THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in town.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Plymouth Memorial Hospital.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system as provided in Chap. 22, Laws of 1943, for the election of its town officers, in place of the so-called Australian ballot system previously adopted.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road leading from the Peg Wood Hill road, so-called across Winter Brook to the Whitney place, so-called.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Campton School Board:

My second annual report as your superintendent of schools presents for your consideration those items which my experience has shown to be of special importance. The facts and discussion included herein are intended to give the people of Campton information which will help them to better understanding of school operation.

Our first concern is the teacher situation as it affects our ability to keep all Campton schools in good functioning order. School boards may provide ample supplies and equipment and superintendents may give advice and direction, but the teacher herself is the final gauge of school efficiency. It therefore becomes of paramount importance that we secure and keep good teachers. There are many factors which now have a tremendous influence on doing that very thing. Teacher training institutions are able to supply only a small per cent of those needed each year. As we go deeper into the war emergency that supply is likely to grow even less. Many teachers have responded to the call of government service or the lure of more attractive wages in industry. Being perfectly aware of the teacher shortage, the comparatively few available teachers have become more critical of offers made to them, confident that a little more waiting will bring opportunities which could normally be realized only after a long period of successful experience. This all works to the disadvantage of the small school of four or more grades. In my opinion we need expect no great improvement for at least another four years. Campton has appreciated the quality of service rendered by local and nearby teachers and has expressed that appreciation by appropriate upward revision of the salary schedule. Our best school insurance is to be prepared in 1945-46 for still greater financial inducements as we enter the highly competitive field of teacher employment.

Music instruction was resumed in October when Miss Carolyn E. Gove of Laconia was employed as music supervisor. There was an interruption of five weeks while her car was undergoing repairs following an accident which occurred while she was on her way to the Manchester Convention. Miss Gove's manner of approach has won the good will of her pupils and the teachers. We believe much will be accomplished in music under her direction.

School transportation has been reduced from that maintained in 1943-44. The route covered by Mrs. Phoebe Downing was discontinued and arrangements were made with the father to transport the only pupil on that route. Similar arrangements with the father of one pupil on the Bog Road eliminated Paul Durgin's route. John Blanchard's route to the Center School remains unchanged. A reduction in transportation is a favorable development in these days of gasoline and tire economy.

Not only in Campton but in several other towns as well there is increasing difficulty in procuring janitor service in rural schools. Even with larger pay the few older boys who might do such work do not seem interested. Furthermore, this year it so happens that larger pupils who might otherwise help out live too far from the school to undertake janitorial duties. The employment of adults, provided they were available, presents an acute financial problem.

All schools are now provided with the new reading system through grade four. It is not our intention to extend the basal system beyond that point. Grades three through eight are using "Adventures in English" which gives us a unified plan and continuity of instruction in English. Manuscript writing is now being taught in grade one and will continue through the first half of next year in grade two. From the second half of second grade, all pupils will receive regular instruction in a graded system of handwriting. A complete

series of history textbooks is being gradually introduced from grade five through eight. It is my opinion that the most satisfactory results can be obtained when we use a complete set of books for instruction instead of several split series.

Parents have now had a chance to see how the new report cards picture the progress made by their children. Attention is especially called to the report on school citizenship. It is my belief that the qualities there rated will count more heavily in later success than the purely scholastic achievement. The purpose of the new reporting system can be summarized under these headings:

- (a) They present a visual record of progress
- (b) They reward real effort.
- (c) They encourage pupils to do their best.
- (d) They allow constructive comments by teachers.
- (e) They make children mindful of personal qualities.
- (f) They make teachers understand their pupils better.
- (g) They discourage jealousy and selfish competition among pupils.

The true function of our schools is to take each child at the point where we find him and build from there on rather than to try to start at the point where we wish he might be. For that reason, it is not uncommon for children to work on one grade level in arithmetic and on a different grade level in one or more other subjects. This plan can easily be followed in schools including several grades under the same teacher. Teachers and superintendent alike are trying to make each child's school years as helpful and effective as possible as we prepare each one to assume an active part in later life.

Again, I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation that exists among parents, teachers, and members of the Campton School Board.
