September of 1990. Mr. Paul Deschenes, who taught at Marlborough School, replaces Mr. Michael Sullivan as our Grade 7/Social Studies teacher. Mrs. Michele Rumrill, our new fourth grade teacher, holds a Bachelor's Degree from Keene State College. She replaces Mrs. Jeannette Gardner. Ms. Kim Wallach, our new music teacher, who replaces Mrs. Joanne Meade, brings her extensive experience as a folksinger to our developing music program. Mr. Peter Parker, who has taught in Waldorf schools for three years, is our new Art teacher, replacing Mrs. Donna Larcom. Dr. John Willis fills a contracted position as an evaluator in the special education department at the school. The number of students in our incoming first grade class will require a second first grade in order to provide a sound education for those young children. The new space created by the construction project will allow us to have another first grade class in the current Room 8.

Many parent volunteers support our school system in many different ways. The PTA continues to provide financial support for various programs, including: \$250 toward classroom materials, \$250 toward Camp Sargent, \$1,500 toward a Macintosh computer and printer, \$250 toward the dedication ceremony entertainment. The PTA also has fed the community at different school events, such as the annual Family Night, Open House, Holiday Concert, and the upcoming dedication luncheon. Members of the Boosters Club ran the annual soccer tournament and provided the school with money toward athletic equipment and uniforms. The Cultural Arts Committee again sponsored international exchange students, Monadnock Music's Lend an Ear program and, this year, contributed toward the Library Fund. Parents continue to serve the school as library volunteers. Parents of students involved in Camp Sargent, NDI and OM contribute numerous hours of support.

This year many people came forward to support our efforts toward making the new addition an exciting place in which to learn. Terry Cox contributed \$450 toward a new display case for the new front lobby. Elizabeth Butterfield and the Library Committee won grants of over \$10,000 toward the purchase of library books, carpeting and furniture for the new Westmoreland School library (including a \$500 anonymous donation). An anonymous donor gave \$1,100 toward the purchase of cafeteria tables and chairs for the new multi-purpose room. We expect many community volunteers to help us with the move to the new addition.

Without the efforts and resources of these many parents and community members, the Westmoreland School would not be such an excellent place to learn and grow.

Westmoreland students continue to enjoy a high quality education, due in large part to the dedication of our professional staff. This year we focused on increasing our knowledge of teaching strategies in whole language instruction, literature-based reading, and math manipulatives. This year we instituted a new activity program for the upper grade students, focusing on hands-on projects such as quilt weaving, basket making, literary magazine and science projects. This is one "middle school" innovation which encourages and motivates our older students. Several of our staff have participated over the summer and throughout the school year on curriculum committees in the areas of mathematics, technology education, and guidance. In addition, the staff spends many extra hours after school coaching students in various extracurricular activities: Math Club, Odyssey of the Mind, video club, and interscholastic sports.

This was a year that brought out the best of the Westmoreland School community -- a caring, professional staff, concerned and committed parents, and, above all, a wonderful group of children. I have thoroughly enjoyed my first six months as principal and I look forward to a close working relationship with the community in the future.
