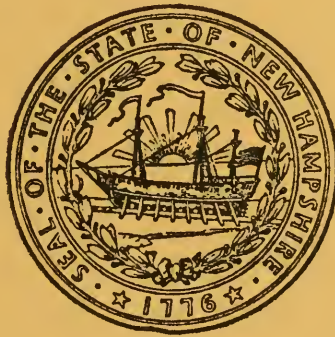

# Town Warrant

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of ANDOVER in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said Andover on Tuesday, the Seventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the town budget.

4. To see if the town will vote to designate Beech Hill Road, Boston Hill Road, Bradley Lake Road, Bridge Road, Chase Hill Road, Elbow Pond Road, Emery Road, Flaghole Road, Hall Road, Hoyt Road, Kearsarge Mountain Road, Morey Hill Road, Morrill Hill Road, Old College Road, Putney Road, Shaw Hill Road, Smith Road, Sucker Brook Road, Taunton Hill Road, and Tucker Mountain Road as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253.17 and 18, for the purpose of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Andover. (By petition)

5. To see if the Town will vote to have the town road agent appointed and hired by the Selectmen, rather than elected by the voters.

6. To see if the town will vote to enact the following ordinance related to dogs running at large:

"No dog shall be allowed to run at large within the confines of this town. A dog shall be deemed to be running at large if not restrained by being tied on a rope, chain, or cable permanently fixed in place, or on a leash held by its owner or keeper, or if not within the immediate care and control of its owner or keeper. In addition to any other damages recoverable or fines or penalties which may be prescribed by law, the owner or keeper of any dog running at large, whether with or without the knowledge of its owner or keeper, shall be fined Ten Dollars (\$10.00), to be paid to the Town." (By petition)

7. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments for the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 toward the purchase of a loader.

9. To see if the town will vote to establish three new capital reserve funds for the following purposes and to transfer the amount

indicated from unencumbered surplus funds to each new capital reserve fund:

(a) Tax map capital reserve fund - \$5,000

(b) Dump capital reserve fund - \$2,000

(c) Equipment capital reserve fund - \$3,000

10. To see if the town will vote to transfer \$2,000 from unencumbered surplus funds to the Lawrence Street bridge capital reserve fund.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to join the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,463.75 for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to close the Town Beach at Highland Lake to all except residents and nonresident property owners and to make any necessary changes in the rates.

14. To see if the town will vote to use \$2,500 which was raised for the Highland Lake Beach house or to take any other action.

15. To see if the Town will vote to have the Bay Road from Route 4 to the Salisbury Town Line, one fourth mile asphalt surfaced. (By Petition)

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the East Andover Volunteer Fire Department to have charge of parking at the Highland Lake Town Beach and the right to fix the fees. (By petition)

## Selectmen's Report to the Town

This year the town has been saddened by the loss of several of its officials, past and present. Victor E. Phelps, our town treasurer, Donal Miller, our selectman, and Harry Emerson, past selectman. We will miss them.

Roger Emerson has been appointed to serve the unexpired term as town treasurer, and James Humphrey as selectmen.

The State Bridge Department has informed the Board that the town will have to replace the Lawrence Street bridge within two years at an estimated cost of \$90,000. The town's share will be approximately \$30,000. We have requested that another inspection be made by their department as a safety measure as soon as weather permits. This bridge is presently posted at a ten ton limit. Should the inspection reveal that the bridge is unsafe, then it would have to be reduced to a six ton limit. This would eliminate all types of heavy vehicles, including school buses and highway snow plows. The Board is asking that the Lawrence Street bridge fund be increased from \$2,000 to \$5,000 this year.

We have had increasing trouble with dogs in Andover and we would ask again that the owners please cooperate in their control. There is still a large number of unlicensed dogs and dogs without rabies shots. Chester Shampney, the dog officer, has been ordered to take legal action against the owners.

Over three hundred properties were reassessed by the Board this year and we look for very little change in 1972. Again the schools are responsible for our increase in tax rate, having risen from \$1.94 to \$2.44 per hundred; the town government's operating expenses dropped from 58 cents to 44 cents, and the county tax increased from 18 cents to 22 cents per hundred. The overall tax increased from \$2.70 to \$3.10, an average increase for the entire state. After receiving the auditor's report your town is in good financial condition.

