TOWN WARRANT

The State Of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be put in a Capital Reserve Fund for the celebration of the Bi-Centennial anniversary of the Town in 1969, or take any action relative thereto.

- 8. To see if the Town will rescind Article 10 of 1965 Town Warrant and all previous Town articles pertaining to the construction, equipping and location of a new Fire Station.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to construct and equip a new fire station and grant authority to erect said fire station at the present fire station location according to plans submitted for this site.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to construct and equip a new fire station and grant authority to erect said fire station on land owned by the Town, located between the Daniels Academy Building and the Nissitissit River on Bond Street, according to plans submitted for this site.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to construct and equip a new Fire Station; said Fire Station to be erected on site determined by vote of Article 9 or 10 of this warrant.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the raising of a sum not exceeding \$25,000.00 for the construction and equipping of a new fire station by the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the Town in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, Chapter 33 as amended, and any other statute thereto enabling; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to fix the date, maturities, denominations, interest rate or discount rate in the case of notes, and to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale, time and place of payment of principal in accordance with Chapter 33 of New Hampshire Statutes Annotated, Revised 1955.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to establish a building committee consisting of: one (1) Fire Engineer, one (1) Planning Board member, one (1) Selectman, Forest Fire Warden, and one (1) member elected by the voters at the Town Meeting; and to authorize said Committee to retain

the services of an architect to prepare detail plans, offer proposals, accept bids, award contracts and monitor the construction of the new fire station per article 9 or 10 of this warrant.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Fire Engineers to draw up specifications for a new fire truck and to proffer said specifications for the solicitation of competitive bidding.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the with-drawal of funds from the "Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Fighting Equipment" and to authorize the Board of Engineers to use said funds for the purchase of a new equipped fire truck based on the lowest competitive bid.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the first semi-annual payment of interest on the bond issue for the construction of the new fire station.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for fire equipment.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property tax.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property on tax liens acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or Tax Collector's Sales.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for a swimming instructor.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract for janitor at Daniels Academy Building.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to charge a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid after September first.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Memorial Day.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$482.10 to secure State Aid for permanent improvements of highways.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Blister Rust Control.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for cutting, spraying and removal of trees.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the maintenance and modification of communication equipment.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for cutting of brush along town roads.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for erection of a new fence replacing the old fence along north side of Bond Street.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to repair Town road leading to Melendy Pond property.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to fix up the infield of the Ball Park.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the necessary funds from the "Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund" for the construction of a fire-proof vault to be constructed in the basement of Daniels Academy Building.

- 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use the Town Hall Equipment appropriation for the installation of crash handle door locks on exit doors of Daniels Academy Building.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to close and discontinue the Town Road beginning at the corner of Main Street and the westerly boundary of present fire station land and extending northerly to the Mae Pierce land.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for the purchase of fuel oil for the Town Hall and Fire Station.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 38. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the ambulance service.
- 39. If the vote on the preceding article is in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of said ambulance.
- 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:
 - 1. The sum of \$200.00 from Olin T. Greeley, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Maude and Ralph Greeley lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
 - 2. The sum of \$200.00, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Durrell and Reid lot.
- 41. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the Board of Selectmen for the wonderful co-operation and support that they have given to me and this department during 1965.

This department investigated 41 motor vehicle accidents this year, some that resulted in personal injury and others in several thousand dollars in property damage, but again this year I am happy to report that there were no fatal accidents.

This year the Police sponsored the Soap Box Derby and hope to continue it this spring. There has been much interest in it and I feel that it is a good project for the youngsters.

The Officers of the department started early this year attending riot control school in Milford and in the late spring this department along with ten other towns formed a mutual aid riot control squad with over one hundred members available and ready in case of any emergency in any of the member towns.

This meant purchasing additional equipment, but I feel that it is money and time well spent.

This year activity increased in Brookline as it has in every town throughout the country. This means that more and more time must be spent by the police in various duties. Therefore I have included in my report a breakdown of duties performed and hours spent through the year at each phase of activity to give the citizens of Brookline a better idea of the hours spent by the Officers of the Police Department in performance of duty.

1965 was a very active year for this department and many thanks are in order to the other departments both in town and out of town for the aid and support they have given.

I would like to express my gratitude to the members of this department for their support, fine work and many hours of services donated. In closing, I would like to thank all of the townspeople who have aided and supported my department during the past year and say that I sincerely hope through the many hours spent that the police department has in some small way helped to make our town a better place to live. REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The revived Brookline Planning Board had a busy year reorganizing itself and investigating possibilities for a new firehouse for the town.

In joint meetings with the Fire Engineers we investigated five possible sites:

- 1. The present location.
- 2. Mr. Erwin Corey's land across Main St. from the present station.
- 3. Mr. Roland Bernier's land on Steam Mill Hill.
- 4. Daniel's Academy land.
- 5. Mrs. Blanche Knight's land across from the residence of Mr. Frank Keeler.

