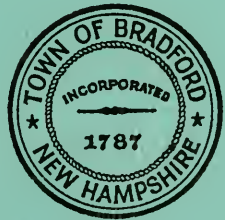

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

The Polls will be open from 12:00 to 7:00 p.m. March 9, 1982.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bradford in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bradford on Tuesday, the ninth of March next, at twelve o'clock noon to act on the following Articles:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. To adjourn the meeting until Wednesday, March tenth at 7:00 o'clock in the evening: the raising of money and other articles in the Warrant to be taken up at adjourned meeting.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, expend and appropriate through the Budget Committee:
 - a. Any Federal Fund under Title I, Local Public Works, Capital Development and Investment Act of 1976, contingent upon availability.
 - b. Contingent on availability, Federal Disaster Funds in the event such funds are needed.
 - c. Contingent on availability, Federal Anti-Recession Funds under Title II (assistance to State and Local governments.)
 - d. Contingent on availability, energy conservation funds from Federal and/or State sources.
5. To see if the Town will vote to approve the application for, acceptance and expenditure of Comprehensive Employment and Training for funding Public Service employment positions in the Town, contingent on availability.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept monies received for the establishment of Trust Funds during the year since last Town Meeting.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept for use on Town highways and roads:
 - a. The sum of \$8,561.53 from the State Highway Subsidy Fund. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
 - b. An estimated sum of \$9,377.47 of Additional Highway Funds for improvement and/or construction of Class IV or V highways in Town. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
 - c. A State subsidy of \$4,116.90 (Duncan Fund) for the maintenance of Class V highways in the Town. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$7,595.07 from the State for TRA. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
9. To see if the Town will vote to retain the unexpended portion of the Conservation Commission's 1981 appropriation in the Special Conservation Fund established in 1977 under the provisions of RSA 31:112 (II). (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of \$17,500 from Revenue Sharing Funds to cover part of the cost of removal of garbage from the Disposal Area. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,728 for the purchase of a special sander-dump body for use by the Highway Department. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
12. To vote on the following question by ballot: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax. These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is

owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a combined net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence."

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for additional oil to seal roads in the Town as designated by the Road Agent and the Board of Selectmen.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 for additional hose for the Fire Department's new pumper. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$820 for two radios for the Police Department use by part-time officers. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
16. To see if the Town will vote to designate the former Pearl Land on West Road, Parcel #22-669,170, given to the Town for Conservation purposes as the Bradford Town Forest, excepting two acres of frontage for possible other Town purposes. This will also authorize the Bradford Conservation Commission to erect a suitable sign so designating the property.
17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.
18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S COMMENTARY

1981 proved to be a good year for Bradford. Our budget, long labored over by The Budget Committee and the Selectmen, proved to be very close to the actual expenditures and this was in spite of some increased costs and because of some hard-to-estimate expenditures were less than anticipated at budgeting time.

With careful planning, departments lived within their budgets for the most part and in some cases, joint efforts saved money while making it possible to stay within the budget.

The solid waste disposal program set in motion in 1978 continued to operate smoothly. Revenue Sharing funds totalling \$15,000 offset part of the projected cost of the operation. Savings due to the program of separating bundled paper and broken-down cardboard cartons has had a growing effect on costs of operation. While the sale of these items has brought in small amounts of revenue, the greatest "revenue" has been an appreciable reduction in the loads of material for the compactor. Because of this factor alone the Disposal Area stayed within budget. Thanks is due to the fine cooperation of the Town's merchants and to those folks who voluntarily cooperated with the program. Everyone can help keep taxes down by cooperating and remembering that our growing population puts increasing pressure on the facility.

The Fire Department became the proud possessor of a new pumper truck, authorized and funded in March of 1980. Through the very anxious time of bankruptcy procedures of the supplier, the Fire Chief, Robert Moore, Town Counsel, Kenneth Brown and the Board of Selectmen successfully worked together to arrange the delivery of the truck and its' complement of equipment.

Probably the greatest change in Town procedures has been due to the approval at the 1981 Town Meeting of the billing and collection of property taxes on a twice-yearly basis. The procedure was instituted in the June billing of taxes with a second billing in December. Collections have been good and with the collections beginning in June, the Town's cash-flow was improved with a drastic reduction in interest charges for the Town. Results of this endeavor were beyond our expectations. A sincere "thank you" to Lillian Frey for her extra efforts.