The town office and library are still in need of work. We find that we are forced to install a new heating system as the old wood-burning furnace has done its job well and should be retired because it never was efficient operating on oil. The oil unit is worn out and would have to be replaced. The building was measured for a new system by Prescott Oil Co. and they suggested that two units be installed in place of one large one; the two units costing \$28 less than the large one. With this installation the library and the selectmen's office can be controlled separately. They offered us a figure of \$1,598. This would include complete removal of the old furnace and pipes. This Board selected Prescott Oil Co. for this installation because of the good service the town has obtained in the past.

New windows will be installed in the library to conform with the rest of the building.

## Report Of Building Inspector

Permits were issued during 1971 on 11 new houses and cottages valued at \$110,500; 38 additions and remodeling projects valued at \$65,500, 5 mobile homes, 11 garages and shops.

In addition to issuing building permits, there were 76 on-site inspections of work in progress and 1 investigation of questionable occupancy as requested by Selectmen, requiring 45 hours of time and 291 miles of driving.

Your inspector will continue to issue building permits to people who wish to start construction of homes according to his practical application of the present Building Ordinance even if future laws may require the home owner to pay expensive engineering and legal fees to be able to sell his houses.

Citizens are reminded that although a building permit is required for major repairs to or new sewage disposal systems, inspection is by the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, which is also the agency that has the qualified personnel, funds and authority to investigate and resolve sewage system complaints between neighbors and should be contacted directly rather than the Building Inspector or Selectmen.

## Andover Planning Board

During 1971 the Planning Board was quite busy with various types of activities. It held a total of twenty-four meetings during the year; twelve regular monthly meetings and twelve special meetings.

The Board of Selectmen appointed two new members to the Planning Board during 1971. These are Stuart Humphrey and Frederick Condon.

Regarding Andover's LAND SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS, the Planning Board has amended the regulations on two occasions during 1971 following the legally prescribed procedures and public hearings. Copies of the amended regulations may be obtained from the Secretary of the Planning Board.

During 1971 the Planning Board approved two subdivisions of land. No applications for subdivision of land were disapproved by the Planning Board. The Board feels that the amount of land subdivision activity within the town will increase sharply during 1972.

During 1972 the Planning Board, with the assistance of the New Hampshire Office of State Planning prepared a new townwide base map for the Town of Andover. In addition, a topographic map and a soils map were also prepared for the town. Copies of these maps are now available through the Planning Board at a cost of \$2.50 per map.

An important accomplishment during 1971 was the circulation of an opinion survey to all residents of the town. The purpose of this opinion survey was to determine how the people of Andover feel about the future growth, development and changes that will undoubtedly occur in their town. On the weekend of November 6 and 7, approximately 700 questionnaires were hand delivered to all available residents. Approximately 550 or 78% of these were completed and returned.

The results of the opinion survey were presented at a public meeting held in East Andover on November 17. On the basis of the questionnaire it appears quite clear that most of Andover's residents appreciate the small town, rural character of Andover and want it to stay that way. How to keep it that way is the key question and in response to this question in the opinion survey approximately 64% indicated support for some sort of protective zoning to control future development and protect the best interests of our town.

The Planning Board interprets this response from the people of Andover as a mandate to proceed with preparation of a town plan and a proposed protective zoning ordinance. With the help of a number of interested citizens the Planning Board is presently preparing such a plan. All citizens of the town who are interested in this important effort are urged to participate and express their views. As the town plan nears completion several open public meetings

will be held to discuss the proposed plan. Following development of the town plan, the Planning Board, in accordance with state law, will develop a proposed protective zoning ordinance which will be considered at two public hearings and then decided upon by the voters at town meeting.

Finally, the Planning Board wishes to remind everyone in town that the regular meetings of the Board are held the first Tuesday of each month at the Town Hall. These meetings are open to the public and everyone is invited to attend. Notices of special meetings and hearings will be widely advertised in order to keep everyone informed of the activities of the Planning Board.