We have eliminated three of these sites for the following reasons:

Erwin Corey's land would cost in excess of \$1,000 for development. This could be acquired only by trading it for the present station and land. An offer has been made of \$2.500.00 for the present station if the town wishes to sell.

Mr. Bernier's land was ruled out because acquisition would have to be by eminent domain as he does not wish to sell. There also is great congestion of trucks and cars at Hall's Store, Hall Manufacturing Co. and Mr. Mourgis' evergreen business.

Mrs. Knight's land was eliminated because of the high development cost, the acquisition expense and the lack of water available.

This leaves a choice between the present station location and the Daniel's Academy land. The building proposed for the present station site is to be of brick and cement block. It is to be brick above ground on three sides. It would have a flat roof with four large doors opening to the street. The problems concerning this site are as follows: Adequate space now but no room for expansion. Losing the income from the sale of the present building. Expense of erecting a retaining wall in the rear and the Fire Engineers feel Hall's Store brook is an inadequate water supply as it is polluted and had ceased flowing last summer for the first time in as long as Forace Hall can remember.

Water is a problem for a new station because the Engineers want a dry hydrant at the building so the firemen can fill the tanks inside without contending with ice and freezing conditions.

The building proposed for the Daniel's Academy land is of Colonial design complete with cupola and weather vane. It would be of wood construction with clapboards on the outside. Three doors would open on to Bond Street.

The problems arising here are the taking of space now used for playgrounds, school bus turn around and parking for vehicles attending town hall functions. This site does however, have water available for a dry hydrant.

The planning board unanimously agrees that the town should have a new fire house and has tried to present to the voters a choice of stations which will be economical, efficient and cover the town's needs for years to come.

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of Union 40:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent for the Towns of Autherst, Brookline, Hollis, Milford, and Mont Vernon.

Having assumed this position on a full-time basis on October 1, 1965, it would seem advisable that this report be confined to a summary of my impressions and conclusions concerning the Union 40 schools and my assessment of future programs necessary to maintain and extend the educational program for the children in our community.

Impressions

One who has newly arrived on the education scene in Union 40 is bound to be impressed by a number of factors. We have a fine faculty which is predominately well trained. This, in and of itself, provides a great resource for an educational program. I have found the administrative staff to be dedicated, hard working and courageous enough for the challenge of modern education. The central office staff have proven themselves invaluable during this transition period. Their dedication and service have made my adjustment much easier. Dr. Richard Goodman was gracious enough to remain with me during the month of October. His knowledge and assistance are most appreciated. The people of this community were fortunate to have had the services of such a dedicated educator for the past four years.

The towns have made a sincere attempt to provide adequate facilities for education. The plants in each community, with the exeption of a very few, are well equipped and maintained. In the few sub-standard schools we have efforts underway to correct them. Our custodial staffs have maintained our buildings at a reasonable level and the interiors of all schools are attractive and conducive to a good educational atmosphere.

The basic curricular programs are more than adequate, in most areas, and any new ideas and innovations have been incorporated.

If there is a weakness in the curriculum, it is the lack of grade one through twelve coordination and articulation. Special programs in visual studies and team teaching are worthy projects.

The communities in Union 40 have demonstrated their interest and support of the schools through the election of qualified and dedicated School Committee members and through strong financial support of the educational programs.

Future Needs

The citizens of this community have made education available to all youth through the high school years. These schools do not exist to classify or eliminate the unfit. Instead, each child is a resource of our community and it is the schools function to develop that resource as far as possible in the time available for schooling. To fulfill its function, the school must provide programs calculated to develop the capacities and abilities of all the children assigned to it. To better identify individual talents and service the teaching staff in terms of the child's individual need, I recommend the adoption of an elementary guidance program. This year we have applied for support of an elementary counselor through PL89-10. I sincerely hope that the citizens of our community will agree with this recommendation and vote support of this program.

The school must serve a dual role. It must contribute to the development of basic citizenship beliefs and skills and also promote the individual's unique abilities. Although both functions contribute ultimately to the same goal, a better society, they are not always cultivated by the same process. The school must organize its program for both ends. Students must have the opportunity to develop their unique abilities to the fullest extent. We must therefore undergo a careful study of our curriculum and plan a coordinated one through twelve curriculum that provides for the many variaties of pupil ability. All students should achieve greater knowledge, but the amount will vary from student to student. It is not the function of the school to produce students exactly alike. Brighter students should have the opportunity to become increasingly superior in their attainment and the further in school they progress the greater the individual differ-

ences we will have to make in our program to accomodate them. Efforts must be made also to develop materials and techniques of instruction for the less able learner. Our school programs must be geared to care for the individual differences of its children. We must understand the type of growth necessary and then make it possible for different students to achieve this growth by working on materials that are meaningful and have purpose for them. Next year we plan to work with the University of New Hampshire in developing an in-service-training program for the combined Union 40 staff. This program will stress the development of new instructional materials and the coordination of subject areas as well as grade placement.