The highway program continued to improve. Reconstruction of Fairgrounds Road proceeded on schedule with a new surface recycling program. Defective culverts were replaced, rocks and ledge removed and proper ditching carried out. It was sealed in the Fall. The recycling procedure resulted in more roads improved for no additional cost. Sealing of other roads was done

as far as the money for materials allowed. Cost of oil increased, resulting in less treated miles than anticipated. Phillips Byfield and his crew continued to develop equipment needed for the roads, maintaining and improving existing equipment by weekly checks and servicing and thus brought us through the year with no major problems. The crew salvaged much timber along the roads during roadside brush cutting. This material was taken to sawmills and sawn into lumber for expanding the existing town barn to a size where now all equipment will be under cover and more covered work space is now available. Thanks go to many people for donating logs and lumber and especially to Dr. James Bibbo for several large hemlock logs cut from his woods by the crew for the long rafters needed for the building. With such contributions, costs for valuable work space have been minimal. The expansion will be finished in 1982.

The town crew also worked at the disposal area and, as instituted last year, such work was charged to it. Burning of allowable material, clean up, etc. are all charged to that project. Similarly, costs of maintenance of Parks and Recreation areas and garbage collection from them by the crew are also charged to that program. As a result, costs for highway maintenance are now true reflections of those services.

January to April saw little snowfall and lower costs for highway maintenance. The same was true of the mild November. However, December was a different story. Several heavy snowfalls, reminiscent of those "old fashioned winters" with storms every other day put severe strains on equipment, the men and the budget right up to the end of the year. After two years of very little snow, unusual snowfalls brought home the fact we live in Central New Hampshire!

One of the programs planned was an enlarged and improved skating rink at Brown-Shattuck, but early and continuous snowfall wiped out that facility which was so much enjoyed last year.

Because inflation has been running at 10% or more annually since the reappraisal of the town, the equalization rate was bound to drop. The rate set by the Department of Revenue Administration of 64% was challenged by the Board of Selectmen by appeal to the State Board of Taxation. This appeal resulted in a 70% Equalization Rate being set. This adjustment resulted in a calculated \$10,000 savings on the school taxes assessed to the town. This meant about fifty cents on your tax rate.

Pressure from the State Board of Taxation resulted in a program of revaluation of all undeveloped lots in subdivisions. Values set are now more in keeping with valuation of lots in rural towns in the general area.

Last winter saw a series of problems with destruction and theft of personal property which spread into four adjacent towns. Chief Rich instituted a five-town program involving chiefs from those towns, the Sheriff's Office and State Police. The coordinated effort resulted in the apprehension of suspects and return of much of the stolen material. As is usual in times of reduced employment, rural property can be a target of such attacks. Elderly residents also, may well be targets of such marauders. It seems, however, that the experiences of 1981 have had a beneficial effect of making a larger segment of our 1,118 people residing in Bradford aware of the need of reporting suspicious acts and incidents promptly. Your Police Department is anxious to serve, but can only do so if you call. The dispatch service is available twenty four hours a day - call 938-2422. (See the Chief's report)

It is with regret that we acknowledge the resignation of three yeoman workers for the Town: Lillian Frey, Florence Jones and Catherine MacLeod, who have served as Supervisors of the Checklist for many years. Their many "sittings" and devoted service are deeply appreciated. Appointed to fill their vacancies were MaryLou Valley, Isabel Sheehan and Michelle Smith.

Legislation passed by the State last year has mandated District Solid Waste Disposal Regions. These are to be set up with taxing powers on the Towns, operating much as School Districts. The New Hampshire Municipal Association, representing 223 member cities and towns, including Bradford, has assisted in developing proposed legislation to reduce the impact and cost of such proposals. This is but one of the services of the N.H.M.A. the Town has used to attempt to keep costs low and keep us updated.

Bradford is a "retirement town" with a high population of elderly held here by our resident health services, bank and organization programs. Because of this, there are an increasing number of elderly exemptions on the tax role. Under the present system, twenty applicants were certified under State rules and standards. These exemptions for 1981 total \$245,000 of property valuation. Those qualifying for elderly exemptions are likely to increase as time goes on.

The Town Hall was surveyed for an energy audit during early summer. A program of insulation and tightening up was developed and placed for bid. In early winter the work was started, based on priorities which would give greatest pay back for dollars expended. Unfortunately, many others desire the same work done and while a start has been made, the job is not yet complete. The programmed work will be completed in 1982. Blown-in insulation, heat-leak sealing, tightening flooring, placement of batts in strategic places and storm windows will be included in the final work.

Co-Chairman Nelson Spaulding and Harold Gustavsson of the Master Plan Committee have nearly completed work on this essential tool for Bradford. Plans are to publish it in early 1982 in its final form.