## Andover Rescue Squad

The Rescue Squad answered fifty-eight calls during 1971, assisting forty-six Andover residents and ten non-residents. Services of the squad were refused in two instances and were not needed on arrival in two others. Thirty-seven trips were made to New London Hospital, fourteen to Franklin, two to Hanover, two to Laconia and one to the Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center at Greenfield. Twenty-seven were what might be called routine transportation cases - elderly patients taken to a hospital and/or later returned to their homes. Five persons were victims of automobile, four of motorcycle and seven of miscellaneous other accidents. Thirteen involved emergencies or sudden illness.

New legislation requires that by September 1, 1972 all ambulances in New Hampshire must conform to certain requirements and be licensed by the Department of Health and Welfare. All drivers and attendants must also be licensed and have completed advanced Red Cross First Aid training or its equivalent.

How much the present services rendered by our rescue squad will be affected by this legislation remains to be seen. The majority of our members are already certified by the Red Cross, but we will definitely lose the services of several valuable men whose loss will be keenly felt in our small organization. Several more of our members are already in the ranks of senior citizens and our greatest need is for more new and younger volunteers to become members of the squad and train with us. Without them the future of the Andover Rescue Squad remains uncertain.

Once again our sincere thanks to the town for its financial support and to the many others who have contributed so generously to our service.

## Report of the Trustees of the Trust Funds

During the year five new trust funds were established covering the perpetual care of lots in the Proctor Cemetery, and \$200 from the sale of four lots in the new part of that cemetery was added to the Proctor Cemetery operating fund. The two separate Nancy A. Eastman trust funds have now been combined in a single fund. There are now sixty-three individual trust funds in the Proctor Cemetery.

One new trust fund was established at the Lakeview Cemetery.

Trust fund accounts are normally balanced up during the month of November and payment from income made to the selectmen when all cemetery maintenance work has been completed for the season. As interest on savings accounts is now compounded monthly instead of quarterly at both the Franklin Savings Bank and the New Hampshire Savings Bank this year's interest figures in the "INCOME" column of the itemized report cover a period of thirteen months from October 1, 1970 thru November 1, 1971.

Interest declared by the Franklin Cooperative Bank on the Lawrence Street Bridge Capital Reserve Fund covers the calendar year 1971.

# Report of Andover Conservation Commission

1971

On March 9th, 1971 the voters of Andover established a Conservation Commission. The selectmen appointed seven members to the commission whose membership has remained the same throughout the year with the exception of the resignation of Mrs. Stannard Dunn; replaced by Mrs. Gracia H. Snyder.

Several items were brought to the attention of the commission early in the spring concerning the effect on the Blackwater River of Open Meeting May 12th at which state officials appeared at our re-New London's proposed sewer project. Four meetings preceded the Open Meeting May 12th at which state officials appeared at our request to inform the citizenry of Andover, Willmot, Salisbury, and Webster why they had approved the New London proposal. Sufficient interest was generated by this meeting so that by midsummer the Chamber of Commerce of New London held a meeting to explain the project to the voters and non-resident taxpayers of that town. At this time the position of the state officials had come into line with federal government policies, and New London realized that any project they undertook would have to comply with federal anti-pollution standards. It now appears that the purity of the Blackwater River is assured, with the exception of certain areas of local pollution which need correction.

It is extremely important for citizens of Andover to take active part with the Conservation Commission regarding their desires toward projects such as Highland Lake Beach, scenic roads, river bank clean up, natural conservation areas, solid waste disposal, and protection of drinking water supplies. This means attending meetings, communicating with, and/or writing to Andover Conservation Commission, Box 195, Andover, N. H. 03216. Unless the commission is aware of your opinion we are unable to recommend actions to your selectmen.

We wish to express thanks for the efforts and financial support rendered to the commission by private individuals, institutions, surrounding communities, local and state government agencies during this past year.

In the coming year we plan watch dog action on the Blackwater River with an expanded water test program, more river bank clean up, improvement of toilet facilities and water testing at Highland Lake Beach, and more study of solid waste disposal methods.