Thought should be given to incorporating a kindergarten program in the public schools. Children can benefit from this early experience. Recent programs run under Project Head-Start have proven the value of a meaningful kindergarten experience.

Conclusions

The Union 40 communities are in an excellent position to meet the challenge of the coming years. We have an excellent basic program with the staff to carry it through. We have in effect many programs recommended as needed by recent educational studies, true some need refinement, but this is essential in any case.

Financing as always, is going to be difficult. It behooves us therefore to make sure that every expenditure is necessary and that efficient use is made of all personnel and materials.

No annual report would be complete without recognition of the fine service of those people who retired from active service during the year.

Miss Mabel Connolly will retire as Teacher Consultant at the conclusion of this school year. During the past 12 years Miss Connolly has faithfully served our children. Her devotion to work and dedication to youth cannot be adequately rewarded in flowery adjectives. The people of our community who have had the benefit of an education under her direction can well appreciate her true value.

Mrs. Betty Denault will retire as Principal of the Hollis Elementary School in 1966. Mrs. Denault has faithfully carried on her duties as Principal in the true meaning of the position (Master Teacher). Hollis has indeed been fortunate for the past 42 years. Our best wishes in your retirement Mrs. Denault.

OUR TEACHER CONSULTANT

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to have worked with the personnel of Supervisory Union #40 for the past twelve years. I would like to submit this, my culminating report, as one that points out not only the progress that has been made during these years but the many things remaining to be done if our children are to find their places in this complex and fast-changing world.

Possibly, our total progress has come under the heading of "Guidance For The Elementary School Child." This has involved many programs and projects with but one purpose: the understanding of each child and his needs as an individual.

- A. To help understand the child, we have kept records of his background, abilities, progress, and needs. Through in-service training, the teachers have acquired an understanding of how to evaluate the child's achievements, how to record his progress, and how to identify possible problems.
- B. We have endeavored to understand his achievements in relation to his ability and to place him at the level of learning where he could be challenged to work to his optimum and to avoid the frustrations that often inhibit learning. We have provided programs for this purpose and, insofar as has been possible, the materials required to enhance these programs.
- C. The child has been considered in the light of all of his needs emotional, social, physical, and scholastic.

In 1953, when my work with these children began, it was possible for me to come in contact with many children having specific problems and with the cooperation of the teachers, principals, parents, and others, get to the source of the problems and, in many cases, help the child to overcome them. Since that time, however, the schools have doubled in size and enrollment. The ratio of the number of children with problems seems to be on a greater scale than one would expect. The fact remains that an increasing number of children must receive help. Over the past few years there have been many with acute emotional problems. These pupils were getting progressively

worse while help was being slowly procured through the proper channels. This has been extremely distressing to those standing by and unable to give aid themselves.

Whereas guidance is taken for granted as a part of the junior and senior high school programs, it has usually been considered as unessential in the elementary field. Nothing could be further from the truth! Here, guidance takes a different form from that found among the pupils in the higher age bracket. There are more programs in the elementary curriculum that could come under the heading of guidance than most people realize. At this age, the emphasis is not on vocational guidance, but on many other facets that will channel the child into better scholastic achievement at the upper levels.

With so many various programs coming under the label of guidance, it is far too great a burden for any one school system to assume alone. A guidance worker is necessary. Even a short time ago it might have been impossible to initiate such a program. The opportunity has now arisen for such a qualified person to be hired, thanks to the offer of Federal funds.

I strongly recommend that:

- 1. Our present program enhancing the entire field of guidance be continued and strengthened.
- 2. We make as much use as possible of all available help regardless of its source.

Since the sole purpose of our schools is to provide the very best for our children, these two recommendations are mandatory.

I am extremely grateful to the teachers, the parents, the school board members, the administrators, and all others who are interested in good education for our youngsters and who have helped to make our school program possible. Also on behalf of these children, I would like to express to these persons a real debt of gratitude.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Principal of the Brookline Schools.

The schools opened last September with one new teacher, Miss Jean Wilcox and a substantial increase of the student body above what was expected. This fact led to shortages in most departments, but we got underway in spite of it.

Mrs. Harris, grade one, enrolled 28 pupils.

Mrs. Madigan, grade two, enrolled 34 pupils.

Mrs. Dunn, grade three, enrolled 30 pupils.

Miss Wilcox, grade four, enrolled 32 pupils.

Robert Harris, Principal, grade five, enrolled 30 pupils.