The Conservation Commission is continuing their program of planting in strategic places in the town. Shrubs and trees were established this year and with the good growing season, they made excellent starts. The Commission is also to be commended for its continuing efforts to maintain a clean French's Park by sponsoring an under-water clean-up of cans, bottles and other debris at the park. This event enlisted scuba divers, Scouts and townspeople resulting in a much needed clean up of material hazardous to swimmers in the area. A "feed" for those participating was put on by the Commission with donated and purchased food. Our thanks to them for their efforts.

Again this year we would close with a plea that you also be concerned with your school budgeting process. Remember school taxes make up the largest part of your tax bill. Town taxes are only 27% of your total tax. We urge you to participate in your school meetings and see that your wishes are known. Our efforts to keep town costs down are essential but monitoring your school costs is just as important.

The Board of Selectmen wishes to thank the continued efforts of the Budget Committee to monitor, at least quarterly, the Town Budget and their work in developing the joint budget presented here which we feel recognizes the balance between the needs of the Town and the hard facts of the financial picture of the times.

During the past year there have been six approvals for the operation of new septic systems and three applications for construction still pending. Despite the current slump in new construction this is an increase in building activity in Bradford over the past few years. This reflects, in general, the steady growth Bradford has enjoyed over the past ten years. Our population has increased from 679 in 1970 to 1115 in 1980 for a percentage growth of 64.2 percent. This figure also makes us the fourth fastest growing town in Merrimack County.

REPORT OF THE BRADFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

I am pleased to submit to you the 1981 Annual Report of your Police Department.

The year 1981 was highlighted by the increase in incidents and actions taken by the Police Department. There were 1,073 varied complaints handled during the year which showed an increase of 269 over last year. 1,589 phone calls were received during the year with the majority of them going through our dispatch center. This has been an extremely busy year for your department and many off duty hours were volunteered by our dedicated personnel which allowed us to remain within the confines of our assigned budget.

The responsibility of the police department is great, but equal responsibility also lies with the people of this community. It is good to show a small decrease in the number of calls answered by the Department this year.

Our new truck arrived late in June after a very nerve wracking struggle. It meets our expectations. We would be very pleased to have people stop by the station and show it to them. It was used on one structure fire late in the year and its performance was excellent.

The four inch hose reel on the rear has a capacity of 2000 feet. At the present there is only 1200 feet on it. The Department is asking for funds to purchase an additional 300 feet this year.

The Selectmen's report last year said more study was needed on the "Fire Station" question. The Department in June proposed to the Selectmen that a Committee be formed composed of department members, Selectmen, Budget and Planning Board personnel. The first meeting was held in late December. It is hoped that this study will be continued.

REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

In 1981 we finished the TRA project on Silver Hill and started on Fairgrounds Road. This road has been rebuilt by recycling the old surface. In doing so, we saved approximately \$20,000, thus enabling us to do all of Fairgrounds Road in one year as opposed to two or three years by using the more conventional method.

Early last spring we began construction of a large addition to the highway garage. All the work was done by the town crew. This building will allow us to keep all the equipment inside a heated space in the winter, causing alot less wear and tear on the trucks and sanders.

The Highway Department has two items on the Warrant this year. The first is a combination sander/dump body for the 1980 Ford truck. The unit will result in considerable savings of fuel and labor over its 10-15 year lifespan, by eliminating back tracking over plow routes to sand the roads after the storms.

The second item is to appropriate \$10,000 for an additional road oiling program. This will help catch up on several years of not oiling and prevent the expense of major road building in the future.

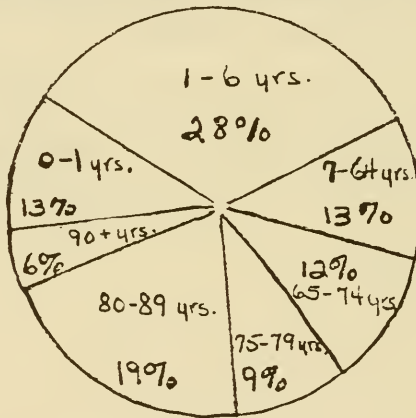

KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has touched the lives of many people in your town this year. The enrollment in the Child Health Program has increased serving 31 children in your town with a total of 69 immunizations given. We have screened 122 people at your Blood Pressure Clinics/Health Fairs with 50 new people in attendance. The growth of KVNA is also reflected in the 216 nursing care visits, 46 Physical and Occupational Therapy visits, and 385 hours for Homemaker and Home Health Aide in your town.