The funds of the conservation Commission are non-lapsing accum-

ulating from year to year for our expenses as necessary. Contributions to the conservation commission are tax deductible.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the Town of Andover for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given to the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Andover Public Library, Williams Adams Batchelder Library and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus of the Town increased by \$7,280.66 in 1970, from \$27,715.09 to \$34,995.75. Inasmuch as there was no outstanding long term debt at December 31, 1970, the Balance Sheet Surplus of \$34,995.75 also represented the Current Surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) on that date.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$8,724.12 plus a revenue surplus of \$1,803.31 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$10,527.43.

**TREASURER**

**Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: Exhibit B-1)**

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit B1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1970, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

**GENERAL COMMENTS**

**Delinquent Taxes - Levies of 1969 and Prior Years:**

According to the Tax Collector's records, delinquent property, poll, yield and state head taxes amounting to \$4,871.14, on account of the levies of 1969 and prior years, were due the Town at December 31, 1970, as indicated by the following tabulation:

The Selectmen should review the Collector's lists of uncollected taxes for these levies and abate such unpaid taxes contained therein as are deemed to be uncollectible. The Tax Collector should take

immediate steps to enforce payment of the remaining delinquent accounts.

**Unredeemed Taxes:**

At December 31, 1970, the Town held unredeemed tax liens with a total value of \$220.14 on account of the levies of 1967 and prior years. Inasmuch as the two year redemption period has expired on these liens, the Tax Collector is required by law (R. S. A. 80:38) to execute deeds to the Town of the lands sold and not redeemed within the statutory redemption period.

**Conclusion:**

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Andover for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## School Board's Report

As this report is written, the '71 - '72 school year is off to a good start.

The school lost several experienced teachers during the past year, however we feel we were successful in obtaining excellent replacements.

This past year the board met with the Franklin school board to determine if it would be possible to enter into a contractual arrangement where the Franklin district would take all our high school students. Franklin has advised us that they are not interested in such an agreement at this time because of a space shortage. Apparently the uncertainty of where our high school pupils will be educated, will be with us in the foreseeable future.

We are in the process of up-grading the school library. Considerably more effort will be required to meet minimum state standards.

The custodian has continued with painting the interior of the building. New lights have been installed in several of the classrooms, and a new science table has been built allowing for science experiments.

The school board has made every effort to hold cost increase to a minimum. Despite this attempt, the budget for 1972-1973 has increased over the previous budget. The biggest single factor is increased tuition costs, over which we have no control.

We especially call your attention to the outstanding job Mr. Seymour continues to do as school custodian.

To Mr. Corson and his staff, to Mrs. Nelson and the hot lunch staff, we express our appreciation for enabling us to have another successful school year.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

I herewith submit this annual report as Superintendent of Schools. It has been a pleasure working with the School Board, school faculty, and citizens who have contributed to an effective educational environment and program for the children of Andover.

The curriculum has been expanded during the 1971-72 school year to meet the State Board of Education Elementary Minimum Standards, and to better meet the needs of all children in our school. Mr. George Corson has assumed duties as supervising principal, which allows him time for guidance services to children. Additionally, he has been instrumental in restoring the former high school Industrial Arts Room to the point where instruction in this area is now being provided for seventh and eighth grade students.

Along with an improved art offering for all students, provisions have also been made to include Home Economics opportunities for girls at the seventh and eighth grade level by utilizing the facilities that were once provided for high school students. More effective use of staff has made it possible to provide regular Physical Education opportunities for the students in grades five through eight.

The Title I program, initiated last year, has been continued and is completely funded by Federal grants. This program provides a teacher, as well as instructional equipment and materials, for use with pupils who are having difficulty with reading. A Supervisory Union funded program is providing speech therapy to those youngsters with speech impairments on a one day a week basis.

An excellent start toward providing library services has been carried out with the conversion of one classroom for use as a library. New shelving and approximately 900 volumes were purchased for the use of the children. This program should be expanded each year to provide a complete library program.

A laboratory demonstration table complete with water and gas hook-ups was constructed in the science area and has been of great use in providing an improved science offering.

The general appearance of the school has been further improved by the continued program of painting and refurbishing. Our custodian has been doing a good job with repairs and maintenance, which has resulted in little contracted service.