Mrs. Varney, grade six, enrolled 21 pupils.

for a total of 175 pupils. The incoming since September have more than made up for those leaving.

It has been a pleasure to return and continue working with the present grade six. Aside from being the smallest group. I can't help feeling a degree of pride in contrasting this group September, 1965 with the same group September, 1964 and noting improved areas, feeling it is, by and large, the best all around group in the new building. It took me to Christmas last year to get this group headed in the right direction, and they haven't let either Mrs. Varney or me down as the new year progressed.

I feel that the Board moving me up here was a step in the right direction in that I am more in the center of things. Last year I was constantly up at this building, for one reason or another. This year there has been no problem as such that made it necessary for me to be at the Academy except on scheduled visits.

I am especially pleased with the advent of Mr. John Murphy as Superintendent. Mr. Murphy and I work well together, and I am convinced he is a definite asset to the overall picture.

I am also gratified in the knowledge that continued steps are being taken to get all pupils under the same roof. Only by so doing, I feel, can things be adequately carried out in administration of general functions.

In closing, I wish to thank the Board, Superintendents Goodman and Murphy, the staff, Miss Connolly, parents, and youngsters for a continued rewarding experience in the Brookline Schools.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Changes in this year's budget are due to increases in tuition for Junior High pupils from \$438 per pupil for the current year to \$467 per pupil for 1966-67 school year, and from \$489 to \$521 for Senior High pupils. The Board is recommending an across the board increase of \$300 for the present teachers. This still does not put our teachers on the salary plan recommended by the Salary Study Committee whose report was accepted by the School District voters last year. We are also recommending the addition of a new position of part-time remedial teacher. We feel this can make an important contribution to our educational program. A youngster can be helped immediately whenever he or she has difficulty learning in the regular classroom. This will be covered in a separate article in the warrant and will cost \$1,200 for the part time teacher plus \$450 for equipment and dividers for the all purpose room. Some of the cost of the equipment will be reimbursed by the Federal Government. Using the all purpose room for class room purposes is in line with the recommendations of the School Study Committee. We also plan to use the all purpose room for library and resource materials for youngsters working on special projects. There is an increase in series 220 for additional resource materials, especially for the Social Studies program. Increases in the text book and supplies accounts are due to increases in the number of pupils in the elementary school. We increased from 151 pupils to 178 pupils this past year, an increase of about 18%. Since our total budget increase is 7% over last year and includes a substantial tuition increase, we feel we have kept the impact of this larger number of students in grades 1-6 to a minimum.

The School Board appointed a School Study Committee as authorized by the School District at the meeting last March. Their report is printed elsewhere in this report of the School District. We recommend that the same committee be continued for another year.

The Board feels the time is fast approaching when we must add to the elementary school. We endorse the recommendation of the Study Committee that a building committee be appointed and an expenditure of \$300 be authorized to draw preliminary plans to be presented at School Meeting in March 1967.

SYNOPSIS OF SCHOOL MEETING March 4, 1965

The Annual School Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Thomas Arnold, and the meeting opened for business under Article 1.

- Article 1: Voted to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers as printed in the Town Report. Motion made by Beatrice Hall, seconded by Sidney Hall.
- Article 2: The names of Walter B. Fessenden and Allan O. Fessenden were presented in nomination for auditors for the School District by Miriam Jepson. Sidney Hall moved that the Clerk cast one ballot, seconded by Rudolph Peterson. This was done and Walter B. Fessenden and Allan O. Fessenden were declared elected.
- Article 3: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,310 to provide three buses for transportation of pupils in Grades 7-12 to Nashua schools. Motion made by Terence Denehy and seconded by George Shedd.

Joseph Gill made a motion for an amendment to the Article, seconded by Francis Dougherty. The Moderator allowed the amendment: exception to the allowing of the amendment was made by Terence Denehy. However, when the amendment was presented it read "to see if th District will vote to raise and appropriate X number of dollars to provide two buses for transportation of pupils in Grades 7 - 12 to Nashua schools" and this amendment was not accepted by the Moderator.

The amendment was then changed and to the original motion was added "if not necessary to provide three buses, provide two." The amendment was then acted upon and was defeated. The original question was then put to the meeting and was carried.

Article 4: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to be paid into the Capitol Reserve Fund for construction and equipment of additional classrooms to the elementary school. Motion made by Allan Fessenden, seconded by Melville Prior.


Article 5: Voted to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source. Motion made by Sidney Hall, seconded by Vincent McInnis.

Article 6: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$121,-253.68 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Motion made by Beatrice Hall, seconded by Rudolph Peterson.

Article 7: Under other business, Beatrice Hall made a motion that the School Board appoint a study committee to aid the School Board in studying school problems. Seconded by Terence Denehy and the motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 9:55 P.M.