In 1982 we are requesting for the third straight year, the per capita assessment of \$1.95. Total town appropriations equal 15% of our operating budget. RN's Homemaker/Home Health Aides, a Physical Therapist and Occupational Therapist are offering more sophisticated health care including blood drawing and plans for IV Therapy. For the patient, this may mean reduced time spent in the hospital and lowered health care costs. For the elderly, our supportive services may enable people to remain in their own homes, forestalling or preventing institutional placement. These visits are reflected in the following age distribution of our total caseload.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE

I am happy to report that nothing of major importance happened during this year within the town that required calling on Civil Defense. We did have several power outages but fortunately they were of short duration and caused only minor inconveniences. When storms did cut electrical power, we were fortunate that our road agent took fast action clearing fallen trees and keeping the roads opened and sanded, enabling Public Service to make repairs.

With no serious structure fires, forest fires or no serious accidents involving fuels and gasoline and hazardous materials being transported over our roads and through our town day and night, we have slid through another year with God's grace. Amen to this.

In my last report, I asked for volunteers and help with civil defense. I am sorry to say I have had not even one offer for help, nor a single volunteer. I suggested that everyone have emergency rations, e.g. canned juices; portable heat - or auxiliary heat - candles, food, etc. Well, I hope they have provided themselves in some way. We do have several available heaters (kerosene) that are available in emergency - but surely not enough to fill the demand of a community. Some are available.

At a seminar in Laconia at the Margate Hotel, your selectmen, fire department and civil defense were represented. A lot of ground work on the various situations of civil defense were covered and explained in detail and I'm sure a lot was gained by attending this seminar. Hopefully in 1982 more of these seminars will be available for us to attend and we will.

At this time I still have no information to offer on the low flying military planes that pass over sometimes several times weekly. I have asked and made written requests for information and have had no reply to date.

To bring again to your attention, anyone having a gas mask issued by civil defense, it is now *not usable*. The charcoal canisters have gone by their usefulness and will not protect you. Please destroy these or make them unusable. This information comes from the Civil Defense Department in Washington, D.C.

At town meeting, an appropriation of \$50.00 is usually made for Civil Defense for our town. My question on this is, why? This amount wouldn't pay the postage to send a single post card to each resident of the town to inform them of any civil defense activity. To my knowledge this appropriation has never been used by Civil Defense. I would like to inform the townspeople again

that civil defense, as well as all the town departments, are on a twenty-four hour alert in the event of a disaster within our town.

Again, if anyone has anything to offer to civil defense, a service, volunteer to help, or anything, please inform me of it. Defense is everyone's concern - even yours.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Town Master Plan Committees continues collecting information on Bradford's resources for the most beneficial use of town land. When the final plan is completed by the Master Plan Committees, public hearings will be held for further input by the townspeople thereby reflecting most of the wishes of the town's population.

This year seven applications for subdivisions were received and the Board approved all seven.

The Tax Map continues to be a beneficial tool for both property owners and town officials as each piece of property in the town is put on the tax roll. In the past some property was omitted from the tax roll because some lots were not listed or registered. As the Tax Map must be updated each year, the Planning Board now requires an accurate survey by a registered land surveyor for all final subdivision maps. This insures an accurate tax map and helps to reduce the town's cost for revisions.

Planning Board meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at seven thirty in the evening at the office of the Selectmen in the town hall. Property owners of Bradford who are considering subdividing their land should attend these meetings for information that will be helpful to them.

**COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program, Main Street, Warner, serves an area encompassing some 300 square miles comprised of eight towns: Bradford, Henniker, Newbury, New London, Sutton, Warner, Webster, and Wilmot.

This past year we were able to provide \$305,391.42 in aid to the elderly and low-income families of this area.

Elderly Services include: The Meals-on-Wheels for homebound seniors, the Senior Companion Program for shut-ins, the Congregate Meal site in Warner, and a Rural Transportation Bus providing trips to Concord.

Our Fuel Assistance Program reached 263 families in the eight towns served.

We also offer many other programs including an on-going information and referral service, crisis intervention, and advocacy for those in need.

The money your town appropriates for Community Action goes for salaries, travel expenses, office supplies and maintenance of the local Area Center. Program funds are provided largely by the Federal Government.

Every year, despite rapid inflation, we have strived to keep tuition reasonable with the hope that all children in our community will be able to attend a local kindergarten. We feel that the preschool years are extremely important years and that the Bradford Cooperative Kindergarten offers a valuable service to the town at no extra cost to the taxpayers.

Our annual budget for the 1981-1982 school year is in excess of \$6,500. Our organization has raised \$2,500 through various fund raising efforts. This includes our major money-making projects, "The Olde Fashioned Pig Roast and Dance". We also published "The Bradford-Newbury Business Director". Individual donations and tuitions payments support the balance of our budget.

We would like to take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to all the residents of Bradford for their continued support of our organization.
